IN SPITE OF the scarcity of some materials, plus the increase in prices due to inflation, building activity seems to be continuing strong in Friona.

At least three non-residential projects are underway in the city. The new White's Auto Store began going up this week, as did the Boy Scout House just north of Reeve Lake. A large addition to the Mexican Baptist Mission on Fourth and Woodland is well underway.

Besides these projects, new home building continues, with builders staying busy at all times.

BARLEY HARVEST was getting underway in the area this week, and early indications were that the crop may be a little on the light side.

Both barley and wheat apparently have been adversely affected by the prolonged dry spell with hardly any moisture at all received by these crops since their planting.

It's hard to achieve a good solid crop when you don't have the underground moisture, and try to supply all of the crop's needs by irrigation, and this is what farmers had to do this winter and spring.

SOME FAIR MOISTURE amounts were received in last weekend's rain, with up to two inches reported by some. There were, however, some bad hail reports as well, with some farmers having their wheat crops adversely affected, and likewise some getting their cotton hailed out.

This time of year, farmers who are needing moisture badly have mixed emotions about wanting to see clouds, since they could wipe out a wheat crop which is ready to harvest, or like some already have experience, severely damage their cotton or maize crops which are at a delicate stage.

Luckily so far, farmers in our area have fared better than they have elsewhere by the recent weather, especially those in the Plainview area, who always seem to bear the brunt of the bad weather on the High Plains.

THE U.S. MINT has come out with a plea for children and adults to get out their pennies and get them back in circulation.

Mrs. Mary Brooks, director of the mint, this week issued a news release in which she urged schools (which are closed), churches, charities, retail establishments and others to examine ways and means to involve their members in collecting pennies.

"The price of copper has retreated...The 62 billion pennies produced during the past 15 years have no numismatic (coin collecting) value because of the huge mintage they will never attain great value," Mrs. Brooks points out.

The mint director said that speculators and hoarders of pennies have caused what seems to be a shortage of pennies, by "putting up" around 30 billion of the 62 billion pennies that were produced during the past 15 years.

"Creating a shortage where none exists can adversely affect every citizen, taxpayer and conservator of the earth's resources," Mrs. Brooks said. "It is inflationary should merchants start to round off sales to the next nickel due to lack of pennies to make change."

Mrs. Brooks says that forcing the mint to increase its penny production to make up for the hoarding is wasteful. One billion pennies returned to circulation will save the taxpayers \$10,000,000, she says.

The Lincoln "wheat" pennies do have a numismatic value, but they have not been produced for the past 15 years.

The mint plans to reward individuals or groups returning at least \$25 in pennies, by giving them a special citation. Got any not-so-old pennies laying around the house?

Week's Rain Breaks Eight-Month Streak

The first beneficial moisture to fall in the Friona area in almost eight months was received last weekend, raising hopes of the agricultural community for a break in the long drought.

Official measurements in Friona were .06 inch Saturday evening, .55 inch Sunday afternoon, and .25 inch from the cloud that came across about midnight Sunday, accompanied by a tremendous electrical display. Another .02 came on Monday.

The weekend total was thus .88 inch of moisture, and the most measured in one concentrated period since October 5, 1973, when .94 inch was received locally.

More rain was reported in the outlying area, which also had some hail damage to report. The hail received in town did not amount to much, and caused little damage.

Reports ranged up to two inches south and southeast of Friona. There also was some bad hail damage to the

southeast, with damage to the wheat and young cotton crops reported.

Amounts of over an inch were received west of Friona and in the Rhea community, and some hail was reported in this vicinity, too. The late Sunday night cloud, which came into Friona about midnight, reportedly spewed considerable hail to the west of town.

Conditions have been favorable for rain all week long, but no measurable amounts have been added. Farmers and city residents alike were still hoping for additional rainfall before the week ended. Prospects were to remain good at least through Friday for additional rain.

