**DON'T LOOK NOW, FOLKS**, but Friona is a real up-to-date city, complete with a traffic signal on Main Street at the Highway 60 intersection.

The traffic signal comes about after several attempts in the past proved fruitless. Finally, early in the year, it was found that the traffic at the intersection met the requirements established by the Department of Highways and Public Transportation, and the signals were approved.

However, Highway officials sound a warning to local residents that the new signal could prove to be a real accident center.

They point out that longtime residents of the Friona area, when travelling down Highway 60, will not be accustomed to having to stop at Main Street.

So, they warn motorists who are crossing the Highway or turning onto the highway, even though they have the green light in their favor, to watch for the motorist who may not be accustomed to having a red light in his path.

A good rule to follow will be: Don't take it for granted that oncoming traffic is going to stop, just because they have a red light and you have a green.

Weldon Moody, maintenance foreman for the DHPT in Parmer County, said that at a similar intersection, located elsewhere in the district, the accident ratio went up tremendously the first year after a traffic light was first installed, due to the reasons discussed above.

At any rate, we're proud of the traffic light, and the help it will be for the intersection, especially around noon time, and before and after school during the school year. We applaud the Department of Highways and Public Transportation for their forward thinking in installing the signal.

**WIFE CAROL'S RECENT** proposal that the Panhandle and a portion of West Texas look into the possibility of forming our own state was given a good sounding out last Friday in the Amarillo Daily News.

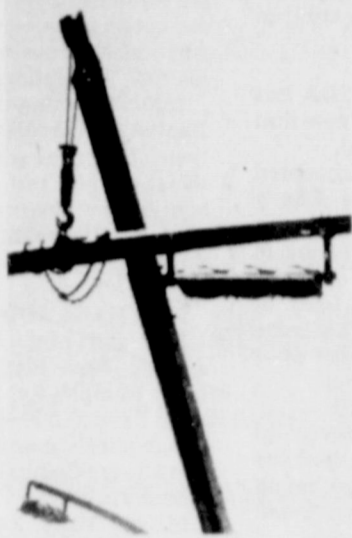

One place we could quickly gain some favor would be in that should the area be able to form its own state, it would have two senators whom, we should hope, would better represent the wishes of our area.

One or two of those interviewed even pointed out that our area has no dearth of leadership talent, and went so far as to suggest possible candidates for governor of the new state of West Texas, or whatever we might decide to call it.

We kinda go along with the principle of the thing, and we honestly would like for some constitutional authority to look into how it could be brought about, so we could give the matter some serious consideration, and not just shrug it off as an amusing possibility.

Our farmers found out last winter and spring that once they got outside the friendly environs of this region, there were few government officials who would even listen to their problems. Some of these who turned a deaf ear were elected officials from their own state.

The time-honored method of achieving goals through government is at the ballot box. We cannot, the way things stand now, achieve our goals in this regard. But we could, if all the people of our region were pulling together for our common good.

## City Approves Water Plan

## Pump Valve Should Correct Major Ills

The City Council voted to accept the recommendations of consultant Bill McMorries on the water surge problem in their monthly meeting Monday night.

McMorries recommended that the city install a pump control valve on the 750 gpm pump. He stated in a report to the council that the pump control valve should be designed to remain closed until the pump is up to speed and then slowly opened.

He also stated in the report that when the signal calls for the pump to stop, the pump should continue to run while the valve begins a slow closing cycle. After the pump control valve is completely closed, then the pump is to stop.

McMorries said this should help to eliminate the surge problem.

He also recommended review of the pipeline network to strengthen the sizes and eliminate the dead ends in the west part of the city. He said this magnifies the surge problem and is a long-range problem that cannot be solved overnight.

McMorries said the cost of tying in the lines and installing the valve would be approximately \$15,000.

For a long-range recommendation, the consultant noted the critical shortage of water in the storage tanks the day the tests on the system were made. He said there were only six feet of water in the elevated tank with both pumps running.

As a long-range solution to the supply problem, McMorries said a ground storage tank should be constructed with a booster pump. This would help the situation by taking some of the work off the 750 gpm pump.

He said the 500 gpm pump should lead with the 750 pump starting after and cutting off before, not both off at once.

The consultant said these recommendations cannot solve all the problems, but can help.

The municipal engineering firm never recommends water lines smaller than six inches installed, McMorries said.

The council asked McMorries about the effectiveness of the valve. He said that the cities his firm had recommended them to have had good luck with them.

