JUDGING BY the turnout of folks to hear tax reform speaker, Dr. A.B. Tibbetts here Thursday, the natives are growing restless concerning the amount of money that they pay each year into the federal coffers, and worse, how the government spends it.

Somewhere around 200 people crowded into the Parmer House Restaurant to hear Dr. Tibbetts speak Thursday night. He said it was the largest turnout for a first meeting in any city in which he has held a tax seminar.

At the Friona meeting, Dr. Tibbetts announced plans to demand that Texas citizens be given the right to establish, by constitutional amendment, a tax ceiling, such as California voters did with their Proposition 13.

The demand is to be made through petitions, which the Tax Action Patriots are to begin distributing throughout this area.

Dr. Tibbetts isn't your run of the mill advocate of tax reform. Since the government uses unconstitutional means of gathering and spending your taxes, he advocates equally strong measures on the part of taxpayers.

Some of his methods may be too strong for the average taxpayer, who have been raised in an atmosphere that has raised the Internal Revenue Service to a level little short of monarchy status, and with more apparent power than any other arm of the government.

"Fear tactics" are the main thing the IRS has going for them, Dr. Tibbetts says. He maintains that it is high time that American citizens revolt from unbearable taxes, because the government seems to be bent on heaping on taxes as long as the American citizen will pay them.

Paul Harvey made an interesting comment along the line of taxation and welfare recently—"If taxpayers were the only ones allowed to vote, politicians would not be intimidated by all of the freeloaders."

## Omaha Packer To Merge With MBPXL

Charles M. Harper, President and Chief Executive Director of Conagra, Inc., Omaha, and David J. La Fleur, President and Chief Executive Officer of MBPXL Corporation, Wichita, Kansas, announced jointly that they have agreed in principle for merger of the two companies.

It is contemplated that Conagra would exchange seven-eighths of one share of its common stock and one-thirty-second of one share of its \$100.00 par Class C, six per cent cumulative preferred stock for each MBPXL Common Share. The agreement is subject to approval by the directors and shareholders of both companies and successful completion of customary business investigations and merger conditions. The common stock of both companies is traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

Mr. Harper indicated that MBPXL would operate as an autonomous subsidiary of Conagra, Inc.

Harper said, "MBPXL Corporation holds the number two share of the market in the boxed beef business, which is the leading edge in the beef processing industry. The Company has a fine management team that will continue to operate and grow the company as a part of Conagra's family of businesses."

"This move is an important step in Conagra's growth as a basic food company. The merger also meets Conagra's stringent financial criteria and is compatible with Conagra's basic return on equity and balance sheet objectives as stated in Conagra's Annual Report."

"It is anticipated that this important basic food business will represent about 35 to 40 per cent of the combined companies profit contributions. The combined company's sales will be in excess of one and one-half billion dollars."

## Turn Lane Set For MBPXL

The Highway Department has been constructing a left-turn lane at the MBPXL entrance on U.S. Highway 60, and the new lane should be ready for operation very shortly.

Highway crews have been building up the shoulder on the north side of Highway 60 in order to get the additional width needed for the left-turn lane.

The left turn lane will begin some 800 feet from the entrance for traffic coming from the east. The widening lane will begin some 750 feet from the entrance to the east, and 500 feet toward the west. The actual left-turn lane will extend about 150 feet in either direction from the entrance.

The addition of the lane is expected to greatly improve the traffic flow and allow trucks entering the beef processing plant a waiting lane, so that through traffic may pass more easily.

## Registration Continues

Early registration will continue for students new to the Friona school system through this week, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

As of Thursday, some 12 new students had registered with the respective principals. Jarboe urged parents of students attending Friona schools for the first time to have their children pre-register this coming week, at either the high school, junior high or grade school principal's office.

Jarboe said that buses will run at their regular time. There will be no change, in order to comply with the breakfast program enacted by the Texas legislature, which begins the second day of school.

## News And Views From American Agriculture

Ever wonder just what the devaluation of the dollar means to the American people and what it means to the foreign countries?

