Star Lites By Bill Ellis

LAST SATURDAY'S experiment by President Ford in visiting by telephone by some 42 folks in a two-hour session broadcast on CBS radio was a bold venture by the new president. Perhaps it helped to reinforce Carter's image as a "people's president."

The president was asked a good many questions by the callers that he hears in press conferences, plus several that weren't among the most asked.

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THOSE WHO HEARD the broadcast may recall that when the program was kicked off, technical difficulties were encountered in broadcasting with the elaborate telephone equipment that had been installed. That must have been an embarrassment to the telephone company.

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A caller from Wisconsin asked the president: "As the wife of a dairy farmer, what can be done about improving the public relations between the consuming public and the U.S. Agriculture Department in regard to the price increases for farm commodities and an explanation to the public that we as farmers receive only a small amount of these widely acclaimed increases?"

Carter's reply was that by putting a farmer into the White House, and an actual dirt farmer in as Agriculture secretary, two steps to solve the problem had been taken. Then, he said the American public needs to be told the truth about agriculture and the farm and ranch families of the nation, as to how to have a stable farm economy with predictable production and prices that don't fluctuate wildly.

A 13-year-old caller, John Herald of California, asked the president: "Why not ship from the East to the drought-stricken West?"

Carter replied "I think somebody found that it would be too expensive to ship snow to the West. I believe that in the future we're going to have to start worrying about water conservation as well as energy conservation."

Mrs. Esther Thomas of Pennsylvania asked the president "How can we as middle class earners expect legislation or reforms that would remove tax loopholes the rich use as deductions when all the legislation is made by the rich? There are no poor people, no lower-class wage earners in either the house or the senate."

Mrs. Richard Nicholson of Fort Worth told the president "I feel that you are violating the states' rights when you call in to the different states and lobby for the ERA (Equal Rights Amendment). I was wondering if you don't think that this should be left up to the individual state legislators?"

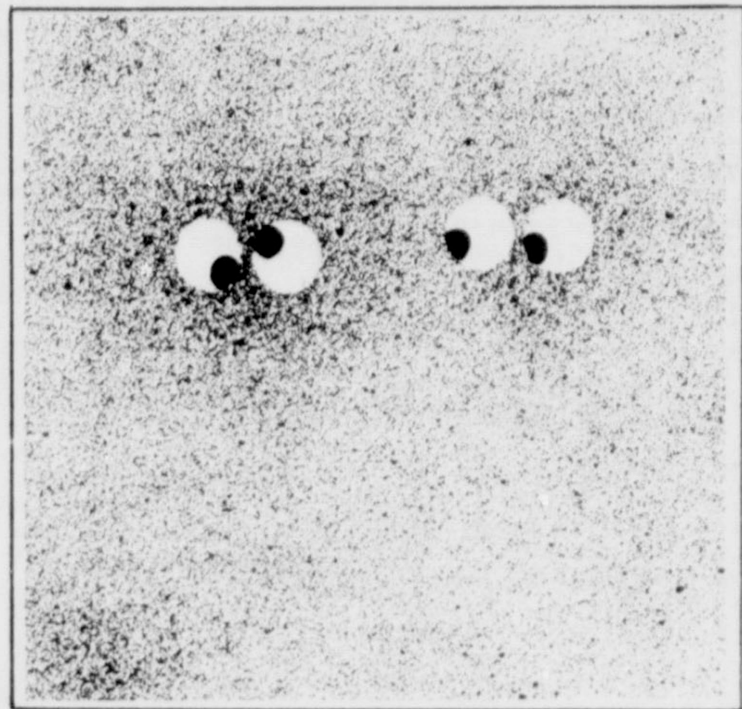
Carter said "Well, I think you probably have noticed that the final decision is with the state legislators, and although I have made a few telephone calls since I've been in office and have talked to some personally and to some governors about the passage of ERA. I haven't tried to interfere or put pressure on them. When I ran for president, I made it clear that I was in favor of the Equal Rights Amendment passing and still am in favor of it and hope it does pass. I reserve the right to express my opinion just like you have a right to express yours."

Phyllis Rodgers of Albuquerque, N.M. asked "We are very concerned about the solar energy program here in the state of New Mexico, and we're hoping it will go through for us."

Carter replied that he would like to see the research and development programs decided on a merit basis, but said New Mexico has a head start on many places around the country due to their long history of research and development and the state's climate.

