THE FRIONA CHAMBER of Commerce is to be commended on the plans it has made for the Christmas season locally.

The Chamber is sponsoring, or at least overseeing, a number of activities during the holiday season, all of which should add to the enjoyment of the Christmas se son by the local residents.

The focal point is to be on Monday, December 18, when Santa Claus will arrive in Friona to visit with the youngsters of the area.

The Friona Noon Lions are sponsoring Santa, who will be in his workshop in City Park every night the week of the 18th, to visit with his young friends.

City of Friona employees aided the cause by planting a large Christmas tree in the middle of the city park. We understand that Chief of Police Bill Denney donated the tree, which had been growing in the Denney's yard, and city employees dug it up and re-set it in the park.

The city employees plan to take special pains with the tree this winter, in the hopes that it will take root, and will become a permanent fixture in the park.

The tree will hold a central spot on the 18th, when the Chamber of Commerce sponsors the turning on of the lights for the tree. The Community Choir also is to be involved in the program, singing Christmas Carols

All in all, it sounds like a good, old-fashioned Christmas program, and one that all of our residents

should enjoy.

Then, of course, the Chamber is sponsoring the decorating of the City Park, as well as the annual Christmas Lighting Contest. Residents of the city and the surrounding rural area are reminded that they should call the Chamber office to enter this lighting contest.

and everything it stands for. Unless we draw the line to such protesters, and quit giving them everything they ask for, then our nation, "under God," can count its days because they will be numbered.

Why is the minority allowed to force its will upon the majority? This is all wrong, and needs to be corrected.

Sometimes America has carried

its freedoms just a bit too far. We aren't advocating that we violate anyone's "rights." Far from it. But we think it's high time that the rights of the majority be

And if certain people don't like the country and its traditions, let them get the heck out. They ought to be able to find a place, or we think they should be encouraged to try, in which they can practice their anti-American ideas to their heart's

But stop letting them advocate the overthrow of the government right under the government's nose. Wake up, America!

Snow, Cold Cause **Minor Accidents**

A fast-moving Arctic cold front plummeted temperatures to their lowest point of the season in the Friona area this week, and brought the second snowfall of the season, which measured four inches by Friday morning.

The temperature had reached a high of 67 degrees on Tuesday, before the front invaded, plunging temperatures by almost 40 degrees in a little over an hour. Friday morning's reading of five degrees was the lowest of the season.

Residents woke up to a covering of an inch or two of snow on Thursday morning and extremely slippery conditions, which contributed to a number of accidents in the area. A freezing rain had fallen prior to the snowfall, which made driving and walking extremely slippery.

The City of Friona reported four accidents on Thursday within the city limits, and there were at least two accidents outside the city. Mark Gammon was uninjured when his 1977 Chevrolet pickup overturned southeast of the city on Highway

In another weather-related incident, Mrs. Irene Ridgeway, 68, who lives on Fourth Street, was discovered in her yard by a neighbor returning home for lunch. Mrs. Ridgeway had gone to her mailbox and apparently fell down and was exposed to the cold and snow for at least 40 minutes.

She was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital by ambulance, where she was reported in good condition on Friday morning.

The latest snow as tallied by the City of Friona amounted to four inches, and .16 inch moisture. But it brought about another delay for some cotton farmers, who are having quite a time getting their 1978 crop harvested.



Some people are totally permissive. Others offer the lame excuse that both parents are employed, preventing them from assisting with studies or teaching their children proper manners and goals in life. Neither of these are valid.

It is high time, and hopefully not too late, that society admits public school systems are not a panacea for the nation's ills. Equally, the schools are not responsible for behavior contrary to a civilized people. To help, yes; totally responsible, no. No longer can we afford the luxury of "packing" our children off to school, complacent that once sent the home is no longer involved. The old saw that discipline begins

in the home is very true. The same applies to study. The teachers in this nation can try to teach for the 55 or 60 minute classroom period. Once the students leave the confines of the public school buildings, responsibility reverts to the home. Let us all hope and pray this responsibility is accepted---and soon.

