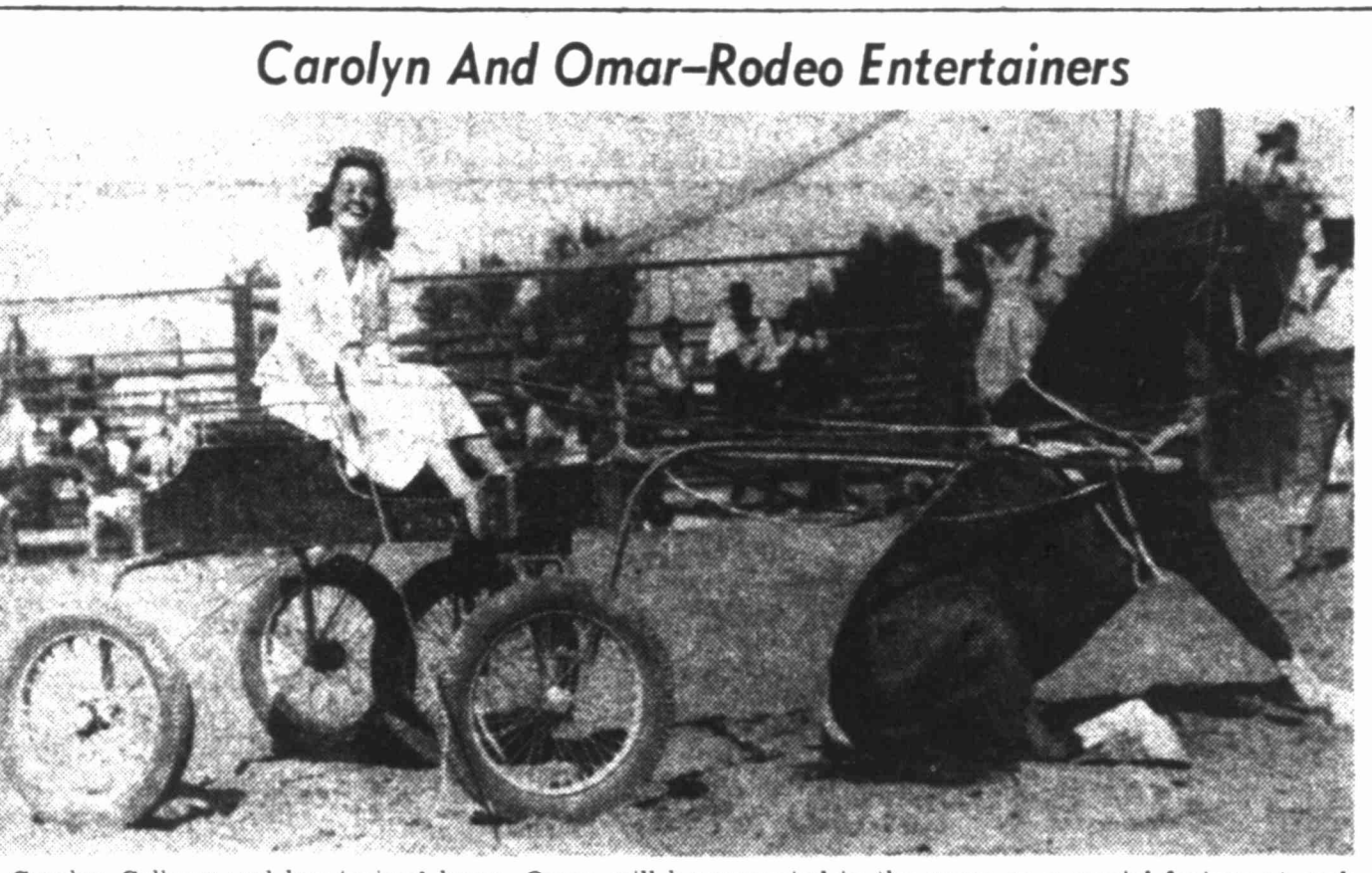

THE MEAK INHERIT THE EARTH

We saw yesterday that the first step in self-discipline is "attention." We come now to (2) Meekness. How we have shied away from that word! We have thought of meekness as weakness. We have purposelessly misunderstood the word, for we have been afraid of what it would demand of the self, namely, surrender. For meekness is just that—surrender.

The scientist is meek, and therefore gains power over nature. The scholar is meek, and therefore gains power over knowledge. The Christian is meek, and therefore gains power over the universe. Jesus stated this truth thus: "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth." His words seem absurd—inheriting heaven, yes, but not the earth, here and now. But the meek do. They are the only ones who do inherit the earth. To whom do the stars belong? To the Sissaras who aspire to conquer the earth and heaven? "The stars in their courses fought against Sissara." The stars belong to the astronomer who meekly surrenders to them, and enters the Kingdom of the Stars through that surrender—the stars belong to him. Who owns the mountains? The man who has enough money to bring the mountains under his control? No, the mountains belong to the geologist who loves them, surrenders to them, gains their secrets, and is at home with them. Who inherits the world of the mind? Those who say they are free to do as they like with their minds? No, such people literally lose their minds! The mind belongs to the psychologist who meekly surrenders to the laws of the mind, who learns of this mind's ways—he inherits the world of the mind.

