



Star Lites

THERE APPARENTLY are two drives underway to build nursing homes in Parmer County, including the one which is well along in Friona.

Farwell residents have discussed the matter for some time, and have come up with a proposal to create a hospital district which would encompass the Farwell School District. The election would also authorize bonds in the amount of \$750,000, presumably for construction of a hospital and a nursing home facility.

Leaders in the nursing home drive locally have been aware of the movement at Farwell, and they emphasize that the local drive was not intended to compete with that one at all, even though it would appear that a certain amount of "overlap" would necessarily exist.

We are reminded that a few years back, political leaders from Farwell offered to work toward securing a portion of the county's public school funds for construction of a nursing home in Friona, if Friona would go along with the proposed new law enforcement center at Farwell. An oral agreement was made along that line.

(This is no "hearsay" report on our part, because we were a member of the Friona City Council at the meeting and were present at the meeting when the deal was offered.)

Somewhere along the way, the state attorney general ruled out the use of the funds for the nursing home. Meanwhile, plans were well underway for the enforcement center, which is now completed.

Farwell leaders apparently hope to "have their cake and eat it, too," since they are pushing for the successful conclusion of their drive, even though Friona already has approved its bond issue, and has its plans progressing smoothly for a nursing home here.

We suppose that in a sense, the fact that the state attorney failed to approve the proposed use of the funds for a nursing home may have given the Farwell leaders a loophole in the agreement, which was only oral to begin with.

However, there are certain drawbacks to Farwell's proposal, not the least of which is a qualified medical staff. But the residents of that area may figure these drawbacks out for themselves.

Also, the bonds being sought amount to 214 per cent more than were voted at Friona. And the people being asked to pass the bond issue are the school district taxpayers, who may find their school taxes doubled or tripled, depending upon which school finance program is ultimately approved in Austin.

So, it will be interesting to see how the Farwell voters react to the \$750,000 bond issue.

SPEAKING OF THE law enforcement center brings to mind that about this time last year we were pointing out how the City of Farwell relied entirely upon the county for its law business, not maintaining a city marshal, nor a municipal court of any kind.

Since then, and just this month, to be exact, the City of Farwell has created both a corporation court and a city marshal's position.

Ronald Mitchell, former city marshal in Bovina, has been employed as Farwell's first "city" lawyer.

Now, we won't presume to take all of the credit for Farwell's improved law setup, but it would seem strange that after some 70 years they suddenly realized they were without a city lawyer, wouldn't it?

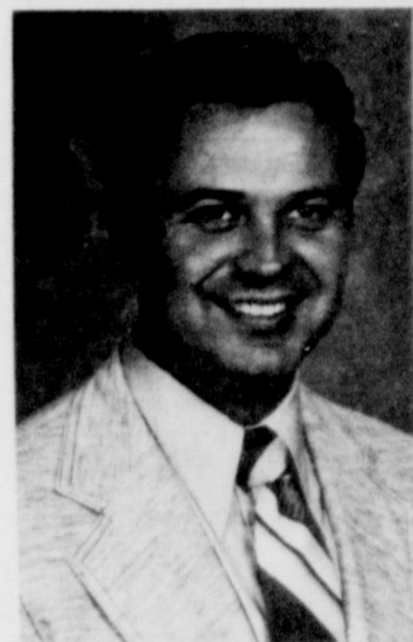
Also to be featured will be the salutatory address by Jeanine Jarboe and the class history by Pam Wilcox.

Mahon Slates Lunch Visit Here Tuesday

Congressman George Mahon will be in Friona on Tuesday, May 27, for a "get acquainted" luncheon to which all residents of the area are invited.

Mahon is expected to arrive in Friona about 11:45 a.m., after a coffee at Farwell from 10 and 11:15 a.m. He will visit with those attending prior to the lunch, and after the meal is expected to make some informal remarks.

Jerry Hinkle of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of Mahon's appearance here, said this week "We would like to stress that the luncheon is an informal affair. It won't be necessary for folks to dress up in order to come.