He said the surge problem would get worse if the lines in Western Addition were extended toward the west without being looped.

Councilman Clarence Monroe said he favored following McMorries' recommendations.

"If we're going to ask for a man's opinion and then just sit on it, why ask for the man's opinion," Monroe said.

Several motions were introduced by councilmen, but were defeated. The council did approve unanimously a motion to accept the recommendation pending a hearing and further discussion with the city's consulting engineer.

In other council action, a letter of intent to raise the base rate was read from Pioneer Natural Gas Company.

The council also reviewed the ordinance on control of small animals. Several councilmen said the ordinance should be more

strictly enforced.

City Manager Jake Outland said the city was destroying approximately ten dogs a week, but were still receiving complaints about stray dogs.

Councilman Jerry Brown said he would like the people to know that in an incident in which two large dogs killed a small dog, all the dogs were illegal. He said all of them were loose and without a leash as required by the ordinance.

The council also voted to meet with the Board of Directors of Prairie Acres.

The council also voted unanimously to set the tax rate at 70 cents for the next tax year.

## Traffic Signal Is In Operation Here

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has completed installation of the new traffic signals at the intersection of U.S. Highway 60 and Main Street in Friona, it was announced this week.

At 10 a.m. Friday, July 14, the signals were placed on a flashing operation, with "caution" being flashed toward the U.S. 60 traffic, and "stop" being flashed toward Main Street.

On Monday, July 17, the signals will be set on the standard stop and go operation.

Motorists who are familiar with the intersection are cautioned to approach it with care after the signals are put into operation.

Highway officials warn that longtime residents will not be accustomed to having the signals there, so it will be good to keep an eye peeled, especially when coming onto Highway 60 from Main Street, even though you have the green light in your favor.

Signs telling of the approaching traffic signal also have been posted, about a block and one-half ahead of the signal on Highway 60.

The new signals came about following a request by the City of Friona in January of this year. The Highway Department came and conducted a traffic survey, and found that the corner did, indeed, qualify for a traffic signal.

The City was notified by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation on March 6 that the

traffic signal had been approved, and crews began preliminary work on the project early in the summer.

The work was completed this week. Original estimate for placing of the signals, which consist of four L-shaped poles each with two sets of the red-amber-green sequence lights, was \$25,000. Weldon Moody, county maintenance foreman for the DHPT, has supervised the work.

## Board To Meet

The Board of Directors of the United Fund have named their co-chairmen for the upcoming drive, according to President Hollis Horton.

Bill Wilshire, manager of Southwestern Public Service Co. and Ronald Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers will serve as co-chairmen.

The United Fund will hold a meeting Aug. 1 at 10 a.m. in the Community Room of Friona State Bank. All those who will represent groups seeking funds from the drive are urged to attend.

## Farmers May Join Tax Revolt Move

Tax revolt fever is in the air. Farmers in the Friona area say the taxes are too high and they have to come down. More than anything, these farmers are upset over how their taxes are being spent.

"I don't mind paying taxes if they are doing some good," Bill Carthel said. "So many of our taxes are wasted on programs that we just don't want."

Carthel said if the lawmakers don't realize the situation the taxpayers will be in a terrible situation.

"We have reached a point where we can't pay the taxes," according to A.W. Anthony, Jr. "We've had all the waste and welfare we can stand."

"The taxpayer can't stand it much longer," Anthony said.

Gene Welch said it may take a tax revolt to stop the taxes from going up, up, up. He said the taxes are getting so high that if some type of disaster was to happen to the farmer, he'd just have to walk out.

Lloyd Rector thinks the California taxpayers did the right thing. He said it is now up to the people.

"There are people at the top that need to be called down," Rector said.

Spencer Hough said that any politician not voting for a tax cut should not even run for re-election.

He said that the federal government money should be kicked out and a relatively heavy sales tax

imposed. This would be a more equal way of taxing with the burden shared.

"If more taxes are needed, a sales tax is where they should put it," said Carthel. He said this would be a more equal way of taxing than the present system which puts the burden on the property owner.

Carthel said that as a whole, the general public is just taxed to death and are just working for the taxes.

A sales tax is the only way some people pay a tax, Welch said, and with a higher sales tax at least everybody pays some tax.

Anthony was in agreement. He said with sales tax everyone pays some.

Lewis Gore said that the sales tax is not too burdensome now, but every tax is going to have its inequities.

The recent re-evaluation by the city and school district has gotten a definite reaction from the farmers. Some were very upset over the increase.

