JUST A WEEK from Tuesday, voters across the nation will go to the polls to elect a new president, and the latest Gallup poll shows that as many as 34 million voters had not even made up their minds who they would support.

This is the largest number of "undecideds" this close to an election in decades.

The pollsters agree that the election will be decided by the millions of voters who at least up until this point are sitting on the fence.

In addition to the voters who are uncommitted, millions of others continue switching their loyalties back and forth, swayed by such things as campaign statements, the debates, and tactical mistakes made by the candidates.

One expert says that many of the undecided voters started out in the Carter column originally, but for one reason or the other, drifted away from his camp.

Some experts explain that many Southerners are finding it hard to make a decision between regional pride in supporting Carter, and the fear that he might turn out to be too liberal once he was elected.

This is a fear that has hurt Carter's standing in Texas, along with his endorsement by labor, his untimely interview granted to Playboy Magazine, plus some other statements that he would have better left unsaid.

Farming areas that have been voting in the Republican column in recent years are torn between anger over President Ford's 1975 embargo on grain sales, and the earlier price freeze that disrupted the cattle market, and suspicion that Carter might raise taxes and return Government controls to Agriculture.

Ford's recent announcement that he would place limits on beef imports was seen as an attempt to influence the fence-sitters in the farm belt.

Most political observers agree that the reason for the big group of undecided voters this late in the election year is the failure of either candidate to become an inspirational leader, to "capture the imagination of the American public."

Another political expert says that the fact that both candidates are moderates, or at least they are seen to be moderates, makes it easier for the independents, the conservative Democrats and the liberal Republicans, to slide back and forth.

To make matters worse, there appear to be no real burning issues making shape prior to the election. There are some issues, true, but none that have really caused the voters to heat up.

This all points to a possibility of a low voter turnout. Some forecasters have predicted that it might mark the first time since 1924 that the turnout for a presidential election fell to less than 50 per cent.

One thing about it—the election is coming up right away. Voters are gonna have to decide in a hurry.

THOSE WISHING to vote absentee are reminded that the deadline to cast an absentee ballot will be next Friday, October 29, at the County Clerk's office in Farwell.

College students may also request ballots, if they are not registered to vote in their college community. But they must do so right away.

Monday will unofficially be "George Mahon Day" in Friona, as a reception will be held for the longtime congressman that evening at 7:30 at the Friona Community Center.

A.L. Black and Hollis H. Horton, Jr., who will serve as co-hosts for the occasion, say they are issuing a public invitation for everyone who has never met Mahon, as well as his friends, to attend the reception.

The congressman will speak briefly, and then will answer any questions that those attending might have. Mayor R.L. Fleming will be on hand to introduce Mahon.

A special invitation has been issued to Mahon's Democratic colleagues in the county, to be at the reception. According to Horton, those planning to attend included sheriff nominee Charlie Lovelace, commissioner nominee Ernest Anthony; county attorney nominee Johnny Atkinson; plus local representatives of the Jimmy Carter campaign, and Mel Phillips, who is area coordinator for the Lloyd Bentsen campaign.

Mahon's visit in Friona will conclude a full day of active campaigning in Parmer County. He begins his day Monday morning at a breakfast meeting of the Farwell Jaycees. From 2 until 3:30, Mahon will meet with constituents in the Bovina area at First State Bank of Bovina.

George Mahon, his opponent, has been in Washington 42 of his 76 years, and a recent study made by the Americans for Constitutional Action shows that Mr. Mahon no longer thinks or votes as a West Texan, Reese says.

His study shows Mahon has voted as follows: 57 per cent of the time against a sound dollar; 65 per cent of the time against a private market and individual freedom of choice and for government price fixing and controls; 50 per cent of the time against private ownership and for

government ownership; 49 per cent of the time against a strong national defense.

"We believe the political philosophy and beliefs of Jim Reese (see p. 4d, this issue) are more that of the West Texan than those of his opponent," said Briggs.

Absentee Voting Goes Thru Friday

Absentee voting for the November 2 general election is underway at the court house in Farwell, and will continue through Friday, October 29.

