All area residents planning to take their "final dip" of the season are asked to keep the closing date in mind.

Nice Rains Help Break Heat Wave

After going virtually a month with no relief in the form of rainfall, the Friona area received a "fair to excellent" rain during the past week, with measurements of near two inches in parts of the area.

Following a number of days with the high temperature reaching into the high 90s, the cold front which pushed into the area early Thursday held temperatures in the 60s throughout the day, with the high that day reaching only 64, while also bringing the welcome moisture.

As the probability of rain increased this week the temperatures in Parmer County dropped sharply to the 60s during the latter part of the week. The cool front brought with it also the best rains the county has had in weeks.

Heaviest rain reports came from the western part of the county along the state line where Jack Patterson of the Rhea community said two inches fell. He also said the Rhea Elevator received 1.5 inches while some of his neighbors reported 1.75 inches. His farm also received 1.5 inches, he said.

Leon Smith, Jr., 11 miles south of Friona on the Running Water Draw, also reported 1.5 inches Thursday, and another .3 inch to .4 inch on

Wednesday. Kenneth Hall at Hub received .8 inch Thursday and .3 inch Wednesday. Officials at Hub Grain said area farmers had told them the community had received anywhere from .5 inch to one inch.

Much the same type of reports came in from the Black community. Black Grain Company reported 1 1/4 inches just west of the elevator and 1.5 inches north and east on Thursday.

Bovina farmers shut down irrigation wells when 1.15 inches fell Tuesday night and another .35 of an inch on Wednesday. Greg Hromas of Bovina said farmers west of town reported another .5 inch Thursday

night and a trace on Friday. 1.3 inches fell southwest of town and 1.1 inches was reported east of Bovina on Tuesday. Bovina's official total reached 1.5 inches.

A report from near Oklahoma Lane indicated two inches of rainfall fell in that area.

While official reports in Friona showed .72 of an inch, Hoyt Smith reported one inch on his farm 15 miles north of Friona.

The National Weather Service has promised a slight chance of showers through the weekend. Early Friday it still looked as if it could rain, although apparently lacking the element to set off the showers.

New Population Estimate Given

A new population estimate for the City of Friona was derived at this week by city officials, for the purpose of posting on soon to be erected new city limits signs.

The estimate, probably conserva-

tive, places the city's 1977 population at 3,565. The figure was reached by obtaining a factor involving the number of water meters in service in the city on April 1, 1970, as related to the federal census population count as of that date.

In the seven years since the census was taken, the number of water meters has increased from 1,205 to 1,372.

The new population estimate is an increase of 454 from the 1970 census figure of 3,111, or a 14.6 per cent increase. Many people figure Friona's current population may be near 4,000 people, but the city prefers to be conservative, and more scientific, with its estimate.

The city council passed a resolution in their Monday night meeting officially placing the city's population at 3,565. The order will be forwarded to the state highway department, which is expected to include the new figure on the new-look city limits signs which are to be installed in the near future.

The highway department is in the process of changing city limits and road signs from the old customary white to an easier-to-read green background with reflectorized paint for better night display.

Requirements Given For Queen Entries

With the Maize Days planning underway the Chamber of Commerce has released the rules for the Maize Queen Contest which is to be the highlight of the festivities again this year.

The annual celebration is set for September 13 through 17.

While contestants for the contest are limited to Friona High School juniors and seniors, the field of girls entering is not lacking in numbers, beauty or talent, as the community has observed in the past.

Deadline for entering the contest is 5 p.m. on September 8, and entry fee is \$20. Entry blanks are available and are being accepted at the Chamber of Commerce office in Friona.

The queen, according to the rules handed out this week, is not to marry before her reign is over, otherwise she will give up her crown to the first runner-up. The reigning Maize Queen's duty will be to represent the city while attending functions at the request of the chamber, school or city. She will also represent Friona in the Miss Wheatheart of America Contest held August 19-20 in Perryton.

The contest has been the main event of Maize Days since 1957 when Betty Agee (now Betty Wetzel of Midland) was crowned the first queen. Each year since then a new queen has been given the red carpet and key to the city treatment.

All the past queens have been invited back to ride in the parade, which begins at 10 a.m. Texas Speaker of the House Bill Clayton will also be here for the day. Immediately after the parade there

will be a \$1 a plate barbecue at the city park. There will be bingo games, raffles, talent shows and a pet show. The Methodist Youth Fellowship will sponsor an Almost Anything Goes contest.

