WHILE ATTENDING the girls' state track and field meet last weekend in Austin, we met Coach Bill Stroman of Jourdanton. We had good reason for seeking him out, because his class A girls team, located just south of San Antonio, is nick-named the Squaws.

As far as we know, there is no other girls team in Region I that has the Squaws name besides Friona, and until this weekend, we knew of no other team in the state.

Stroman says he gave the team the nickname himself, when he first went to Jourdanton (pronounced Jer-dan-ton) in 1954. He currently serves as athletic director, coaches football and track in addition to girls basketball. The boys athletic teams are called Indians.

Jourdanton has an outstanding record in girls basketball. Stroman said that his teams have failed to win their district only about three times in the past 20 years.

Their girls team had qualified one representative, Melinda Dornak, to the state meet, in the 440-yard dash. She represented the "Squaws" well, placing second in the good time of 58.1. Coach Stroman said she was a junior.

Some of you girls' basketball fans have probably heard of Jourdanton before, whether or not you have heard they were the "Squaws." Melinda's older sister, Carolyn Dornak, was an all-state player there some years ago, and went on to star for the Wayland Flying Queens.

We thought you'd be interested, as we were, with this tidbit we picked up while covering our Squaws at Austin. Incidentally, the school colors at Jourdanton are—you guessed it—Red and White.

IT WAS QUITE AN experience to see the new Olympics-style scoreboard at the state meet. It flashes the times for the races while they are in progress, clicking constantly in hundredths of a second. When the race is over, the timing apparatus stops, and you know immediately the time for the race, unless it has to be adjusted, which is seldom.

Those attending the state meet this year were privileged to see some outstanding performances by the girls, all the way from class B through AAAA. A number of national records were shattered by our Texas tracksters.

If you don't think the sport is progressing, just realize that Friona almost won the class AA mile two years ago. Their time of 4:00.4 is still the school record. This year, it took a 3:53.8 to win the event. Tulla and Lubbock Cooper, Region I's best, came in fifth and sixth this year, with 4:00.0 and 4:00.7 respectively.

But Region I seemed to be plagued with getting the undesirable lanes. Friona drew lane eight for their 880-yard relay race and neighboring Bovina somehow got that assignment on all three of their great relay teams. Bovina officials thought this figured prominently in their outcome. The Fillies placed second in two events they expected to win, losing both in almost dead-heat finishes. This cost Bovina the state title.

We mentioned Dora Bentancourt. She had lane eight for her race. Other teams from this area drawing "unlucky eight" were Sudan, Slaton and Levelland. Vicki Cleveland of Dimmitt drew lane seven for the 80-yard hurdles finals. Levelland and Canyon had lanes six and seven for the 880-yard relay, conference AAA.

One might suspect that Region I was getting the short end of the stick when it comes to lane assignments. We definitely didn't get any favors this time around.

Good Rainfall Is Reported In Area

Rainfall in the area during the past week has varied from an inch in the city of Friona to four inches at Bovina, with virtually everyone in the area getting beneficial moisture.

Friona's rainfall, conservative by the standards around the area, came to .13 inch late last Saturday, .08 Monday afternoon, .22 Wednesday night and .52 Thursday night.

The corresponding totals by the official weather recorder at Bovina

showed .5 inch Saturday, 1.6 inches Monday, .6 inch Wednesday, and .85 Thursday. In addition, another .3 inch had fallen after 8 a.m. in Bovina Friday morning, making it virtually four inches for the week.

The Rhea area received a good rain from the late Saturday rain, with 1.5 to 2 inches reported. Some fine hail was reported in that area, and also at Bovina, but hail damage was believed minimal, and limited

The Hub area had received 1.2 inch of rain prior to the Thursday night fall, and Lazbuddie had received 1.6 inches, and it was still raining when the report was being written.

The rainfall should highly benefit young crops, as well as assist planted crops in coming up. The only people beginning to yell calf rope were vegetable farmers in the Bovina area

City Calls Trash Hearings

Residents of Friona will be able to tell the city officials how they feel about the city's trash disposal situation during two public hearings set up by the city council during its meeting last Monday night.

