NOT MANY YEARS AGO, it was considered "taboo" to campaign against your opponent in a political race in a mud-slinging type of manner.

Most of the time, voters were "turned off" from this type of campaigning, and it would most likely backfire. Campaigns were run purely on the record of the accomplishments of the candidate themselves, and the opponent was basically ignored.

How times have changed! Practically without exception, the current campaigns have been nothing but an exercise in dissecting the candidate's opponent. What the candidate's opponent had done or had not done filled up the majority of the speeches, the advertising space or commercial time on radio or television.

Yours truly heard a longtime national commentator on the political scene say that he thought that the current campaign had been the worst from this standpoint that he had ever seen, and he also was voicing the hope that candidates would "turn the corner" and go back to a more positive type of campaign.

There has been such negative campaigning, that in some of the races which were held this week, you never heard a positive statement advanced on behalf of either candidate in a race.

As a voter, I found myself scanning the ballot and wishing that just once, a particular candidate or their supporters had come out with a statement on their own qualifications or background, so we could make a more intelligent decision on their race.

I think most voters are like myself, in that they would rather judge a candidate on his or her own merits, rather than having only heard all the bad information their opponent had been able to dredge up during the course of the campaign.

The worst part about negative campaigns such as witnessed in the 1982 election is the fact that voters get the idea that in reality they are having to make the choice between the lesser of two evils, rather than choosing a candidate on the basis of his superior qualities.

This gives you the idea that the person you are electing to serve in a particular office is inferior to begin with, and that he should most likely be replaced at the earliest possible time.

The voters are "saddled" with the candidates who run for office in the various parties, and many times have little control over who gets on the ballot for a particular race.

So you can understand voters' frustrations when all they hear about a particular candidate (or every one of them) is what a crook and a scoundrel he is, how inept he has been in his previous position, how much money he voted to spend on such-and-such, how much money he spent on the campaign, that he was arrested for speeding in 1955 in a Houston suburb, was once seen attending a "rock" concert, drives a foreign car, and at one time ran the bingo booth at his hometown celebration.

Thank goodness we are to be spared this type of abuse on the media for the immediate future. Now we can go back to the old regular ads and commercials, such as how to cure dandruff, acne, grey hair, being overweight, etc.

Come to think of it, this sounds sort of familiar. Reckon those political commercials were written by the same folks who try to attack our personal ills?

Chiefs Win Coin Toss, Gain AAA Grid Playoffs

Friona won a three-way coin toss between themselves, Dimmitt and Muleshoe Friday night, and in the first year of runner-up teams qualifying for UIL playoffs, will represent District 2-AAA in football.

The Chieftains are slated to meet 1-AAA champion River Road, who ironically was Friona's opening season opponent, in the first-round of the 1982 playoffs next Friday. School officials were meeting in Canyon Saturday morning on game details. The site was expected to be Canyon's Buffalo Bowl or at Hereford.

The tie for second came about after Friday night's game results, which saw the Chieftains lose to district champion Littlefield, 23-9; Muleshoe topple Tulia, 28-18, and Dimmitt beat Abernathy, 28-7. These three teams ended district play with identical 3-2 records.

It took five tosses of the coin, with officials of the 3 schools involved meeting in Dimmitt late Friday. On the fifth toss, Dimmitt's representative tossed the odd coin, and was "out," according to pre-determined rules. Friona matched Muleshoe, and since the Chieftains had beaten the Mules last Friday, 17-10, won the right to enter the playoffs.

The Chieftains entered Friday evening with two chances at the playoffs. One was to beat the potent Wildcats in their final season game, and the team gave Littlefield a run for their

money, before falling to a strong second half 'Cat rally, losing 23-9.

Friona played the 9-1 Wildcats on almost even terms during the first half, trailing at intermission by five, 14-9.

The Chieftains drew first blood, driving 80 yards the second time they had the ball, to take a 6-0 lead. Sophomore runningback Alfredo Mata sparked the drive with runs of 16 and 17 yards. On third and eight from the Wildcat 13, Bruce Patterson tossed a pass to Max Perea, who dashed into the end zone.

The snap from center on the PAT try went over everyone's head, but Friona had taken the lead at 6-0.

Littlefield came back to drive 72 yards in only five plays to take a 7-6 lead. Then the Wildcats went 64 yards in a ten-play drive for a 14-6 lead 5:10 before halftime.

Charlie Venazy returned the kickoff to midfield to get the Chiefs going. Patterson hit Eloy Caballero with a 26-yard pass to the Littlefield 20, and on fourth down Mark Montoya got the Littlefield fans' attention with a 44-yard field goal that cut the margin to 14-9 at the half.

But the Wildcats wore the Chieftains down in the second half, as injuries began to take its toll on Friona. Steve Greene scored a third-quarter TD for Littlefield, which then missed a two-point conversion.

