The Friona Chieftains made some kind of basketball history with their 63-58 win over Dimmitt in the 'Cats' lair last Friday. We can't find out the last time that this particular feat was accomplished. It hasn't happened since 1950 at least, so that means the first time in 25 years at least.

Now, the Chieftains have their second goal right before them—a victory over the Morton Indians, whom they haven't beaten anywhere for a number of years, although they played them a close game here in the invitational tournament last year.

If the Chiefs can pull off this second of their "two stage" goal, it will just about wrap up the first half of the district title, and would assure that the team would at least be involved in a district playoff for the 3-AA basketball crown.

Friona has been "close" to district titles in football the past two years, and most of the basketball starters also were involved in football. We think this group of boys are tired of being just "close," and want to do something all the way for a change.

FIGURES CONTAINED in stories presented elsewhere on this page indicate that the economy of Parmer County is in pretty good shape as 1974 gets under way.

An all-time high of \$47.2 million was on deposit in Parmer County's three banking institutions. All three banks showed sizeable gains in its deposit figures. A gain of 41.6 per cent in deposits isn't bad for a one-year period.

With record deposit totals, business in these parts should be good in 1974. Naturally, lots of folks are concerned about the shortage of fuel, and rightly so. This will undoubtedly have a bearing on whether or not the year 1974 lives up to the one just completed.

But apparently things could be a lot worse off. We could have a gas shortage and be broke at the same time. Looking at the bank figures, it appears that if somehow the shortage is solved, most of us will be able to pay for the fuel we need.

ONE OBSERVER said you could tell when the farmers had a good year. Most have been able to buy a new car—and in some cases a new pickup as well.

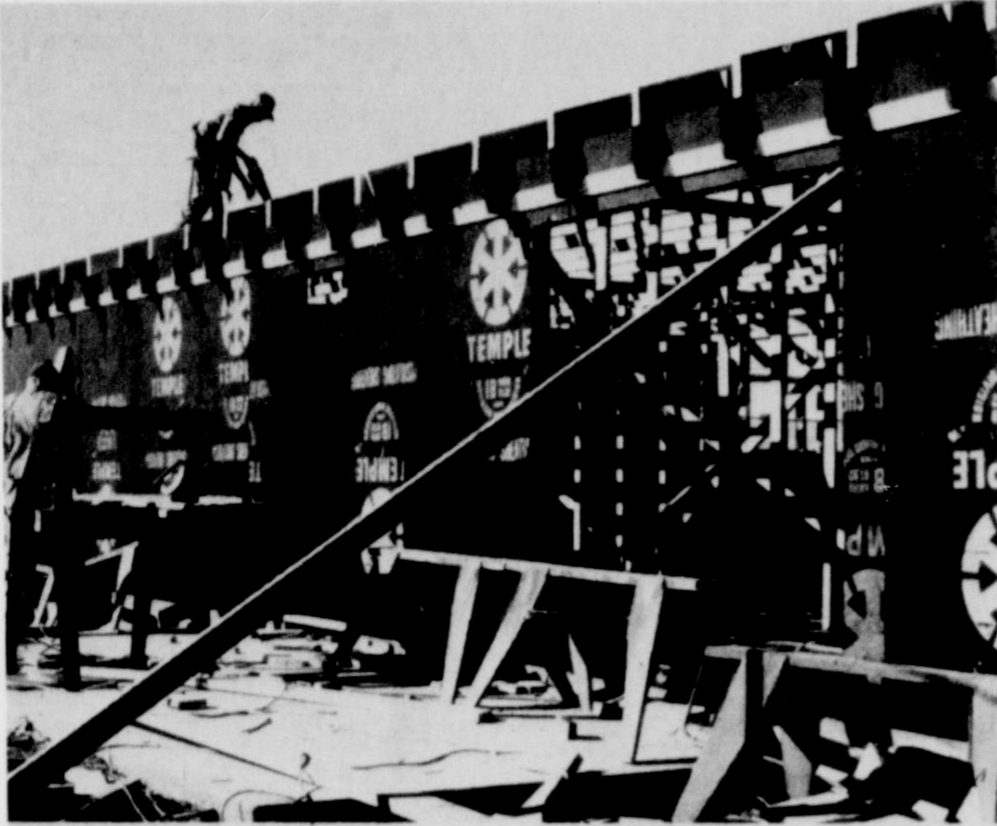
Most farmers would have invested even more in equipment if they could have gotten just what they wanted during the calendar year just past.

