TAXPAYERS IN the city and school district are being invited to examine their recent statements of re-evaluation of their real and personal property, and to contact the taxing officials if they have any questions.

In fact, the school and city are hosting a series of pre-hearing dates this coming week starting Monday, during which residents are invited to appear and ask questions.

In seeking to equalize the tax base for everyone, real and personal property has been re-evaluated on a basis of 100 per cent. In the past, the taxes were figured based on a percentage of the actual valuation.

Due to the immense size of the re-evaluation process, school and city officials recognize that errors in computing the tax base could have been made, and they want all residents to appear at the scheduled hearings.

ONCE AGAIN WE tip our hat to the Friona Volunteer Fire Department, for a tremendous job in staging the city's annual July 4th fireworks display.

The firemen, staging the city's 10th annual Community Fireworks Display, put on a show that did not have to rank second to anyone's fireworks. And they accomplished the chore in spite of a south breeze that really tested the firemen and their ability to adequately propel the "missiles."

According to the best estimates we have been able to come up with, the crowd watching the fireworks was the largest of any of the previous nine displays. This means that over 5,000 residents of the area came to Friona for the display.

The other events, particularly the Friona Noon Lions Club's barbecue lunch, were also well attended. A spokesman for the club estimated that between 850 and 1,000 persons were served in the event at the Community Center.

We sincerely believe that the big fireworks display helps to a large extent to keep people in town for the holiday, and thereby helps the attendance and participation in the other July 4th events.

This is why we were mystified by the recent Chamber of Commerce decision to drop sponsorship of the fireworks. It appears to us that the fireworks are the key to the success of the entire holiday slate of activities.

Some people have made light of the fact that so much money is spent on the annual display, which just "goes up in smoke" in less than an hour.

But we submit the fact that it draws the largest crowds to watch any single event in the city all year long as overwhelming evidence that the public wants a fireworks display.

And, just like we believe there should be a Santa Claus appear locally each year around Christmas-time, we feel that our local citizens are deserving of their own fireworks display each year.



Council To Consider Gas Issue

The Friona City Council will meet Monday night at 8 p.m. at City Hall. On the agenda will be a report and recommendations from Bill McMorries on the water surge problem.

New business will include discussion of Pioneer Natural Gas Company's intent to request a gas rate increase. Gale Warren will then report on the status of Southwestern Public Service Company's request of a rate increase.

The council will also review Ordinance No. 81 on the control of small animals.

Pioneer Asks For Increase

Pioneer Natural Gas Company has notified the city officials on its West Texas System that the Company is applying for an increase in its base rate for gas service within the cities on its West Texas distribution system.

In his letter to the cities, K.B. Watson, Company President said, "As you are probably aware, Pioneer's last base rate increase became effective during the year 1970, based on recommendations of the Company and a committee of city representatives." Watson went on to say, "Since that time, in spite of the increased cost of gas to the consumer, the Company's rate of return has decreased substantially due to many factors and an increase in the base rate is now essential."

Watson pointed out that the increase in the customer's cost of gas over the past several years has come about by the "cost-of-gas adjustment, an adjustment that is designed to pass the increased cost of gas in the field directly through to the consumer." "Pioneer does not retain any of the increased cost of gas and does, in fact, fail to recover much of the increase because of several cost items not recovered in the cost-of-gas adjustment," Watson said.

Company officials have pointed out on numerous occasions in the past that the cost-of-gas adjustment has been the assurance that Pioneer Natural Gas Company has been able to maintain an adequate gas supply to protect the interest of the customers it serves and to enable the Company to continue to serve the growth of its service area.

Pioneer has not specified the new rates needed in this initial request to the cities and said it would supplement the application. The Company has retained the services of H. Zinder and Associates, Inc., utility consultants, to assist in the study currently being made to determine the appropriate amount of the deficiency in the gas service revenue at Pioneer.

Watson told the city officials that a preliminary draft of a report of the studies made by the utility consultants indicates the current value of the properties used to serve the West Texas Distribution System to be in excess of \$178 million in addition to the value of properties used to serve irrigation and other rural customers.

The rate increase request will be discussed by the Friona City Council at their regular monthly meeting Monday night at 8 p.m.

ON RE-EVALUATIONS

Taxpayers Urged To Ask Questions

The City of Friona and the Friona Independent School District urge those with questions about their property re-evaluations to meet this week in the pre-hearings.

Representatives from McMorries and Company of Hereford, who handled the re-evaluation, will meet with taxpayers at the High School Cafeteria Monday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., according to Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

The representatives will meet with taxpayers regarding the valuations. They will go over the property evaluations and the method used to determine the values, Jarboe said.

Some letters that were mailed out did not contain values for the property. Jarboe said these will be established at the pre-hearings.

City and school district officials urge taxpayers to compare their property values with other comparable property.

"The School Board and City Council are concerned about fair,

equal and just values being used," Jarboe said.

The superintendent said that McMorries realizes in a re-evaluation effort of this size, incorrect evaluations could have been made. He gathered facts from many sources but some circumstances about the property may need to be called to McMorries' attention, especially about pump capacities, Jarboe said.

Rendition forms have been mailed for rendering of all property. Tax Assessor-Collector David Cooper expresses his appreciation for the good responses and the number of forms returned. He encourages all to return the forms.

Jarboe said the law places the responsibility of rendering on the property owners.

"The School Board and City Council feel at this time that tax rates will not exceed 70 cents per \$100 evaluation for the city and 80 cents per \$100 for the school district," Jarboe said. "It is hoped

by both entities at this time that this will be the maximum tax rate."

