FRIONA RESIDENTS have not wanted for things to do during the past week or ten days. In our 15 years or so of trying to cover the news in the Friona area, it's been about the busiest single period we can recall.

It all kicked off with the super-duper extra-special Homecoming celebration by Friona Ex-Students September 24-25. A record crowd for a Community Center banquet—in excess of 700 folks, attended the function last Saturday.

In addition, the exes attended individual class reunions throughout the day Saturday. From all reports, the Ex-Students' program was a big hit, with both the visitors from out of town, and with those local exes who worked so hard to bring it about. The First Baptist Church had a special music program last Sunday, featuring the Royalheirs. The Catholics had their annual German Sausage Dinner that same day.

The third annual Parmer County Auto Show, featuring the new 1977 model automobiles, was held at the Community Center all day Friday, as show dates for the new models coincided with Maize Days week.

Also, the Tri-State Fair was winding up in Amarillo the weekend of September 24-25, and many local residents always try to make it up for a part of the fair.

Open House Set For Prairie Acres

Open House for Prairie Acres, Friona's nursing home facility that opened August 15, will be held on Sunday, October 3, between the hours of 1:30 p.m. and 5 p.m.

A program will be held beginning at 2 p.m. at the facility. A flag-raising ceremony will begin the activities. Next will come a recognition of special guests, a history of the project, a dedication ceremony, and a graduation ceremony for the home's Nurse Aides.

Beginning at about 2:20, guided tours of the facility will be given, continuing throughout the open house.

Prairie Acres was completed earlier this year, bringing reality to

a longstanding dream by a number of local residents.

Following a series of planning sessions early in 1975, a plan was set in action to raise the estimated \$500,000 needed to construct the nursing facility.

It was decided to call a municipal bond election to raise \$350,000, and to raise the additional \$150,000 through a special fund drive. The bond election carried by a record majority, and the fund drive soon raised the needed \$150,000.

Rising construction costs caused the initial bids to exceed the bond issue amount, so that a few things were trimmed from the specifications and the project was re-submitted to bidders.

Lewellen Construction Company was successful bidder on the project. Raymond Powell of Lubbock served as architect.

A number of new concepts have been built into the facility.

But Merv Noah, administrator, says he is proudest of the experienced staff that has been collected to run the facility.

"Our LVN's came in with as much experience as you could want. They are well-trained and willing to work. We are real fortunate in this respect," Noah said.

Noah pointed out that Prairie Acres was equipped to handle all nursing procedures, including normal bed care, physical therapy

including whirlpool baths and intravenous feeding.

The administrator also had praise for the other departments at the home, including the housekeeping department. "These girls are immaculate. They are doing a super job," he said.

A ladies group is in the process of developing a ladies auxiliary for Prairie Acres.

In the home's department of activities, Noah said that all the local ministers met recently and planned activities for the residents. He complimented the local ministers and church leaders for their participation in activities at Prairie Acres. A Sunday School ministry has been started.

Sharla Bengé Is '76 Maize Queen

Sharla Bengé was crowned Friona's Maize Queen for 1976-77 in the annual Maize Queen Pageant Thursday night at Friona High School.

FHS Exes Meeting Success

Upwards of 800 ex-students and teachers of the Friona Public schools enjoyed the most ambitious Homecoming and Ex-Students Reunion ever staged at Friona last weekend.

Highlighting the weekend was the banquet Saturday night at the Community Center, attended by around 725 exes.

They came from near and they came from far. And the grads represented classes all the way from 1917 up to the 1976 graduating class.

A full program was presented at the banquet, which was catered by K-Bob's Steak House. Eugene Bandy gave the invocation. Tom Jarboe, Friona's Superintendent of Schools, gave the welcome. Ray Landrum, representing the ex-students, gave the response.

"Fashions of the Past" were presented by Teresa Ingram Buske. Accompaniment was provided by Clint Mears, Bryan Johnston, Mike Murphy and Wade Jameson.

Gaylord Maurer read a compilation of a history of the Friona schools, a sometimes serious, sometimes humorous presentation which had been written up for the occasion.