ALL-TIME RECORD

County Bank Deposits Top 47 Million Mark

Parmer County was 41.6 per cent wealthier at the beginning of 1974 than it was at the start of 1973—at least that's what was revealed by bank deposit figures, released this past week by the three county banking institutions.

Three Parmer banks had a total of \$47,192,862.54 on deposit at the close of business on December 31, 1973. This was an increase of \$13.9 million over the total deposits on the same date a year earlier. That figure rounded off was \$33.3 million.

Bankers across the county credited exceptional crops, along with record prices, for the boom in deposit growth. Deposits set all-time records at Friona State Bank, Security State Bank of Farwell and Bovina's First State Bank.

Farwell's deposits showed the biggest gain of the three banks, from \$10.8 million in 1972 to \$17.3 million in 1973, a whopping 60 per cent increase. Bovina's deposits increased by 43.6 per cent, from \$5.2 million to \$7.6 million. Friona grew by 29.4 per cent, from \$17.2 million to \$22.2 million.

The county's overall growth percentage was a healthy appearing 41.6 per cent.

Total assets at the three county banks rang the bell at \$51,621,070.96—up by 42.4 per cent from the figure of \$36,243,633 a year earlier. This was an increase of \$15.4 million.

Loans amounted to \$23,834,534 at the three banks mentioned. This was up by \$4.7 million from the figure of \$19,162,614 of a year earlier.

Only one county banker interviewed had a "cautious" attitude. "When they have to pay income taxes next spring, these figures may go down pretty quick," he warned.

That may be right, but as of the moment, a lot of Parmer County folks sure do appear to be wealthy.

Politics Low Key As Deadline Nears

Filing deadline is just over two weeks away, and there has been a minimum amount of political activity, what with four county officers to be elected, plus three precinct officials in the county.

In addition, in Friona there will be two city councilmen, a mayor elected, and two school board members.

On the county level, voters in 1974 will elect a judge, a county treasurer, a county clerk and a district clerk.

In addition, precincts two and four will elect a commissioner. All three of the county Justices of the Peace are to be elected.

As of Tuesday morning, all four of the present county office holders had filed for re-election. Also, Charlie Jefferson had filed for re-election as commissioner in the Bovina precinct.

Others who had filed for re-election as county judge; Benna Felts for county treasurer; Bonnie Warren for re-election as county clerk and Dorothy Quickel for re-election as district clerk.

Thus far, the Lazbuddie precinct is the only one showing a contested race, as Pete Jesko this week filed for county commissioner. Junior Treider, the incumbent, also has filed.

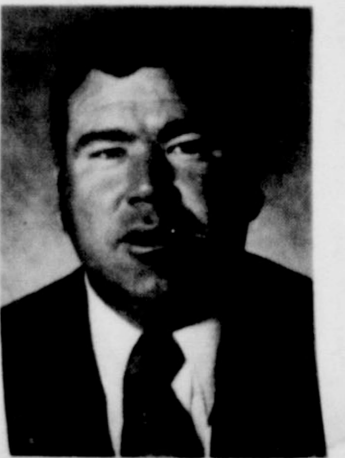
Maddox Named New Junior High Chief

45 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 25, 1929

J.A. Blackwell was elected president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce at a called session Monday night. Other officers are M.A. Crum, vice-president; John White, secretary; J.M. Osborn, treasurer and M.C. Wilkison, director.

