ONE OF THE ANSWERS to our nation's energy crunch may lie in the development of a new fuel-gasohol.

A number of our state leaders, including Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby, Speaker of the House Bill Clayton, and Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown, have spoken out in favor of gasohol production, and have assumed leadership roles in aiding gasohol legislation.

The production of gasohol should have dual benefits for farmers and residents of our area-it would assume a continuing fuel supply, plus creating a much-needed extra market for their crops.

Texans envision two types of gasohol production in the state within the near future, according to state representative Dan Kubiak of Rockdale. One would be a major gasohol plant, which could utilize \$15 million in U.S. Department of Energy funds.

The second type of gasohol plant would be in the form of smaller, on-the-farm alcohol fuel plants, and county-wide alcohol fuel coopera-

In a recent report, Kubiak, who is the author of the Texas Energy Development Act, called gasohol the "Fuel of the future, today." "In many ways, it's an improvement over our most conventional fuel, gasoline," Kubiak says.

The state legislator points out that gasohol burns more efficiently and with less pollution than gasoline. In research, engine performance increased using gasohol.

Gasohol can be sold on a cost comparable with gasoline at the pump. In states where consumers already buy gasoline, its cost ranges between two cents less to two cents more than premium grade gasoline.

Thirdly, gasohol is made from renewable resources such as grains and organic wastes. Texas farmers can supply a never-ending source of energy, thus saving our state's precious petroleum for more vital products than gasoline.

Kubiak says that gasohol will help decrease our dependence on other countries and foreign leaders who can drive up the price of fuel in our

"By adopting gasohol, our nation can ease the energy crunch, improve our economy, and better maintain a strong national defense," the state representative said.

According to Kubiak, the farmer would have the most to gain. By installing fuel alcohol plant on his own farm, the farmer can grow his own complete fuel supply and have a surplus to sell for profit.

Federal law already permits farmers to use set-aside acreage for "energy crops," without loss to present income. It is also pointed out that inferior or distressed crops can be marketed at the local fuel alcohol plant. Agricultural by-products, such as residues and wastes, can also be sold to make the new fuel.

By-products of fuel alcohol can be used as an excellent livestock feed and as a fertilizer.

Kubiak inspected a research test car at Texas A&M University, which had been operated for two years on 100 per cent alcohol fuel, without adverse affects.

In fact, it was reported that gasohol can be burned in any type car, truck or farm machine, and in most cases with increased engine performance.

Tests showed that gasohol brought greater fuel mileage, and burned with less major pollutants than

conventional gasolines.

Other advantages also have been discovered.

### Girls, Boys State Delegates Named

For the 25th consecutive year the American Legion Auxiliary has chosen delegates for Auxiliary's Bluebonnet Girls State Program.

The Friona American Legion Post No. 206 sponsors the boys to Boys State which is a companion program to the Girls State program. Boys State is held on the campus of University of Texas in Austin. The same program is carried out by the American Legion. Representing Friona this year is Doug Massey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Massey. Doug is the second generation delegate to attend Boys State--Leon having attended while a junior in high school.

Chosen to represent Friona's Unit and City are Angelia Sims, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Sims and Sonya Gore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Gore.

The program is designed to teach young people the principles of our State government from the city level on through the State Offices. There is an enrollment of 550 girls from over the state of Texas who are selected from only junior classes of high schools by the American Legion Auxiliary Units over the State of

After the state elections are held-Governor, Lt. Governor, Supreme Court Judges, Department of Agriculture, Railroad Commissioner and all the other State officers-all the students are taken to the State Capitol at Austin and literally take over our State Capitol and are sworn into their respective offices by the present state officials.

This program is held on the campus of Texas Lutheran College at Seguin, Texas each year and is staffed by volunteers.

The Girl State Citizens choose and elect all of the candidates for the 51st State but the directors chose the two outstanding girls to attend Girls Nation which is just another step in the learning process on the National level. Two girls from each state are sent to Washington, D.C. to form a "national government" and elect the highest officials.

The local American Legion Auxiliary sponsors delegates from Bovina and Farwell High Schools. The Bovina Women's Club chooses their delegates and the Student Council of Farwell High School chooses their delegate. When these girls return from Girls State, they are asked to give a report of their experiences to the sponsoring Units, Clubs and schools.

# FHS "Sweeps" 3-aa Literary Title

Friona High School has captured the sweepstakes trophy for District 3-AA's spring literary contests, and in the process snapped a lengthy winning streak by their rivals in the speech department, Muleshoe High School.

It was the first time in 19 consecutive years that Muleshoe's speech department had failed to win their district title in the spring meet.

Friona won the title with 206 points, to 202 for Muleshoe in a close

This is the fourth year for Muleshoe to be back in District 3-AA, after a dozen years in District 1-AAA. Friona had won the sweepstakes award on other occasions, most recently in 1975.

Friona students won six events in the spring contests, and qualified 19 students for regional competition in 14 events.

