ON MURDER CHARGE

Lambert Indicted; Trial Date Pending

Leroy Lambert, 33, was indicted by the Parmer County Grand Jury Monday, June 24, for the murder of John Frazier in Friona last March.

Lambert, who had been a co-worker with Frazier at Parmer County Implement Company, was arrested and charged with murder following the discovery of Frazier's body early on the morning of March 20 in the parking lot of the implement company.

Lambert has been free on \$25,000 bond after being arraigned before Farwell Justice of the Peace R.E. Mears.

It was theorized that Frazier had been shot sometime late on Tuesday, March 19. Frazier had been shot in the back of the head with a shotgun.

Trial date will be scheduled later, according to Mrs. Dorothy Quickel, district clerk. Four other indictments were handed down Monday, against 11 other persons during the Grand Jury session.

Ricky Darnell, Dawn Hadley Darnell, Tommy Page and Darwin Ray Ellison were indicted for arson in connection with a country fire, the burning of the former Glenn Floyd home, which was the property of Eric Rushing, about five miles west of Friona.

Eliodoro Bruno Ruiz, Jr., Oliver S. Landeros and Roger Huron were indicted with burglarizing a motor vehicle parked on Main Street in Friona. Taken from the vehicle, which belonged to Edward Burchett, were a tape deck and two speakers.

Marty Dupuy, Rocky Dupuy and Lynn Marks were indicted for burglarizing the Allsup's 7-11 store in Farwell.

A fifth indictment was against Jim Corbett Aldridge, who had been charged with driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense.

Trial dates on all of the above criminal indictments will be set in the near future.

Law Center Okayed; \$60,000 Is Trimmed

Parmer County commissioners awarded the contract for the new law enforcement center on Monday, and the final bid was \$52,715 more than original estimates, or 24 per cent above the amount originally pegged for the building.

John C. Cornell, Inc., of Clovis, was awarded the bid, on an adjusted figure of \$277,715. Cornell's original bid, announced two weeks earlier, had been \$337,774.

The architect, Warren Pendleton of Clovis, had consulted with the low bidder, and the two had managed to make adjustments in the design of the building amounting to \$60,000 from the original bid figure.

The center, which includes an entirely new jail and sheriff's department offices, will be connected to the court house and to the north of the present building.

Pendleton explained that one block of three men's cells had been eliminated as one of the major changes. Also, two air conditioning units were combined into one unit to effect another saving.

The jail windows also were eliminated, as were the panels which had been planned for the front of the building.

A group of citizens met with the commissioners during discussion on the matter. They raised questions concerning the necessity of the building, and also why it had to be built onto the court house.

Judge Archie Tarter explained that the current county jail had been condemned by the state, and that the county could be in bad shape if a prisoner decided to sue the county because of the inadequate facilities.

As to the location, Tarter said "There is no question where the building is going to be located. The statutes are behind us on this."

At the close of the discussion, Tarter called for a motion. Commissioner Charlie Jefferson moved that the building be built in Farwell. Commissioner Cecil Atchley seconded the motion, and it passed, unanimously.

Prior to casting his vote, commissioner Tom Lewellen of Precinct 1 explained to a number of his constituents attending that the county business involved a considerable amount of give-and-take.

"The other commissioners have gone along with me on most of the things I have proposed, so I'm going to go along with them on this," he said, in making it unanimous.

On approving the bid, commissioner Raymond Treider, Jr. made the motion awarding it to the John C. Cornell Co. and it also passed unanimously.

The contractor is to complete the building in 360 working days.

Star Lites Wins First In State

"Star Lites," the weekly column written by publisher Bill Ellis earned for the Friona Star a first-place plaque in the 1974 Texas Press Association newspaper contests.

The Star also received a third-place award in the statewide contests in the "Appearance" contest, a category which judges the overall "looks" of a newspaper, including its makeup, headline and news type.

An honorable mention was given the Star for its entries in the "news pictures" division of the annual contests.

The awards were presented at the annual TPA convention last weekend at Arlington's Inn of the Six Flags.

The two awards in the state contest gave the Friona Star a total of 140 points, which tied it for third place in the running for "General Excellence" honors in its division. The Star had won this coveted award in 1970, which was the last year the local paper had won a statewide award.

