# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

## 45 YEARS AGO—SEPTEMBER 6, 1929

The building of the Texas Utilities Company high line into Friona was completed Tuesday afternoon and connected with the system of wires that has been giving electric service to the city for more than a year.

Homer Williams and N.B. Norton, whose homes are south of town, were in Friona last Saturday, interviewing the farmers and businessmen as to the probability of organizing a permanent fair association for Parmer County.

## 40 YEARS AGO—SEPTEMBER 7, 1934

The dust storm which struck Friona about six o'clock Sunday afternoon was one of the worst in effect as well as probably the worst in appearance that has ever visited this locality. For an hour or more previous to the striking of the storm, there had been a dark bank of cloud covering the western horizon, then with apparently increased momentum it moved rapidly toward town. For a while, houses only the width of the street away were invisible, one from the other.

## 35 YEARS AGO—SEPTEMBER 8, 1939

Work is in full swing on the "old" basement of the Methodist Church. A courageous group of donors are working with hammers, saws and squares. The basement is expected to be in use two weeks from Sunday.

## 30 YEARS AGO—SEPTEMBER 1, 1944

An Italian navy lieutenant who escaped from the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp on August 4, had made his way more than 300 miles toward the Mexican border before his capture Saturday by the border patrol.

The local AAA Committee cannot issue priorities for the purchase of lumber for any construction within the city limits, it was emphasized this week by the committee chairman, who says that several city residents have come to the local office requesting lumber priorities.

## 20 YEARS AGO—SEPTEMBER 10, 1954

Incomplete totals tabulated from the recent Emergency Polio Benefit Drive in the county shows over \$600.00 donated to the cause. Director Raymond Euler announced yesterday.

## 15 YEARS AGO—SEPTEMBER 10, 1959

Two infants in Friona are confined in Parmer County Community Hospital with encephalitis, or more commonly known as sleeping sickness. The two youngsters, both baby boys, are Tim Nichols, 7-week-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Nichols of Friona and James Potter, 4-week-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Potter of Friona. Young Potter is still in "serious condition" according to reports from the hospital Tuesday and the Nichols baby is "still in danger but improving."

Saturday, September 26, has been set as the date for the \$330,000 bond election for the City of Friona by members of the council at their regular meeting Monday night. The council plans to use the money—if the bond election passes—over a period of years and not all at once.

Roy Tolok, chairman and president of the Southwestern Public Service Company, announced recently that the completion date for the second 350,000 kilowatt coal-fired generating unit at the company's Harrington Station, near Amarillo, has been moved up from 1979 to 1978.

"The area we serve continues to grow and this means more industry and more people. In order to continue to provide our customers with the electric service they need, we found it necessary to have the second unit at Harrington Station ready a year sooner than we had first planned," Tolok said.

### Local Ministers Organize For Community work

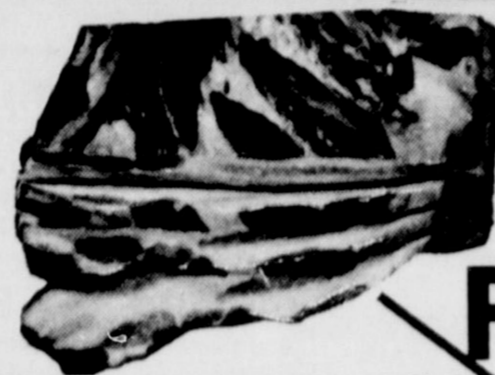
Local ministers met at Earl's Parmer House Restaurant last Friday, September 6, to discuss the future plans of the Friona Ministerial Alliance.

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## Arizona Couple Held On Drug Violation

A Tucson, Ariz. man and woman are currently being held in the Parnum County jail at Farwell following the discovery in the automobile they were driving of nine pounds, four and one-half ounces of a substance believed to be marijuana in brick form.

Texas Highway Patrolmen Glen Fant and Jim Bishop, accompanied by Bovina City Marshal Ronald Mitchell, stopped a 1962 Buick station wagon with New Hampshire license plates shortly before midnight Saturday between Bovina and Friona on routine traffic violation charges.

