Wilson Begins Mobilization Duties

Hoover Calls For Isolation From Europe

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A new congressional battle loomed Thursday over former President Hoover's proposals to shorten America's defense lines and arm the Navy and Air Force "to the teeth" to defend the nation's Atlantic and Pacific frontiers.

Republican Senate Leader Wherry of Nebraska said Hoover's proposals "collide directly with those of President Truman and Congress and the public must decide who is right."

Most Democratic Party leaders avoided immediate comment but Senator Lehman (D-NY) said: "It appears to me to be a plea for a return to complete isolationism. If we followed President Hoover's suggestion, we would find ourselves isolated and without any friends in the world."

Senators of both parties agreed on one thing—that Wednesday night's broadcast proposals by the only living former President would echo in Congress for some time to come.

Bluntly calling the United Nations-U. S. efforts in Korea a defeat, Hoover warned against "another Korea" in Western Europe if this country feeds men and money there before the European countries organize their own defense.

"Another Korea" is the only living ex-President, making one of the most important addresses of his long public career, said "it is clear that the United Nations are defeated in Korea."

"It would be inviting another Korea," he declared, to send more troops or money to Western European nations before they had armed themselves as a "sure dam against the Red flood."

Defense of Western Continental Europe rests primarily on the European nations themselves, the 75-year-old former Chief Executive told his audiences across the nation.

"We have little need for large armies unless we are going to Europe or China," he said. Land war (Continued On Page Seven)

Beachhead Quiet As Allied Barrage Stills Red Thrust

TOKYO—(AP)—The Hungnam Beachhead lay quiet Thursday after Allied land-sea-air barrages mowed down and rolled back the Reds' most menacing attack on the perimeter.

Frozen bodies of Chinese and white-robed Korean Reds littered the snow-crusted east flank of the United Nations defense ring where the attack was made.

Communist survivors apparently were numbered to a standstill by the fury of round-the-clock bombardment Wednesday by Allied warships, planes and land artillery.

Field dispatches reported the shattered survivors were thrown back from the point of gravest peril to the Allied forces holding their last sliver of Northeast Korea around Hungnam on the Sea of Japan shore.

Red buildup reported. Quiet also was reported on the Western Korean front.

The U. S. Eighth Army reported an ominous buildup of Red strength behind the western front. Heavy traffic, including freight trains, was spotted moving Wednesday night near Yonchon, six miles north of Parallel 38.

Eighth Army headquarters did not say whether the enemy buildup was Chinese or North Korean.

The Chinese have been around the Hungnam beachhead in great force for days, but it was apparent (Continued On Page Nine)

West Allies, Germans In Arms Parley

BONN, GERMANY—(AP)—The Western Allies Thursday embarked on the laborious task of coaxing troops from a West Germany united in demanding "full equality" with the West or no rearmament.

Cognizant of a golden opportunity for diplomatic horse-trading, the Germans began talks with the three Allied high commissioners determined to write sizeable concessions for any participation in the international defense force headed by Gen. Dwight Eisenhower.

The North Atlantic Pact nations—which do not include West Germany—decided at their Brussels meeting Monday that 150,000 German soldiers were wanted for the European army they plan to raise to 1,000,000 men in two years.

Leaders Serve Notice. But West German political leaders and newspapers have served notice they will have none of it unless:

1. Their nation is accepted as an equal partner by its one-time conquerors.

2. German troop units are not restricted significantly in size or composition of command staffs unless such restrictions apply to all member nations.

3. West Germany's status as an occupied enemy nation is scrapped and the republic given full political independence.

An authoritative German source said West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer would demand the sweeping array of occupation controls on West Germany. He would seek, instead, what he calls a "security treaty" between the federal republic and the Western occupying powers, the nearest thing possible under present circumstances to a peace treaty.

The conference also was to work out the procedure for the negotiations for Bonn's acceptance of the Atlantic Pact proposals. German intentions to drive a hard bargain indicated the talks would be lengthy.

Firms Agree To Help Hold Down Prices

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Charles E. Wilson took office Thursday as director of defense mobilization and immediately appointed Gen. Lucius Clay and banker Sidney Weinberg as his assistants.

Wilson, former president of General Electric, told reporters of the two appointments at the White House after taking the oath of office in President Truman's presence.

Wilson said Clay and Weinberg will serve without compensation. Clay, former U. S. commander in Berlin, is relinquishing his duties as chairman of the board of the Continental Can Company.

Weinberg is senior partner of Goldman, Sachs and Company, New York investment banking firm. He was a vice chairman of the War Production Board in World War II. The oath was administered to Wilson by Chief Justice Vinson in Truman's circular office. The three men stood beneath a large portrait of George Washington.

Wilson told reporters his immediate plans are to continue just what he is doing now—that is, surveying the job that must be done, and getting "just as many facts as I can."

GM Appeal Rejected. Wilson took the oath of office well under 24 hours after the Senate Wednesday rushed through confirmation of his appointment.

Already, in another step toward cushioning the shock of the defense buildup on the nation's economy, the government had asked 250 large corporations to give at least \$20 million more before making plans for any major projects.

Economic Stabilization Director Alan Valentine said this would give his agency time to study the proposals and decide if they were justified. If not, the agency could ask or order their abandonment.

Valentine telegraphed the command (Continued On Page Nine)

American Casualties In Korean 'Disaster Period' Total 11,314

TOKYO—(AP)—General MacArthur's headquarters said Thursday American casualties in the worst fortnight of retreat in Korea totaled 11,314 killed, wounded and missing. It said other United Nations forces from abroad suffered 1,011 casualties in that period.

The total of 12,325 did not include Republic of Korea losses. Headquarters said field commanders reported Chinese Red losses at a ratio of 10 to 1—a total of more than 120,000.

The period was dated November 27-December 12, but the total also included relatively small losses suffered during "UN probing attacks beginning November 24."

The latest Defense Department casualty list, issued Thursday and covering notifications of relatives through December 15, showed total casualties of 36,421, including 6,180 dead.

No Break-Down Given. The Washington list showed 6,130 dead, 24,895 wounded and 5,316 missing. The new MacArthur headquarters summary Thursday did not break down his casualty figures to show how many were killed, wounded or missing.

Hardest hit was the U. S. Army Second Infantry Division, which suffered 4,131 casualties during what MacArthur called the "re-territorial 'disaster' period." The Second Division played a major role in hunting the Chinese Red counter-offensive on the northwest front.