Ira Holt, who served as master of ceremonies, and also presided over the election of new Ex-Student officers.

It was decided to hold a similar reunion again in 1980, and after that to rotate the special affairs every five years.

Some of the exes attending the banquet came from as far away as California. Others came from Arizona, New Mexico, and a number of other states, as well as various points around the State of Texas.

Among those attending was Dr. Floyd Golden of Amarillo, who organized the school's first football team back in 1920. Dr. Golden also attended the Chieftains' homecoming game Friday night against Tulla.

Jeff Peak Wins Prize With A 19

Jeff Peak rode the tide of upsets to capture first place in the fourth weekly football contest sponsored by the Friona Star, with a sterling score of 19.

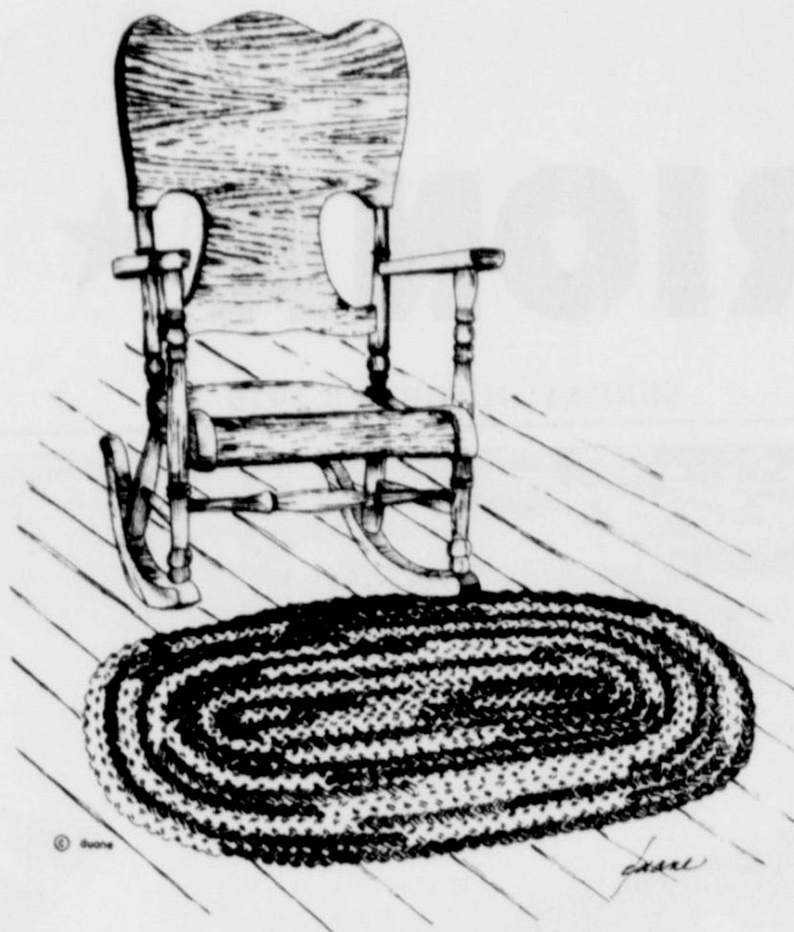
Other contestants to correctly pick 17 games were Preach Collier, Don Maynard and Jimmy Evans.

REMEMBERING...

Braided Rugs

My grandmother's home was a cozy sort of place and one thing that made it so was the many braided rugs placed throughout the house. The flooring was of rough pine lumber but the braided rugs added warmth and color.

She had a box in the bedroom that she called her "scrap box". It was usually filled with scraps of cloth taken from discarded clothing and such. People in the community often brought scraps to her and when new material was used to make clothing the pieces left over (even the smallest) were saved back and added to scrap box.

During the winter months when she wasn't able to work in her garden or yard she busied herself making rugs and things. She would select pieces of cloth from the scrap box and cut them into strips about an inch wide. The strips were folded and plaited, usually a three-strand plait, like you would braid pigtails, though some rug makers used as many as seven strands. The plaits were coiled around and around and sewn together with needle and thread. Most of the rugs were made oval but some were round. The finished rug was mingled with many colors and was made well enough to last for years and years.