To the American farmer it is very devastating. By this we are of course talking about our exports. Bob Bergland told a group of farmers in Amarillo last spring that the United States exported 185 million metric tons of feed grains in 1977 and that the U.S. would export 215 million metric tons of feed grains in 1978 but that it would bring in less revenue to the U.S.

It seemed strange that we could export 30 million metric tons more feed grains and receive less for the goods than we had received the year before with the prices higher. But this has come about through the devaluation of the dollar and through inflation.

Japan is buying corn today at less than half of the price that they paid for corn a year ago. Even though the price for corn and virtually all feed grains are up in price here in the United States, the same food grains are still costing less than half what they did in Japan a year ago. This is not only true for Japan but is true for nearly all the nations that import our goods. So it is bargain day for all the foreign nations that buy our feed

grains. Oil, by the same token, is costing the Japanese more this year than it did last year as they buy all their oil with U.S. dollars coming from the vast amount of goods sold here in the U.S. Point of interest: Japan has no petroleum production and imports all their oil needs.

Virtually all food grains are a little higher at this time in 1978 than they were a year ago, and the federal government is making a big play about how the 1977 farm bill is working, but this is the biggest farce in history.

In actuality, we as farmers are in the same sorry price squeeze that we were in a year ago through inflation. Input costs continue to skyrocket, more than offsetting any benefits that we might have received by the higher prices. To this point, we are at just about the same place that we were at the close of last year, but we still have 5 months of inflation ahead.

Last year the U.S. farmers operated on a 1.2 per cent profit on investment. This is an all-time low. 1978 looks to be even worse. With five months remaining for inflation the ratio of profit could slip below the 1.0 per cent mark and this includes the better cattle prices

received for the first part of the year.

AAM met with the National Chamber of Commerce last Thursday in Amarillo but accomplished nothing. The National Chamber of Commerce was very instrumental in defeating our farm bill last spring.

The National Chamber still can't understand why farmers want to pay for their land. They think that we should pass the land, debts, and interest along to our sons and daughters. They said "This is not a time for profits and paying off land notes. This is a time of borrowing."

Ever wonder just how people who think like this could attain such high positions? The man who made this statement is a high official with Continental Grain Company.

Remember, apathy got us where we are today...so let's not be apathetic about such dire problems.

# Writer Sees Conflict In Trilateral's Aims

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

When Jimmy Carter took the above oath of office, he swore allegiance to the Constitution of the United States. It is my belief that President Carter has broken faith with the citizens of this country by placing the interests of international agencies above our national interests. It is my contention that when he took the oath of office as President, Carter, who promised never to lie to us, told the biggest lie of all.

+++

"We will have world government, whether you like it or not, by conquest or consent." (Statement by James Warburg before the United States Foreign Relations Committee)

"The management of foreign relations appears to be the most susceptible of abuse of all the trusts committed to a Government...." James Madison 1798.

The Trilateral Commission, an elite group of some 250 individuals from the United States, Western Europe and Japan, was established in 1973 by David Rockefeller (who is also the primary source of funding for the Commission.) Its stated purpose is, among other things, to meet semiannually to discuss topics relating to global problems, especially those dealing with economics and politics.

On October 19, 1977, a Paul Scott report revealed the real purpose of the Commission is "to influence or take over all the key policy-making

positions in the governments of the United States, Western Europe and Japan." The objective is "permanent coordination of the entire free world and eventually the establishment of a loosely knitted socialistic world government." (Henry Kissinger, who holds dual membership in the Council on Foreign Relations and the Trilateral Commission, has stated he believes that a "loosely knit world government can become a reality by the 1980's.")

Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale are both "former" members of the Trilateral Commission, as are about 25 other members of the Carter Administration. (Commission members serving in the Executive branch are designated as "inactive" or "former" members.)