The headquarters summary gave other Allied losses as: U. S. First Marine Division, 2,861; U. S. Army Seventh Infantry Division, 2,897; U. S. Army 25th Infantry Division, 1,606; U. S. Army Third Infantry Division, 656; U. S. Army First Cavalry Division, 443; U. S. Army 24th Infantry Division, 146; Other UN forces, 1,011.

Conferees Get Excess Profits Bill

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Congress drove Thursday for a hurry-up agreement on an excess profits tax to skim billions from corporation earnings.

The Senate gave the measure hasty approval Wednesday, after a sketch-the-highlights report from its tax-writing Finance Committee on what the bill would do.

Designed to tax away an additional \$3,200,000,000 of this year's corporation profits, and far bigger sums as defense spending mounts, the bill differs radically from the form in which the House had passed it earlier.

Seek Compromise. Thursday a committee of Senate and House members took over, seeking a compromise.

Senator George (D-Ga.), heading the conferees, said the bill undoubtedly contains errors the next Congress will have to correct. But on the whole, he told the Senate, it is the best that could be devised in this short session of Congress.

As passed by the Senate, the measure would boost the corporation surtax from 20 per cent to 22 per cent, to go along with the excess profits levy. The House had proposed no surtax change, but its version of the excess profits levy was far less mild.

Both House and Senate already are agreed, however, on a 75 per cent tax on assumed "excess profits," defined as earnings that exceeded 85 per cent of the average for the three best years from 1946 through 1949. And both agree the tax should be retroactive to last July 1.

The Senate bill declares that the combined corporation income tax, surtax and excess profits levy may not take more than 60 per cent of any firm's net income. The House had proposed a 67 per cent ceiling.

Firms earning less than \$25,000 a year would be exempt from both tax boosts.

Record Holiday Deaths Predicted

CHICAGO—(AP)—The National Safety Council Thursday forecast the gloomiest Christmas ever, as far as traffic deaths are concerned.

Estimating that 440 persons would die in traffic crashes during the three-day Christmas holiday, the council said the figure was the largest pre-holiday estimate it has ever made.

The council's estimate covers only immediate traffic deaths, occurring between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight Monday.

Christmas Seal Sale Nears Goal

The Christmas Seal Sale Thursday was only \$750 short of its \$6,000 quota, as campaign leaders reported returns totaling \$6,050.

Contributions continue to be received at campaign headquarters, and officials urged those who have not paid for their seals to do so this week if possible.

The campaign is sponsored by the Midland County Tuberculosis Association, which receives its sole support from the sale of Christmas Seals.

SE Midland Region Set For 13,000-Foot Ellenburger Wildcat

Magnolia Petroleum Company is to start operations at once on its No. 1 Sam R. Preston, which is contracted to drill to 13,000 feet to explore into the Ellenburger in Southeast Midland County.

Location is 660 feet from west and 1,980 feet from north lines of section 41, block 37, T&P survey, T-4-S. That makes it 23 miles southeast of the City of Midland.

The wildcat is near the southeast side of a large block of acreage which Magnolia owns in that region. It is five miles northeast of the Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Mickler, recently completed small pumper from the Spraberry sand.

The Magnolia exploration is four miles southwest of Ted Weiner No. 1-16 Driver, which has indicated the possible discovery from the Spraberry in a core at 7,110-30 feet in the top of the Spraberry sand.

The Weiner prospect is to set casing and then drill deeper and try to make an oil well.

The nearest Ellenburger production to the Magnolia No. 1 Preston is about 18 miles west and slightly south in the Pegasus field.

Potential Reported For Howard Opener

Fred M. Manning, Inc., No. 1 Chester L. Jones, Northeast Howard County wildcat, one mile northeast of the town of Vincent, and one-half of a mile south of the small Vincent-Clear Fork field, has been officially completed as a commercial oil well and a new discovery.

Located at the center of the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section 5, block 25, H&TC survey, this new field opener reported a calculated 24-hour potential of 246.10 barrels of 46-gravity oil, plus one per cent water.

The flow was through a 9/64th-inch tubing choke. Flowing tubing pressure was 1,500 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 1,600-1.

The 24-hour potential was based on an actual 24-hour flow of 236.05 barrels of oil, plus the one per cent water.

The project drilled to a total depth of 8,433 feet in barren Mississippian lime. After that zone proved dry the project was plugged back to 7,980 feet in the Pennsylvanian. Casing was set at that point, and it was perforated at 7,698-7,703 feet for the completion test.

That interval had been washed with 250 gallons of acid.

Some geologists call the pay at 7,698-7,703 feet lower Canyon. Others think it is Strawn.

Pennsylvanian Test Slated For Borden

The Texas Company No. 1 J. M. Higginbotham is to be an 8,500-foot wildcat in South-Central Borden County. It is to be drilled primarily to test the Pennsylvanian lime. However there is a possibility that it may be carried below that formation.

Location is at the center of the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 5, block 31, T&P survey, T-2-N. That makes it about five miles northeast of the Veal-moor field and approximately seven miles east of the Good field. Operations are to start immediately.

C-N Dawson Area Gets Deep Venture

Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Adcock is scheduled to drill to 10,500 feet, starting at once, to explore the Pennsylvanian formations in Central-North Dawson County.

The location is 1,530 feet from west and 467 feet from south lines of section 106, block 34, D&SE survey, T-7-N.

That makes it four miles northeast of Hindman, and about four miles south of O'Donnell.

Hattie W. Caraway, First Woman Elected To U. S. Senate, Dies

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Mrs. Hattie W. Caraway, 72, of Arkansas, first woman ever elected to the United States Senate, died Thursday in White Hall Sanitarium at Falls Church, Va.

Mrs. Caraway had been ill and became worse January 18 when she had a stroke which left her partly paralyzed.

Mrs. Caraway was a member of the Federal Employees' Compensation Appeals Board at the time of her death.

She was a senator for slightly more than 13 years during the administration of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

A Democrat, Mrs. Caraway went to the Senate Nov. 13, 1931, by appointment to succeed her late husband, Thaddeus Caraway. Later she won one special and two regular elections.

While not the first woman to hold a senate seat—Rebecca Latimer Felton of Georgia was appointed in 1922 to fill out a vacancy—Mrs. Caraway was the first member of her sex to win a senatorial election.