"We realize that farmers are busy at this time of year, and they are urged to come on to the lunch 'as they are,'" Hinkle said.

A lunch of pit-cooked barbecued beef, potato salad and cole slaw will be served. Hinkle said the Chamber had ordered 300 meals, which should adequately take care of those attending.

After his lunchtime visit here, the congressman is due for a coffee stop at Bovina's First State Bank beginning at 2 p.m., to visit with constituents in that area.

The Lubbock lawmaker, who has been the Congressman for Parmer County since it was added to the 19th Congressional District in 1972, is

visiting about the 17 county region during the Congressional Memorial Day recess.

Mahon's chief interests since he has been in Congress have been in the fields of agriculture and national defense. He is Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee which has extensive responsibility in

the funding of all federal programs.

Chairman Mahon is the author of a pending bill to provide additional funds for Farmers Home Administration operating loans. Although the measure is still pending in Congress, and it is unclear just when the additional funds will be available, the Congressman states that he is completely confident that they will be provided.

Congressman Mahon has expressed grave concern over the livestock situation. He is supporting the legislation which passed the House (Continued on Page 7)

Rains Dot Area With Regularity

Rain showers the past week have amounted to an official .90 inch in Friona, although the amounts received in the area has been somewhat more in places.

A thundershower last Saturday evening left an official .4 in town, and a repeat performance on Sunday measured .34 inches. Outlying areas reported over an inch for the two-day period.

A rare early morning cloud Thursday morning left .16 inch in Friona, but farmers to the west reported three-quarters of an inch, which was highly beneficial to wheat and young row crops.

"The wheat is the best we've had in years," said Hoyt Smith, who farms northwest of Friona. Smith indicated that the showers received during May had brought the wheat along real well. Harvest is about a month away.

Friona Flashbacks ...from the files of The Friona Star

45 YEARS AGO—MAY 30, 1930
A force of men arrived here and began work on the construction of the new Farmers' Elevator here this week. The work is progressing at a satisfactory rate and the manager in charge of the work proposes to have the building complete in time to receive the new crop of wheat when it comes in. The new elevator is being built on the south side of the track near the old one and will be owned and operated on the same plan.

40 YEARS AGO—MAY 31, 1935
In spite of the fact that it seemed that all wheat in this territory had been ruined by the wind and dust storms of the past several weeks, it now appears that there will be some wheat grown here if no unfavorable weather conditions arise. The good rain of two weeks ago has placed sufficient moisture in the land to admit planting of the spring row crops.

35 YEARS AGO—MAY 31, 1940
The Santa Fe Grain Company, under the direction of the manager, G. (Preach) Cranfill, is making extensive additions to its plant, which, when completed, will place Friona among the high-ranking grain buying cities of the Panhandle. The work now under construction, will add five larger metal storage bins to the company's storing capacity. Each bin will have a capacity of 20,000 bushels of grain, making a total capacity of 100,000 bushels.

30 YEARS AGO—MAY 25, 1945
So far as the growing wheat in this locality is concerned, the situation has already become serious from the long continued dry spell. Some farmers report that they have already plowed under a portion or all of their wheat crop, while others are talking of turning their livestock in on their wheat and thus reaping as much as possible from its pasture.

25 YEARS AGO—MAY 19, 1950
Victim of a freak explosion, Clyde Field, about 30 years old, is in the Parmer County Community Hospital, suffering painful injuries, cuts and bruises. The forefinger on the left hand was severed and part of another finger was cut off in Tuesday's accident. Field's left eye was injured but the damage is not believed to be permanent. As he and C.L. Mercer were walking along the country road from the pickup to their irrigation ditch,

Field unearthed a partially covered object about the size of a fountain pen. On closer examination, he took the top off the object. When he did, the unidentified missile exploded in his face. His condition was pronounced as painful but not critical. One theory is that the object was a detonator left by a seismograph crew that worked in that vicinity last year.