Report on the condition of Friona State Bank showed that deposits as of December 31, 1928, stood at \$270,356.29 [compared to the almost \$10 million on deposit on the bank's last statement].

Friona gins will begin operating only three days per week until the current crop is off. Ginnings at the present time total 1200 bales, and the original estimate of 2,000 bales may not be reached.

40 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 26, 1934

Prof. Glenn Davis will direct the Friona school faculty in a three-act play, "The Whole Town's Talking," on Friday evening.

West Texas Gas Company has had a crew of men employed this week making some extensions to its gas mains. One was made across Eleventh Street between Summit and Prospect Avenues. Another was in the northwest part of town to provide services to the homes of C.C. Weis and O.C. Jones.

35 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 27, 1939

We have been reading quite a bit in various newspapers concerning the "seething" attitude toward Governor O'Daniel's "Transition Tax" plan.

Principal Approval Tops Board Agenda

The naming of the new Junior High School principal was the main item of business confronting members of the Friona School Board at their monthly meeting Monday night.

Cecil Maddox was approved as the replacement to longtime Principal Tom Jarboe, who will become superintendent of schools on July 1. (See separate story on this appointment).

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Garry Baccus, who is serving as instructor of the school's general construction trades class in junior high school. Tax assessor-collector Porter Roberts' report showed that a total of \$158,530.89 in taxes was

collected during December. The school tax collections as of January 1, 1974 amounted to 65.7 per cent of the tax roll, up from 59.8 per cent as of the same date a year earlier.

The board called a trustee election for April 6, to coincide with the City of Friona's council election. Two spots on the board are expiring. Those seats are currently held by Leroy Johnson and David Grimsley.

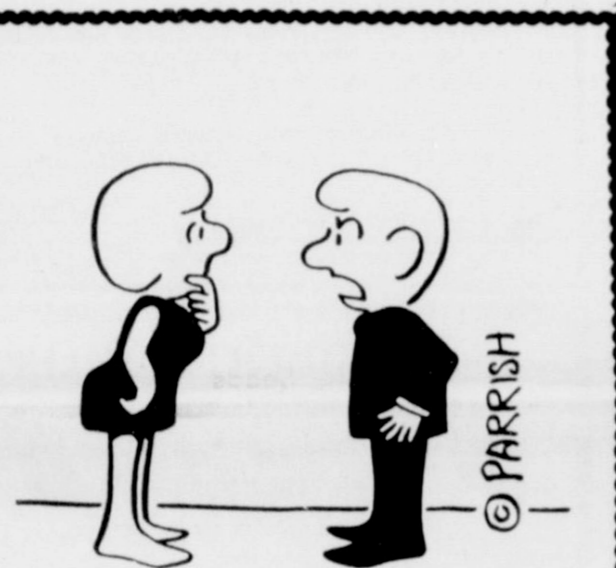

IRS REPORTS

Deadline Near For Taxpayers

Four important tax deadlines face taxpayers and employers in Texas during January. Walter I. Perry, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for the Plainview area, reported recently.

Employers are reminded that the deadline to give employees their 1973 W-2 forms is Thursday, January 31, 1974. The form should show earnings, income tax withheld and Social Security information. January 31 is also the deadline for reporting Social Security information. January 31 is also the deadline for reporting Social Security and withheld income taxes for the calendar quarter ended December 31, 1973.

If employers make timely deposits of the full amount of the tax due, ten additional days are allowed to file the return. Perry said that employers who received a pre-addressed Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," should use this form to report their tax liability. Other employers can obtain blank copies from their local IRS office.

The last day of January is also the last day to report and pay any balance of Federal Unemployment Tax not over \$100.00 for 1973, using Form 940. If the balance of tax due is over \$100.00, the employer must make a deposit with FTD Form 508. If the full amount of the tax is deposited on time, employers may then file the

return no later than February 11, 1974.