After finding a small quantity of hashish in the vehicle, the officers took the automobile to Friona where a more detailed search led to the discovery of the substance believed to be marijuana.

Edward Joseph Quinn, 24, of Tucson and Lenda Jean Ellis, 28, also of Tucson, were charged with possession of more than four ounces of an illegal substance, a third degree felony charge. They appeared before a Farwell justice of the peace where they were placed in jail under \$5,000 bond each.

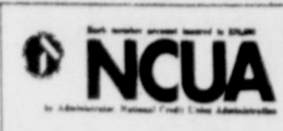

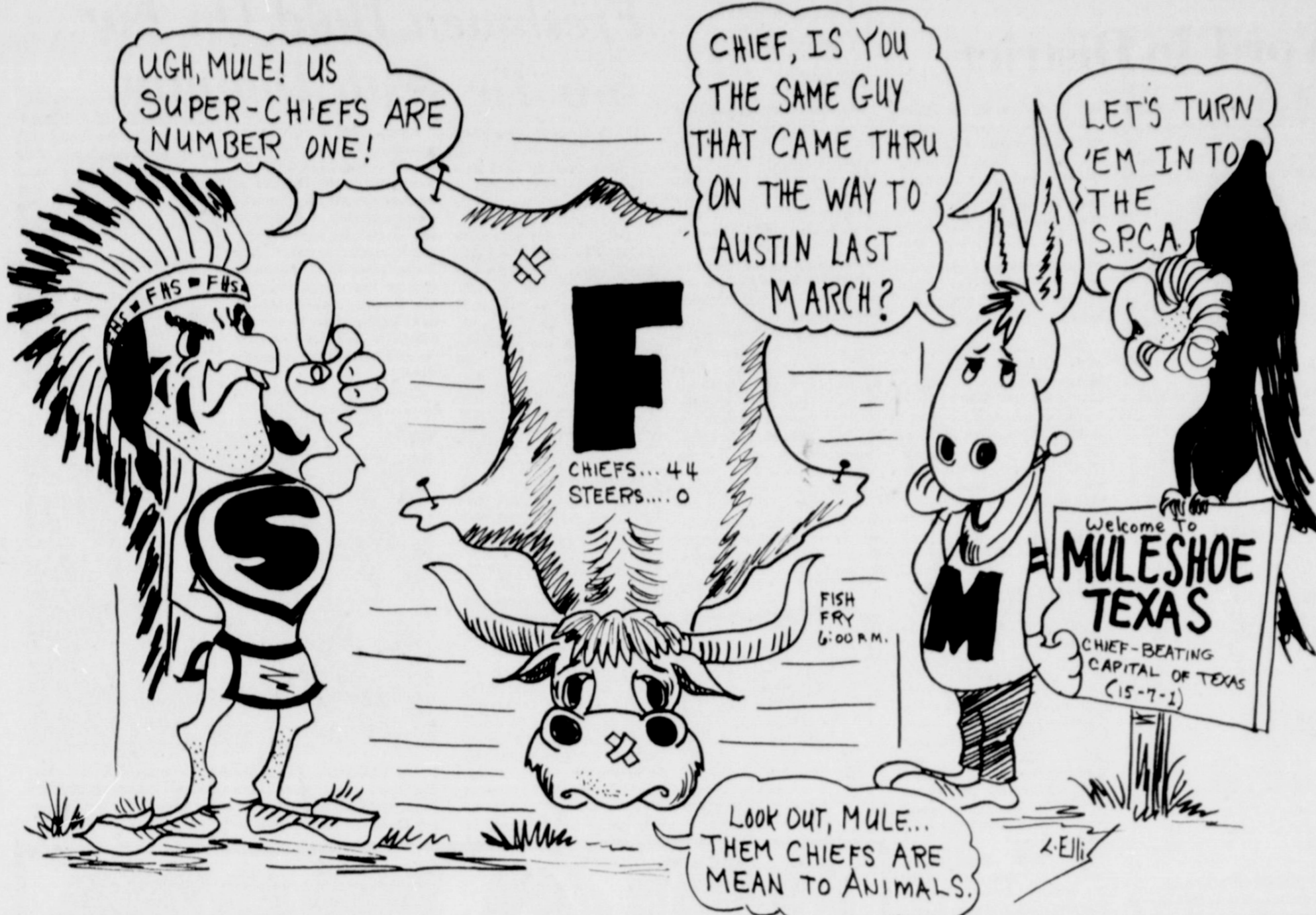

The Friona Chiefs proved to have a very devastating offensive football team in their season opener against Farwell last Friday. Fact remains that the defensive team is no slouch either as the Angry Red shutout the Steers, 44-0.

The Chiefs were idle this week and this could be a blessing for Coach Bob Owen's crew. Fullback Davy Carthel is still hampered with an ankle injury while tailback Clay Bandy and halfback Dee King are plagued with minor hurts and pain. The layoff gives the injured time to recuperate.

Spoke with Olton Mustang head mentor, Ed Miller, this week. Coach Miller remarked about the district teams, "The team that can put together four good games will win. Each team has the capability of defeating the other, each team is going to have to play the best game possible."

District 3-AA teams fared very well last week with only defending champion Littlefield feeling the pangs of defeat. The Wildcats were stopped by Cooper, 15-7. District teams gave up a total of 33 points while scoring 93.

### CHIEFTAIN AWARD

Coach Owen named the Hustling Chieftain Tuesday night at the Boosters Club meeting. Roy Don Rector was named as the recipient of the award, which is voted on by the coaching staff. Rector recovered two fumbles, made 11 tackles [six unassisted and five assisted] against Farwell. Kenny Stowers was runner-up with seven tackles.

### STEAL MARK FALLS

St. Louis Cardinal speedster Lou Brock became the leading thief in the major leagues Tuesday night with his 105th stolen base. The new mark broke the mark of 104 set by Maury Wills of the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1962.