The largest rug she ever made was in her living room in front of the wood stove. It measured about eight feet across with every color in it you could imagine but most of the rugs were about 2'x3'.

She never sold a rug though she made many in her lifetime. Those she didn't need for her house were given to friends in the community. She especially liked to give them for wedding presents. She would say with a grin, "Those kids are going to need something to keep their feet warm on cold winter nights."

45 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 2, 1931

40 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 2, 1936

The duties of his office will require him to live at Farwell, so they have found a suitable place to live in the county seat.

35 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 2, 1941

Announcement was made this week that the Lions Club will sponsor a Boy Scout and troop and a Cub Scout pack in Friona. An organizing committee, composed of Tiny Magnus, Pete Buske, R.J. McReynolds, Glenn Reeve and Frank Spring is making plans for getting scout work started. The organizing group have named Frank Trout as scoutmaster, with Ed Williams assistant. Joe Wilson is leader of the Cub pack, and Virgil Elms is his assistant.

30 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 4, 1946

The Friona Chieftains won their first game of the season at Lockney last Friday, when they beat the Lockney Longhorns by the score of 12-6. The Chiefs showed much improvement over their previous games. Miller did the scoring for Friona.

25 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 27, 1951

Bids for construction of a fire station in Friona will be let quite soon, according to announcement this week by Mayor Mack Bainum. Plans are for construction to begin before cold weather of the two-truck station. Location will be on the city-owned lots just north of the park on Main Street.

Who is going to win the World Series: Ed White: "I guess it's going to be the Brooklyn Dodgers and the New York Yankees. My favorite

team is the St. Louis Cardinals, but I don't think they have a chance."

20 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 20, 1956

A special program for guests and pioneers will be conducted at 4:30 p.m. on Friday.

15 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 21, 1966

Albert Field, Friona City Manager, officially submitted his resignation to the City Council Tuesday at 8 p.m. during a called meeting. Field will assume similar duties at Muleshoe.

5 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 30, 1971

The Friona Police Department was instrumental in stopping and apprehending a man Monday who allegedly took \$89 in cash and three tapes from a Clovis store, and then tried to outrun officers in a high-speed chase between Farwell and Friona. Frederick Lee Talbot, 33, who gave officers several addresses but is believed to be from Akron, Ohio, was stopped in Friona by a road block set up by Chief of Police Bill Denney and patrolman Billy Lucas.

USSR Using Maize In Feed Experiment

The Soviet Union announced this week that it has begun an experimental poultry feeding project using U.S. grain sorghum.

Soviet agricultural researchers are comparing feeding efficiency and nutritive value of U.S. number two yellow sorghum to corn and to grain components conventionally used in broiler diets in the USSR.

The poultry demonstration, jointly sponsored by the U.S. Feed Grains Council and the Soviet government, is a result of the sales expansion program of Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Dr. J.H. Quisenberry, retired poultry specialist from Texas A&M University, will go to the Soviet Union Oct. 10 to oversee the project. He will be joined later by officials of the USFGC, including President Darwin Stolte of Washington, D.C.

Sorghum to be used in the experiment was shipped in early July by Soviet vessel to the All-Union Research and Technological Poultry Institute experimental farm near Moscow.

Detailed plans for the feeding trial were finalized in Moscow May 10, 1976 at a meeting of Soviet agricultural officials with Dr. Halvor Kolshus, USFGC European director and Dr. Quisenberry. Preliminary plans were prepared by a grain sorghum team headed by Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, and Jack King, GSPA research director, during a series of seminars in Eastern Europe and Russia last fall.

Soviet approval of the first U.S.-USSR feeding demonstration marks another major step in the development of that country as a major export market for U.S. grain sorghum. Soviet purchases of corn last year were equal to nearly two-thirds of the total U.S. sorghum crop.

The sales expansion program began two years ago when the first Soviet trade team came to the High Plains of Texas as guests of Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board to study production and utilization of grain sorghum.

