**A THREAT** to the very base of our area's economy has been posed by the recent re-classification by the Federal Power Commission in Washington, D.C. irrigation gas, from a "commercial" priority to an "industrial" classification.

Apparently, under the classification of "industrial," irrigation gas usage can be severely limited, so much so as to threaten the area's ability to produce its abundant farm products.

"I am afraid the area's crop production may be severely hindered by this ruling," a Farmer County farmer told us this week.

The spokesman said he was afraid the farmer's hands were tied in the matter, and there might be little they could do to get the ruling reversed.

At any rate, this will come under discussion at the annual meeting of the Farmer County Irrigation Gas Users this Thursday at the Hub Community Center.

Everyone with a vested interest in agriculture (and this includes a lot of us) is urged to attend.

It would be a drastic situation if the use of natural gas for irrigation purposes were to be severely limited, not only for the immediate area, but for a wide section of the world, since the High Plains farmers produce a good percentage of the foodstuffs that go to feed our state and nation.

**IT HAS APPEARED** to us for the last few years that the government is out to put the farmer out of business. Don't know where they expect to get their food when they accomplish this.

First it was the cattlemen who were brought to their knees by the government "watchdogs." Now, it appears that the farmer is to be next in line.

This past year, farmers were forced to pay inflated prices for everything that went into producing their crops. They were put in a position of having to receive high prices for their crops, in order to come out.

Some few were lucky enough to get the prices they needed, but some did not, and a few are still holding their commodities.

If the farmer continues to be curtailed on his production, there may be some hungry folks around this old nation one of these days.

This is a good example of what we are talking about:

Come to find out, it represents a special code, which identifies the product, and gives its price.

In some large super markets in the metropolitan areas, special checkout equipment is used to read the codes on these packages, which in turn "rings up" the item automatically, with no chance for an error in the check-out process.

Bennett, 31, has been a member of the association for 11 years. He and his wife have two children. They own 220 acres and rent or lease an additional 1180 acres. He raises milo, cotton, soybeans and wheat, and runs around 160 head of cattle.

### James Andrews Wins National Contest

James Andrews, assistant band director for the Friona schools, was named first place national winner in the music composing contest sponsored by the College Band Directors Association and held last week at the University of California in Berkeley.

Andrews, whose composition "Sinfonietta for Winds and Percussion" was previously judged winner of the Southwest regional contest last August in Colorado Springs, won the top prize sought by six regional winners from across the country.

As an added feather in his cap, four of the other regional winners are college instructors, and another is a doctoral student.

Jim Gates of Bovina gave his school something to applaud when his heavyweight crossbred barrow was named reserve champion of the show.

In the steer show Friday night, Farwell claimed the grand champion banner for the fifth consecutive year, and seventh in the last eight

years when Mac Langford's entry in the "jumbo" division was tapped by the judge.

Reserve champion steer was entered by Gary Haseloff, another Farwell 4-H entry.

Other class winners in the steer division were Jim Gates, Bovina, mediumweight; Mickey Powell, Lazbuddie, welterweight; Mitchell Wiseman, Friona, light heavyweight and Joan Carson, Bovina, lightweight.

Lazbuddie showmen also swept the honors in the lamb show, winning all five breed trophies. These were by Mike Windham, fine wool; Tim Smith, fine wool cross; Mark Foster, other breeds; Russell Windham, Southdown and Tim Smith, medium wool.

Breed champions in the barrow show were exhibited by Gary Green, Chester White; Marty McGuire, Duroc; Mark Mimms, crossbreed; Russell Windham, Hampshires and Dave Engelking, Poland China. All are from Lazbuddie.

The event was held in the new showbarn for the second time, and the building began to pay dividends when a weather change blew in on Friday, and the sale day started out on a cold, misty note.

basketball, failed to score a field goal, and came out of the fray with only two free throws on the offensive side of the ledger.

Hutson, meanwhile, canned 20 points, to lead the team in scoring for the second straight game. It was the 5-11 blonde's field goal with 37 seconds left that sent Friona ahead to stay in the hard-fought contest, 55-53.