Wildcat triple-threat quarterback Bryan Gregory booted a 40-yard field goal which cleared the uprights for the final margin of 23-9.

Friona drove to the Wildcat 15 in the fourth quarter, but a Patterson pass was intercepted at the one to turn back the scoring bid.

Having lost the chance to win the playoffs and the district title to boot, the team then had to wait and sweat it out until coaches and officials from the three tied schools, all playing on the road, gathered in Dimmitt for the crucial coin toss.

Game results were also vital. Had Tulia beaten Muleshoe, Dimmitt would've edged Friona for the playoff spot.

Friona had lost a three-way toss in 1977 to Littlefield when they tied for the district title with the Wildcats and Muleshoe Mules, so Friday night's "win" helped erase the memory of that "almost" trip to the playoffs.

It's the first time in the football playoffs for Friona since 1965. In two years as head coach at FHS, Tommy Moss' teams have tied for second in district both times.

Littlefield led in first downs, 15-10; in yards rushing 253-163 and in passing, 59-53. Mata was Friona's leading rusher with 93 yards on 12 tries, a nifty 7.8 yards-per-try average.

Friona's injury list continued, and may be a factor in the team's playoff picture. The team's 1,000-yard gainer, Charlie Morgan, carried the ball only twice at Littlefield. Quarterback Bruce Patterson was limping, and Doug Carbel had an apparent shoulder separation.

It was believed that Districts 1 and 2-AAA had reserved Canyon's Buffalo Bowl and the Hereford High School stadium for next Friday's playoff contests. Littlefield and Dalhart would meet at one site and Friona-River Road at the other, if these expectations were met. Announcement on site and time will be forthcoming from the school.

United Way Kickoff Day Set Monday

The kickoff luncheon for the Friona Area's 1982 United Way campaign will be held at noon Monday, November 8, at the Girl Scout House.

Royce Bodiford of KGNC Radio, Amarillo, will be the speaker for the kickoff luncheon.

Mike Hanes and Keith Black are co-chairmen for the 1982 drive.

The goal for the 1982 United Way campaign is similar to that for 1981: \$12,350, which is just \$200 above last year's goal.

Local Voters Favor Clements, Collins

Friona and Parmer County voters bucked the trend somewhat in Tuesday's general election.

For example, in the governor's race, where former state attorney general Mark White won the race against incumbent Bill Clements, Governor Clements was awarded 61.3 per cent of the votes in Friona, 571-360. County-wide, Clements also led, with 1432 votes (58.9 per cent) to 997 for White.

Clements won nine of the county's ten voting boxes, all except at Black, where White scored a 1915 edge. White also led in the absentee box, 46-37.

Clements won Friona's largest voting box (Precinct 2-1, voting held at Calvary Baptist Church), 333-227. He won Precinct 2 (Fire Station), 102-67; and Precinct 2-2 (Community Center), 136-66.

In the race for County Commissioner, Precinct 2, in which a certain number of Friona voters were involved, Dale Hart of Friona lost out to Tommy Williams of Bovina, 510-175. However, Hart won his home voting box, 102-93.

In the only other local "race," Justice of the Peace Frances Euler of Friona turned back a late-blooming write-in campaign by Madge Horton, garnering 761 votes to 165 votes for Mrs. Horton.

Perhaps causing a little confusion in the JP race was the fact that on some of the ballots, including those cast at the Fire Station, Mrs. Euler's name was not printed on the ballot, and this was not discovered until after voting began. For the balance of the day, election officials had to add Mrs. Euler's name and a square, under the proper place.

But this oversight did not appear to materially hurt Mrs. Euler's re-election bid, as she won Precinct 2, 118-20; Precinct 2-1, 404-81; Precinct 2-2, 125-44; Black, 29-2 and Lakeview, 48-15. She also led in the absentee box, 37-3.

In the U.S. Senate race, Friona's three precincts gave challenger Jim Collins a big majority of their votes, 544 to 377. This amounted to 59 per cent of the local vote. County-wide, Collins also held a lead, with 1324 votes (54.8 per cent) to 1,094 for Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, who won re-election.

Friona voters also went for Republican George Strake in

his ill-fated race for lieutenant governor, 587 votes to 406 for incumbent Bill Hobby. In county totals, Strake polled 1212 votes to 1168 for Hobby.

Local and county voters also helped Ann Richards become the first woman to win a state-wide office since "Ma" Ferguson held the governor's chair. Mrs. Richards won in Friona, 501-387 for Allen Clark, and carried the county, 1353-949.

U.S. Representative Kent Hance, who faced only token opposition in his bid for re-election, was virtually unopposed. He polled 783 votes in Friona to 127 for E.L. Hicks, and tallied 1,983 votes countywide to Hicks' 384.