The council, after discussing the status of the trash disposal system in Friona, decided to call the public hearings to let the city residents voice their opinions on the subject. "Maybe we can get the public's

opinion on this subject," Jake Outland, Friona City Manager, said Tuesday. "We know it will cost about \$75,000 to \$80,000." He was referring to the complete new trash container system the city is proposing. If Friona changed to this system there would be one container, or dumpster, to every two to three houses, which are picked up by trucks, doing away with the present system of having men dump each trash can into the trash truck.

Tentative dates set for the public hearings will be Monday night at 8 p.m. and next Monday, May 23, at 8 p.m. at the Friona Community Center.

Outland said this would give him time to obtain bids from several builders so the city could show the people just what it would cost them. In other business, the city fathers agreed to pay Buck Paige \$460 for repainting the interior of the Law Enforcement building. Outland said the only local bid received was for the sum of \$738.

The council also authorized the installation of a lawn sprinkler system at Prairie Acres by Colonial Turf Irrigation Company of Clovis, N.M., who had a bid of \$5,602. Mayor R.L. Fleming said a local bidder had reduced his bid by \$1,000 at the last minute but was still beat in the bid. "When you are spending the taxpayers' money you have to advertise for bids and accept the lowest of the bids received," the mayor said. "The purpose of advertising, asking for, or calling for bids is to get the low bid. If you always give the bid to a local man no

For tree trimmings, construction material disposal, incombustible metals etc., a decision has been made to close the facility to public disposal.

Action Saves Hereford Boy

A 19-year old Hereford youth, Kevin Lea, probably owes his life to the quick action of a Friona man, who stopped to render aid last Wednesday and discovered Lea unconscious and in an unresponsive condition.

Artis Fallwell was driving southeast on FM 1731 when he noticed two men standing just off the highway, and then spotted a third lying on his back. The two flagged Fallwell, who turned around to check the situation.

He told the Friona Star he discovered that young Lea, an employee of West Texas Rural Telephone Company, had been

working with a crew laying an underground line, when they cut into a gas line.

Lea was attempting to plug the line when he became overcome by gas. When Fallwell arrived at the scene, he could not tell if the victim was breathing, and his eyes had rolled back.

Fallwell applied artificial respiration, pumping Lea's stomach and chest, and got the youth to breathing and coughing.

Fallwell then rushed Lea to Parmer County Community Hospital, where he was put under oxygen and kept until his condition stabilized.

Friona Man Donates Windmill To Museum

There's a new but old windmill at the Ranching Heritage Center of The Museum of Texas Tech University. It is a Starmill, manufactured by the Flint & Walling Manufacturing Company, Kendallville, Ind., about 100 years ago.

From sometime in the 1890s, according to oldtimers, it stood on New Mexico land owned by Calvin Talley, who farms north of Clovis and in the Friona, Texas, area.

After Talley's father, L.R. Talley, died at the age of 92 in 1971, his family in "cleaning up the home place" was ready to destroy the windmill when Hollis Horton, operator of Parmer County Pump Co. in Friona, volunteered to remove it to the Ranching Heritage Center.

The Center is a 12-acre outdoor exhibit of more than a score of authentic ranch structures depicting the history of ranching in the American West.

The windmill was brought to the center by Hollis, and it stands now behind the Barton House, a large home in the process of restoration. The Barton House depicts the coming of affluence to ranchers who persevered while other Ranching Heritage Center structures—log cabins, dugouts, and the dirt-floored picket and sotol house—demonstrate earlier days of ranching.

The Barton House is a suitable site for the windmill, for Talley said that it long served his family's eight-room residence where the parents reared ten children.

"The windmill pumped water for the family and the livestock," he said. His father farmed and ran some white faces, the number ranging between 100 and 500, which were bought in the winter to graze the wheat and then sold in the summer.

