One of the fastest-rising young singing stars since Glen Campbell, Tom T. Hall is under contract by Mercury Records. He has appeared on such television shows as Johnny Carson's "Tonight Show" and "The Midnight Special."

Advance tickets are now on sale from Friona Merchants, at \$5.00 each. Tickets at the door will be priced at \$6.00 each.

Hall's appearance in Friona is being sponsored by Friona's Business Activities Committee.

A lot of things have happened in 1973 for Tom T.

Hall, Country Music's most authentic Storyteller. As a matter of fact, they started happening in 1972 when he wrote "Old Dogs, Children and Watermelon Wine" because that masterpiece helped him garner five nominations in the CMA Awards Of 1973!

ACCORDING TO an announcement in a recent edition of the Muleshoe Journal, that city's hospital will close on June 1, unless something can be worked out to save the facility.

Inability to keep an adequate staff, rising costs, and trouble keeping the hospital in the "black" were cited recently as the hospital board made a decision to close the facility.

This would really pose a hardship on a city the size of Muleshoe, to have no hospital and would no doubt add to the crowded conditions already prevalent in the hospitals which surround Bailey County.

HAVING JUST passed April 15, many of our readers are no doubt still in shock after having had their annual "contact" with Uncle Sam.

There are probably a fortunate few who either plan to receive a refund or didn't have to pay as much income tax as they expected to, but for the most part, tax time is usually a painful time for most people.

The past year was a good one from a farming standpoint, so these folks found their "ante" was raised accordingly. The more you make, the more you have to pay, it says somewhere in the taxpayer's guide.

THE YEAR 1974 will go down as the one in which a United States president was assessed for back taxes—some half a million dollars of them.

If Mr. Nixon owed the back taxes [which apparently he did, since he didn't hesitate to pay them], then we're all for him paying them. Personally, we're a bit tired of being a member of the middle class, which pays some 80 per cent of the taxes in this country.

The wealthy have ways of getting out of paying taxes, and the poor people don't pay any taxes, since they don't have enough income. That just leaves the middle class to support the entire country.

WE SAW AN article that was supposed to make us feel better about our taxes, though. It seems that a recent report shows that by comparison, the total U.S. tax burden, including federal, state and local taxes, are smaller in relation to gross national product (GNP) than 10 or 11 major nations in Europe.

The report showed that Americans pay about 28 cents in taxes for each dollar of gross national product. Canadians pay 32.2 cents per dollar of GNP. The average European pays about 35 cents of each GNP dollar.

The highest tax burden of all, the report showed, was in Denmark, where residents paid 44 cents for each dollar of gross national product.

That won't allow you any additional deductions, but at least it will make you feel better, and maybe make you change your mind if you were thinking about moving to Denmark.

AMBULANCE SERVICE, and how many cities are working on this problem, was the subject of an article we noticed the other day in Reader's Digest.

The article said that many cities, even large ones, spend more money annually to pick up stray dogs and cats than they do to carry injured human beings to hospitals.

Hopefully, this is not the case locally, where the city, as well as the county, pays a monthly subsidy to the ambulance service.

THERE IS a batch of new regulations concerning political advertising that we are having trouble getting used to.

For example, the name of the person paying for the ads is supposed to be printed in the advertisement, along with a line telling you the name of the newspaper, if you didn't already know it.

Thus, just to keep the record straight, last week's ad supporting Harvey Floyd was paid for by Mr. Floyd. Also, it was printed by the Friona Star.

"Think Rain" Week Is Proclaimed Here

In an effort to try to bring about an end to the drought which is gripping the local area, Mayor R.L. Fleming has proclaimed the week of April 21-27 as "Think Rain Week" in Friona.

As a tie-in, some of the local merchants are staging "April Shower" Sales, and at least one, Friona Consumers, is running an ad asking for a four-inch rain.

One other time, when the local cooperative ran the ad, over two inches of rain was received within two weeks. Farmers are hoping the ad will again bring results.

The Friona area is in the seventh month since any appreciable moisture has been received. Farming operations have been seriously hampered by the dry conditions, and all dryland wheat has long since been abandoned.