Six months later the Soviet Union's leading agricultural officials returned to the High Plains to continue their study. Within a few weeks, the Soviet government requested that a team of sorghum experts come to Moscow to present seminars about the high energy feed grain. That team, which was the first to be invited to Moscow, was told by Deputy Agriculture Minister Boris Runov, "We don't know your sorghum, but we should."

Team members were Texas Tech University animal science professor John Baumgardner and Texas A&M University cereal chemist Lloyd Rooney, and GSPA officials Harp and King.

During their visit to Moscow, the team was asked to prepare tentative plans for the poultry feeding trials in order to demonstrate to Soviet officials the nutritive value and cost advantage of U.S. number two yellow sorghum.

SCS Report

The Parmer County Committee for the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) met last Monday.

A review of the three GPCP contracts that have been carried to completion and will go out of contract in December was made. These contracts were on J.P. Sims, John Hays and Frank Hinkson. Conservation practices that will help conserve water and soil have been installed on these farms.

The committee was informed of the soil and water conservation that took place on the Orville Burnett's farm. This farm has the most recent GPCP contract in the county. The parallel terraces that were constructed on this farm held all the soil, and the water that fell in early August.

The committee was informed that there is money available for GPCP contracts in Parmer County. For further information see or call Soil and Water Conservation office in Friona.



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SCORE ON HORNETS

Chiefs In Moral Victory Vs Tulia

The Friona Chieftains suffered their third loss of the year as Tulia's Hornets stung them 33-8 at last Friday night's homecoming game.

The Chieftains did manage to drive across their first touchdown of the regular season, gaining what head coach Lonnie Phillips termed a "moral victory," scoring against Tulia's previously "unscored on" defense.

The only points previously scored against the Hornets during the season came on an interception when Olton's defense took the ball all the way in, making the points against Tulia's offense.

"We felt like we didn't play as well defensively as we thought we would," said coach Phillips. "They attacked us on the outside, and we didn't contain them."

The Chiefs' running game looked pretty good against the tough Tulia defense, as they managed 188 yards on the ground, and came up with 12 first downs.

The first quarter bounced back and forth with neither team getting the upper hand. Friona managed to ward off a potential touchdown as Tulia carried their second possession from their 20, all the way to

Friona's five, before the Chieftains stopped the drive.

Tulia's first score came early in the second quarter as they took the ball from their own 44 and marched the length of the field in 11 plays. The PAT was good and the Hornets led 7-0.

The Chiefs were stopped cold on their next possession and forced to punt as Edward Castillo boomed a 40 yarder to the Tulia 45.

The Hornets took over on their 45 and pushed the ball down to Friona's five yard line, where Tulia quarterback Don Burgess carried the ball over on a bootleg. The kick went wide and the Hornets led it 13-0 going into the half.

The third quarter went pretty much like the second for the Chiefs as Tulia scored on their first possession with quarterback Steve Brown taking it in on a keeper from the one. Friona had fumbled the kickoff to set up the Tulia opportunity.

The PAT was again bad and the score stood 19-0.

Friona received the kickoff on their 25 and fumbled the ball back to Tulia on the first play from scrimmage.

The defense put up a good fight, but the Hornets were too close to paydirt to give up. They scored on a five yard run by halfback Larry Anderson, putting them ahead 27-0.

The Chieftain offense came out determined to close the gap as they moved the ball from their 47 down deep into Hornet territory before missing a hand-off and fumbling the ball on the Tulia 16-yard line.

Tulia took over again from their own 18, but the Chieftain defense refused to yield and forced the Hornets to punt.

On their next possession, the Chiefs gave the crowd something to stand up and cheer about as the offense pulled everything together, moving 56 yards in nine plays to score their first touchdown of the 1976 regular season.

Kelwin King took the ball in from the 12 yard line for the score and then ran across the two point conversion to make it 27-8, with 9:34 left in the game.

It looked like Friona might have a chance to pull a little closer until Jerry Williams, a Hornet defensive end, intercepted a Keith Martin pass and ran it 70 yards for the final touchdown of the game, making the score 33-0.

Friona's next game will be on the road against Hart.

Jayvees, Tulia Play 8-0 Defensive Battle

Friona's Junior Varsity was shut-out by Tulia, Thursday, September 23 in a close game, 8-0.