Until she entered the Senate, Mrs. Caraway was known as a homemaker, interested in the comfort and welfare of her more famous husband.

But in 1932 she became a national figure. That year, with the active backing of Senator Huey P. Long of Louisiana, she won one of the most sensational primary campaigns her state had ever known.

Here's How Price Tags On Christmas Foods Should Look

By The Associated Press While food men try to figure out how the government's voluntary price freeze will affect price tags, shoppers stocking the family larder for Christmas this week will find:

- 1. Turkey prices down two to seven cents a pound in most retail stores compared with last week, but up a few cents from Thanksgiving time;
2. Beef cuts unchanged to two cents a pound higher than last weekend, pork and lamb unchanged to six cents higher, but chickens slightly lower;
3. Eggs off three to six cents as much as 19 cents a dozen—the sharper reduction in those marketing centers which were slower to come down last week when egg prices started their plunge from record or near-record peaks;
4. Those big oranges for the youngsters' Christmas stockings lower than last week, along with Western apples, iceberg lettuce, and onions — but cranberries, large grapefruit, beets, good celery and spinach slightly higher, and nuts about the same as at Thanksgiving;
5. And bread, shortening, cooking oils and a few canned fruits, vegetables and meats up a cent or two.

Truman Sends GI's Christmas Message

WASHINGTON — (AP)— President Truman's holiday message to members of the armed forces says their mission "is to strengthen and to give hope to all who seek peace on earth."

The brief message, released Wednesday night, concludes: "May the real spirit of Christmas abide with you, and may all of us, in concert with all free peoples, come nearer in the New Year to realizing man's ultimate dream of liberty, justice and freedom."

Aleman To Rule On Ochoa's Extradition

TIJUANA, MEXICO — (AP)— President Miguel Aleman now will decide whether George Ochoa will be extradited to Texas to face charges in the Laredo hotel slaying of two men.

Federal court Wednesday recommended the extradition of the former Laredo, Texas, customs broker. The recommendation is to be sent to Aleman, who has the final say. Usually the president accepts the court opinion.

A Department of Commerce spokesman admits that the investigation, which began more than a month ago, has turned up the fact that several previous large shipments of "rags" have been sent from the same firm in Detroit to Holland and for trans-shipment to North Africa.

The fact that the bales of "rags" contained American Army uniforms was discovered through accident by a customs' inspector in Detroit last month, just as they were to be loaded aboard a ship bound for Holland. The matter has been kept a

carefully concealed secret in Washington ever since. The inspector noticed a hole in one of the bales, and investigating, found the uniforms inside. He immediately checked the other bales, found the same thing, and notified the Army and the FBI.

Total weight of the 200 bales was 100,000 pounds. A customs' spokesman does not say exactly how many uniforms there are, except that "the uniforms were a whole of a big percentage of the whole load." And he says that they are in good, usable shape.

Beyond confirming these details, spokesmen for the four federal agencies concerned will only say that the investigation is continuing abroad.

Officials at the Pentagon are considerably disturbed about the ramifications of the whole thing. They point out that Chinese Communist soldiers in Korea have been attacking UN troops dressed in U. S. uniforms. And they raise the question of how much other Army surplus equipment has gotten out of the country and possibly into the hands of enemy troops through entirely legal channels in the U. S.

American Army Uniforms Sent Abroad As Rags Set Off International Investigation

By DOUGLAS LARSEN WASHINGTON — (NEA)—An international probe to try to find the ultimate destination of 200 bales of American uniforms which were intercepted being shipped out of this country as "rags" now is being pressed by four U. S. agencies.

The uniforms were being sent by the Midwest Waste Materials Company, Detroit, Mich., to an un-revealed customer in Holland and were marked for trans-shipment to North Africa. The final destination of the uniforms is the mystery which FBI, U. S. Customs agents, Department of Commerce export officials and U. S. Army intelligence officers now are trying to solve.

Newsprint Up, Up, Up, And Scarce

NEW YORK—(AP)—Tighter newsprint supplies and higher prices are the prospects facing United States publishers.

Publishing sources figure consumption of the paper used for newspapers is about 6.5 per cent above 1949, while production has gained only about 2.8 per cent.

This simply means digging into stocks for the difference. And stocks are dwindling too.

The supply situation alone has forced some papers to limit the advertising they can accept. Increasing costs are forcing many to advance subscription rates.

During the last few months the price of newsprint has increased generally \$6 a ton to the highest level in almost 30 years.

37 Believed Dead In Charred Wreckage Of Transport Plane

BAGUIO, PHILIPPINES —(AP)—The charred wreckage of a U. S. C-54 transport which crashed with 37 persons aboard was sighted Thursday high up a rugged, 9,324-foot mountain in Central Luzon. Search pilots reported no sign of life.

At least three of the 30 passengers and seven crew members were U. S. Clark Air Base personnel. Another was a civilian U. S. government employee.

Far East Air Forces headquarters in Tokyo has notified relatives of a number of those aboard but has not announced their names.

Destroyed By Fire
A Clark Air Base spokesman said all but 50 feet of the tail section was destroyed by the crash and a fire.

The four-engine plane struck the 8,000-foot level of Mount Tabayoc Tuesday enroute from Okinawa to Clark Air Base, 60 miles north of Manila.

The crash scene was so remote a ground team may require several days to reach it.

A parachute team was unable to make a drop because the wreckage is on a sharp ledge, with a drop of several hundred feet on each side. High winds made it impossible to go in by helicopter.

Prayerful New Year's Eve Asked

MEMPHIS, TENN. —(AP)—Two of the nation's largest church groups have asked you to make New Year's Eve a time of repentance and prayer instead of revelry.

The pleas were issued Wednesday by the president of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Methodist Church's General Board of Evangelism in Nashville, Tenn.

Representing 6,000,000 Southern Baptists in 22 states, Dr. R. G. Lee of Memphis said he spoke "with recognition of the need for God's intervention in behalf of our people and other freedom-loving peoples in this time of national peril."

Methodist churches throughout the nation were asked to unite in a mid-century prayer for peace in a letter that went out to 42,000 pastors.