AS OF APRIL 1

City To Assume Ambulance Duties

The Friona City Council voted this week for the city to take over the ambulance service for Parmer County effective April 1, 1977. Effective that date, Parsons-Ellis, which has operated the service in the past, will relinquish all ambulance calls to the city.

The decision came after some months of planning a change in the ambulance setup, and after a lengthy discussion on the ambulance service at the council meeting Monday night.

"Someone has to run an ambulance, and Percy (Parsons) has said he doesn't want it anymore. Private enterprise is fast fading away, and the taxpayers are having to provide more and more of their own services," said Mayor R.L. Fleming during the discussion.

Other discussion centered around the need for making the change "one of permanence," and the possible problems which would be posed through providing a volunteer assistant.

Under the city's proposal, the ambulance operator will be a full-time paid employee, with an assistant coming from a group of people who are taking a special emergency medical course to better equip them to help with an ambulance call.

Also discussed was the possible need of a second ambulance for use when multiple calls are received and the main vehicle is in use. The fire department owns a station wagon which council members felt could be

equipped so as to qualify as a "backup" ambulance.

The city recently received a van-type ambulance in a cost-share arrangement through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The ambulance can transport two patients at once if necessary.

In other business, the council heard a proposal from the Ebling Manufacturing Company of Plainview to equip the city with solid steel trash boxes for the residential and business district, and a loader truck which would service the boxes.

The council felt that the program, although a costly one, would be an improvement for the city's trash disposal system, which uses 55-gallon drums and requires two men emptying the barrels and another to drive the truck.

The company is to study the city's requirements and come back with a solid proposal at the next council meeting.

The council was given the retirement notice of City Judge Thelma Jones, and the proposal to separate the job of city judge and dispatcher.

As Mrs. Jones had agreed to continue to work one day per week providing the dispatching duties were relieved, the council voted to offer the position back to her on that basis.

Insurance coverage for the city's new ambulance was assured by approval of a bid of \$1,193 per year from Ethridge-Spring Agency.

A resolution was passed okaying the city's participation in the PRPC's new Criminal Justice teletype system, at a cost of \$1,516 the first year and \$1260 per year thereafter. The system will modernize the city's present communications capabilities, according to Police Chief Bill Denney.

Miscellaneous business included noting the monthly adjustment by Pioneer Natural Gas Company of the city's key rate, which will increase 4.41 cents per MCF to the city.

Parsons, representing the Prairie Acres board, reported that the nursing facility currently has 30 residents, and the board feels that 36 would be a break-even point financially. "We could take care of six additional residents with very little more expense to the home than we have in caring for 30," Parsons explained.

City Manager Jake Outland revealed that the drawing for ballot position for the city council election placed the order thusly: Patrick Pace, Jerry Brown, Beth Thompson and Haywood Vaughn.

When Joe Bill Jones is not out buying cattle with his Dad, he is the only man in West Texas and one of a very few in the state making custom fitted artificial eyes.

"My Father is a cattle buyer and I lived on a farm outside of Friona, Texas all my life until I went off to college and became an Ocularist."

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Jones of Friona.

An Ocularist is trained to fit and fabricate artificial eyes, and Joe Bill Jones, 25, spends approximately two and one half days fitting and making each of his patient's prosthesis (artificial body part).

"I used the Modified Impression Method of fitting artificial eyes," Jones said. "I take an impression of the eye socket, from which I make a wax pattern. The wax pattern is smoothed down and the iris-cornea piece is added."

"I work with the wax pattern until it is shaped to match the companion eye and lids. I then make another mold from the finished wax pattern. When the mold is completed, it is

opened and the wax pattern removed. The iris-cornea piece is then removed from the wax pattern and placed into the mold. Then, white acrylic is packed into the mold and cured for forty minutes. Curing is a process which hardens the plastic."

The acrylic eye is now ready to be painted. Jones spends approximately eight hours painting the eye. He uses the primary colors—yellow, red and blue, manipulated with black and white, mixing the necessary color to match the patient's natural eye.

"I work toward painting the artificial eye exactly like its mate. I intentionally put in a little difference only to make the eye look more natural, since everyone's eyes are a little different."

