ANTHONY WINS

Record Turnout; Demos Get Edge

The largest local voting turnout in history went to the polls here Tuesday, and gave Jimmy Carter an edge in his drive for the presidency.

Carter, who bested President Gerald Ford nationwide by a slim margin of electoral votes, coaxed the Friona precinct back into the Democratic column for the first time since 1964.

The vote here was 724 for Carter, and 595 for Ford. The excellent voting turnout of 1,358 in the Friona precinct represented around 78 per cent of the qualified voters, which was much better than was being predicted by the national news

Countywide, the turnout was 72.5 per cent of the estimated 4800 registered voters, while at the smallest precinct of Lakeview, 96.6 per cent of the voters turned out, as 58 of the 60 eligible voters cast their

A FEW YEARS AGO we began to hear the term "silent majority" being used. It pertained to the rank and file Americans, who go about their business without causing a great deal of stir, but who, with their ballots, wealth or influence, silently cause the major events to happen.

We don't know if you'd call the results of Tuesday's election the work of the silent majority, but in many ways it applies.

About all you heard during the closing weeks of the campaign from the news media was about how President Ford was closing the margin between himself and Jimmy Carter, and how he apparently, like a pro football team in the final two-minute drill, was moving in for the sure 11th hour win.

You also heard a lot to the effect that voter turnout was going to be low. Many people commented as to the cause of the predicted voter apathy, especially during our

Bicentennial election year A lot of this turned out to be just so much talk Tuesday, as American voters, apparently tired of such things as Watergate, low farm prices, high gas prices and a questionable energy program, voted to return a Democrat to the White

House for the next four years. And they did so in record numbers in many places, including Parmer County, where the voter turnout was over 72 per cent of the registered voters, probably a record percentage of people voting, and definitely

a record number. After visiting with several farmers, it was no surprise to us that they were going to vote for Jimmy Carter. Farmers in this area have watched the price for their commodities slip to a three and four-year low in some cases, while at the same time their cost of production, particularly in the field of natural gas, has doubled and

quadrupled. as we have noted before, the farmers have felt for some time as though they were a voice crying in

highest office, surely if things change at all for the farmer, it will

be for the better. At one time we attempted to figure out who the last American president had been who had actually persued farming as an occupation. We never did pinpoint him, and decided that it may have even been George Washington. No doubt some enter-

more accurate answer to this one. At any rate, the silent majority has spoken. Carter did not (at least at this early hour) receive an overwhelming mandate, but the voice of the voter was heard, all the way from Friona to Washington.

Carter carried every voting precinct except Farwell and Rhea. Ford carried the Farwell box, 323-300, and at Rhea the 72 votes were split right down the middle, 36

Democratic nominee Ernest Anthony won the commissioner's seat in Precinct one, with an impressive victory over Republican challenger Forrest Osborn and 11th hour write-in challenger Raymond Euler.

The final totals were 993 votes for Anthony to 304 for Osborn and 183 for

Some eyebrows have been raised over Friona's vote in the presidential race. Usually holding to a longtime conservative voting records, voters in this precinct gave Carter 60 per cent of their votes, to 40 per cent for Ford.

In 1972, Nixon carried the Friona precinct with 921 votes to only 172 for George McGovern. In 1968, Nixon

also held a commanding lead, 605-251 over Hubert Humphrey. Even with Texan Lyndon Johnson's successful re-election bid of 1964, the Friona precinct favored the Democrat by only 53 per cent of their

votes, 495-438 over Barry Goldwater. The Friona precinct joined those across the county in giving George Mahon a big edge in his re-election bid. Mahon had a lead locally of 803-507 over challenger Jim Reese, or 67.4 per cent of the vote.

Local voters also went heavy for Senator Lloyd Bentsen. They favored winner Jon Newton in the Railroad Commissioner race, and gave controversial candidate Don Yarbrough a lead with 555 votes. In the latter race, write-in candidates Sam Houston and Tom Lorance received 354 and 77 votes respectively, but it did not hinder Yarbrough's election bid.

