



**THE HONEYMOON** was over between President Ford and many members of Congress recently when Ford announced his pardon for former President Nixon.

The honeymoon between Ford and the nation's grain farmers ended abruptly last Friday, when Ford intervened and stopped the proposed grain sale to Russia.

As a result, Ford's action sent the grain market into a tailspin, and early this week grain farmers had no idea what they might expect for their 1974 crop.

The nation's farmers have been given the opportunity of growing as much grain as they cared to raise for the past couple of years. The government subsidy was eliminated, and Uncle Sam promised a "hands off" attitude toward the farmers, encouraging a profit commensurate with supply and demand.

Grain leaders have worked for a number of years to increase the export market. In fact, the export demand has just about determined the price of grain, due to there being fewer cattle in the area feed yards this year.

Many grain farmers feel, and rightly so, that the government "welched" on its deal to maintain a "hands off" policy in regard to the grain market.

The market may recuperate, but early this week it had dropped around 80 cents (on corn and milo) from where it had been a week earlier, prior to the halting of the grain sale.

The federal government showed last year what the results are when it tampered with the cattle market, with many cattle feeders going out of the feeding business as a result.

We would hope their intervention in the grain market will not make for such dire results for grain farmers.

WE AGREE with the president that inflation needs to be halted, but we're wondering if the steps to halt inflation that he proposed on Tuesday are exactly what we need.

The proposed additional five per cent surtax on families with at least \$15,000 annual income will place an additional tax burden on the very people who pay a majority of the taxes already.

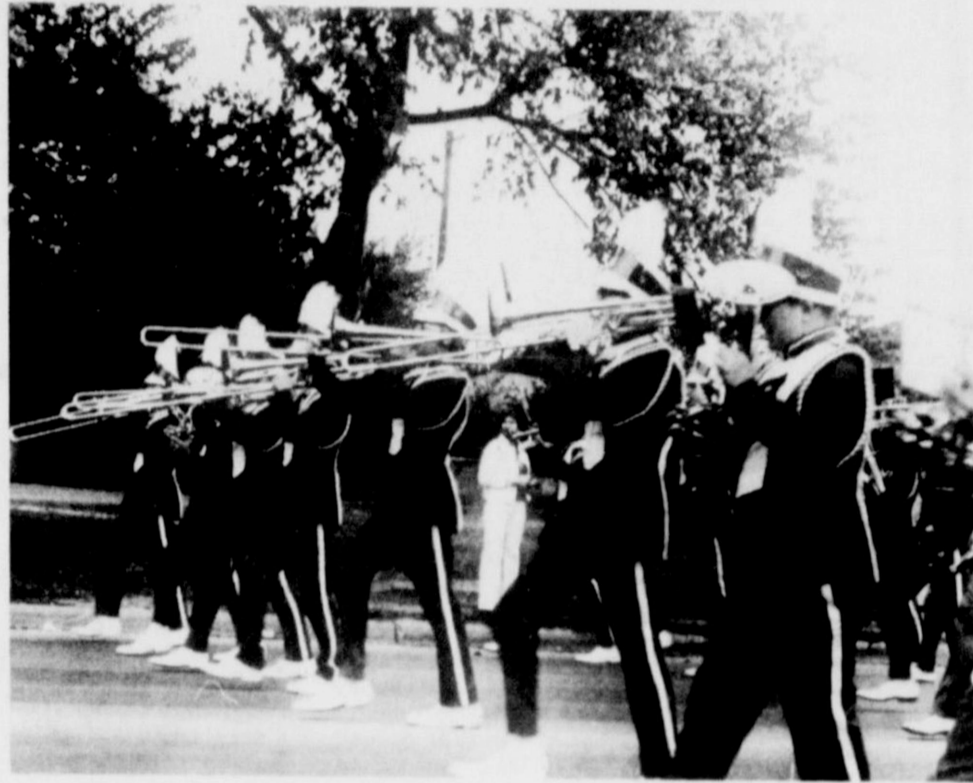
We had held out hope for a means of taxing big business, or a closing of the loopholes which allow so many of the wealthy people to escape paying taxes.

But these were not proposed by the president. We could have also cut down a little on government spending, such as in unemployment payments and certain welfare recipients. But neither of these were proposed.

In the past, the Republican party has talked a lot about economy in government and cutting down on spending. However, it appears that this has gone by the wayside, at least with the current administration.

