Farmers Helping REC With Cutdown Practice

'The increasing demand being placed on our system due to summer irrigation is a threat to the loading capacity of the Cooperative, and we need to know if there is a feasible method of controlling a part of this load in the future without hurting our irrigation farmer," stated James Hull, General Manager of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.

Although the problem is not yet critical, steps are being taken to prepare for the future. A load management experiment is now being conducted by the Cooperative, along with the voluntary cooperation of several farmers who irrigate with pivot sprinklers.

This experiment is being con ducted out of one of the Cooperative's sub-stations located northwest of Hereford. It involves 14 center pivot sprinkler systems amounting to 730 HP. Each volunteer participant has his system

assigned to one of two operating schedules. During the hours between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. of every alternating day, he has agreed to turn his system off. This arrangement will allow the Cooperative to shave approximately 300 HP off of its peak capacity demands. This lowering of peak loading will not only save money, which will be returned to the participating farmers, but it will also provide more capacity to the Cooperative during peak-use hours. This will also allow the Cooperative to take steps toward fulfilling the request of its power supplier to decrease its load

growth each year. Pivot sprinkler systems were selected as being one of the few loads which could be controlled the most economically for both the Cooperative and the farmer. It is also the only form of irrigation which could feasibly be controlled

with the least amount of inconvenience and without damage to crops. Although the immediate benefits from this arrangement will be small, it will offer valuable data and information for analyzing the feasibility of incorporating a load management program into the entire service area in the future: "A full scale program of this type," commented Hull, "Could help in future years to insure the availability of electric energy for future growth."



THE ESS NARALE ESS NAR No sooner had head smut been discovered in the local corn crop than the considerable expertise of Pioneer Hi-Bred research arrived to assess the situation. Six of the forty-man Pioneer corn research team rushed to examine corn fields throughout the affected area. Together with the agronomy service personnel out of Southwestern Division headquarters at Plainview and

the Division's district sales managers, they have formulated recommendations for corn farmers in this area.

THE FIRST JOB IS TO IDENTIFY THE ENEMY

There are two kinds of smut in the corn fields of Parmer, Castro, Deaf Smith, Bailey, Lamb and Hale counties: common smut and head smut. Common smut has little, if any, economic significance. Head smut is the real culprit. Estimates are that it will reduce the yields of some fields by over 20%.

Common smut (Ustilago maydis), sometimes called boil smut, is repulsive but does not usually reduce yields. It is characterized by galls, bulbous growths which are at first covered with a glistening, greenishmay appear on any part of the corn

plant including the exposed tips of healthy ears protruding beyond shuck. The plant becories host to wind or water born sporidia which stimulate cells in young tissue to proliferate.

Head smut (Sphacelotheca reiliana) is systemic, the plant being infected by soil-born teliospores A in the seedling stage. The outward signs of the, disease are less conspicuous than common smut. It first appears when ears and tassels are formed. Tassels of infected plants usually appear to be covered with a reddish-brown or

black, spiny rust. Silkless shucks look as if they might cover a short, fat ear of corn but opening the shuck exposes a mass of black, worm-like teliospores or a tangle of bright green, leafy buds.





Lockney Bops Chieftains By 20-0

For the second week in a row, the Friona Chieftains reviewed a lesson they should be familiar with: you don't make mistakes against a good team and win.

Lockney was the opponent in the opening home game of the 1976 season. The Longhorns exhibited a big, solid team that was just as tough on defense as they were on offense. The 'Horns held Friona to just 40 net yards for the night, the lowest total offense by a Friona team in several years.

The Chiefs made an early mistake, giving Lockney a quick 6-0 lead, and got themselves into a hole they never could get out of.

On the team's first possession, Friona faced fourth down and three from their own 43. The Chiefs attempted to punt, but the snap from center was bad, and Edward Castillo couldn't control it. Lockney recovered on the Friona 29.

It took the fired-up Longhorns just four plays to score, with quarterback Glen Lane going the final yard. A pass for two points fell incomplete, and the visitors were out front, 6-0 with just 4:26 gone in the opening period.

The Chiefs survived a second mistake, when Kelwin King fumbled the ball to Lockney on the third play following the kickoff.

Lockney had a first and goal on the Friona eight, but the 'Horns were caught clipping and set back to the Friona 25. Lockney had to go to the air, and could not complete a pass, and Friona survived this threat.

The only thing Friona had to cheer about in the first quarter was a pass completion, to a guard, of all people. Todd Bandy lofted a pass that was deflected by Lockney, right to Mitchell Smiley, who rambled 18 yards before being stopped. It was one of only four first downs for Friona in the game.

Aided by some timely penalties against the Longhorns, the Chiefs

were able to play on even terms with Lockney for most of the second quarter. But before it was over, the 'Horns cashed in on one more break. Friona had the ball at midfield.

thanks to a roughness penalty on Lockney, when Bandy was hit and the Longhorns recovered the ball at their own 49.

Seven plays later, Lockney was on the scoreboard again. Halfback Gerado Rodriquez (No. 21) got the score on a seven-yard run. A running try for points failed, but Lockney had a 12-0 lead, which turned out to be the halftime score.

