## Annual Xmas Bazaar Here Next Weekend

The Christmas in November Bazaar and Arts and Crafts Festival is now in the final stages of planning. The annual event which has been well received by area folks for the past three years is scheduled for Friday and Saturday, November 19 and 20 at the Community Center in Friona.

The Festival is sponsored by the Parmer County Family Living Committee with County Agent Jana Pronger acting as co-ordinator.

The Bazaar will be open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Friday and from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday.

A fashion show featuring festive holiday wear from the Main Place in Friona will be held Friday afternoon. Leric's of Farwell is scheduled for a similar type style show Saturday at noon.

Friday morning Eula Mae Madole, representing the Farmers Electric Coop of Clovis, will be demonstrating gourd craft. This will feature the curing and drying of gourds and the use of them in holiday decor.

A representative from American Handicrafts of Lubbock will be doing several types of craft demonstrations throughout the afternoon on Friday.

There will be a demonstration of hand painted china jewelry on Saturday morning.

Various individual booths will also be featuring demonstrations of crafts work as well as having many items for sale.

Hodge Photo Art and Rock Shop from Amarillo has been one of the most popular booths in past years and will be returning to have a booth again in this year's bazaar.

The paintings of Brenda Chisholm Ballew of Sudan will again be featured in a booth this year.

A new booth which has been added this year will feature clocks and woodworking plus the paintings of Robert Reed of Floydada.

A few of the local folks who will be sponsoring booths this year are Diane and Carrie Tatum, Mrs. T.I. Burleson, Jimmy Grimsley, Steve Struve, and former Friona resident Vickie Bell, now of Lamesa.

There is no admission at the door and there is no obligation to buy anything. Anyone who attends the Craft Festival is sure to come away inspired at the many new ideas available.

The Parmer County Family Living Committee charges a small fee for the rental of each booth. The proceeds from this rental goes to help buy equipment for the Community Center.

The public is invited to circle the calendar for November 19 and 20 and to make plans to attend the fourth annual "Christmas in November" Bazaar, Arts and Crafts Festival.

# Bandy Bolts To Five-Point Lead

Clay Bandy moved to a commanding five-point lead in the race for grand prize in the Friona Star's football contest, coming up with a score of 16 for last week to tally 158 for the cumulative ten week total.

Bandy had entered the week with a three-point lead over the field, and managed to widen his margin by two points, to put the pressure on the contestants trailing him in the race for grand prize.

Bobby Wied, who retains second place in the standings, scored a 14 for the week, not a bad score by any standards, but still fell two points further back with a score of 153.

Jerry Hinkle, with his second straight superlative score, snared the weekly first prize of \$10 by correctly picking 18 of the games, with 21 as a best possible score.

Hinkle's only misses besides the tie game was in picking Lockney over Abernathy; Texas over Houston, and Atlanta over Seattle. He was awarded \$10.00 for his efforts.

Myrna Gatlin was the second place winner in the weekly contest, with a score of 17. In addition to the tie, Myrna missed the Vega-Bovina game, Texas-Houston, Lockney-

Abernathy and Washington-San Francisco.

Strange as it sounds, there was a five-way tie for third place in the weekly prize race. They were from among 14 contestants with scores of 18.

Mike Maynard, Clay Bandy and Jimmy Evans all missed the same number of games, and all had the Friona-Dimmitt score pegged at 14-13. Dwain Pape and Ron Cain each had the score down at 15-14. The score differential figured the same for all contestants.

## Change Announced For Flu Shot Days

A change in the schedule for the swine flu shots being given at Parmer County Community Hospital was announced this week.

Beginning next week, the shots

will be available only on Saturday mornings, instead of the three clinics per week as had been offered for the past month or so.

Dr. Paul Spring, spokesman for the hospital, said that as of Thursday, a total of 1,050 adults had received the shots in Friona. The number getting the shots has dwindled to around 30 per clinic during the past couple of weeks.

