WE ADMIRE THE EXAMPLE set by the state of Florida, which has instigated a special literacy test which all high school students must pass before they will be awarded a high school diploma.

Bothered by the fact that kids are graduating from high school who can't even do such commonplace things as read a road map or balance their check book, Florida lawmakers approved the requirement, and a special 117-question exam is the result.

The students get three chances during their junior and senior years to pass the test, which will require them to demonstrate ability to read and do math on a seventh-grade level. If they can't score at least 70 on both the math and communication sections, they won't get a high school diploma, regardless of their classroom grades. Instead, they will get only a certificate of attendance.

Florida officials say that their state is the first state to set up a single statewide test that all students must pass in order to graduate.

Much of the interest in the special test is a result of a swing away from the educational experimentation of the 1960s and a return to "the basics."

We think it's high time that school officials put an emphasis back on "reading, writing and arithmetic." We have seen a lot of examples of the modern educational system, and we have found that kids today can't spell, don't have a basic background in math, and sometimes have trouble following directions.

Maybe some others of us should follow the lead of the educators in Florida.

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IT'S OCTOBER, and one thing you can always count on is that it's time for the World Series.

The National Football League may hold the spotlight on Sundays for the rest of the year, but in early and mid-October, baseball grabs the spotlight.

And with the arrival of the World Series, the customary "pots" spring up in virtually every place of business, and we suppose this happens across the nation.

This led us to an unusual thought this week. The World Series is the only sporting event we know of to which millions of fans pay at least passing attention, not caring particularly who wins or by how much, but just praying that the Total Score ends up on their "number."

In a football contest such as we conduct at the Star, you have to choose between teams, and root for the teams you have chosen. But we have seen people down through the years who became excited only if the final score added up to their number. In most cases, they probably couldn't have told you who was the winning team.

Cotton Harvest Is Underway In Area

Parmer County farmers have been harvesting early or semi-dryland cotton crops for some time now, but the cotton pulling season will not be in full swing for a couple of weeks yet, depending mostly on the time of the first freeze.

The first bale of cotton ginned in the Friona area was delivered by A.G. (Gus) Schlabs on Monday, October 10, to Bruegel Bros. Gin (see separate story). The bale had been hand picked.

Friona Farmers' Co-Op Gin also received its first bale on Monday afternoon, owned by Billy Wayne Sisson, who farms north of Friona.

Bovina's first bale of 1977 cotton was delivered October 12 by Larry Gregory, who farms south of Lariat. The bale weighed 540 pounds, and the turnout was between 26 and 30 per cent. Lawlis Gin ginned the bale.

Probably the first bale in the county was ginned at North Lazbuddie Gin on September 27, being brought in by Lazbuddie farmer Billy Weir. The first bale in the Friona area came in Monday morning to Bruegel Bros. Gin by A.G. Schlabs and that day Billy Wayne Sisson brought the first bale to the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin.

While gins north of Running Water Draw have been slow to get into operation, the Lazbuddie Gin and the Clay's Corner Gin are already drawing in the cotton. North Lazbuddie has already ginned better than 175 bales and Clay's Corner Gin has turned out nearly 40.

"The yields are pretty good," Claude Gregory, manager at the Lazbuddie Gin said. "Kenneth McGehee had one patch that made two bales to the acre. Most of the cotton is averaging better than 25 per cent turnout."

Don McDonald, manager of the Clay's Corner Gin said they had processed 33 bales by the middle of this past week, and so far it is a little lighter than expected. "We have ginned defoliated or dry land cotton so far, but for the rest of the year the outlook looks good," McDonald said. "Our first bale was ginned October 10 and belonged to Eldon Page of Lazbuddie."

Lariat Gin received their first bale October 11 from Gilbert Kaltwasser, who farms two miles northwest of Lariat. Manager Calvin Meissner said Kaltwasser had about 27 per cent turnout. Meissner is expecting 40 bales by this weekend and another 100 next week.

"The cotton outlook here looks good," Meissner said. "Looks like cotton will help the farmers' cause this year."