20 YEARS AGO—MAY 27, 1955
Coming to Friona to fill the position of grade school principal is Mr. Kenneth Fields who is a brother of Rev. C.M. Fields, pastor of the Friona Baptist Church. Fields began his teaching career in Sudan where he taught the eighth grade for two years. From there, he went to Farwell, where he served the past few years in the capacity of principal of the elementary grades.

15 YEARS AGO—MAY 26, 1960
Friona Lanes, Friona's newest addition to the skyline along Highway 60 will officially open their doors for bowling enthusiasts at 8 a.m. Friday morning. Members of the Friona Star and Plains Publishers staffs honored J.W. (Uncle John) White with a birthday party Monday afternoon. This "grand old man" of the Star was observing his 92nd birthday. He was the first editor and publisher of the Friona Star. The first issue was printed July 5, 1926.

10 YEARS AGO—MAY 27, 1965
J.W. (Uncle John) White quietly observed his 97th birthday on Sunday, May 23. The old gentleman, Friona's pioneer newspaperman, spent a quiet day with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Flippin, Jr. Friona Feed Yard, Inc. was a major attraction on the first day of a three-day tour of the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico area beginning Monday by a group of Englishmen who are members of Corn and Agricultural Merchants, Limited. There were sixteen men in the group.

5 YEARS AGO—MAY 28, 1970
Greenbugs have been found on small sorghum plants in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties, according to Jack King, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board research director. This is the earliest that greenbugs have been found on sorghum in the Plains since they first became a threat to the crop in 1968.

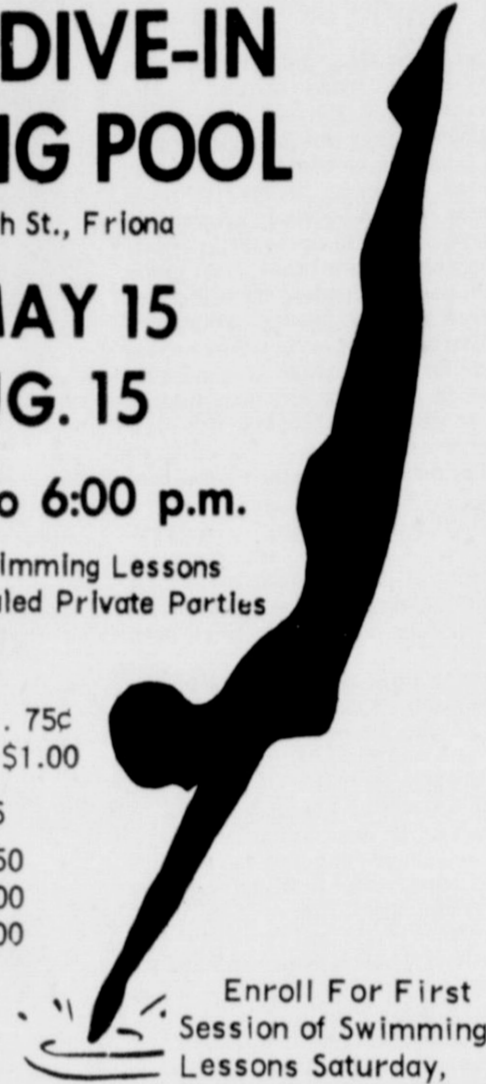

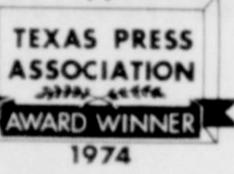

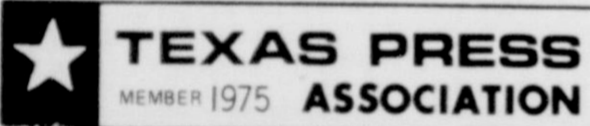

Cancer Society Issues Warning

American Cancer Society officials announced recently that it in no way endorses any commercial product. The Chairman of the Board of the Texas Division of the

ACS, Stanley Cole, said, "We want to make it clear that this applies to any type of insurance, especially cancer insurance." Cole, a San Antonio

insurance executive, said the Society feels the statement is necessary because an increasing number of insurance companies have been using ACS statistics in sales promotion literature. "The American Cancer Society has never authorized the use of its statistics or any educational film or printed literature for any commercial purpose," he said.