He said the aim of both in the re-evaluation effort was not to generate more revenue, but to equalize. The budgets for both the city and school district are comparable to last year's.

Mayor B.K. Buske said the city is making an effort to hold the line on budgets and Board President Floyd Reeve said the school is also.

The Board of Equalization will meet Friday, July 14, in the cafeteria from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with any property owners who feel their taxes are not equal, Jarboe said.

The officials urge all taxpayers to go before the re-evaluation representatives in the pre-hearings before meeting with the Board of Equalization.

City Manager Jake Outland said the city had not re-evaluated property since 1949. Superintendent Jarboe said the school district had not re-evaluated since 1959.

News And Views From American Agriculture

The American Agriculture Movement would like to thank the Friona State Bank, Parmer County Cattle Company and Friona Industries for their support of the beef industry. These businesses gave each of their employees \$20 worth of beef during Beef Production Week.

Rodney Dunham of Friona Industries said they had encouraged their employees to buy prime beef, not just hamburger, with the gift. These gifts bought approximately \$8000 worth of beef.

In addition to the problems caused by the President's action on the increase in beef imports, other imports are also hurting the economy.

The auto industry imports many replacement parts from South America. This importation makes tax recipients instead of tax payers out of many auto and related industry workers.

With the talk about a 32-hour work week, the wage pay scale will have to be increased per hour to keep the standard of living at present levels.

The increased cost will be passed on to the consumer in the price paid for the products. Consumers will not be able to afford the products, cutbacks will be made in the industry and more will be laid off. This means even more expense to the consumer.

This is the same with the beef industry. Truckers, feed lots, slaughter houses and grain producers will all be hurt by the increase in importation—and they are being hurt now.

Importation is what started the vicious circle. There must be controls on imports with quotas or higher tariffs.

The fruit stand in Bovina will be opened within the week. Fruits and vegetables in season will be sold at parity prices.

When buying fresh fruits and vegetables from your neighbors, use these prices as a guide so you won't cheat your friends.

These prices will also be used for the stand.

According to the USDA, parity prices for May are:

- Onions, 11.4 cents per pound
- Potatoes, 6.3 cents per pound
- Cucumbers, 17 cents per pound
- Cantaloupe, 16 cents per pound
- Bell peppers, 27 cents per pound
- Beans, 32.3 cents per pound
- Watermelon, 5.6 cents per pound
- Cabbage, 9.7 cents per pound
- Lettuce, 12.6 cents per pound
- Sweet potatoes, 15.1 cents per lb.

Bush Looking To Congressional Race

Congressional candidate George Bush said in Friona Tuesday that he believes two issues will be prominent in his campaign against Democratic nominee Kent Hance: inflation and taxes. Stating that inflation is pricing people out of the market place, Bush said he is advocating a 33-1-3 reduction of taxes over a two-year period. "I would like to see a reduction of taxes at the federal level—that's where the fat is, and where things can be trimmed," the Midland resident said. Attacking President Carter's proposals to limit inflation, he charged that Carter's plan is to shift tax money around. "His program is just 'cosmetic,' Gurs is a definite tax cut," Bush said.

Bush pointed out that a salary of \$20,000 just ten years ago would have to be doubled today in order to have the same purchasing power. In the same time period, taxes have tripled, he said. The candidate for Congress, 19th district said we need to reward the working man, who has borne the brunt of taxes for a number of years. He said he felt he would run well in Parmer County in November, in spite of his lackluster showing against Jim Reese in the Republican primary. "Reese had several built-in advantages in this area, not the least of which was a prior campaign. I think I can pick up most of the conservative voters in November," Bush said.







The Friona School System has always endeavored to deliver the best possible education for the least amount of tax dollars and we shall continue to do so in the future, realizing that education is a commodity everyone deserves. The City has held the line on taxes since 1973, while providing a maximum amount of service at a minimum cost. Our desire is fair, equal, and just values.

Priscilla Pruett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Pruett, recently returned from Girl's State where she served as the Precinct II Chairman of the Nationalist Party for Friendship County.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purpose of the Girl's State program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults.

They learn the problems of government by assuming the duties of city, county and state officials as stipulated by the Texas Legislature. Each year citizens are selected at local levels from students who have just completed their junior year in high school.

The selection is based principally on leadership, character, and scholarship.

The 1978 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Texas Bluebonnet Girl's State has grown from an experimental conference of ninety-four girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas.

This year 560 girls are in attendance, making a total of more than 13,500 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Former citizens of Girl's State and members of the Texas American

Legion Auxiliary comprise the seventy members of the staff and counselors who volunteer their services to direct and lead this program.


The chairman of the Girl's State Committee is Mrs. James Lee of Sweetwater, and the Director is Frances Goff of Houston, assistant to the Vice President for Administration of The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston.

One of the highlights of the session, which began June 13 and ends June 23, will be the selection of two outstanding citizens of 1978 who will be sent to Girl's Nation in Washington, D.C. This program which is also sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary will give the two young representatives the opportunity to continue their study in responsibilities of the Republic.

During the session the citizens were privileged to hear the following guest speakers: Ms. Marjorie Wilhelm, a former Governor of Girl's State, now an attorney with the Fulbright and Jaworski Law Firm of Houston; Ms. Ann Richards, Travis County Commissioner of Austin; and Ms. Martha Smiley of the Texas Attorney General's office. All of these women are former citizens of Texas Girl's State.

Governor Dolph Briscoe spoke to the citizens on the campus of Texas Lutheran College on Wednesday, June 21. He was introduced by Mrs. Jane Blumberg, a member of the Board of Regents of both The University of Texas and Texas Lutheran College.