Anthony said in the reevaluation some of the land north of Friona was appraised at more than the land can be sold for. He said land that is worth approximately \$250 per acre was valued at up to \$600 per acre.

He said the farmers to the north of town were going to dry land farming because they can't afford to water or pay the taxes for irrigated land.

Welch believes the valuation on

## News And Views From American Agriculture

The Appreciation Dinner for Gerald McCatheran was a big success. More than 500 people attended and many more who could not attend sent a donation.

Dignitaries who attended were Senator John Tower, Mayor Jerry Hodge of Amarillo, State Senator Kent Hance, and Attorney-General John Hill. Also attending was Congressional candidate Claude Brown, who is the only candidate to be endorsed by the AAM. He is running against Jim Wright.

Each spoke to the group in a Dean Martin-type roast of McCatheran. Sen. Tower said that a 100 per cent parity farm bill will be presented to the Congress in January, 1979.

Tower said the AAM has definitely attained the attention of all congressmen. He said if the Movement continued to work as we did this past year, we will have the farm bill by March.

The senator also said there was never a push in Washington like American Ag. He said AAM was not there to destroy and there was no violence.

He said AAM has been more educational for all Congressmen and Senators than anything in Washington. He also said the Movement must continue to educate the urban people.

John Hill said if and when he

becomes governor, the state will do more to pass restrictions on imports of vegetables and beef. He said the state was actually in a better position to take action than the federal government.

Hill said there were numerous avenues that can be followed to force action on the national level.

He has asked American Ag representatives to meet with him this Saturday in Austin. Anyone interested in attending the seminar-type meeting should phone the Hereford State Headquarters at 364-7820.

McCatheran told Kent Hance that he would have awful big shoes to fill to replace George Mahon and that AAM would be back in Washington to make sure he did it elected.

AAM has also pledged everything possible to get Brown elected and Jim Wright defeated. Carter and Wright were very upset that AAM demonstrated in Ft. Worth.

Hill said it was Wright who had invited Carter to Texas and Hill didn't want Carter to campaign for him.

**STRIKE NEWS:** The Agriculture Department and Community Services Administration will hold five regional meetings to hear complaints from small farmers and get their suggestions on what to do.

The Southwestern meeting will be

held in Albuquerque Sept. 6-7.

"Food Marketing Alert," a report sent to big volume buyers, reported beef output will be only "adequate" in July. This is the lowest rating in three years.

Some wonder why the USDA has continued to report up until now that beef supplies were plentiful.

Donations are still being accepted for a chance at the 1978 Chevy pickup. A \$5 donation will entitle the donor to a chance at the drawing to be held in August.

People waited in line in Iowa to buy gasoline at 5 cents a gallon more than gasoline. The pumps went non-stop for hours.

The USDA is not in favor of gasohol and is concerned that its production would use up too much corn, resulting in a tight supply and higher prices.

In a totally assinine statement, the USDA said that to replace 10 per cent of the fuel with grain alcohol, 40 per cent of the total grain harvest would be delivered to ethanol production. They said farmers would have to increase acreage or the prices would increase.

The USDA also claims commercial production of ethanol would cost \$1.42 a gallon, compared with 38 cents for refining gasoline.

Bob Bergland has made the statement that the government is not importing beef, just private businesses were importing it. Unbelievable.

He also told the Cabinet that the main cause of higher food prices was the increase in the price of beef. He blamed this on three years of drought, and said that now that the rains have returned, cows are being held back to increase the breeding herd.

In reality, cattlemen cannot afford to keep heifers back to breed and are selling them to slaughter.

his land was fair but questioned the big jump in one step. His property evaluation doubled.

The evaluation of Hough's land was not out of line, he said. He didn't appreciate the way they (evaluators) treated him.

Hough said they had made quite a few mistakes on his property. He said they had a grainery for twice as large as it is.

There is land on the market in the north and west parts of the district for less than the appraisal, Hough said.

Rector said he didn't understand why so much of an increase at once. He said he was told at the pre-hearing that the government had forced the 100 per cent evaluation.

The school district is going to use the same tax rate as last year, 60 cents per \$100 evaluation, Rector said. He questioned the need for so much more money for the schools.

"What I wonder about, with the extra money to spend, in four or five years when the district gets used to spending so much money, what are they going to do when there isn't that much money," Rector said.

"With the new school tax on 100 per cent, they are shooting us out of the saddle," he said.

"Like I told the people at the pre-hearings, I don't like what they've done, but there doesn't seem to be a whole lot we can do about it," Rector said.