In his proclamation, Mayor Fleming said: "Whereas a condition of general drought is gripping the local area, and

"Whereas a good general rain would do more to perk up the spirits of the local citizens than just about anything else, and "Whereas water is vitally important to our agricultural area, therefore, be it resolved that we hereby proclaim the week of April 21-27 as 'Think Rain' week in Friona, and urge all residents to beseech a rain for our area, whether it be by prayer or rain dance."

Maurer Machinery Sets Auction Sale

One of Friona's oldest continuing businesses will close next week, following an auction sale.

Carl C. Maurer, owner and operator of Maurer Machinery in Friona for the past 45 years, announces that there will be an equipment auction at his place of business on Tuesday, April 23, after which he will retire from the implement business.

Maurer first opened in business on the corner of Fifth and Main on April 15, 1929.

Continued difficulty in obtaining machinery, parts, and problems involved in staffing an adequate shop were cited by Maurer as chief reasons for

terminating the business here.

"I especially hate to do this on account of our many farm customers, who will be forced to go out of town for parts for their machines," stated the longtime businessman.

He stated, however, that this eventually seemed to be his best move at the present time.

The auction sale will begin at 1 p.m. Tuesday. Houston Bartlett and Larry Potts, of Bartlett & Potts Auction Service, will conduct the auction.



Friona Flashbacks

45 YEARS AGO—APRIL 26, 1929
Friona was visited last Saturday by what was perhaps the most costly fire in its history, when the immense piles of grain heads and ear corn in the Doggett Grain Company's yard caught fire.

Wind swept the fire from the northwest corner of the yard to the south, and soon the entire yard, consisting of three city blocks, was in flames. Estimates put the loss at not less than \$12,000.

35 YEARS AGO—APRIL 28, 1939
Tuesday of this week several Friona men were invited by Hugh L. Clearman, Government Entomologist, to visit a section of Parmer County east of Friona, to witness the emergence of millions of young grasshoppers.

Mr. Clearman assured us that the hoppers we saw coming out of the ground, literally by the thousands, were the real "migratory" variety, and if nothing is done about them, they will take wing within six weeks and be ready to destroy crops many miles from their place of origin.

20 YEARS AGO—APRIL 29, 1954

Quarterly Sales Tax Receipt Sets Record

A record quarterly sales tax check was received by the City of Friona late in March. The check came to \$14,526.70. Since sales tax checks run a quarter behind, this was for the fourth quarter of 1973, which would have been the "Christmas Quarter."

Largest previous quarterly check was for \$13,295.06 and was for the third quarter of 1973.

Since the sales tax check received by the city amounts to

one per cent of taxable goods purchased within the city during the quarter, it means that a total of \$1,452,670 was spent in the city during the fourth quarter of 1973.

Many goods, including grocery items, are not taxable items.

The money goes into the city's general fund, where it is a budgeted income item. However, the additional receipts will help the current city budget, which has been

affected on some hands by inflationary trends.

New building activity was slow during the month, as only one permit was issued. That was for an addition to a residence, in the amount of \$7,000.

Twelve fire alarms were turned into the City of Friona during March. Eleven of these were outside the city limits. Greatest loss was a farm house on the Rushing farm [former Glenn Floyd residence].

A total of 39 arrests were logged by Friona patrolmen, 28 of which were for traffic violations. Three were for drinking in public, one for DWI, one for AWOL, and another was a traffic warrant.

The Friona City Library currently has over 10,000 volumes, according to a report from the librarian. A total of 1415 books were checked out during the month of March to 748 patrons which included 11 new readers.

Area Man Tours Water District

Five directors of the High Plains Water District, including Webb Gober of the Oklahoma Lane Community, recently toured the Southwest Florida Water Management District.

The district, headquartered at Brooksville, Fla., covers all or part of 15 counties in Florida, an area of 10,000 square miles. Governed by nine members appointed by Florida's governor, the district was established in 1961 as a flood control agency, but its powers were enlarged in 1969 to deal with

the area's burgeoning groundwater conflicts and problems. During the past three years, the board has issued some 44,000 water well permits in the district.