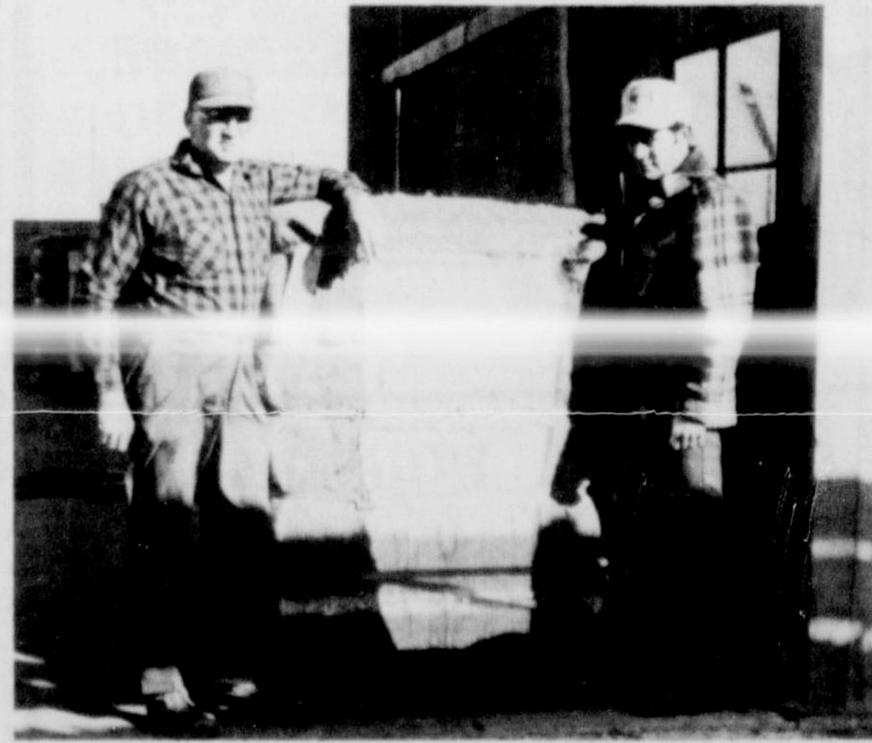
"We still strongly recommend that people get the shots. We have had no severe reactions at all locally to the shots," Dr. Spring said.

He added that the "ideal time" to receive the shots was beginning to pass. "You should get your shots within the next couple of weeks. The flu season will be upon us around Christmas, and it takes two to six weeks to develop a good immunity from the shot," he explained.

Dr. Spring said that he was not too disappointed at the number who had accepted the free shots, but still would like to see more people participate in the mass immunization program.

The monovalent type shot protects only against the swine flu strain. Bivalent shots, recommended for folks above 65, will protect against the regular flu as well as the swine flu strain.

Remember—the shots will be available only on Saturdays, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon beginning next week.

# Friona Flashbacks

**40 YEARS AGO—NOV. 13, 1936**  
Bob Clements of Albany, who formerly owned the Clements Tailor Shop here, but who a few months ago purchased a larger shop at Albany, was here Tuesday and moved the stock of men's furnishings to his store in Albany. The shop here has been under the management of Roy Clements, and will continue so.

**35 YEARS AGO—NOV. 14, 1941**  
Announcing an allotment of \$148,000 for the construction of 213 miles of new REA electricity lines in Texas. H.V. Hennen, project supervisor stated that approximately 50 miles of this new allotment will be placed in Parmer County. When the new construction is completed, approximately 300 miles of REA line will be served through the Parmer sub station.

**30 YEARS AGO—NOV. 8, 1946**  
On last Friday night at the football game with Tulia, the Chieftains crowned their football queen, Miss Marcia Lutrell of the junior class. The pep squad, dressed in their red and white uniforms, formed a heart on the playing field. The queen was dressed in a red evening gown and her attendants wore white. The queen was crowned by Dean Hall, captain of the football team. Tulia prevailed in the game, by a score of 32-0.

**25 YEARS AGO—NOV. 8, 1951**  
Survey work was commenced today on the new fire station for Friona, with actual construction to follow immediately. All bids recently were rejected by the city commissioners, and decision was made for the city to construct the building themselves. Mayor Bainum pointed out that a considerable saving in cost would be effected.

**20 YEARS AGO—NOV. 8, 1956**  
Texas agreed with the nation in returning President Eisenhower to his second term of office in the general election Tuesday, but it was a different story in predominantly agricultural Parmer County. Here, Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver, the Democratic nominees for the nation's two highest offices, took a clear cut victory. Democrats won in Friona by a 434-356 margin. Countywide, the count was 1372 votes for Stevenson-Kefauver and 1028 for Eisenhower-Nixon.