Those who plan to be out of the county on election day may vote at the County Clerk's office during the special period.

College students who are not registered to vote in their college communities may request a mail ballot, but must do so immediately if they plan to vote.

Only previously registered voters may take part in the absentee voting.

Mass Shot Program Shows Decline Here

The swine flu shot program was resumed at Parmer County Community Hospital this week after a temporary delay had been placed on giving the shots by the state department of health.

A big drop in the number of residents showing up for the shots was evident on Monday and Wednesday afternoons. "We are either running out of customers, or folks are being scared off by the adverse publicity the program has received," stated Paul Spring this week.

After the first two sessions had yielded an average of 400 residents per day to take the shots, only 60 showed up on Monday, and another 58 took the shots on Wednesday.

"We still believe in the program, and are hopeful for a good response, in order for the program to be a success," said Dr. Spring. "If only half of the people take the shots, then we won't get the protection we were seeking, and we still could potentially have an epidemic."

The vaccinations, which are provided free by the federal government, are being administered on Monday and Wednesday afternoons from 1:30-5, and on Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. until 12 noon.

The shots are not recommended for children under 18 years of age unless they have a chronic illness. They also are not recommended for anyone who is allergic to eggs, or who has a cold or fever.

The final score for the Morton game was Friona 18-Morton 0.

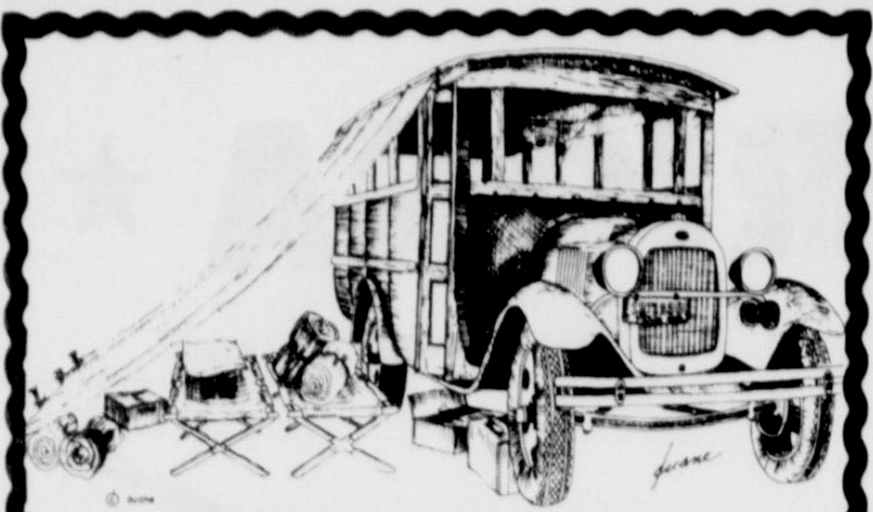
Then on Tuesday afternoon of this week, Littlefield came here. This game was won by Friona 8-0.

REMEMBERING...

Summer Camp

I never got to be a Boy Scout or anything because there wasn't a troop in our community when I grew up. But we could go to church camp when we reached a certain age. I wasn't old enough the year I went but they had plenty of room and asked me if I'd like to go since my big brother would be there to look after me. I was prematurely thrilled and could hardly wait for that week to come. How nice it would be to spend several nights out under the stars!

We arrived at camp after a hot, jolting 100-mile ride in a rickety old used-up school bus. We found our spot on an unlikely, rocky, hilly slope profusely landscaped with thorn bushes and stickers. A large tarp was stretched out and fastened to the bus on one side and we attempted to stake the other side down to the ground to make a sort of lean-to shelter. Have you ever tried to drive wooden pegs into solid rock?

We finally got our "quarters ship shape" as the counselor had ordered and the announcement was made that we would have preaching service in 10 minutes. What? Preaching? We thought we were going camping.