During their three-day visit, the High Plains District directors were briefed on the geology and hydrology of the Floridan and associated aquifers; were presented a review of the functions and procedures of the Florida District; toured a portion of the area to view the hydrologic conditions and

SAFE DRIVING

The drivers are judged in three phases of motoring: driving ability, knowledge of driving theory and traffic laws and the ability to handle an automobile in emergency situations. The program's goal is to show that safe driving isn't always enough, that superior driving abilities are needed to anticipate and adapt to emergencies.

SS Representative Announces Change

"For the past three months we have been making monthly cash payments to people in financial need who are 65 or older, and to people under 65 who are blind or disabled," Mr. William Ent, field representative Clovis Social Security Office, stated recently. "The new program is called 'Supplemental Security Income' (SSI). It took the place of public assistance to the aged, blind or disabled, which was administered by the New Mexico Department of Health and Social Services.

"Federal law provides that disability payments are made under this program in cases where drug addiction or alcoholism contributes to their undergo treatment in an approved rehabilitation center if treatment is available to them, and their benefits must be made to a third party designated as a 'representative payee'.

"A 'representative payee' is an individual or public or private institution or agency selected by the Social Security Administration to receive payments and use them on behalf of the drug addict or alcoholic SSI recipient. In stipulating the necessity for a 'representative payee' Congress intended to discourage the use of SSI payments for the purpose of illegal drugs or alcoholic beverages," Mr. Ent explained.

Mrs. Mabry To Head Special Campaign

Mrs. Jimmy Mabry, a resident of Friona, has been named Coordinator of the Friona Area Cystic Fibrosis Spring Special Events Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Mrs. Jack H. Grizzard, President of the Lone Star Chapter, National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

Mrs. Mabry will lead local volunteers in raising funds through a Spring Special Event to support research and care

programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like Cystic Fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema."

Cystic Fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the

National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C/F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from the other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F.

According to Mrs. Mabry, "Most people don't realize that there are six million children in the U.S. affected by pulmonary illness. For some of these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."

Academically, Texas Tech has been designated as one of the four major, multi-purpose Universities in the State of Texas System. The board academic program is designed to meet the increasing demands for continuing education of all citizens by providing opportunities at the undergraduate, graduate and professional levels.

The Texas Tech University School of Medicine, which opened in the fall of 1972, is a separate state educational institution governed by the President and Board of Regents of Texas Tech University. The first graduating class of 24 students of the School of Medicine received their degrees last month. The new School has a highly innovative program emphasizing the role of the family physician.



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

New Colorful Map Is Ready On West Texas

Seventy-four attractions and points of interest from almost as many cities throughout West Texas are featured in the new "Wonderful West Texas" Fun and Adventure Map just released by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The main objective of the Fun and Adventure Map is to sell West Texas as a vacation region within itself. The publication does this by showing the prospective visitor that there are points of interest and things to do and see in abundance throughout West Texas, and that a route can be planned to hold driving time and distance to a minimum and, at the same time, include more than enough attractions to guarantee an interesting and most enjoyable vacation or weekend outing.

"The full color Fun and Adventure Map, which locates each attraction on a specially prepared highway map, is the only tourist oriented publication dedicated to the 132 counties of West Texas" according to Burvin Hines, Chairman of the WTCC Tourist and Travel Development Committee, "and it will serve as the foundation of the organization's efforts to assist in increasing visitor traffic to West Texas."

Hines, Senior Vice President of the First National Bank in Arlington, went on to say that "the publication will enable the WTCC to answer many inquiries developed as a result of the state's national advertising program and provide a vehicle enabling prospective visitors to be reached with areawide information on a volume basis." He related, "that another important factor achieved by this promotional effort will be the effect it has in uniting towns and attractions

throughout the entire region in an all-out effort to increase the share West Texas receives of the potential visitor dollar."

The Fun and Adventure Map project entails a total program of distribution including the Texas Highway Department Information Centers, travel shows, travel bureaus of major oil companies, by the participants and by use of direct mailings. The map will be free to the traveling public.

More than 100,000 Fun and Adventure Maps were printed. The publication is divided into three main areas of interest including attractions and areas of interest, museums and colleges and universities.