Prior to the rain of last weekend, there had been an eight-month period with a total of 1.43 inches of moisture as the official moisture in Friona—and this was scattered over a number of dates and had been of very little beneficial value.

After having a "wet" October with a .96 reading (.94 coming

October 5), the monthly totals had been November, .01; December, .13; January, .54; February, .17; March, .38; April, .11 and May, .09.

The first load of small grain delivered in Friona was a load of barley that was delivered Wednesday afternoon, June 5, by W.M. Massie.

The barley tested 14 per cent moisture content, and had a test weight of 43 pounds per bushel.

The first load of wheat followed the barley by just a day, coming in on Thursday morning, June 6. It was harvested by Herbert Schueler of the Rhea community.

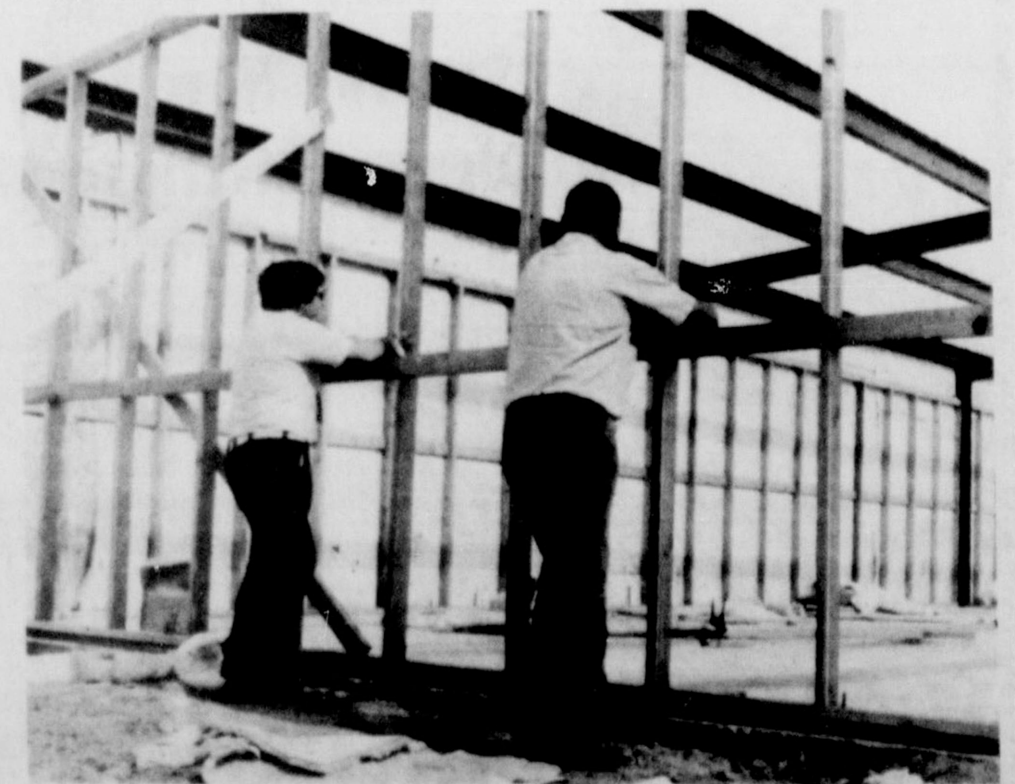
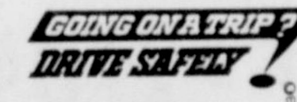

35 YEARS AGO—JUNE 16, 1939

A radio program contest for 4-H Club boys in Parmer County has been announced by County Agent Jason O. Gordon, with broadcasts to be given each Wednesday at 8 o'clock over KICA, Clovis, as a means toward encouraging club members to deliver talks on agricultural subjects, and to explain to the citizenry the true meaning of 4-H Club work.

On June 2, a letter was sent by the county committee to all wheat farmers in the county who had seeded barley in either seeded wheat or volunteer wheat in order to be within the acreage allotment.