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
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

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

3 lb. broiler-fryer, with giblets, cut into serving pieces

1 (10 oz.) can condensed beef broth

3/4 C. cranberry juice cocktail 2 T. butter

2 Texas oranges, thinly sliced 1 T. cornstarch

1 T. water

2 T. butter, melted 2 T. sugar 1 T. vinegar

Bring beef broth and chicken giblets to boil in small saucepan and simmer for one hour. Strain broth. Add cranberry juice to broth and simmer gently until liquid is reduced to one cup. Brown chicken pieces in butter and place in baking dish. Season chicken with salt and bake at 350 degrees F. for 25 minutes. Blend together cornstarch and water. Stir this mixture into broth and cook until sauce thickens and bubbles. Stir together butter and sugar, then vinegar. Add to broth; heat through. Pour sauce over broiler-fryer pieces and serve. Yield: 4 servings.



### Chieftains Sparkle; Win Own Meet Title

The Friona Chieftains won their third track meet of the season, taking the title in their own Friona Invitational Meet here last Saturday, scoring 129 points.

The Chiefs racked up wins in eight of the 14 meet events, and also set new meet records in eight events.

The Chieftains had a good day in the field events, completed in the morning session, winning three of the five events.

Chuck Nichols won the pole vault with a leap of 12-0, a new school record. He was the only entrant to score points in the event, as no one else cleared the qualifying height. Joe Malouf's long jump effort of 20 feet, 11 inches, his best of the season, won that event in another record performance.

Mike Hutson won the high jump with a 5-10 effort during chilly conditions.

White toured the track twice in the time of 2:04.3, winning the 880-yard dash in meet record time.

The mile relay team won their event in the time of 3:32.9. This is their best time for the event in yards, although they have a 3:32.5 for 1600 meters at Bovina. Members of the foursome are David Fleming. Rod Owen, Robert Alexander and Chitto Caballero.

The sprint relay team (Michael Gowens, Robert Alexander, Rod Owen and Mike Hubbart) won their event in the time of 44.8, their best time of 1979, and another meet record.

Other wins were by Chitto Caballero in the 440-yard dash in 51.6, edging teammate David Fleming.

Rod Owen blazed through the 330-yard intermediate hurdles in his best effort of the season, a 41.8 timing for yet another record. Friona also took 1-2 in this event, as Joe Malouf posted a 43.3.

Caballero posted the eighth meet record by winning his heat in the preliminaries of the 120-yard high hurdles in 15.5, but had bad luck in the finals and did not place.

The Chieftains have two other warm-up meets--at Amarillo this week and then at Springlake--prior

to the District 3-AA meet, where they will be out to defend their title.

### Chamber Gives Results Of Housing Survey

THE FRIONA CHAMBER of Commerce and Agriculture has just completed an interesting, and somewhat eye-opening housing survey for the city.

Survey sheets were distributed to employees at MBPXL on March 9, pertaining particularly to those employees not living in Friona, and being obligated to drive to and from work each day.

Out of 89 employees who responded to the survey, 50 indicated that they would move to Friona if suitable housing was available.

The respondents also listed their current residences, and the breakdown as to where they are now living, and commuting to Friona, is interesting

Twenty-five, exactly half of the employees responding favorably, are now living in Clovis, and say they would move to Friona if housing were available. Eleven more employees are now living in Hereford, but say they would move

if they had living quarters. The other breakdowns, those who said they would move to Friona included six people now living in Muleshoe, four from Texico, N.M., two from Bovina, one from Farwell, and one who is commuting all the way from Lubbock

Thirty-nine of those responding indicated that they would probably continue living where they now live, even if more housing were available

Of the 50 indicating they would move to Friona if it were possible, 27 indicated their family size was one to three; 17 had families in the 4-6 member range, and six had seven to nine members in their family. Thirty of the respondents had school-age children.

As to type of housing preferred, 45 checked houses, with only five indicating apartments as their preference.

As to monthly rent the potential residents would prefer to pay, 39 hoped to rent something in the \$150-\$200 per month range; six expected to pay between \$200 and \$250 per month; four would pay \$250 to \$300 a month, and one expected to pay over \$350 in rent per month.

However, 38 of the 50 preferring to move to Friona say they would rather buy than rent. Of the 50 respondents, 31, would hope to buy a house in the \$20,000 to \$25,000 range. Thirteen thought they could pay \$25,000-\$30,000 for a home, three checked the \$30,000-\$35,000 block,

and three checked "over \$35,000." Six of those interviewed had yearly income between \$5,000 and \$6,000. Eight were in the \$7,000 to \$9,000 annual income range; five more made from \$9,000 to \$11,000; eight were in the \$11,000 to \$13,000 bracket, and 23, almost half, make over \$13,000 per year.

Out of the 50 responding, 16 said their wives also worked, which means that many would have additional payroll income.

A little quick mathematics indicates that if the 50 employees who say they would move to Friona if housing were available were living here now, that would give the city an additional payroll living here of at least \$545,000 a year.

That would appear to be quite an attractive payroll to make an effort to secure, especially in light of the fact that the workers are already employed here, and would prefer to live in Friona, by their own statements.

The Chamber of Commerce plans to share their survey figures with builders, in an attempt to get new houses for these potential workers. The organization is also looking into the possibility of government funding for housing.

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




















Once each year, the crew flies to San Diego to join the Hull for two Instrument Report Ending March weeks of training. Between these treks, classroon and discussions are complemented by drills in the shipboard simulators in Oklahoma City every three NW1/4 Sec. 13, T1N; R3E months.

The simulator has a realistic ship's bridge, a Combat Information Center, engine room, crews compartment and a damage control training area.