At Bovina, a write-in candidate, Wayne Spears, was elected to the Justice of the Peace post, outpolling Edna Estes, 344-295 for the position. Mrs. Estes' name was on the ballot. The race was to fill the unexpired term of Wilbur Charles, who died while in office.

The two proposed constitutional amendments received favorable consideration in Friona and Parmer County. Friona favored number one (water treatment bonds) 888-218, and number two (sewage treat ment), 845-220. Countywide, the vote was 2071-692 and 1936-730.

But statewide, the number one proposition failed, while number two narrowly passed. Number one on the ballot turned out to have some opposition for one reason or another. The complete county tabulation,

DPS Confiscates Haul Of 'Grass'

A pair of Highway Patrol officers based in Friona stopped a car east of town on Highway 60 Wednesday night on suspicion of driving while intoxicated, and discovered what is believed to be the biggest "haul" of marijuana ever confiscated in

Parmer County. Kenneth James Poe, 26, a native of Illinois, was arraigned Thursday in Farwell and charged with possession of over four ounces of marijuana, a felony crime. Justice of the Peace R.E. Mears set bond at \$15,000. Poe was still in custody at press time

Officers Royce Keck and Andy Martinez stopped Poe about two miles east of Friona Wednesday night when they noticed the car questioning the driver, the officers noticed some items that made them suspicious, and the DPS representatives eventually found out that Poe had a trunk full of the narcotic weed.

The investigating officers unloaded 142 packages, each package weighing approximately a kilo, or 2.2 pounds. This amounted to roughly 312 pounds of marijuana. It

was estimated that the street value of the haul might be around \$20,000

There was some confusion as to where Poe is from. He holds a temporary driver's license from Taos, N.M. The 1970 model Ford he was driving is registered in El Paso County, Texas.

There was also some evidence that the vehicle had been sold recently. and that perhaps Poe had borrowed it from an individual thought to live in Ruidoso, N.M.

The car was equipped with a CB radio and a radar detector. The officers felt they were lucky to have stopped Poe under these circum-

"If he had received a "Smokey on us, he could possibly have avoided us. It goes to show you that you never know who you may be talking to on the CB," Keck stated.



The first firearm most oungsters own is a BB gun. Oh, I know a BB gun is really not a firearm but it means the same thing to a ten-yearold. I can remember reading ads for Daisy "Red Ryder BB guns in comic books and such and wanting one so badly I could taste it.

My brother and I begged Mom and Dad and warted them until they finally gave in. Having an older brother helped. Dad reasoned that brother could take charge but that I could use the gun under his supervision. The arrangement was fine with me, anything to get that Daisy. But there was a catch. Dad said we would have to buy it with our own money. That \$4.98 might as well have been a million we didn't have 15 cents between us.

The only thing to do was take a job since Mom and Dad didn't believe in allowances and "chores" done on the farm were nonpaying jobs. It was summer and we were out of school so we set out with our hoes to see if we could get a job chopping cotton. A neighbor we knew hired us right away and said he was paying 75 cents a day if we were good workers. "Sure!" we said, "Can we start now?

By mid-afternoon we were pretty tired but the thought of that BB gun kept us going. We got to work four days that week and on Friday at quitting time the man gave us each three dollars!

Mom helped us fill in the

order blank. We bought the

gun and six boxes of BBs. When it came in it was the neatest thing I figured I would ever see. The barrel was dark blue, just like Dad's real rifle and the stock was made of fine polished wood with Red Ryder's picture stamped right on it. We received stern instructions concerning its use

to which we both solemnly

nodded agreement On our first hunting trip we

imagined bagging all kinds of big game, from coons to mountain lions. We actually shot several tin cans in a trash pile and killed one sparrow. We told Mother we wanted her to fix it for supper. She laughed and said, "O.K. but I don't think you'll eat it." We assured her we would and we did. We even bragged about how good it tasted (it actually

tasted a lot like a rope.) We learned a lot from having that BB gun. Sure, we learned care and respect for firearms but the experience of working for it and buying it with our own money was just as important.