For one thing, there were four bands, and this was an improvement over the past year or so.

## AT BI-WIZE

### Attempted Break-In Leaves Two Jailed

Two Liberal, Kansas men are in custody at the County Jail in Farwell, charged with burglary and criminal conspiracy in connection with the attempted robbery of Bi-Wize Drug last Saturday night.

Kent Allen Rich, 20, was found hiding in the ceiling of the store. He had in his possession a duffel bag (taken from the drug store) filled with narcotic drugs.

Rich had allegedly hidden in the drug store until after it closed, and then pried the lock off the pharmacy's drug cabinet, removing the drugs he intended to take.

Authorities were tipped off by a call after Johnny Massey, one of the proprietors of the Main Place, located just south of the drug store, heard a noise at Bi-Wize. Mrs. Massey was working late at her store, and knew everyone had left the drug store.

The call was received at the police department at 10 p.m. Saturday, and investigating officers caught Rich on the premises. He was placed in the city jail.

At about 1 a.m., Curtis J. Hackett was arrested at the Budget Motel, having registered there along with Rich early Saturday evening. Hackett was charged with criminal conspiracy in connection with the burglary at Bi-Wize Drug.

Both subjects were transferred to Farwell on Monday, where they were arraigned. Bond was set at

\$5,000 each. At midweek, bond had not been posted, and the subjects remained in jail.

It was theorized that the pair may have been involved in other area robberies. They reportedly had made a habit of

following the carnival from town to town, apparently so that their break-ins might be blamed on personnel from the carnival.

Officers estimated that the drugs which were about to be taken would have had a "street" value of at least \$7,000.

## Trial Postponed; Re-Set December 9

Two trials had been completed by Thursday evening in 154th Judicial District Court, another was scheduled to be heard on Friday, and another case was postponed until December 9.

The trial of James Leroy Lambert, charged in the shooting death of John Frazier here last March, was postponed until December 9.

Court officials cited the length of the current docket as a major factor in the postponement. Cases were being heard in the order they had been filed. Lambert's case would have been last on the list, making it very late in the week before it could have been started.

The week of December 9 will be the next time a jury could be petitioned for District Court.

In court action, Oliver S. Landeros was found guilty of theft, involving the burglary of a car belonging to Edward Burchett in Friona last June 11. The car was parked on Main Street in Friona at the time it was burglarized.

Landeros was given a 10-year prison sentence by the jury, which heard the case on Thursday. He has 10 days to appeal the sentence.

Ricky Darnell and Dawn Darnell pleaded guilty to charges of arson involving the burning of a house on the Eric Rushing property west

of Friona. Ricky Darnell was given a 10-year probation sentence, and Dawn Darnell was given a five-year probation sentence.

In an earlier trial, Aubrey Lee Gibson was found not guilty of charges of willfully destroying property without the consent of the owner. The charges stemmed from the breaking of windows at the Holiday Store in Farwell.

The trial of James Earl Chaney, charged with conspiracy to commit theft, was to begin on Friday.

District Judge Pat Boone of Littlefield has been presiding over the court cases in Farwell this week.

## Two Directors Elected By Friona Industries

Shareholders of Friona Industries, Inc., Tuesday elected two new members to the Company's board of directors at the annual meeting in Friona.

Paul F. Hartz, chairman of the board and president of Fram Corporation, manufacturer of automotive parts in East Providence, R.I., and Donald C. Oskin,

executive vice president of FMC Corporation, a diversified machinery, chemicals and synthetic fabrics firm with headquarters in Chicago, Ill., were added to the Friona board of directors. Eight other directors were re-elected.

Hartz has been with Fram more than 20 years and has served as president for the past eight years. He was previously executive vice president.

Oskin has been with FMC for 30 years and has held a number of executive positions, including vice president of marketing and chemical operations.

"The addition of these two top executives who are with major nationwide firms will considerably strengthen our board," said John G. Carrothers, board chairman and president of Friona Industries.

"The Company's past fiscal year was characterized by some of the most abrupt and disruptive changes that our industry has ever encountered," said Carrothers.

He explained that the total beef supply-demand-price cycle has been interrupted in the past year by the price freeze and price controls, consumer boycotts, grain exports, a trucker's strike, abnormally high grain prices, unlimited beef imports, high interest costs and other inflationary and unstable economic conditions.