Once more before halftime, Lockney got the ball following a high punt near midfield, and marched to Friona's 13-yard line before stalling. The home fans felt relieved to be

trailing by only 12-0 at the half. In fact, Friona was very much in the game, after a lack-lustre third quarter, when on the next-to-last play of the quarter the Chiefs recovered a Lockney fumble at the

Longhorn 25. On the second play of the final quarter, a pass interference penalty against the visitors gave Friona a first down at the Lockney 12. But Friona could not capitalize. Two penalties set the Chiefs back, and then Kevin Kothmann's pass was picked off by Lockney at the ten to end Friona's only serious scoring threat of the game.

Ram Randolph recovered a Lockney fumble at the 50-yard line midway through the final quarter with the score still 12-0. Lockney got its sixth 15-yard penalty of the game (the Longhorns were penalized 130 yards during the contest), and Friona moved to a first down at the 'Horn 33-yard line.

But a Kothmann-Glen London pitchout lost two yards, and on third down, Kothmann was intercepted again. Earl Mathis swiped the pass at the Lockney 25 and ran it all the way to the Friona four-71 yards. On the next play, Clint Riddley scored for the Longhorns, and put the frosting on the cake. He also ran for two points and the final margin of 20-0.

The 40 yards total offense are the least by a Friona team in the past 15 years. Closest to this mark was a net of 58 yards by Friona in a 24-8 loss to Floydada in 1969.

The four first downs also were a team low mark, the fewest for any game in at least the past ten years and making matters worse was the fact that two of the first downs came by penalty, so the team gained only two under their own steam.

"We feel we've made progress offensively and defensively. We believe the boys can do it and they still believe they can. It's just a matter of getting it all together at

the same time. Hopefully we can do it Friday night."

"We will have to re-group our defense. Lockney had a good team defensively and we were very slow at hitting the holes. We also had trouble reading the defense last week."

"We felt encouraged about our defense. They made fewer mistakes than they did against Floydada," concluded Coach Phillips.

12 Accidents Investigated In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of August, 1976 according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1976 shows a total of 80 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 45 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August 1976, shows a total of 566 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 319 injured, as compared to August 1975, with 596 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 292 persons injured. This was 30 less accidents, the same number killed, and 27 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time

The 16 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1976, occurred in the following counties: three each in Parker, Hansford; two each in Donley, Motley; one each in Deaf Smith, Foard, Lubbock, Lynn, Montague and Palo Pinto.

Since 1975, members of the Dallas Police Department have been living with the boys at the camp and helping with various activities. "The program's intent is to give the campers a better rapport with police officers," according to Jake Outland, local Service Unit Chairman.

The program met with so much success and enthusiasm by the campers and Dallas Police, that officers were at Camp Hoblitzelle for 11 camping sessions in 1976, an increase over 1975 figures.



JUDGE HAMLIN

Parmer Co. Judge **Is Book Subject**

"The Flamboyant Judge" is hardly a fitting description of James D. Hamlin, the subject of a book by that name. But then it's hard to come by a fitting description of this man who came to Amarillo in 1897 and crammed the next 53 years with law, academics, business and an insatiable zest for living.

The book's subtitle is "The story of Amarillo and the development of the great ranches of Texas Panhandle." That, too, is insufficient; for Hamlin's memoirs--as edited by J. Evetts Haley and W. Curry Holden--are filled with detail that reaches out to Old Mexico, New Mexico and Arizona, to Austin and New York, Chicago, St. Louis and St. Matthews, Kentucky.

Judge Hamlin had the scholarly background to teach Latin and

Greek and serve as the first president of Amarillo College. He had the business acumen to serve as president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He was a lawyer and judge of Parmer County. He was a founder of Farwell, Texas, and Texico, N.M. He represented the Farwell Brothers of Chicago, owners of the three million acre XIT Ranch, when they were disposing of their Capitol Reservation Lands.

With all of that, an old-timer, Duke Dietz, who eventually settled near San Angelo, reminded Hamlin once of the time the judge won two fights in the same day at the Big Four Saloon in Texico.

Haley and Holden had the foresight to persuade Hamlin to dictate more than 200 pages of memories and also to make tapes of

his recollections before he died in 1950.

The book is a 300-page compilation of those memories. The official publication date was January 21. The book was launched Sunday with a public autographing party at The Museum of Texas Tech University. The sponsor was the West Texas Museum Association.

In addition to the authors, honored guests included Mr. and Mrs. Hamlin Y. Overstreet of Farwell. Overstreet is now the lone representative of the XIT and Farwell interests on the South Plains. He is a nephew of the late Judge Hamlin.

There were autographing parties honoring Haley and Holden in Amarillo and Santa Fe, N.M., on succeeding weekends. Judge Hamlin spent many of his later years in Santa Fe.

Palo Duro Press of Canyon is the publisher of two handsome editions of this volume. Carl Hertzog and Ed David are responsible for the typography and the design of the book. A limited edition epitomizes the judge, combining cowhide with sculpture with its leather spine and a bronze medallion of Hamlin. The medallion also is stamped in gold on the linen cover of the regular edition. It was executed by Glenna Goodacre of Lubbock.

Both Haley and Holden are widely known historian and authors. Haley is the author of "The XIT Ranch of Texas," "Charles Goodnight, Cowman and Plainsman," "George W. Littlefield, Texas," "Jeff Milton, a Good Man With A Gun," "Fort Concho and the Texas Frontier" and "A Texan Looks at Lyndon

Johnson." He is a former member of the Texas Tech University Board of Regents.

