THE NEWEST THREAT to our American way of life is the metric system.

We know that most of you have by now heard at least a little about the proposal to change our American system of weights and measurements to the metric system, which is currently in vogue in Europe.

Frankly, we have seen few systems developed in Europe that it would benefit our nation to adopt, but our congress is rushing pell-mell into the conversion to metric, and unless they do an about-face, the metric system will be the next millstone to be draped over an unsuspecting public's neck.

Why should America—the nation who first landed men on the moon—be told that its systems of weights and measurements are antiquated?

Charles Lindbergh would undoubtedly turn over in his grave if he were to realize that some of his own countrymen were at this moment suggesting that he might have been better prepared to make his historic first crossing of the Atlantic Ocean by airplane if he could have figured his fuel requirements, aerodynamics, time, etc., by the metric system.

We know that some of you are going to say, "Why we didn't know that Bill was an old fogey. Everyone knows that the metric system is the simplest in the world, and that it converts our complicated system of pounds, ounces, feet, inches, miles, and degrees into a standardized system."

Well, maybe we are a bit of an old fogey, but we can't see why our government and its agencies should spend all of the money they plan to spend simply to convert miles into kilometers.

Just the other day we heard that it would cost the government (which means you and me, baby) something like 80 billion dollars to make the necessary changes on everything from road signs and maps to untold millions of books and pamphlets.

We are of the opinion that the 80 billion could be invested in a number of ways that would better serve our nation. Put it into energy research. Spend half of it to determine if we really do have an energy crisis. That would be better spent than printing volumes to inform us that 32 degrees Fahrenheit equals zero degrees Celsius. It's just as cold, either way.

In December of 1975, Congress went on record supporting the conversion to the metric system. It did not impose a deadline for the conversion for citizens and businesses, but indicated that agencies of the government will be required to make the conversion.

That is why we fear an avalanche of spending that won't move our nation a bit closer to perfection, if that is what they think the metric system is.

From what we read and hear, the system was not necessarily a cure-all in Europe.

So far, the fact that we still deal in such outdated terms as pounds and gallons has not necessarily hindered

REGISTER NOW

Cattlemen Urged To Vote On Referendum

All eligible livestock producers in Parmer County are reminded that they will need to register June 6-17 if they are to vote in the forthcoming producer referendum on the Beef Research and Information program. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) in

Farwell will conduct the registration and referendum.

The law requires that beef producers register at least two weeks before the referendum in order to vote.

Producers eligible to register and vote are those who owned cattle

during the past 12 months, prior to the referendum, including 4-H and FFA members, men and women.

If the vote is favorable, a Beef Board will be appointed. This board is to consist of not more than 68 members, selected from the beef producer ranks by the Secretary of Agriculture as nominated by their producer organizations. Representation on the board would be proportional to cattle production in each state or geographic area.

If the program becomes operational, the Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA would monitor it, or serve in effect as a referee, to assure that it stays within the legislative authority, and accomplishes the goals of the program as voted on by producers in the referendum.

Should producers approve the program, the initial board meeting might be held in the late fall of 1977.

The investment needed for the program is to be provided by a collection of 30 cents on each \$100 of cattle sales. This is based on a "value added" system that guarantees each person pays his fair share.

The beef industry's present research and information effort is inadequate, according to the Beef Development Taskforce, which is promoting the referendum.

"We spend a small fraction of what many other, smaller commodity groups spend," a taskforce member said concerning cotton, citrus, dairy and soybeans. "The referendum will generate the \$30 to \$40 million a year needed to solve our problems and strengthen our markets."

Nearly 90 producer organizations endorse the program. During a series of six public hearings held by the USDA, 150 beef and dairy leaders spoke out in favor of the program and six against.

Some smaller cattlemen are concerned that the program will benefit only the large producer, but taskforce members say Beef Board members will be both big and small producers.

The program is voluntary. The collection is automatic. But if anyone, for any reason, doesn't want to participate, he can ask for a refund and get it promptly, with no red tape. That's the law.