King, a low scorer, proved that he really is "Basketball King," a title bestowed upon the 5-10 senior guard two weeks ago, by canning a pair of crucial free throws with seven seconds remaining to ice the game, giving Friona a 57-53 lead.

Clark came off the bench to score ten points, six quick ones in Friona's big 23-point second quarter, and helped with timely rebounds and a steal. "Clark's play was definitely a big difference," stated Chieftain coach Larry Dyess, admitting that the win Friday was the biggest in his short career as a head coach.

The game was witnessed by approximately 1900 rabid basketball fans, as two rows of chairs were added at floor level—first time ever in Chieftain Fieldhouse.

Dale Cleveland, who played after being slowed last week by a slight case of flu, scored 12 points, five below his average, but dominated the defensive boards like he owned them. Cleveland pulled down 19 rebounds, to pace Friona to a 35-28 edge over the Bobcats in that important category.

The Chieftains held leads of five points twice during the opening period, and had a pair of six-point leads during the second quarter, including the halftime edge of 35-29.

But the Bobcats battled back, tying the score in the third quarter at 37-37, and taking momentary leads of 39-37, 41-39 and 43-41. But the Chiefs answered the challenge and Dimmitt never led in the final quarter, although Friona never had more than a four-point lead.

Dimmitt controlled the ball in the first quarter, and got on the scoreboard first when Jim Birdwell sank one of a two-shot free throw effort.

Hutson made his first of ten baskets with 6:20 registering on the clock, and Friona was ahead 2-1. He

## Gas Rationing For Irrigation Probed

The possible "rationing" of natural gas for irrigation purposes by the Federal Power Commission will be the main topic as the Farmer County Irrigation Gas Users hold their annual meeting Thursday, February 20.

The meeting will be held at the Hub Community Center, beginning at 8 p.m.

"The shortage of all fuels, and particularly the increased demand for natural gas, has placed the use of natural gas for irrigation in jeopardy," stated Pete Jesko, president of the Gas Users Assn.

The Federal Power Commission, in an opinion dated December 19, 1974, changed the classification of irrigation gas from a Number 2 priority, which is classified as "commercial" use, down to a Number 3 priority, which is classified as "industrial" use.

"Admittedly, no evidence was heard by the commission as to the impact on agriculture that such a

Clay Bandy sank a pair of free shots to attain an 18-17 lead, and Clark, in for Hutson, got a jump shot inside the circle for another five-point lead, 24-19.

Clark again made his turn-around jumper 3:08 before halftime, and Friona had its first six-point lead at 27-21. Dimmitt rallied for a two-point deficit, but Clark responded by ripping the net from the corner at 1:38 for a 31-27 edge.

King then made two free shots, and Hutson canned his jumper for the 35-29 edge that became the halftime score.

The Chieftains had bombed the nets for nine of 15 field goal shots in the second period—a torrid 60 per cent, to finish the first half shooting at 47 per cent, 14 of 30.

The beginning of the third quarter has been a bad time for the Chiefs all season, and Friday was no exception. The team missed its first four field goal attempts, and seven of its first eight shots, while Dimmitt was outscoring the home team, 10-2 to start the second half.

It was Clark that started the scoring for Friona at 5:22, but his goal was wedged among five by the visitors as Dimmitt took a 39-37 lead.

Hutson sparked an offensive revival with a pair of baskets to knot the score at 39 and 41-all, and his third straight bucket gave Friona a 43-43 tie as the third quarter ended.

Friona got the tip to start the vital fourth quarter, and Cleveland tipped home his own missed shot for a 45-43 lead.

Hutson's shot from the corner gave Friona a 47-43 lead, but Williams sank a long set shot, and after McKee stole a King pass, Williams got an easy layup to knot the score at 47-all at 5:36, and prompt a time out by Coach Dyess.

King hit his only field goal of the game 20 seconds later, and Bandy

The leaders of the Farmer County Gas Users Assn. will attempt to secure the support of all irrigation farmers in the county to retain the use of natural gas for irrigation.

New officers will also be elected at the meeting. District officers are expected to be present, along with the association's attorney, John D. Aiken, to give a current report on the status of the classification of irrigation gas.