The problem farmers are faced with now is trying to determine when the first freeze will be. Should they apply a chemical to kill the

green leaves, defoliate, or should they wait for the freeze? Harvesting too early will cost the farmer in yield and quality. If he gets green leaves in the lint, or if he has too much moisture due to green bolls, his seed and lint will deteriorate.

The farmer can't harvest with a cotton stripper until about a week to 10 days after defoliating or a freeze. So time will be a factor in the harvest even after the first freeze kills the green and moisture out of the cotton fields.

Police Warn Of Burglar In City

With a burglar or two loose in the city Police Chief Bill Denney is again encouraging cooperation of residents in crime prevention actions, by marking valuable items and reporting suspicious activities.

The home of Ella Duke, 1301 N. Main, was broken into the night of October 5, the very day she left town for a little trip. When she returned last Saturday she found a 19-inch color TV, a clock radio and a man's wrist watch missing. Denney said the subject had entered through a window and carried the items out the back door.

"Mrs. Duke told us she was leaving town," Denney told the Star. "But there is not a lot you can see by just driving by on regular patrols. I would encourage anyone leaving for a vacation to notify neighbors as well as the police. If neighbors know the people are gone they will naturally pay attention to any noise or unusual vehicles."

Denney said that anything anyone sees that is suspicious needs to be reported, and it will be checked out. As is the case in almost any size city, people are afraid to get involved. But Denney said most of the time a report can be checked out without involving the person reporting it.

"Anything a citizen sees that they think needs to be checked should be reported. The phone number citizens need to write down for emergencies is 247-2711. This number is also for the ambulance and fire."

City Manager Jake Outland said the city was printing emergency number stickers which could be attached to the phone or in a place easily seen. He has encouraged all citizens to memorize the number.

Denney also urges residents to mark valuables with an electric engraver type marking device. The police department has an electric engraver which is available for the public to use at any time, or citizens can request the use of the engraver and a policeman will mark the items for the citizen and give tips on home security.

"The police department can answer any questions concerning the engraver," Denney said. "If residents have questions about 'resident watches' or security they are welcome to call the police department."

Denney said a person should mark all valuable items with his or her driver's license number or other number easily traceable. The driver's license number can be traced in any state.

"If the stolen article is sold it can be identified and returned," the police chief added. "This also might lead to the person that sold it and an arrest can be made."

If the chief scratches off the ID number he will have more trouble selling it. Many shops will not buy merchandise which have been defaced or which look like an attempt has been made to cover an ID number.

Denney said an investigation was continuing in the Duke burglary.

Schlabs Revives Cotton Picking

The first bale of cotton ginned in the Friona area was a little different from the ordinary bale of cotton.

It was hand picked. That's right—the cotton was picked right out of the burr.

Hand-harvested cotton is quite a rarity anymore, and to hear of a bale being picked is really out of the ordinary.

A.G. Schlabs, 72, and his son Edmund, who farm southeast of Friona, delivered the bale to Bruegel Bros. Gin the first thing Monday morning, October 10.

Since the Schlabs picked the cotton, it did wonders for the ginning process, and helped produce a pretty bale of cotton. The turnout was a whopping 41 per cent. A bale weighing 635 pounds was produced from a gross weight of 1560 pounds.

Ginner W.A. (Army) Armstrong said it was the first picked bale of cotton he had seen in a number of years.

"My son Edmund and I just picked, not pulled understand, the cotton during spare time while watching our irrigation water," Mr. Schlabs said. "It took 23 days, working an hour or two a day."

The cotton was planted May 6 and the first bloom appeared August 6. The first boll opened on Schlabs' 72nd birthday, August 26.

"It was Paymaster Dwarf," Schlabs said. "We picked it and put it in baskets. I estimated the weight of each basket before putting it in the trailer."

Schlabs said he would hand pick some more cotton during his spare time. He may not finish a trailer load before the cotton strippers begin heading into the fields, but he will have a profitable pastime to keep him busy during his "spare time."

Area Misses Freeze As Mercury Hits 35

The mercury flirted with the freezing mark in Friona this week, but at week's end farmers and gardeners are still looking for the first freeze of the season.

The temperature dropped to a low of 35 degrees on Tuesday morning, and was just a degree warmer on Wednesday. Thursday the reading was 38 degrees for a low, and Friday morning found the thermometer at 41 degrees.