Brock's mark was established against the Philadelphia Phillies in Busch Stadium before a frenzied crowd of 27,285. The thefts by Brock also lifted him to 740 for his career, eclipsing the former record of 738 set by Max Carey of the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1929.

Only Ty Cobb, who has 892 and Eddie Collins, who had 743, stole more bases during their major league careers.

### AX TIME IN NFL

This season the National Football League will be playing without the services of some very familiar names like Green Bay's Ken Bowman, Rod Widby, Kansas City's Pete Beathard, NY Jet Joe Fagan, Joe Jackson and Rod Spicer.

These players were dropped Tuesday in preparation of the season opening game Sunday.

The Packer's Bowman has been a mainstay with the Pack since their glory years under the late Vince Lombardi. Bowman happened to be the teams player representative and a vocal leader during the NFL Players Association strike.

Other veteran players trimmed off the rosters are Randy Johnson, Rocky Thompson [former West Texas State star] and Charlie Evans of the New York Giants. Evans was the team's player representative.

The familiar names were dropped in favor of rookies and free agents. At the same time, the NFL announced that teams would be allowed to carry 47 active players this season, signaling the end, for at least a year, of taxi squads.

## MULES LEAD SERIES

# "Top Effort" Needed In Muleshoe Contest

The Friona Chieftains donned their warpaint for the second time this season this coming Friday in hopes of breaking a four-game losing skid in Muleshoe. The Chiefs have not won an encounter in Muleshoe since 1959 when the Chieftains brought back a 24-14 decision over Muleshoe.

The series between the two teams has Muleshoe holding the winning edge, 15-7-1. The worst defeat the Chieftains have had inflicted on them was a 47-6 setback in 1962, however, the Mules kicked the Chiefs, 42-0 the following year in Friona.

Friona's largest margin of victory came in 1928 when the Chiefs tomahawked the Mules, 45-0. Currently, the Friona squad is trying to avert a three game losing streak to the Mules as they have lost, 27-6 and 14-0 the past two encounters.

