LAST WEEK WE printed a picture and a short article about former Friona Chieftain star Tony Perea, who is a defensive starter at linebacker for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the professional Canadian Football League.

Perea, who went from holding virtually all of the offensive records in football at FHS to star on defense for the University of Texas at El Paso, got back into the scoring column in his team's opening game, even if he is playing defense.

The former Friona star scored the first touchdown for his team in the regular CFL season, recovering a blocked punt in the end zone in a game against Montreal.

"I had a couple of touchdowns on interceptions in my senior year at College, but never one like that. I thought I was going to get hit from behind while I was waiting, because that ball seemed like it was never going to come down," Perea was quoted in the game story.

Perea's team dropped the game in question, 33-23 to Montreal, the defending Grey Cup champions, which is apparently Canada's Super Bowl. But the hometown press lauded the youth-laden Hamilton team.

Perea's score was called "The most intriguing Tiger-Cat touchdown" by the Hamilton newspaper.

It's good to hear from Tony, and we appreciate the clippings that papa Jake loaned to us. We always enjoyed watching Tony play football. He always gave about 150 per cent, and apparently is still doing just that.

## Scores Hit Zenith In Football Event

Scores in the Friona Star's football contest hit a high for the season last week, as six contestants tabulated the score of 19, new high for the contest, missing only one of the slate of 20 games.

One factor helping the scores was that for the first time this season, there were no tie games on the slate of 20 games.

Coming out with first place prize money for the week was Marie Fleming, whose tie-breaker score of Dalhart 7, Friona 6 was only seven points off the actual score. Mrs. Fleming was awarded first place prize money of \$10.00.

Second place went to Jayson Grimsley, whose tie-breaker guess of 14-14 was eight points off the actual score. Grimsley won \$6.00.

Third place and \$4.00 was awarded to Clay Bandy, who also had a 19, and missed the tie-breaker by 15 points, picking the Chiefs to win by 21-14.

Three other contestants also picked 19 contest games correctly. They were Jack Clark, Bobby Drake and Cindy Smiley. Ironically, these three contestants were all 22 points off on the tie-breaker score.

Five contestants correctly picked 18 games, which was the previous high weekly score. Those missing only two games were Fred Barker, Jr., Edward Castillo, Owen Drake, Mitchell Smiley and Bobby Wied.

## Snakebit Chieftains Nipped Again, 14-10

The Friona Chieftains and their fans must be wondering what else can happen to them, after Friday night's 14-10 loss to the Abernathy Antelopes at Chieftain Field.

For the third straight week, the team had the "first half blahs," trailing 14-0 at intermission, just like they had against Hart and Dalhart.

Friona came back for a great second half, and cominated play, but their inability to get the ball into the end zone on two opportunities made the difference between defeat and victory.

Abernathy fumbled the ball on its first offensive drive, and Rolando Caballero recovered at the Chieftain 42.

The Chiefs picked up a pair of first downs, but on fourth and 11 from the Abernathy 36, a pass from Keith Martin to David Barnett gained eight yards, three less than needed to keep the ball.

On Abernathy's second possession, quarterback Wayne Riley hit Ron Presley on a 49-yard bomb to the Friona one. He was caught from behind. However, Ken Davenport rammied it across on the second down play, and Mickey Davis kicked the point for a 7-0 score.

Keith Martin raced 15 yards to the Abernathy 38 after the kickoff, but on the next play Bobby Zetsche fumbled and the Antelopes recovered. Abernathy then set out on a 65-yard drive that culminated when Riley passed 19 yards to Rodney Mahagan for a touchdown. Davis' kick made it 14-0 1:48 into the second quarter.

Late in the quarter, London ran 19 yards, Zetsche 14 and London 13 again as Friona drove to the Abernathy 32. However, a third-down pass was intercepted at the 10 to end the threat.

Only 1:46 remained in the half when Abernathy took over at the Friona 32. But it was enough time for Riley to drive the team 60 yards and a first down at the Friona 10. Abernathy had four plays inside the ten before the half ended. Friona had to call on all of its defensive might to avoid a third touchdown.

Midway of the third quarter Friona held an Abernathy drive on the Friona four, and began a drive of their own. Davy Carthel ripped off 19 yards to get the team out of the hole.

Zetsche raced 30 yards on a nice run, threatening to break for a TD before being stopped at the Abernathy 45. Three plays later, Zetsche ran 11 yards. Carthel picked up six, Zetsche five and London six as the third quarter drew to a close.

As the quarter ended, Friona had the ball fourth down and three from the Antelopes' nine.

The fourth down play was a pass, which Martin overthrew in an attempt to hit Jeff Whiteside.

Friona held, and took the ball back at the Abernathy 41 after a punt. Zetsche gave the team a pair of first downs, at the 28 and 15.

London ripped to the three, and then finally got Friona on the scoreboard by blasting over from three yards out. Friona went for two points, and got them, when the speedy Zetsche raced into the end zone to trim Abernathy's lead to 14-8, as only 5:48 remained in the game.

Friona got the ball back at their 39 with 3:52 left. Zetsche and Martin gave the team a first down at Abernathy's 48, and then London ran through a gaping hole for 13 yards. But he was thrown to the ground on a vicious tackle, and the ball spurted free. The Antelopes covered the

fumble, and it was a costly one, coming at the 36 with 2:43 left in the game.

The Chieftain defense pushed Abernathy back to their eight in three plays in which the Antelopes mainly let the clock run. Facing fourth and 37 from their own eight, Abernathy purposely gave Friona a two-point safety, in order to kick the ball out of danger.