Monday's "big blow" came after temperatures had reached the 80-degree mark. The rapidly-moving cold front dropped temperatures in a

hurry, and by nightfall the reading was in the 40s.

Most cotton farmers would welcome a freeze, which would defoliate the crop and hasten maturity. It was thought that the low readings of this week would not accomplish this job completely, although helping in some cases.

45 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 12, 1932

It has been suggested that the board try to pay one-half of all salaries of teachers and bus drivers until more funds are received. It is hoped that all taxpayers who can possibly do so will meet their tax payments as soon as possible after November 1.

35 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 9, 1942

25 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 10, 1952

Committeemen representing the 13 counties in the Hi-Plains Water Conservation District voted to require permits for drilling water wells and to leave well spacing in the hands of county committees. The action, taken at a meeting in the Hotel Jim Hill at Hereford October 2, was a followup of recommendations made at recent county meetings in the district. Only one dissenting report was presented against the well permit and spacing action. Parmer County farmers, Committeemen Bruce Parr reported, are opposed to any rule which would limit their freedom in drilling wells.

20 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 10, 1957

Easements for seven and two-tenths miles of new farm-to-market road right-of-way has been arranged with property owners bordering the proposed road, reports E.G. Phipps,

county commissioner. The road is planned to start at the Clyde Goodwine corner, extend to the Elmer Euler corner a mile east, then a mile south and then about six miles east to the Claude Blackburn intersection. Total mileage on the project is about 7.2 miles.

10 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 12, 1967

First of all, thank you to the Friona Star, the Pastors of Friona Churches, Sue Smith, R.N., of the Parmer County Community Hospital, the Board Members of Prairie Acres, and the good people of Friona for the concerned response to our current "nursing crisis."

Several R.N.'s are giving us a relief day and a full time L.V.N. has been secured with the possibility of one more being available in the near future.

The really exciting aspect of the "problem" is the positive exposure given us by your newspaper in the "Challenge of Geriatric Nursing" and the people who have gotten to know us better out here at Prairie Acres. Misunderstandings and insensitivity happen in respect to nursing homes because the public often never gets involved in the good things that are happening. We are thankful that is not our problem in Friona.

One item in your front page article, October 2, 1977, "Nursing Situation Termed Critical," needs minor CLARIFICATION. The four staff members now enrolled in Amarillo College are in a 50-hour Medication Aide program. This will qualify them to dispense medications under the supervision of an R.N. or L.V.N. To be a Licensed Vocational Nurse (L.V.N.) it takes one full year of training. While the Medication Aide training is helpful in reaching the L.V.N. standard, it would only indirectly lead to L.V.N. qualification.

Thanks again for what you are doing to make Prairie Acres the best nursing home anywhere.

FmHA Deadline Is Extended To Dec. 2

The U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has extended to Dec. 2 the deadline for farmers in Parmer County to apply for farm emergency loans to cover losses caused by this year's drought and other natural disasters.

The agency's County Supervisor, Billy R. Boling, said the extension has been ordered by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland for applications under drought or other emergency loan-eligibility designations that would expire before Dec. 2, provided the designations are based on disasters that have occurred on or after July 1, 1976. The Secretary's action was taken under requirements of recent emergency loan legislation (PL 95-89) signed by President Carter.

Farmers lacking other sources of necessary credit may apply to FmHA for loans to offset losses or

revive farming operations. Under the schedule of interest rates as revised by PL 95-89, loans are made at a rate of 3 per cent on the first \$250,000 borrowed against actual loss, 5 per cent for additional amounts offsetting actual loss and 8 per cent for loans not based on loss but needed to continue farming or make major adjustments in farm operations.

Boling said extension of earlier deadlines will give farmers whose crop returns are determined late in the year a better opportunity to assess their losses and credit needs, and enable FmHA to speed completion of work on applications now pending that need immediate processing.

FmHA emergency loan applications from farmers in Parmer County are received at the agency's county office located at 207 Avenue D in Farwell.