The annual Little Miss pageant will be held in conjunction with the queen's contest, with Lois Norwood of the Progressive Study Club doing the coordinating.

Entry fee for the Little Miss Contest is \$10.

Charles Caudill, committee chairman for the Maize Days events, said the chamber has chosen the theme "Maize Days-Product of Happy Days" for this year's celebration.

New Students Are Asked To Register

New students entering the Friona schools who were not in Friona at the end of the past school year are encouraged to contact their respective principals to pre-register. This request is being made so that schedules and teacher assignments can be made before registration days and will save considerable delay for these students to be assigned to classes.

New students in grades kindergarten through fourth should contact Freeman Melton, Jr. at the primary school office sometime next week. It

is not necessary for kindergarten children who pre-registered last spring to report early, but those who did not register in the spring should report.

New students in Friona in grades five through eight should report to Cecil Maddox at the junior high school. Grades nine through twelve are to report to John R. Cook at the high school.

Official registration for students in grades six through twelve will be on Friday, August 26. Grade six will register at 9 a.m. on August 26 at the junior high auditorium. Grades seven and eight will report at 10:30 a.m. for registration on August 26. High school students will register at 9 a.m. at the high school.

Students in grades kindergarten through five will report on Monday, August 29 for the first day of school. There will be no registration day prior to that for these students, unless they are new in the community. August 29 is the first regular day of school for students in all grades.

The Friona Schools offer one-half year, full day instruction for kindergarten students. Eligibility for kindergarten is as follows:

Children born after September 1, 1971 and before March 1, 1972 are to attend kindergarten the first semester.

Children born between March 1, 1972 and September 1, 1972 will attend the second semester, beginning on January 16, 1978.

Patrons are reminded that Texas law requires all Texas school students be immunized for polio, rubeola, rubella and D.T. These immunizations must be current and updated with prescribed boosters.

Petition Asks For Porno Removal

A petition with 356 names of local residents was presented to Mayor Raymond Fleming and the city council Monday night at the city council meeting in an effort to get officials to pass an ordinance against the display and sale of pornographic reading material in Friona.

"The sale of pornographic material has become a public nuisance," said J.P. Sims, who presented the petition. "It is harmful to the welfare of our children."

Sims said they would like a "no-show" ordinance passed by the council prohibiting the display of sexually explicit materials so minors or browsing teenagers could not see them. This would mean the material could not be displayed visible to the public eye either while in or on the newsrack or after removal from the newsrack.

City attorney Gale Warren said a law prohibiting the sale of this material could not be passed because of the First Amendment right all men have of freedom of the press, stating that local businesses have every right to sell whatever material they wished. However, he said the store owners could voluntarily corporate and keep the material behind the counter, where it must be called for in order to be purchased, or in paper containers

where the cover is not visible to the public and it cannot be "flipped through."

Some area cities do have "no-show" ordinances that prohibit the display of material intended to arouse sexual lust or passion for commercial gain. But Warren said these ordinances would have a hard time standing if they were taken to court.

City Manager Jake Outland said he had talked to one Friona merchant who displays "hard pornography" and that businessman has agreed to go along with anything the council comes up with, although he sells about \$20 worth of the magazines per day.

The argument often heard in this type of case is that it is unreasonable to retailers and distributors to officials to make it illegal to carry an uncovered magazine on the rack. Although it would not be hard to prove that some of the magazine are pornography, it would be equally hard to restrict merchants from selling the material because of the right to run the business as they wish and sell any item which is not illegal.

In Friona, however, a disagreement is not likely. Most store owners stopped selling the pornography long ago, and those who still market the sex magazines are nonchalant about taking them off the rack.

Season Tickets Will Go On Sale Monday

Season tickets for the 1977 Friona Chieftain home games will go on sale Monday at Bi-Wize Drug, according to Bob Owen, FHS administrative assistant.

There will be only four home games for 1977, reversing last year's schedule, when six of the ten games were played at Chieftain Field.

Cost of the season tickets will be \$8.00, or \$2.00 per game, the same price as for recent years. Previous season ticket holders will have first option at renewing their tickets, Owen said.

The Chiefs play two non-conference and two District 3-AA games at home this season. The home schedule is as follows: September 2, Floydada; September

30, Hart; October 28, Muleshoe; November 4, Dimmitt.