Cattlemen will register to vote June 6 through June 17, and vote for or against the referendum anytime between July 5 through July 15. Voting place will be the County ASCS Office. A "yes" vote means that cattle producers will have the research, promotion and foreign market development tools they need to make the beef business more profitable.

Council To Discuss Bids On Containers

The city council will meet Monday evening at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the proposed changeover in the method of trash collection.

Two public hearings were held this month to seek the wishes of the residents of Friona, and now the city feels they are ready to act on the situation.

"We won't necessarily make a final decision on the matter," City Manager Jake Outland said last week. "We are going to go over the bids and talk the situation over."

Outland explained that the city has solicited bids for the system, and these are to be opened at the meeting. One of those seeking the job of selling the city a 25-cubic yard side-loader compactor truck and 400 three cubic yard metal boxes is Pac-Mor Company of San Antonio, who demonstrated the system for city employees and councilmen Thursday.

If the new system is okayed the city will locate the containers two per every 300-foot block.

At the public hearings residents expressed concern about the system. Those attending the second hearing wanted to know if there

would be any threat to yard fences when the truck picked up and set the container down again. They were assured by the councilmen that the side-loading system would pick up the containers and set them back down in the exact location.

Concern was also expressed for the elderly and others who might have to walk several feet to dump their trash. Councilmen said that while citizens would have to walk farther than they do with the present system, no one would have to go more than 100 feet.

Residents have also indicated concern over the fact that the new system would obligate the city's revenue sharing fund for a three year period.

"The City of Friona will get \$9,417 per quarter or \$37,670 in revenue sharing funds per year," Outland said. "A three year accumulation of the fund would amount to \$113,010."

The council has studied the preliminary estimates from two manufacturing companies, EMCO from Plainview and Pac-Mor. With the trade-in of the city's present equipment, the cost to the city would be around \$85,000.

Growth Indicated By City Report

Eight building permits were issued by the City of Friona this month, which presents a good outlook for the growth of Friona.

City manager Jake Outland said permits totaled \$280,800 for the month which included six for new houses totaling \$245,800. Two residents requested permits for additions to their present houses,

totaling \$35,000.

This brings the total for April and May to sixteen new permits. Permits for two new buildings were issued for April, estimated at \$78,000. The total for April reached \$93,500.

The ambulance made 34 service calls, including runs to Lubbock, Plainview, Clovis, Hereford and Amarillo.

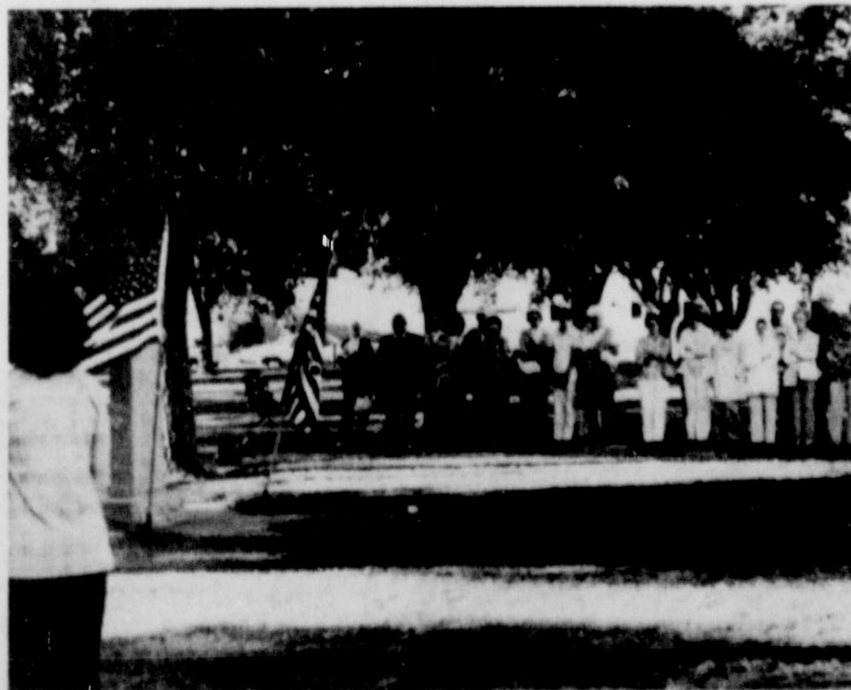
Floyd Reeve of Post No. 206, played taps before the color guard retired and the service ended.

