## Gala Reunion In Works For Exes

Friona ex-students are planning a very special reunion September 24-25 for all persons who have been associated with the Friona schools since its first graduation class in 1916.

"Because this is the Bicentennial and since our school is 60 years old this year, we thought it would be a good idea to have an all-school reunion," stated Becky Weatherly, secretary of the Ex-Students Assn. in a letter which was mailed this week to many ex-students.

Mrs. Weatherly said that the exes had been aided by many who have helped by giving addresses of former students, but that there were several classes on which the association did not have information, and they would appreciate the help of all local residents in helping them to get the word out.

"Please understand that we intend the reunion to be for ANY person who ever attended Friona schools, or taught here, and not just graduates," Mrs. Weatherly says. The association also could use help in getting the word to former teachers.

September 24 is the date for Friona's football homecoming

game, which will be against Tulia. On September 25, a big day is planned, with a banquet at 8 p.m. at the Friona Community Center to cap off the activities.

The banquet is to catered by K-Bob's Steak House. It will be necessary to purchase tickets to the banquet at \$3.50 each, and these must be purchased by September 10.

Also on tap once again this year will be the alumni band, which will perform during halftime of the homecoming game. Last year, a number of alums participated in the band, and all had a good time.

**THE RECENT NEWS** that the State Highway 214 project, which now is completed from Friona to Hub and from Clay's Corner to Muleshoe; will get the 10-mile middle portion, Hub to Clay's Corner, rebuilt, was good news in these parts.

With the highway funds cut to the bone, there was some question as to whether the project, which had been in the planning stages for a number of years, might ever come to pass.

County commissioners had done considerable work in securing needed right of way to complete the widening process, which will include a larger bridge at Running Water Draw.

However, with the state's budget out of whack due to loss of federal matching funds, all highway programs have more or less been placed in a state of limbo.

In fact, the Highway Department has had to cut down on its work force, in order to operate under the trimmed budget.

Thus, the announcement that the bid for the reconstruction of SH 214 south of Hub would be awarded on October 13 was met with much jubilation by county officials.

The improvements made to the road from Hub to Friona, including the beautiful overpass spanning the Santa Fe tracks, have really been enjoyed by those who use the highway on a regular basis. However, the "through" traffic, to Muleshoe, Lubbock, etc., has had to contend with the deteriorating condition of the middle part of this road for a number of years.

There have been a number of serious accidents on this portion of the highway, and its improvement can't come a moment too soon.

**HOWEVER, THE NEWS** which county officials received pertaining to any future highway projects in the county, including the widening of Highway 60 to four lanes, was not bright.

George Wall, District Engineer, told the commissioners that under the present funding and financing system, rebuilding highways such as U. S. 60 into a four-lane road would be a virtual impossibility.

Interstate Highway construction will have to be almost stopped completely, the district engineer told the court.

The state of Texas has always prided itself in having a modern system of highways, and the Highway Department has taken the lead in planning for improvements.

However, with the present system of financing, it appears that our roads could become second rate in the near future.

We suppose that the only way to argue for a change in the financing system would be to communicate with our elected officials, preferably those in Washington.

We would assume that our Texas senators and representatives would all be in favor of any change that would help our state roads. The large metropolitan areas, which have been grabbing the bulk of highway money for their mass transit systems, would appear to be the "road block" standing in the way of progress on our highway needs.

One other possibility would be if the problem could be made an election issue. If it were possible to inject this problem into the campaign issues, then we might at least find out how the candidates stand on the highway matter. With all of the other major issues, though, this is probably a remote possibility.

**SPEAKING OF THE** election, we were reminded last week by County Democratic chairman Hollis Horton of the continuing drive to register voters for the November 2 general election.

registered still may become eligible to vote in November if they complete a voter registration card by October 1.

A number of young voters may have had their 18th birthday this year. They could become eligible to vote by registering with the County Tax assessor. Also, those who have moved into the county can become eligible to vote locally by filling out a card.

So, if you feel that you might become eligible to vote, and are not already eligible, you might communicate with Horton. He will be happy to answer all of your questions on the subject.

## Enrollment Shows Gain

Enrollment figures are up for Friona schools since the first week of classes, reported Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

The high school total continued to climb as they enrolled eight more students for the fall term to bring the total to 401.