Jesus was right—as always—the meek do inherit the earth. Literally, the word is, "the disciplined shall inherit the earth." Those who bring themselves under the great Discipline, the Discipline of the Kingdom, inherit the earth. Browning expresses the same thought: "Who keeps one end in view makes all things serve." The one end is the Kingdom—all things serve those who serve the Kingdom.

O God, I now begin to feel the meaning of being disciplined. It is getting into my blood and brain cells—into me. When I shall have become a disciplined soul, I shall be free. Help me to emerge as a disciplined spirit—disciplined for the highest by the Highest. Amen.

Britain Wary On Steel-Coal Pool

LONDON —(P)— Britain wants to take a long, hard look at the Schuman plan for pooling West Europe's coal and steel industries before committing herself to formal approval of the far-reaching project.

Informed sources said Monday Britain has rejected a French request that the Labor government go on record now as favoring the industrial pool in principle and examine the details later.

The sources emphasized that Britain's refusal does not mean she disapproves the plan, which already has been hailed by West German leaders as a great step toward European unity.

But Britain first wants to examine the proposal in detail to see what sacrifices might be demanded of her if she joined British coal and steel output with that of France, Germany and other European countries.

Old Chisholm Trail Driver Dies At 86

DALLAS —(P)— Funeral services for Robert Lee Cooper, 86, are to be held here Wednesday.

Cooper, who was a cowboy on the Chisholm Trail in his youth and a bank guard here in later life, died Sunday.

He was born in Tennessee and reared near Temple. When he was still in his teens, Cooper drove cattle to market over the old Chisholm Trail.

Politicos Wonder If Pappy Has Presidential Ambitions

AUSTIN —(P)— Is W. Lee O'Daniel again toying with the idea of being somebody's—or a lot of folks'—candidate for president?

That question was being bunched around in professional political talk at the capital Monday following O'Daniel's announcement that he is not now a candidate for political office. To most listeners that meant he wouldn't run for governor this year.

O'Daniel emphasized the "now" and nailed it down by saying he didn't mean he was eliminating himself forever as a candidate, that he was not burning any bridges either behind him or in front of him.

It was the reiterated and familiar reference to the need of change in national governmental policies that led to new speculation that O'Daniel's ambitions may point toward national rather than state office.

Leaves Door Wide Open

Everything he said, however, left the door wide open to almost any course he might choose to follow.

Texas will elect a United States senator in 1952, and another senatorial election comes up in 1954. There are governor's races in those years, too.

The radio speech—following a technique which led the former flour salesman to a series of startling political victories—beginning with his election as governor over a strong field in 1938—flatly took O'Daniel out of the Democratic gubernatorial primary this July.

Gov. Allan Shivers, whose formal announcement is expected this week, had no comment on O'Daniel's announcement but he didn't look unhappy after listening to the broadcast at the mansion.

Some of the governor's associates plainly were relieved.

There are five candidates in the race so far, exclusive of Shivers.

Death Of Airmen On Okinawa Revealed

OKINAWA —(P)— Cpl. Richard E. Byrd died last Thursday in a hospital a few hours after he was found shot in the orderly room, the 20th Air Force said Monday.

A pistol lay nearby. Authorities are investigating.

Byrd's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Byrd, live at San Angelo, Texas.

Woman Pushes Husband To Death From Window Sill

NEW YORK —(P)— "Please don't throw me out," paralyzed Fred Bornholdt pleaded as his 60-year-old wife balanced him on the sill of their sixth-floor window.

"I have to do it," she told him—and dropped him to his death on the courtyard below.

Police got her story after arresting her Saturday night.

They asked why she did it. She rambled vaguely, finally saying "I'm a bad girl." She was charged with homicide and will go to Bellevue Hospital for mental observation after a hearing Wednesday.

Neighbors filled out the rest of the story. Bornholdt, a 64-year-old waiter, was paralyzed by a stroke last November. His wife, Anna, a hotel chambermaid, slaved away to keep things going. The strain told, and neighbors said she talked of cats prowling the apartment... of the devil dancing outside the window.

Two weeks ago she told one neighbor she had taken Fred to the window to drop him out—but that her nerve failed.

Korea Is Quiet On Eve Of Elections

SEOUL —(P)— The little Republic of Korea, born of the turmoil of World War II and a hot spot in the Asian cold war since Monday wound up a quiet (for Korea) campaign for Tuesday's national elections.