30 YEARS AGO—JUNE 16, 1944

Work has begun on the erection of a large building on the lots just north of the Santa Fe Grain Company office and warehouse, to be used by the Santa Fe Machinery Company, local Case implement dealers. The building is a frame structure, 32x60 feet, and the frame work is up and under roof.

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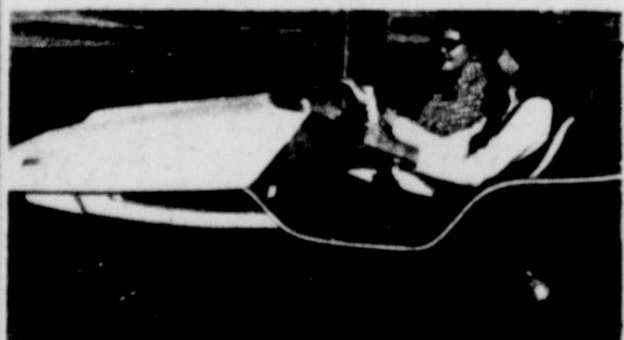

Missouri Beef Denies Charges

David J. La Fleur, President of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., announced that the Department of Agriculture's claim that Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. made illegal brokerage payments through Midwest Selection Service of Topeka, Kansas is completely unfounded.

An investigation of the facts reveals that the claim against Missouri Beef Packers is an administrative complaint by the Department of Agriculture alleging Missouri Beef Packers used "an unfair and deceptive practice in commerce" in its brokerage payments to Midwest Selection Service and does not involve charges of making discriminatory advertising allowances or commercial bribery as previously announced by the news media.

It is common place and customary in our industry to use a brokerage firm for the sale of products, and all such transactions with Midwest Selection Service were arm's-length transactions in which they were dealt with just as all other brokers through which we sell. The brokerage payments were made to a bonafide brokerage concern, Midwest Selection Service, for brokerage services rendered by Midwest Selection Service personnel. The claim by the Department of Agriculture alleging illegal brokerage payments is without merit, and Missouri Beef Packers will pursue proper legal courses of action to defend the charges, and I am certain Missouri Beef Packers will be completely exonerated.

\$7.1 Million Federal Allocation to Help Conservation Practices

AUSTIN—A \$7.1 million federal allocation to Texas farmers for conservation programs is expected to help improve environmental quality in the state, said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

The United States Department of Agriculture has announced that Texas farmers and forest landowners would receive \$7,160,000 of cost-share assistance in 1974 under the new Rural Environmental Conservation Program (RECP).

This program, approved by Congress in August 1973, replaces the Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) which was terminated last spring.

RECP will be administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and is designed to share with farmers and forest landowners from 50 to 75 per cent of the cost of implementing approved annual and long-range conservation practices.

"This program was desperately needed since REAP was eliminated last year," White said. "Since there will be no set-aside requirements this year, Texas will have about 2.7 million more acres available for production which will increase the potential hazard of erosion."

The allocation for Texas represents nearly 10 per cent

of the national appropriation of \$78 million. Texas farmers will receive a total of \$6,723,000 in cost-share programs, and forest landowners will receive \$437,000 in the Forestry Incentives Program in counties designed for the program.