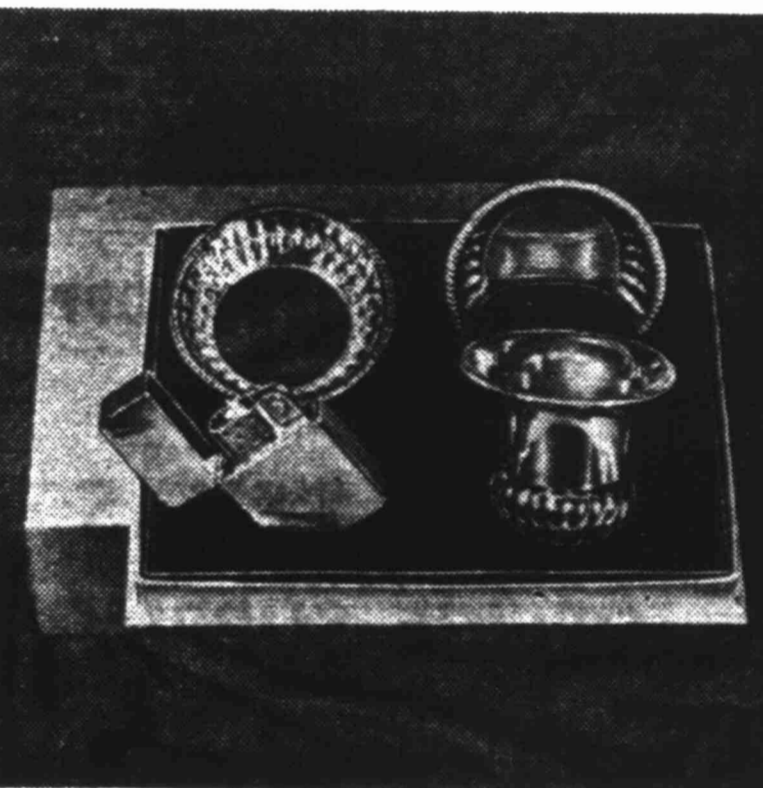

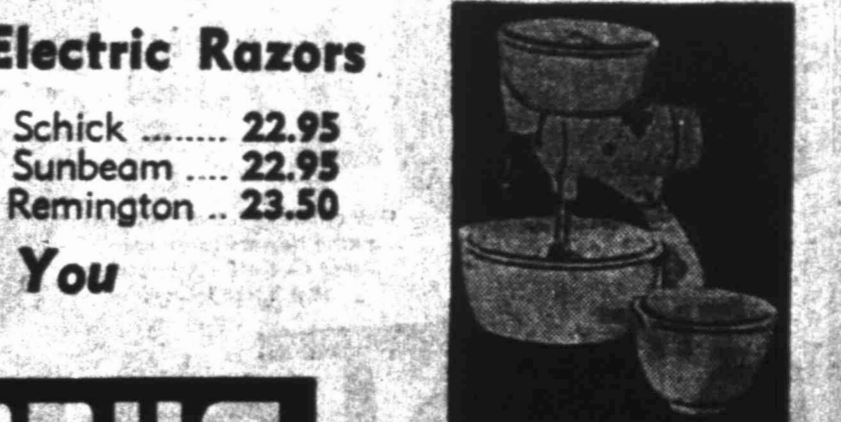

Keep Christ In Christmas
—Attend Church Sunday**

What should Christmas mean? How can the "agreeable possibility" of this season become more than that for us?

The fact celebrated in this Christmas season is a stupendous, staggering fact. It is nothing less than that God became man. The Creator God, all-knowing and all-powerful, took on human flesh. He became incarnate. Once in history a man came into life who was also God. God was among us in the flesh. Such a thing is incredible, viewed objectively. Our minds tell us it just could not be so. Our hearts wish it might have happened, but do not see how it could. Our wills resist the idea because it is beyond our understanding. But Christmas tells us it is true, mind, heart, and will notwithstanding. God was once a man.

"We Can Know God"

If each new Christmas does not make us fairly real under the implications of this event, it is either because we have become inoculated against its reality by so much else associated with the day or because

we do not really believe it happened; for we must never take this fact for granted or let it rest lightly on our souls. We can know God! He has been—and is—among us! That is a profound fact to contemplate; the world never can be the same again to any man who has been confronted with this truth. Upon our human road there is a point of encounter with this God who is in our midst. We cannot walk the road without meeting Him. This is the possibility opened to us by the arrival of God's Son upon earth at Bethlehem.

Person-To-Person

Do you see what this makes of our knowledge of God? He is not a thing or a force or a power that come to believe in through reason, logic, philosophy, or the observation of the phenomena of nature. We do not study all the arguments for the existence of God and then decide they have proved to our satisfaction that He exists. We believe in Him because we have met Him in a person-to-person encounter.

These philosophic arguments may buttress what we believe, but primarily we know Him because we have met Him. This is the real meaning of Christmas: God is a person whom we know and meet in Christ. The "agreeable possibility" is a fact and an experience. No Christmas should pass without that experience becoming deeper and more real to the believer's heart.

Bearing On Christian Life

How will it be this Christmas? Will the incarnation of God in Christ be only an "agreeable possibility," or will God in Christ be a fact. Someone who really happened and who even now is alive? Let us meditate on this mystery, feel its judgment in our hearts, and then accept the grace of forgiveness and power which he brings. For Christmas has this bearing on the Christian life—that without God in us we cannot possibly begin to be Christians. And since He came to dwell with men, then, He can and will dwell with us now if we will let Him enter in. Come into my heart, Lord Jesus.

"O come to us, abide with us, Our Lord Emmanuel."

with the Communist masses in Asia or Western Europe "would be the graveyard of millions of American boys and would end in the exhaustion of this Gibraltar of Western civilization."

Should Arm Themselves

Hoover said Western European nations should arm themselves with combat divisions of "huge numbers" before the United States lands "another man or another dollar on their shores."

Only two days before, President Truman had pledged that more American forces soon would join the combined West European defense force now being set up under Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. As Hoover spoke, Secretary of State Acheson was flying back from the Brussels Conference which authorized the combined non-Communist force.

Adding to his prepared text, Hoover said "I devoutly hope a maximum of cooperation can be established between the British Commonwealth and ourselves."

He urged that the United States free Japan and help her rearm; stiffen the defenses of Formosa and the Philippines; reduce non-military expenses, balance the budget and roll back inflation; aid other nations that show "spirit and strength" in defending themselves against communism, and engage in no appeasement anywhere — "no more Tehrans and Yaltas."

