WE APPRECIATE the remarks this week by Senator John Tower, in his weekly newsletter from Washington, in regard to community newspapers.

In fact, we decided to share his remarks with our readers. (Senator Tower isn't running for office this year, so maybe we can get away with using his particular column.)

"This week (October 10-16) is National Newspaper Week. I would like to join my friends in the press as they observe the occasion with the theme 'A Free Press—Your Key to Freedom.'"

"A free press is guaranteed in the First Amendment of our Bill of Rights. The founders of our nation believed that it was an essential right—not for newspapers or their editors—but rather for the people. They realized that it was impossible for even the best-informed citizen to know first-hand of everything that happened in government. Only through newspapers, and later other forms of mass media, was it possible for citizens to keep track of their representatives and their government. It was essential that the press be free of government control if it was to perform this function.

"Newspapers thus have a proud heritage as guardians of democracy. Our entire system of government rests on the premise that an informed electorate will make decisions that lead to good government. Government officials have a primary obligation to keep their constituents informed, but must depend upon the press as the primary vehicle through which to meet that obligation.

"Throughout my 21 years in the U.S. Senate, I have been proud of my association with Texas newspapers. They have not always agreed with my actions. They have not always written stories the way I would like to have seen them written. But, by and large, they have been fair and have served their readers well. That is all that any public servant can ask.

"I would also like to say a word about community journalism. As communication and transportation have improved during this century, the world seems to have grown smaller. National news networks, nationally circulated magazines, easier travel and commuting have brought us closer together as a people. This has made us a stronger nation. Yet, we have lost some of our roots, our sense of community, in the process.

"Community newspapers serve a special role in helping people feel a part of their town as well as their nation. As I travel throughout the state, I see many towns in which the newspaper is a substantial factor in the preservation of a community's sense of identity. This is a valuable service, particularly in Texas where diversity is one of our great resources.

"So as a reader and a public servant, I would like to use the occasion of National Newspaper Week to thank the newspapers in Texas for their outstanding service, and for their unceasing dedication to their role in preserving our traditions of freedom and democracy."

THOSE WHO ENTER the football contest each week have reason to suspect that our schedule for West Texas State's games may have a flaw or two.

We had resisted this temptation for about 20 years, but finally yielded. This week's slate includes a game for none other than Slippery Rock State Teachers' College. I guess you could say this is our "protest" against the NFL strike. Maybe by next week there will be a break in the strike.

Commission Has Friday Session

Mostly routine business was transacted by the Parmer County Commissioners' Court, which met on Friday, October 8, a departure from the court's regular Monday meetings.

Lawrence Kriegel of Bovina had visited with Judge Porter Roberts as to repairs and renovations made to the Bovina Neighborhood Center. Due to the work done, Kriegel asked that the rent to the building be increased. A motion was passed approving the increase of the county's share of the rent to \$86.00 per month effective January 1, 1983.

A request had been received from the Bovina Ambulance Service for certain equipment. Following a discussion on the matter, the item was tabled until the next meeting, for further study and consideration.

A motion was passed to allow the County Extension Agent for Agriculture to have repairs made to the county pickup, which are expected to help the vehicle's mileage. Benna Felts, County Treasurer, met with the court and presented the quarterly report of county finances. A motion was passed approving the report, and directing that it be published in the three county newspapers.

A motion was passed to pay boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$1100, which amount will be reimbursed to the county.

Short reports were made by the County Extension Agents, Laura Jacobs and Seth Ralston, relative to the 4-H Club work underway in Parmer County.

Plans Made For United Way Campaign

Drive chairmen have been named, and the kickoff date announced, for the Friona Area's 1982 United Way campaign.

Mike Hanes and Keith Black are co-chairmen for the drive.

In a change from the usual pattern, the drive will be kicked off with a luncheon, rather than a breakfast. The kickoff luncheon will be held at 12 noon on Monday, November 8.

Royce Bodiford, general manager of KGNC Radio, Amarillo, will be the speaker for the kickoff lunch.

The goal for the 1982 United Way campaign is very similar to that of 1981. The goal is \$12,350, which is only \$200 above last year's goal.

Review Board Meets Saturday

The Board of Review of the Parmer County Appraisal District will meet Saturday, October 16 at the Appraisal District's office, 305 Third Street in Bovina, from 9 a.m.-12 noon and 1-4 p.m.

