### CITY MANAGER SAYS

# Same Tax Rate Seen For City In Budget

announced this week that the city's budget for 1974-75 would be presented to the council at its meeting on Monday, August

Because of the Revenue Sharing checks and the continued income from the one-cent city sales tax. Outland is recommending no increase in the city's tax rate, which is \$1.40 per \$100 valuation.

Outland pointed out that the city has been receiving around \$13,500 per quarter from the city sales tax, and \$9,771 per quarter from Revenue Sharing.

Due to the increase in the

City Manager Jake Outland revenue, an increase of \$42,000 which was allowed for in the 1973-74 budget for the year ending August 30.

> Outland will present a budget to the council that will call for expenditures amounting to \$421,174. This will be an increase of \$14,339 over the disbursements in the 1973-74 budget, which came to

The new budget will call for income to the city amounting to \$586,211. This is up \$13,603 from the previous budget's figure of \$572,608.

Outland pointed out that the amount received from sales tax, 2.4 per cent increase in the the new budget will anticipate overall budget for 1974-75 were \$55,000 from that source of mainly due to inflation,

particularly in the gas and fuel departments. The city is now paying 100 per cent more for its bulk fuel than it did just a year

Included in the new budget will be a recommended increase in the salaries of city employees, \$25 per month, straight across the board. Capital improvements are

tabbed for \$57,900 of the proposed budget, which items mainly amount to general maintenance and periodic replacement of vehicles and Any citizen interested in the

city's budget is invited to attend the council meeting on August 5 and express their views on the budget.

### National Farm Safety Week, 1974

By The President of the United States of America

### A Proclamation

50 other people. Our agricultural productivity plays a fundamental role in our country's international leadership as it enables us to provide assistance to other less fortunate nations and it frees so many in our society for other economic and social efforts which benefit America and the world.

As in every other crucial industry, job safety is essential to the maintenance of high agricultural productivity. But we are concerned with more than productivity alone. Every year farm accidents produce serious injuries and result in the loss of thousands of lives. The financial cost in lost time, production, and medical and property expenses runs into billions of dollars. The cost in human suffering is incalculable.

This needless waste of precious human and economic resources must be and can be sharply reduced through careful attention to basic safety precautions. As we act to provide the food and fibre that feeds and clothes Americans and many people around the world, I urge that we also act to protect the lives of the farmers and farm workers of America through more careful attention to farm safety.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, RICHARD NIXON, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate the week beginning July 25, 1974, as National Farm Safety Week. During this week and in the ensuing year, I urge all who reside on farms and ranches to employ every needed safety precaution and practice, at work, at home, and in recreation. Further, I ask those who work with and serve farm and ranch people to support them in accident-reducing efforts by providing encouragement, information and education. We must become as effective at reducing accident losses as we have become in increasing agricultural production.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-first day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred seventy four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred ninety-eighth.

### Farm Accidents Take 2,200 Lives

CHICAGO-Approximately 2,200 people were killed in agricultural accidents in 1973. according to preliminary estimates by the National Safety Council. About 1,500 of the victims were residents of farms and ranches, and the remaining 700 were non-residents. Although the final totals have not been confirmed for 1973, little change is expected from 1972.

The 2,200 accidental agricultural work deaths are part of an estimated 14,200 total work deaths in all occupa-

A total of more than 6,000 farm and ranch residents died in accidents last year. More than half of these, however, were victims of traffic mishaps. Farm work accidents ranked second as a cause of accidental deaths.

# Governor Proclaims Farm Safty Week

Governor Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed the week of July 25-31 Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Texas.

"Although the farm and ranch environment contains many hazards," the governor said in his proclamation, "experience has shown that caution, common sense, skill and protective equipment can counter these hazards and keep accidents and injuries to a minimum.

"Texas farmers and ranchers, their families and employees need to dedicate themselves to the task of safely producing the commodities needed by an entire nation," he continued.

The proclamation is part of a statewide farm and ranch accident prevention campaign being conducted by the Texas Safety Association, Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America and Young Farmers of Texas.

The week also concurs with National Farm Safety Week under the co-sponsorship of the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agricul-

State Health Department figures show that there were 214 fatal accidents on Texas farms during 1973. That number is up 16.9 per cent over 1972. The highest ranking fatal farm accidents in 1973 were those involving firearms (42 deaths), drownings (41 deaths), tractors (26 deaths), fires and burns (24 deaths) and falls (20

Joe Smetana, TSA vice president for farm and ranch safety, offered some basic suggestions for preventing

-Watch your step. Survey your path to spot slipping, tripping hazards.