At a meeting in Plainview on February 3, Carl Schlenker of Friona was elected secretary-treasurer of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Assn.

**45 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 21, 1930**  
The building committee of the Methodist Church met Thursday night and adopted plans for the new Methodist Church building. It is to be a three-story brick building, containing 14 rooms besides the auditorium. The auditorium, including the balcony, will seat about 500 people and the general dimensions will be 42 by 74 feet, and the cost will be between \$12,000 and \$14,000.

**40 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 22, 1935**  
The Parmer County basketball tournament held here the latter part of last week was, in all respects, the most satisfactory tournament that has ever been held in Parmer County. The local teams, both the Chiefs and the Squaws, won the championship of the county by good safe scores, and will be thus entitled to represent the county in the district tournament.

**35 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 23, 1940**  
The local highway leading into Friona from the north on the west side of the city is now receiving a substantial caliche surfacing, the work being done by WPA workers of the county. It is proposed to extend the surfacing to a distance of three miles north. This will be a decided help to traffic from that part of the territory.

**30 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 23, 1945**  
The Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster has been awarded to Staff Sgt. Roy E. Hughes, and the decorations will be sent to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Buford Hughes, according to word received here last week from the Air Force.

**25 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 17, 1950**  
The \$93,000 sewer system was completed in Friona this week, finishing a project which was started by passage of a bond issue in June of 1946. Completion of the new system should pay big dividends to the estimated 1550 Friona residents.

**20 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 18, 1955**  
Construction has commenced on a cotton gin located one-half mile west of Hub, the owners announced this week. To be known as the West Hub Gin, the firm is to be headed by Leo Ruzicka, manager. The gin expects to be completed in March. The project is reported to involve about \$210,000.

**15 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 18, 1960**  
Funeral services for Mrs. F.L. Reed, a resident of Parmer County the past 52 years, were conducted from the Friona Methodist Church at 4 p.m. Saturday. Needing a victory to enter the district playoffs against Tulia, the Friona Squaws soundly defeated the Canyon girls, 83-48 last Friday night.

**10 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 18, 1965**  
A colored man died, apparently from exposure early Sunday morning in a Friona street. Patrolman Travis Clements, who investigated after a call was received by the police department, discovered the man's body at Fourth and Prospect. Officers are investigating.

**5 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 19, 1970**  
Members of the Chamber of Commerce, the city manager and publisher of the Friona Star met with representatives of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest Tuesday at noon, and discussed possible additional telephone service for Friona. One of the things discussed was the possibility of connecting Friona and Bovina for dialing purposes, with no toll or long distance charges.




### Set This Month

The levels of disease protection in Texas among two-year-old children will be known in a few weeks as a result of a state wide immunization survey conducted in February by the Texas State Department of Health. According to Doctor M.S. Dickerson, director of the Bureau of Communicable Diseases Services in Austin, the survey will be undertaken to determine the levels of protection against polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, lock jaw, measles, rubella and mumps.

In Amarillo interviewers from the State Immunizations Division at 1015 West 8th will collect data from the 25-county Texas Panhandle Health Region. Histories of diseases and immunizations will be recorded from a sample of 300 children. Interviewers will call on 300 families during February. It would be helpful if parents would keep the children's immunization records readily available for the survey.




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

It also appears a bit hypocritical to condemn vice and immorality and other "social maladies," only to go home and take pleasure in someone performing these same things for us in our living rooms, via TV. These things appeal to our carnal nature, but appall the spiritual nature. Almost three thousand years ago a concerned king spoke up and said "I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes." (Ps. 101:3) May we God fearing Americans learn to follow his example.





made a timely steal to set up a hook shot by Clark that made it 51-47. Friona, with 4:07 left in the ball game.

The Chiefs missed a couple of shots, and Dimmitt took advantage to tie the score again at 51-all with just 2:55 left on the clock.

Hutson got his ninth basket with 2:31 remaining for a 53-51 lead, but Myatt tied it up at 51-22 after Cleveland fouled the big post center trying to prevent him from scoring a layup.

The Chiefs worked the ball around deliberately for almost a minute, before Hutson saw his shot and canned it from outside for a 55-53 lead with 37 ticks left on the clock.