Texas farmers and fishermen who have not filed their 1973 declaration of estimated Federal Income tax must file and pay that tax by Tuesday, January 15. The sole exception

to this rule is if they file their income tax return and pay the total tax due by March 1.

Farmers and fishermen are defined as those persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1973 gross income from farming or fishing.

Long Distance Dialing May Help Gas Shortage

The gasoline shortage may increase use of local and long distance telephone facilities, according to L. Gray Beck, president of General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

"No trend has developed," Beck explained, "but if the trend is upward, margins for growth in telephone usage built into equipment should prevent any serious shortages. However, we want our customers to know there is a possibility of some busy conditions on local and long distance calls if the gasoline shortage becomes more critical and telephone usage replaces travel to an unexpected degree."

"Telephone calls are an effective way to reduce gasoline consumption and we are suggesting that customers call instead of drive where possible," Beck said and added, "If busy conditions do develop it is suggested that calls be made during non-busy hours."

"Requirements for switches and circuits in use today were established several years ago and usually equipment is ordered 18 months to three years before it becomes operational—based on projected usage when the project is engineered," Beck said. "Over capacity is costly to customers and company and the gasoline shortage certainly was not figured into earlier projections;

however, we are making every effort to stay on top of any adjustments which need to be made."

Texas DPS Investigates 13 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Farmer County during the month of December, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the year of 1973 shows a total of 148 accidents resulting in four persons killed and 70 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for December, 1973, shows a total of 499 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 277 persons injured as compared to December, 1972 with 464 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 213 persons injured. This was 37 more accidents, 3 less fatalities, and 64 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of December, 1973, occurred in the following counties: Parker, four; Lubbock, three; Wise, Young, two each; and Floyd, Hockley, Terry, Carson, Ochiltree, and Oldham, one each.

TAKE DISTRICT LEAD

Chiefs Score Rare Cage Win At Dimmitt

The Friona Chieftains defeated the Dimmitt Bobcats in a basketball game at Dimmitt.

And thus the 1973-74 Chieftain basketballers made history. Not in at least the past 25 years had the feat been done before—if indeed it ever had.

But the main thing about last Friday's thrilling 63-58 Friona victory was that the win propelled the Chieftains into the district basketball race with an important win, and perhaps with the inside track toward the first half title.

HAVE BIG QUARTER

A fabulous third quarter, which saw the Chiefs outscore the hometown Bobcats 22-8 turned out to be the difference in the big game. In that quarter, the Chieftains burned the nets on 77 per cent of their field goal tries (10 of 13) and also hit two of two free throws, in building a seemingly unsurmountable 50-33 lead entering the final eight minutes.

But the lead became anything but safe, as the Bobcats roared back, outscoring Friona 15-2 in a frigid five-minute span, to trim the Chieftain lead to 52-48, as the momentum which Friona had enjoyed so much in the third quarter was all-Dimmitt at this point.

However, Friona refused to crumble, and the Chieftains righted themselves in time to protect their lead, and salt away the historic win.

The win was no fluke. Dimmitt held only three leads in the entire game, one at 2-1, and again early in the first quarter at 6-5. Kent Patterson gave the team a tie with a free shot, and Dale Cleveland's jump shot with 2:22 left in the opening stanza gave Friona the lead back at 8-6.

Patterson had put Friona on the scoreboard first with a free shot 16 seconds deep in the contest.

After the Chieftains forged a 10-6 lead with 1:15 left in the first, Dimmitt came back to knot the score at 10-10, but Cleveland got loose under the basket for a layup with 25 seconds left, giving Friona a

12-10 lead at the buzzer.

Paul Langford gave Dimmitt its last lead at 13-12 and 15-12 early in the second quarter. Bobby Lewellen's jump shot closed the gap to 14-15, and Clay Bandy's long jumper at 5:53 before halftime gave Friona the lead it never lost.

After Cleveland and Langford traded baskets to make the score 18-17, Friona got three straight baskets, two by Dale Parsons and one by Gene Strickland, to thrill its fans with a 24-17 lead. Parsons and Bandy then hit, and Friona had its longest lead of the first half, 28-19 with 1:11 left on the clock.

