IF YOU ARE A MEMBER of the generation that grew up reading Life Magazine, then there is good news

Life, which was America's weekly companion before, during and following World War II, only to cease publication in the early 1970s, is returning to the newsstands, except that the magazine will be published monthly instead of on a weekly basis.

Since the demise of Life Magazine, others have emerged, such as "People," which used the same basic format that Life had done so well for so long a time.

And, while Life Magazine returns under a different format, its longtime publishing competitor, Look, is making plans to return, and it plans to use the weekly publishing pattern.

Being a nostalgia buff, we have to applaud the return of these two members of the publishing world. And besides, since we mourned Life Magazine on its death in 1973, it seems only fitting that we recognize its resurrection.

FOR THE SECOND TIME in the early NFL season, the Dallas Cowboys will make an appearance on Monday Night Football this week. September Wet Month For Friona

September has been the wettest month of 1979, according to City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland, official weather recorder.

As of Friday's weather reading, a total of 4.67 inches had been recorded for the month, exceeding the 3.29 inch total recorded for the month of August. The total moisture recorded for the year now stands at 16.58 inches.

It was a wet week, with moisture recorded on five of the seven dates, making it seven out of eight states that moisture was recorded, beginning on September 19.

The past week's amounts were .08

on Saturday; .05 on Sunday; .40 on Monday: .57 on Tuesday and .01 inch on Wednesday. Readings are made at 8 a.m. each day, and the totals are for the previous 24 hours.

After a week of low temperatures, fair skies returned to the area on Wednesday. The temperature reached a high of 79 on Thursday, and the mercury was approaching a more seasonal 80 degrees as of press time Friday.

Farmers, saddled with a week of cold, wet weather, were hoping the clearing trend continues, so they can get on with harvest operations.

The public is invited to hear this lecture on tax reform and learn what they can do to help themselves and the rest of the country's overburdened taxpayers. There will be no admission charge and there will be free refreshments served at the

"We do not advocate the overthrow of the government or of the nation," says Dr. Tibbetts. "We merely wish to point out the rights of the individual and how those right are being misused by our government."

A portion of Dr. Tibbetts' talk pertains to the "rip-offs" or the foolish ways the taxpayer's money is being spent, such as the study of the impact of rural road construction on Poland at \$85,000; the study on teaching mothers how to play with their children at the cost of \$576,969; or the publication of a dictionary on witchcraft at a cost of \$46,089; or the study of lizards in Yugoslavia at a cost of \$15,000; plus many many

more governmental wastes. Dr. Tibbetts represents a fastgrowing group known as the United Tax Action Patriots. As a member of the group, he seeks to educate the average tax-payer to the fact that our tax-system is based on individual self-assessment and voluntary compliance.

The vitality of the tax system hinges on the good faith of the American people and their willingness to report their income accurately. In other words, paying your income tax each year is not mandatory, but few people know

The Internal Revenue Service has so intimidated the American public over the years, that people no longer know what their rights really are. Dr. Tibbetts will outline step-by-

step methods for dealing with IRS officials. Anyone who is tired of turning

over half their annual income to the government, no questions asked, is urged to attend this important meeting.

SCS Introduces New Seeding

'Aztec' Maximilian sunflower, a native forb relished by livestock and wildlife, has been released by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service. A forb is a herbaceous plant that is not a grass, sedge or rush.

Mack Mauldin, district conservationist for SCS at Friona, said the new variety was selected for use in range seeding.

range seeding.

"A lot of livestock producers in Texas would like to include seed of a native plant used by livestock and wildlife-especially deer and game birds-in range seeding mixtures,"

Maudlin said. "But seed for such plants simply are not available." "But 'Aztec' Maximilian sunflower will change that," Mack continued. "We anticipate a heavy demand for the seed as soon as it is available."

Mack said that commercial seed growers will be planting 'Aztec' in 1979. A small amount of seed should be available for use in range seeding mixtures in 1979 and 1980.

Maximilian sunflower is native to most of the grasslands of the Southwest, but the plant is so relished by livestock and wildlife that it has been killed out on most rangeland. Seed for the plant has never been grown commercially.



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Offense Clicks, FHS Storms To 40-6 Win

The Friona Chieftains "got it all together" in their game against River Road at Amarillo last Friday night. Friona blasted the Wildcats, 40-6 in the first-ever meeting of the two schools in football

The Chieftains, who had looked good on defense the previous week but had had trouble getting points on the scoreboard. Friona solved this problem last Friday, scoring four touchdowns in the team's first five possesions of the ball, to run up a 27-0 lead early in the first half.

Friona took the opening kickoff, which Joe Malouf returned to the 33, and then marched 67 yards in ten plays to get on the scoreboard.

Rod Owen burst 21 yards up the middle on the first play from scrimmage for the Chieftains, and Chris Barnett hit Kevin Kothmann on a 20-yard gainer which set Friona up with a first down just outside the River Road ten.