Senior Citizens Seek Meet Center

Members of the Friona Senior Citizens organization have begun a movement to obtain their own building and are asking the city officials and other organizations for advice, support and understanding. A delegation representing the Senior Citizens met with the city council Tuesday night and the Prairie Acres board of directors Wednesday night to reveal their plans and request. Mrs. Taft Lovett, Senior Citizen spokesman, told city fathers that the Senior Citizens were requesting permission to build a reception center on the East or West campus of Prairie Acres to meet the current meeting needs of the organization.

The group, now over 50 members strong, does not have a meeting place large enough for their needs, and wishes to build a place which will hold their crafts, games and hobbies, and not have to take down or put up their tables before or after each meeting. Therefore, Mrs. Lovett said, they wish to build a building near the present convalescent home.

The Senior Citizens would assume financial expense of the construction and maintenance of the building in turn for governmental responsibility of the building use through a Senior Citizens appointed committee.

"We would like a ninety-nine year lease for the amount of one dollar

with the option to return land to Prairie Acres providing property of equal value be returned to us," Mrs. Lovett said.

The Senior Citizens are talking in terms of a 40' x 75' building which would resemble the present Prairie Acres building. The cost would be about \$40,000, which through a possible government grant the Citizens would have to pay only 25 per cent.

"If we could get the building started this year and get our grant, we would get another grant the first of next year which would help us with our utilities, refreshments and some recreation items," she said. "Some of the Prairie Acres residents attend our meetings now, and if we were out there we would have even more of the residents attending," the spokesman added.

With all of their planning and enthusiasm the group's spirits were dampened somewhat after they met with the Prairie Acres board on Wednesday. The board recommended that the Citizens again meet with the city council and request that they reserve a portion of the Friona Community Center, partition off an area which they could use for their meetings and work on their crafts.

"While the Prairie Acres board left the door open to the Senior Citizens group about their original plan, they suggested the Citizens

avoid overhead expenses, and generate enthusiasm without involving federal funds," Merv Noah, administrator of Prairie Acres said. "Their original plan could well be a reality within a year. It is not being ruled out."

The Senior Citizens are ready to begin a drive to raise the 25 per cent of the \$40,000 (\$10,000) it would take to build the building. They would like

to get the building started this year in order to reap the grants they want.

Prairie Acres board members are saying the land which the Citizens want has been obligated for future convalescent home expansion, and it will take some doing for them to meet the group's needs and leave room for their own expansion.

City, School Plan Tax Office Combo

The city council met Tuesday night and read a rough draft of a contract with the Friona Independent School District concerning the consolidation of the city and school tax offices.

If the consolidation is made, a centralized tax office would be in the city office building and would be manned by school employees. All present taxes, those paid to the city and school at separate places now, would be paid at this location.

City attorney Richard Collard said final touches will be put on the contract pending action by the school board, who met on the issue the same night.

"The basic contract was accepted by the school board," Tom Jarboe, superintendent of schools, said. "The board did not adopt the rough draft because there were some minor items they wanted Mr. Collard to check out for them, but there is no problem and the school will not change the contract. We will enter into a contract during the November or December meeting, and the consolidated tax office will be in use by the next tax collection period."

The reason for the move and consolidation is for the convenience of the patron who now have to go to both the school and city offices to pay their taxes.

"We are eager to enter into this contract with the school," Mayor B.K. Buske said.