Six deaths, three kidnappings, four cases of arson and about 300 arrests have been reported. Among those clamped in jail were 42 candidates and 178 electioneers. The main charge was violation of election laws in sympathy with communism.

This calm compared to the bloody elections of two years ago. Then some 800 were killed or wounded in the campaign. Another 100 casualties were added election day.

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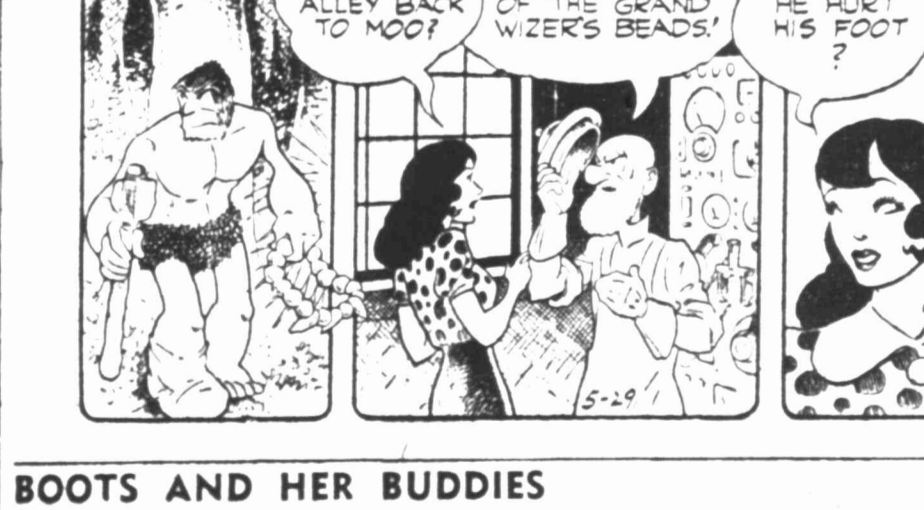

26 Die Violently In Texas During Holiday Weekend

Traffic accidents and drownings lead the list of 26 Texas violent deaths as the Memorial Day weekend holiday moved into the last half.

Counting, which began at 6 p.m. Friday, will end at midnight Tuesday.

By early Monday 13 persons died in highway mishaps, and nine drowned. One died in a plane crash, one was hanged, a small boy was electrocuted, and a man died in an oil field accident.

Four persons drowned Sunday when a boat overturned in Lake Worth, near Fort Worth. They were Marvin Galloway, 19; Carl F. Galloway, 30; Mrs. Carl F. Galloway, 28; and Marion Austin, 28. The bodies were recovered.

A Sunday automobile collision also took four lives. Mrs. John Brannum of Amarillo, A. B. Meeks of Amarillo and two children—Carol Thelma and Thurman Dale Thelma of Muleshoe—died in the wreck near Amarillo.

Ray Douglas, 17, of Muleshoe was killed in an automobile collision four miles west of Muleshoe early Sunday.

Bobby McBroom, 17, of Nacogdoches died in a head-on auto collision near Nacogdoches.

At Austin, the same type of accident killed Epitafio Castro, 28, of Creedmore.

Three Die In Collision

Three persons died in an auto-truck collision eight miles east of Grandbury Friday night. They were Fred Chapman, 30, of Grandbury, his 39-year-old wife and their eight-year-old son, Sidney Wayne.

Robert Lee Blazek, 24, of College Station died Saturday in a training plane crash five miles south of College Station.

A car-truck crash in Dallas Saturday killed Carl M. Phinney, 48, of Dallas.

George P. Beville, 59, of Kerrville died in a collision of four cars and a truck near Comfort Friday night.

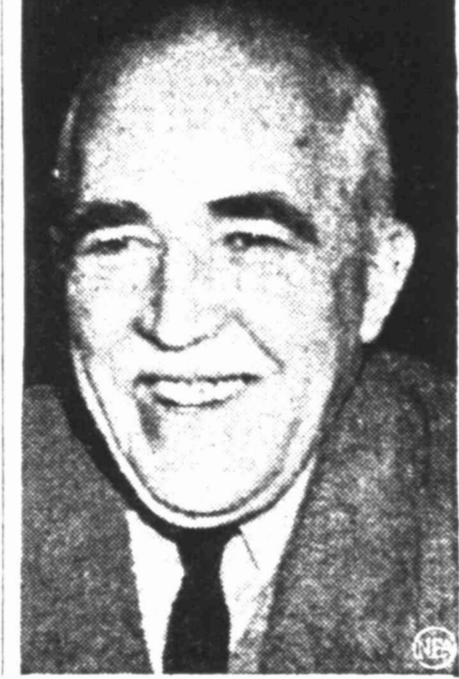