REMEMBERING...

All my haircuts were given at home when I was little. The haircuts were a weekly ritual — every Saturday night whether I needed one or not.

I would be seated on a tall stool with a cup towel tied around my neck while Dad would get out his hand clippers, blow hair off them, squirt them with machine oil and here we'd go. I didn't like to get haircuts. In fact I believe I would rather have had a tooth pulled any day as to get a haircut from my dad.

I would have to sit just right and perfectly still, not slumping or bobbing my head. Dad would hold my head with a hand that seemed more like a vice so I couldn't move a fraction of an inch but all the time his other hand worked the clippers he would be saying, "Stop wiggling around!"

I'll always believe those clippers were designed to pull hair out — not cut it off. The haircuts weren't so hot looking either. I mean he didn't use a bowl or anything turned upside down over my head like I heard some people did but he might as well have because that's the way they usually turned out. My head would be peeled to some point an inch or so above my ears and from there it would kinda bush out like a tree. He would always start out to leave a little hair on the sides of my head but he would get a few gaps

(because I wiggled around he always said). As he tried to get rid of the gaps he would cut off more and more of the hair until there were no more gaps because there was no more hair. I used to like to wear caps so nobody could see my haircut.

I got my first real store-bought haircut the week before I was to start school. Mother took me to the barber shop in town where we had to wait for quite a while before the barber could get to us. He had some clippers that plugged into the wall and made a humming sound but nobody in the shop seemed afraid of them so I figured they must be OK.

When it came my turn the barber motioned for me to climb up into the big chair. He put a board across the arms for me to sit on so I'd be tall enough and said, "What'll it



be a shave or a haircut?" I just grinned but didn't say anything. I was eyeing those electric clippers hoping he didn't let them get loose and cut off my ears or something. He looked at me for a while and said, "Did I give you your last haircut?" "No, my daddy did!" He frowned and said that's what he thought. He turned on the clippers and put them to my head. I fully expected it to hurt but it didn't — just made my ears kinda buzz. It tickled and I started giggling. Mother said, "Hold still son." But in just no time at all he was through and he gave me a big piece of bubble gum for being a good little man he said. When we left I asked Mother if I could go back there for all my haircuts, she said, "We'll see."

Group Mails Carter 'Three Cents Worth'

How about sending President Carter three cents?

Not that the President is destitute, but members of the local chapter of W.I.F.E., and chapters all over the U.S. want to send him three pennies to illustrate that a loaf of bread or a pound of cornmeal only has 3 cents worth of wheat or corn in it.

A letter writing campaign has

been mounted by the W.I.F.E. organization. Sample letters have been prepared by W.I.F.E. and these are being distributed through places of business and at our booth during Bull Town Days. W.I.F.E. members believe that if the letter contains three real 1 cent coins; they will not be thrown away as quickly. The letters point out that a nickel buys very few things these days of inflation, but that it doesn't even take a nickel to buy the wheat used in a loaf of bread or 1 pound of cornmeal.

W.I.F.E. members hope to call attention to the deplorable price of wheat and corn, and how this is threatening to bankrupt thousands of wheat and corn farmers unless something is done about it.

The letter writing campaign is being launched at this time because Congress is considering the 1977 Agriculture Act and this will be in effect through 1981.

President Carter has said he will veto any farm bill that exceeds the spending limits he has set.

Proponents of the bill, including Rep. Jack Hightower of the 13th District, say that farmers are in a crisis situation and need more help than the administration seems willing to provide.

Rep. Hightower, in a speech on the House floor last week, pointed out that national publicity has been given the Panhandle area because of the dry weather and dust storms this spring which caused crop losses.

He stated that farmers can cope with the weather and expect losses from that source, but when this is coupled with a disastrous drop in prices, it becomes a real crisis.

"Farmers have been accused of 'crying wolf' too often," Hightower said. "The truth is that the wolf comes to see the farmer too often. Agriculture is a basic economy. We have seen many changes in our national economy in the last 50 years, but agriculture is still basic. The farmer can no longer be self sufficient. Now he, too, feels the 'energy crunch.' The farmer is a consumer of manufactured articles and knows what inflation has done to the costs of the equipment and supplies that he must purchase to remain a producer. He is helpless to do anything about his increased costs and now he is helpless when he must market his products."

"Give the farmer the kind of support he must have to stay in business because he is essential to the economic health of this country and to our very survival."