**15 YEARS AGO—NOV. 9, 1961**  
An all-out drive to enroll the 20 additional members necessary before the construction of the Country Club House can begin will commence Dec. 14, according to Andy Hurst, club president. D.G. McClellan, local telephone maintenance man, received fractures in his ankle as a result of a fall from the top of the American Legion Building Thursday.

**10 YEARS AGO—NOV. 10, 1966**  
Friona and Parmer County voters turned out in heavy numbers for a non-presidential voting year to help return Senator John Tower to Washington and to favor Congressman-elect Bob Price. City and county voters gave both of the Republican candidates a surprisingly heavy majority. Seven of the eight precincts voted for the two

candidates. In Friona, Tower out-pollied Waggoner Carr, 446-225, and won the county vote, 1084-651. Price's margins were 476-179 in Friona and 1161-569 county-wide over Democrat Dee Miller.

**5 YEARS AGO—NOV. 11, 1941**  
The procedure for purchasing right of way and making other necessary adjustments preliminary to the beginning of construction on the overpass for Highway 214 was discussed and outlined by right of way officials from the Texas Highway Department with city and county officials here last Thursday. The highway officials turned over to the City of Friona six tracts of land which have been approved by the State Highway Department for participation on the 50-50 right of way purchase, and two for the county.

### Scarecrows



The Brooks kids had a garden one year. Dad said it was high time we learned what it was like to raise a crop of our own. He marked off one corner of a field near our house and gave us the responsibility of choosing what to plant and taking care of it.

We planted seeds and most of them came up. We watered and hoed and eagerly watched the plants as they bloomed and put forth their fruit. We especially watched the watermelons because that was our favorite thing to eat. Each vine had several nice ones and we could hardly wait until they would be ripe enough to pick.

One day as we were inspecting our crops we were dismayed to find that several melons had jagged holes in them. Sitting nonchalantly on the fence nearby was a couple of crows with rounded stomachs full of melon.

"A scarecrow will solve this problem." We took some boards and made a kind of cross. Using gunny sacks we made a body. My sister's knowledge of sewing came in handy for that. We slipped

the body over the cross and stuffed it full of wheat straw. It looked really good, almost like a person except with no clothes. It needed a pair of overalls and a shirt we figured, along with a hat and some gloves. Mother said some of Dad's old worn out work clothes would be just fine so we had everything we needed.

We got him dressed and took him to the garden where we dug a hole to stand him up in. He looked good standing there guarding our melons but my sister said he wasn't quite finished. She ran to the house and came back with a face she made from white cloth and crayons. She stitched it in place on the burlap head and I had to admit it was just what he needed.

He wasn't very effective at doing his job however, because crows sometimes came to roost on his arms and hat. I think they would land there to choose which melons they wanted. But whether he really scared them or not didn't matter because there were plenty of melons for us and some to share.

