Enrollment Totals Given For Schools

Enrollment is down in Friona school system from a year ago, it was reported this week by Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

This year's enrollment figures stood at 1333 on Wednesday, August 25. as compared to 1392 last year.

The decline seems to be common in area schools this fall, though. Neighboring Bovina had a decrease of 40 students on their opening day. Their totals had dropped from 541 to 501.

Superintendent Jarboe said he could not explain the drop in enrollment. He did say, "I'm not worried because we always get a number of students after Labor Day."

number of students after Labor Day."

The superintendent reminded parents that it is required by law for all children between the ages of six and 18 to be registered for school.

and 18 to be registered for school.

The largest decline in enrollment figures, as last year, was in the junior high segment. They enrolled 416, compared to 471 a year ago. This was a decrease of 55 students.

The drop in elementary school was not as large. Their figures show 524 students enrolled as of Wednesday, or a drop of 18 from 1975.

High school figures show an increase of 14 students over 1975. There were 393 enrolled Wednesday, compared to an enrollment of 379 in

1975. "This was the largest enrollment figure for high school that we have had in quite some time," Jarboe said.

The school enrollment by grade was as follows: Kindergarten-51; first grade-123; second grade 110; third grade 115 and fourth grade 118. Elementary total-524.

Fifth grade-97; sixth grade-105; seventh grade-97; eighth grade-117 and special education-7. Total for junior high-416.

Freshmen-116; sophomores-99; juniors-104 and seniors 74. Total enrollment for high school-393. Grand total for all grades, 1333.



all bids at this time, with further action postponed until after January

George Wall, district highway engineer from Lubbock, attended the meeting and gave the commissioners an update on the situation facing the Texas Highway Department.

Wall said that the highway department is having trouble operating under the present budget system, with inflation being a big cause of the trouble.

It appears that the state's Farm to Market highways can probably be continued at their present level, due to \$15 million being designated for this purpose.

However, Wall said that it appears that interstate road construction will have to be almost stopped, and that highways similar to Highway 60 in Parmer County will only be rebuilt or reconstructed as a two-lane road within the next 20 years, unless the situation changes.

The annual inspection date for the dam site near Bovina is to be September 13, it was announced. The commissioners unanimously adopted the following resolution, to be made a part of the court's

SWPS Station Burning Coal

Brac Biggers, division manager for SPS in Amarillo, has announced that Southwestern Public Service Company is now burning coal at its new Harrington Station northeast of

This is the first time in the modern history of the company that coal has been used to fuel the boilers that produce steam at Southwestern's power plants. The low-sulphur coal is brought in from Wyoming in 110 car unit trains on a twice-a-week schedule and will be used at the rate of 3500 tons per day when the generating unit is operating at capacity.

Construction of the second 350,000 kilowatt generating unit is underway at Harrington Station with completion scheduled for 1978. Plans call for additional coal-fired units to be in service in 1980, 1982, and 1984.