He believes that taxing farmland on the productivity is the way it

should be, even though it may have a negative effect in a county like Parmer where productivity is so high.

Gore agrees. He thinks this would be a better way to tax, instead of on the speculative value.

Weich believes that this system would be good for big ranches and forest areas but could ruin counties like Parmer. This would penalize the high producer and take away incentive to produce more.

Awarding of the bid for a new pickup for the county agent, and renewal of the county's Workmen's Compensation insurance highlighted the agenda at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court on July 10.

The commissioners also set a date

for a possible use hearing for the county's revenue sharing funds for the coming year. The date will be August 14, and the county is to give official notification prior to the meeting.

B.E. Duggins of Friona was appointed to a public responsibility committee to assist the Central Plains Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center of Plainview. Mrs. Lucille Lewis was named as alternate member of the committee.

The treasurer's quarterly report was approved, and is presented for public inspection on page six of this issue.

Expenditure of \$150 per month for maintenance for a machine in the sheriff's office was approved.

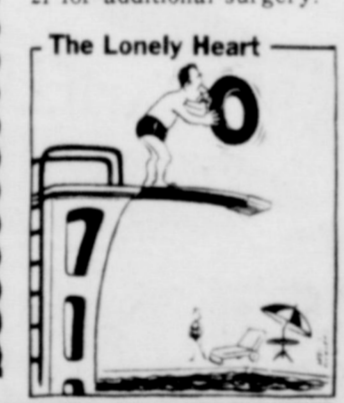
### Hospitalized Out of Town

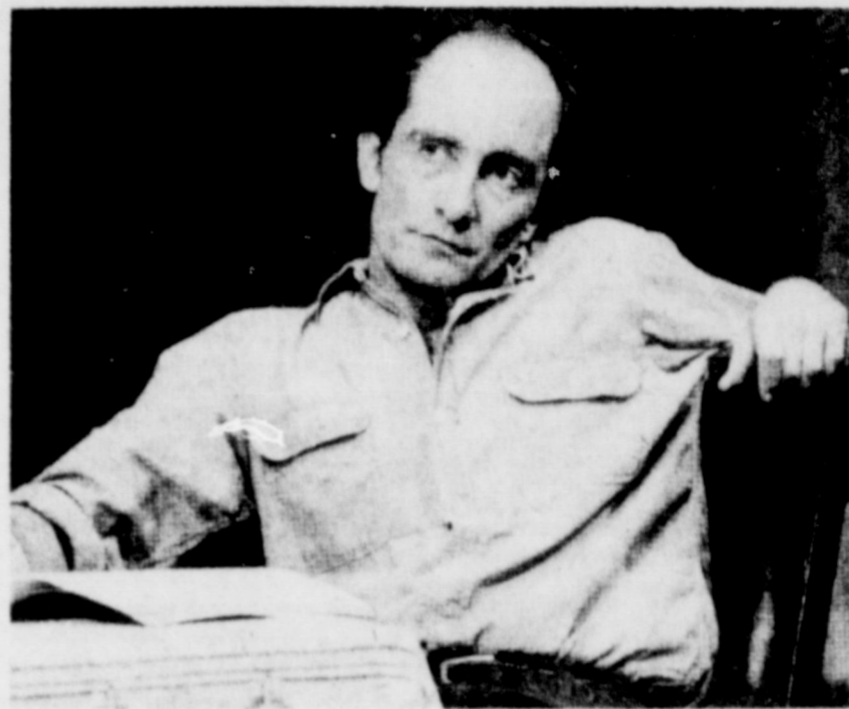

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# Around The House

Before shopping for a new refrigerator, do some planning. Start planning now—sales during the next several weeks may offer the lowest prices during the year.

First, look to the future. A typical family will keep the refrigerator 15 years—so determine what the family's future needs will be. Consider the number of young children and teenagers or whether no children will be in the home during the next 15 years. Also, consider food storage needs—frequent shopping means less capacity is needed. In addition, a large freezer compartment is less important if the family has a separate freezer.

Next, decide on what features are needed. Remember, more gadgets add to the initial cost and to potential repair problems.

### SIZE, TYPE

Size and type are the first features to decide on.

+Conventional refrigerators are available in nine to 14 foot capacities. These single-door units have a small section for freezing ice cubes and short term storage of frozen foods. The freezer will require defrosting every two to three weeks or before frost deposit is one-fourth inch.