"Star Lites" won out over some 36 column entries from papers published in towns of 2,000 to 5,000 population. This particular field is the largest of the six divisions of competition.

Judge for the column writing contest was Gary Hebert of Louisiana, a prize-winning columnist. In his comments on the entries, Hebert said of "Star Lites": "Bill Ellis does an impressive, comprehensive job of covering the community—the issues and matters which affect his people. A good, and I'm sure well-read column."

Hebert gave Star Lites a score of 95 points. Second-place entry, from Clifton, received 90 points. Third place, from Round Rock, received 87 points.

It marked the second time in three years for Ellis to win a plaque in column-writing competition. In 1973, his column was judged tops in the annual Panhandle Press contests, and it took the second-place award in that contest this year.

The first-place state press award was the seventh won by the Star since 1959, and fifth under Ellis' editorship. It was the first column-writing plaque ever won on the state level by the local newspaper.

Mr. and Mrs. Ellis attended the annual TPA convention. Among the personalities on the convention program were Senator Lloyd Bentsen and the reigning Miss Texas, Judy Mallet, who entertained at one of the meals with her violin.

214 Project Detailed At Meeting

Some 27 persons interested in the Highway 214 road construction project met Monday morning in the City of Friona's council meeting room for a pre-construction meeting.

Purpose of the meeting, as explained by moderator, Rhea E. Bradley, resident engineer, was to secure closer cooperation of the contractor, law enforcement agencies and Highway Department engineering personnel in promoting traffic safety on the project.

According to the contractors, the first portion of the project to be started will be the dirt work for the bridge (overpass) that will span Frio Draw and the Santa Fe Railway.

"We hope to start hauling dirt on July 8," said a representative of Austin Bridge Co., the contractor on that portion of the

project. He explained that the crew would be off the week of July 4, being between projects.

The crew which will be involved with the actual construction of the bridge won't move in until mid-September, after the required dirt work has been done.

J.O. Boswell, representing Boswell Construction Co., who will be in charge of the road portion of the project, said it would be mid-October before work could be started on the road, which will be completely re-constructed for 13 miles.

First portion of the road to be re-built will be from Clay's Corner south to the Bailey County line. After that portion has been completed, the eight-mile stretch from Friona to Hub will be constructed.

Ultimate completion of the project is foreseen by September 1, 1975, barring

bad weather or other unforeseen difficulties.

The contract calls for completion in 350 working days.

Construction of the road will be done in half-widths. One half of the road will be torn out, and a shoulder will be bladed off for one lane of traffic to use, while the other lane will be left intact until completion of the new side.

Only 2,000 to 4,000 feet of road will be under construction at any one time, Boswell explained.

The new highway will be 24 feet wide, with nine-foot paved shoulders on each side. This compares to a supposedly 18-foot highway at present. However, the edges have worn off so that the present highway probably does not measure 18 feet.

The bridge will be 1,205 feet long, and will contain 17 spans. Its maximum height over the railroad will be 23 feet. The bridge will contain approximately 2,000 cubic yards of concrete, and 8,395 feet of prestressed concrete.

Contractors indicated that the prestressed beams will be installed this fall before the weather gets cold. The bridge construction will shut down in November and resume in April, for best results from the concrete. The concrete slab work will not be started until next April.

The Highway Department will post 45 mile-per-hour speed limits through the project during construction.

Other points covered in the meeting were the compliance with the Equal Opportunity Employment law, and the compliance of the contractors with state and federal construction safety standards.

45 YEARS AGO—JUNE 28, 1929

Pearl Drake, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.O. Drake of Friona, who was shot three weeks ago in the abdomen with a 22-calibre bullet when a rifle in the hands of her brother was accidentally discharged, died Thursday night at the Deaf Smith County Hospital at Hereford.

40 YEARS AGO—JUNE 29, 1934

The 1934 harvest season in the Friona territory has been unusually quiet as compared to that of the past six years, when the elevators were working double crews and long rows of trucks stood waiting in the streets for their turn to unload. Despite the fact that the harvest season appears to be at its height at this time, there are no such scenes. The fields of the locality are giving a yield of from four to 15 bushels to the acre, with an apparent average of about 8 or 9 bushels.