Wear shoes and boots with slip-resistant soles and heels. Clean them before climbing, mounting farm equipment, or walking on hard, smooth surfaces.

-Keep walking surfaces free of ice, snow, manure, loose

-Never permit children to ride on farm equipment. Establish a "no riders" rule-no one should be on farm equipment other than those necessary for work operation or for instructional purposes.

-- Use hand holds or rails when climbing off and on machinery. Use handrails on

-Inspect ladders before each use. Repair or replace if unstable or faulty. Set ladders on firm footing. Set straight ladder base out one foot for each four feet up. Don't overreach. Stay off tall ladders on gusty days.

-Keep buildings maintained.

Fix broken flooring, steps, etc. -Have a storage place for everything; put things away when finished. Good housekeeping is a falls prevention "must.

-Don't block your view when

carrying large items. -Look for hidden hazards when walking in weeds, tall grass, etc.

-- Provide plenty of light so you can see where you're going and what you're doing.

-- Fatigue, illness, excessive alcohol, worry, poor vision, anger, medicants which make you drowsy, etc. make you less alert, more prone to fall.

-Take time to be safe.

### **Suit Filed Against Local Spray Firms**

Walter Gilbert and Ronald Bretrand of Lubbock, representatives of the Texas Department of Agriculture office there, were in Parmer County the second week in July inspecting reported violations of state herbicide usage laws.

Gilbert reported that suits have been filed against several agricultural spraying firms in the county. If the firms are convicted of violations, they will be subject to fines, he reported.

Gilbert said that agents from the office in Lubbock will return to the county at periodic intervals to inspect for further violations.

Farmers desiring information concerning the regulations on herbicide use may contact the Texas Department of Agriculture at 1924 34th Street in Lubbock.

### **Benefits Aid Retired Women**

Nearly one-half of all retired women are getting monthly social security retirement checks on their own work records, according to William Ent of Clovis, social security field representative. Twenty years ago, only five per cent of all women 65 and older were getting monthly benefits on their own record.

On her own work record, the working woman may retire at 62 with reduced social security payments. Or, she may wait until she's 65 and get full monthly benefits. If she is entitled to higher benefits as a record she may choose to get

Women reaching 62 this year may get monthly retirement checks after five and one-half years of work under social security.



# Greenbug Epidemic **Hits High Plains**

High Plains are being hit by greenbugs in epidemic proportions, according to Jack King, research director of the Texas Sorghum Producers Grain Board.

King compared this infestation of greenbugs to the epidemic of 1968, but added the main difference is that control is very poor at this time. The use of existing chemical compounds is resulting in only 50 to 70 per cent control.

"We don't know why we're having control difficulties, King said, "but it could be one of two things: The extremely dry period could have affected the results of chemical usage or there may be a resistance in greenbugs to the present registered compounds."

King added that farmers should recognize that in most cases, the fault is not with the chemical itself or the aerial applicator.

"If chemicals are going to work, then the low rate (one-sixth pint) is enough. If chemicals aren't going to work, it doesn't matter how much is used," King said, adding that if rapid mite buildup is present, higher rates of granular or liquid chemicals could be



# County Leads State In Agriculture Stats

ranked first, second and third in production of corn, castorbeans and grain sorghum, respectively, and were among the top five counties in sugarbeet production in Texas for 1973, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White in a news release last

Total corn production in Parmer County was 16,594,000 bushels, White reports. "The work of the Parmer County farmer provided a big boost to the total state production of

60,800,000 bushels," he added. Other counties in the top five in corn production include Castro, Lamb, Deaf Smith and

The second largest crop of castorbeans in the state--4,750,000 lbs.-was raised in the county last year.

Because '73 had one of the latest freezes in recent history, harvest began several weeks behind schedule with rapid progression until the end of the year, White noted.

Other counties in the top five in castorbean production include Lamb, Bailey, Hale and

Total grain sorghum production for Parmer County was 15,454,000 bushels, third ranked county in the state.

Statewide, some 2,355,000 irrigated and 5,745,000 dry land acres were planted in grain

sorghum. Other counties in the top five in all sorghum production include Hale, Lamb, Hidalgo and Swisher

Parmer County, which had ranked first in sorghum production last year, fell from the number one slot probably because of the number of acres planted last year in corn, according to agricultural ob servers here.

Ranked in the top five counties in sugarbeet production in '73, Parmer County produced 41,600 tons, while production on a statewide basis yielded 400,000 tons.

Planting of last year's crop began in late March and was completed in early May. Harvest began the first of October and, with mild, open weather, was completed by December.

Also included in the top five counties in production of sugarbeets are Castro, Deaf Smith, Hartley and Randall.



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