The Bobcats came down court. Birdwell's shot bounced high off the rim, and Cleveland used all his remaining strength to claim the errant shot for the Chiefs as only 23 seconds remained in the big game.

After a time out, Friona took their time working the ball upcourt, and tried to stall it out but King was finally fouled with seven seconds left. Dimmitt called time to give Dee a chance to worry about the shot. It might have been a two-shot foul, but officials ruled it a 1-1 when play was resumed.

Dee made the all-important first shot, and then added the second one for good measure. The other four Chieftains all but left the floor, letting Williams make an uncontested layup for the final margin of 57-55.

"I was kinda weak," said a tired but happy Dale Cleveland following the game. Dale had missed school on Monday, and was used sparingly in the lop-sided win over Olton on Tuesday. He had been on medication most of the week.

"This is our chance to go back to the 'Big City,'" said Clark, who has started only a few games this season but has averaged almost a point per minute when he has seen action. Clark is the team's leading free throw shooter, but didn't make it to the line Friday.

The Chieftains shot a respectable 40 per cent from the field, paced by Hutson's 63 per cent (10 of 16) and Clark's 62 per cent (five of eight).

Officials called 15 fouls on the 'Cats and 17 on the Chiefs. Strickland had three fouls at the half, which added to his frustrating game, and got his fourth 1:25 into the final quarter, which sent him to the bench in favor of Clark.

The lead changed hands nine times, and the score was tied on nine other occasions.

The game was undoubtedly the best Valentine's Day present the team could have given to their many fans. Some 1900 folks will never forget the great "St. Valentine's Day Battle." It was everything fans had expected.

Some confusion was caused at the scorer's table in the early part of the game because Dimmitt had entered the wrong uniform numbers for Williams, Myatt and Danny Vaughn. It could have cost technical fouls, but officials ruled Dimmitt had not made the mistake purposely.

The Squaws missed their first seven shots from the field, as the Fillies opened up a 9-2 lead after five minutes of play. A pair of free shots by Terri Patterson were Friona's only points during this time.

But Miss Patterson connected on a set shot, a lay-up and two jump shots before the period ended, completing a three-point play on the lay-up, and that gave Friona an 11-9 lead as the first quarter ended.

But Friona couldn't hold the lead. Miss Patterson gave Friona two more leads at 13-11 and 15-13 after Olton tied the score, but when Donna Hodges connected on a jump shot with five minutes remaining before halftime, the Squaws had held their last lead.

Making matters worse for Friona was the fact that Miss Patterson, this scoring mainstay, collected her third and fourth fouls within a two minute period, the last one coming with 4:12 remaining in the half, and she had to slack off for the rest of the game. The score at the point of Terri's fourth foul was 19-17, Olton.

## Coldness Stymies Squaws' Title Bid

A fantastic cold spell by the Squaws here Tuesday ruined the team's hopes for the district title without a playoff, as Olton made off with a 51-43 win to nail down the second half title in District 3-AA.

# Chiefs Stage Great Rally, Top Morton

The Friona Chieftains fought their way to a hard-earned 65-62 win at Morton last Friday, partially avenging two previous losses to the Indians on their home court, and keeping pace with Dimmitt in the second half district race.

The win must rank as one of the greatest come-from-behind performances by a Friona High School sports team in history. Even more impressive was the fact that it was accomplished on the Indians' home court—a place Friona held only one other varsity win in their past ten tries.

A fantastic fourth-quarter rally accomplished the trick, after Morton had held the lead for more than three quarters. Friona had never led until a "five point play" with 6:35 remaining in the game.

Up until that point, the Chieftains had trailed, except for an early 2-2 tie, by as many as 11 points, and as late as 4:14 into the third quarter.

But the team never gave up, and battled back for the "must" win, which kept them in the running for a shot at the district title.

The first half was a bit frustrating for the Chiefs, who hit 53 per cent of their shots (16 of 30), but still were trailing by three at halftime, 40-37 to the hot-shooting home team.

Although playing without their tall post-center, Mike Williams, the Indians hit the floor determined to bounce back from their previous game loss to Dimmitt.