A notable Trilateralist is Z. Brzezinski, the first director of the Commission, and who is now Carter's number one foreign policy adviser. Brzezinski's book, "Between Two Ages," formed the concept for "a community of developed nations" that would direct the world to new levels of freedom, human rights and economic progress. Or, as the Rockefeller and their allies refer to it, "The New World Order." "Because his foreign policy speeches are written by men assigned to him by David Rockefeller, Carter often uses the phrase "New World Order." (Larry McDonald)

The New York Times says that, advised by Brzezinski, Jimmy Carter "has established a consistent theme in his foreign policy statements: 'We must replace balance of power politics with world order politics.'" Since Brzezinski holds that the "nation-state as a fundamental unit of man's organized life has ceased to be the principal creative force," what will replace it? He gives us a hint when

he states: "International corporations are acting and planning in terms that are far in advance of the political concepts of the nation-state." You can see why David Rockefeller likes "Ziggy."

Cyrus Vance (Secretary of State), Harold Brown (Sec. of Defense) and Michael Blumenthal (Sec. of the Treasury) all hold dual memberships in the CFR and the Trilateral Commission. (Their Rockefeller and CFR connections are tied in closely with their business connections. Besides being Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Rockefeller Foundation, Vance is press connected; he sits on the Board of the New York Times, the most influential newspaper in America.)

We have been told that Brzezinski will be the creative genius in foreign policy and that Vance will be the administrator. That doesn't leave much of a role for Carter to play, except as their spokesman.

Here is a bit of Foreign Policy maneuvering that perhaps you haven't heard about. Last fall, President Carter went to the United Nations in New York, in a very quiet visit, and signed two treaties, reversing 29 years of American foreign policy position.

These treaties, if ratified by the Senate, nullify your right to own private property. This is in complete disagreement with the Constitution which guarantees our right to private property (the 5th and 14th Amendments). This is the Constitution Carter swore to preserve, protect and defend.

A task force report titled "The Crisis of Democracy," written by Brzezinski and other Commission members, was issued in 1974. This document states, "Some of the problems of governance in the United States today stem from an 'excess of democracy'....(In the Trilateralists opinion, our Consti-

tution allows us too many rights; we would be more easily controlled if we had less freedom). The report recommended limits on freedom of the press, such as "prior restraint" of what newspapers may publish and, should this not control the press sufficiently, the "alternate could well be regulation by the government." (In other words, a government-controlled press)

President Carter was in attendance at the Commission meeting in Japan in 1975 when this report was presented to the full membership. One must believe Carter agreed with the report's recommendations since he made no protest to them in the debate that followed.

It was at this same meeting Brzezinski, speaking from the dais, praised Carter's candidacy (for President) before all the Commissioners. Every member there knew Carter was Rockefeller's (and the Trilateral's) candidate for President. A full year before he became nationally known in the United States, it was known by the "elites" in the Commission that Carter could most likely be our next President.

And here is a tidbit of news about some domestic policy. Executive Orders No. 11921 and No. 11490 can be used to establish a federal dictatorship whenever the President deems it expedient. Should he and the Congress lock horns on an issue the President feels is of vital importance, he can declare by a signed proclamation that a national emergency exists, and from the moment the proclamation is published in the Federal Register, it has the force of law. And under these orders, all food, money, credit, transportation, communications, public utilities, energy and all other facets of the lives of every citizen would be under complete control of the Federal cabinets and agencies.

"All changes toward a socialistic world government are to be brought about quietly with a law passed here in Congress, a treaty negotiated there." (W.S. McBirnie, Ph.D. in "The Trilateral Commission, America's New Secret Government")

Though the Trilateral Commission is no longer secret, the fact remains they are still accomplishing their goals. "They have kidded themselves by believing that they do represent the mainstream of the American people....The Commission has published some pamphlets, but the strategy continues secretly without debate in public....It's being carried out in spite of the wishes of the American people." (Jeremiah Novak in a radio interview).