"There have been some reports," Cole stated, "of American Cancer Society educational films being used by agents in direct sales promotions. This is an absolutely unauthorized activity and we are asking people to report this sort of activity to the State Board of Insurance and the American Cancer Society if it continues."

"While the American Cancer Society assembles and publishes many statistics regarding cancer incidence," Cole said, "it should be pointed out that it is possible to save one in two cancer patients if people would do for themselves what they can, using available knowledge regarding early diagnosis and known effective treatment. "Our goal," Cole continued, "is to control cancer. The Society funds basic and clinical research, disseminates up-to-date diagnostic and treatment methods to physicians, provides community services and our volunteers provide many services and rehabilitation programs for the cancer patient."

Cole concluded, "The American Cancer Society is not in business to scare people, but to help people become knowledgeable enough so that more people will act promptly to protect themselves."

9 Accidents During April

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the

month of April, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1975 shows a total of 42 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 19 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1975 shows a total of 425 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 251 persons injured as compared to April, 1974, with 390 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 35 more accidents, one less killed, and 33 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 18 traffic deaths for the month of April, 1975 occurred in the following counties: four in Lubbock; two each in Bailey, Clay, and Garza; and one each in Hockley, Wise, Yoakum, Briscoe, Castro, Hartley, Ochiltree and Potter.





Benefits of air transportation to a community are not always well understood. General aviation airports will be examined in relation to community and county development goals.