The Muleshoe-Friona series started back in 1926 with the Chiefs of Friona blanking the Mules, 8-0. Friona won the first three encounters before Muleshoe jumped into the win column. The series has been delayed somewhat with the two teams skipping two years from 1930 to 1932. After the 1932 game in which the Mules clipped the feathers of the Chiefs, 14-7, the two teams did not meet again until 1938.

Muleshoe holds the longest win string in the series with six straight victories. The Mules defeated the Chiefs every time from 1960 to 1970. Muleshoe plays each of the District 3-AA teams each year and always puts up a stiff contest.

Coach Bob Owen, head mentor of the Chiefs for the past seven years has won only one time in four tries against Muleshoe. Owen commented on the upcoming encounter, "We are going to have to play our best on offense and defense if we hope to bring back a victory against Muleshoe. They seem to always get up for Friona and play us a hard game."

Owen went on to point out that Muleshoe is big and strong, but lacks the superback like Bobby Hayes and David Wheat. Muleshoe has a veteran line, but a lot of new faces in the backfield. Coach Owen feels that the team does not have the overall speed and quickness that they have had in recent years.

The Chiefs as a team will be ready mentally and physically. The Chiefs took the weekend off from the gridiron wars after

suffering some injuries to Davy Carthel, Clay Bandy and Dee King. Carthel missed the opening game against Farwell, but is expected to play against Muleshoe. Bandy and King were not seriously injured, but had some nagging pain in their ankles, both are expected to be at full strength against the Mules.

Probable starters for the Chieftains against the Mules will be Dale Cleveland at tight end, Gene Strickland or David Hutson at split end. Kenny Stowers and Danny Campbell will team-up at tackles while Roy Don Rector and Mitchell Wiseman will operate at guard

slots. David Clark is the starting center.

Directing Coach Owen's Power-I offense will be senior Dusty Peters at quarterback with Bandy running out of the tailback slot and Dee King working at halfback. Davy Carthel will probably start at fullback. Kevin Welch, who saw action at fullback against Farwell is the number two man at all the running back spots and will see plenty of action.

New coach, Chuck Stout, is in the rebuilding process with his team. The Mules returned only eight lettermen from a team that finished, 3-6-1, a year that had been plagued by the injury

bug.

The Muleshoe line is probably its strength with Robert Stoval [6-2, 200] and Dusty Davis [6-3, 215] returning to the tackle slots. Guard Danny Vela [5-10, 185] returns as a starter again this season. Billy Balderas, a 5-10, 185-pound junior could move into the other guard slot. Doug Crawford [6-0, 160] is back to reclaim his regular end slot as is end Max Burhman [5-9, 150].

Carey Sudderth will probably get the quarterback roll with Robert Shafer at fullback and Hector Posadas and Tommy St. Clair at the halfbacks.

## B-Chiefs Rally To Down Dimmitt 18-14

The Friona Junior Varsity scored an 18-14 victory over a visiting Dimmitt Bobcat crew Thursday night. Rolando Caballero put on a stellar performance for the Chiefs with three touchdowns and netted 84 yards on 13 rushing attempts.

Dimmitt drew first blood after holding Friona on downs and driving 73-yards in 18 plays. The first tally was on a one-yard plunge by fullback Sammy Flores. Quarterback Brad Dulaney scooted around end for the two point conversion giving the visitors an 8-0 lead with 4:28 remaining in the first quarter.

The Chieftains wasted little time in getting on the scoreboard after taking the kickoff. The Chiefs set up shop on the 39 yard line. Friona covered the 61 yards in six plays aided by a 29 yard scamper by Caballero and a piling on penalty by Dimmitt. Caballero bulled across from nine yards out. Friona's chance for the two point conversion was marred when a delay penalty set them back. The Chiefs tried to pass for the points but the pass was batted down in the end zone. Dimmitt held on to a slim 8-6 margin with 2:21 remaining in the quarter.