The Bobcats showed that they can't be taken lightly, scoring six points in the last minute of the first half while holding Friona scoreless, to trim Friona's margin at halftime to 28-25.

Even the most optimistic Chieftain fan could not have guessed what the third quarter

would hold for the team.

The team hit the floor shooting—and hitting with uncanny regularity. After Florencio Avevedo made a layup for Dimmitt 1:30 into the quarter, the Bobcats were to see the red-hot Chieftains score the next 14 points, stretching a 32-27 lead into a 46-27 advantage, and causing their fans in the packed stands to lose their voices from cheering.

The Chiefs turned Gene Strickland loose on Dimmitt in the big quarter, and Dimmitt never knew what hit them. Strickland sank three quick field goals, sandwiched around one by Parsons and two free shots by that same player, to open up Friona's first 10-point lead at 38-27 with 4:44 left on the clock.

Just 24 seconds later, Strickland made a brilliant turning jump shot for a 40-27 lead, and it appeared that Friona could do no wrong.

Before the startled Bobcats could stop the rout, Parsons had banged home a long jump shot from the key, Cleveland made a hook shot from in close, and Strickland scored a layup on a fast break for the eye-popping score of 46-27.

Fans (at least this one) kept checking the scoreboard to make sure they were reading it right.

But old "Moe Mentum," who had played for the Chiefs in the third quarter, suddenly suited up for Dimmitt in the fourth, and fans saw almost a carbon copy of the previous quarter, only in reverse.

With Friona going 2:40 without scoring, and then only a single field goal in five minutes of precious clock time, Dimmitt outscored the Chiefs 15-2, and methodically trimmed their big lead until the scoreboard read 52-48 with three minutes left.

The 'Cats missed a couple of

chances to make the score 52-50, and about this time Friona rebounded from the brink of disaster. Parsons' jump shot increased Friona's lead to 54-48 at 2:43, and Strickland's layup made it 56-48 and Friona fans breathed a little easier.

Parsons' jump shot gave Friona a nine-point bulge at 59-50 with 1:30 left to play, but Dimmitt didn't give up. The Bobcats trimmed the margin to five at 61-56, but Parsons' two charity shots with 13 seconds on the clock iced things away at 63-56. The Chieftains let Dimmitt score a fairly easy basket in the last seconds, as the clock ran out.

SHOOTING GOOD

The Chieftains made a good 41.9 per cent of their field goal shots, and held Dimmitt to only 30 per cent from the floor. Friona hit on 27 of 66 field shots, to only 23 of 77 shots by the Bobcats, who entering the game had lost only to Morton in the Caprock Tournament finals, and to class AAA power Levelland.

Parsons had one of his better nights from the field, and led scoring with 22 points. Strickland also enjoyed one of his finest nights, with nine field goals and 18 points.

Although Cleveland's ten

points were below his average, the big junior really starred on defense, grabbing off 17 rebounds to lead everyone in that department. He did a great job on the defensive boards, seldom allowing Dimmitt more than one shot if it missed.

As a team, Friona out-rebounded the Bobcats, 48-37.

And if a head count had been made, it might have revealed as many Friona fans at the game as there were Dimmitt rooters. A great delegation made the trip, in spite of threatening weather, which produced a thick fog for the return trip home.

They came expecting to see a great ball game. And none of them were disappointed. It was one of Friona's finest hours on an athletic field.