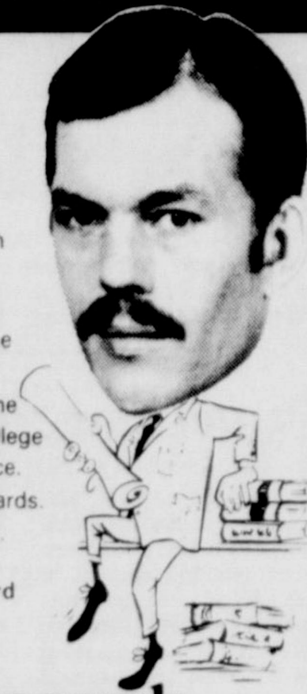

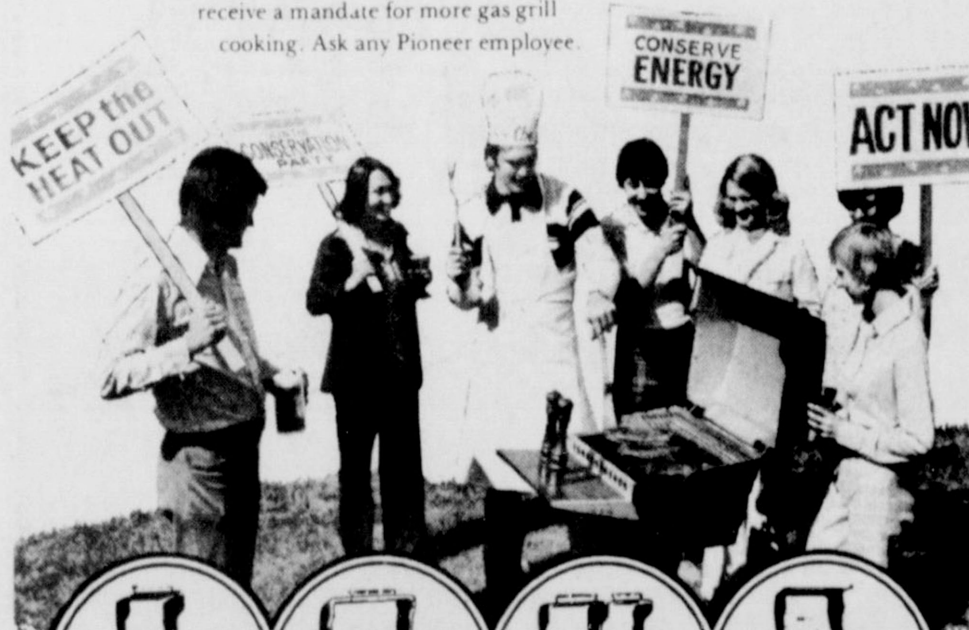

Safety Assn. Reminds Drivers To Buckle Up

The Texas Safety Association reminded motorists to make their Memorial Day travel sensible by buckling safety belts and observing speed limits.

The Memorial Day holiday period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, May 23, and ends at midnight, Monday, May 26.

The most important passenger protection feature in the American car today is the seat belt system, asserts TSA, yet it is estimated that less than 30 per cent of drivers wear lap and shoulder belts regularly. As a result, each year more than 14,000 persons die in highway crashes that would not have been fatal if the victims had been wearing safety belts.

TSA cited the National Safety Council estimate that

over 100 drivers could be saved over the upcoming holiday if they simply took the time to fasten their safety belts.

Speed is another key factor in traffic death and injury, points out TSA, noting that in 1974, state-wide traffic deaths decreased by 17 per cent. But in 1975, with compliance to the 55 m.p.h. speed limit apparently slipping, deaths are on the increase again. The latest Department of Public Safety report shows traffic deaths up 23 per cent so far this year.

Learning to deal with situations that cause accidents can help the driving public survive not only in holiday traffic but every day.



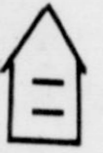

Modern jet combat aircraft have rocket ejection seats to save the pilot from almost certain death in a crash. So far, no one has proposed rocket seats for tractor drivers, but starting in 1976 all new tractors will afford the operator increased protection in a rollover.

Noting that tractor rollovers have accounted for some 125 deaths among Texas farm workers during the past five years, the Texas Safety Association today issued a reminder that the Occupational Safety and Health Administration has now officially adopted rollover protection standards for agricultural tractors.

The standard applies to all

agricultural tractors manufactured after October 25, 1976. After that date tractors of over 20 engine horsepower used in agriculture must be equipped with a seat belt and rollover protection structures which meet government performance requirements.

In addition, the standard requires that the employer assure that all employees use the seat belt and that employers enforce prescribed operating rules whether or not a rollover protective structure is required.

Unlike earlier proposals, the final standard exempts "low-profile tractors" while used in orchards, vineyards, hop yards and low clearance buildings. Also exempted

are tractors mounted with implements incompatible with the protective structure during these usages.

The new standards, adopted April 25, are included in a new Part 1228 of Title 29, Code of Federal Regulations, safety and health standards for agriculture. The Secretary of Labor designated the area of rollover protective structures a priority subject for a standard in appointing the Standards Advisory Committee on Agriculture in June, 1972.