For its 1974 fiscal year ended June 30, 1974, the Company had net income of \$1,173,661, or \$1.00 per share, on revenues of \$50.3 million. This compared with net income of \$1,951,748, or \$1.95 per share, on revenues of \$41.4 million in the prior fiscal year.

"Company-owned cattle sales were primarily responsible for lower net income than in the previous year," said Carrothers.

"The other four of our five primary lines of business showed improvement over last year," he stated.

Manufactured feed, animal health supplies, custom cattle feeding and grain all had higher revenues and operating income. "In future months, as a corporation engaged in agri-business, we are going to be subject to economic conditions of not only the nation but in particular the total field of agriculture," commented Carrothers.

"At the present time, the beef production industry is in a cost squeeze, and the outcome of this squeeze is basically hinged to the inflationary trend of the country.

"Because of these conditions, it is extremely difficult to make projections about the future. However, the Company is in a strong financial position and fully expects to overcome sustained periods of below-normal revenues," he concluded.

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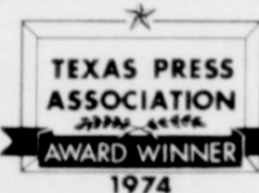

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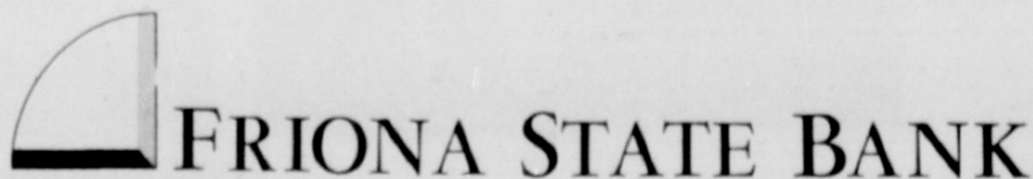

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

## 45 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 4, 1929

Judge I.R. Kelso, of St. Louis, president of the Texas Utilities Company, and J.B. Scott, of Plainview, general manager of the company, were business visitors here one day last week. The chief object of the visit was that they might inform the people of Friona who are patrons of the company that another rate cut had been made to users of light for domestic purposes.

A deal was consummated here the latter part of last week whereby W.F. Bays, of Vaughn, New Mexico, becomes the proprietor of the Friona Motor Company and the Farwell Motor Company, having purchased the entire interest of J.H. Elder in these two promising business concerns.

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## 40 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 5, 1934

The city's new well has been completed at a depth of 192 feet with 55 feet of water in it and the new pump has been received and installed. The well has been tested out and found to throw a stream of clear water, from an apparently unending supply.

The West Texas Gas Company, which serves Friona with natural gas for fuel, has arranged a new schedule which is estimated to be quite a savings for its patrons over the rate that has been in effect here and still is, for that matter, since the acceptance of the new rate is optional with the patron.

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## 35 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 6, 1939

The Star is authorized to announce that the people of the local Methodist Church will hold their first worship services in their new church on Sunday, October 8.

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## 30 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 6, 1944

G.E. and Nelson Welch, who are arranging to open an auto supply store here sometime about the first of November were in town Monday morning, when G.E. was seeking a suitable residence for he and Mrs. Welch to live in while fitting out the store building. Nelson Welch, the junior member of this firm, is a Friona boy and well known by all our people. The other member is an uncle of Nelson. They have secured the O.G. Turner Building on Main Street and remodeled the building for their business.

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## 20 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 7, 1954

Parmer County gins have all been placed in operation this week in plenty of time to serve the current harvest. Two new gins in the central section of the county, the L. & H. Gin just west of Friona, operated by John Davis, and the Tri-County Gin at Summerfield, operated by S.W. Patterson. Both these gins are owned by Floyd Linsey and Fred Huls.

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## 15 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 8, 1959

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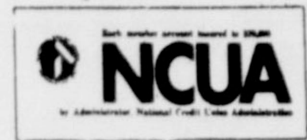

So, one might expect an exciting game when the two teams tangle. There has never been a shutout in the series, something Friona would like to remedy. There has been an average of 33 points per game scored by the two teams, in previous games.

However, this year's Abernathy team has yet to show a lot of offense.