Dr. Holden, professor emeritus of history at Texas Tech University is the author of "Alkali Trails," "Rollie Burns," "Spur Ranch," "Studies of the Yaqui Indians," "Hill of the Rooster," "The Esquela Land and Cattle Company" and "The Tall Candle." Holden also is a former dean of the Graduate School at Texas Tech, founder and first director of The Museum of Texas Tech University, and is co-chairman of the Ranch Headquarters Planning Committee for the authentic, outdoor museum of ranching history at the university. Haley had had a long interest in

the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society which Hamlin headed for many years, and both Haley and Holden knew Judge Hamlin well. Perhaps the most notable feature

of "The Flamboyant Judge," in addition to Hamlin's remarkable memory, is the judge's ability to be candid about himself and those he knew with an unusual generosity of spirit which prevented any censure of those whose lives touched his. The people he speaks of are warmly human, whether he is talking about the affluent and influential Farwells or about Ella Hill who operated a dance hall with exemplary integrity. The book covers the detail of business enterprises, feuds, and

friendships as well as the progress of land utilization from ranching to farming and community building. The authors describe Judge Hamlin as a striking and unforget-

Throughout the book, however, Judge Hamlin appears as the most modest of all the people who thread their way through his memory. He reports his own foibles almost with enjoyment.

He readily admits that he lacked the foresight to predict Amarillo's growth. And who, but a modest man, would recall for all the world to know that, in proposing to a Miss Blanche, he inadvertently called his intended by the name of her friend,

It was this, perhaps, that caused Hamlin to marry late in life a Miss Kate Nichols who, with her husband, collected English silver and enjoyed the fine works of art he acquired and gave later to the Panhandle-Plains Museum of Canyon.

Much of the history of the Panhandle of Texas and the plains of West Texas and eastern New Mexico is entwined in the memories of Judge James D. Hamlin, and no history of the area can be complete without the detail of his recollections.

Caprice, Impala To Offer New Styles

The 1977 Chevrolet debuts as an all-new, full-size car for America, more closely tuned to changing consumer life-styles and matched with the nation's goals of conserving fuel and natural resources.

The '77 Chevies will go on display at Friona's third annual Auto Show Friday, October 1 at Friona Community Center.

The completely redesigned Caprice and Impala models offer crisp new styling with a long list of design and engineering improvements. The . new Chevrolets boast more fuel efficiency and safety effectiveness while being 11 inches shorter and almost 700 pounds lighter than their



predecessors.

The new models have more room inside despite the smaller exterior size. This includes more rear legroom and more front and rear headroom along with added usable storage space in the trunk.

Matching the trim new dimensions, additional operating efficiency and fuel economy is made possible by the addition of a 4.1 litre (250-cubic inch), six-cylinder engine and a smaller displacement 5 litre (305-cubic inch) base V8. The six-cylinder engine is the standard power plant for sedans and coupes while the 5.7 litre (350-cubic inch) V8 becomes the top optional engine. All are used in conjunction with the automatic Turbo Hydra-matic transmission.

Ride and handling characteristics parallel the dramatic advances in weight reduction and interior accommodations.

The 1977 Chevrolet is being offered



in two series--the top-of-the-line Caprice and the ever-popular Impala. Two-door coupes, four-door sedans and four-door two- and three-seat station wagons are available in each series. The former Impala S and Landau options are discontinued.



The 1977 Chevrolet has a 116-inch wheelbase, a reduction of 5.5 inches from the 1976 Chevrolet. Its overall length is 211.9 inches (10.8 inches under the 1976 Chevrolet). 

The Longhorns were finally able to put together a drive early in the fourth quarter which resulted in their only touchdown of the game. A two point conversion try was





# **Chiefs Look Better, But Wolves Win 21-0**

The Friona Chieftains may have cornered an angry wolf last Friday night as they got their heels nipped 20-0.

The Chiefs made fewer errors than they have this season, but they just couldn't seem to move the ball inside the twenty.

"We were extremely disappointed," said head coach Lonnie Phillips. "We played much better ball than the score indicated."

"We haven't given up, though." he added. "The kids are learning and improving with every game. We made a few mental mistakes that hurt, but these teams we've played are very tough....there's not anyone in our district that's any tougher.' The Chieftains have spent the week working on their passing attack and trying to eliminate the mental mistakes.

"Not many people realize," said Phillips, "that these kids have had three different offensive systems and three different defensive systems in three years. They are improving with every game and eliminating more mistakes each time out."

Friona won the toss and chose to receive. Following the kickoff, they took over on their own 10 yard line. On the third play of the game, Glen London broke around the left end for a 13 yard gain which looked promising for the Friona team.

London carried the ball two more times for two, and then five yards, but an untimely illegal procedure penalty set the Chiefs back.

London ran for eleven more yards in the next two plays, but it was not enough for the Chieftains to punt.

Dalhart was only able to make one first down as the Chieftain defense held, forcing the Wolves to hand the ball back.

Friona's second chance with the ball faired little better than the first time around as the offense could not quite get it moving. Dalhart's offense stood tough, holding Kelwin King to three yards in three carries, and then putting a strong rush on Edward Castillo as he dropped back to punt. Castillo punted on the run as he scrambled in the end zone, to Friona's 39 yard line where the Wolves took over.