35 YEARS AGO—JUNE 30, 1939

The County Commissioners, in session here Monday, passed a resolution submitted by County Judge Lee Thompson, which will limit the amount of financial aid to be extended indigent persons of the county. In offering the resolution, Judge Thompson said that in recent months the county had received bills from hospitals for care given county residents with bills that had never been authorized officially and he felt that some action must be taken to curb practice of this nature.

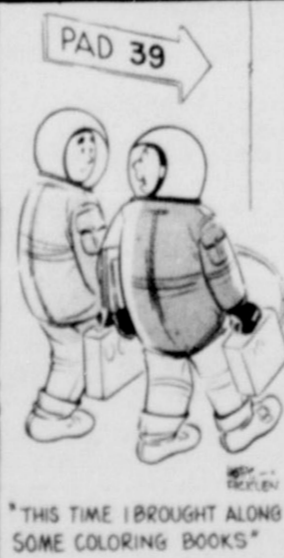

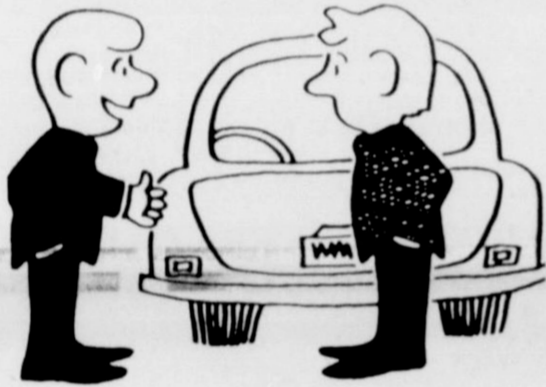

SCS Report

There is a lot of smoke in the air now. In a year of short moisture wheat residues could make a big difference in future crop production. The wheat straw acts as an insulator toward the hot sun that evaporates moisture and bakes our soil. The insulation given by the wheat straw helps keep what little moisture we have in the soil.

Wheat straw prevents wind erosion. Notice the first fields to blow are burned fields. It also acts as a cushion for the rain [when we get it] to fall on. This reduces erosion and siltation.

With our moisture shortage it is going to be harder and harder for most of us to keep up with crop water needs. We now are entering the peak use period for crops. This means double cropping will be difficult.

Also have you noticed how many pheasants are nesting

and living in the wheat stubble? This is one of their favorite places.

It all adds up to good management and conservation to leave wheat stubble on the soil surface, or tugged in.

Thunderstorm Leaves .57 Inch Here Sunday

A fast-moving summer thunderstorm left a total of .57 inch of moisture at Friona last Sunday afternoon, and a bunch of thankful folks that the cloud didn't leave any hail, or tornadic activity.

The cloud really was a wicked one as it blew in from the north and west, and packed quite a gust of wind as it first blew up.

However, all that resulted was rain, which started out on the heavy side, and then

leveled out to a "mountain shower" type of rain for almost an hour.

Rainfall in the Rhea area was reported as averaging an inch, with up to two inches received in places.

Bovina received about a half inch in its official gauge.

Welcome though the rain was, the cropland in the area is tremendously dry, and can use a lot more moisture to attempt to get the things back toward a normal pace.

The first six months of 1974, coupled with the last three of 1973, have been tremendously dry from a rainfall standpoint.

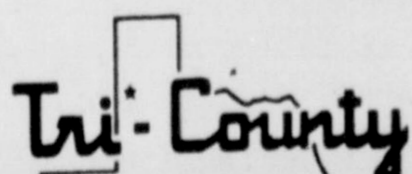

GTCSW To Enforce New Bond Ratings

Officials of Standard & Poor's Corp., one of the nation's largest bond rating services visited with General Telephone of the Southwest officers June 19-25 and made on-site reviews of company operations, according to L. Gray Beck, General Telephone Company of the Southwest president.

H. Russell Fraser, vice president of the corporate finance department of S&P; John A. Hardy, Jr., corporate bond analyst; and J.J. Vasicek, president of GTE Credit Corp., will be accompanied on their tour by John E. Graham, vice president-controller and treasurer for the Southwest Company.