We set up our cots that night and discovered we had forgotten to bring sheets. "Don't matter, it'll be warm tonight so we won't need no cover." It was warm that night, in fact it was hot, but mosquitoes came to call and it was a choice between being eaten alive or suffocating between two scratchy, heavy, wool army blankets.

Somehow we survived the night only to be awakened by a bugle being enthusiastically tooted by someone musically uninclined at a time long before the sun woke up. "Mess in ten minutes!" came the call. I figured I was a mess already but I found out mess was food and if you weren't there in ten minutes you didn't get any. An hour of handicrafts came next. A

fellow demonstrated his skill of plaiting several strands of bright plastic cord while he urged us to try our hand. It seemed easy watching him but no matter how hard I worked mine just didn't look like his. He finally said maybe I should go over where they were making little animals by gluing beans on a board. My rooster turned out O.K. but I would rather have had one of those plaited key chains to take home. I found out there was more preaching, in fact there were three sermons a day. I was finding out that summer camp just wasn't much fun and decided I wouldn't come back the next year.

The last night we were there we had what they called a camp fire service. Everyone assembled around a big fire and sang songs, and that was a lot more fun than listening to preaching. Some boys stood up and gave testimonies about what different things meant to them. Then a young man sorta preached a sermon but it was different from the others I had heard. He seemed more sincere somehow. He said some things that really made sense. I remember he said not to be discouraged whatever happens in your life and no matter what you are called upon to do, do it the best way you know how. He said a lot more but those things have stayed with me. I went to bed that night with a new feeling. I didn't even mind the mosquitoes.

"Church, a 5-11, 163-pounder, led the Chieftain offense to a 17-12 upset victory over District 3-AA rival Morton last Friday night."

"It was the first win of the season for first-year head coach Lonnie Phillips' charges. In leading his team to the surprise decision,

Church earned this week's Globe-News area Class AA honor as player of the week."

"We felt like he (Church) drew a tough task," said coach Phillips. "The boy he had to block most of the night weighed 228 pounds and has been a defensive standout for Morton all year. Perry just did an outstanding job for us all evening. He was named offensive player of the week by the coaches for that job."

"Phillips also cited strong end Eddie Bermea who was 'instrumental in both of our TD passes.'

Bermea caught a 69-yard touchdown pass for the first score. On the second Friona tally, a 64-yard aerial," Phillips said, "Eddie came back off his pass route and knocked a tackler loose from the receiver (Earnest Mills) and sprung him for the TD."


Carl White, Little League president, says the officials are looking into the possibility of a baseball program for 16 to 18 year olds, plus a new program for those 15 years old and younger.

"We need the help and concern of everyone in order to make this a successful program for our youngsters," White says.

Also under consideration is a softball league for the girls wishing to compete.

The Friona Chieftains came alive last Friday night as Keith Martin completed two long passes for touchdowns and Edward Castillo added the extra points and a field goal to lead the Chieftains to their first win of the season. The Chiefs beat a tough District 3-AA rival the Morton Indians, 17-12.

commented Chieftain head coach Lonnie Phillips. "But we feel real good about our victory. This will definitely spur our young men onto greater efforts since they know they have a chance at the district title." The passing game drew much praise, but the running slacked off some from previous weeks. Coach Phillips commented that they had

been working extremely hard on their passing game, but want a balanced attack.

"Morton was a very physical team. They hit hard and had running backs that were as good as any we've seen. The Indians' defense boasted eight boys over 210 pounds," said Phillips.

The opening quarter seemed to indicate a punting game would be on tap until the Chiefs, on their third possession began to move the ball. The drive was almost stalled when a pass drifted behind the line of scrimmage to make it a free ball. The ensuing fourteen yard loss set the offense back to the 36 yard line.

Keith Martin quickly righted the situation with a 65 yard aerial strike to Eddie Bermea for the first TD of the game. Edward Castillo added the first of his five points and the Chieftains led 7-0 with 48 seconds to go in the first quarter.

Morton was in possession of the ball at the end of the quarter, but couldn't overcome a 15 yard holding penalty and were forced to punt early in the second quarter.