·Dalhart's first play of the series was a 39 yard pass from quarterback Jeff King to wingback Forrest Lloyd for the TD. Bo Ramirez made the PAT good and Dalhart led 7-0.

Friona took over after the kick-off on their own 27, but could not get their momentum as the Wolves again forced them to punt. Castillo's 47 yard kick gave the Wolves the ball on their own 22.

They were not able to move against the Chiefs solid defense and Friona again had the ball.

On the first play of the series, Friona fans had something to yell about as Kelwin King broke loose for an excellent exhibition of broken field running, gaining 19 yards on his little romp.

#### It was all in vain, though, when the next play was fumbled and Dalhart recovered.

Friona's defense wouldn't give up as Terry Wilcox forced an incompletion on a Wolf pass as he rallied the Dalhart receiver hard. With third and 10, the Chiefs blitzed the guarterback for a three yard loss, forcing them to kick.

Friona took over, but still could not mount a sustained drive so Castillo boomed a 60 yarder down to the Wolves' 14

The defense once more fired up and threw the Wolves for a 10 yard loss on a third and seven play. They then blocked the punt on the following play, giving the ball to the offense on Dalhart's five. The offense stopped short, though, as Kevin Kothmann's pass fell incomplete on fourth and goal.

The Wolves took over, but fumbled the ball right back to the Chiefs, who hung onto it until time ran out in the first half with the score 7-0 in favor of Dalhart.

The Chieftains tried to re-group during halftime. The defense came out for the second half and held the Wolves on their first possession, forcing them to punt.

The offense then decided to move the ball and drove to the Dalhart 20, where they were finally stopped. An attempted field goal was broken up as the snap from center went over kicker Edward Castillo's head and Dalhart recovered the ball on their own 33.

On third down Jeff King threw to one of his backs for a 45 yard touchdown run. The point after

attempt was off to the left, making the score 13-0.

The Chieftains controlled the ball once again, and just before the third quarter closed, King broke loose on an excellent run that netted him 59 yards and put the Chiefs on the Dalhart 10 yard line. They aren't able to score in four plays, and the Wolves had the ball on their own nine

Dalhart's final score of the game came late in the fourth quarter with a first and ten from their own 28. Kenney Howell received a quick pass and trotted for 63 yards to the Friona nine.

Dalhart took the ball in on another pass to Howell and made the two point conversion good. Friona moved the ball very

strongly on their last possession, but it was too late as time ran out on them with the ball on the Wolf 12. Friona had 11 first downs -- to Dalhart's 10 and was only 64 yards behind the Wolves on total offense.

"The kids are learning fast. We still believe we can do it. I have faith in the kids and faith in the fans keeping up their support in us,' Phillips concluded.





The teams host Hart in games here next Thursday evening.




DECKED .... Dalhart's quarterback is decked in the second quarter of Friday's game by Chieftain Chris

**OSHA Regulations** A Bit "Far Out"

(Editor's note: Those familiar with OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) are familiar with some of the ridiculous erules and regulations that have been made for businesses to adhere to. The following was written as a sletter by John A. Matthews, an Albany, Texas, rancher, to Ed Wishcamper, editor of the Abilene Reporter-News. We thought that Star readers would enjoy it.)

Dear Ed:


. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration, under the United States Department of Labor, is in the process of writing regulations whereby people working on farms and ranches must have toilet facilities within a five minute walk of where they are working.

I feel an average sized person can walk about one-third of a mile in five minutes. He might do better if he was in a hurry. This means that on a 30-section ranch, you would have to build 120 flush toilets complete with septic tank and water storage. They will also require proper toilet paper holders and locks on the doors to insure privacy

Also, I think it would be necessary, on the ranches covered with brush, to erect a tall flag pole at the toilet site so the worker could zero in on his objective. Otherwise, he might get lost and you could be fined for non-compliance.

Beyond the fact that all of this will cost one big pot of money--no pun intended--I am worried about some other aspects. It seems to me that this is going to discriminate against short-legged people who can't walk a third of a mile in five minutes. Will the foreman have to work the short-legged man one minute closer to the toilet, or will it be necessary to have a walking demonstration before you hire a new worker so you can gauge just how far from the toilet he can work?

I can see further complications in that sometimes some of the crew may drink some gyp water and come up with a case of the "Green Apple Two-Step." Then you would have to work them only a one or two minute walk away from the toilet or be in danger of non-compliance, if Government Agency, OSHA Recommends **Restrooms In The Fields For Farmers** 



you had them three minutes away and they didn't make it.

This is going to take some careful planning before you start a crew to work every morning. You will have to ask one just what shape his innards are in before assigning jobs for the day, and you may never have a day when they will all be five minute men and can work in a group.

I thought at first that a person might get around the whole idea by designing a "Handy Dandy Quick Relief Portable Toilet" that each man could carry, but that wouldn't work since OSHA's whole idea is to have the men use flush toilets -- even the ones that don't know how to use \*\*\*\*\*

OSHA stands for safety and health. I am unable to see where making it mandatory to have millions of toilets scattered over the range is going to increase safety, so they must be aiming at the health aspect. When they get all these cowboys and farmhands "pottytrained," which will be no small undertaking, I guess they will start on my cows. Did you ever try to train a cow to walk anywhere to go to the bathroom?