Those having appointments with the board to discuss their tax evaluation will be heard at the meeting.

Mother Located After 20 Years

A genuine "human interest" story has developed due to the visit this summer in Friona by Reiko Sadaoka, Japanese girl sponsored locally by the Friona Noon Lions Club through the Youth Exchange Program.

On the last day of her stay in Friona, Reiko learned of a Japanese lady living here, Chizuko (Mrs. Bob) Northcutt, and was anxious to meet her.

Reiko learned through her visit that the Friona resident had lost contact with her mother and family in Japan, and had not heard from her mother in almost 20 years. She had feared that her mother had died.

Reiko promised Chizuko that upon her return to Japan, she would do her best to find out something about the mother, and would let her know something.

About ten days ago, Chizuko received letters and a photograph from her mother and brother, who live in Yokohama. This week, she had a 45-minute telephone visit with her relatives in Japan.

Reiko spent the summer with the John Blackwell family as part of the Youth Exchange Program.

The Blackwells had known about Mrs. Northcutt through their daughter Melanie's acquaintances in school with Chizuko's daughter Mary Summers, who is a student at Friona High School.

As fate would have it, it turned out to be on the last day of Reiko's visit that she was able to visit with Mrs. Northcutt.

That also was the evening she was a guest of the Friona Evening Lions Club. Reiko became so intrigued by her visit with Mrs. Northcutt that she came back after the club meeting for a second visit.

"We had tried to write to Chizuko's mother three or four years ago, after we first married. But the letter came back stamped 'addressee unknown,' or something to that effect. Chizuko was afraid that meant that her mother was dead, but I kept telling her 'We're going to locate your mother'," Northcutt said.

Reiko had told Mrs. Northcutt (Chizuko) that Yokohama was located about 200 miles from where she lives, and that when she had a break from school she would make an effort to locate Chizuko's family.

But to speed things up a bit upon her return, Reiko called an aunt who lives in Yokohama, and in a short time the aunt had located the "missing" family. (The mother still lived in the same house as before. Some street numbers had changed in the meantime.)

"I just can't find words to say thank you enough. I wish to thank the Blackwells, the Lions Club, and of course, Reiko. I am so happy," Chizuko said this week.

"I really appreciate the Lions Club, for sponsoring the girl in the first place, and for their interest in our situation. It was just a miracle," Northcutt added.

Northcutt said that the day the letters arrived, his wife came inside with them. "She was crying and laughing, all at the same time. It was the longest time before I knew that the news was good," he said.

The Northcutts said that Reiko still plans to visit Chizuko's mother, when she gets her break.

A lot of happiness has been evident at 112 E. 12th Street the last several days. And it all was due to a young Japanese "Youth Exchange" student who "just happened" to come to Friona for the summer.

Elliott died Wednesday, October 13 at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

He was born March 12, 1892 in Linden, Texas, and came to Parmer County in 1927.

Elliott was a veteran of World War I, where he served in the Army. He was a member of the Farwell Masonic Lodge, the El Paso Scottish Rite, and was a past member of the Bovina City Council and school board.

He had served as the first president of the First National Bank (now First State Bank) of Bovina.

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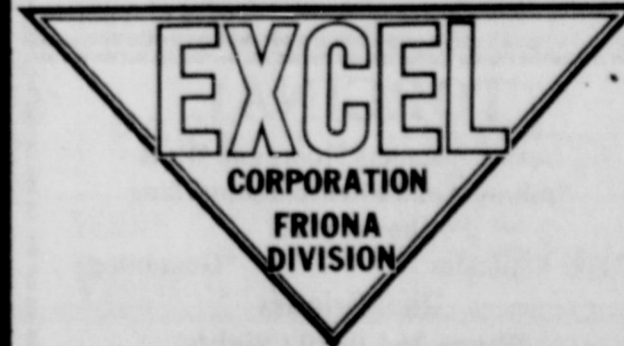

Chieftains Win Dist. Opener Against Tulia Hornets, 16-7

The Friona Chieftains began district play last Friday with a 16-7 win over the Tulia Hornets in a wind-swept game at Chieftain Field. The win pushed Friona's season mark to 4-2.