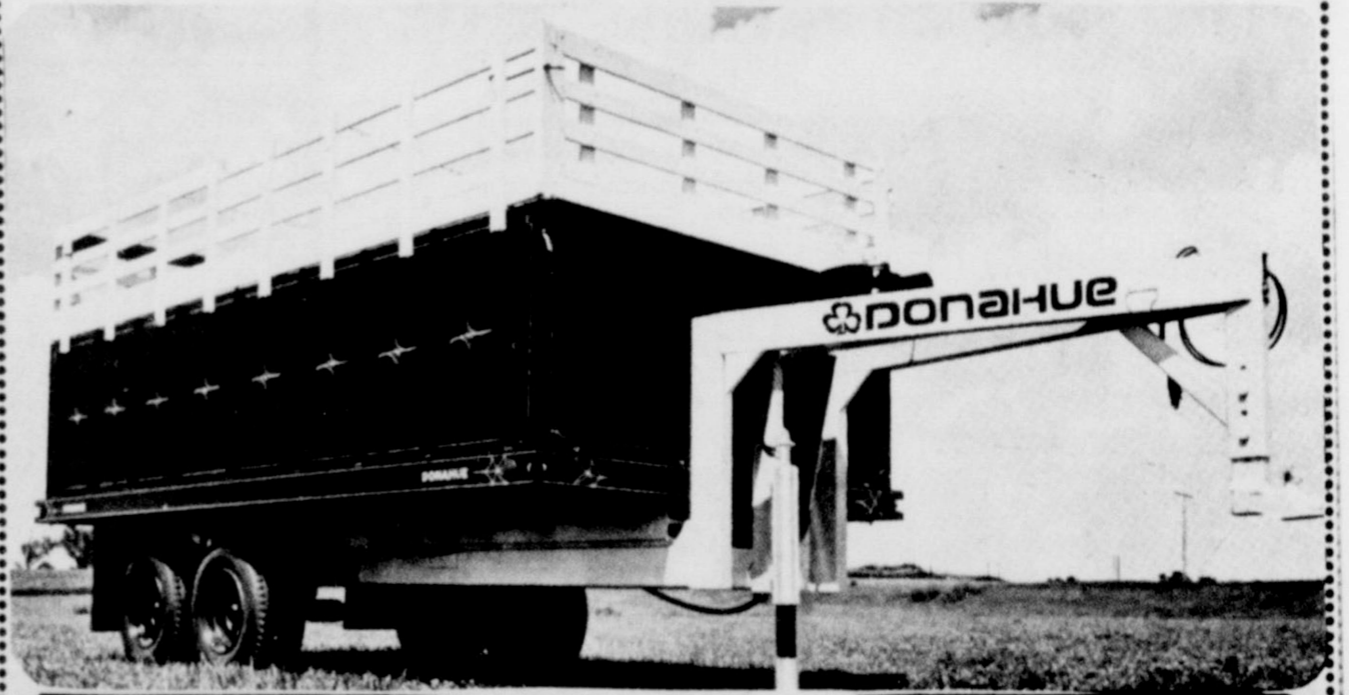

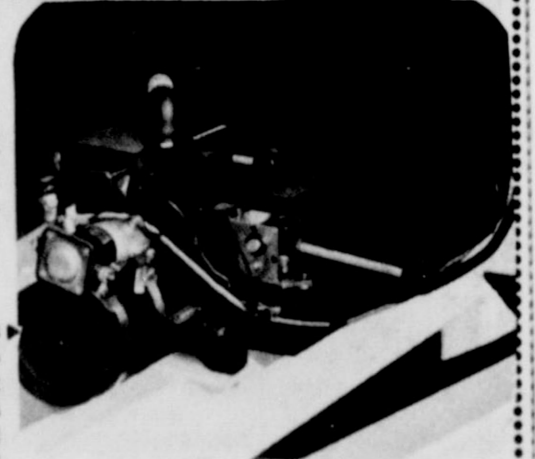

recently amending the Emergency Livestock Credit Act of 1974. Final enactment of the bill is expected shortly, but Mahon points out that its provisions will not be of maximum benefit to handle the serious situation in West Texas. However, he believes that the amendments will create a somewhat more liberal loan program which will be of assistance to some local cattlemen.

Mahon was active in the successful effort to secure a change in the regulations of the Farmers Home Administration and the Small Business Administration to increase the availability of credit to feedlots. FmHA officials have agreed to include cattle-feeding operations in their Rural Development Program.

The Congressman states that he is fully aware of the serious concerns of agricultural producers due to the rising costs of production and the instability of farm prices.

He joined in the effort to override the President's veto of the Emergency Agriculture Act feeling that passage of the legislation would introduce some stability into agricultural markets while encouraging increased production to aid both consumers and our national balance of trade.

Mahon encourages people in his District to contact him on national issues which concern them or on any problems they may have with the federal government.

"Old Mike" Story Was Personal To City Man

Many people may have read in the papers last weekend about the funeral home in Prescott, Arkansas that was forced to bury a man's body that had been "on display" at the mortuary for some 64 years.