# **Active Career In Music Is Reviewed**

How many people do you know who can claim to have played the organ for over 3,000 church services, played for 600 weddings and funerals and taught close to 2,000 young people to either sing or play the piano. If you live in Friona, you probably know one person who has accomplished this amazing task and her name is Eva Miller.

Mrs. Roy Miller is a real musical ball of energy and a very organized person to have been able to do all of this in the thirty years that she and her husband have made their home in Friona.

The Millers moved to Friona in 1945 and Mrs. Miller started playing for the First Baptist Church services the following year. It had been fourteen years since she had played a piano, but she says it was not difficult to pick it up again.

Shortly after that, she began teaching two or three students each year. By 1954 the number of plano students she was teaching had grown to fifteen. In later years, she has had as many as 50 pupils a year in voice, plano and organ.

In 1956 Eva started her wellknown group of singing girls called the "Trebelaires." The original group grew out of three smaller groups she had organized earlier known as the "Blue Notes" the "Loreleis" and the "Millerettes."

The Trebelaires caught on at once and began to entertain all over the Panhandle of Texas at various programs, meetings and conventions. The group was especially popular with the USO in Amarillo during the war years when the girls entertained there often. They held an annual Christmas program at the USO until it closed a few years back.

Mrs. Miller has received a ten-year service pin from the USO for her work with that organization. At one time the USO wanted Eva's Trebelaires to go on a tour to entertain the troops, but the girls were all minors in age and so were unable to oblige.

Christmas has always been a busy season for Eva and the girls. They held an annual Christmas program on KGNC-TV until that station sold out a few years ago. Currently, they still do a program in the Mall at Western Plaza in Amarillo each

year during the Christmas season and they perform on Christmas programs for clubs, schools, churches and banquets throughout the area.

In the early years, the number of Trebelaires varied from 12 to 15. But then, as the group became popular and more in demand, transportation began to be a problem. Eva now keeps her group to nine or ten girls each year.

The Trebelaires were written up in the REA magazine in 1967 and in the Panhandle Press magazine in 1968. Eva has received letters of appreciation from such well-known persons as Mrs. Oma Link Rowley of Amarillo, Congressman Bob Price and Chester O'Brian, for her work with these girls.

In addition to her work with this musical group, Eva has worked with Friona's Maize Queen Contest every year. She was chairman for three years back in the fifties and still helps the girls with their talent and accompanies them when they need her.

Eva has taught a Sunday School Class at Friona's First Baptist Church for many years and has also been active in the church's Women's Missionary work. She is a member of Modern Study Club, the National Federation of Musicians Club, and has received "Honor Roll" status in the National Guild of Piano Teachers.

Eva was chosen Friona's first "Woman of the Year" by the local Chamber of Commerce back in 1959, which was the first time this award had been given.

In 1962 the members of Friona's Progressive Study Club voted her their "Mother of the Year" and worked up a scrapbook to enter for her in the district race for that honor. The following year, 1963, she took the title of Caprock District "Mother of the Year" over all the federated women's clubs in this area.

In addition to these honors: Eva has a scrapbook filled with certificates of honor from such groups as Kiwanis, Boys Ranch, FHA, Lions Club, Kings Manor Nursing Home, and in 1967 she received a citation as an "Outstanding Civic Leader of America."

In the midst of all this flurry of activities, Eva and Roy have managed to raise a fine family. The Millers had seven children, starting with Roy V. who is now in Vernon, Texas. The Ross Miller family resides in Friona where he is engaged in farming. Another son, Johnny, was accidentally drowned at age 16 while trying to rescue a friend. The Miller girls are Mrs. Dale Glass (Mary Lou) of McLean, Mrs. Sam Mears (Donna) of Friona, Mrs. Clyde Tims (Linda) of Stratford and Jan Miller of Los Alamos, New Mexico. Eva says she's "mighty proud of

those kids" and thinks they've all turned out rather well. "We have a doctor, a farmer, a teacher, a scientist and an artist in our group," says the proud mother. It goes without saying, that after raising a family of that size, that Mrs. Miller would be an accomplished cook. In fact, at the time of this interview, she was busy stirring up spaghetti sauce for the local Lions Club which was to meet later that evening.

She also managed to find time to be a seamstress for her four girls when they were growing up.

"We sure couldn't afford to dress four growing girls in those days without doing some sewing at home," Mrs. Miller recalls.

In 1970 a reception was held for the Millers at the Johnny Mars home. This was on the occasion of the Millers fortieth wedding anniversary and was attended by just about everybody in Friona.

Then the following year "Eva Miller Day" was held at the First Baptist Church, honoring her for her 25 years of piano and organ playing for the church. The program was done in the style of the "This Is Your Life" radio and TV show.

The Millers, who are now the proud grandparents of 19 grandchildren, will have been married **4**7 years next March.

Would you believe that in addition to everything else Eva Miller does, that she has time for a few hobbies? She enjoys flower gardening, needlework and antiques. Most of her antiques are items that have been in her family for several generations.

Perhaps her favorite antique is a walnut desk which her grandfather made by hand from a tree which he cut down himself. She is also proud of a small camel-back trunk which belonged to her mother.

There are many other antique items throughout the Millers' country home such as picture frames, washstands, cut glass, and a large round dining table. Eva enjoys showing people through the home, pointing out each item and giving a little of the history behind it.