Friona's defense played the major role in the second score. Dimmitt was held on downs in the second quarter and had to punt the ball back. The punt was blocked and Waymon Lee recovered the ball for Friona at the Dimmitt 19. The first

offensive play for Friona lost four yards and the second was held for no-gain. A little dippy-doodle occurred in the Friona backfield with Roy Smith heaving a 23-yard pass to Caballero for the touchdown.

Another delay call went against Friona on the conversion attempt. Dimmitt intercepted the point after pass, but Friona went ahead, 12-8, with 2:28 remaining in the half.

Dimmitt came roaring back on the kickoff. After setting up shop on their own 36 yard line, the Bobcats began to march. Aided by a pass interference call, the Bobcats scored on a 32-yard pass from quarterback Dulaney to Gains Howell. The Friona secondary allowed Howell to get behind them and it was six points for Dimmitt with 0:08 remaining. The Chiefs got it all together on the point after attempt and stopped halfback Joe Reyes short of the goaline. Dimmitt took a 14-12 edge into the halftime.

Friona forced the Bobcats to punt the ball after the opening kickoff of the second half. Starting at their own 23, the Chiefs connected on a first down play from quarterback Keith Martin to Roy Smith. Smith weaved his way 40 yards before tripping over his own blocker at the Dimmitt 32. Caballero and Bobby Zetsche combined for 20 yards in two attempts setting the ball down at the 12. Martin hit Mark Neill with a pass for 11 yards and Caballero carried the ball over from the one with 7:47 remaining to give the Chiefs a

18-14 lead. The point after pass try failed.

Smith came up with a key fumble recovery for the Chiefs late in the third period after Dimmitt set sail for the goaline. Smith recovered a Bobcat fumble at the 22-yard line.

The remaining minutes of the game was a defensive effort by both teams.

Friona's Waymon Lee came up with a key fumble recovery late in the game at the Chieftains 30-yard-line. The Chiefs runningbacks, Richard Bermea and Caballero pounded out good gains to move the ball out of immediate danger. With less than a minute remaining, Friona fumbled the football to Dimmitt.

Friona's defense smelled the air of victory and on first play, Alberto Rodriguez put the bonnet on Dimmitt's halfback and forced the fumble which was recovered by Waymon Lee. The Chiefs ran out the clock to preserve the 18-14 victory.

The Friona offense ground out 183 yards rushing and connected on five of eight passes for 86 yards. Dimmitt pounded out 190 yards on the ground.

Caballero took rushing honors with 84 yards and Bobby Zetsche carried for 50 yards. Hal Blackburn caught one pass for 11 yards, Mark Neill had an 11 yard reception, Smith caught one aerial for 40 yards, Caballero one for 23 yards and Bob Clark one for two yards.

The clinic is being conducted for mainly one reason, according to Mrs. Bandy—so that the women will understand what the kids are doing on the football field.

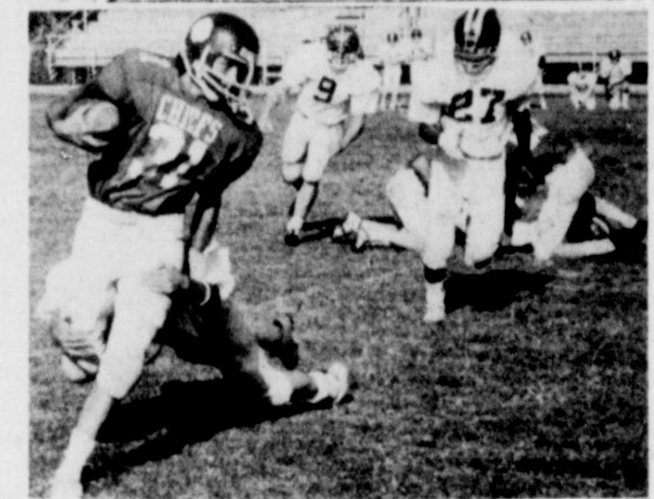
# Freshmen Hold On For 6-6 Tie With Dimmitt

The Friona eighth grade record is now evened with one victory and one loss. The victory was a 6-0 win over Farwell in the season opener.