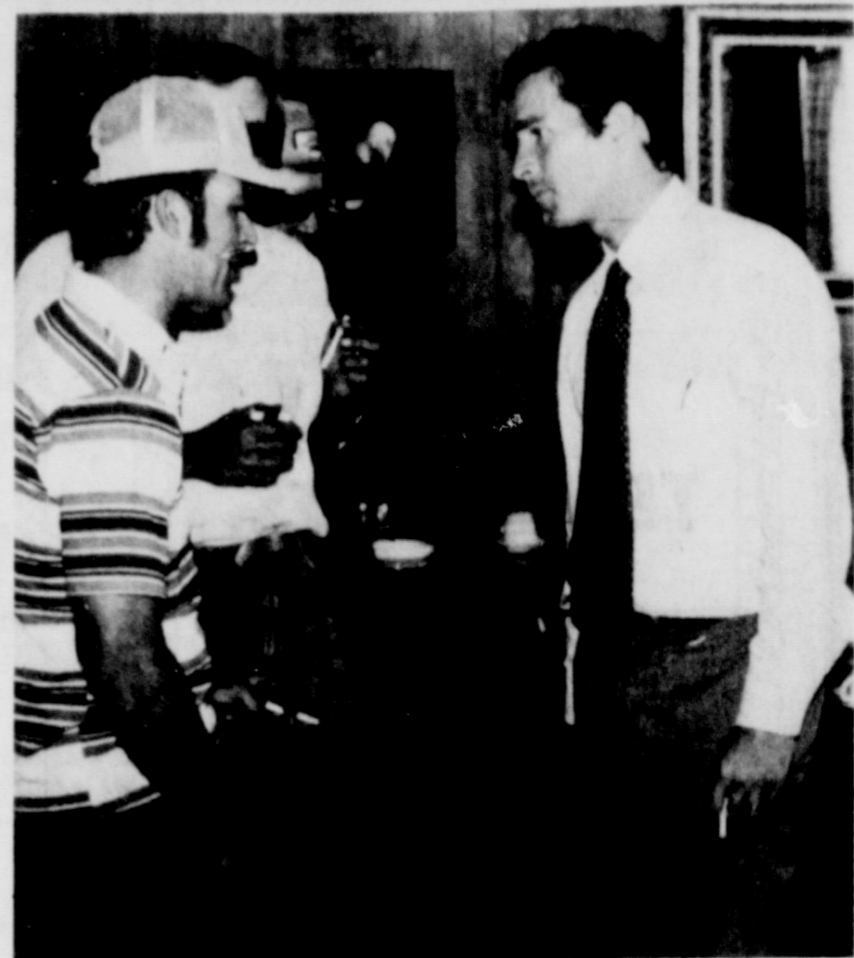

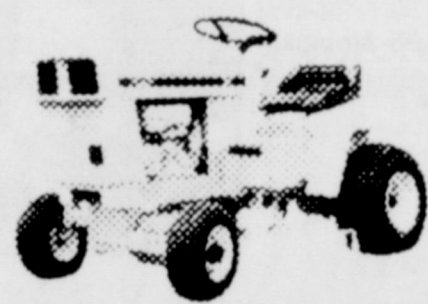

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