Hoover proposed that the United Nations take these actions against Communist China. Declares it an aggressor, refuse it membership, demand that UN members cease supplying it with militarily useful goods, and adopt a resolution condemning the "infamous lies" about the United States.

Republicans Cheer

Many Republicans in Congress were quick to cheer Hoover's sharp dissent from the Truman-Acheson policy.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio), chairman of the Senate GOP Policy Committee, told a reporter he agrees with "many of the general principles" Hoover stated.

Taft said some would term the speech isolationist but added, "Mr. Hoover presents very forcefully a point of view which certainly should have the immediate consideration of the Congress."

Senator Russell (D-Ga.), who soon will head the Senate Armed Services Committee, avoided direct comment but noted that Hoover was passing judgment upon the relative size of the Army, Navy and Air Force and on military tactics.

Russell said such policies should be determined by the joint chiefs of staff.

"They are in a much better position to judge those things than Mr. Hoover or I," Russell added.

"Around Washington there is a growing sentiment on both sides for re-examination of our program in the light of what we have learned as to Communists and as to our allies," Senator Brewster (R-Maine) added.

Full approval of the Hoover ideas came from Senators Martin (R-Pa.), Watkins (R-Utah) and others who have been highly critical of the Democratic foreign policies.

Would Repeat Mistake

Senator Benton (D-Conn.), a former assistant secretary of state, said the Hoover proposals would repeat a mistake made twice before—of expecting Western European nations alone to defend their soil.

Another Democrat, Fear of Delaware, expressed partial agreement with Hoover, saying:

"The United Nations has had sufficient time to make up its mind. Although I support the United Nations, this is the time for decision."

Two Republicans, Senators Saltonstall (Mass) and Aiken (Vt.), who have supported most bi-partisan foreign policies, also agreed with the Hoover proposals in part.

"Certainly we should not maintain large forces in Europe unless the people of Europe have the will to defend themselves," Saltonstall said. "I hope the next few months will prove that they have that will, for I believe it is highly important for our own security that Europe remains free."

Aiken said this was true but added he "would want further consideration before withdrawing completely out of Europe."

AF To Reactivate Big Spring Base

BIG SPRING—Funds for reactivation of the Big Spring Air Force Base are contained in the new military appropriations bill now before the Senate.

A message, signed jointly by Sen. Lyndon Johnson and Rep. George Mahon, Wednesday notified the chamber of commerce and city authorities that the bill contained \$13,822,000 for reactivation of the airbase here.

Mahon told sources here by long-distance telephone that final disposition of the appropriation will be subject to negotiations between the Air Force and the City of Big Spring.

In the absence of any announcement from the Air Force, information about the proposed reactivation was sketchy. However, it was understood from a good source that the site would once more become a bombardier school.

Oilfield Worker Injured Fatally

ODESSA—S. C. Leverich, Jr., 36, oilfield worker, was injured fatally at 4 p.m. Wednesday when his body became entangled in a catline on the Cooden University oil lease at Fenwell, about 15 miles west of here.

Leverich, who was employed by the Cooden Refining Company as a gang pusher, was operating a pulling unit at the time of the accident. He was brought to a hospital, where he died at 8:30 p.m.

King's Row

The same sad plight that caused Texas Coach Blair Cherry to resign has befallen his one-time assistant, Howard (Bull) Lynch. The only difference is that Cherry quit before he was fired, and Lynch wasn't quick enough. But the results are the same—both probably are finished as coaches. And even if they aren't, they've had blows placed against their name.

Cherry, despite the fact that his team won the Southwest Conference title, earned the right to play in the Cotton Bowl, was ranked number three nationally and lost by only one point to the mythical national champion—Oklahoma, announced he will quit after the current season because "the pressure is too great and it just isn't worth it." The pressure, of course, is that brought on by fans who feel that anything short of perfection is a football sin.

And now Lynch finds himself in the same boat.

The Amarillo School Board failed to renew the contract of Lynch for the 1961 season after his 1960 team won but four and lost six games for the most disastrous season a Sandie team has experienced in years.

And "Putt" Powell, Amarillo sports scribe, long a booster of the Sandies and a "trier" of Lynch for years, started a mid-season campaign of snipes and side remarks about "The Bull."

Eventually, it led to fans clamoring for a new coach. And the campaign was a success. Lynch was let out.

Naturally, this was quite an unexpected blow to Lynch, who has given the Amarillo school one of the finest records in Texas schoolboy football. The record will be hard for any coach to duplicate.

During the 14 years Lynch was head boss at Amarillo High School, his teams won 126 games, lost 29 and tied one. The 1960 team defeated Temple for the state title 20-7 and swept through a rugged 14-game schedule unbeaten. Other Lynch teams won the district title so often there was a cry of "Break up Amarillo!"

Howard Lynch was a great coach in 1940 when his team won the state title. He was a great coach every year, as his teams became known throughout the state as solid, rough outfits.

But the wolves began to bay in 1949, after a 47-7 loss to Lubbock. They set up a mournful howl this season after Lubbock again laced the Sandies 20-0, Odessa romped over them 41-0, and the blow of blows came when Borger edged the Sandies 13-7. It was the first time Borger ever had beaten Amarillo in the gridiron sport.

That did it. For Lynch it was

Boxer Hurt Critically In Arena Kayo

NEW YORK (AP)—Al (Sonny Boy) West, a 21-year negro boxer from Washington, D. C., hovered in "very critical condition" Thursday after a knockout loss to young Percy Bassett of Philadelphia Wednesday night in St. Nicholas Arena.

Surgeons performed an emergency brain operation on the stricken lightweight who was carried unconscious from the ring after failing to respond to stimulants.

West was losing but still appeared strong until Bassett tagged him with a straight right to the head after 28 seconds of the seventh round of a scheduled ten. On the cards of all three officials West had won only one round. Referee Harry Ebbs also had one even.

LANDS WITH THUMP
Sonny Boy, moving backward as he was hit, fell flat on his back, his head hitting the ring canvas with a thump. He did not regain consciousness.

Dr. Vincent Nardiello, New York State Athletic Commission physician, administered a stimulant in the ring. After West was carried downstairs to his dressing room in the basement of the arena, Nardiello gave him another injection. Then an ambulance hustled him to St. Clare's hospital.