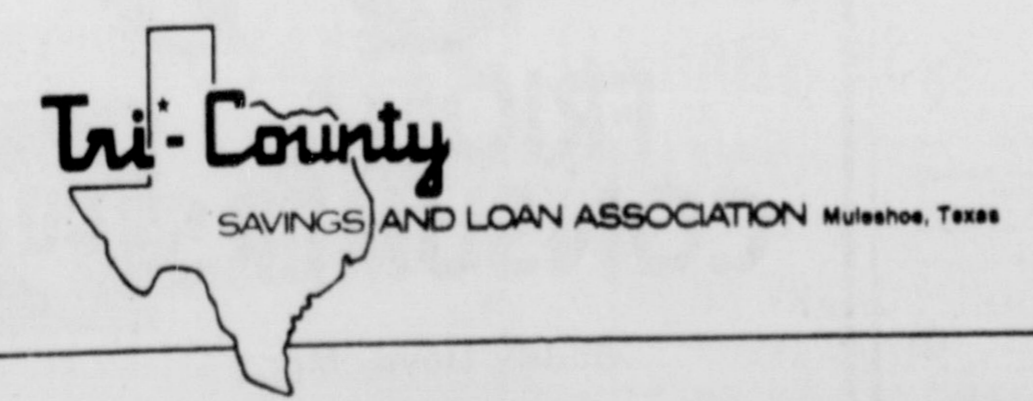

Christmas Seal Donations Drop

Mrs. Pearl Cervantez, Parmer County director of the American Lung Association of Texas, said today the Top of Texas Area has so far shown a decrease in Christmas Seal Campaign of close to \$6,000.

The decrease in campaign, Mrs. Cervantez said, threatens the Panhandle with a cut in Lung Association's educational campaign to overturn the popularity of smoking among students, as well as support of medical research and medical training for the treatment of

emphysema and other lung diseases.

"We are hopeful that Panhandle residents will yet respond to their Christmas Seal request for support of this work," Mrs. Cervantez said, adding that an area-wide seminar for training of nurses, physicians, and other hospital personnel connected with the treatment of respiratory disease patients may have to be eliminated unless campaign contributions come in.

Mrs. Cervantez said that

Texas is currently reporting a median of 45 cases of tuberculosis a week. "It is important to note," said Mrs. Cervantez, "that out of every 10 cases reported, one case is diagnosed too late to prevent

death, another one relapses after treatment into active and infectious disease, and another two in 10 are left with permanent residual effects to the extent that they are classified as 'pulmonary cripples.'"

First District Loss For Squaws Since '70

The Friona High School Squaws found themselves with a 1-1 district record after their first two 3-AA conference games, one of which was a big win over Dimmitt and the other a disappointing loss to Olton.

The Squaws posted a pressurized 46-39 win before a capacity crowd at Dimmitt last Friday, but stumbled in their home conference opener to Olton here Tuesday, 45-40.

At Dimmitt, the Squaws spotted the Bobbies an early lead, but came from behind before the first quarter ended, and stayed in command the rest of the way, although having some anxious moments toward the end of the game.

Dimmitt grabbed a 4-0 lead in the first two minutes of the game, and after Terri Patterson gained a tie for Friona with two set shots, the Bobbies went back in front at 6-4. However, Darla Rhodes' jumper tied the count at 6-all, and her hook a minute later gave Friona an 8-6 lead.

The Bobbies managed ties again at 8-all and 10-all, but Miss Patterson's set shot with 1:07 left in the quarter made it 12-10 and the Squaws were ahead to stay.

A trio of baskets by Miss Rhodes shot Friona into an 11-point lead, their longest, just before halftime, and this was the team's halftime margin, 28-17.

After an uneventful third quarter, the Bobbies scored a pair of quick baskets in the fourth quarter to trim Friona's lead to 40-35, and the Squaws had lost their momentum.

However, Coach F.G. Croford sent his team into a slow-down ball control game, and this was as close as Dimmitt could come. Six foul shots accounted for all the Friona scoring in the fourth quarter, as Dimmitt was forced to foul in efforts to get the ball.

A cold, cold shooting night against Olton proved to be the team's downfall here Tuesday, as the Squaws hit only 33 per cent of their shots, and scored only 12 second-half points to lose a 28-24 halftime lead.