Quarterback Riley simply took the ball on fourth down and ran into the end zone and downed it for two points, making it 14-10 with only 47 seconds left in the game.

Abernathy then punted the ball from the 20, and Zetsche made a good return from his 35 to the Antelope 35. On first down, Martin failed to get off a pass, and the team lost precious time waiting for the ball to be reset. Instead of getting several plays before time expired, Friona only got four.

On third down, Carthel made a nice catch of a Martin pass, to the Abernathy 15, but a desperation play as the gun sounded found Martin being swamped behind the line of scrimmage.

## Mayor Urges Continuing Revenue Funds

Mayor R.L. Fleming this week urged the continuation of the Revenue Sharing program through a letter to U.S. Senator John Tower.

Mayor Fleming's letter said: "Friona is a small city, population count of 3,111, however, Revenue Sharing is playing a very important part in our over-all budget and daily operations. For instance, \$8,500 of Revenue Sharing funds are allocated to the payment of personnel which amounts to 6 per cent of the annual payroll. The \$34,000 Revenue

annually amounts to 7.12 per cent of the entire city budget.

"Practically all the funds received from this program have been allocated specifically to sanitary landfill-solid wastes disposal operations which is a requirement handed down by Federal, State and EPA procedures for which no other funds were provided.

"So you can readily see that curtailment of the Revenue Sharing Program will seriously affect our budget and future welfare of this community.

"I sincerely urge you to support the continuation of the Revenue Sharing Fund Program when it comes up for reconsideration in congress," the letter concluded.

# REMEMBERING... Feed Sacks

Used to be, when you wanted a new shirt or new dress, you didn't just go to the store and buy one. No. Your mother would pull out all the feed sacks and flour sacks from where she kept them and you selected the material you liked. For boys, it was usually plain white or unbleached material, but the girls could choose from an assortment of pretty prints. If it makes any difference, clothing patterns weren't purchased either. They were usually made from newspapers, cut, trimmed and fitted to the person they were intended for. The clothes didn't always fit, however, sometimes they bagged and drooped or else cut off blood circulation in a place or two. One size was usually made to fit all.


The sacks were obtained by purchasing chicken feed, flour and other things. I enjoyed going to the feed store. It had a nice smell about it and it was fun to play hide-n-seek among the tall stacks of bags and crates. They generally always had a bunch of baby chicks in the back of the store that were fun to watch, too.

A friend of mine tells the story funnier than I can about his grandmother. How she would do all their feed buying just to get to pick the clothing material she wanted. She would stand for hours, looking at the assortment of sacks, trying to decide. Invariably she would select the one on the bottom of the stack. The poor old storekeeper, wishing to be accommodating, would take down the sack to get to the sack at the bottom. But, more than a few times, by the time he got to the one she pointed out, she had changed her mind and had selected another one.

It was common practice to trade sacks or sell them back to the feed store. You could go to the store and buy empty sacks to match ones you

already had. Often, sacks were traded among neighbors. Therefore, even though it took about three sacks to make a regular dress, it was usually possible to have it made all out of the same print pattern of

material. Dresses and shirts would sometimes have seams in odd places but it didn't matter. No one criticized how your clothes looked because theirs usually looked the same way.

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

### 45 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 31, 1930

Farmers in the Friona territory say that their chances for a wheat crop this year look extremely good. There is plenty of moisture in the ground to bring the wheat to a good growth and the usual amount of winter moisture they will be sure to make a good stand.

### 40 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 25, 1935

Monday was "Wheat Check Day" at Friona, when County Agent, A.R. Bateman and his assistants put in one full day here in the Maurer building delivering wheat checks to the wheat farmers of this locality. The checks that were delivered at that time were the last 1934 and the first 1935 checks, and those delivered totaled an estimated amount of \$80,000.00 for this locality. The total amount of money allotted the wheat farmers of Parmer County according to Mr. Bateman, is \$200,780.30, of which amount \$121,780.30 in checks has already been received at his office at Farwell.

### 35 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 25, 1940

Parmer County 4-H Club Beef Calf demonstrators have scheduled a Progress Show in the school bus barn in Friona Saturday afternoon, October 26 at 2 o'clock. This is not a competitive show, but will give you an opportunity to see the type calves on feed now, and compare the feeding results next March at our spring show.

### 30 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 26, 1945

Mayor Glenn Reeve announced Tuesday that the City Commissioners have appointed Freese and Nichols, engineers, to do the preliminary figuring on the prospective sewer system for Friona. Further announcements in regard to this project will be made as soon as possible.

Lion W.L. Edelman of Friona has been made Zone Chairman of the Lions Clubs at Friona, Hereford and Dimmitt. His appointment was made by Deputy District Governor

Lon Edwards of Amarillo, and concurred in by District Governor Charles H. Dean of Plainview.

### 25 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 19, 1950

Burglars again struck Friona last Thursday night, taking property from the Friona Lumber Company and the Friona Consumers Cooperative. The same night, tools were taken from the A.L. Black farm southeast of Friona. The lumber company safe was carried from the yard, later being found near the highway west of town, minus a small amount of cash, but still containing the books of the firm.

### 20 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 21, 1955

Playing "caveman" proved fatal to a 6 year old child Thursday afternoon and placed another in the local hospital severely cut and bruised about the head. David Casares, son of an itinerant Mexican family, lost his life when playing with a number of other children in a pit at the Mills & Fleming Gin south of Friona. The