The junior high total was up to 423 from a first week total of 416.

The largest increase was seen in the elementary school. They went from 524 to 545 students; an increase of 21 students.

The revised school enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten-53 first grade-126 second grade-113

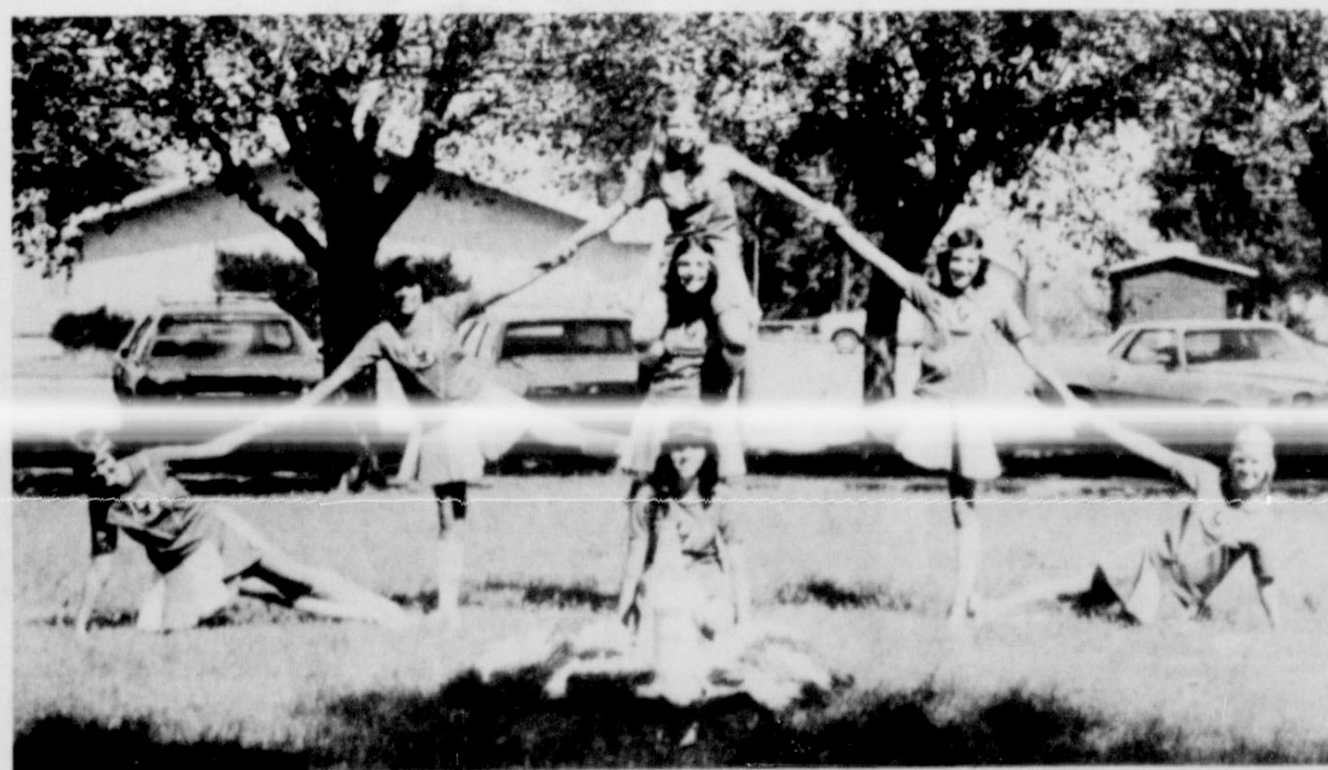
special education-7. Elementary total-545.

The funnel, which was about 1/2 mile in diameter, left an official .39 inch of moisture in the city Tuesday afternoon. The total will be reflected in September rainfall figures, since readings are made at 8 a.m. each day, although it fell on the last day of August.

# Friona Flashbacks

### 45 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 4, 1931

The tonsil and adenoid clinic held under the auspices of the Parmer County health association this past week was a tremendous success. Dr. R.R. Wills operated on 23 children during the two-day clinic, originally scheduled for one day but extended by the good response.