Friona kicked to Tulia to begin the contest and the Hornets took the ball all the way from their 37 to score. It took the team 13 plays in which they gathered five first downs.

Tulia ran the two point conversion in for the last and only score of the game.

Justin McNeeley took Tulia's kickoff and ran it back to the Hornet's 40 yard line to give the Chiefs excellent field position.

Friona was able to move to Tulia's six yard line, but could not find the combination to strike paydirt. Tulia held and took over the ball on their own five.

Friona's defense dug in and held the Hornets, forcing them to punt from their own 10.

Friona took over on their 46 and moved the ball well until Tulia's defense held at their 28.

The ball changed hands thirteen times the first half, with neither team able to sustain a drive other than Tulia on their first possession of the ball game.

As the half ended, the Chiefs stopped Tulia on the one yard line, to stay within 8.

The second half went much the same as the first, with Friona driving down inside the Tulia 20 on four different occasions, but always being stopped by the strong Tulia defense.

Statistically, Friona outgained the Hornets 200 yards to 95, during the third and fourth periods, controlling the ball most of the second half.

Neither team, though, was able to break through the other's defense to score.

The Chiefs threatened several different times, but were unable to make those last few yards for the points.

During Friona's second possession of the third quarter, it looked as though the Chiefs would pull it out as they moved the ball easily against the Tulia defense.

Their drive took them from their own 25 to the Tulia 35; as they managed four first downs in the 40 yard march, only to lose the ball on

the Hornets' 35 with an untimely fumble.

The Hornets were only able to gain six yards in their first three carries and were forced to give the ball back to Friona.

Friona took over again from their own 35 and drove to Tulia's two yard line before once more losing the ball to the Hornets, as Chris Barnett was tackled for a five yard loss on fourth down, ending the most serious scoring threat by the Chiefs in the second half.

Chiefs Hoping To Upset Hart Friday

The Friona Chieftains will try to break their losing streak Friday night, October 1 as they take on the Hart Longhorns at Hart.

There should be two Friona coaches especially anxious to do well against the Longhorns—one who coached there and one who went to school there.

The Longhorns should be equally anxious to do well against Friona. Hart has a new coach this year, but they look and play as well or better than they did a year ago. Coming off last year's season with a 9-2 record, they now stand 3-1.

Their only defeat this year was at the hands of bi-district rival Petersburg, as the Buffaloes stamped Hart 14-6 last week.

The Longhorns returned 12 lettermen to a very competitive and hard hitting team. If new head coach Bill Taylor can overcome some of the inexperience in his line and overall lack of depth, which they seem to have done so far, the Longhorns should be a tough

opponent for the Chiefs.

"Hart is the small caliber team as those we're already played," said Chieftain head coach Lonnie Phillips. "They'll come out playing with everything they're got."

Hopefully the Chiefs will have it together offensively for the game Friday, since they have now found the touchdown combination. Knowing what it feels like to get on the scoreboard is important to get an offense on the move.

Friona's points against Tulia should be even more important to the Chiefs in proving to them that they can score against one of the toughest AA defenses in the area.

The Tulia Hornets defense had not been scored against yet this season, and the Chieftains ruined their perfect mark.

"We scored a moral victory Friday night against Tulia. Maybe our consistency will start now. We hope to be more consistent against Hart," concluded coach Phillips.

7th Braves Shell Hart

The Friona Seventh Grade Braves shellacked the Hart Shorthorns in a game here Thursday afternoon, 34-0.

The win was the first of the season for the Braves, who have been tied twice.

Quarterback Rudy Mendoza scored three touchdowns for the Braves and Nelson Jackson scored twice.

Mendoza got the Braves off and running in the first quarter, when he ran three yards on a busted play for a touchdown. Robert Caballero ran for two points, and Friona had an 8-0 lead.

Jackson rang the bell again for the Braves later in the half when he snagged a 25-yard pass from Mendoza. The point try failed, but Friona had a 22-0 edge.