Shortly after arrival at the hospital, West was rushed to the operating room. Nardiello reported "neurological findings indicate a blood clot." Nardiello and Dr. James Daniels, a brain specialist, performed the operation.

It was in this same club Lavern Roach of Plainview, Texas, was injured fatally when knocked out by George Small of Brooklyn last February 23.

Bassett, 22, has won 47 of 49 pro fights and his last 18 in a row. According to Ring Magazine, there have been eight boxing deaths in 1960 throughout the world, amateur and pro. Only two were in the United States. The first was Roach and the second occurred December 7 at Merced, Calif., when featherweight Samuel (Johnny) Lopez of Richmond, Calif., died after being knocked out by Joe Madrid of Stockton, Calif. Last year there were 18 ring deaths.

SMITH, TIDWELL CHOSEN
ATHENS, GA. (AP)—Backs Bob Smith and Bill Tidwell of Texas A&M were placed by Georgia football players Wednesday on their 1960 all-opponent team. Smith was a unanimous choice.

AUSTIN (AP)—All schoolboy football conferences except six-man may hold spring training in 1961, the Texas Interscholastic League's Executive Committee announced Thursday.

Dean T. H. Shelby, committee chairman, said the ruling was a result of the reshuffling of the old league conferences to equalize football competition.

Thirty consecutive calendar days of training will be allowed. Fall football practice in all except the six-man conference will start Aug. 27, 1961. Six-man football will start practice August 15.

Odds-makers Pick Kermit, Baytown

You couldn't ask for closer games than expected in Texas schoolboy football this weekend.

If they go according to the odds-makers' estimates, Kermit will beat Wharton for the Class A state championship at Sweetwater Monday by seven points, while in the Class AA semi-finals Saturday Baytown will defeat Austin by six and Highland Park (Dallas) and Wichita Falls will battle evenly.

Wichita Falls and Highland Park play at Dallas while Baytown and Austin get together at Houston.

Odds favoring Baytown over Austin came with news that Austin would play without its top ball-carrier and safety man, Delano Womack. Womack is out with broken bones in his foot. He suffered the injury in the game with Harlingen last week.

A-Bomb Arguments

In their widely circulated "Stockholm appeal" for the outlawing of the A-bomb, the Russians did their work well. A good part of Europe already is acting as if the bomb were indeed outlawed.

Even among those who understand the A-bomb is no more immoral than any other weapon of war, there are urgings against its use by the U. S. unless it has been dropped on us first.

This is strange reasoning from allegedly mature men. Europe's keenest observers, including some satellite diplomats, believe firmly that our possession of the atomic bomb is the one great deterrent to a Russian effort to conquer Western Europe.

There's not the slightest doubt that at this stage of our military preparedness the bomb is the only weapon we have which could inflict real damage on the Soviet Union should it march tomorrow. To be barred from using it is to be robbed of an effective club against Russian aggression.

Furthermore, Air Force officials believe there would be grave risk in waiting to employ the A-bomb. Though doubters continue to turn up, our experts believe the Russians have the bomb themselves. Certainly, to play it safe, we must assume they have and can make at least a dozen or a score a year.

What would it mean to allow the Russians to drop the bomb first? Not only colossal damage to key cities, but possibly the immobilizing, right at the start, of our own A-bomb effort.

The Russians know where our strategic air force is based, where our oil is, where A-bombs are produced. If we're lucky, they don't know where finished bombs are stored.

But it's evident they might, with suicide squadrons carrying either the A-bomb or even just old-fashioned blockbusters, do irreparable harm to our key striking force before it could make itself felt. To risk that is to risk total defeat.

Strategic air officers are wholly aware of this peril and it worries them greatly. So, incidentally, does the prospect of internal sabotage which might ground many bombers we'd need to carry the A-bomb to Russia.

Should a war come, our hands must not be tied as to the use of the one great weapon in our arsenal. Those who argue that we should wait are, perhaps unconsciously, arguing a counsel of defeat.

DREW PEARSON ON THE WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND

(Copyright, 1950, by The Bell Syndicate, Inc.) Drew Pearson says: U. S. will not organize anti-Communist Chinese guerrillas; Music critic pleases President Truman; Chinese plan "Monroe Doctrine" for Asia.

WASHINGTON — White House policy can change overnight, but for the present we have no intention of mobilizing the vast but disorganized army of anti-Communist guerrillas in China. President Truman so advised a group of congressmen at an off-the-record and very candid meeting last week.

Truman also is holding firm to his resolve not to drop the atomic bomb in China or Korea.

"That doesn't mean that we are appeasing the Chinese Communists—far from it," Truman told his callers. "They are aggressors and we will continue to treat them as such."

Truman added that if British Prime Minister Attlee came with any appeasement notions, he left without them. He agreed with Attlee, however, that if we used the A-bomb, Russia would seize the opportunity to retaliate against London, Berlin and Paris.

But the argument that carried the most weight with him, Truman explained, was that we should not atom-bomb Russian satellites in reprisal against the Kremlin.

Regarding the question of arming Chinese guerrillas against the Communists, the President pointed out that it might lead to a retaliatory Communist move against the Philippines; also that the guerrillas are too "inaccessible" and scattered to be supplied from the air or welded together into an effective fighting force.

Note—The congressmen who conferred with the President included Francis Walter of Pennsylvania, Brooks Hays of Arkansas, House Whip Percy Priest of Tennessee, all Democrats; with Kenneth Keating of New York and Walter Judd of Minnesota, Republicans.

Another music critic—President Truman has a different opinion of at least one music critic—Mrs. Helen Knox Spain of the Atlanta Journal, who wrote such a favorable review of Margaret's concert in Atlanta last season that the President bubbled over with joy and telegraphed the Atlanta Journal for extra copies of Margaret's picture. (Contrary to rumor, the President did not use profane language in his note to critic Paul Hume of the Washington Post.)

Senator from Tennessee—Senator McKellar of Tennessee, grandpa of the Senate, is planning to run again in '52. He told Boss Crump of Memphis about his plans but Crump warned that McKellar was four that he stomped out of Crump's office and caught the first plane back to Washington.

