Law Center Okayed; \$60,000 Is Trimmed

Parmer County commission ers awarded the contract for the new law enforcement center on Monday, and the final bid was \$52,715 more than original estimates, or 24 per cent above the amount originally pegged for the building.

John C. Cornell, Inc., of Clovis, was awarded the bid, on an adjusted figure of \$277,715. Cornell's original bid, announced two weeks earlier, had been \$337,774.

The architect, Warren Pendleton of Clovis, had consulted with the low bidder, and the two had managed to make adjustments in the design of the building amounting to \$60,000 from the original bid figure.

The center, which includes an entirely new jail and sheriff's department offices, will be connected to the court house and to the north of the present

building. Pendleton explained that one block of three men's cells had been eliminated as one of the major changes. Also, two air conditioning units were combined into one unit to effect another saving.

The jail windows also were eliminated, as were the panels which had been planned for the front of the building.

A group of citizens met with the commissioners during discussion on the matter. They raised questions concerning the necessity of the building, and

also why it had to be built onto the court house.

Judge Archie Tarter explained that the current county jail had been condemned by the state, and that the county could be in bad shape if a prisoner decided to sue the county because of the inadequate facilities.

As to the location, Tarter said "There is no question where the building is going to be located. The statutes are behind us on this."

At the close of the discussion, Tarter called for a motion. Commissioner Charlie Jeffer son moved that the building be built in Farwell. Commissioner Cecil Atchley seconded the motion, and it passed, unani-



214 Project Detailed At Meeting

Some 27 persons interested in the Highway 214 road construction project met Monday morning in the City of Friona's council meeting room for a pre-construction meeting.

Purpose of the meeting, as explained by moderator, Rhea E. Bradley, resident engineer, was to secure closer cooperation of the contractor, law enforcement agencies and Highway Department engineering personnel in promoting traffic safety on the project.

According to the contractors, the first portion of the project to be started will be the dirt work for the bridge [overpass] that will span Frio Draw and the Santa Fe Railway.

"We hope to start hauling dirt on July 8." said a representative of Austin Bridge Co., the contractor on that portion of the

project. He explained that the crew would be off the week of July 4, being between projects.

The crew which will be involved with the actual construction of the bridge won't move in until mid-September, after the required dirt work has been done.

J.O. Boswell, representing Boswell Construction Co., who will be in charge of the road portion of the project, said it would be mid-October before work could be started on the road, which will be completely re-constructed for 13 miles.

First portion of the road to be re-built will be from Clay's Corner south to the Bailey County line. After that portion has been completed, the eight-mile stretch from Friona to Hub will be constructed. Ultimate completion of the project is foreseen by September 1, 1975, barring bad weather or other unforeseen difficulties.

The contract calls for completion in 350 working days.

Construction of the road will be done in half-widths. One half of the road will be torn out, and a shoulder will be bladed off for one lane of traffic to use, while the other lane will be left intact until completion of the new side.

Only 2,000 to 4,000 feet of road will be under construction at any one time, Boswell explained.

The new highway will be 24 feet wide. with nine-foot paved shoulders on each side. This compares to a supposedly 18-foot highway at present. However, the edges have worn off so that the present highway probably does not measure 18 feet.

The bridge will be 1,205 feet long, and will contain 17 spans. Its maximum height over the railroad will be 23 feet. The bridge will contain approximately 2,000 cubic yards of concrete, and 8,395 feet of prestressed concrete.

Contractors indicated that the prestressed beams will be installed this fall before the weather gets cold. The bridge construction will shut down in November and resume in April, for best results from the concrete. The concrete slab work will not be started until next April.

The Highway Department will post 45 mile-per-hour speed limits through the project during construction.

Other points covered in the meeting were the compliance with the Equal Opportunity Employment law, and the compliance of the contractors with state and federal construction safety standards.

45 YEARS AGO-JUNE 28, 1929

Pearl Drake, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.O. Drake of Friona, who was shot three weeks ago in the abdomen with a 22-calibre bullet when a rifle in the hands of her brother was accidentally discharged, died Thursday night at the Deaf Smith County Hospital at Hereford.

40 YEARS AGO-JUNE 29, 1934

The 1934 harvest season in the Friona territory has been unusually quiet as compared to that of the past six years, when the elevators were working double crews and long rows of trucks stood waiting in the streets for their turn to unload. Despite the fact that the harvest season appears to be at its height at this time, there are no such scenes. The fields of the locality are giving a yield of from four to 15 bushels to the acre, with an apparent average of about 8 or 9 bushels.