The Talleys purchased the New Mexico land in 1923 from a Mrs. Clack, and they were the first to break the grassland for farming. The Starmill was on the site when they purchased it, and the younger Talley said he was told it was put there in the 1890s.

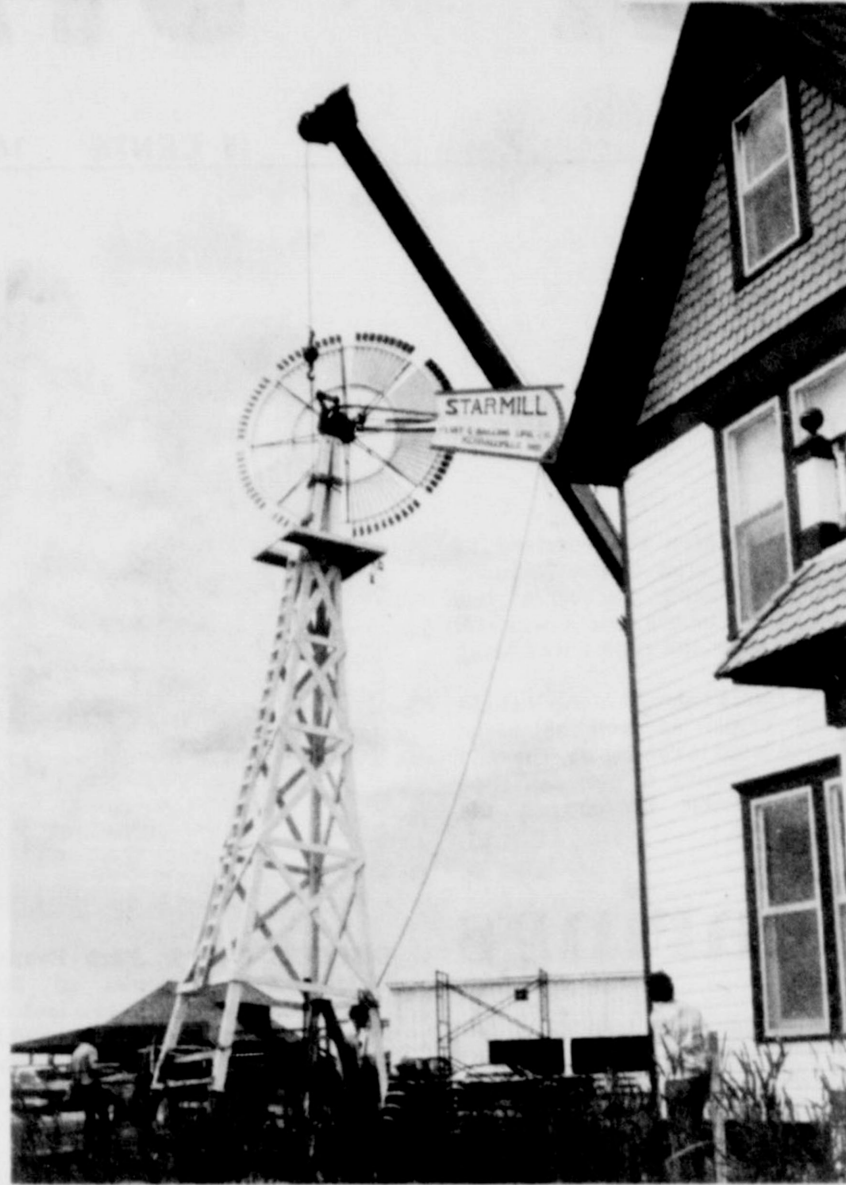
Historian Robert C. Williams who is in charge of its restoration said, however, that there are indications that the windmill is older. Among the clues is the type of nails used.

The windmill was in use until 1949. It stands 48.6 feet tall. The mill wheel is 14 feet in diameter and has an alemite grease fitting, probably installed in the 1920s or 1930s. It has been restored with its original red, white and blue paint covering the cypress and white oak wood. There are eight blades still to be installed.

The Starmill is the fourth windmill at the Ranching Heritage Center.