"Purpose of the visit," Beck said, "is for S&P to take an in-depth look at the company's operations and visit personally with officers and key management employees. Result of the visit, along with other detailed financial studies made by S&P, will determine General of the Southwest's bond ratings in conjunction with bonds tentatively scheduled to be issued in August.

Fraser, an expert in a field of

experts, says that S&P has two obligations in determining bond ratings: First, last and always the investor and, secondly, to be fair to the company or the "issuer" to give him the highest rating justified.

Bond ratings are intended, Beck explained, to be an indication of the relative degree of probability of repayment of interest and principal on time and are of vital importance to the telephone company which must borrow enormous amounts of money in order to provide service. The rating will affect the interest rate the company must pay for bonds which has a direct and immediate effect on the company's cost of doing business, including the cost of money, Beck stated.

GTCSW's rating will not be determined until subsequent meetings and reviews are completed after Fraser and Hardy return to New York.

Scenic Attractions Offered In Texas

Texas history from a century ago and scenery shaped through the ages dominate the vacation opportunities of Far West Texas, that region rolling west of the Hill Country to El Paso.

And today's 55 mph speed limit stretches the fuel far enough to see it all: the Sonora Caverns, Langtry, Big Bend, restored old Fort Davis, and Guadalupe National Park and El Capitan.

These and more than five dozen travel stops are mentioned in the new "Wonderful West Texas Fun and Adventure Map," says J. Fike Godfrey, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Sonora Caverns, best known of the Edwards Plateau caves, was discovered only in 1961.

Langtry is the home of Judge Roy Bean's frontier court and an attractive Texas Highway Department tourist information center. It shares the Rio Grande region with Amistad (Friendship) Reservoir and the Texas-Mexico towns of Del Rio and Ciudad Acuna.

Up river is Big Bend, one of Texas' two national parks, a blend of desert and mountains, horseback trails and house trailers, and the canyon waters of Santa Elena, Mariscal and Boquillas.

Plenteous air currents make Marfa the site in early summer of the national sail plane meet. Twenty-one miles north, 19th Century Fort Davis isn't far from the 20th Century's McDonald Observatory, both open to the public.

The Texas Highway Department also recommends a scenic 74-mile drive, looping through the Davis Mountains.

More mountains lie across Interstate 10 between Van Horn and Ysleta, location of the Tigua Indian Reservation, the only one in West Texas.

Just beyond there's populous El Paso and Juarez. A tank of gasoline goes a long way there, with the handy concentration of border shopping, bullfights, dog and horse racing and the Mt. Franklin scenic tramway.

Census Bureau To Take Survey

Farmers and ranchers are being asked by the Federal Bureau of the Census to "keep good records of farming operations this year" in preparation for the 1975 Census of Agriculture. That agency will conduct the 20th nationwide agriculture census during the first months of next year. The Bureau is part of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

Farmers and ranchers will receive their report forms by mail early in January with a request to fill out the forms and return promptly, according to Dorothy W. Whitson of Washington, D.C., a spokesman for the Bureau. She states that having accurate and detailed records will make it simpler for the forms to be filled out. Questions will be much the same as in the previous census during 1969.

Questions will ask for acreage of cropland harvested; quantity and market value of major crops produced; acres irrigated and means of irrigation; acreage treated with pesticides, lime and other chemicals; acreage fertilized by

kind of fertilizer (dry, liquid, gas). Questions on livestock and poultry will cover the number of each kind on the farm as well as the number sold and the sales value. Quantities and sales value of their products will be sought.

Details will be requested about farm products produced or marketed under contract. A few questions will be included about hired and contract labor, the number of workers and cash wages paid; also about any injuries to workers.

Further expenditure questions will cover amounts spent for feed, fertilizer, pesticides, lime, gasoline and other farm fuels, machine hire, and livestock and poultry purchases.

Questions will be included about the various types and uses of land, such as cropland not harvested, other pasture and woodland, and about the value of land and buildings on the farm.

Operators will be asked about farm-related income such as recreational services, custom work provided other farmers,

or payments for participation in government farm programs.