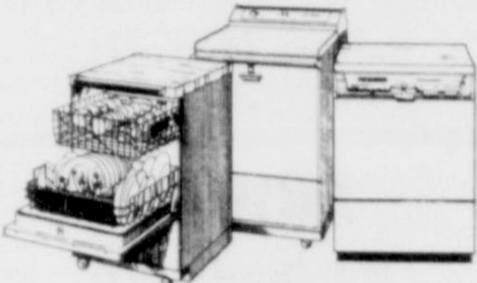

Friona Library Qualifies

For System Grant

Eighteen libraries in the 25 counties served by the Texas Panhandle Library System have qualified for system membership in the year that began September 1. The system will receive a grant of \$183,554 to carry out programs to improve library service in the area.

Ten regional systems have been organized under provisions of the Texas Library Systems Act that is administered by the Texas State Library. Funds are available to the systems to carry out cooperative activities to improve library service to users of system member libraries.

Like other systems, the Texas Panhandle Library System is developing service programs particularly suited to the library needs of its region. These include providing consultant services to libraries in the area, circulation of a film collection purchased for use by all libraries in the area, a books-by-mail program for residents of counties without library service, and assisting libraries in disseminating information about services.

Community libraries are Hutchinson County Library in Borger,

Hemphill County Library in Canadian, Canyon Public Library, Rhoads Memorial Library in Dimmitt, Killgore Memorial Library in Dumas, Friona Public Library, Deaf Smith County Library in Hereford, Lovett Memorial Library in McLean, Carson County Public Library in Panhandle, Perry Memorial Library in Perryton, Shamrock Public Library, Hansford County Library in Spearman, Sherman County Public Library in Stratford, and Swisher County Library in Tulia.

The High Plains Bookmobile which operates out of Muleshoe and serves a four-county area is a unique member of the state system.

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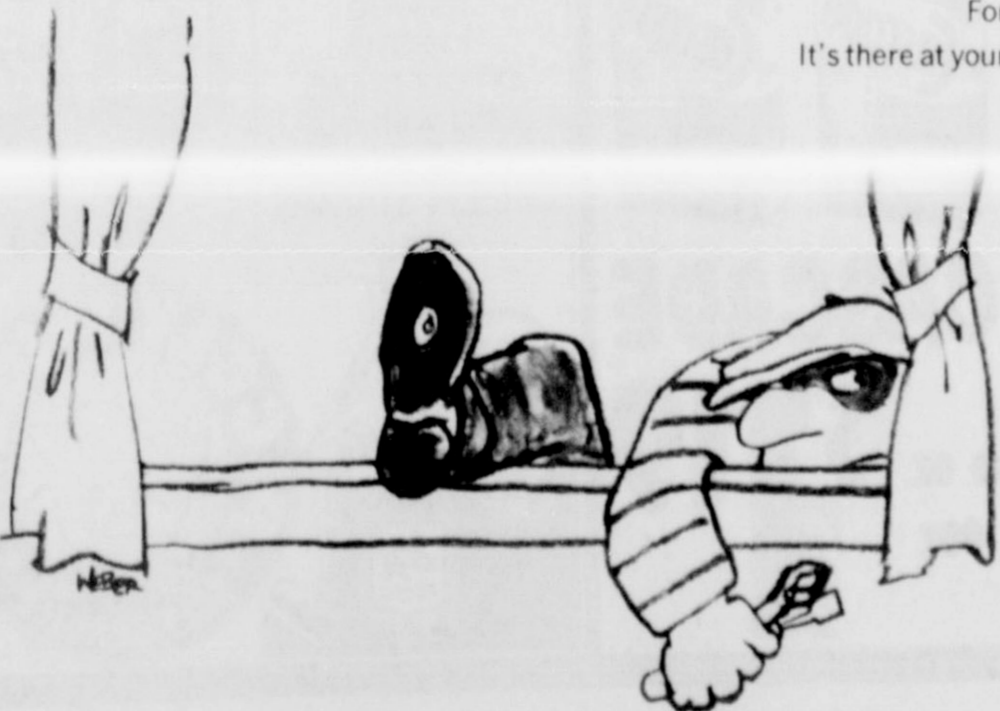
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