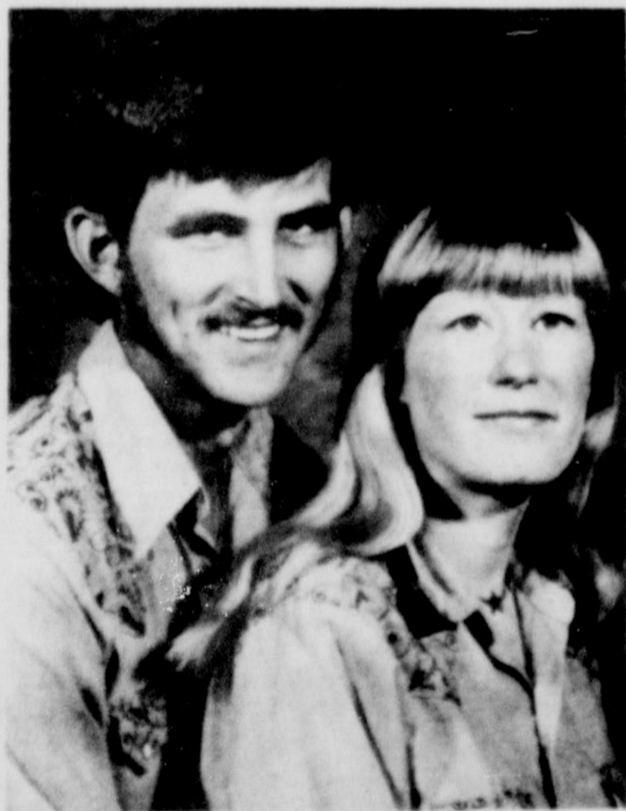
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WELCOME TO FRIONA

On The Farm In Parmer Co.

Deciding when to stop irrigating a crop is often tougher than deciding when to start. Both decisions are sometimes made with uncertainty and with a desire for more definite clues.

In the case of corn, the "grain maturity line" can be a guide on when to stop irrigating, but judging grain maturity in corn is a matter of micro-measurements.

Leon New, irrigation specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says grain maturity stages determine whether further irrigation is profitable, and should be closely checked before irrigating.

Corn kernels mature from the outward tip inward toward the cob. As kernel maturity progresses, a definite white-yellow color distinction can be seen. This color separation on each kernel is known as the maturity line, commonly referred to as the starch line.

The outward portion of the kernel that is mature and has reached full weight is yellow and hard while the inner portion toward the cob is white, in the dough stage and yet to mature. In heavier clay soils such as Pullman silty clay loam, Acuff and Olton loam, growers should irrigate until the maturity line has progressed to 1-3 to 1/2 the inward distance down the kernel.

In other words, try to have a full profile of soil moisture at this stage of maturity. This level of soil moisture is generally adequate for the immature portion of the kernel to mature and to maintain stalk quality. On sandy soils and other instances where individual application amounts have consistently been less, corn should be irrigated until the maturity line has progressed to 1/2 to 2/3 the distance down the kernel. This will normally occur around August 15 to 20 for corn planted in mid-April.

New says the maturity line is also visible on white corn kernels but it is not as distinct as in yellow kernels. To identify the maturity line, one should break a corn ear in two and closely inspect the exposed full kernels. Kernels exposed by the external portion of the ear show the maturity line more clearly.

There are two other methods of identifying corn maturity, both relating to the maturity line. One is denting and the other is the forming of the black layer.

Denting is the first stage of maturity. Initial denting occurs as the maturity line forms and begins to move inward down the kernel.

The formation of the black layer is a signal of full maturity and is visible after the maturity line reaches the inward point of the kernel, near the point where the kernel attaches to the cob. A dark brown line first appears near this point and later turns black. It can be located by cutting into the tip of the grain.

After the black layer forms, the kernel can no longer increase in weight. Irrigation after this stage is of no benefit except to maintain stalk quality.

The maturity line is the most exact identification of the stage of corn grain maturity, but the three maturity signals can be used together.

It could pay to follow grain maturity and soil moisture closely this year, especially if dry weather continues. An additional furrow irrigation toward the end of August last year on fields where sub-soil moisture had been boosted corn yields 800 to 1000 pounds per acre in areas checked in Deaf Smith and Hale Counties.

No significant yield increase is normally expected from irrigation that late, but it was unusually dry.

