WHEN THE GROUNDHOG came out this week to make his traditional weather observation, folks in most parts of the nation were hoping against hope that he saw a sign favoring the end of a long, bitter winter.

However, the weather experts, who have a bit more complicated way of predicting things than does our friend the groundhog, seem to think that folks up in the northern part of our nation may be destined to at least one more month of the type of weather that has already produced one of the worst winter seasons on record.

If residents of Parmer County think they have had a cold winter, all they have to do is listen to the news each day, or read in their daily papers to find out that other parts of the nation are having the type of winter that makes it appear that we are having very little winter weather in the immediate area.

The city of Detroit, for example, recorded the most consecutive days of zero or sub-zero low temperatures since records have been kept in the city—105 years.

Areas such as upper New York, Ohio and other parts of the East, have been virtually crippled by the weather in the past two weeks. Industries, schools, in fact entire communities, have been forced to close down by the worst spell of winter in almost 100 years.

Complicating matters is the lack of natural gas in some areas, particularly in the industrial states of the North. And the frozen waterways, including the Mississippi River and the Great Lakes, have compounded the moving of supplies, as has the fact that busy freeways have also had to be closed to traffic.

Besides adding to the fuel and oil crisis, the Deep Freeze has hurt the nation in several other ways. The layoff by industries will hurt these large businesses, and put them behind their schedules. In addition, the loss of pay to employees who have had to be laid off, makes a double burden at a time when fuel bills have doubled.

Then, too, states such as Florida suffered a big loss to fruits and vegetables, and this will affect shoppers all across the nation, who will have to pay higher prices for the commodities that were affected.

The ravages of winter will undoubtedly pass, and enable the nation to get back to normal. But it has been a costly winter, one that will be long remembered.

FOREIGN AID is Congress' worst offender, when it comes to deficit spending, says a U.S. Congressman from Texas. Rep. James M. Collins points out that foreign aid has cost U.S. taxpayers the sum of \$537 billion, the major portion of the present U.S. debt of \$634 billion.

Congress has the mistaken belief that you can buy friends. They should know better.

Collins points out that the United States has a proud history of foreign missionary programs and community efforts through private charity abroad. A good example of the Lottie Moon offering does more good than the entire foreign aid program.

Gifts which are gathered by the churches go right to the spot needed. They achieve 100 per cent results.

A dollar that is given to the U.S. government by a working taxpayer only yields a dime's worth of benefit at the end of the line, Collins says.

Black Slated To Receive Award

A.L. Black of Friona is to receive one of four top awards for outstanding contributions to conservation of natural resources at the annual meeting of the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in Atlanta February 6-10.

Black, widely known agricultural leader who has farming, cattle feeding and industrial interests, is a former president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts. He is currently serving as chairman of the Texas Water Development Board.

He is only the second Texan to be so honored. Previously honored was the late Walter Humphreys, former publisher of the Fort Worth Press.

Black is to be honored for "his years of sustained devotion to the goals of conservation, agricultural progress and resource development."

He has served on five NACD national committees and has been chairman of the Great Plains Committee.

Other national leaders slated to be honored at the convention include Senator Herman Talmadge, Georgia, chairman of the Senate

Youth Is Charged After Fatal Wreck

A two-vehicle accident on Main Street just before midnight last Friday left a young Friona man, Larry Smith, dead of injuries suffered in the crash.

A 17-year-old driver of one of the vehicles, Michael Blackburn, was charged Thursday with criminally negligent homicide, a class A misdemeanor, and will come before County Judge Paul Fortenberry on Monday.

Blackburn was driving a 1975 Ford pickup headed north on Main Street, when a 1976 Dodge pickup headed south and driven by David Darnell, 21, attempted to turn left into the parking lot at Houser's.

The pickups collided with such force that the Dodge vehicle was knocked 89 feet from point of impact into the Houser's parking lot. The Blackburn pickup was turned completely around and was headed south.

There were two passengers in the Darnell pickup, Terry Mabry, 22, and Larry Smith, 24. Smith was on the outside. He was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital, but was dead on arrival.

Smith suffered hardly any visible physical injuries, but an autopsy performed in Amarillo revealed that the force of the wreck had caused a major artery to burst, and death was almost instantaneous.