In spite of their cold shooting, the Squaws were in the game right up to the end, trailing by only one point, 41-40 late in the game. However, Olton scored the last two baskets, including one at the buzzer, for the upset win. It marked the first time since the 1956-66 season that the Squaws had lost to Olton, Friona having won 13 straight games over the Lamb County girls.

It was the Squaws' first district loss since 1971-72, when Floydada turned the trick, 40-39 at Floydada, and the team's first home district loss in four years.

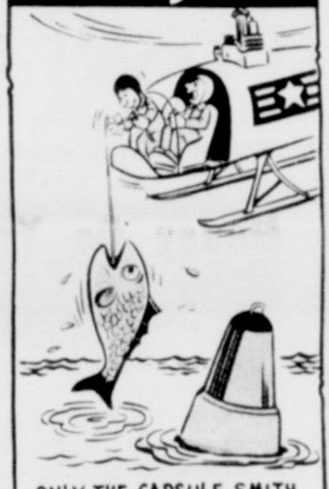
The team downed Olton B in a game here Tuesday, 37-25, led by Connie Lindeman's 16 points.

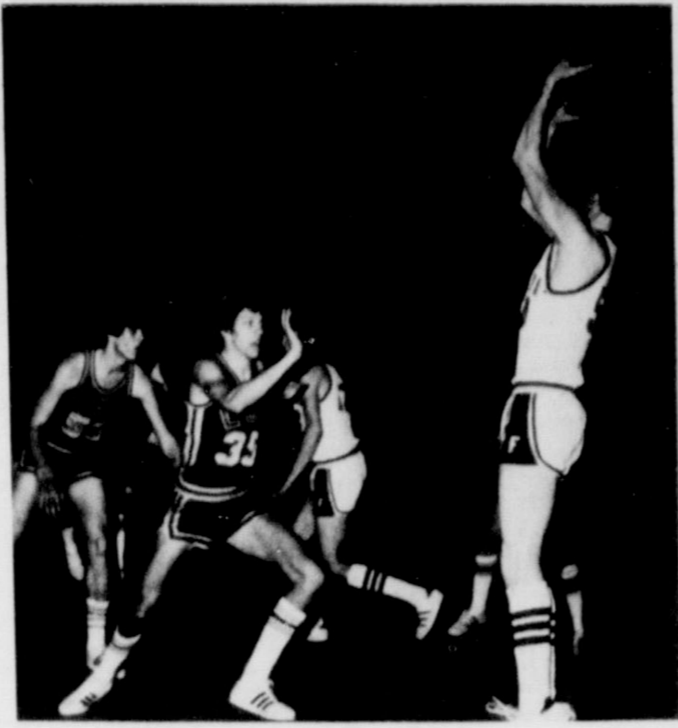

The boys and their fathers will participate in games which have been planned for the meeting.

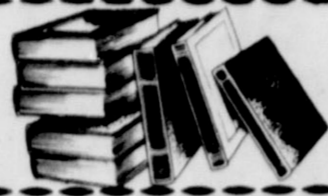
It was announced that it is almost time for election of new officers for the organization and anyone interested is urged to attend this meeting and also the committee meeting which

"Since I have to read a book, it might as well be a book that will do me some good. So what do I read?" High school students are willing to read but often ask guidance in selection from parents or teachers. The reading background the student takes with him to the college campus, or into preliminary examinations for college entrance and scholarships, can be inadequate, useful, indifferent or sufficient, in the degree the student wishes to make it. The following books are listed as necessary to acquire an adequate reading background for college entrance.

DON QUIXOTE by Cervantes is strictly satire and will be remembered by all as the book about the man who tilted at windmills. Full of wit and humor, the book is enjoyable to read without trying to grasp all the implications and underlying meaning of the author.

BRAVE NEW WORLD and **BRAVE NEW WORLD REVISITED** by Huxley are novels written in the twenties predicting what would happen in a mechanized, dehumanized world of the future. Good reading for young and old.