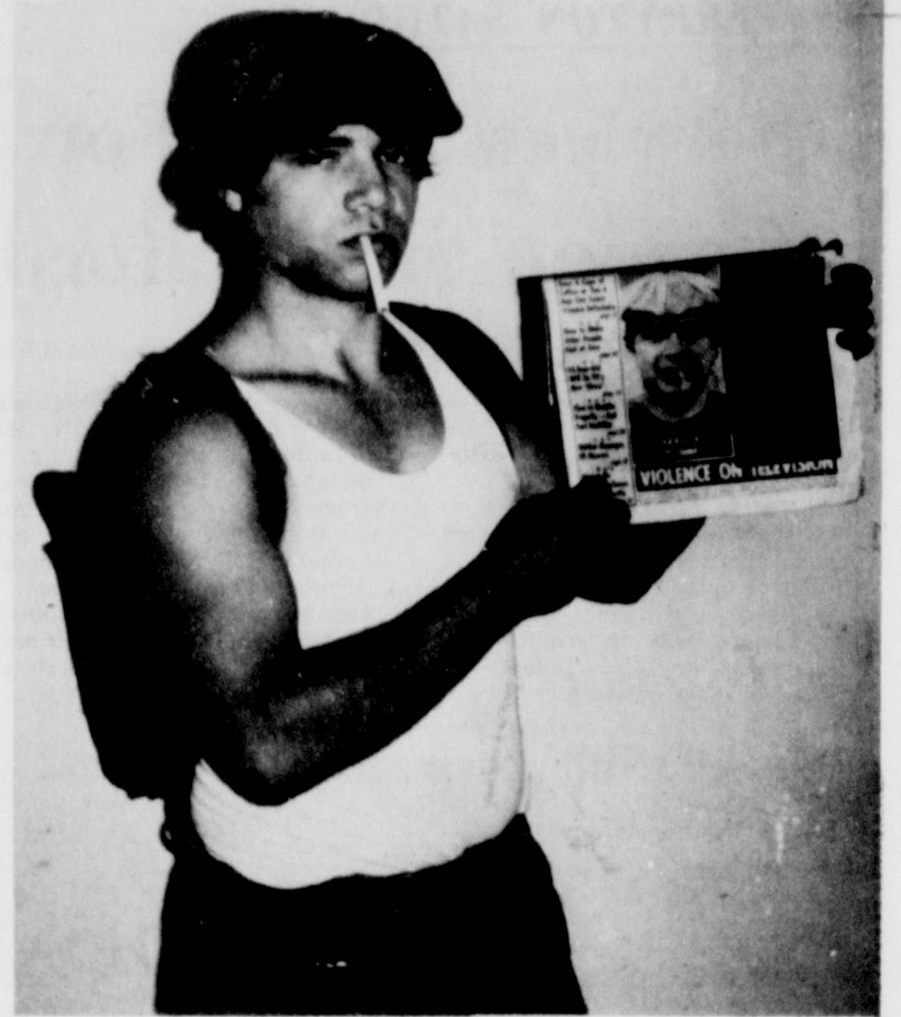
At the city council meeting city manager Jake Outland said that City Records show that 29,459,000 gallons of water were pumped during the month of September and 25,333,000 gallons were accounted for in sales to indicate an efficiency

of 86 per cent in the distribution system.

Pumpage computed to 981,986 gallons per day and is down from the previous months supply. Rainfall for the month was negligible with only .36 inch registered over five different days.

Records also indicate that approximately 8,491,620 gallons of wastewater were processed at the plant during the month. This computes to 283,054 gallons per day and is down considerably for last months figure.

The Friona Fire Department reported six alarms during the month; three inside the city and three outside. Only damage reported was \$50 which was a grease fire at the Holiday Restaurant on September 17.