Led by the shooting of Ken Standmire (20) and Ray Dean Thompson (30), the Indians bolted to an 18-10 lead with only 1:22 left in the opening quarter. Standmire and Thompson were hitting every shot they put up.

Friona had gained a tie only at 2-2 on Gene Strickland's layup shot.

Strickland's three-point play at 1:07 and another basket a moment later trimmed the Morton lead to three at 18-15, and his shot from the corner kept the Chiefs within three at the first quarter buzzer, 20-17.

Strickland, who connected on six of his first seven shots from the field, made another jumper to start the second quarter, to trim the Morton lead to one, 20-19. However, the Chiefs hit a momentary cold spell while Morton hit one of their hot flurries, and the Indians suddenly had a ten-point lead at 30-20, only 1:30 into the second quarter.

Morton kept their ten-point edge at 32-22, but Strickland and Dale Cleveland each scored a pair of baskets, one of Cleveland's coming on a steal and an easy lay-in, to trim the margin to two at 34-32.

Cleveland's three-point play 28 seconds before halftime trimmed the lead to one at 38-37, but Standmire's jump shot in the last ten seconds made it 40-37, Morton, at the half.



Scoring 14 second half points, Hutson dogged the Olton offense all night, making numerous steals and setting up easy Friona points on the fast break.

The win was number 27 for the Chieftains, one short of the school record they set last year, and set up the "big shootout" with Dimmitt.


The Heart Fund Drive will be conducted in Friona next week, February 17-22. The drive this year is being conducted by 18 members of the National Honor Society at Friona High School.

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# City Tables Phone Rate Hike Request

After approximately 50 minutes of discussion, during which members of the council discussed discrepancies in the telephone service locally, along with several members of the audience at the meeting, a motion was passed that the request be tabled until more satisfactory service is secured locally.

Rad Richardson, district manager for the telephone company, presented the request. He also reported that the completion of the city's automatic dialing system would be made around February 27. After this date, residents aren't expected to have to give their numbers on calls which are dialed direct.

In other business, the council passed a resolution authorizing Friona State Bank as a depository for the city's general obligation bonds.

The proposed extension of the contract with Jake Diel Dirt and Paving Company for the city's annual street sealcoating program, to include 21 blocks, one alleyway and three-foot aprons on ninth street in Western Addition was approved at an estimated cost of \$9,917.50.

Fallwell Floor Covering of Friona was awarded the bid on installing carpet and floor mat for the front office of City Hall. Fallwell submitted the low bid of \$1,401.85.

A resolution and order for the city election on April 5 was approved.

Chamber of Commerce members presented the council an alternate park plan for Reeve Lake Park Area, to include a four-foot level parking area directly south of the community center and Boy Scout buildings, which would require considerable dirt work.

A new street light was authorized to be installed from property owners.

A notation was received concerning the pending rate adjustment in cost of operating the city's street light service, along with the monthly gas rate adjustment from Pioneer Natural Gas Company.

## Residents Urged To Help Combat Burglary

"One of our main jobs as law enforcement officers is to act as professional Consultants Against Crime and to offer security advice based on our specialized training," explained Denney. "We'd rather prevent crimes from ever happening, and many of our services are directed toward this goal."

"Take our security surveys. At the request of a manager or proprietor, we'll send a trained crime prevention officer to examine a place of business thoroughly and recommend ways to make it more secure."

According to Denney, the best results are achieved when all the businesses in a neighborhood participate in the crime prevention program, so that the neighborhood gets to be known as a high risk area for burglars.

"Crime is largely a matter of opportunity. When a businessman reduces the opportunity for crime, he reduces his chances of becoming a victim," Denney concluded. "Of course, we're here to help, but it's up to the individual to take that first step and call us."

"Crime doesn't pay; it costs, particularly when it comes to businesses," cautioned Bill Denney of the Friona crime prevention unit.

"Burglary, robbery, shoplifting—they all mean loss or damage to property, the risk of insurance rate increases, and untold man-hours spent dealing with the crime after the fact," Denney continued. "It makes much better sense to keep crimes from happening in the first place, to decrease the opportunity for crime."