+Two-door refrigerators with a top or bottom freezer compartment are available in 12 to 22 cubic foot capacities. They come with semi-automatic defrost freezer compartments. Most two-door semi-automatic defrost units are no larger than 13 to 15 cubic feet and will require defrosting before the frost is one-fourth inch deep.

+Side-by-side models offer two doors the full length of the appliance and come in 17 to 25 cubic foot capacities. The newest side-by-side models feature two freezer doors opposite the refrigerator door. These refrigerators usually offer more freezer space and are only available with no-frost freezers.

### ENERGY USE

Single-door refrigerators cost the least to operate when defrosted regularly, however they are smaller capacity and have only short term frozen food storage. Among the two door models, the manual defrost costs only slightly less to operate—with an estimated difference in monthly costs between a 14 cubic foot manual defrost and a 14 cubic foot no-frost of 15 cents.

Some manufacturers are producing "energy-saving" models. Some of these models have extra insulation, others have a switchable heater which saves energy when turned off. The switchable heater, used when condensation forms around the door, is most efficient in dry climates where condensation will form less readily and the heater will need to be turned off frequently.

### OTHER FEATURES

Other features that are available include:

- automatic ice-maker
- ice and cold drink dispenser on the door
- adjustable shelves and half shelves
- dual temperature controls
- wheels
- storage bins of various types and sizes

### COMPARISON SHOP

Wide price variations for the same models make comparison shopping

pay off with big savings. Look at discount stores and clearance sales for low prices. However, don't sacrifice reliable servicing and repair for a low price. Compare warranties for each model and ask what is covered by each warranty.

"It is chief of this world's luxuries...When one has tasted it, he knows what the angels eat!" Mark Twain's praise of the melon holds more truth than sentiment for many of the world's semi-arid regions. If you lived in some parts of Africa where melons once grew wild, you would probably cultivate many types of melons to rely on as an important source of water during dry periods. If you have ever enjoyed watermelon, cantaloupe, honeydew or other melons on a hot summer day, you know what a sweet thirst-quencher a melon can be.

Whether you're planning a Fourth of July celebration, family outing or low calorie snack, supplies of melons should be good to plentiful this summer for your eating pleasure, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) market news reports.

Where do these water-packed, vitamin-rich melons come from? Through the summer you can find all types of melons—cantaloupes, honeydews, watermelons—in local markets in Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Late summer brings supplies from Colorado. In 1977, California led in cantaloupe acreage harvested with 4,400 acres, Texas followed with 17,200, and Arizona supplied 10,450. This spring, rains delayed planting and pushed back harvest date of cantaloupes and honeydews in Texas and Arizona. California and Texas acreage of cantaloupes increased over last year; however, heavy rains early in June hampered Texas harvest. Overall, you'll find quality is good and supplies adequate from major production areas.

Texas usually brings you more watermelons than any other state. Texas harvested 58,000 acres in 1977 and Florida provided 51,000 acres. Florida acreage increased this year, while Texas acreage remained near the same.

In late spring, you could buy watermelons from California and Florida. In early summer your purchases could come from home gardens or small growers in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma or New Mexico.

Thumping a watermelon doesn't always tell the true story, at least to the untrained ear. Traditionally, an immature melon yields a metallic ring when thumped, and a mature melon produces a soft, hollow sound. Selection of melons for quality and flavor challenges the skill of even the most experienced buyers, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Although they hold no guarantees, if you want to buy an uncut watermelon these few appearance factors from USDA's Food Safety and Quality Service may help guide your selection. The watermelon surface should be relatively smooth; the rind should have a slight dullness (neither shiny nor dull); the ends of the melon should be filled out and rounded; and the underside, or "belly," of the melon should have a cream color.

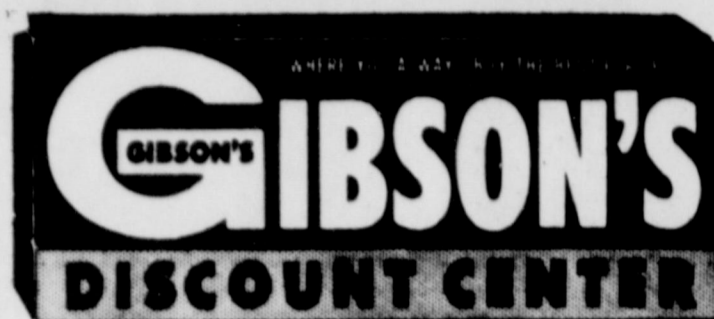