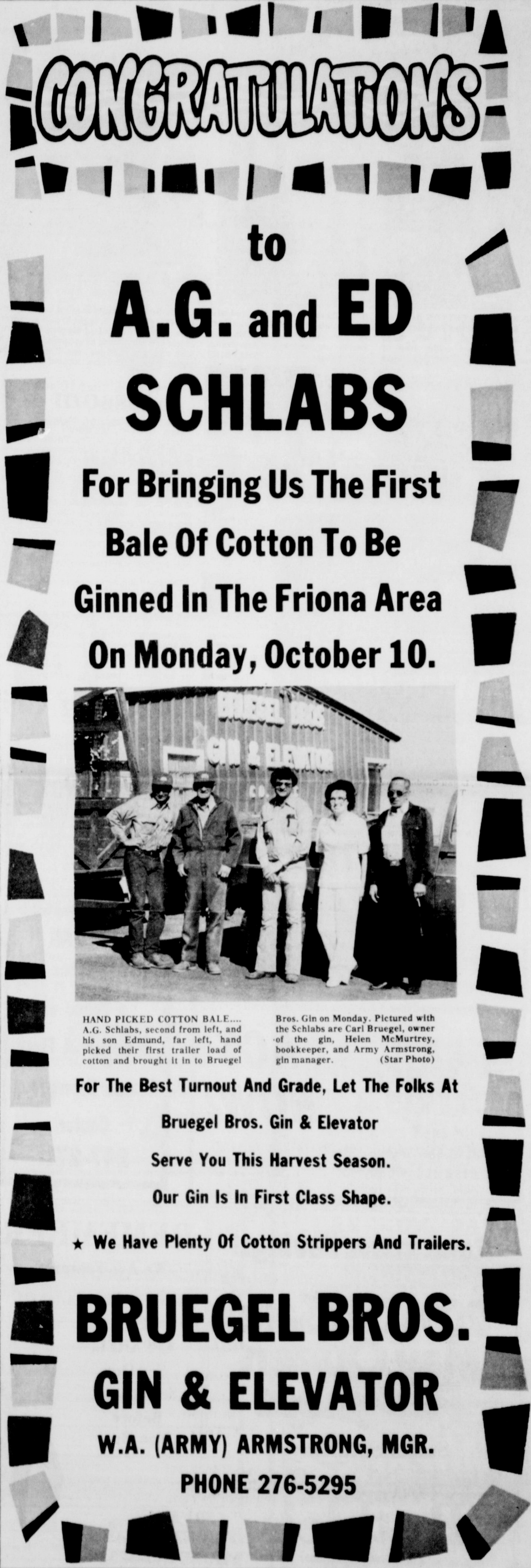

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

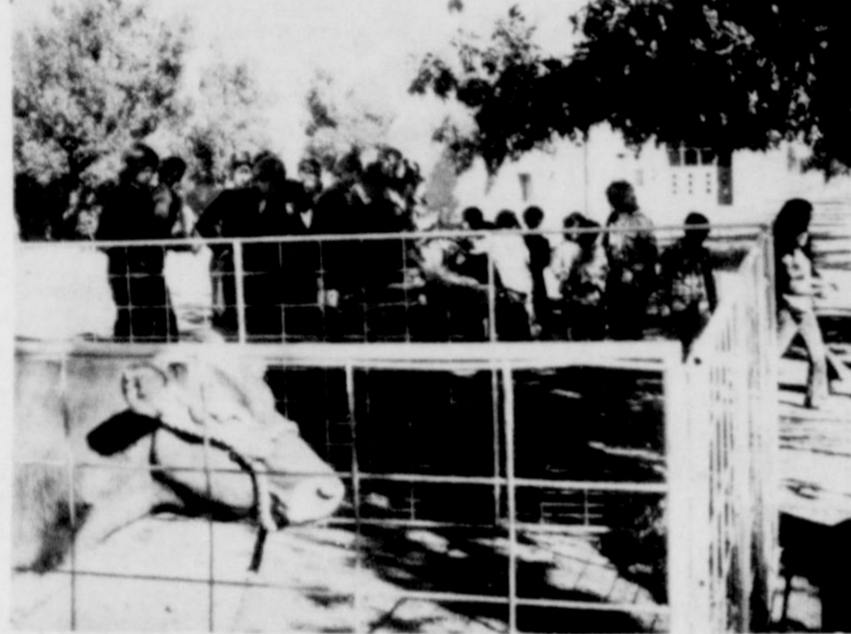
The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors,

Grissom will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district law.

In other areas of leadership, Grissom is active in civic activities. He is a past president and member of the Bovina Lions Club. He is the chairman of the board of directors of the Friona hospital and is a member of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

In Texas there are 198 Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Expect More Arrests For Drug Crimes

Whiteside, London Hold 'Stat' Leads

Glen London and Jeff Whiteside were the offensive statistical leaders for the Friona Chieftains at the midpoint of the 1977 season, a tabulation of the five-game statistics revealed.

Both London, the senior fullback, and Whiteside, senior halfback, have identical averages of 4.2 yards per carry. London has carried the most times, 75, and gained the most yards, 313. Whiteside has touched the pigskin 66 times and picked up 276 yards.

London has the longest gain on a single play, 26 yards, one more than Chuck Nichols had against Tulla in a touchdown run. Nichols, seeing offensive action just in the one game due to an injury, has a seven-yard average on five chances with the ball.