Mike Read received 11 votes in the Libertarian Party for congress (not shown on the county voting chart), and John Ford received six votes. Laurel Kay Freeman received ten votes for lieutenant governor, Bob Poteet received three votes for governor, Charles Fuller garnered 14 votes for land commissioner, and Stanley Keen received eight votes for agriculture commissioner.

County voters went along with five of the six proposed constitutional amendments.

Voters went along for Number 1 (repealing state property tax), 1294-768; Number 2 (increasing ceiling on payments to needy children), 1076-997; Number 3 (empting agricultural machinery), 1448-719.

They also approved Number 4 (terms for members of certain boards), 1464-597; and Number 5 (abolish county treasurer's office, Tarrant and Bee counties), 922-745.

Only Number 6 was turned down by county voters (increasing maximum interest rate on general obligation bonds), by a margin of 997-932.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren said the voting turnout of 2,460 represented about 57 per cent of the registered voters in Parmer County.

The number was well below the 1980 presidential election turnout of 3,519, but slightly ahead of the last off-year election of 1978, when 2,460 people went to the polls.

Friona's largest voting box, 2-1 (Calvary Baptist location) ran out of ballots, and had to do some fast shuffling to borrow from other precincts. A total of 568 people voted in that precinct.

The turnout in Friona was 952 voters. This was up from the 871 Friona voters in 1978, and commendable, since there was still considerable confusion by some local voters as to where they should cast their ballots, due to the restructuring of the city and county's precinct lines.

Chieftains Score 17-10 Win In Vital District 2-AAA Game

The Friona Chieftains stayed in the thick of the District 2-AAA title chase with an exciting come-from-behind win at Muleshoe last Friday night that was without question the team's top performance of the 1982 season.

Friona spotted the hometown Mules a 10-0 lead early in the second quarter, then turned on the defense and took advantage of some timely breaks, to score a 17-10 win.

The win gave the Chieftains a 3-1 district record, and clinched no worse than a tie for runner-up honors in the district race, with tough Littlefield left on the schedule.

It was Muleshoe that took advantage of the first break in a game that was to be full of big plays.

Friona took the opening kickoff, and in six plays had the ball at their own 47 yard line, facing fourth down and a yard to go.

The Chiefs' decision was to go for the yardage, but Muleshoe showed it was tough when challenged, and threw Charlie Morgan for a yard loss to take over the ball at the Friona 46.

Two consecutive pass completions moved the ball to the Friona 30, but then the Chieftain defense dug in and held at their 19. From that point Muleshoe kicked a 35-yard field goal, to take a 3-0 lead with 5:20 left in the opening quarter.

The Chieftains picked up one first down, but again came up fourth down and short yardage, but having been burned before, booted the ball away this time.

Muleshoe proceeded to drive 67 yards in ten plays to extend their lead, Hard-running Alex Paez wiggled his way 26 yards on the Mules' second play, and on a big third and 14 play, quarterback Sam Gonzales hit Freddie Vela for a 35-yard gain to the Friona 11.

Five plays later, wingback Jeff

Hamilton punched the ball across from the two, and Eddie Alvarado's kick gave the Mules a 10-0 lead. Only 54 seconds had elapsed in the second quarter, and Friona fans were remembering the same type of start against Dimmitt a week earlier.

But the Chiefs dug in, and late in the half began a drive which eventually paid off with a score. Friona took the ball at their own 32, after Paez was knocked loose from the pigskin.

Quarterback Bruce Patterson gave the team a first down with a six-yard run to midfield, and Max Perea gained ten yards. Friona faced fourth and five and decided to punt.

Punter Mark Montoya was leveled by the charging Mules, and Friona got the ball after a 15-yard penalty against Muleshoe. Muleshoe later was flagged for unsportsmanlike conduct, and the ball was moved to the Muleshoe 13.

Two passes fell incomplete as the clock neared halftime. But on third down, Patterson lofted the ball and split end Johnny McLellan made a great catch in the end zone for the touchdown.

A high snap foiled the point try, but Friona was on the scoreboard and trailed at the half by only four, 10-6.

Muleshoe took the ball to open the second half, but didn't keep it long. On the third play of the second half, Bruce Patterson stepped in front of a Gonzales pass at about the Mule 45 and ran down the sideline to the 14.

But hard luck set in, as Friona drew a pair of penalties, and on fourth down found themselves back at the Muleshoe 25. Montoya came in with his tee, and boomed a 43-yard field goal that drew the Chieftains within a single point at 10-9. This came 3:27 into the third quarter.

Muleshoe picked up one first down

but had to punt, and Friona took over on their own 28.

Chieftain speed merchant Charlie Morgan had left the game in the second quarter with a hip-pointer injury, so the team was without their leading ground-gainer for the remainder of the game.