Famous quote from this book, "We are all equal, but some are more equal than others."

GULLIVER'S TRAVELS by Swift is biting satire on man's inhumanity to his own kind and is usually mistaken as children's literature. The entire book concerning Gulliver will include tales you have not heard of if you've only read the children's version.

For books which treat political systems, the College Preparatory Reading Lists suggests the following:

MARX AND THE MARXISTS by Sidney is told in clear, brisk and frank opinion.

THE PRINCE by Machiavelli is a much quoted and often discussed book. Assuming that self-interest is the core of all human nature, the author writes a realistic manual of political practice that has been studied and acted on from the 16th century to the present.

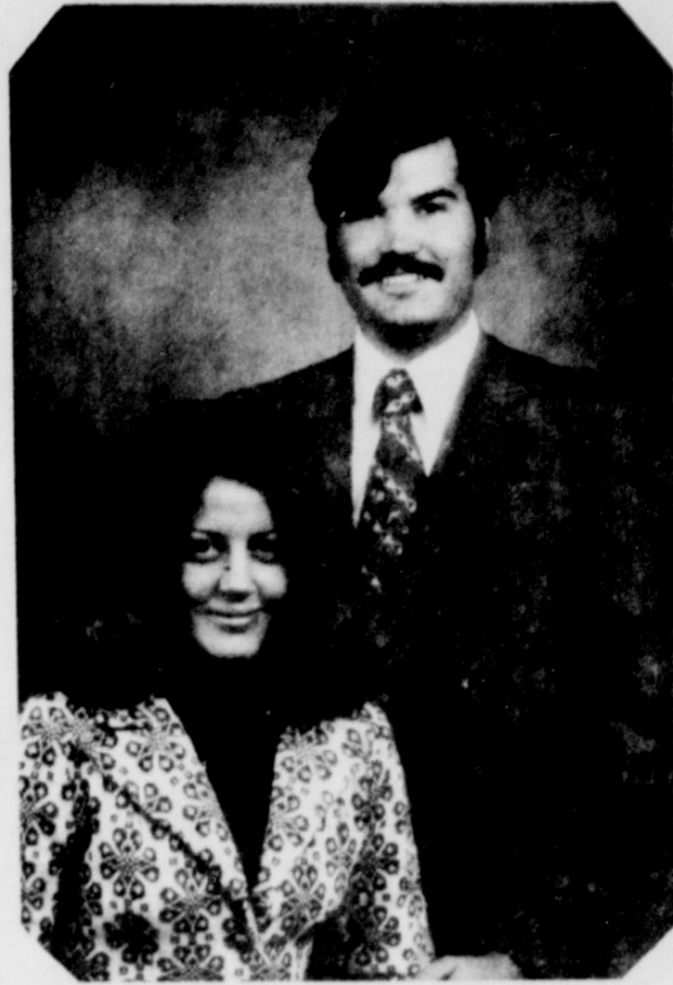
THE COMMUNIST MANIFESTO by Marx is the bible of modern Communism and Socialism. The book is a statement of the ends and purposes of early Communist doctrine. It should be read and compared with present Russian ideology and also that of the Red Chinese.

RIGHTS OF MAN by Thomas Paine is a book about the affirmation of man's rights to political freedom and general happiness. Written in the 18th century this book has been judged influential in shaping the ideas expressed in the Declaration of Independence.

DIALOGUES by Plato are some thirty discussions which rank among the greatest literary and philosophic masterpieces. They were written to help men understand the good society and to guide them into actually living it.

THE SOCIAL CONTRACT by Rousseau is the 18th century summation of the political theory that "will, not force, is the basis of the State," and this was of immense influence on French revolutionary thought and that in other countries. Thomas Paine was indebted to Rousseau for some of his direction and thinking.

These books and many others, perhaps 200, are on most college preparatory reading lists. Do read. Encourage others in your family to read. Reading increases vocabulary and adds knowledge to the individual who enjoys reading. Come by your library.