In addition to the farm home, the Millers maintain a home in town for convenience. It makes it easier for Eva to hold music lessons, Trebelaire meetings, and conduct her many other activities from in-town without having to drive in

The Insurance Company believes volunteer fire departments have contributed to reduce the amount of loss involved by fire and more important, to prevent fires.



# **County Resident Races Greyhounds**

"I came to this country dragging a cotton sack and had three dogs with me," said James Robinson, who raises and trains racing greyhounds at Clay's Corner.

"I came here from central Texas in the early 50's," he said, "and when I was a boy there I used to run greyhounds in the fields chasing rabbits."


"When I was in my thirties I got hold of a registered dog and sold it for \$500. I thought I could make some pretty good money by raising registered dogs so I bought a couple of registered females and bred them and leased out the puppies for the racetrack," he explained.

"Robinson leased out his dogs to Cecil Austin of Florida until Austin retired two years ago, and then Robinson's daughter, Gayle, and her husband, Richard Hawkins, got into the business and moved from Muleshoe to Florida to race the dogs.

Two other daughters and their husbands, Vicki and Melvin Morris and Glenda and Darrell Jennings, live nearby and also raise and train greyhounds. The Jennings have their own kennel at Juarez where they race their dogs.

Dog racing isn't legal in the state of Texas, but Robinson prefers to run his operation in this area. "I like the climate here," he explained. "It has cold, dry winters and there is a good feed supply from the feedlots...there is a lot of cattle in this country. We buy commercial feed out of Waco mostly, but if anyone loses a dead cow, we butcher it if we can get to it fast enough."

Robinson has lost count of how many dogs he has exactly, but figures it to be over 300, with another 100 racing at the racetracks in

Florida and at Juarez. "It takes \$50 a day to feed 'em," he commented. "I guess my bill for a year's supply of dog food runs over \$15,000. It takes six or seven of us to feed the dogs each day in 30 minutes time. It would take one person over three hours."

Robinson races about 40 dogs in Florida leased to his daughter Gayle and her husband, Richard Hawkins, and races 60 dogs of his own in Juarez.

"In Florida, the competition is stiffest because it draws the biggest crowds and thus the most money,"

he said. "Juarez has a real nice racetrack, but it is such a hassel getting back across the border through customs that it discourages crowds, and we don't make as much money there. Our best dogs race in Florida because that is where you find the fastest dogs racing."

The dogs race out of three racetracks in Tampa, Orlando, and Sarasota. "One kennel runs all three places for four months each," Robinson explained.

"The best dog we ever had was Scatty. He won 76 races in Florida and earned a purse of \$40,000 during that time," Robinson said. "That's not counting what he has made in stud fees....I guess that would be somewhere around \$20,000. Scatty has run out enough money that he could've paid for our house, so we always thought a lot of him," Robinson said.

Robinson's home, located on Highway 214 at the Clay's Corner intersection, was built five years ago this December and sports a life-sized statue of a greyhound in front. "James saw a statue like it at a coursing race in Abilene, Kansas, and decided he wanted one," said his wife, Sallie.

Scatty, who began racing in 1968 at Tampa, is retired now, and lives in the kennel house on the Robinson place. He is highly regarded by Robinson and his wife, who turned down three offers of \$10,000 each to purchase Scatty when he was in his prime.

Robinson's latest winner in Florida is two-year-old Hafta Hurry, which outran all the best dogs at the Sarasota track, about 600 dogs, to win the 1976 Sarasota Inaugural....a tremendous distinction which Scatty earned twice.

"The best time in Florida on a dog

is 30 seconds for a 5-16 mile track...they have to run around 40 mph to do that," Robinson said. "I like a good straight-back dog

with good straight legs front and back, a deep, wide chest with good muscles on the shoulders and good hind muscles," Robinson said, running his hand along Scatty's back while visiting the kennel house looking at the dogs. Most of the dogs are kept in long runs behind the house, but the dogs training for the racetrack and those just returning are kept in the kennel house, and are turned out several times a day to run in a coursing pasture after live rabbits, and some race on a nearby racetrack. Robinson has a smaller track for young dogs....about 100 yards around ... called a whirligig, which has a tape player emitting squeals like a rabbit

"When a dog is 16 or 17 months old, and if we race it and think it is good enough, we send it off to the racetrack," Robinson said. "The ones we don't think are good enough we sell for rabbit or coyote dogs....lotta people hunt coyote in this country."

"It's up to the dog to learn to want to run hard and come out of the box fast enough," Robinson said, "You just hope he comes out fast enough....it's up to him if he's gonna make that racetrack. That's why you breed the fastest ones you can get."

"The one thing you can do is to get a dog to try hard," Robinson explained of his dog training. "They're not like a horse....you can't use a whip on them. I like for them to come out of the box real fast and get the lead. If a dog doesn't have the lead at the first curve he's liable to get in "Houble" fammed up with eight



"If you get into it a little bit at a time you could grow into it like we did," he explained. We were renting land farming and seemed to get more dogs until we finally were able to quit farming and go into dog racing exclusively."





# Louisa Wilson Recalls Her Growing-Up Years

#### By JAN U. TURNER

"Family life was the important thing when I was growing up," said Mrs. Ralph (Louisa) Wilson of Friona.

"Our folks played with us. At Christmas we always got games, and the folks .... especially Papa .... taught us to be fair and honest and not to cheat ... the values that stayed with us through life were learned then.