London and Whiteside are also tied for the scoring lead on the team, each having a pair of touchdowns for 12 points.

Whiteside also is the leading pass receiver on the team, with three catches good for 55 yards, including gains of 28 and 26 yards on individual plays.

Kevin Kothmann has four catches good for 40 yards. Both Whiteside and Kothmann have caught a touchdown pass, and each was a

sterling catch, in the Hart game. Quarterback Chris Barnett has completed better than 50 per cent of his passes—52.2 per cent on 12 completions in 23 attempts. Barnett has gained the team 133 yards through the air, and has passed for two touchdowns.

In team statistics after five games, the Chieftains have a close set of stats, in spite of their 1-4 season record. Opponents hold a slight lead in every offensive category except punting, where Kevin Kothmann is averaging 34.4 yards on 20 kicks.

The Chieftains might be 5-0 at midseason if it weren't for their "fourth quarter phobia." Going into the second half of the season, the team has yet to score a point in the final quarter of a game, while opponents have been making hay, racking up 61 points.

In first half statistics, the Chiefs have outscored five opponents, 34-29 going into the intermission. But the second half, particularly the last quarter, has proven disastrous.

In fact, the team had to beat back a final-period rally by Hart for their lone non-conference victory, and came out with their 20-18 win.

On defense, Koty Kothmann has the most unassisted tackles with 13,

and has assisted with 26. Terry Wilcox has 53 assists and seven unassisted. Todd Bandy has 30 assists and six individually.

David Fleming has 32 assists and nine unassisted tackles. Kevin Kothmann has 37 assists and five individually.

Lamb County Lands New Electric Plant

Southwestern Public Service Company has announced that it will invest in excess of \$200-million during the next four years for the

construction of a new electric generating station on the South Plains of Texas.

The announcement was made today by Bill Esler, SPS vice president of engineering and construction. Esler said the new plant would be located on the James Ranch about seven miles west of Southwestern's Plant X in Lamb County.

The plant will be called "Talk Station" in honor of Roy Toik, chairman of the board of SPS and it will have a generating capability of 565,000 kilowatts. Primary fuel for the station will be low-sulphur coal which will be brought in by unit train from Wyoming.

Construction of the new plant will begin next year and is scheduled for completion in 1982. Plans also call for a second 565,000 kilowatt unit to be completed in 1985.

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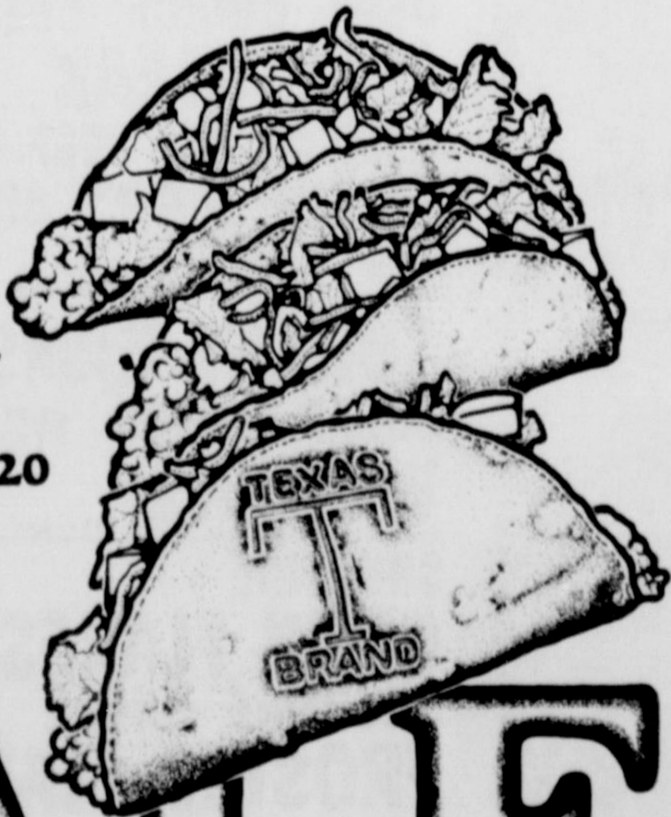