### 40 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 4, 1936

A WPA project has been accepted for straightening, broadening and deepening that part of the channel of Frio Draw which passes through or just south of the city limits. Surveyors have been busy on the project for several days and the actual work of moving dirt will begin in the near future.

A two-weeks singing school closed Saturday night August 31 at Rhea. An average of 40 persons attended the school.

### 35 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 5, 1941

The 1941-42 term of the Friona Independent School opened in earnest Monday, when a large enrollment of both grade and high school students arrived at the buildings and got down to the work of the term. Superintendent of Schools W.L. Edelman seemed mighty well pleased with the enrollment and the spirit of both the teachers and the students. A total of 170 students were enrolled in high school. (Editor's note: Total enrollment was unavailable).

### 30 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 30, 1946

A local building boom finds several new residences under construction, with others having been just recently completed. Among those in the process of finishing new homes are Euel White, H.C. Davis, H.H. Lloyd, J.H. Hinds, Guy Latta, W.C. Osborn and Milton Blalock.

The Parmer County Hospital Board has secured the administration building from the Prisoner of War Camp at Hereford as a temporary home, it was announced this week. The building is to be moved to the hospital grounds as soon as possible.

### 25 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 30, 1951

Twenty-three boys have signed up for football this year, and Coach Raymond Cook says he anticipates a good year, as nine of the players are

seniors with three years experience. The seniors returning are Max Cruse, Max Wells, Doyce Barnett, Walter Haws, Ross Miller, Frankie Allen, Frank Reed and Jay Cobb. Juniors are Ben Jordan, Arnold Fangman, Darrell Robbins and D.O. Robason.

### 20 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 30, 1956

In a slight deviation from the way most of the Panhandle counties went in the gubernatorial race, U.S. Senator Price Daniel rolled over his opponent, Ralph Yarborough, 1036-627 in Parmer County in the Democratic primary runoff Saturday. On the local scene, E.G. Phipps captured the office of county commissioner, and will represent Precinct One for the next four years. He won over E.R. Day by a tally of 471 to 348.

### 15 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 31, 1961

Joe Coronado was hired and began work this week as golf pro at Friona Country Club.

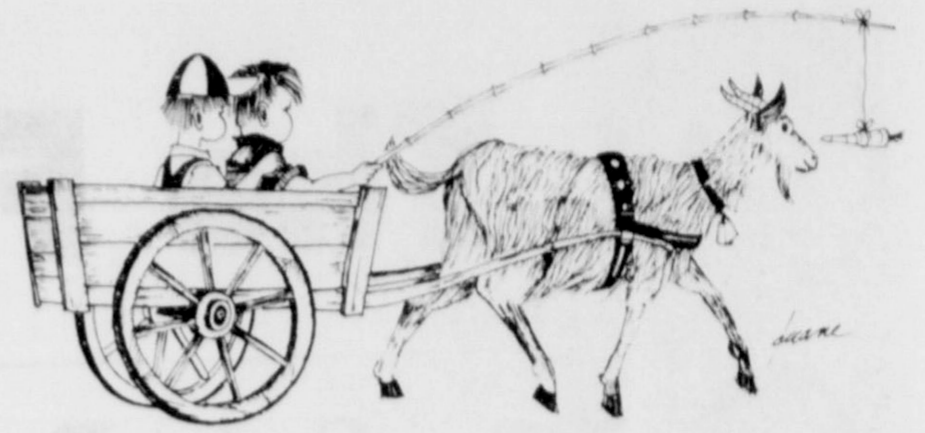
### 10 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 1, 1966

### 5 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 2, 1971

Parmer County scholastics totaled 3,137 at the beginning of this week. The figure was probably a record for the beginning of school, as two schools indicated all-time records.

Friona led the way, with 47 per cent of the total. Enrollment in Friona schools stood at 1490 on Monday. This was up 42 from the first-day total and an increase of 45 from the same date a year ago. The Farwell school system showed 675 scholastics, up slightly from a year ago, according to Superintendent W.M. Roberts. Bovina's enrollment on Monday stood at 662, also up slightly from a year ago. The total enrollment at Lazbuddie amounted to 310 students.

The Coopers, who lived down the road from us, raised goats. They had a sizable herd from which they got milk and meat and a small income from selling some of the animals at market.