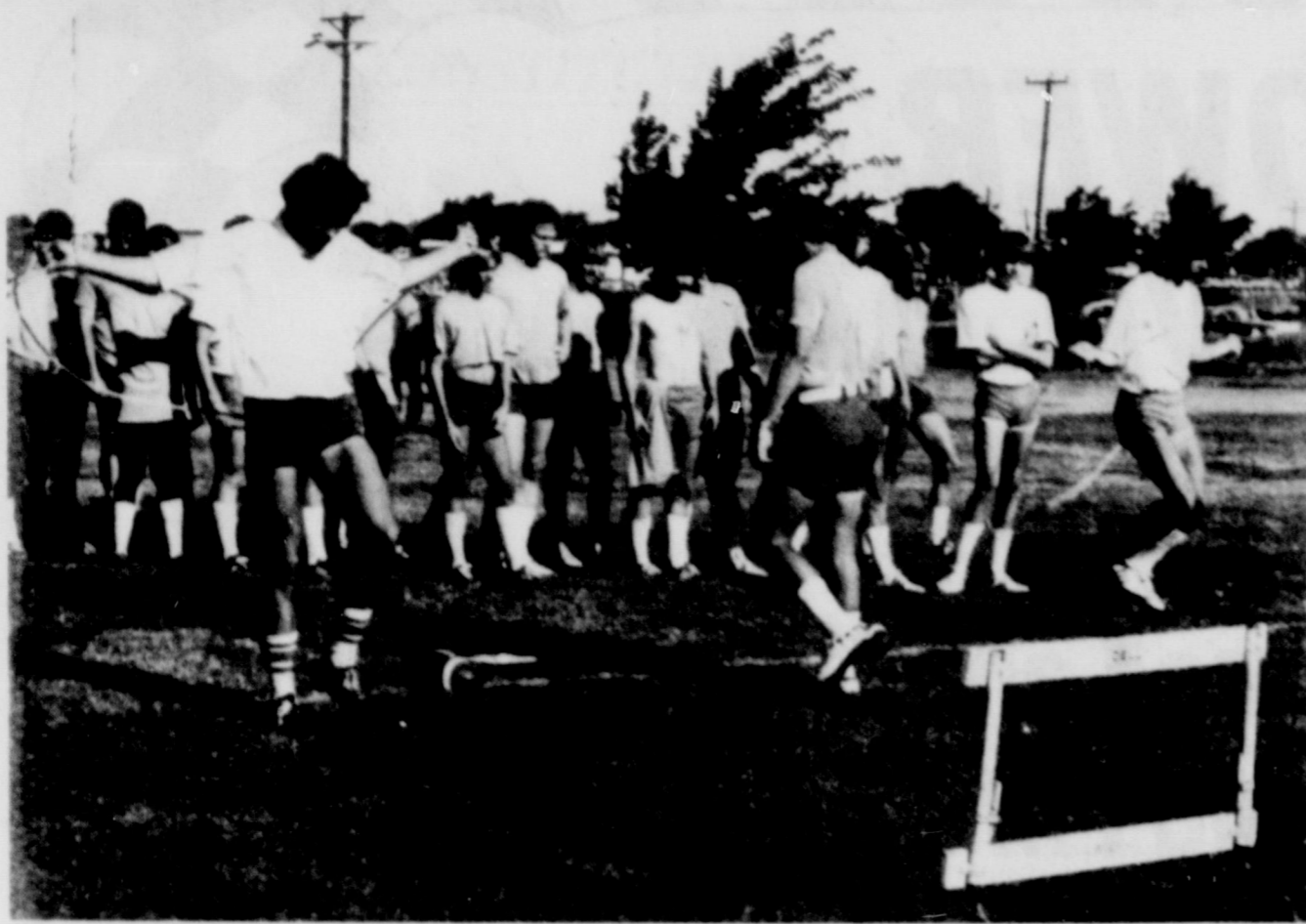

"Our seniors are doing a super job of leading the team, and I'm real proud of the way the freshmen players are working. They are