"Out in the Rhea Community where we grew up we had no church then...once in a while a preacher preached at the schoolhouse and everybody went no matter what denomination. Mama played the organ and we'd always sing on Sundays with songbooks. On Sunday evenings she'd always read us a story from 'Hurlburt's Story of the Bible' ....those stories were real impressive for us kids growing up."

"I was born in Iowa in 1906, the ninth of 11 children," Mrs. Wilson said, adding: "My folks moved us to Rhea when I was 21/2 months old and one of my very earliest memories was climbing halfway up a windmill tower to watch the cows being sold by the XIT. They went by all day long....there wasn't any end to the cattle and the cowboys!"

"I started to school when I was six, and we had to walk about....oh, I guess it was a quarter of a mile from where we lived then. It was one of those one-room schoolhouses that taught all grades, and there weren't more than maybe 15 students in it then. 'Bout half of them were my family!" she laughed.

"I went to school at Rhea until we were in high school," she said, "And my big brother, Harold Schlenker, and I drove a makeshift schoolbus and picked up several children on the way in.'

"It's a thousand wonders we didn't freeze to death riding that bus that winter!" she said. "Half the time the windshield was out and the wind was so cold tears just streamed down our cheeks," she explained, running a finger down her cheek. "But I tell you, when it was bad weather we just didn't go ... it wasn't like it is today.

"The benches on that bus werejust boards, and it didn't have glass windows .... just canvas curtains," she further described.

Then she laughed. "I graduated from high school twice. They just had ten grades when I graduated the first time in 1923, and then the next year they added an 11th grade so I went back and graduated again." "I remember when the first schoolhouse burned in 1922 and they put up a temporary schoolhouse .... it was practically a shed then .... they replaced it with 'Big Red'," she said. "A lot of people have told me, 'I don't know how in the world your mother raised 11 children!', but in those days everybody had a job to do," she commented. "We didn't sleep till noon .... when Mama called us for breakfast we all got up...if we ate like they do today she'd never get through." 'We all had our jobs, and we were a big family: five boys and six girls," Mrs. Wilson said. "In the morning after breakfast two would wash dishes, two would fix school

lunches, and two would make up beds, so really, when we left for school, that part of the housework was done," she explained, spreading her hands.

"During canning season we were an assembly line. There were enough of us to pick vegetables and snap beans, leaving mother time to dry non-acid vegetables such as beans and corn. There were no pressure cookers then," she said, "and most of the preserving was in drying rather than canning.

'My first pressure cooker was after I was married and I thought I really had it made being able to can non-acid vegetables and meat."

"Mother had a 50-gallon barrel in the basement, and she used to put cucumber pickles in salt water brine and in the winter time she'd take out a dishpan full at a time and soak the salt water out and then she'd put the vinegar and spices in ... and us kids liked pickles.

'Papa did all his own butchering. and he'd render the lard," she added. "I remember he used to kill eight or 10 hogs in the winter and we'd have sausage .... oh, we'd have sausage by the tubful! That was the best sausage!'

'Mama'd make lye soap which we'd use for washing in a big iron kettle. We didn't use it for hands, but it was real keen to wash hair with,' she recalled

"I learned to crochet when I was eight," she said with a smile. "Mother taught me, and I'll never forget that first venture .... a crochet bag to hold crocheting. They were supposed to be white, but my hands must not have been clean because I crocheted dirt right into it .... I never could get it clean!" she chuckled.

"Mother always sewed, knitted, and crocheted, and a lot of those things reflect down through our family. We're all handy with our hands," she said, glancing toward an arts and crafts counter full of seed pictures, dough sculptures, a patchwork and dough sculpture set in a shadowbox frame, and an assortment of pine cones, macrame beads, and seed pits.

'Most of those things are projects we've done in girl scouts," she explained. "I've been in scouts 30 some years. I started when we moved here from Rhea in 1941 and our daughter, Mamie Lou (Welch), wanted to be in scouts when we moved here six miles west of Friona I got started then, and when she left for college I needed to fill my time and started scouting other people's kids. "I have worked at all levels, and several years ago I tried to quit having a scout troop and just work with leader training, but usually I'd end up with a troop," she said. "And for years....I don't know how many years .... we had a girl scout day camp every summer out here at our farm. We'd have as many as 150 kids every day for a week from morning till noon. Then when we bought this Spohn place," she indicated the neighboring land, "There were two houses on it and Ralph and I fixed it up for the scouts. One house is the kitchen and it has an old-fashioned stove in it which the Whaley's gave us that we cook on.

"Scouting has such a good program and it is a shame that all girls can't go through it. They have so many other things they want to do nowadays," she sighed.

"I guess the thing with me is that I really enjoy the kids," she smiled. "My husband, Ralph, has been very helpful with my scout work." she added. "He and I got married in 1926 and came here a couple of years later to farm because we weren't making anything farming south of Lubbock.

"He started farming for himself during the Dust Bowl Days and has

"One reason we could stay when a lot of people didn't was our milk cows," she pointed out. "Ralph and I used to milk 30 cows twice a day and we always had milk and cream and beef ... we had the whole things then. And we had chickens for eggs and fryers.

'We were pretty self sustaining in those days. A lot of experiences we went through then would be called hardships now, but when you haven't lived any other way it was just thought to be normal." 

The West Texas State University Upward Bound Program will start later than usual this year due to the lateness in funding and new changes in grant conditions.