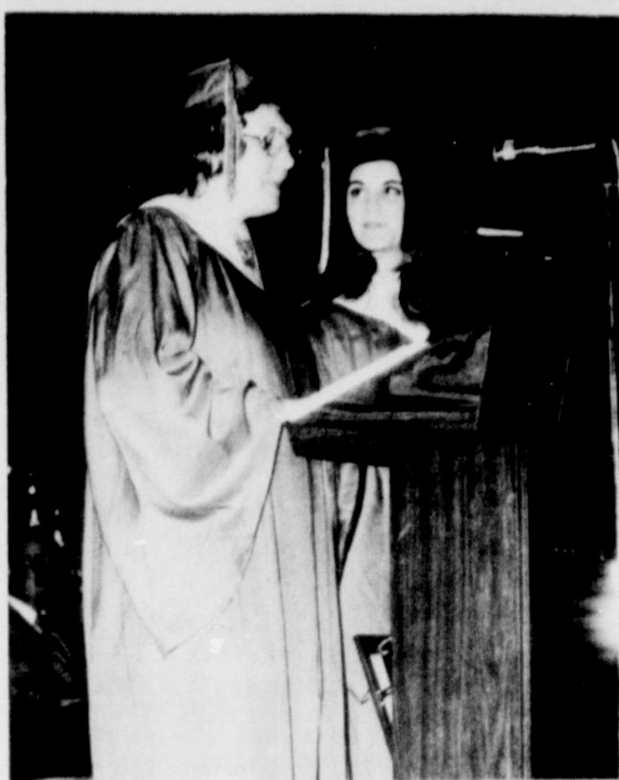

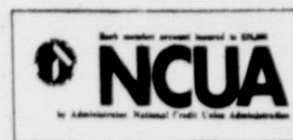

SPRING AND SUMMER fashion fabrics will feature a kaleidoscope of patterns, dots, stripes, florals, geometrics and motifs.

Designs range from objects found in nature to the abstract creations of a designer's imagination.

Design sizes, on the other hand, run rampant from miniature to "slipcover" sizes.

In general, patterned garments add excitement to a wardrobe—and often express the wearer's personality and temperament.

On a more practical note, they make versatile wardrobe additions. Patterns also show less soil and fewer wrinkles than plainer fabrics.

When selecting a fabric or garment, consider overall effect created by a particular pattern. Pattern type and size influence a person's apparent size.

Extreme color contrasts—and very lightly or brightly colored patterns—tend to make a person appear larger. Large, widely spaced patterns also do this.

To diminish apparent size, choose patterns with compact spacing and close color relationships. Also, darker or subtle colors and blurred or overall designs.

Most people find medium-size designs—in similar colors—becoming.

Patterns also express moods. For example, some patterns are dainty and demure. Others may be bold and exotic—or dignified and conservative.

Careful use of irrigation water in this year of little effective rainfall and downward spiraling prices on farm products could mean the difference in getting by and financial disaster.

There are three things vital in planning a row watering system. They are soil permeability, slopes and lengths of rows. Johnny Hamilton of Friona considered these in laying out his irrigation system.

Sprinkler systems can apply a more controlled amount of water to the land.