An Eclipse, which was the most popular on the High Plains, was donated by Jonah Laubhan of Follett, Texas. It was built in the early 1900s and stood near Stratford, Texas.

The unusual Walpole, donated by Ronald Weaver, Petersburg, Texas, was located near Ulysses, Kansas. It

is unusual in that its sails remain opposite the pivot, or away from the wind.

An improved Clipper Windmill, once marketed by Montgomery Ward, was located near Presidio, Texas. Donated by an authority on windmills, Billie Wolfe of Lubbock, it has been restored and serves the George M. Slaughter and the Pitchfork Ranch pens and the Reynolds-Gentry Barn at the Ranching Heritage Center.

A ground tumbler windmill, built of scrap lumber and bois d'arc wood, was found by Ms. Wolfe near Cooperston, Okla., and donated by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Hunsinger of Mountain View, Okla. Commonly seen in open prairie country, these windmills had the disadvantage of being unable to pivot as the wind changed and had to be situated to catch prevailing winds.

Ms. Wolfe, who has spent a lifetime studying and photographing windmills, said the first in the

United States were manufactured in the early nineteenth century although their history is dated at several centuries earlier. Although the Persians are credited with their invention, there are indications, she said, that they may have been built even earlier in other cultures. Ms. Wolfe is a member of the emeritus faculty at Texas Tech University.

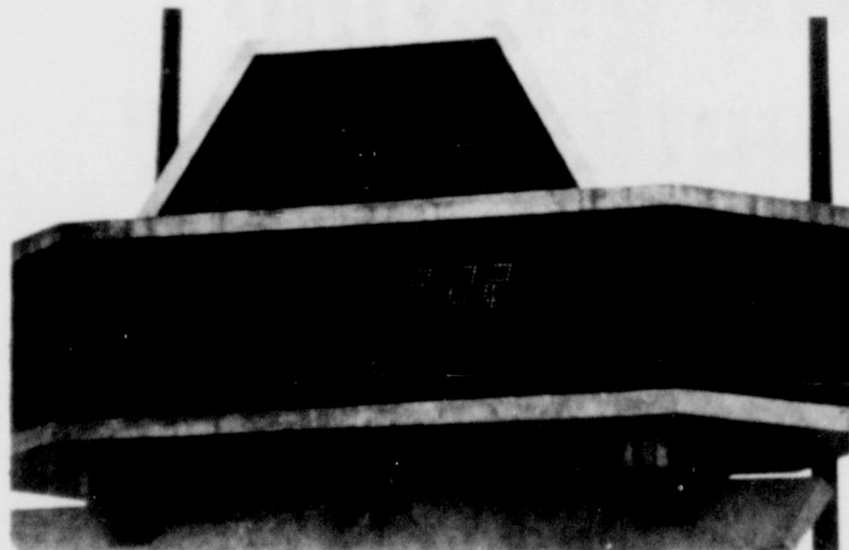

"I decided at the first of the year that I wanted to run the event in under 2:23," Tammie concluded following her triumph. She achieved everything she set out to do—and more.