It took four plays, but Owen got the touchdown, following a wall of blockers in from the four. Jerry Harrelson's kick made the score 7-0 with just 3:46 gone in the opening quarter.

After Friona's kickoff, River Road ran one play and then fumbled. Joel Hight pounced on the ball at the Wildcat 24, to set Friona up in good field position.

Chuck Nichols took a pitchout on second down, and skirted end for 20 yards and paydirt. Harrelson again kicked true, and the score mounted to 14-0, and the opening period was

barely five minutes old. The home team was managing a creditable drive on their second possession, getting a pair of first downs, and helped by a 15-yard stepoff against the Chiefs, when another fumble stymied their efforts.

Bobby Thompson recovered this bobble, and it was a costly one for the Wildcats, as they could have gotten back into the game at this point. They had driven to the Friona

The Chieftain offense was clicking on all cylinders. Owen and Nichols picked up good gains, and Barnett hit Kothmann for a 16-yard gain to

Then on third down, from the Wildcat 41, Barnett lofted a spiral which Kothmann caught at about the River Road 20, making a nifty catch and then a good run, snaking his way into the end zone for his first touchdown of the year.

Harrelson kicked the equivalent of a 25-yard field goal after Friona was penalized prior to the PAT try, and Friona's lead had become 21-0. The first quarter still had 46 seconds to

Friona's momentum was broken only slightly, following a high River Road punt that gave the ball to Friona at midfield. A bobbled handoff gave the Wildcats the ball at their own 45, but on the next play Brett Moore intercepted a River Road pass and ran it back to the Wildcat 28. He almost got away for the touchdown.

The Chieftains converted the opportunity into points. Coach Lonnie Phillips began shuffling his lineup, with Mike Hutson taking a turn at quarterback.

Hutson passed 14 yards to Malouf, moving the ball to the five, and then ran it in himself on the quarterback option play, going five yards.

The kick was a shade wide, but Friona's lead was ballooned to 27-0 with 8:25 yet to play in the half.

The plucky Wildcats again mounted a threat, and again aided by a personal foul penalty against the Chiefs, moved to the Friona 31. But Friona met the challenge and held on downs.

Friona almost had a fifth touchdown before halftime, as Jeff Peak intercepted a pass and ran it 55 yards for an apparent touchdown, but Friona was called for a clipping penalty, and the run was nullified.

After the halftime break, Friona continued its onslaught. The Chiefs scored quick touchdowns on their first two possessions, to rack up their point total of 40.

Sophomore Chitto Caballero got the first one, from three yards out following another fumble recovery by the Chieftains. Harrelson's kick made the score 33-0, as only 2:54 had been played in the third quarter.

The Chieftains got the ball back

after River Road couldn't move, and Hutson hit Moore on a 50-yard pass play for six points. Kothmann was all alone in the end zone, and gathered in the ball for the touchdown. That made the score 40-0 with 6:20 left in the third quarter.

Early in the final quarter, River Road got cranked up, and drove for their only touchdown of the game. The score came on a 64-yard pass and run play, in which the receiver got behind the Friona defenders, and caught the ball, and took it in for the

That one play accounted for over half of River Road's yardage for the game, as Friona for the second straight week had an outstanding defensive performance.

For his outstanding play, which also included making 12 tackles and two interceptions on defense, Brett Moore was singled out as the "Player of the Week" for Class AA teams by the Amarillo Daily News this week.

"We still made a few fundamental mistakes, but overall, it was the kind of game we were needing, to build up our confidence. We just got them 'down' in a hurry, and after that, it seemed we could do no wrong," said Coach Lonnie Phillips.

In all, the team recovered five River Road fumbles, including two by Hutson, and one each by Rod Owen, Bobby Thompson and Joel

Phillips said he was pleased with the way Hutson came in at the quarterback position and ran the team. Mike guided the team to three touchdowns, scoring one himself and passing for another on a 50-yard

"I feel we're real solid at the quarterback position. And our passing game was super. This is definitely the best passing team I have ever coached, and it's not just one or two boys who can catch the ball." Phillips said.

The Chiefs gained 158 yards passing, on seven completions out of nine attempts. "The front wall did a great job of protecting the quarterbacks, giving them time to throw," he said.



Grain sorghum targets were set at \$4.07 per hundred weight in the 1977 Agricultural Act, while corn targets were set at \$3.57 per hundred weight for the 1977 crop. The increase in grain sorghum targets was the result of Grain Sorghum Producers Association working to establish a Nationwide Cost of Production Study in 1973, and getting Congress to set the targets of sorghum in relation to corn based upon the cost of production rather than the nutri-

to grain sorghum farmers on 1977 allotted acres in production. This payment was 68 cents per hundred weight times the normal farm yield on allotted acres. Amounts ranging up to \$20,000 per farmer were paid to grain sorghum producers on their 1977 crop, as a result of this GSPA provision. It could be as much as \$40,000 on the 1978 crop for producers complying with the feed grains program.