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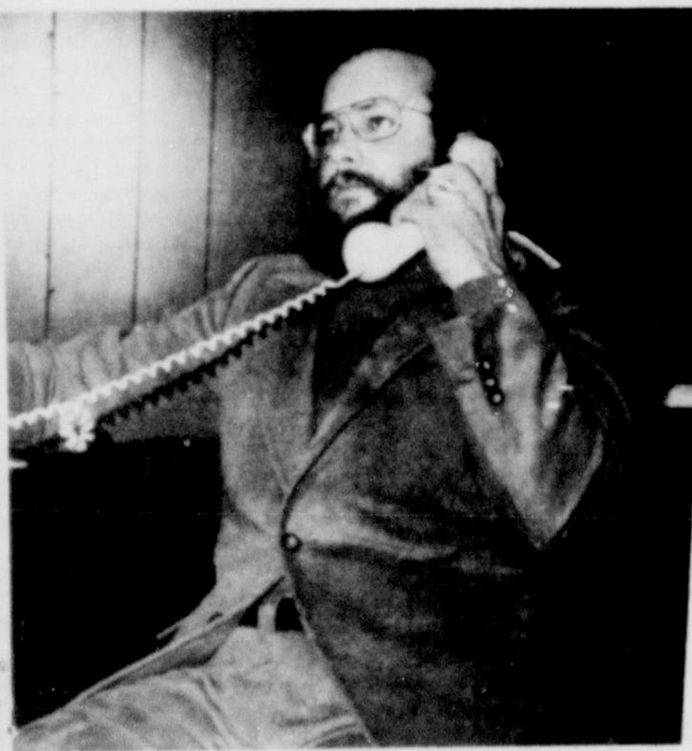
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## French Feeders See Area Installations

The Friona cattle industry will be part of a research report in France. Three French students, Elizabeth Charcosset, Anne Vollott and Paul Noel Ortlieb, were in Friona Monday and Tuesday to make a tour through some of the plants here.

The students are currently touring the beef empires of the U.S., they have already been in 15 states and have ten remaining. The three are Economic and Agriculture students, who have been selected to study the beef market in the U.S. They were selected under a grant given by a well known French foundation (ELF) working with the French Chamber of Commerce.

The purpose of the tour was to study the characteristics of the U.S. beef market, the structure of the market and the links between various branches of the industry. Methods of marketing particularly at the levels of feeder market, the feeding, the packers and the retail trade.

The students were very surprised at the amount of cattle held at the Hi-Plains Feed Yard, but what surprised them most of all was the difference in consumer taste and the efficiency of the plants.

When asked how the meat price at the store level compared to France, Miss Vollott, whose father owned a feeder ranch in Couches-les-

Mines, replied, "The Americans would not like to pay the prices that we pay in France. We have no grading system compared to the one in the U.S. and so therefore we pay as much as \$4 per pound for the best possible meat."

The French taste buds vary, depending on what part of France one resides. The people in the southwest part of France like fat meat while in the industrial northern sectors, the people eat mostly steak or lean meat. In the south, the French eat mostly boiled meat.

The three were impressed that the U.S. government allowed so many feeder lots and the amount of competition among the industry. This is not so in France, remarked Elizabeth Charcosset. "In France, the government limits the number of feeders and so competition is limited. Politics is much more tighter in France than here," added Elizabeth.

While here, the students visited Missouri Beef Packers, Crow's Meat Co., Hi-Plains Feed Yard and Hi-Pro.

One big difference was that in France, each large town has a slaughter house which is owned by the town, not individually. The slaughter people have to pay the town to use the house.