Jones used red commercial embroidery floss for the veins. Each strand is separately applied and varnished. All of the eye parts are put back into the mold and allowed to cure for an hour and forty minutes. "I pumice and polish the

eye, then hope for the best," Jones said.

The Modified Impression Method Ocularists use to fit artificial eyes is a great improvement psychologically and aesthetically over stock eyes. Stock eyes are prostheses some opticians pick from a drawer to match as closely as possible to the patient's real eye, making it difficult to maintain anything resembling natural color or position.

Jones is unique because he is only one of a few in Texas utilizing the Iowa Implant, which provides 70 per cent total eye movement. It utilizes the muscles to move the prosthesis with the companion eye by attaching the eye muscles over the implant grooves. More common to Texas is the Spherical Ball Implant which allows only about 45 per cent movement.

"The Iowa Implant is a quasi-integrated buried muscle cone implant which is surgically connected to eye muscle. It has four rounded mounds on the front surface of the implant, which "key" into

corresponding depressions in the back of the plastic prosthesis to support the prosthesis against gravitational pull and pressure from the upper lid. The lids, predominantly the upper, hold the prosthesis against the mounds.

While persons of all age groups benefit, several of the advantages are especially notable in elderly persons in whom lack of tissue tonus (muscle strength) is more common. When such person with the new implant are fitted with prostheses based upon correctly taken impressions, the prostheses are supported to fit all spaces well. This results in healthier sockets, requiring little attention from the patients or their physicians.

Jones studied concentrated arts at the University of Houston before entering the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics Department of Ophthalmology. At the University of Iowa he had thorough, specialized training in preoperative and post-operative anatomy of the eye

Bovina Man Named SCS "Farmer Of The Year"

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District has selected Troy Christian as the conservation farmer of the year.

Troy and Lillie, with their three children, live on their farm six miles south of Bovina. Troy farms seven quarters of land, each with a center pivot sprinkler. By farming corn under the sprinklers and cotton in the corners he is able to get the most efficient land use. Troy has been cooperating with the Parmer County SWCD as long as he can remember.

Present methods of conservation farming are an every day thing with Troy. It hasn't always been that way. He has pioneered water, soil and energy conservation in his community.

Troy put in one of the first center pivot sprinklers in his community. This has led to a number of conservation practices. Troy said he was spending a good bit of his tractor time getting furrows ready to receive the irrigation water. He has conserved both time and energy by cutting out this costly operation.

Troy does not use a deep bed. He has found out that he has less erosion with a shallow bed.

By going sprinkler he is able to trash farm. He said that he cannot go "No Till" because it is necessary to "bust out" stalks for insect control.

The minimum tillage Troy practices provides an insulation on the soil reducing the moisture loss through evaporation. The trash reduces wind erosion to zero. By leaving the trash on the surface, Troy has improved the water penetration from his sprinklers. He said water penetration wasn't much of a problem on his sandier soils, but

his clay loam soils were a problem until he had built up his trash cover. The kind of farming Troy is doing now has maintained his production. He is now shooting for optimum production because it is more economical than maximum production.

Another thing Troy is doing, in fact, the day he was visited, is modifying his equipment so he can do a more economical job of trash farming. By saving time, labor, fuel, water, and soil, Troy is doing a complete job of conservation farming.

and orbit dealing in the field of ophthalmic prosthetics and implants. Certain knowledge of optics, ophthalmic devices, and especially cosmetic optics was also attained during this training. A complete understanding and utilization of these principles must be realized by the ocularist to render the ultimate illusion.

Jones holds an Associate of Arts Degree from Tarrant County Junior College. "I thought I would be an optician, but I was also interested in art, so I decided to put my two interests together and become an Ocularist." Jones is currently at the Texas Tech University School of Medicine in Lubbock where he has been since September, 1976.

"I still try to go to cattle sales with my Dad whenever I can," Jones said, "but my profession as an Ocularist takes up most of my cattle-buying time."

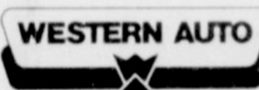
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Schueler Services Held At Rhea

On the girls' all-district team, champion Dimmitt dominated the squad with eight places.