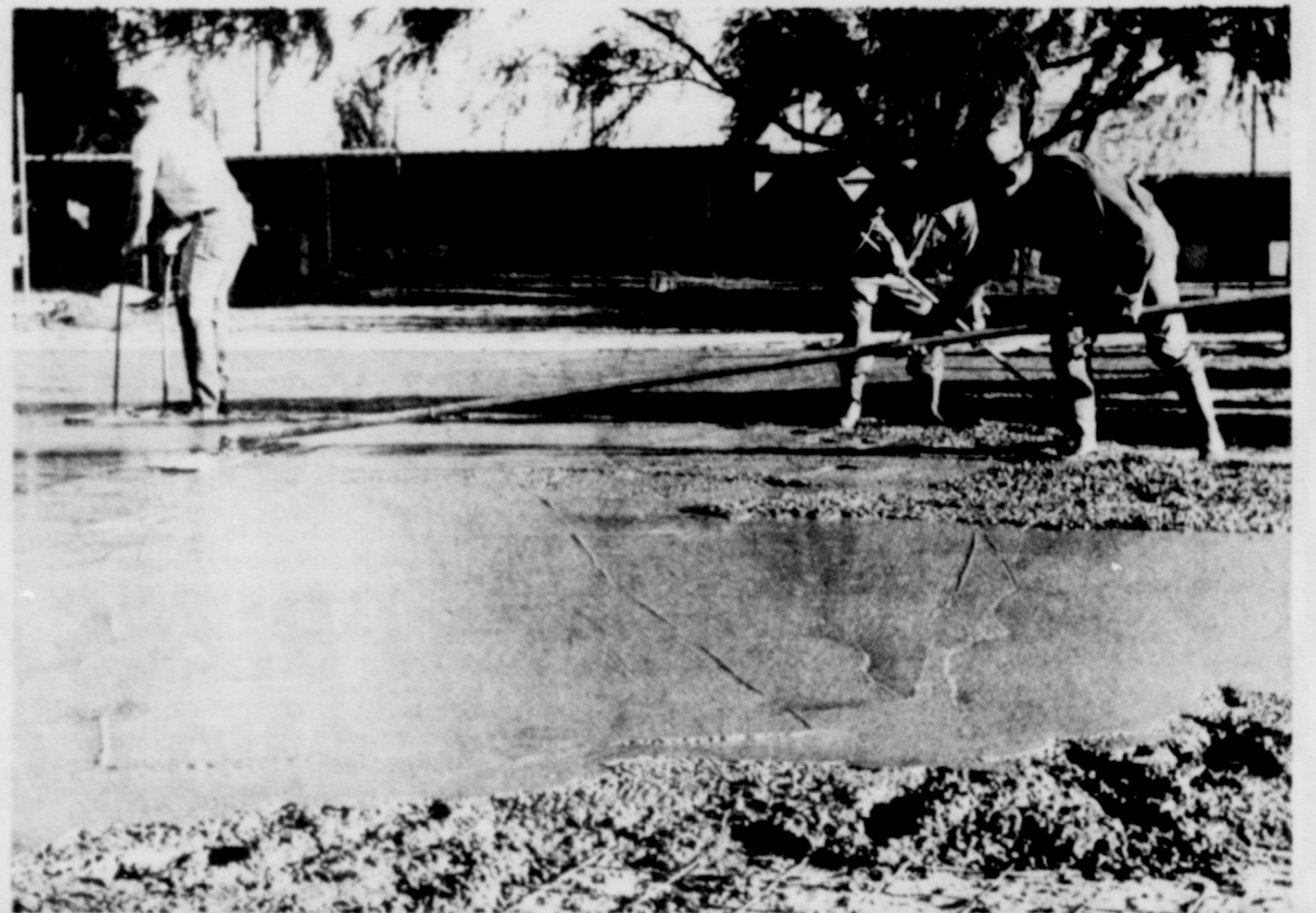

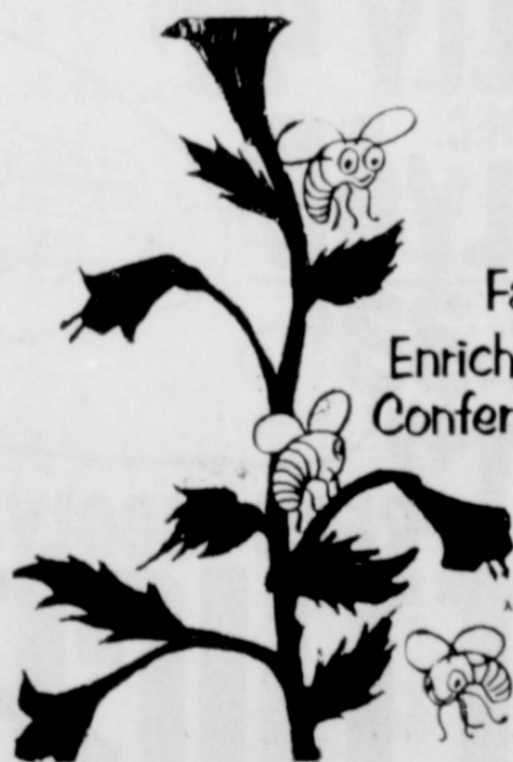