U. S. trained Germans—Without waiting for European diplomats to come to terms, the U. S. Army quietly has trained 10,000 West Germans right under the noses of the Russians to serve as the nucleus for a future West German army. Two thousand have been armed and equipped into battalions in West Berlin, with the rest stationed in four training centers in the Western Zone under the label of "labor battalions." Actually, they are carefully selected anti-Nazi who will be the officers of the new German army, Chinese Monroe Doctrine.

Most significant news to come out of Asia recently resulted from a talk between Prime Minister Nehru of India and U. S. Ambassador Loy Henderson, as which Nehru broke the news of the new Chinese Monroe Doctrine for Asia.

Nehru reported that the Indian ambassador in Peking had called the Chinese Communists were planning to pop a big surprise on

the Western World in the form of a Monroe Doctrine.

This would mean that all white and non-Asiatic nations were to keep out. Any interference, according to the proposed Chinese Monroe Doctrine, would be justification for war. The doctrine also would apply to Japan, Prime Minister Nehru informed Ambassador Henderson.

Note—Nehru is not in sympathy with the Chinese policy, believes Europeans and Asiatics can cooperate together.

Legal Wire-Tapping—Congressmen will give special attention in January to the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals decision overruling the proposed Chinese Monroe Doctrine. In this decision, the three judges took the unusual course of recommending legislation to Congress—something that judges, in our system of checks and balances, seldom do.

Pointing out that the FBI had less power to arrest than the ordinary sheriff, the Court recommended that FBI powers to arrest be enlarged; also that certain phases of wire-tapping be declared legal when it involved espionage, sabotage, kidnaping, extortion and national security.

"Please make a few comments on South's bidding," requests a Boston trader. "As you know, this is a very staid and polite city. I could not possibly say what I think of South's bidding, but perhaps you—as a Texan—will be less inhibited."

West opened the jack of spades, dummy covered with the king, and East won with the ace. East laid down the ace of diamonds, cashed the queen of spades, and gave his partner a spade ruff. West obediently cashed the king of diamonds and gave his partner a diamond ruff.

"East kept turning his attention to the next, leading low to West's ace. West returned a heart to East's king, thus stripping South's

hand of everything but the trumps. When East now led a spade through West was sure of two more trump tricks. South ruffed with the queen, but West carefully refused to over-ruff.

"South, my partner (as you may have guessed), cheerfully observed that we were not vulnerable. This was small consolation, since the opponents had scored 900 points on a hand which they might not have bid game. Even if they had bid game, they might not have made it. Even had they made game, it would have been worth only about half as many points."

"Will you take over now?"

"My Boston friend is behind the times. It's a good many years since we shot a bridge player for making a horrible bid like that overall of South's. I would say that odds are about even that South could make that same kind of bid in Texas and live to tell the tale."

There is, of course, no possible excuse for such a bid. With average luck, South can expect to win about four tricks, or even if the opponents are very timid about doubling for penalties. In this case, South's bid did not indicate a good lead. With both red queens in his hand, he should be perfectly willing for North to make a normal opening lead if West plays the hand at no-trump.

There is some point in making a dangerous overall to indicate the only possible favorable lead; or if there is some good prospect of making a game, or even if the opponents are very timid about doubling for penalties. Fogbound Defense Atmosphere Is Reminiscent Of Last War

WASHINGTON—In a fireside chat on May 26, 1940, the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt made his sensational suggestion that the United States should harness the machinery of this country to build 50,000 airplanes a year.

He got panned all over the country for that, you'll remember, and a lot of people thought he was crazy. The way it turned out, the United States built 75,000 planes in one year of the war and more than 100,000 in another.

Whether the President knew it was going to turn out that way or not is now immaterial. The main function of his 50,000-plane statement was that it served to dramatize the fact that the United States would have to perform bigger miracles of production than it had ever performed before. Today you can only hope that President Truman's fireside chat will have the same effect.

Though \$26,000,000,000 have been appropriated by the present Congress for military procurement, the armed services are talking only in terms of about 6,000 new planes this year. True, the U. S. Air Force is bigger and far better than it was in 1940. True also that procurement plans for the \$16,000,000,000 supplemental military appropriation now before Congress have not been announced.

It's probably just as well that these figures on plane and tank and gun procurement aren't made public. The potential enemies have been told too much already about American defenses or lack of them. Still there is a need to dramatize the needs of the hour.

There still are too many people standing around moaning, "Tell us what to do." There still is too much business as usual. Somehow, the war orders haven't been coming through as fast as they should. And members of congressional military and appropriations committees—saying that they have given the armed services everything they've asked for—are wondering why.

Military requirements still aren't known. Only now is the National Security Resources Board making its estimates of how much steel, aluminum, copper and manpower the country will need. These are the basic requirements of any defense effort. Yet six months after the shooting starts, the country still does not know what is to be required of it except in the most general terms.

Maybe President Truman's new budget message, to be sent to the 82nd Congress when it convenes in January, will shed more specific light.

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"Never before since Jamestown and Plymouth Rock has our American civilization been in such danger as now," the President went on. "The Nazi masters of Germany have made it clear that they intend to enslave the whole of Europe, and then to use the resources of Europe

to dominate the rest of the world. . . .

"The experience of the past two years has proven beyond doubt that no nation can appease the Nazis. No nation can tame a tiger into a kitten by stroking it."

Does all this have a familiar ring? Substitute "Communist" for "Nazi" and substitute "Russia and its satellites" for "the unholy alliance," and only hope that President Truman's fireside chat already "ready" for him.

The country is perhaps a little bit ahead of where it was 10 years ago. Some of the lessons have been learned, though not many.

Lend-lease was still a year away in 1940. Today there is a foreign arms aid program on the books, and operating.

Inflation is much more of a menace now than it was then. There was no manpower shortage then, but a surplus to draw on.

It seems that political dissention is always in surplus supply. Then it was Senator Baylon K. Wheeler warning against involvement in foreign wars and pleading for peace offers. Today it is the new isolationists who would have the United States get out of European entanglements, and who seem unwilling even to make the sacrifices at home necessary for the country's defense.

