## Change Announced For Flu Shot Days

A change in the schedule for the swine flu shots being given at Parmer County Community Hospital was appounced this week

tal was announced this week.

Beginning next week, the shots

will be available only on Saturday mornings, instead of the three clinics per week as had been offered for the past month or so. Dr. Paul Spring, spokesman for

Dr. Paul Spring, spokesman for the hospital, said that as of Thursday, a total of 1,050 adults had received the shots in Friona. The number getting the shots has dwindled to around 30 per clinic during the past couple of weeks.

"We still strongly recommend that people get the shots. We have had no severe reactions at all locally to the shots," Dr. Spring said.

He added that the "ideal time" to receive the shots was beginning to

weeks. The flu season will be upon us around Christmas, and it takes two to six weeks to develop a good immunity from the shot," he explained.

Dr. Spring said that he was not too disappointed at the number who had accepted the free shots, but still would like to see more people participate in the mass immunization program.

The monovalent type shot protects only against the swine flu strain. Bivalent shots, recommended for folks above 65, will protect against the regular flu as well as the swine

flu strain.

Remember--the shots will be available only on Saturdays, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon beginning next week.

## Scarecrows

The Brooks kids had a garden one year. Dad said it was high time we learned what it was like to raise a crop of our own. He marked off one corner of a field near our house and gave us the responsibility of choosing what to plant and taking care

We planted seeds and most of them came up. We watered and hoed and eagerly watched the plants as they bloomed and put forth their fruit. We especially watched the watermelons because that was our favorite thing to eat. Each vine had several nice ones and we could hardly wait until they would be ripe enough to pick.

One day as we were inspecting our crops we were dismayed to find that several melons had jagged holes in them. Sitting nonchalantly on the fence nearby was a couple of crows with rounded stomachs full of melon.

"A scarecrow will solve this problem." We took some boards and made a kind of cross. Using gunny sacks we made a body. My sister's knowledge of sewing came in handy for that. We slipped

the body over the cross and stuffed it full of wheat straw It looked really good, almost like a person except with no clothes. It needed a pair of overalls and a shirt we figured, along with a hat and some gloves. Mother said some of Dad's old worn out work clothes would be just fine so we had everything we needed.

We got him dressed and took him to the garden where we dug a hole to stand him up in. He looked good standing there guarding our melons but my sister said he wasn't quite finished. She ran to the house and came back with a face she made from white cloth and crayons. She stitched in it place on the burlap head and I had to admit it was just what he



## Low Cattle Prices Are Reflected

The sale of grain-fed income," he said. cattle at continued low prices was primarily responsible for the loss tries, Inc., in the first quarter of its fiscal year.

During the quarter ended September 30, 1976, the company sustained a loss of \$177,000, or 14 cents per share, on revenues of \$13 million, compared with net income of \$361,000, or 29 cents per share, on revenues of \$10.9 million in the same quarter of last year.

"Three lines of our agri-business operations-custom feeding, commercial feeds and animal health supplies-generated income. but it was not sufficient to offset the loss in the sale of company-owned cattle," said John G. Carrothers. president.

"Occupancy in our three feedvards, while still well below the past five-year average, was considerably better than the first quarter of last year, and custom feeding made the largest contribution to pre-tax income," he explained.

Commercial feed operations were also profitable. In the first quarter of last year the manufacture and sale of these products showed a loss. Revenues of the Hi-Pro feed mill were approximately 49 per cent higher this year when compared with the same quarter of last year.

Animal health supplies, which had a substantial loss in the same quarter of the prior year, achieved profit-

"For the prior 12 months, cattle herd liquidation throughout the nation has been reported by Friona Indus- at an extremely high level, and the July-September quarter was no exception. This heavy cow and grassfed slaughter has contributed to the supply of hamburger at the retail level to the point that it is now estimated that 40 per cent of all beef consumed is in this form," said Carrothers.

"This high level of hamburger consumption has had a very depressing effect on grain-fed beef prices and will continue to do so until herd liquidation decreases. It is our opinion that the current month of October and possibly November will be the peak of this grass-fed supply of cattle. We expect that in the ensuing months this supply will decrease to levels considerably below last year," he explained.

At the company's annual meeting of shareholders today, William C. Donnell, prominent West Texas rancher, was elected to the board of directors.

He graduated from Texas A&M University and is recognized as one of the leading agriculturists in the entire Southwest, having received the Texas Man of the Year Award in Agriculture. 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## Playoff Hopes Fade After Dimmitt Loss

## Fourth Quarter Is Fatal To Chiefs

The Friona Chieftains, District 3-AA leaders, were outlasted by Dimmitt Friday night, November 5 as the Bobcats clawed their way into a tie for first place.