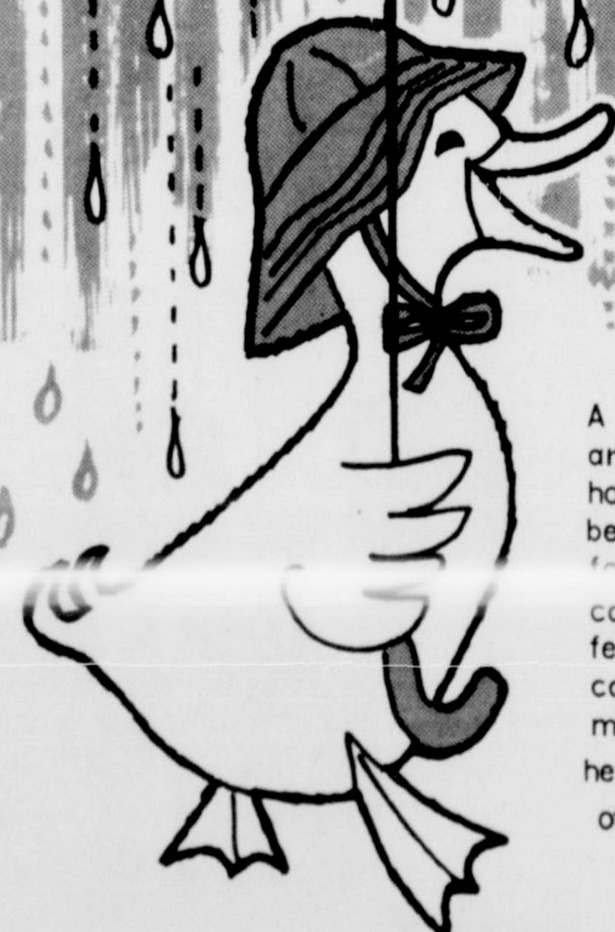

# Low Cattle Prices Are Reflected

The sale of grain-fed cattle at continued low prices was primarily responsible for the loss reported by Friona Industries, Inc., in the first quarter of its fiscal year.

During the quarter ended September 30, 1976, the company sustained a loss of \$177,000, or 14 cents per share, on revenues of \$13 million, compared with net income of \$361,000, or 29 cents per share, on revenues of \$10.9 million in the same quarter of last year.

"Three lines of our agri-business operations—custom feeding, commercial feeds and animal health supplies—generated income, but it was not sufficient to offset the loss in the sale of company-owned cattle," said John G. Carrothers, president.

"Occupancy in our three feedyards, while still well below the past five-year average, was considerably better than the first quarter of last year, and custom feeding made the largest contribution to pre-tax income," he explained.

Commercial feed operations were also profitable. In the first quarter of last year the manufacture and sale of these products showed a loss. Revenues of the Hi-Pro feed mill were approximately 49 per cent higher this year when compared with the same quarter of last year.

Animal health supplies, which had a substantial loss in the same quarter of the prior year, achieved profitability.

"For the past year we have been implementing a program designed to reduce expenses and improve the efficiency of operations for our veterinary supply stores. This program is being continued, and we are presently seeing the results of our past efforts," stated Carrothers.

Grain, transportation and other businesses were marginally unprofitable.

"However, these services allow other lines of our business to purchase and transport commodities at lower costs, assisting commercial feeds and custom feeding in achieving higher

income," he said.

"For the prior 12 months, cattle herd liquidation throughout the nation has been at an extremely high level, and the July-September quarter was no exception. This heavy cow and grass-fed slaughter has contributed to the supply of hamburger at the retail level to the point that it is now estimated that 40 per cent of all beef consumed is in this form," said Carrothers.

"This high level of hamburger consumption has had a very depressing effect on grain-fed beef prices and will continue to do so until herd liquidation decreases. It is our opinion that the current month of October and possibly November will be the peak of this grass-fed supply of cattle. We expect that in the ensuing months this supply will decrease to levels considerably below last year," he explained.

At the company's annual meeting of shareholders today, William C. Donnell, prominent West Texas rancher, was elected to the board of directors.

Mr. Donnell is very active in cattle industry organizations and affairs. He graduated from Texas A&M University and is recognized as one of the leading agriculturists in the entire Southwest, having received the Texas Man of the Year Award in Agriculture. He is a past president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and is currently serving as a director for that organization. He is also a current director of the American National Cattlemen's Association and the Texas Hereford Association.

"Because of his business and agriculture expertise, we expect him to make a significant contribution to our board," stated Carrothers.

Following the annual meeting, the board of directors declared a quarterly cash dividend of 5 cents per share on the company's common stock. The dividend is payable February 2, 1977, to shareholders of record as of January 17, 1977.

# Playoff Hopes Fade After Dimmitt Loss

## Fourth Quarter Is Fatal To Chiefs

The Friona Chieftains, District 3-AA leaders, were outlasted by Dimmitt Friday night, November 5 as the Bobcats clawed their way into a tie for first place.

The Chiefs were able to hold the Bobcats to a 14-14 tie until just under six minutes were left in the game. The Cats then rallied to score two touchdowns and take the important win.

Dimmitt's Thompson Mayberry gained 92 yards and two TDs while teammates Eddie Chavers and Tony Washington scored a touchdown each in the winning effort. The Chiefs' touchdowns came on runs by Glen London and Keith Martin.

"The kids played real good football," said Chieftain head coach Lonnie Phillips. "But Dimmitt has a good ball club. They really got tough when they had to and just flat whipped us."