The man, called "Old Mike" because he was unidentified, had been kept at first in the thought that he would be identified. It was reported that hundreds of visitors who had missing relatives came to see "Old Mike."

Friona resident Earl Jameson called this week to inform the Star that he had worked at the mortuary in Arkansas, and was very familiar with the "Old Mike" situation.

Jameson was employed at Cornish Funeral Home in 1945, 1946 and 1947. A brother, Ernest Jameson, worked for the firm about 30 years until he died in 1971.

Jameson substantiated news reports that Mike was the "town curiosity." He apparently served as a sort of tourist attraction for the town of about 4,000 people.

"Once during the war, they were having Army maneuvers in the area. Some of the soldiers heard

about 'Old Mike' and came by to see him. The next day, the whole battalion came over and lined up to see him," Jameson said.

Rather than being placed in a reclining position, Mike was displayed standing up. He had reddish hair and a moustache. About every six months, mortuary employees would change his clothes.

Although the reason the state embalmers association of Arkansas gave for burying "Old Mike" was for reasons of health, Jameson says he was petrified, virtually like wood.

"One time a museum in Oklahoma City tried to buy Mike from the Cornishes, but they wouldn't go for it. They figured it was illegal to sell a dead person's body," Jameson relates.

The Friona resident pointed out that the mysterious "mummy" had a full set of gold teeth, a rather unusual circumstance for a person who died in 1911.

Although the newspaper stories state that it was believed that Mike had been a bum or a drifter, Jameson reasons that he had to be a

person of means at one time, to have had a set of gold teeth.

At Home In Parmer County

Jana Pronger

WITH GARDENS in or going in now it's time to start thinking about food preservation and putting some of those good fresh vegetables and fruits up in the pantry or freezer, as they get really plentiful this summer.

Some of the containers and equipment you might like to start collecting now are: for canning—tempered glass jars (this is the kind with the glass company name stamped on the side), caps and lids to fit the jars. For processing one needs a pressure canner, pressure sauce pan or boiling water bath canner (this depends on the size jars and type fruit or vegetable to be processed). Other miscellaneous equipment you might like to use would be: jar lifter, funnel, vegetable brush, collander or wire basket and sauce pan. Also be sure to have pure, "pickling and canning salt" available.

For freezing one needs vapor-moisture proof containers. These could be tempered glass jars, plastic freezer boxes with tight lids or plastic bags. In preparation one would use general kitchen equipment such as a large kettle or sauce pan for blanching and knives and other utensils for general preparation.

++++
HERE'S SOMETHING else to remember when you start putting things in the freezer.

Guidelines for loading a freezer are simple and logical—designed to keep food rotating and the freezer temperature at 0 degrees, Mrs. Lillian Chenoweth,

family resource management specialist, said this week.

Be careful about adding too much "new" or unfrozen food at one time. The specialist advised that three pounds of food for every cubic foot of storage space is a reasonable addition.

Another way to determine the amount of food to freeze at one time is to add no more than 1-1 1/2 the capacity of the freezer. After this amount is put in, wait 24 hours before adding more, she recommended.

The specialist pointed out that for fast freezing, new food should be placed near the walls or bottom of either chest or upright types of freezers.

Keep similar foods together in baskets or on shelves. Foods also may be organized in heavy plastic or mesh bags.