SCS To **Formulate** Program

The ability of farmers and ranchers to continue to produce adequate food and fiber was the number one natural resource concern expressed in Texas during a series of statewide meetings held

earlier this year. Soil erosion by water, deterioration of rangeland, shortage of municipal and rural water supplies, and irrigation water management came in second, third and fourth, and firth-respectively-in a tabulation made by the U.S. Soil

Conservation Service. George C. Marks, state conservationist for SCS in Texas, said that some 8,500 Texans established these priority concerns during a series of 377 public meetings held last spring and summer. The meetings were held in compliance with the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act

Mack Mauldin, district conservationist for Soil Conservation Service at Friona, said the number one resource concern expressed in the local Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District was irrigation water management. More local control and adaptation of practices for our area, wind erosion control and more emphasis on dryland practices came in second, third and fourth in a public meeting held June 13 at Bovina.

SCS and local conservation districts sponsored the meetings in each of the state's 198 soil and water conservation districts.

Other statewide concerns listed in order of ranking were flooding, loss of rural lands to urban sprawl, soil erosion by wind, rural development, increased demand for recreational facilities, and loss of wildlife

The public inputs from Texas were forwarded to Washington where they will be combined with responses from the other states. National concerns will be announced in 1979. At that time, the public will again be asked to help SCS and conservation districts decide what conservation programs should be used to solve local concerns.

A national conservation program will then be presented to President Carter to concentrate on the nation's top natural resource concerns on a priority basis.

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
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HANGING CLOSE....Karen Patterson (40) of the Friona Squaws, works the ball, but gets close

Squaws Gain Experience

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


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Teamwork Evident Chiefs Are Winning



Windbreaks Can Save On Energy

It is estimated that a well planned, established windbreak can save up to 30 per cent in heating and cooling costs. Two or three rows of trees not only protect the farmstead from high winds, they also improve the beauty, privacy, and overall quality of life within their boundaries.

Again this year the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is sponsoring a windbreak tree planting program. To participate in the program, the owner must have at least two acres of rural land and agree not to use the trees for ornamental or landscaping purposes. These trees cannot be resold as living trees.

When ordered through conservation district the cost is surprisingly low. The cost for potted trees is \$13 for 30 trees, or \$18 for 100 barerooted trees. Although they are a little higher in price the potted trees are more generally recommended since they do not require a nursery type environment the first year as the bare rooted trees do

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
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

Shop, Mail Early, **Postmaster Advises**

"Don't take a chance on disappointing someone you love, send you gift parcels and cards early enough to insure their delivery before Christmas, not after, Postmaster Richard Wilson advised today.

Such disappointments can be avoided if Christmas mailers will observe the following mailing schedule:

1. Gift parcels going to distant states should be mailed by December 8.

2. Parcels going to local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than December 14.

3. The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside address label. The outside label should be placed on only one side of each parcel.

4. Greeting cards going to distant states should be mailed not later than December 8. Cards going to local and nearby areas should be in the mail by December 14.

The Postmaster also emphasized the importance of using ZIP Codes and adding a return address to all Christmas mail. It only takes a

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

That's the name of Fran's recipe, which reads as follows: 2 cups chicken (4 breasts) cooked and chopped; 1 clove crushed garlic; 1 dozen flour tortillas; 6 chicken bouillon cubes; 1/2 pound grated cheese (Jack or Swiss); 1 chopped onion; 2 cups tomato sauce; 2 cans mild green chilies; 1 (4 oz.) can mushrooms; 3 cups half and half cream; 2 tablespoons oleo; and pinch of salt.

Saute onions in oleo. Add garlic, tomato sauce, green chilies; chicken and salt. Simmer for ten minutes. In a large skillet, heat--do not boil--cream, bouillon cubes and mushrooms. Dip tortillas in cream mixture, then fill with chicken.

Roll up and arrange in baking dish with small space left in between. Top with remaining cream mixture and grated cheese. Bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees. For dress up, garnish with avocado slices, eggs and green chilies.