The win moved Dimmitt into a deadlock with the Chieftains with a District 3-AA record of 2-0-2, while Friona was forced to accept their first loss in three district games as their loop record dropped to 3-1.

The game was very close all the way, with only about 20 net yards separating the two teams offensively.

Coach Phillips cited the defense as playing a very good game. "But in the last six minutes, they just broke down a little," he said.

The Chieftains are not out of it though, since a win against Olton will assure them of a co-championship, which is not a bad way to end a season.

Dimmitt took the opening kickoff, and behind good blocking, Larry Bossert ran the ball all the way to the Friona 20. Friona was penalized five yards for off-sides and three plays later, Eddie Chavers slid through the Chieftain's defense from the three yard line for the first TD of the game. Matt Howell kicked the extra point and the Bobcats were on top 7-0.

The ball changed hands four times the remainder of the quarter with neither team able to sustain a drive. Dimmitt was forced to punt just before the quarter ended and Friona took over their first possession of the second quarter from their own 30.

It wasn't long before the Chiefs got a drive underway with Glen London and Kelvin King as the workhorses. It looked as though the drive might stall as the Dimmitt defense read Keith Martin with a first and ten on the 17. The defense put the pressure on and threw Martin for a three yard loss.

The Bobcat defense again held tough as they stopped Kelvin King for only two yards the next play. The Chiefs would not give up and Martin rushed for eight yards on third and eleven. The handoff went to London on fourth-and-three as the Chieftains gambled on a power play. London broke through for a five yard gain to set the Chiefs up on the three yard line with a first-and-goal.

Two plays later, London took it in for the TD and the Chiefs were only out by one point. The point-after-try went wide and Dimmitt held their lead 7-6.

Friona converted three critical fourth down plays in Bobcat territory to keep the scoring drive going.

Friona took over on their own 38 after a 35 yard punt by the Bobcats. They too were stymied and with fourth-and-one, elected to punt. Edward Castillo's kick went for 38 yards to the Dimmitt 15. Dimmitt took over with 1:23 left in the half and moved the ball to their own 37 when time ran out with them leading 7-6.

Neither team was able to drive across any points until late in the third stanza. The Bobcats took the ball over on the Chiefs' 36 following a short punt. From there they drove 36 yards in six plays with Thompson Mayberry sneaking the ball across on a one yard plunge. Howell's point

after kick was good and the Bobcats led 14-6.

Friona got the ball with good field position following a 43 yard kickoff return by Keith Martin to the Chieftain 48. Friona took over there and drove to the Dimmitt 32 before time ran out of the third stanza.

After changing ends, it took the Chiefs only two plays before Martin turned a bootleg into a 26 yard scramble for paydirt. The Chiefs decided to try for two and Martin again took the ball, slipping around the right side of the line, he burst into the end zone to tie the ball game 14-14.

The TD only served to fire up the Bobcats, though, as they took the kickoff and clawed their way 86 yards for a touchdown and a six point lead. The PAT was good and they led 21-14.

Friona was stopped cold as they tried to move the ball from their own 10. Their drive moved them to the 18 when Martin was thrown for losses of three, five and two yards by a fired up Bobcat defense, forcing the Chiefs to punt.

Dimmitt, scoring on a well-executed bootleg play, and then running across the extra points to tie up the game at 14-all. However, Dimmitt came back for a 27-14 win.

But the punt never came, due to a high snap, and Edward Castillo tried to throw a pass, to no avail. Dimmitt took over on Friona's 13, and two plays later added an insurance touchdown.

The Bobcats scored on a 12 yard run by Mayberry to clinch a 27-14 win over district leader Friona. Friona and Dimmitt are now tied for first with Friona meeting Olton at home and Dimmitt traveling to Littlefield for their final district battles on Friday, November 12.