A cold front was moving through the area during the game, and winds up to 30 and 40 miles per hour hampered play, and made it

uncomfortable for the fans watching the game.

Although Friona completely dominated the game, rolling up 16 first downs to only five for the Hornets, and in yardage, 216-125, the Chieftains held a slim, 9-7 lead at halftime, thanks to a broken-field run by Tulia's Chris Sperry in the second quarter.

Friona had taken a 3-0 lead in the first quarter on a 47-yard field goal by Mark Montoya. It was the FHS place-kicker's second try of the game, having barely missed a goal from five yards closer the first time Friona had the ball.

Montoya had contributed a 12-yard run on Friona's second possession, to move the ball from the Chieftain 41 to the Tulia 47. From there, Charlie Morgan ripped off a 15-yard gain to the Hornet 31.

But a run and two passes failed to gain yardage, and on fourth down Montoya teed up the ball. The kick was true, and with 1:46 left in the opening period, Friona had a 3-0 lead.

Friona gave Tulia a lesson in defense as the Hornets had the ball at Friona's 40 on fourth down and ten to go. Tulia had the field position thanks to a high punt into the wind which Friona couldn't handle.

On the fourth down play, the Chieftain defense rose up to throw the Hornet quarterback for a four-yard loss, and Friona took over on their own 44.

Inspired by the good defensive play, the offense went to work and

put together a good drive. Morgan ran 25 yards to the Tulia 25 for a first down. Reese Fleming then gained 14 yards, moving the ball to Tulia's 11.

From this point on third down, Morgan went in for the touchdown. A high snap hurt the kick try, and Friona had to settle for a 9-0 lead with 8:43 left in the half.

Tulia had the ball at their own 45 following the kickoff, when Sperry got loose on his run. Friona had the play covered, but some good blocking by the Hornets and running by Sperry got Tulia on the scoreboard. The run was a 55-yarder. The kick trimmed Friona's lead to a shaky 9-7, which was the halftime score.

Neither team could mount a sustained drive in the third quarter. In fact, the Chieftains held Tulia to minus eight yards in the period.

Early in the final quarter, Friona got good field position after Montoya punted the Hornets into a hole at their own six. Charlie Veazey returned the Tulia punt to the Hornet 34 to set up a short scoring drive for Friona.

Helping the drive along was a 15-yard penalty against the Hornets for a personal foul.

Reese Fleming ran 11 yards to move the ball to the two, and from there Morgan ran it in for the TD. Montoya's kick gave Friona a little more breathing room at 16-7. Just 2:42 had expired in the final quarter.

That was to be all the scoring, although Friona moved to the Tulia 24 on a drive late in the game. The Chieftains were content to turn the

Hornets back with their defense.

For the record, the win was Friona's first football victory over the Hornets since 1974 when the Chieftains edged Tulia 6-0 in a defensive gem, and only the fifth victory ever for Friona in the on-and-off series which first started in 1933.

Viola Gonser Observes Her Ninety-Fifth Birthday Here

One of Friona's newest residents, Mrs. Viola Gonser, who recently moved to 309 East Ninth from Laverne, Oklahoma, is really one of our oldest residents and certainly one of the most active for her age.

She observed her ninety-fifth birthday Tuesday, September 21. The following Sunday she was honored with a birthday dinner in the home of her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Gonser, 402 East Ninth.

Then, in the afternoon her five grandchildren, Douglas Gonser of Laverne, Oklahoma; Mary Redfearn, Fort Supply, Oklahoma; Patti Mayhew, Farwell; and Ciara Loooper and Dean Broyles, both of Friona, hosted a birthday party in her home.

She also has fifteen great-

grandchildren and eighteen great-grandchildren. Most of them attended the party.

Mrs. Gonser was presented a corsage by the hosts. A decorated cake was served from a table covered with a white satin cloth and decorated with fall flowers.

More than fifty persons, including some from Clovis, New Mexico; Laverne, Fort Supply and Weatherford, Oklahoma; and Bovina, Dimmitt, Canyon, Amarillo, Oklahoma Lane, Farwell and Hart, Texas, attended the party.

Viola was the first of eight children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. Newt Brawner near Logan, Kansas, September 21, 1887. The family soon moved to Nebraska and from there to a farm north of Woodward,

Oklahoma, which was the Oklahoma Territory at the time.