Two types of report forms are being prepared; one for farms with sales of \$2500 or more, and another less detailed form for places with sales of less than \$2500. No matter which form a farmer receives, he need answer only those questions that apply to his operation.

By Federal law, every report is confidential. It may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical purposes. The mail method reinforces confidentiality. It also allows the farmer to complete the report at his convenience with accurate information from his records, according to Ms. Whitson.

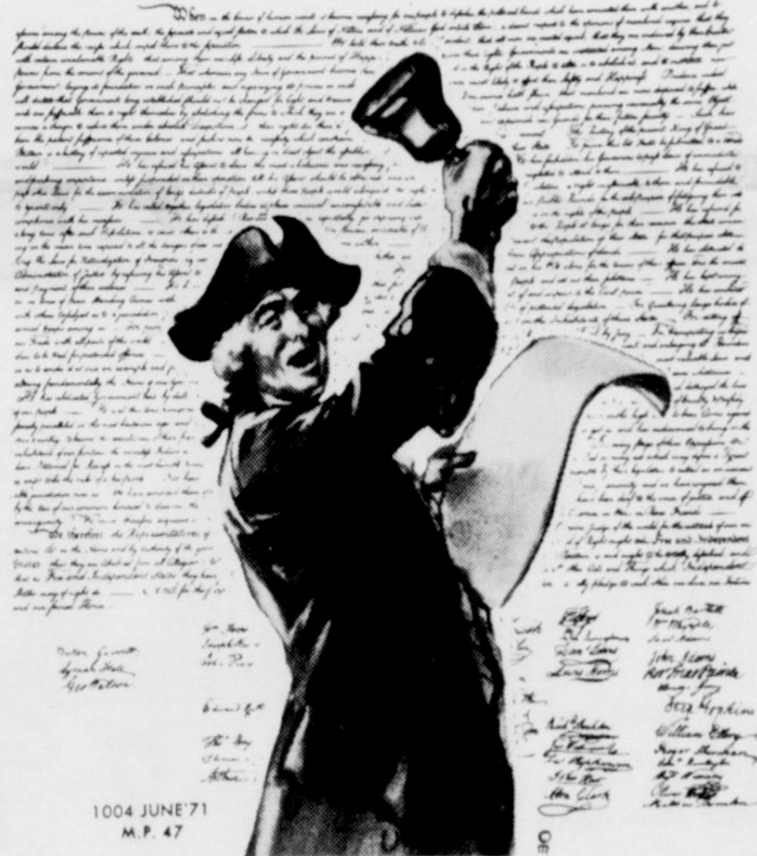

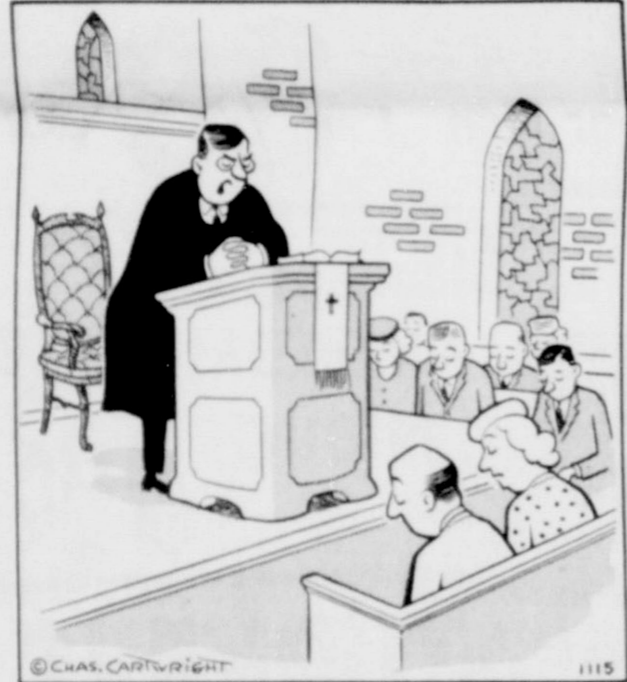

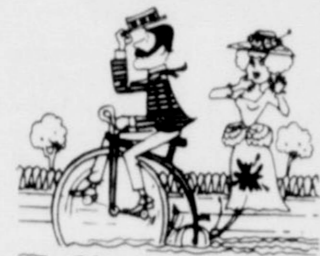

Following the ceremony, the couple greeted guests at a reception in Community Room of First State Bank.