35 YEARS AGO-JUNE 30, 1939

The County Commissioners, in session here Monday, passed a resolution submitted by County Judge Lee Thompson, which will limit the amount of financial aid to be extended indigent persons of the county. In offering the resolution, Judge Thompson said that in recent months the county had received bills from hospitals for care given county residents with bills that had never been authorized officially and he felt that some action must be taken to curb practice of this nature.

30 YEARS AGO-JUNE 30, 1944

B.P. Abbott, of Bovina, has been in this community frequently during the past week, an employee of the Parmer County Extension Service or AAA, assisting farmers who have no combines in contacting combine owners who are prepared to do service harvesting.

20 YEARS AGO-JUNE 24, 1954

Harry McCauley, who has assumed duties of manager of the Friona yard, states that no changes in local personnel are anticipated.

15 YEARS AGO-JUNE 25, 1959

Census Bureau To Take Survey

Farmers and ranchers are being asked by the Federal Bureau of the Census to "keep good records of farming operations this year" in preparation for the 1975 Census of Agriculture. That agency will conduct the 20th nationwide agriculture census during the first months of next year. The Bureau is part of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

Farmers and ranchers will receive their report forms by mail early in January with a request to fill out the forms and return promptly, according to Dorothy W. Whitson of Washington, D.C., a spokesman for the Bureau. She states that having accurate and detailed records will make it simpler for the forms to be filled out. Questions will be much the same as in the previous census during 1969.

Questions will ask for acreage of cropland harvested; quantity and market value of major crops produced; acres irrigated and means of irrigation; acreage treated with pesticides, lime and other chemicals; acreage fertilized by

kind of fertilizer (dry, liquid, gas)

Questions on livestock and poultry will cover the number of each kind on the farm as well as the number sold and the sales value. Quantities and sales value of their products will be sought.

Details will be requested about farm products produced or marketed under contract. A few questions will be included about hired and contract labor, the number of workers and cash wages paid; also about any injuries to workers.

Further expenditure questions will cover amounts spent for feed, fertilizer, pesticides, lime, gasoline and other farm fuels, machine hire, and livestock and poultry purchases.

Questions will be included about the various types and uses of land, such as cropland not harvested, other pasture and woodland, and about the



After July 2, the couple will be at home in Summerfield.





Tourist Industry Is **Big Business**

Abundant family entertainment for Texans stretches f established in 1837 and is the down the center of the state, an easy ride from the Fort Worth-Arlington complex to Austin and the Hill Country.

The distance from Tarrant County to the state capital: 193 miles. Some cars can drive it on a tank of gasoline, observing today's 55 mph speed limit.

It's not only a sound vacation idea, says J. Fike Godfrey of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, but it's a fuel-saver that aids the Texas tourist industry.

The West Texas Chamber serves this area from its Abilene office, said Godfrey, WTCC executive vice president.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe notes that more than 600,000 Texans are employed in the state's \$2.2 billion tourist business.

The area to the north, from Gainesville near the Red River to Jacksboro, features the old Butterfield Tail Route. And a train for vacationers, the Firefly, crosses the sometimes rugged terrain between Bridgeport and Fort Richardson at Jacksboro.

The Fort Worth area has Six Flags Over Texas, in its 13th season; Seven Seas, in its third; Lion Country Safari, Texas Rangers baseball, and the newest sight worth seeing; the Dallas-Fort Worth Regional

fort is a replica of one site of the Homer Garrison Memorial Texas Ranger Museum.

Austin, 106 miles farther, can be explored for its own beauty or serve as a jump-off for the Hill Country or the Highland Lakes, both to the west.

Scenery comes in many forms in Austin, much of it historical: the 46-acre capital grounds: French Legation, built in 1841; the home of writer "O. Henry," a resident from 1885-95; and the newest and most popular attraction, the Lyndon B. Johnson Library.

The LBJ Ranch and National Historic Site is just over an hour's drive west of Austin, near Stonewall. Horse-drawn vehicles are used for visitors.

Hill Country memories last longer after detours through the small towns, some of them German in origin, with their reputations for tasty, solid food.

This 200-mile, eastern fringe of West Texas is included in a new map published by the WTCC, the Wonderful West Texas Fun and Adventure Map. It and more than 200 brochures on individual cities of West Texas are available from: West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Box 1561, Abilene 79604.



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Arts enrich Fort Worth through the Amon G. Carter Museum of Western Art, Kimbell Art Museum and the Fort Worth Art Museum. For theater there's Casa Manna.