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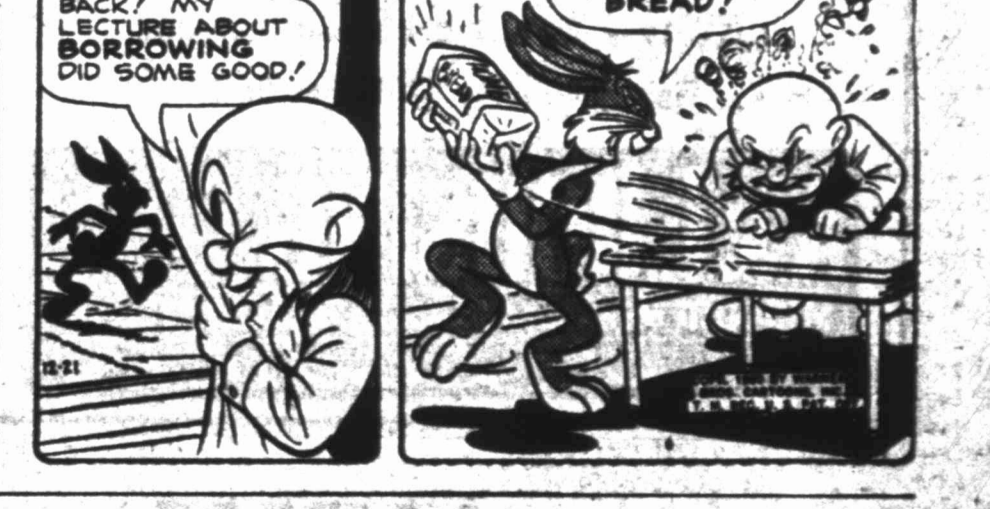


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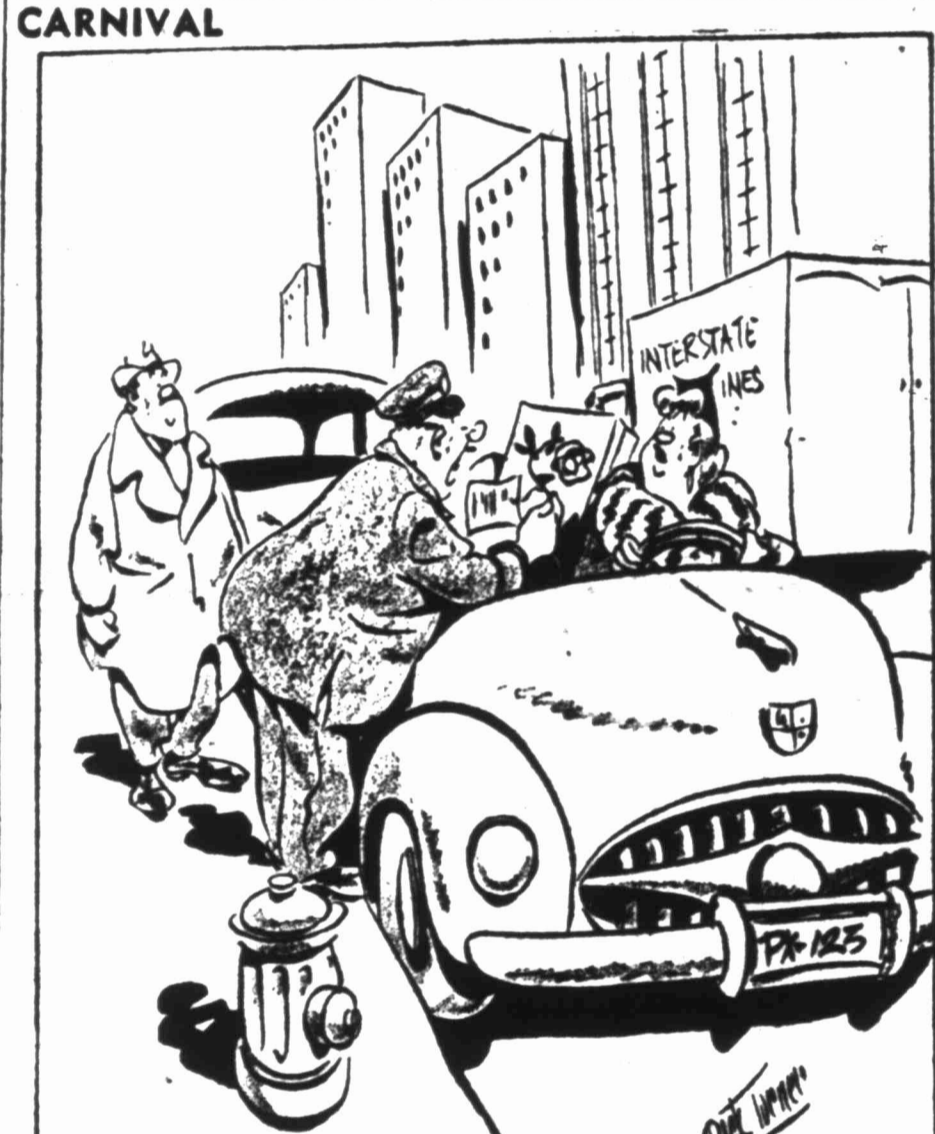

Persistent Victoria Postmaster Issues His Own Yule Stamp

VICTORIA, TEXAS (AP)—Postmaster Leopold Morris of Victoria, who has been trying for years to get the Post Office Department to issue a special Christmas stamp, has become weary of the effort and has issued his own.

He doesn't think the Post Office Department will mind much because he will stick the stamp on the back of his Christmas card envelopes. Besides, they are three times the size of regular stamps and have printed across the bottom in big letters "proposed Christmas stamp."

The design is a reproduction of the famous painting of Washington crossing the Delaware, printed in red on green paper with a border

of holly and poinsettias on the corners. On a scroll at the top is the wording "Father of Our Country—Christmas Day 1776."

Morris submitted his suggestion for a Christmas stamp to the Post Office Department years ago but it was rejected on grounds there would be a surplus of unsold stamps.

Submits Idea Again

He resubmitted his idea again this year, arguing that the stamps, as with others, need not be dated and could be carried over from year to year.

"A special three-cent Christmas stamp would cause most greeting cards to be sent as first-class mail, since practically everyone would

use such a stamp and thus greatly increase postal receipts," Morris said.

He contends that about 75 per cent of Christmas cards are sent unsealed for two cents as third class mail and are thus not entitled to directory service when incompletely addressed and can neither be forwarded nor returned to the sender. Thousands are destroyed each season for this reason.

Morris estimated such local mailings this year have been 500,000, which would have meant \$5,000 more revenue for the Victoria Post Office alone if they had been mailed first-class.

Since Morris has never been known to give up, the Post Office