The Antelopes are in a rebuilding year. They will carry a 1-4 record into the game next Friday. Their only win so far this season was a 16-6 decision over Tahoka.

Losses have been to Petersburg, Hale Center, Slaton and Olton. The most recent game was with Olton, in which the Antelopes dropped a 33-6 decision. Abernathy was open this past Friday.

Chiefs, Bobcats Retain Unbeaten Loop Records

Friona's Chieftains finally were scored on, and Dimmitt's runaway express was slowed somewhat—but District 3-AA's two top teams continued on their undefeated way in games last week.

The scrappy class A Hart Longhorns carried the fight to Friona's Chieftains, and scored the first points against the Redskins in 18 quarters, counting 1973, but Friona still registered a 14-6 triumph.

In an offensive game dominated by big defensive plays, the Chiefs had a slight edge in total offense, 285-254, although Hart out first-

downed the Chiefs, 15-13.

HART PRAISED

"Hart is as good a class A team as we've played in a number of years. Their line moved our people like no other team had this season," said Friona coach Bob Owen.

Dimmitt raced to its fifth season win, 20-0 over Morton, but saw its point and total offense production slowed somewhat by Tullia, which has a reputable defense.

The Bobcats still rolled up 310 total yards, but this was considerably less than the 444 yards per game it had

averaged in the first four games.

Dimmitt draws Lockney this week, a team that dropped a 29-28 cliff-hanger to Kress last Friday. A high-scoring game might be expected.

OLTON WINS

Olton powered past Abernathy, 33-6, getting pairs of touchdowns out of Glenn Johnson and Jimmy Parker.

The Mustangs allowed a touchdown by a long pass, or would have shut out the District 4-AA Antelopes. Olton gave up only 100 total yards.

Morton had to score a late TD to down winless Idalou, 19-14. Quarterback David Ramby raced 12 yards around end to wipe out a 14-13 Idalou lead late in the game.

In the district's only loss of the week, Littlefield found out that Floydada is still tough. "They have the best team they've had in the past three or four years," said Jerry Blakely about the 27-7 loss.

GOOD RECORD

The league's 4-1 record for the week upped its record against outside competition to 17-6-1 for the season, a formidable .729 winning percentage.

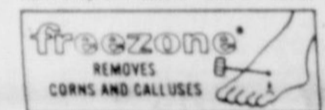

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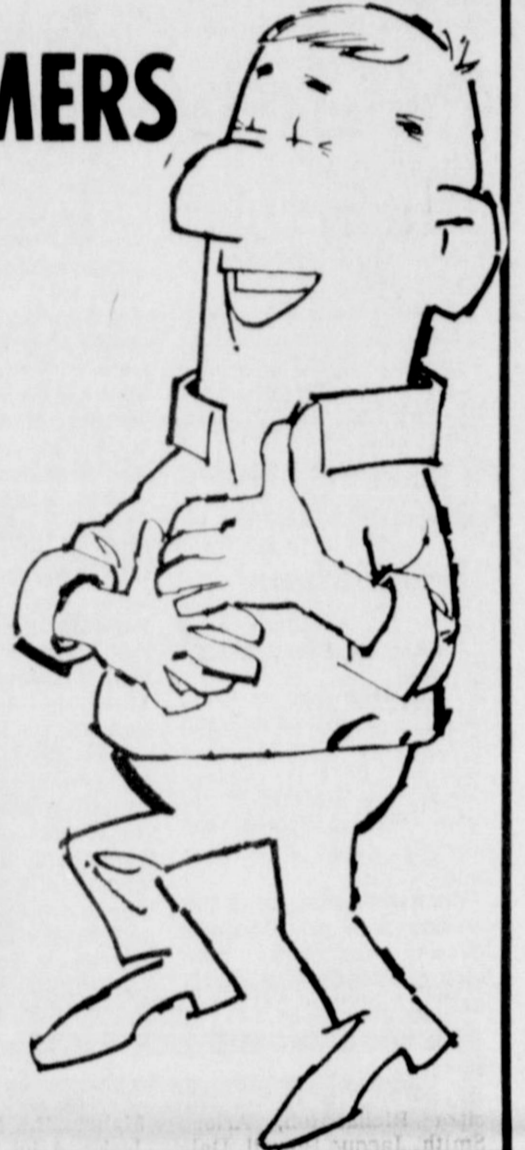