The ball exchanged hands three more times before Kevin Kothmann broke up a Morton pass attempt with a near interception to bring the count to third and six. Larry Moore broke through the secondary on the crucial third down play to cover 51 yard and score Morton's first TD of the game.

The point after attempt was blocked and Friona still held a slim 7-6 lead.

Clifford McLellan fielded the kickoff at the 11 and made a fine 20 yard run back to set the Chieftains in business on their 31 yard line.

Martin decided to take advantage of his receiving corp and on first down threw a scoring strike to Ernest Mills. Mills made a fingertip catch and with an excellent block from Eddie Bermea danced into the end zone making the pass play cover 88 yards.

Following a successful point after attempt the Chieftains kicked off to Morton sporting a 14-6 lead which they held onto going in at the half.

In the closing moments of the third stanza, Eddie Castillo kicked a 22 yard field goal to give the Chieftains a five point lead. The field goal was the last score of the game.

The first touchdown had come on third and six and this must have been etched in Mike Murphy's memory because he slipped through the

offensive line to throw the Morton quarterback for a nine yard loss to set up a fourth and fifteen situation with 49 seconds to go in the game. The ball went to the Chieftains on downs and the clock ran out with the Chieftains on the winning end of the count, 17-12.

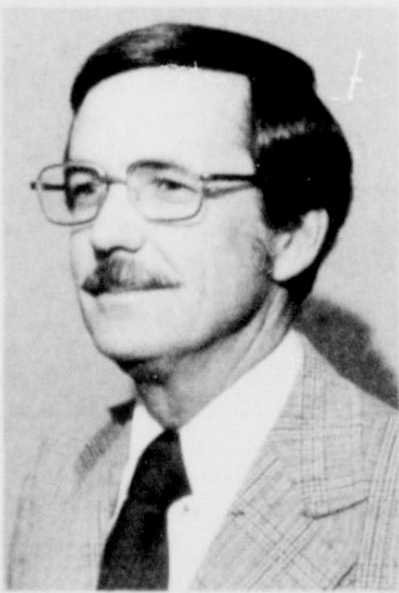

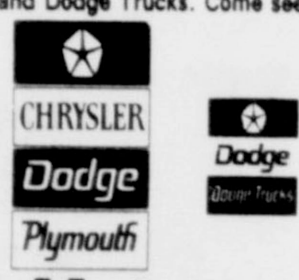

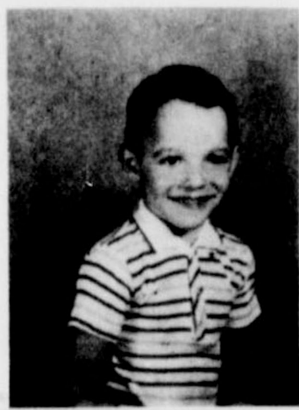

Kiwanis Club Pushes Anti-Crime Program

The Friona Kiwanis Club will launch a new community service program called "Safeguard Against Crime," according to D.L. Harguess, president of the club.

The program has the full support of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and other local, state and provincial law enforcement organizations.

Purpose of the program, according to Harguess, is to bring to the attention of the public the dramatic increase in crime against persons and property; and to suggest many of the ways in which individuals, them-

selves, can prevent crimes. He said that specifically the program will attack the problems of crimes against the home, crimes against children, crimes against businesses and offices, and crimes against senior citizens. He said the program will also deal with organizing and operating civilian surveillance programs (not to be confused with vigilante programs) and conducting basic attitude programs aimed at encouraging and understanding of and respect for the law, and dependence upon and respect for law enforcement officials.

In many communities, the Kiwanis president said, the local authorities will cooperate in "Safeguard Against Crime" programs which are primarily educational in nature. Groups reached, he said, will include householders, merchants, older citizens, young children, and civic, church and professional organizations.

Schneider unveiled it during his acceptance speech, and showed a film clip of himself, Commissioner Maurice J. Nadon of the RCMP, and Director Clarence M. Kelley of the FBI laying plans for the project.