Paul stated, "The people of the U.S. and France are the same of mind in regard to government interference in business. It's bad when the

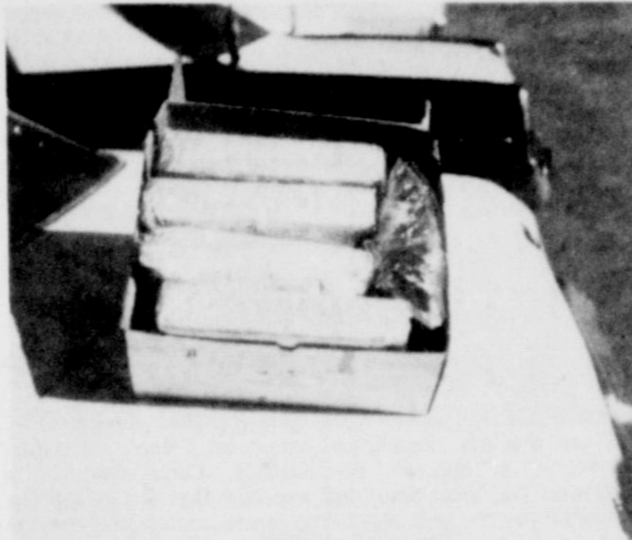

government can set a price on the markets plus high price of food and labor cost. It would be nice if the middlemen in the beef chain could be eliminated, then there could be more money for everyone, added the young man from Burgandy.

The supermarket and chain stores are just now beginning to appear in France. Meat is now purchased in the meat markets. Recently the French Assembly met and defended the small store owners.

In closing, the students remarked, "The beef situation is just as bad in France as it is here, it's now a world-wide problem. We came here to find a solution, but there appears to be none," added Paul.

The students were very pleased with the reception they received in Friona. The three visitors remarked, "We thank the people of Friona, who assisted us. We found them to be very gentle people and friendly."

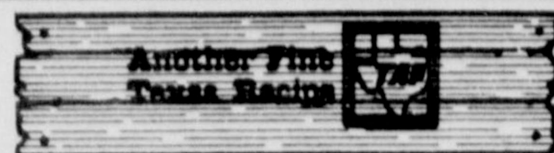

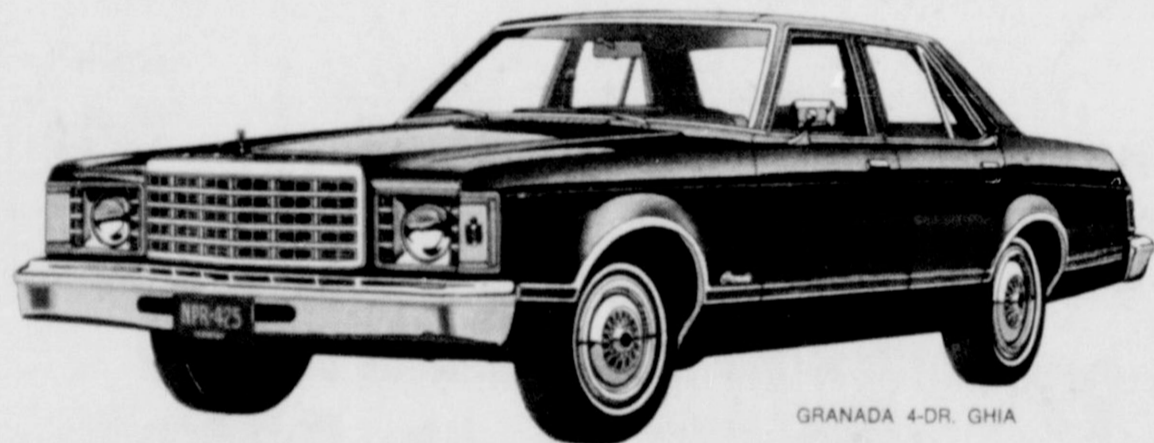

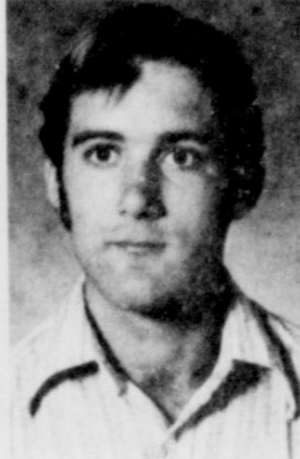