The Chiefs were able to hold the Bobcats to a 14-14 tie until just under six minutes were left in the game. The Cats then rallied to score two touchdowns and take the important

Dimmitt's Thompson Mayberry gained 92 yards and two TDs while teammates Eddie Chavers and Tony Washington scored a touchdown each in the winning effort. The Chiefs' touchdowns came on runs by Glen London and Keith Martin.

"The kids played real good football," said Chieftain head coach Lonnie Phillips, "But Dimmitt has a good ball club. They really got tough when they had to and just flat whipped us."

The win moved Dimmitt into a deadlock with the Chieftains with a District 3-AA record of 2-0-2, while Friona was forced to accept their first loss in three district games as their loop record dropped to 3-1.

The game was very close all the way, with only about 20 net yards separating the two teams offen-

Coach Phillips cited the defense as playing a very good game, "But in the last six mintues, they just broke down a little," he said.

The Chieftains are not out of it though, since a win against Olton will assure them of a co-championship, which is not a bad way to end a

Dimmitt took the opening kickoff, and behind good blocking, Larry Bossett ran the ball all the way to the Friona 20. Friona was penalized five vards for off-sides and three plays later, Eddie Chavers slid through the Chieftain's defense from the three yard line for the first TD of the game. Matt Howell kicked the extra point and the Bobcats were on top

The ball changed hands four times the remainder of the quarter with neither team able to sustain a drive. Dimmitt was forced to punt just before the quarter ended and Friona took over their first possession of the second quarter from their own 30.

It wasn't long before the Chiefs got a drive underway with Glen London and Kelwin King as the workhorses. It looked as though the drive might stall as the Dimmitt defense read Keith Martin with a first and ten on the 17. The defense put the pressure on and threw Martin for a three yard

The Bobcat defense again held tough as they stopped Kelwin King for only two yards the next play. The Chiefs would not give up and Martin rushed for eight yards on third and eleven. The handoff went to London on fourth-and-three as the Chieftains gambled on a power play. London broke through for a five yard gain to set the Chiefs up on the three yard line with a first-and-goal.

Two plays later, London took it in for the TD and the Chiefs were only out by one point. The point-after-try went wide and Dimmitt held their

Friona converted three critical fourth down plays in Bobcat territory to keep the scoring drive

Friona took over on their own 38 after a 35 yard punt by the Bobcats. They too were stymied and with fourth-and-one, elected to punt. Edward Castillo's kick went for 38 yards to the Dimmitt 15. Dimmitt took over with 1:23 left in the half and moved the ball to their own 37 when time ran out with them leading

Neither team was able to drive across any points until late in the third stanza. The Bobcats took the ball over on the Chiefs' 36 following a short punt. From there they drove 36 yards in six plays with Thompson Mayberry sneaking the ball across on a one yard plunge. Howell's point

Friona got the ball with good field position following a 43 yard kickoff return by Keith Martin to the Chieftain 48. Friona took over there and drove to the Dimmitt 32 before time ran out of the third stanza.

After changing ends, it took the Chiefs only two plays before Martin turned a bootleg into a 26 yard scramble for paydirt. The Chiefs decided to try for two and Martin again took the ball, slipping around the right side of the line, he burst into the end zone to tie the ball game

The TD only served to fire up the Bobcats, though, as they took the kickoff and clawed their way 86 yards for a touchdown and a six point lead. The PAT was good and they led 21-14.

Friona was stopped cold as they tried to move the ball from their own 10. Their drive moved them to the 18 when Martin was thrown for losses of three, five and two yards by a fired up Bobcat defense, forcing the Chiefs to punt.

Dimmitt, scoring on a well-executed bootleg play, and then running across the extra points to tie up the game at 14-all. However, Dimmitt came back for a 27-14 win.

But the punt never came, due to a high snap, and Edward Castillo tried to throw a pass, to no avail. Dimmitt took over on Friona's 13, and two plays later added an insurance

The Bobcats scored on a 12 yard run by Mayberry to clinch a 27-14 win over district leader Friona. Friona and Dimmitt are now tied for first with Friona meeting Olton at home and Dimmitt traveling to Littlefield for their final district battles on Friday, November 12.

Friona dropped to number two in total offense after the Dimmitt game with an average of 17.4 points per game, and number three in defense, having been scored against for a

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