As more and more Friona business people are realizing, crime prevention can be far less costly than the damages incurred by becoming a victim even once. Expenditures for security hardware, such as adequate lights, effective locks, and a good alarm system, should be considered an investment. In fact, many crime prevention measures cost nothing but a little time, some attention to detail, and the individual advice the Friona Police Department provides free of charge to members of the business community.

## Easter Seal Appeal Kicks Off On Monday

The Easter Seal Representative is the person to contact to request services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

Last year 20,152 handicapped people received help from the Texas Easter Seal Society. With the costs of providing expert professional care rising, more money than ever will be

needed to assist more disabled Texans and remain ahead of inflation.

Funds help support professional treatment centers in Texas, where services are provided to those crippled children and adults who cannot provide for themselves and who do not

qualify for help from any other source.

"The people of Texas have always responded generously to helping the handicapped and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year," Jones said.

## School Needs Names Of New 1-K Students

Parents of children who will attend kindergarten in 1975-76 are asked to call elementary principal J.T. Gee to register their child.

"We need to know how to make plans for textbooks, and materials," said Tom Jarboe, superintendent of schools.

Children who will be eligible to attend next year must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1975. Also, the school needs to have the names of children

who will be in the first grade next school term but did not attend kindergarten here this year. This applies to children who will be six on or before Sept. 1, 1975.

## VA Offers Tips On IRS Returns

Here are tips from the Veterans Administration on federal income taxes for veterans filing returns.

In general, Texas VA officials noted, veterans benefits are exempt from federal income tax, and need not be reported as income.

**This income tax exemption applies to individuals and proceeds from government life insurance policies, but federal estate tax does apply to insurance proceeds. Also, interest earned on government life insurance**

**dividends left on deposit or credit with VA is considered income and must be reported on federal income tax returns, it was explained.**

Among major tax exempt veterans benefits are compensation, pension, GI Bill and other educational assistance, including subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees.

Also exempt are grants to service disabled veterans eligible for specially adapted homes and cars, and clothing allowances for

veterans whose prosthetic devices tend to wear out or tear their clothing, VA officials advised.

economics at Texas A&M and Ralph Tabor of Washington, D.C.



**USDA Releases Grass Report**

Barnyardgrass, also called watergrass, can be controlled in irrigated sorghum fields with a combination of herbicides and cultivation, according to Dr. A.F. Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientist at the USDA Research Center near Bushland. Results of a three year research effort were presented at the Weed Science Society of America Meeting on February 6 in Washington, D.C.

"Farmers occasionally complain that herbicides won't do the job," Wiese stated, "but nine times out of ten the rate of application was too low." He hastened

to point out that if it does not rain between herbicide application and the first furrow irrigation most herbicides will fail.

Studies were conducted from 1971 to 1973 on the Harvey Garrison Jr. farm near Dumas. Garrison noticed effective treatments in 1971 experiments, and by 1974 his four sections were free of barnyardgrass. Wiese stated that the most consistent treatment was two to three pounds per acre of Milogard applied pre-plant followed by a pre-emergence treatment of Milogard at one to two pounds per acre. Milogard at three pounds per acre pre-emergence was the next best treatment. Milogard applied three pounds per acre pre-plant and incorporated with a rolling cultivator also did a good job.

Effective short residual pre-emergence herbicides were Igran, Lorox mixed with Milogard and Ramrod mixed with Milogard. Wheat can be double cropped after sorghum on fields where Igran is used. After using short residual herbicides some barnyardgrass came back in August, but grain yields were not reduced. "Applying Milogard pre-plant or one of the pre-emergence herbicides and cultivating the young sorghum is the most practical approach," Wiese stated, "but if grass shows up after a rain or first irrigation AATrex can be applied post-emergence to one inch grass." If it doesn't rain in a week, control from AATrex will be increased by incorporation. Using this system may save some money because AATrex doesn't have to be purchased unless weeds emerge.

"However," Wiese concluded, "saving money by not using enough herbicide is false economy. Doing a good job of controlling barnyardgrass increased sorghum yields from 1600 to over 5000 pounds per acre in one study."


## Little League
