Official records here showed that the coldest it had been early in September was a reading of 44 on September 10, 1962. The mercury had dropped to a low of 49 on September 13, 1970, and had hit a low of 38 on September 18, 1971.

Also, on September 22, 1972, the low was 37-but that was almost three full weeks later than last Monday's record low.

A good comparison, and probably a more typical September statistic shows that in September of 1969, the lowest temperature registered was a reading of 50 degrees, and that didn't happen until September 25.


The mercury was climbing back toward the 90-degree mark on Friday, and cotton farmers were beginning to smile again.

This year's crop is said to be well loaded, and the crop needs several more days of hot, dry weather in order to properly



County Scholastics

totalling 3,006 this week, as the county came up approximately number of students it had at the same time a year earlier.

The decrease county-wide amounts to roughly 3.4 per cent. Apparently, after several years of scholastic growth, the area is experiencing a "levelling off," or a slight decline in students.

Friona's totals are perhaps the least affected of the county's schools, with the local figures showing about a one per cent drop from the previous

Enrollment at Friona schools this week came to 1,488 students, which surprisingly was down by seven from the opening week, according to Superintendent Tom Japhoe.

Jarboe had expected a slight increase after the Labor Day holiday, but this failed to come off. Last week the total enrollment for the Friona schools stood at 1,495 students. However, Friona's figures are still good, compared to most of the other schools in the area, which are feeling much larger decreases in enrollment.

There are 394 students enrolled at Friona High with 126 seniors, 104 juniors, 92 sophomores and 126 freshmen. Last week there were 394

In the junior high there was a decrease of five students from the 519 students enrolled last week. The figure in junior high dipped to 514 students this week. There are 13 special education students included in

the total number of students. In the fifth grade there are 124 students, a loss of one from last week's figure. The sixth

104 students short of the 116 students, two short of last week's total of 118.

Elementary and students numbered 580 this week, two down from last week's 582. However, kindergarten raised its figures by three from last week. There are 47 kindergarten students enrolled. There are 152 students enrolled in the first grade while 144 students are in the second grade. Third grade class figures show 112 students while fourth grade attendance dropped to 115 compared to 123 reported last week. There are ten students in special education

INCREASE AT BOVINA

Enrollment in Bovina Schools increased by 24 last week and this after the opening day total was announced, according to

Superintendent L.F. Jacobs. Total number of students as of Tuesday morning was 603 as compared with the total of 579 Tuesday noon of last week.

The enrollment this year is off 15 from the same time a year ago when the count was 618 and down 31 from the enrollment of 634 at the same time in 1972.

Jacobs says he expects the number of students enrolling here to increase for the next several weeks.

Broken down into grades, the enrollment is as follows-kindergarten, 22; first grade, 53; second, 51; third, 51; fourth, 48; fifth, 64; sixth, 37; seventh, 55; eighth, 56; ninth, 42; 10th, 42; 11th, 48: and 12th, 34.

The junior high enrollment is down by ten from last year with 162 students attending the three grade levels. In the sixth grade there are 53, the seventh grade totals 59 and the eighth grade enrollment shows 50

In elementary school, a total of 241 students have been enrolled, as compared to last year's figures of 295. Divided into classes, the enrollment shows 33 kindergarten students, 37 in the first, 40 in the second, 36 attending the third, 34 in the fourth, 53 in the fifth and special education classes lists eight.

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Dimmitt Man Jailed In Kidnapping

(From the Castro County News)

Russell Lee Curry, 31-year-old Dimmitt farm laborer remained in Castro County jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond at presstime on charges of aggravated kidnapping in connection with the abductionshooting of a seven year old Dimmitt girl last Thursday. County Justice of the Peace Mary Jo Smith set Curry's bond Friday.

Curry was accused of kidnapping Diana Dominguez, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Dominguez of Dimmitt about 7:20 p.m. last Thursday as the child was walking to her home from her grandparents home with some other children.

County Sheriff Jack Cartwright reported that the girl was forced into the car, then driven about two miles south of Lazbuddie where she was shot in the upper abdomen with a 22 caliber pistol and pushed from the car on a county road. She was apparently left for dead at

The child managed to walk to the Terry Parham farm about a mile from the scene of the incident and Parham drove her to Muleshoe where she

"Parents should remind their children not to get into cars with strangers," Cartwright pointed out. "A word of caution now may avert a tragedy


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



During the fourth quarter the Company sustained a net deficit of \$260,667, or 21 cents per share, on revenues of \$10.6 million as the result of depressed cattle prices. This compared with net income of \$394,647, or 39 cents per share, on revenues of \$9.8 million in the fourth quarter of last year.


"Fewer cattle are in the nation's feedlots each month, a trend that has been going on for more than a year," said Carrothers. "This reflects the fact that cattle feeders cannot continue to operate at a loss on each head they market.

"In the coming months two factors will become more evident: There will be less quality beef available for market, thus a lesser average consumption of choice beef, or the average family will eat a lower quality beef, an alternative with which I believe most people will not be satisfied,"



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