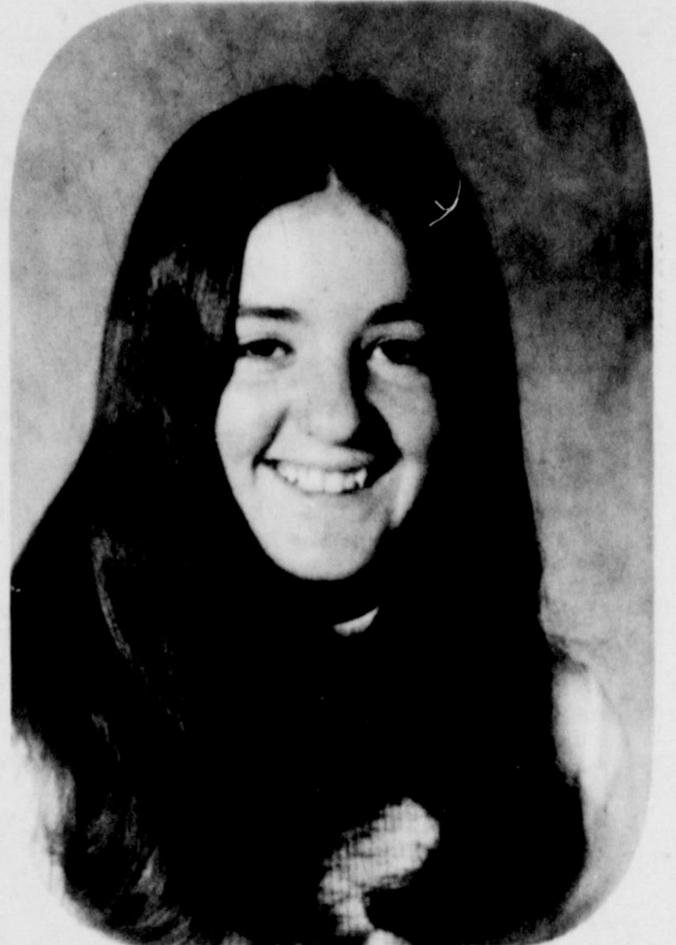

Paint In Safety
If spring cleaning plans include a painting project, take time to observe some simple fire prevention rules, urges the Texas Safety Association.

Solvents labeled "nonflammable" are safest for removing paint and cleaning brushes. If flammable solvents must be used, work outdoors in areas where there are no open flames and no one is smoking nearby.

Paint or solvent should be stored in capped metal containers well away from any source of heat. Never save empty paint or solvent containers.

Rags used for painting projects should be disposed of immediately, outside the house. If drop cloths and other combustible items must be kept for re-use, store them in metal containers with tight fitting lids.

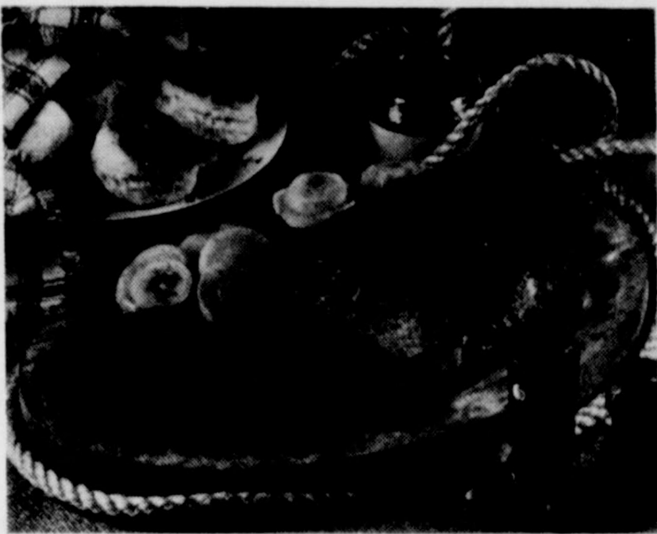

Chill a beef top round steak, cut 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 inches thick; score on both sides in diamond pattern, 1/8 inch deep, with a sharp knife. Combine 1/2 cup sherry, 1/2 cup soy sauce, 1/4 cup salad oil, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 2 table-

spoons brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1 clove minced garlic and 10 drops hot sauce in saucepan. Cook slowly 10 minutes; chill. Place steak in plastic bag, add marinade, carefully press out air, tie securely and place in pan in refrigerator for 6 to 8 hours or overnight. Remove steak from marinade, reserving marinade, and place on grill over ash-covered coals or on rack in broiling pan so surface of meat is 4 to 5 inches from heat. Broil at moderate temperature to rare or medium (25 to 40 minutes, depending on thickness of steak and doneness desired), brushing with marinade and turning occasionally. Carve in thin slices, diagonally across the grain.

The rodeo clowns will be Wiley McCray of Briscoe and Tommy Sheffield of Rankin. Earl Warton of San Saba and his working sheep dogs will be the specialty act. John Snow of Tucson, Ariz., will be the rodeo announcer.

The Clovis event will be produced by Beutler Bros. and Cervi of Colorado, the nation's foremost stock contract company which last year sent 17 brones and bulls to the National Finals Rodeo in Oklahoma City—more than any other producer.

The annual event is sponsored by the Curry County

Mounted Patrol, a non-profit organization formed in 1941 to assist law enforcement agencies and promote western oriented activities in the community.