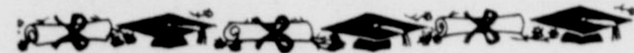

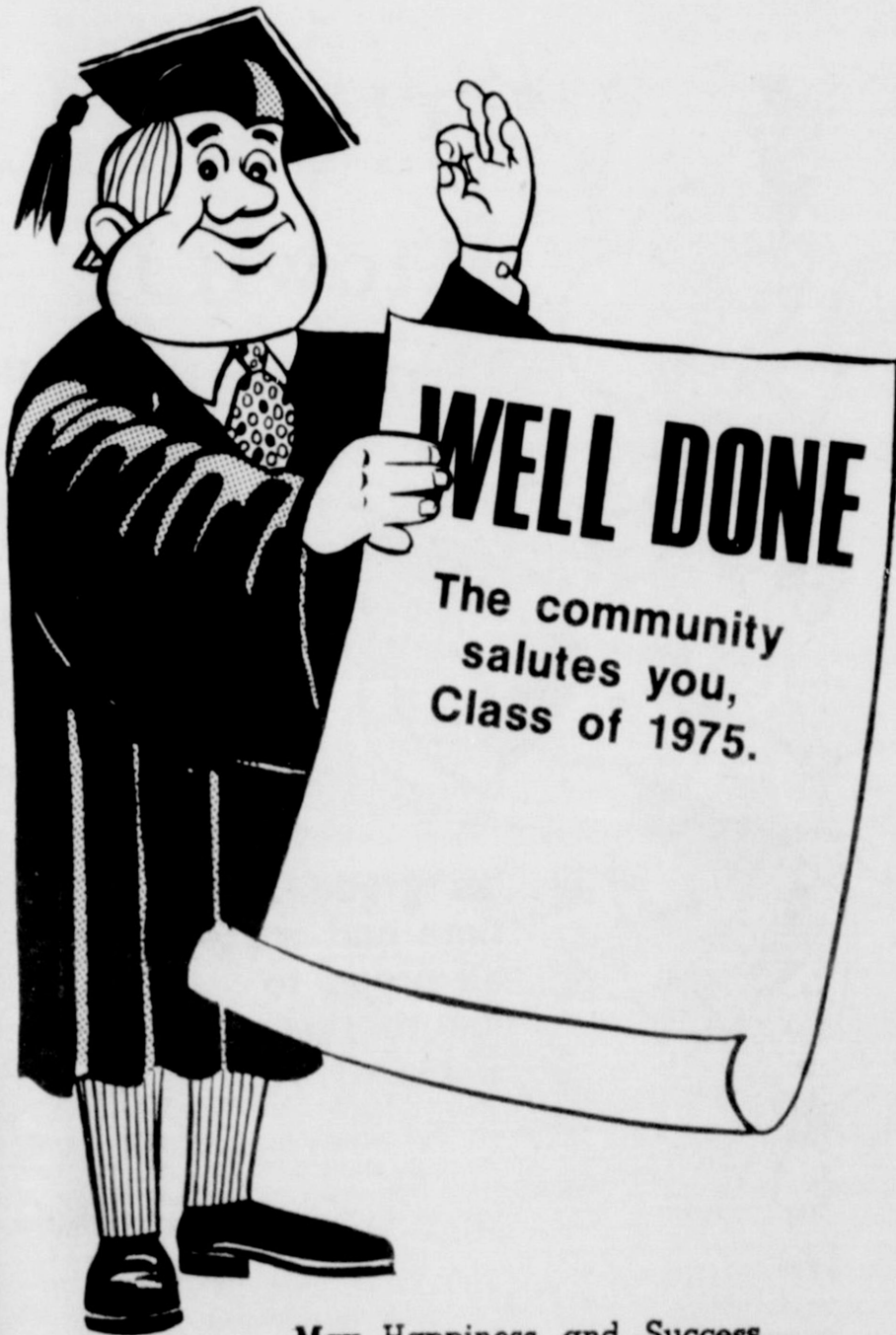

FHS won first place in seven events, to go with the win it had scored earlier in the one-act play competition.

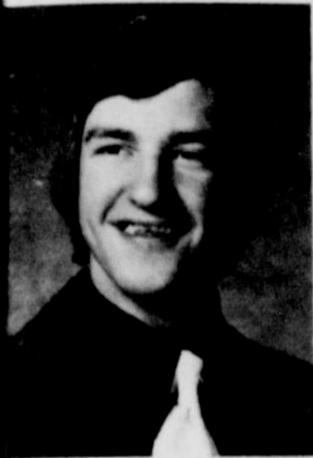