Highway 214 **Work Detailed**

Details concerning the construction of State Highway 214 between Hub and Clay's Corner were discussed at a pre-construction meeting Wednesday involving representatives of the Texas Highway Department, the contractor and the Department of Public Safe-

Main purpose of the meeting was to promote safety to the traveling public and construction personnel and to discuss the project's plans, specifications and the contractor's plans and schedule of operations.

The construction area will be speed zone 45 miles per hour, and the Highway Department has requested the Department of Public Safety to enforce the special speed limit, especially in the vicinity of Running Water

Rhea Bradley, supervising resident engineer, discussed the project in general and the sequence of work, pointing out the potential for interference of traffic, and possible de-

Particularly discussed was a proposed detour at the bridge at Running Water Draw, which will be completely rebuilt. A temporary culvert bridge will be built at the bottom of the draw, to the east of the present bridge, to carry the traffic during the construction phase.

J.O. Boswell, contractor, said he expects to begin work on reconstructing the roadway in about two weeks. The contractor will begin the job at Running Water Draw and proceed north to Hub during the first plans of construction, and then build the portion from the draw south to Clay's Corner in the second phase.

Work on the bridge is expected to begin in eight to ten weeks. The contractor has estimated 285 working days for the project, which is slated to be completed by July of 1977.

The project calls for construction of two 13-foot travel lanes with nine-foot shoulders and one bridge with a 48-foot roadway width. The new bridge will be 120 feet long, and approximately five feet higher than the present structure, with only an 18 to 20-foot surface.

Sight distances will be improved on both sides of the bridge.

The contract amount is \$1,391,262. The contractor, Boswell and Crafton, constructed the portion of the highway from Hub to Friona in 1975-76.

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

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Chiefs Thump Mules; Take District Lead

The Friona Chieftains braved the elements and took advantage of mistakes to stop a hard hitting Muleshoe team last Friday night and spoil the Mules' homecoming.

"We were extremely pleased with the defensive effort," said Chieftain head coach Lonnie Phillips. "It was probably our best of the year (defensively), holding Muleshoe to only 40 yards rushing and 20 yards passing when they've been averaging over 200 yards per game this

Coach Phillips cited Mitchell Smiley as having an outstanding night with six unassisted tackles, seven assisted tackles and two quarterback sacks. He also caused a fumble and intercepted a pass.

Others mentioned by Phillips for defensive honors included Mike Murphy with 10 assisted tackles and a fumble recovery and Keith Martin with 10 tackles. Martin led Friona with 144 yards rushing and scored both touchdowns.

"The defensive secondary played super," Phillips continued. "Todd Bandy and Clint Mears both got good interceptions, and Clint almost broke loose for a touchdown."

Junior Varsity runningback Eddie Braillif was brought up to the varsity earlier in the week and had a very impressive debut with the team pounding out 41 yards in 9 carries for

a 4.5 yards per carry average. The first half was a defensive struggle with neither team able to move the ball in the freezing weather. Friona won the toss and elected to receive. On the first play from scrimmage, Glen London broke loose for a 20 yard gainer and almost got away for a longer run, but was tripped up by a Mule secondary member to save a touchdown scramble.

The Chieftains made it to Muleshoe's 39 yard line on their first possession when their drive fizzled and they were forced to punt. Edward Castillo booted a high 39 yarder into the end zone and the Mules took over on their own 20.

The ball changed hands five more times in the first quarter with neither team able to sustain a drive. even though the Mules drove for two first downs to none for the

The second quarter was very much like the first with Muleshoe picking up another first down. The big exception was two fumbles by the Chiefs and one by the Mules.

A short Muleshoe punt gave Friona the ball at t' . Mules' 26, but the drive was blunted by an intercepted pass on fourth down.

The second half was controlled by the Chiefs as they came out with an unbalanced line, which confused the Mules. After the opening kickoff of the second half. Muleshoe fumbled on their own 30 and Friona recovered only to drive to the Mules' 24 and stall out.

The Mules were stopped on their possession and forced to punt. Friona took the ball on their own 32 and on the first play, Keith Martin scrambled for 22 yards to the

Stephen O. Knox plans to finish his Ph. D. work in 1977, with his thesis probably in the field of rf plasma heating