They had one goat named "Yancy" and he was sorta special to them. He had become an orphan soon after birth and the Cooper youngsters had raised him on a baby bottle. He was more like a pet than a farm animal and could often be seen playing with the dogs and cats. He had been trained to pull a small cart, if encouraged with a carrot in front of his nose. He was the first one to greet company and did so by planting both front hooves on the side of their car, peering inside as if to ask, "What did you bring me?"

Yancy was not without his faults however and it was best you didn't take your eye off him when he was near because he was apt to practice his butting at any time. Most people liked him well enough except for one neighbor lady. She didn't like goats — period! She said they had the face and features of the devil as well as his temperament and they smelled bad and shouldn't be turned out around humans.

She would shake her finger at poor Yancy anytime he got close to her.

As she went into the outhouse one time the goat was doing! planted his body down in front of the door, refusing to get up when she was ready to come out. 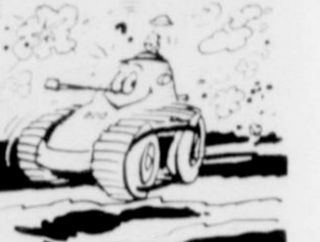

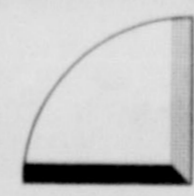

### On The Farm In Parmer County

Windbreak seedling applications are now available in my office. These trees are costing \$10 per hundred this year. Orders need to be filled as soon as possible in order to obtain some of the popular species. Order forms are also available at the SCS office in Friona.

It's field day time again! The 67th Annual TAES Field Day will be at Halfway, September 14, from 1-5 p.m. Crop demonstrations, weed control research, and machinery displays are only a few of the many activities featured this year. Watch for further details.

The rancher or farmer who pays \$2 a pound for a T-bone steak in the supermarket probably can't understand why he only got about 30 cents a pound for his calf. The reason for this is the number of processing steps the animal goes through before reaching the supermarket.

First, the animal had to go to a feedlot where he was fed to obtain the grade and weight desired by most retailers. As a 1,000-pound steer, he was probably sold for about \$400. A packer purchased him and found he yielded only a 620-pound carcass. The price for the carcass then was at least 64.5 cents a pound.

The retailer buying the carcass must then cut and package it for the consumer. Cutting loss along with bone, fat and some moisture are lost during this process so that only about 440 pounds of meat are left for retailing. The cost goes up rapidly to about 91 cents a pound.

When the other costs of slaughtering, labor, transportation, advertising and

packaging costs are added, the price goes up to about \$1.40 per pound.

Of course, the \$1.40 retail price is an average for all cuts of meat of a steer. Since the 440 pounds of meat included only about 16 pounds of T-bone steak, it must naturally bring a higher price than the cheaper and more abundant cuts.

So, the next time you look in shock at the price of a T-bone steak, think of all the steps and people involved in transforming that 1,000-pound live steer into a neatly packaged piece of meat available at the grocery store.

#### SCS REPORT

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is very interested in the developing of conservation and environmental education in our schools in the county.

The first step was taken this past week when Herb Evans of the SCS, Friona talked to a teacher's workshop for Friona teachers. Some of the things covered by Evans were:

1. The large amount of printed material available to teachers for planning and teaching conservation education.

2. The availability of materials for student use.

3. Demonstrations that are available for classroom use.

4. The majority of time was spent talking about outdoor classrooms, their planning, construction, and use.

This material and talk is available to all the school systems in the county upon request, Evans stated.

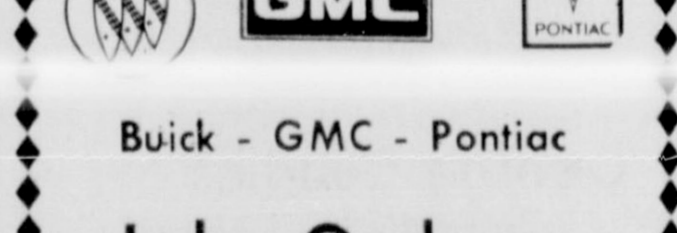

**Library Report**

"The Night Will End," memoirs of a revolutionary by Henri Frenay is available at Friona Public Library.