FHS Sends Two Teams To Vo-Ag Contests

Six vocational agricultural students from Friona High School will compete Saturday at Texas Tech University in the 47th annual Texas Tech Vocational Agricultural Judging Contest.

The FHS youngsters will enter two judging categories, livestock and dairy cattle.

Members of the livestock judging team are Garvin Thorn, Gene Schueler and David

Blackburn.

In dairy cattle judging, those entering will be John White, Charles Wilkins and Ken Jordan.

Participants are expected from 150 West Texas high schools, with around 1600 individuals taking part.

Five hundred three-man teams are expected to compete in 11 separate events in the contest. Livestock, dairy cattle, dairy products, poultry judging, and meats judging, and agricultural mechanics competitions will serve as elimination contests for Areas I and II of the State Future Farmers of America (FFA) competition.

Five contest, in cotton, wool, crops, grass and land judging, will also be conducted, though not for FFA elimination competition.

The top ten per cent in the elimination contests will qualify for state FFA contests, to be held April 27 at Texas A&M University.

The FHS teams have been to Pampa, Canyon and Hereford for judging events. Gene Schueler was second high point individual in beef judging at Pampa.

The local FFA chapter has six boys who will be making application for their Lone Star Farmer degrees. Results of the applications will be made known at a later date.

Judging will begin at 7:30 a.m. in various places throughout the Texas Tech campus. Contest results will be announced at 2:30 p.m. in the Ballroom of the Texas Tech

University Center. During that time, teams qualifying for State FFA competition will be certified by contest supervisors from Areas I and II.

Special guests at the contest will be Raymond Holt, consultant to the Vocational Agriculture Department of the Texas Education Agency; Wilbert M. Meischen, executive secretary of the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association; and Jerry Johnson, State FFA vice president from Post.

The annual contest is coordinated through the Department of Agricultural Education at Texas Tech University. T.L. Leach is chairman of the department and Prof. L.M. Hargrave is contest general superintendent.

Members of the Texas Tech faculty will supervise each of the competition events of the contest. Dairy products judging will be under the supervision of Dr. Milton L. Peebles, professor and acting chairman of the Texas Tech Department of Food Technology.

Livestock judging will be under the supervision of Dr. Leland F. Tribble, professor of animal science. Dr. Robert C. Albin, professor of animal science, will supervise dairy cattle and poultry judging.

Deadline Set For '74 Farm Program

Farmers participating in the 1974 farm program are reminded that Saturday, June 1, is the deadline for sign up and reporting crop acreages, according to Prentice Mills, head of the ASCS office in Farwell.

Mills said that his office now has the necessary forms prepared for each farm. "All a producer must do to participate in this year's program is sign up and report crop acreages on his farm," said Mills.

He stressed that farmers with wheat or feed grain allotments must comply with the regulations by the deadline date.

Mills says that producers become eligible for several benefits by signing up for the '74 program.

Among those he listed were the following: assurance that the farm will retain its allotments for any future programs; the crops produced on enrolled farms will be eligible for price support loans; should adverse weather cause a loss of crops or low production, the farm may become eligible for disaster payments; and should prices become disastrously low, the farm would become eligible for a deficiency payment or payments.

Mills pointed out that the latter problem is not anticipated this year.

"The two most important reasons for signing up in the programs this year is the retention of farm allotments and the disaster payment provisions of the programs," he commented.

Mills gave an example of how the disaster program would be applied: "If a farm had a 24-acre cotton allotment, with a 500-lb. per acre program yield, had been planted in early May and was completely hailed out on June 20, the farm operator would report the loss to his local ASCS office and the farm, in this example, would be eligible for a disaster payment in the amount of \$1,524. This figure is arrived at by multiplying the farm yield by 12.7 cents times the acres allotted to the farm. In this example, 12.7x500x24 would be the basis for figuring the disaster payment."

Mills said the sign up period began this week. He urged all farm operators planning to participate to measure the winter crops and report as early as possible. Sign up and reporting will continue until the deadline of June 1.

 PARMER COUNTY RESIDENTS**

From County Judge Archie Tarter

I am running for a second full term as Parmer County Judge, having previously been elected for the unexpired term of Loyde A. Brewer, now deceased, and for one full term.