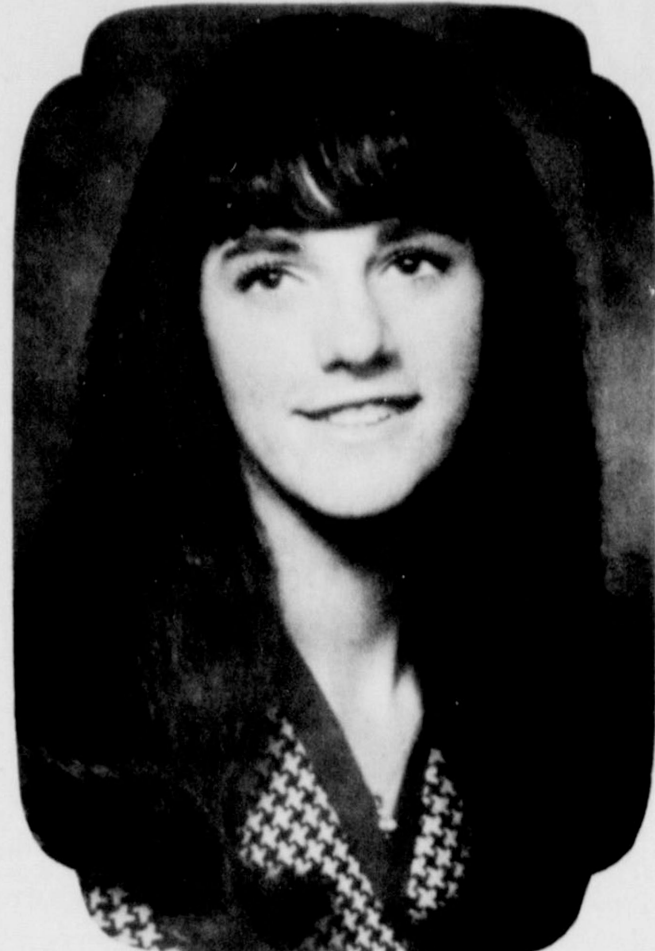

The distance from Tarrant County to the state capital: 193 miles. Some cars can drive it on a tank of gasoline, observing today's 55 mph speed limit.

It's not only a sound vacation idea, says J. Fike Godfrey of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, but it's a fuel-saver that aids the Texas tourist industry.

The West Texas Chamber serves this area from its Abilene office, said Godfrey, WTCC executive vice president.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe notes that more than 600,000 Texans are employed in the state's \$2.2 billion tourist business.

The area to the north, from Gainesville near the Red River to Jacksboro, features the old Butterfield Tail Route. And a train for vacationers, the Firefly, crosses the sometimes rugged terrain between Bridgeport and Fort Richardson at Jacksboro.

The Fort Worth area has Six Flags Over Texas, in its 13th season; Seven Seas, in its third; Lion Country Safari, Texas Rangers baseball, and the newest sight worth seeing; the Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport, the world's largest.

Arts enrich Fort Worth through the Amon G. Carter Museum of Western Art, Kimbell Art Museum and the Fort Worth Art Museum. For theater there's Casa Mañana.

Eighty-seven miles south along Interstate 35 is Waco and Fort Fisher, home of Company F of the Texas Rangers. The

fort is a replica of one established in 1837 and is the site of the Homer Garrison Memorial Texas Ranger Museum.

Austin, 106 miles farther, can be explored for its own beauty or serve as a jump-off for the Hill Country or the Highland Lakes, both to the west.

Scenery comes in many forms in Austin, much of it historical: the 46-acre capital grounds; French Legation, built in 1841; the home of writer "O. Henry," a resident from 1885-95; and the newest and most popular attraction, the Lyndon B. Johnson Library.

The LBJ Ranch and National Historic Site is just over an hour's drive west of Austin, near Stonewall. Horse-drawn vehicles are used for visitors.

Hill Country memories last longer after detours through the small towns, some of them German in origin, with their reputations for tasty, solid food.