Blackburn was alone in his pickup. Both vehicles were total losses.

Both Mabry and Darnell were treated at the local hospital, but neither was seriously injured, nor was Blackburn.

The accident was reported at about 11:45 last Friday night. There was considerable traffic at the time of the accident.

Local authorities say the fatal traffic accident was the first for Main Street in a number of years. In fact they could not pinpoint when there had ever been another.

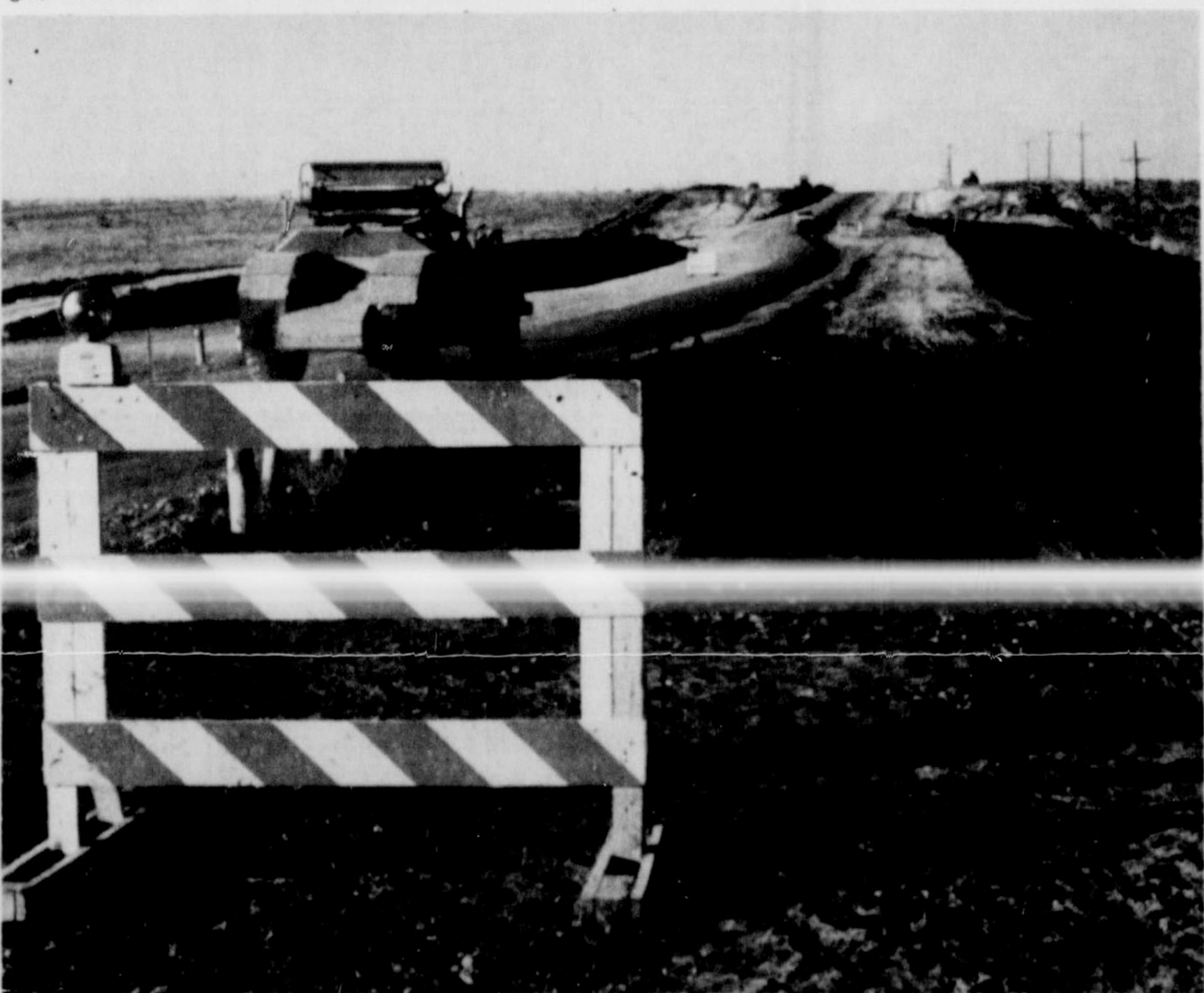
But by sending the paper by air mail, the Ross family is expected to receive it within four or five days, or

Opportunity Plan Now Self-Sufficient

Cecil Maddox, local chairman of the Opportunity Plan, Inc., in a status report on the organization, says the local chapter is beginning to be self-sufficient.