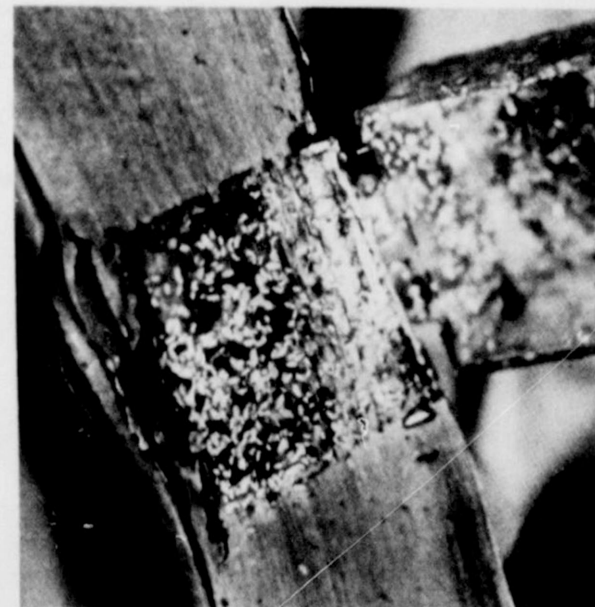

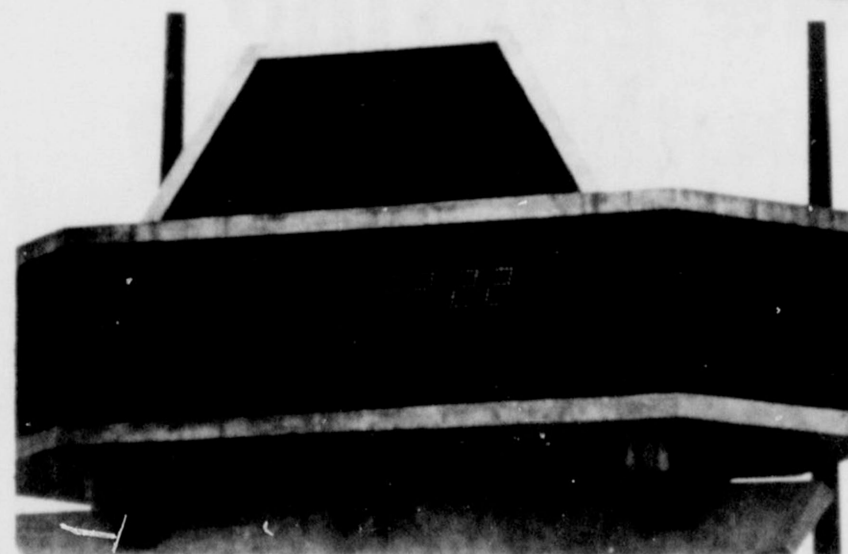

The action wound up the girls' Little Dribblers action on the local level for this year.

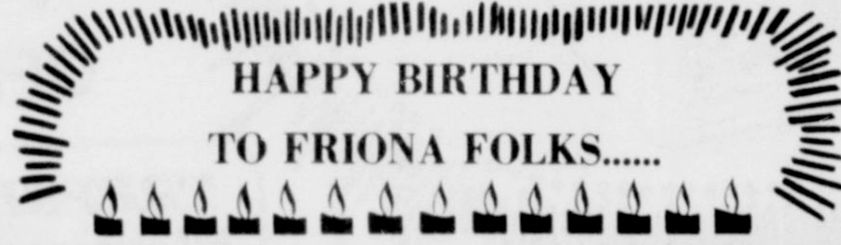

Directors Attend Tour Of Facilities

A tour designed to point out the scope and magnitude of responsibility of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative was attended recently by the Cooperative's Board of Directors.

The all day tour, covering over 240 miles and three of the four counties served by the electric cooperative, included stops at the REC's 16 electric substations. The substations provide the power requirements of the rural areas of Oldham, Parmer, Castro and Deaf Smith Counties. These stations have a combined capacity exceeding 87,000 KVA or 117,000 horsepower.

The tour's first stop was in the Ford community where a proposed substation is to be erected this year in order to provide the ever increasing electrical needs of Oldham and northwest Deaf Smith Counties. In addition, the other five substations in Deaf Smith County were viewed.

Next on the agenda were the four substations serving the Parmer County area. These stations are located near the Rhea, Oklahoma Lane and Farwell communities, plus

a substation serving the general area surrounding Friona. The aggregate capacity of these stations exceed 36,000 horsepower.

The six substations in Castro County have the capability of providing the needs of over 36,000 horsepower. The newest station is located in the growing Nazareth area. Three stations are required to serve the needs of the northern half of the county, plus one located in the vicinity of the Flagg Community.

The tour, attended by all seven Directors, was very timely and informative in better acquainting the Cooperative's Board with the ever incurring responsibility and size of the locally owned electric cooperative.