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LETTERS To The Editor

To The Editor:

Within a matter of days, July 5-15, every cattle producer in the United States will have a chance to determine the future of the beef industry. On these dates, we cattlemen will be voting on whether or not we want a national program of beef education, research, promotion and market development.

I personally will vote "YES" on this national Beef Referendum—authorized by Congress last year. Why? I've got several good reasons:

(1) It's needed. The cattle industry has lost millions of dollars during the past three years. We need an aggressive program to promote our product and to work for better markets.

(2) It will be financed, administered and controlled by cattle producers. If passed, the national Beef Board will be organized with 68 representatives from across the country. Based on cattle numbers, Texas will have seven producers on the Board. This Board will determine what needs to be done and

who should be contracted with to carry out the needed program.

(3) It's fair. Every producer will pay his fair share. Whenever cattle are sold, 3-10's of one per cent of the sale price will be set aside—to be collected ultimately at the point of slaughter. If someone doesn't want to participate in the collection program, he can request, and receive, a refund of his contribution.

(4) It's accepted. More than 90 cattle producer groups have officially endorsed this "Beef Research and Information Act." These groups represent cattle breeders, calf producers, stocker operators and feeders. They have worked hard to get this program before us and they agree it's the best solution to our problems.

(5) It will benefit Parmer County. We are the second largest fed cattle county in Texas, with a capacity of 250,000 head. At the present time we are between 50 and 60 per cent capacity. With corn being used as the major grain in most rations, the more cattle on feed means more corn consumed, which would ultimately mean a higher price for corn at the elevator.

I urge every cattle producer—that includes dairymen—to register at your county ASCS office June 6-17 and then vote "YES" in the Beef Referendum. It's up to us.

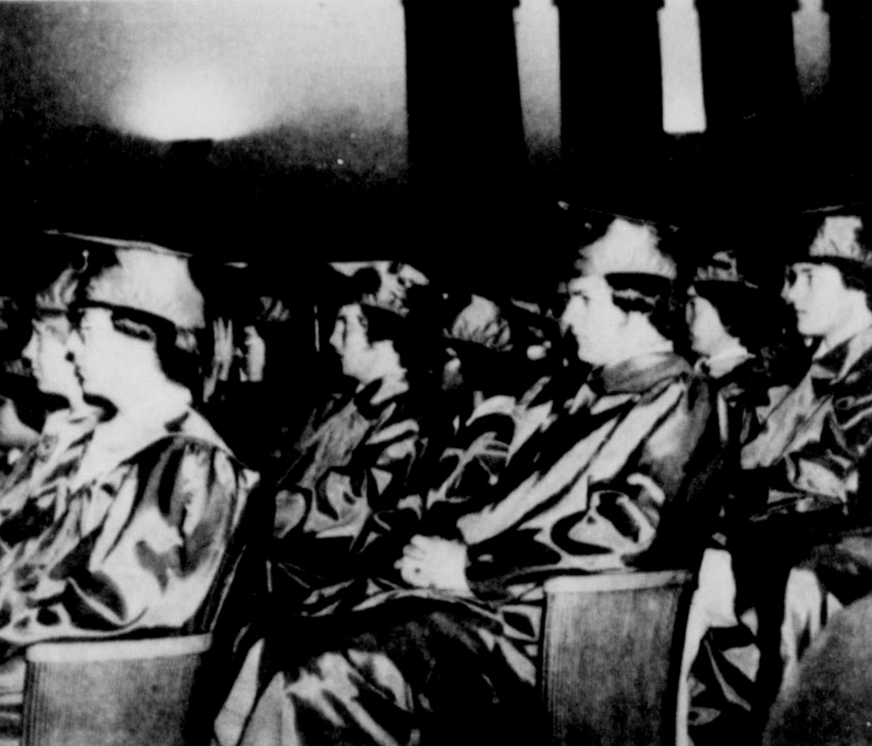

The Beef Referendum

What it is.