The Friona Division of the Opportunity Plan was formed in 1970 to give capable and willing students a chance to attend a college or vocational school.

At the present time, the people of Friona have, through their contributions, helped 29 students to attend such institutions as: Amarillo College, Texas State Technical Institute, Texas Tech, Texas A&M, West Texas State, Jessie Lee's School of Hairdressing, to mention a few. A total of \$23,446 has been loaned to these students. The Friona Division has a working capital of \$10,523.83.

The Opportunity Plan is not a scholarship program, but a revolving fund that mixes money with young people who have a desire to do something. Students who are on the plan work up a budget as to how much they will need for the year.

After the budget is approved by the committee, they may draw checks as needed up to amount set.

The Friona Division committee is composed of Cecil Maddox, Ethel Ruth Spring, Tom Jarboe, Betty Cunningham, and Richard Collard. The committee will accept applications, screen them, and make decisions as to who will receive educational aid.

The Opportunity Plan, Inc. was founded by Milton "Buff" Morris in Canyon, Texas in the 1950's. Buff Morris, a former Friona resident, has operated the Opportunity Plan from every spare office or corner at West Texas State University, but new offices are now a reality.

The Friona Division, along with the other divisions in the state would like to dedicate a room in this facility to Morris. 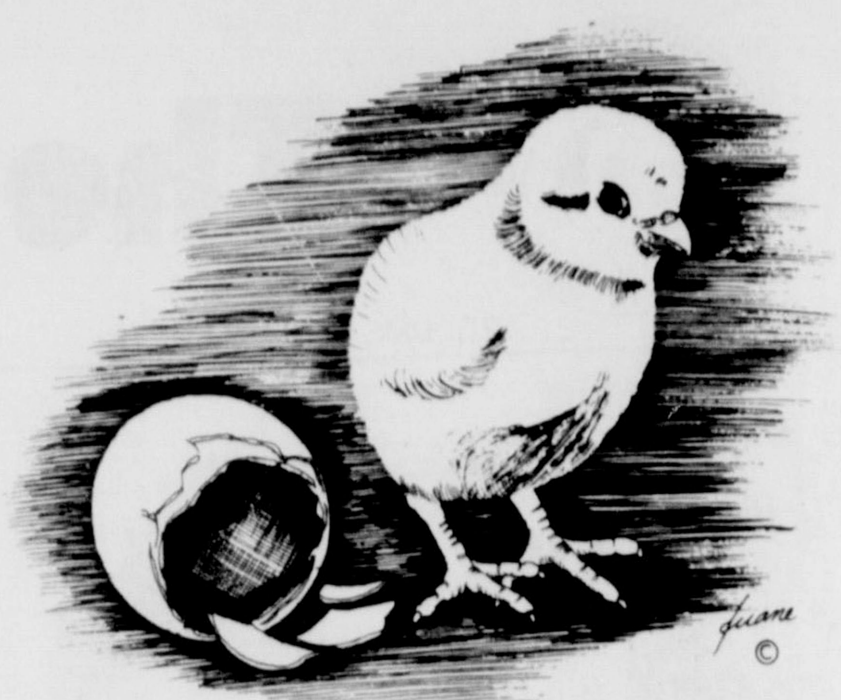
Essay Contest

Just about every year in April or May we would get a new batch of chickens. The hatchery was in the back part of the feed store in town. We would usually buy at the hatchery but you could get chicks by mail order if you wanted to.

The hatchery was a fun place to go. It had chicks of all sizes and kinds and there were books on the poultry

business along with salves, pills and powders for treatment of disease. They also sold supplies like feeds, feeders, brooders and coops. The hatchery man knew all there was to know about raising chickens, or at least it seemed that way, and his advice was free.

There was a place where you could watch the chicks being hatched. It was a big wooden case with glass doors and you could look in and watch the little chicks pop out of the shell right before your eyes. The hatchery man said the temperature inside the box was just about the same as under a mother hen, about a hundred degrees.