The first appearance in English of the French best seller adds astounding revelations to the traditional knowledge of World War Two.

It places the last thirty years of European politics in a new perspective and tells for the first time the whole truth about occupied France and the Resistance.

Frenay organized and led the grass-roots people's revolt known as Combat against the Vichy government and the Nazis—and became the man most wanted by the Gestapo. No other witness of the Occupation and his vantage point to observe the triumphs, disasters, and intrigues described in his book.

"Fighting Ships of World War II," is a summary of the war by J.N. Westwood. The story is written at sea and a record of almost all the major vessels involved in it.

Presenting these celebrated fighting ships and detailing both their war-time careers and their design features. In addition it describes the evolution between the wars of the various ship types; how their designers sought to make compromises to satisfy the requirements of fighting qualities, sea-going capability, expense and those of the different naval treaties.

The work of the author can only take second place to that of that anonymous band of men who served during the war as naval photographers. Thanks to their competence, it was possible to illustrate this book with a superb array of pictures.

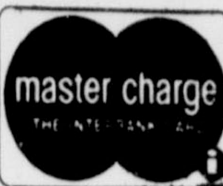

Friona's Chieftains traveled to Floydada Friday night, for the team's opening game of the 1976 season against the always-tough Whirlwinds.

On the eve of the season opener, new FHS gridmaster, Lonnie Phillips, was optimistic about his team's chances.

"We're hoping for a real good game. The kids are looking for a good game. They believe in themselves, and we definitely believe in them," Phillips said.

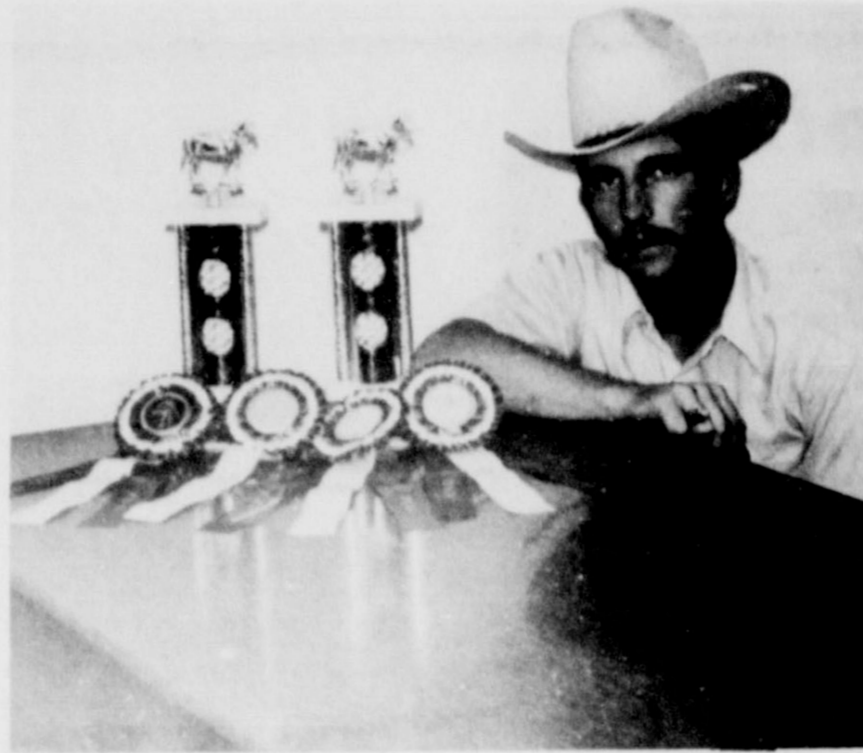

## County Has Seven Wrecks In July

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of July, 1976 according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1976 shows a total of 68 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 39 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1976 shows a total of

20 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 388 injured, as compared to July, 1975 with 568 accidents resulting in 11 persons killed and 398 persons injured. This was 24 more accidents, the same number killed, and ten less injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

The 22 traffic deaths for the month of July, 1976, occurred in the following counties: three each in Archer, Wise, Dallam; two each in Foard, Wichita, Lubbock; one each in Hale, Young, Deaf Smith, Hall, Moore, Sherman and Wheeler.