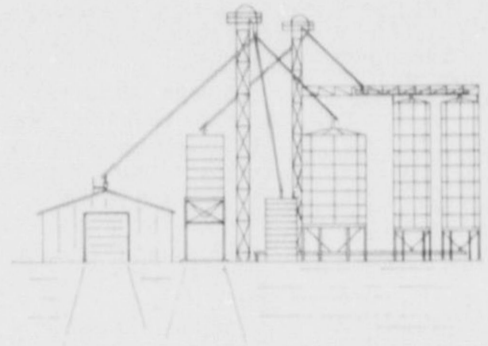
Friona gained three honorable mention places, Diane Bennett, Rhonda Parsons and Sheri Rector.

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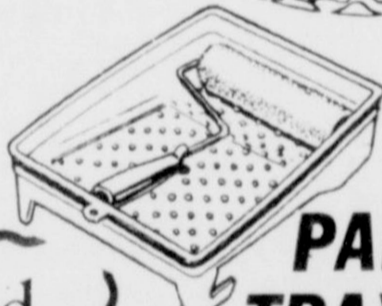
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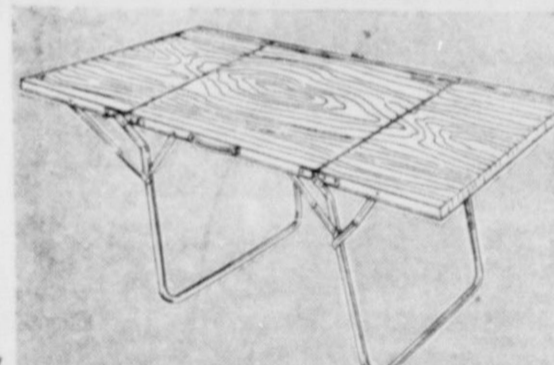
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Anthony Re-Elected To DS REC Board

An estimated crowd of 1100 attended the 39th annual meeting of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative March 5, at the Hereford Bull Barn. Capital Credit checks totaling \$437,610.08 were returned to members who purchased electricity during 1964.

Earnest Langley, attorney for Deaf Smith REC, directed the business meeting. The meeting was called to order by President Sloan Osborn, Friona. Following a report by Secretary A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, an election for two directors was held.

Jerry Roberts, who farms in the Sims Community, won the position of Director for Deaf Smith County over veteran Raymond Higginbotham, who had held the post for the past 17 years, and served as vice-president of the Board.

A.W. "Dub" Anthony, Jr., was re-elected as Farmer County's Director over W.S. "Dub" Ingram. Anthony served as secretary-treasurer during 1976.

The crowd paid tribute to retiring Higginbotham and gave him a standing ovation for his many years of service to the Cooperative.

Drawings for various door prizes were held throughout the meeting, which began with a barbecue dinner served by the Catholic Daughters of Nazareth.

Highlight of the drawings was a microwave oven won by Eva Valdez of Hereford.

James Hull, manager of the Cooperative, addressed the crowd in an effort to bring the membership up to date on cooperative matters of 1976. He stated that 1976 was a banner year with over a million dollars in margins being made, and that member equity, that part of the electric cooperative that is owned by the member has remained stable at approximately 47 per cent.

"Another figure of which we are particularly proud is our outage time, or power failure time. Our power failure in 1976 amounted to one and one-half hours per meter, compared to a national average of five hours per meter."

Hull stated the largest problem these days is explaining to the members the limitations placed on the REC's peak demand growth. The cooperative grew at an annual rate

of 19 per cent but has been asked to restrain this growth to 6.5 per cent which is 2.5 per cent above the national average.

"It is not that Southwestern Public Service Co. does not want to supply us additional power, it is just that their construction schedule is firm throughout 1982... We have looked into other sources of power, from other power suppliers, but the economic feasibility of transmitting into this area, power from other generation sources is just not economically feasible," Hull stated.

Another avenue that is being explored is the feasibility of enacting a load management program. Load management as described by Hull, would permit the cooperative to interrupt a certain electric load, if agreed to by the member, should the cooperative system's peak begin to reach a critical stage. A maximum of 50 hours per month during the months of July and August are some of the stipulations placed on the cooperative's load management plan.

"We are admittedly moving very slowly on this new project, we are so to speak, 'plowing new ground,'—no other electric cooperative in Texas has initiated this type of program," Hull said.

A bit of good news, Hull added, is the REC's ability to acquire all the needed capital for investment in plant expansion through loans with the Rural Electrification Administration and CFC, which is the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation.