A hundred chicks (that's how many we usually bought) fit snugly into a pasteboard box that had little round holes in it for ventilation. The man would let us kids help carry the cheeping box to the car where it was carefully placed in the back seat. On the way home we would sit by the box and stick our

fingers in the holes to see if they would peck and, sure enough, they usually would.

When we got them home they were placed in the brooder house under the brooder. It was so exciting to finally take the lid of the box and see all those cute fuzzy little yellow balls clammering around, cheeping in chorus, looking for food.

The brooder was a kind of a tent-looking thing made of metal. In the center was a coal oil burner that kept the chicks warm. It would be their home for the next eight to ten weeks and, as kids, it was our chore to keep it clean, see that there was plenty of water and food and report immediately if any of the chicks looked sick or showed signs of disease.

After several days the chicks would begin to get real feathers and they wouldn't be as cute but we knew that before long we'd be having good ole fried chicken instead of those old boiled hens we had to eat during the winter time.

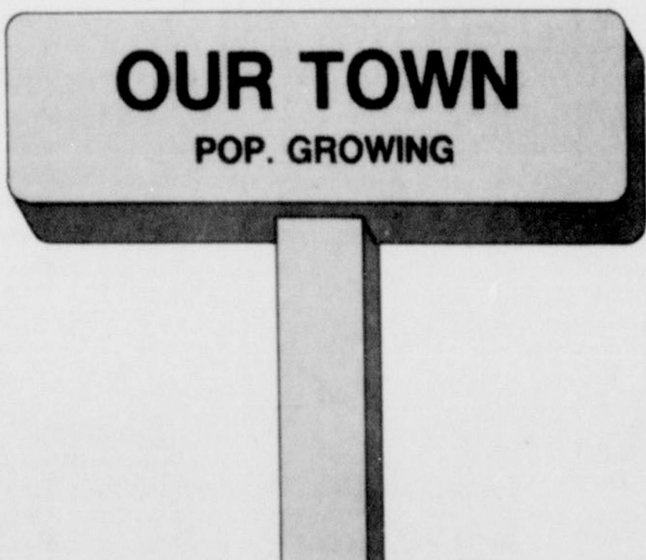

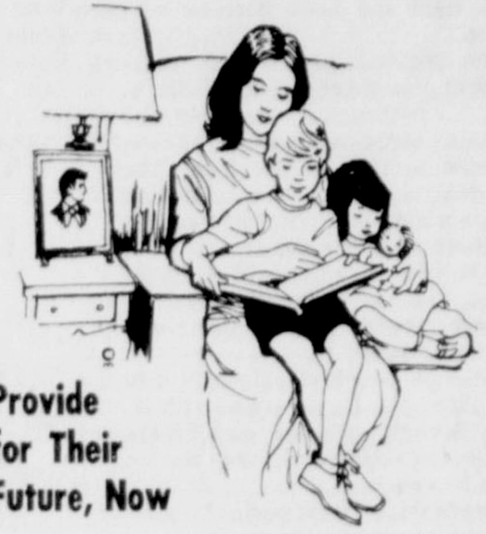

and events of 1976 might also bring about some change in philosophy about the meat industry.
 Some of the startling facts about the beef industry in 1976 were these:
 -Commercial cattle slaughter set a new record high of almost 43 million head.

-Commercial beef production also set a new high, about 25 billion pounds.
 -Beef consumption approached 128 pounds per person, not only a new record but eight pounds more than the previous high set in 1975.
 -Calf slaughter at about 5

million head was the second highest since 1968.
 -Average retail prices were about \$1.39 per pound for choice beef and \$1.36 per pound for pork, the second highest beef price in history and a new record for pork.
 -The weighted average price received by producers

for beef cattle was about \$34 to \$35 per hundredweight, the third highest in history.
 -Disposable per capita income of U.S. consumers also established a new high in 1976 at about \$5,500 per person.
 -New record highs were also established during the

year for farm wage rates, machinery costs, interest costs, taxes, fuel costs, utility costs and real estate values. Even farm-to-retail price spreads—what the producer gets compared to the price at the grocery store—recorded a new high.