But the team got some outstanding play from other sources. Such as from Patterson, who ran nine yards, then three for a first down. The drive bogged, and Friona punted.

The Muleshoe safety attempted to fair catch the ball, but perhaps hearing footsteps, bobbled the ball, and Friona recovered at the Muleshoe 21. The Chiefs had become party to their second big break dealing with their kicking game.

On a third and two from the 14, Patterson bulldozed for eight yards for a first and goal situation at the Muleshoe six. On the next play, Alfredo Mata barreled into the end zone, and Friona led, 15-10.

Needing a two-point conversion with only a five-point lead, the Chieftains sent Eloy Caballero on a post pattern. Patterson threw the 150-pound junior a strike, and the two-pointer made it Friona 17, Muleshoe 10 with 1:29 left in the quarter.

A high punt against the stiff south wind by the Mules after they had been held for the third time in the quarter gave Friona yet another good chance, with the ball at the Muleshoe 40.

But on the first play of the final quarter, Friona suffered its only fumble, and Muleshoe recovered at their 34.

The Mules started a drive, with Paez picking up 31 yards in three totes, before the Chieftain defense tightened up. It was fourth and three from the Friona 26, when Paez was upended by Patterson on one of several stellar defensive gems by the

Chieftains.

Friona took over on their own 28. On a second and two, Patterson again ran two yards for a first down to keep Friona in possession. But a holding penalty against Friona two plays later was an untimely blow and the Chieftains were forced to punt.

Muleshoe took over on their own 42 yard line, with plenty of time (5:51) to do something about the score.

But the Chieftain defense had other ideas, and when the Mules tried to run the ball from fake punt formation and failed, Friona took over at midfield.

Friona again had to punt, this time Montoya backing the Mules up to their 27. There was still four minutes to play in the game.

But big defensive plays by Martin Lopez, who sacked the Mule quarterback for a nine-yard loss, and Tim Kirk, who cut the feet out from under Muleshoe's Hector Orozco on a big fourth down play, spelled doom for the home team.

Friona was then able to run out the clock. Patterson added insult to injury with a 12-yard run up the middle with a minute left.

Patterson led the balanced running attack for Friona with 44 yards gained on 12 carries. Bruce picked up seven of the team's 13 first downs on keeper runs, and passed for another.

"It was an especially good performance, considering how many players we had sidelined," said Coach Moss, who particularly lauded the team's outstanding defensive play. Every defender did his job, and that was what it took.

"It should be a big confidence booster," said Moss in reference to the team's final game of the season at

Littlefield, where the district title will be on the line.

Around The House

There's something new in microwave ovens today: a bit of metal here and there. And if MIGHT be OK—if you STRICTLY follow all manufacturer's directions and understand them.

Some microwave cookware now has metal or metallic coating, and there are a growing number of frozen-food items packed in metal dishes. Also, makes of aluminum foil say to use it in your microwave oven.

Manufacturers of the different ovens provide specific instructions for using metal—as do the makers of microwave accessories and aluminum foil.

Utensils containing metal elements IF DESIGNED FOR MICROWAVES should pose no threat to the microwave oven, utensils themselves or food. Their form or shape allows them to direct the microwaves in an energy-efficient manner.

DON'T OPERATE WITHOUT FOOD

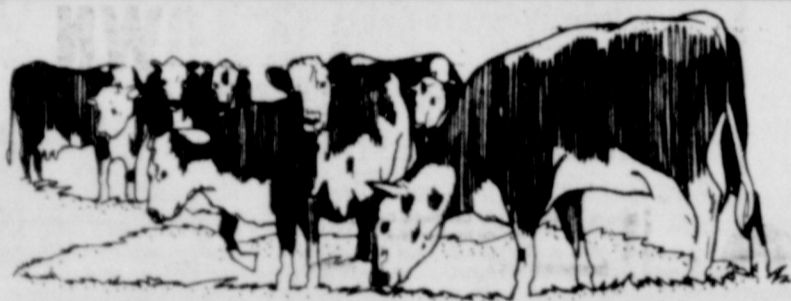
Something old in microwaves still holds: do not operate a microwave without food.

A microwave oven's walls are made of metal and that metal reflects the microwave energy. So, to prevent damage, there MUST be some sort of FOOD "load" in the oven to absorb the energy.

Operating the oven empty—or with a metal container and NO FOOD—can cause great damage: fusion of the materials inside the oven and, in some cases, damage to the magnetron tube. If a metal container is put in the microwave oven alone—without food—it acts as a "second wall" inside the microwave oven, rather than an object to absorb the microwaves.

KEEP METAL AWAY FROM WALLS

One reason it's so important to follow directions STRICTLY is "arcing." This can happen if a metal utensil touches the microwave oven wall. It may cause an unsightly defect to the oven wall rather than actual damage to the oven.