Two Wrecks In Friona

A 15-year-old Friona girl was injured in one of two traffic accidents occurring within 50 minutes of each other Thursday as Friona had its first damp and cloudy days in weeks.

Linda McCune was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital with minor injuries she received in a two-car accident at the corner of Highway 60 and Main Street.

The first of the two accidents happened at 1:25 p.m. when a 1975 Ford pickup, driven by Jody Tom Lewellen of 1504 Jackson, was heading north on Main Street when it struck a 1974 Buick Apollo driven by Carole Lou Stokes also of Friona. Ms. Stokes was attempting to turn onto Main Street from Eighth Street when the accident happened. She was cited for improper start from a parked position.

Firemen To Have Free Water

Being a Friona volunteer fireman has one more advantage now as a result of a decision by the city council to have the city underwrite the firemen's water bills.

Fire Chief Ralph Shirley met with the council Monday night and said the firemen needed more attractive benefits in order to recruit good young volunteers.

The firemen have been paying a flat water bill rate of \$7.50 per month for some time, Shirley said, but the number of men he needs were not being attracted to the sometimes hazardous job of firefighting. He told the council that if the city would underwrite the water bills for recruiting purposes only, he and the other officers on the department would make sure the privilege was not abused.

After some discussion the council agreed to carry the bills provided Shirley kept a close eye on the situation. The city will continue to read the firemen's meters and if excessive usage is found or a fireman is caught wasting the water

other measures will be taken.

Shirley told the council that with the added benefit of free water bills he felt he could maintain a full crew of 33 men who were 35 years old or younger.