Hull's opinion is that the much publicized pass-through, termed "fuel adjustment charge" is anticipated to increase at about the same rate as inflation that we have in the United States. His logic being that all fuels for generation of electricity are made available through the use of labor and labor contracts are, in most cases, tied to the cost-of-living index as determined by our federal government.

In conclusion, Hull thanked the member-owners of Deaf Smith Electric for their patience in working with the Cooperative through the energy crises, and period of energy shortage.

Friona Junior High School's boys track teams entered the Roughrider Relays at Boys Ranch last Saturday.

The seventh grade finished second in their division with 70 points. Winning their division was Panhandle with 74 points.

Friona could have won the seventh grade division, as its 440-yard relay team had the best qualifying time, but was disqualified for passing the baton out of the specified handoff zone.

The eighth graders placed third in their division, scoring 72-1-3 points and getting three first-place efforts.

Claiming first-place medals were Delton Rando in the high jump, Mike Leal in the 880-yard dash and Mark Blankenship in the 1320-yard run.

Seventh graders scoring wins were Tony Rios in the discus throw and Robert Caballero in the 400-yard dash. In addition, the seventh grade Braves had five second place finishes, including two by Rios who was their high point individual with 26 points.

Another delightful weekend experience was attending 4-H Club District Contests at Hugoton, Kansas. Our number two grandson, Jason Floyd, participated in the contests. (We number all our children and grandchildren in the order they came into the family.)

There were probably 150-200 4-H Club members of all ages from five counties competing in various categories and the majority of them were serious minded young people who had a job to do and were willing and eager to do it.

The singing, speaking, project demonstrations, model meetings and instrumentals, were all we had time to see and we didn't see all of them.

However, as I watched the participants and their leaders working together, I was reminded that here was a side of young America that we rarely see on television or hear on radio.

Maybe we should spend more time

reading our newspapers and keeping up with such organizations and supporting them.

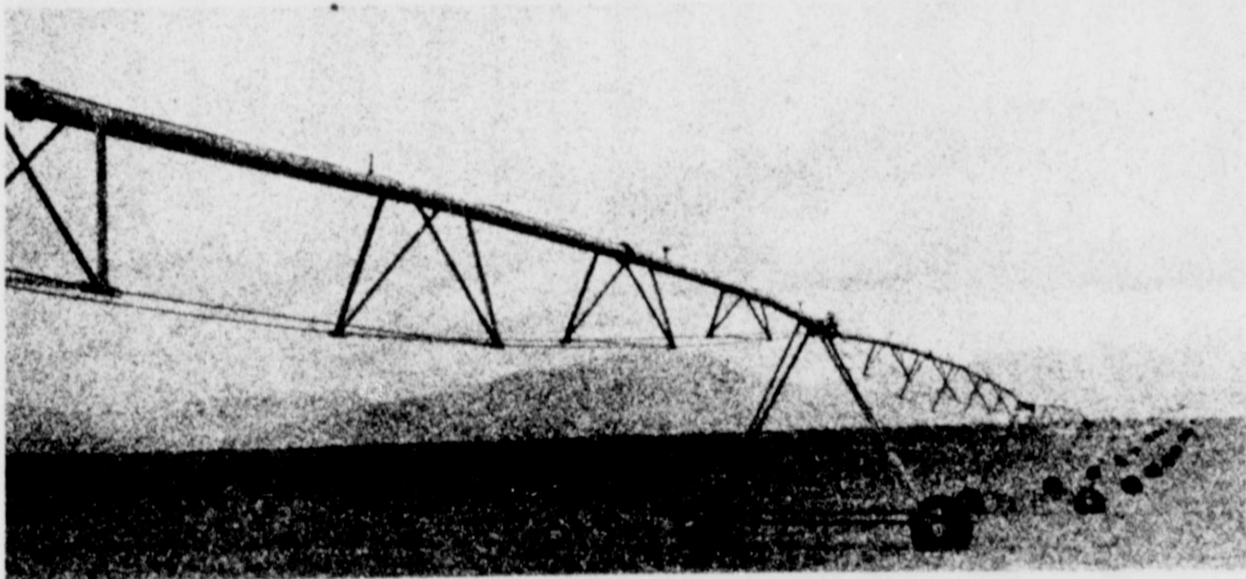
The FHA also hosted a Sweetheart