Brawner was a wheat and corn farmer and did all his farm work with horses and mules. He also raised cobs. Most of his equipment was single row when Viola started helping him farm. Later he added multiple row plows, planters, cultivators, etc., which were powered by eight mule teams.

The Brawner's first home in Oklahoma was a half dug out. The above the ground part was covered with logs and rocks and the dirt floors were covered with hand made rag rugs. Before her marriage Mrs. Brawner was a teacher.

Viola reports that in spite of being the oldest girl in the family she did very little baby sitting with her siblings. Instead she went to the field and helped her Dad.

The first farm work she remembers doing was helping with wheat harvest. She drove the six head team which provided power to push the header. The wheat was hauled in a header barge from all parts of the field to a central location, where it was stacked to await the arrival of the steam powered threshing machine.

After attending several one room schools, Viola went to Carmen for one year and graduated from the eighth grade. The following year she attended Woodward Normal and taught at a one room school during the 1904-1905 school year.

She recalls riding horseback eight miles each way that year and was the principal, classroom teacher, janitor, custodian, nurse and whatever else her seventeen pupils needed. She remembers the winter as one with a lot of snow and many times her saddle horse waded snow up to his knees to get her to school on time.

About this time she met E.G. Gonser, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. D.A. Gonser, also pioneer residents of the Woodward area. Their friendship soon developed into a romance and the young couple made plans to be married in September of 1905.

E.G. followed the wheat harvest that summer and by the end of July he was in Larned, Kansas. His home was a covered wagon, which was pulled wherever there was wheat to harvest.

The couple corresponded regularly by mail and before the end of the summer the wedding date had been moved ahead several weeks. Viola remembers her train ride from Oklahoma to the northern part of Kansas. They were married in Larned August 4, 1905 and spent their honeymoon travelling in a covered wagon.

Their first stationary home was in the half dug out on the Brawner farm about eight miles north of May, Oklahoma. Their only son, Leonard, was born here.

Later the couple bought a relinquishment and moved closer to Laverne. Mrs. Gonser still owns this farm and her grandson, Douglas

Gonser and his wife, Eleanor, live there. They lived on this farm until they bought land south of the Syndicate Hotel in Parmer County, and moved to Texas.

When Mr. Gonser first got interested in Parmer County land, he brought Oklahomans out to look at it and he and Mrs. Gonser stayed at the Syndicate Hotel when it was operated by Mrs. W.C. Wilkerson and her late husband.

Mrs. Gonser remembers, "Mrs. Wilkerson prepared such delicious meals, but the one thing I remember most is a combination of turnips and zucchini squash." (Mrs. Wilkerson now lives at 312 East 12th.)

The Gonsers farmed in Parmer County from 1927 until 1953, then moved back to Laverne. When they started farming with tractors, Mr. Gonser drove one and Mrs. Gonser drove the other.

The couple bought their first Model T Ford in 1917 and Viola soon learned to drive it. Recently, she passed the second driver's license test she has taken in Texas and remembers that she had to take one when they moved back to Oklahoma twenty-nine years ago.

She does her house and yard work, drives her own car and has good health. When asked for a formula for a long useful life, she replied, "All I know is that I've had good health and I've always worked hard."

Mrs. Gonser's hobbies include piecing and quilting quilts, sewing, doing embroidery work, knitting, crocheting and rug making. She also plays the piano, violin and guitar.

She says, "I really enjoy playing

the violin most and when I get lonely, I just practice awhile."

She has lived alone since her husband's death twelve years ago and thinks she's going to like living in Friona.

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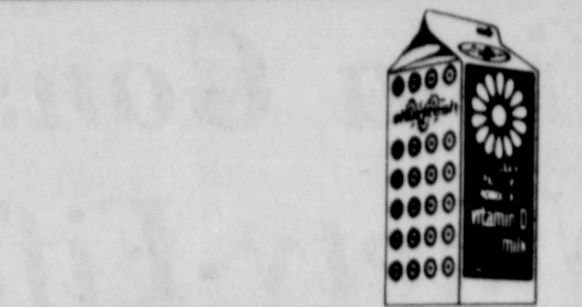


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