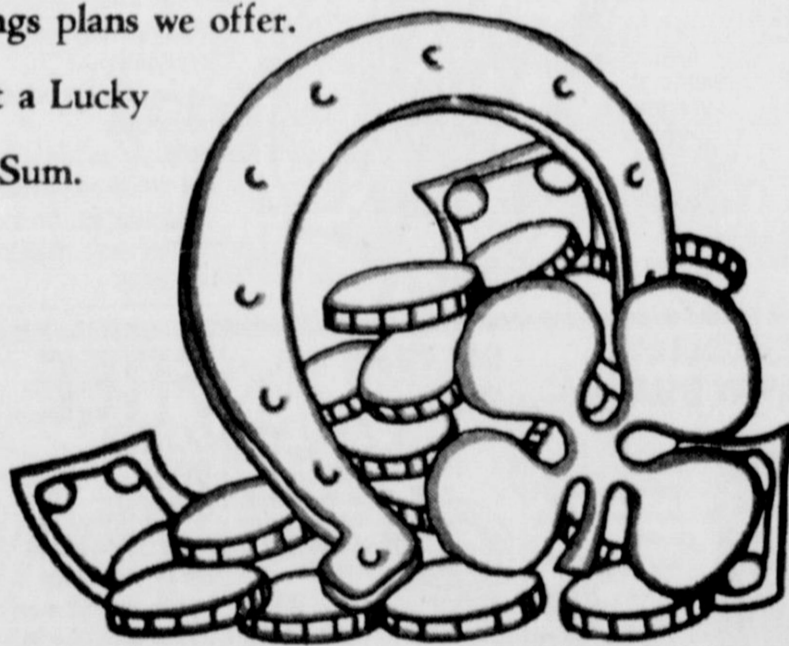

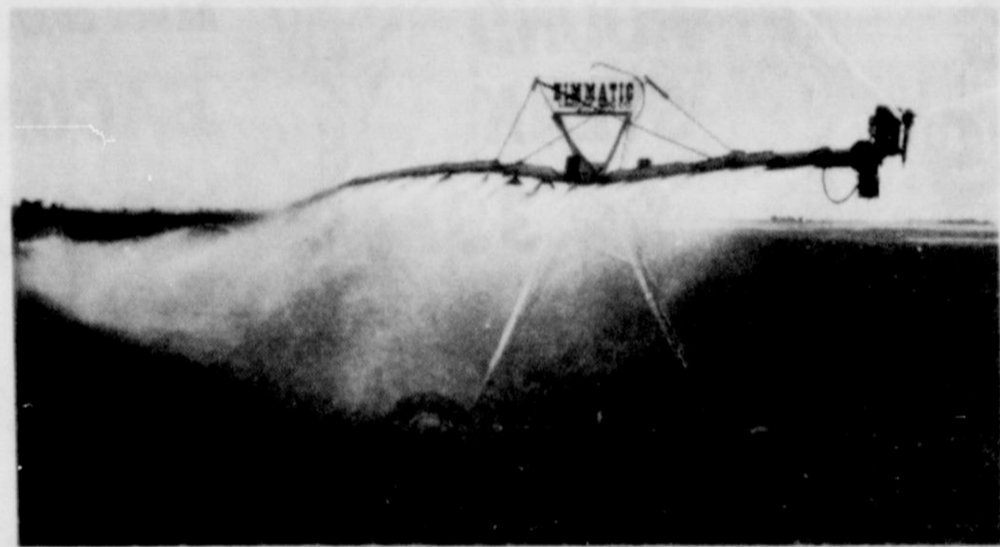

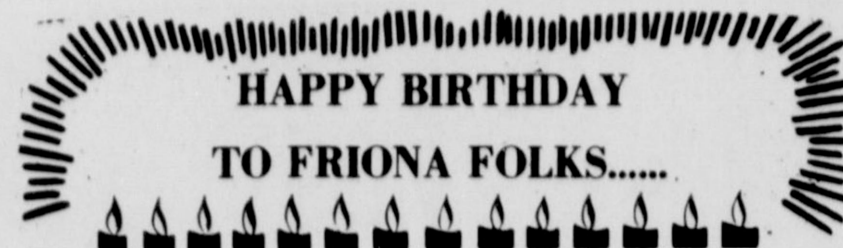
The Chieftain Parents will hold their first meeting of the fall, a combined ice cream supper and business meeting on Monday, August 15 at 8 p.m.

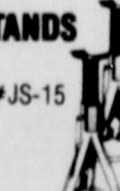

Possible Merger Of Tax Offices Talked

The Friona city council voted Monday to have new city limit signs put up which coincide with new signs going up on highways throughout the area. The signs will have an updated population figure of 3,565 for the city.

The council also discussed the possibility of a proposal to integrate the city and school tax offices, and enter into a contract for tax re-evaluation appraisal program. If integrated, the tax offices of both city and school would be in the city hall building. This would be done as a service to the public, making the paying of tax less confusing.

The city feels that with integrated tax offices both the city and school would have less delinquent taxes because the public could pay all their taxes at the central location instead of paying one place and putting off going to the other tax office.

The councilmen decided to table the proposal and wait to see what the school board decides to do about the matter. They said they would approve the merger if the school did so.

The council gave preliminary approval for the City's budget for the 1977-78 fiscal year, in the amount of \$534,955.

For the second month in a row City Manager Jake Outland reported to the council that Friona has recorded a record high water consumption figure, with 49,051,100 gallons being pumped.

As park and ball-park watering continued, the city reports showed an average of 1,582,293 gallons being used per day which seems staggering to water conscious residents, but 70 per cent of the usage was by residents of Friona.

SCS Report

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District met in regular session last Tuesday. Leon Grissom, chairman, was in charge. Visitors were James Abbott, Assistant State Conservationist, Temple, George Davis, Area Conservationist, Amarillo, and Fred Squyres, representing the State Soil Conservation Board, Dumas. Along with the routine business there was one conservation plan approved.

Herb Evans, District Conservationist, Friona, gave the SCS accomplishment report and an up-date on the Lazbuddie dam construction.

Abbott and Davis informed the board of the need to get involved in "208" planning and in the Red River Basin planning also an up-date on the Great Plains program was given.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

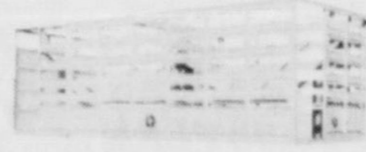

The Chiefs' first regular season game will be here against Floydada on September 2 at 8 p.m. After five games they will open district play against Morton on October 14.

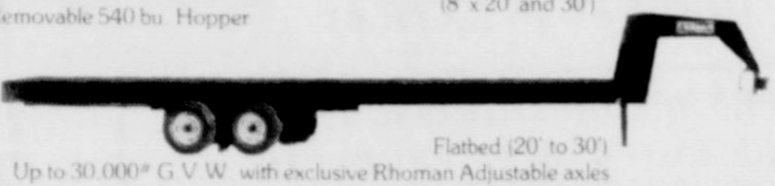