I promise nothing to each of you except honesty, integrity and proper fulfillment of the duties of this office to the best of my ability and knowledge regardless where you reside in Parmer County. This county as a whole has been, and always will be, considered in any official decision I have to make so long as I serve as your County Judge. I believe in and shall always work for a financially sound county government. I believe at this time our county is on a sound financial basis.

A few of the financial changes since I have been serving as your County Judge are as follows:

The available county funds have been increased from \$404,764.13 to a present balance of \$584,468.81, being a total net increase of \$179,704.68.

The County Judge also serves as Ex-Officio County School Superintendent and administers the Parmer County Permanent School Fund.

The Permanent School Fund has been increased from \$576,825.60 to the present balance of \$732,109.63, being a net increase of \$155,284.03.

When I went into office as your County Judge, this county was receiving only \$19,000.00 annually from the Permanent School Fund for the schools of our county. The funds were being held on short-term bonds and I cashed the same and placed all of them into long-term Federal bonds. These bonds are increasing in value approximately \$30,000.00 each year since purchase, and should continue to increase accordingly. In addition, these funds are paying interest into the available school fund which is distributed annually to the Parmer County schools on a per-student basis. In 1974 \$30,865.28 will be distributed from this fund to our schools. Law prohibits the Permanent School Fund from being consumed, and it is regulated as to how it can be invested.

As each of you know, in the last several years State and Federal funds have been severely limited for construction of farm-to-market roads. Most of the available funds have been spent in metropolitan areas and in areas around larger towns such as Lubbock and Amarillo. However, Parmer County has received some money for farm-to-market road construction and the County itself has spent some money for rights-of-way and easements for such construction during my tenure of office, as follows:

[a] Farm-to-Market Road 1140, consisting of 4 miles, located East of Friona to connect U.S. Highway 60, and Farm-to-Market Road 2397 \$43,133.33 spent for rights-of-way and removal of utilities

[b] Farm-to-Market 1172, consisting of 11 miles, connecting from State 86 to U.S. 60 NE of Lazbuddie, \$49,732.31 spent for rights-of-way and utility line removal

[c] Farm-to-Market Road 292, consisting of 1 mile, connecting U.S. 60 to U.S. 70-84 NE corner of Farwell - \$6965.00 spent for rights-of-way and utility line removal

[d] Farm-to-Market Road 214, approximately 2 miles - Removing utility lines, easements and rights-of-way for construction of a new overpass to be located immediately South of Friona, in the very near future - \$163,548.27 spent by Parmer County

I support expenditure of all future money received for farm-to-market road construction wherever the need is greatest in the County.

In addition, approximately \$42,000.00 has been spent for repairs, maintenance and upkeep to the Parmer County courthouse building, including installation of central heat and air-conditioning, District Courtroom repairs, installation of modern glass doors at the entrances, and renovation of the hallways.

Parmer County is scheduled to receive \$516,000.00 Revenue Share Funds from the Federal Government. Of this amount, approximately \$220,000.00 has been received and the remainder will be received between now and the end of 1976. \$225,000.00 of this amount has been allocated for construction of new jail facilities in compliance with the Federal Court ruling of Judge Sarah Hughes. The remainder will be spent for the best benefit of Parmer County.

During the last six years I have disposed of over 680 criminal cases filed in the County Court, as well as handling many civil cases and other court proceedings. As County Judge I have carried out the duties of my office on a full-time basis to the best of my knowledge and ability. Many of you I have come in contact with one way or another while I have served as your County Judge. I would hope to meet and visit with each one of you personally before election day but know this is impossible.

I earnestly solicit your vote for re-election as County Judge for Parmer County on May 4, 1974.

Two Persons Injured In County Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of March, 1974, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1974 shows a total of 26 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 17 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1974, shows a total of 395 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 172 persons injured as compared to March, 1973, with 468 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 263 persons injured.

This was 73 less accidents, four more killed, and 91 less

injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1974, occurred in the following counties: five in Lubbock; four in Hale; two each in Parker and Wichita; and one each in Deaf Smith, Foard, Gray, Hutchinson, Randall, Wheeler, Bailey, Palo Pinto, Terry and Young counties.