Soon you'll have an opportunity to vote on the beef research and information plan. Here are some facts to consider.

We spend a small fraction of what many other, smaller commodity groups spend (e.g. cotton, citrus, dairy, soybeans). The referendum will generate the \$30 to \$40 million a year needed to solve our problems and strengthen our markets.

It's accepted. Nearly 90 producer organizations endorse the program. During a series of six public hearings held by USDA, 150 beef and dairy leaders spoke out in favor of the program; only 6 against.

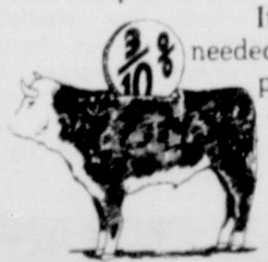
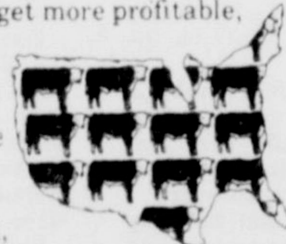
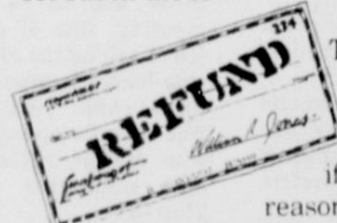
What it isn't.

It's not a government program. This is a producer program. Producers wrote the law. Producers are paying for the referendum through voluntary donations. And producers will run the program from day one, once the referendum passes. The government's involvement is limited: The Secretary of Agriculture formally appoints the Beef Board members, who are nominated by producer organizations; he is also responsible for seeing that the money is spent according to producer wishes, as set out in the law.

It's not a tax. The program is voluntary. The collection is automatic. But if anyone, for any reason, doesn't want to participate, he can ask for a refund and get it promptly. With no red tape. That's the law.

It's not just an advertising program. The program is comprehensive. Some of the money will go for consumer education. Some for foreign market development. Some for production research. Some for new product development. Some for improving marketing and distribution. And some for advertising and promotion—whatever producers, through the Beef Board, decide they need.

It's not just for the big guy. Beef Board members will be both big producers and small, from all across the country. Cow-calf operators. Farmer-feeders. Stocker operators. Feedlot people. Dairymen (dairy cattle account for 20% of beef production). This program will help everybody. Now, it's up to you. Register at your ASCS office. Then, vote "yes" in the beef referendum.

Friona Man Arraigned

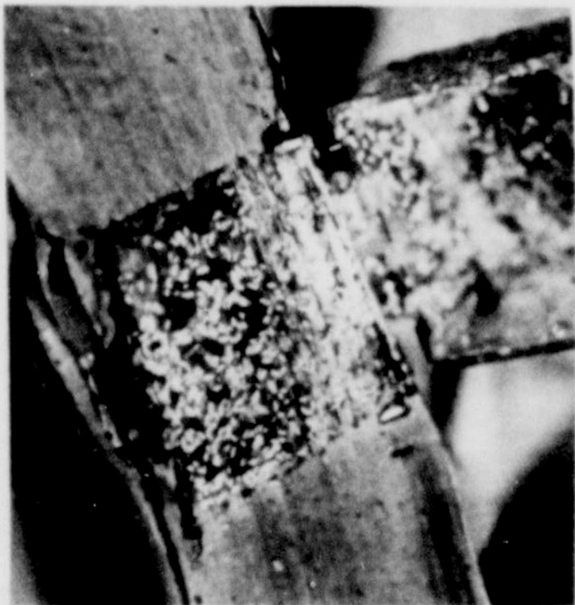