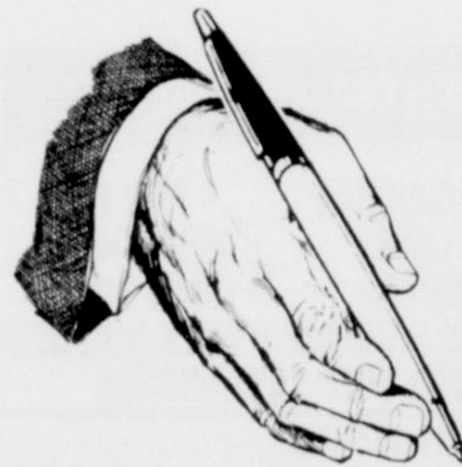

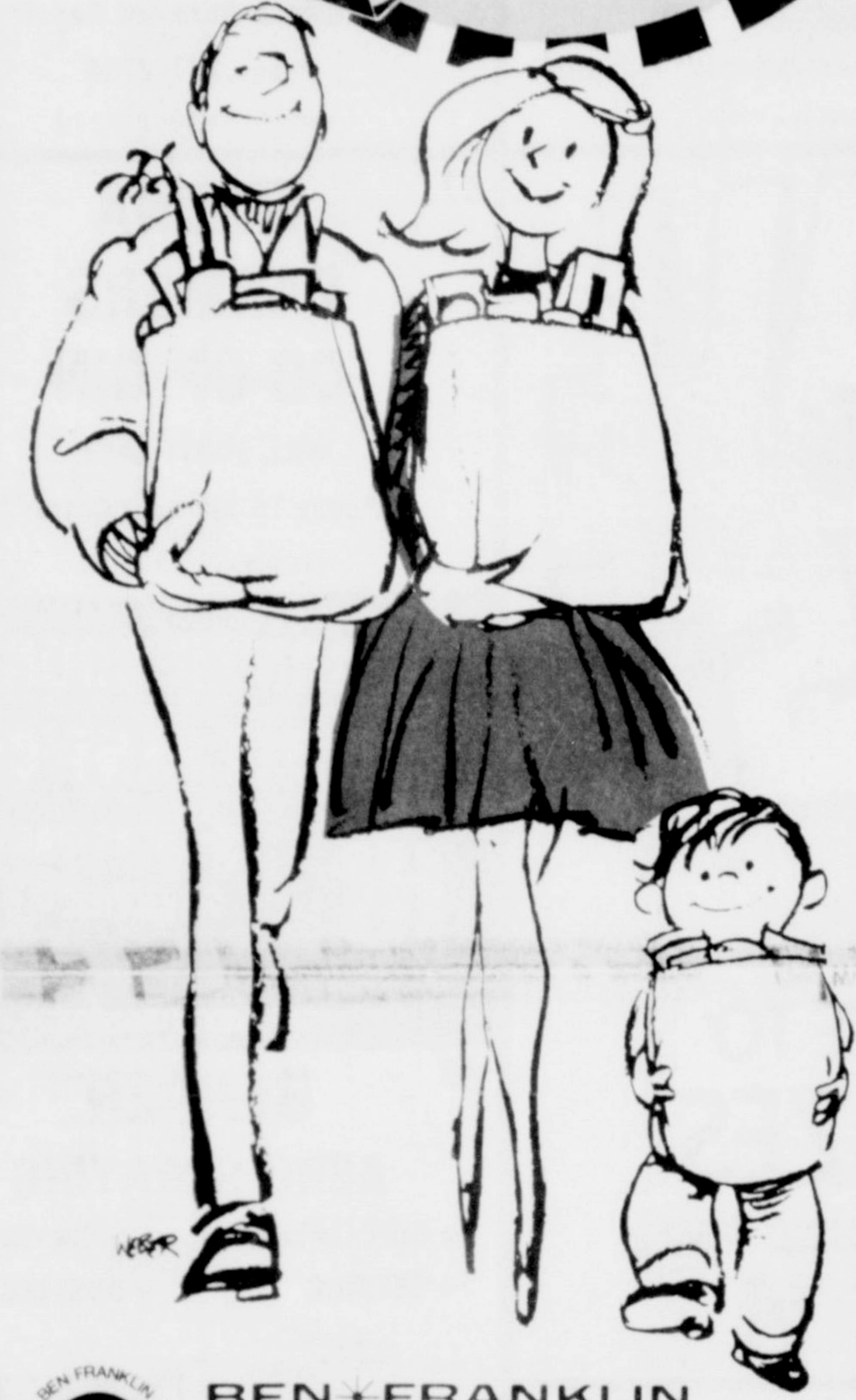