Previously Upward Bound has begun its regularly scheduled academic year meetings around the middle of September. "Customarily, we have met with the Upward Bound students in their respective communities on an average of three times a month during the regular school year, said Jimmy Diaz, Program Director. 'The significant change this year is that we must hold our weekly meetings on Saturday mornings thus necessitating bringing the students to the WTSU campus in order to satisfy new grant conditions. We are currently in the process of putting the staff together and making the necessary arrangements for student transportation to and from their respective communities."

The program will be allotted seventy slots (students) from within a fifty mile radius of West Texas State University.

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# Mabelle Hartwell--Friona's Class Of '17

Even at 77 the traces of former beauty were still evident in the brown-eyed grey-haired lady speaking, who was Most Beautiful and "Most Everything" of the 1917 senior class of Friona.

"I was the Class of 1917!" laughed Mrs. Mabelle Hartwell merrily. It was the second graduating class

out of Friona, and if it hadn't been for the nine school children in her family....the Charles Schlenker



family....there wouldn't have been a school session at all ... five graduated from Friona, the year before, and there weren't enough children to hold school, so the local school board went to Mr. Schlenker, of Rhea, and asked him to move his large family to Friona.

Judge Hamlin gave the com-mencement address," she said, "and it embarrassed me so I didn't know what to do!'

"I was the fifth child in a family of

eleven," she explained, "And I was seven years old when we moved from Iowa to Rhea Community in 1906 on an excursion train. It took us three days and three nights with nine children and my mother, and we got in about midnight and spent the night on a siding at the Bovina train station. My father met our train the next morning and we started out for our farm after lunch and got there about 9 o'clock that night," she explained.

"We were the only people living in the area until a couple of families moved in, and we went to school for the first two years at New Mexico," Mrs. Hartwell added. "Then the men got together and built a one-room schoolhouse....we didn't have any schoolroom furniture, so they built a long bench and a long table, and we sat around the table."

"We went to school at Rhea until 1914 when my father got his first car, and then we drove to Bovina to school for one year," Mrs. Hartwell said. "The next year we rented a house in Friona and went to school there. My sister, Esther, was one of the four teachers there then."

"When I graduated, I went to school for a couple of years at Canyon and got my teacher's certificate," she said. "I taught school at Rhea for one year and found out that I didn't like it. Really, I wanted to go into nurses training instead of getting a teacher's certificate, but my parents expected it of me, so I did.

"I left teaching and went to work as deputy clerk at the county courthouse in Farwell," she continued. "I was staying at the Farwell Inn, and one day was having lunch there when Judge Hamlin came in with John T. Hartwell and introduced us. We had dinner together, and afterwards went for a drive in his Hudson Super 6," she said with a smile. "We courted for one month before we got married. 'John and his mother and aunt had bought the XIT Headquarters ranch at Bovina and were farming and running sheep," she said. "John had spent most of his life in the city, so after we married we moved to Chicago, then St. Louis, and then Kansas City, where our three children were born.'

'In 1926 he came back to farming

had a cow, a sow, and a hen could make a living'," she smlled. "That's how many people made a living during the depression and the Dust Bowl Days. They could sell butter and eggs in town to make enough money to buy the groceries they needed," she explained.

Mrs. Hartwell waved her hand across in front of her saying, "You could see those duststorms coming like a big dark cloud. I remember one came on an Easter Sunday, and it just rolled in and everything loose went before it. I wet sheets and hung them over the windows to keep dust out...it helped some, but not a great deal. Those winds were very high and sometimes they would blow for three days or more, but usually only lasted a day or two."

"The worst ones you could see in the distance and we'd start 'battening down the hatch'," she said with a chuckle at the phrase. "Most of the time during the Dust Bowl Days we lived in the old XIT ranchhouse and the dust would blow so hard and get into the house so bad you couldn't see the pattern on the carpet....it was the awfullest mess to clean up afterwards!" she exclaimed.

"People caught out in one of those storms sometimes breathed so much dust they'd get what they called dust pneumonia," she said. "I don't remember if anyone died of it .... most people stayed where they were when one of those dust storms struck.

"In the early forties it seemed like the dust storms weren't as frequent....things were better. And after irrigation in the late forties that also helped to settle the dust and keep things from blowing," she commented

"During the war years tractors and machinery were hard to get," she recalled. "I had two sons who both wanted to join the army when we heard about Pearl Harbor, but we talked them into finishing high school first. My daughter was at Tech at the time. During the late forties when my husband became sick, the boys helped with the

farming ... My husband had the first combine in Parmer County, by the way," she added. "That was back in 1921 and it was a drag type. You just hitched it on behind the tractor and pulled it," she explained. "My husband and the boys cut their own wheat and sorghum and then custom cut others," she said.

"My husband died of cancer in 1951, and when the time came I had to do something I went into nursing over here at the county hospital. I've lived right here at 721 Euclid for the last 25 years," she said.

"Back before I started nursing here the hospital was a barracks


building they had moved in, but the present hospital had been operating four or five years when I started to work here. I'm just working part time in the nursery now." she

explained. "I'd rather live in Friona than any place else," she stated. "When I go to visit my daughter in Pennsylvania I am so glad to get to Amarillo and get off that plane and feel that good Texas breeze. I like the people here, and I like the climate," she said.

"I was a country girl, and I've never been able to get the country out of me.
