## Girls, Boys State Delegates Named

ONE OF THE ANSWERS to our nation's energy crunch may lie in the development of a new fuel-gasohol.

A number of our state leaders, including Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby, Speaker of the House Bill Clayton, and Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown, have spoken out in favor of gasohol production, and have assumed leadership roles in aiding gasohol legislation.

The production of gasohol should have dual benefits for farmers and residents of our area—it would assume a continuing fuel supply, plus creating a much-needed extra market for their crops.

Texans envision two types of gasohol production in the state within the near future, according to state representative Dan Kubiak of Rockdale. One would be a major gasohol plant, which could utilize \$15 million in U.S. Department of Energy funds.

The second type of gasohol plant would be in the form of smaller, on-the-farm alcohol fuel plants, and county-wide alcohol fuel cooperatives.

In a recent report, Kubiak, who is the author of the Texas Energy Development Act, called gasohol the "Fuel of the future, today." "In many ways, it's an improvement over our most conventional fuel, gasoline," Kubiak says.

The state legislator points out that gasohol burns more efficiently and with less pollution than gasoline. In research, engine performance increased using gasohol.

Gasohol can be sold on a cost comparable with gasoline at the pump. In states where consumers already buy gasoline, its cost ranges between two cents less to two cents more than premium grade gasoline.

Thirdly, gasohol is made from renewable resources such as grains and organic wastes. Texas farmers can supply a never-ending source of energy, thus saving our state's precious petroleum for more vital products than gasoline.

Kubiak says that gasohol will help decrease our dependence on other countries and foreign leaders who can drive up the price of fuel in our country.

"By adopting gasohol, our nation can ease the energy crunch, improve our economy, and better maintain a strong national defense," the state representative said.

According to Kubiak, the farmer would have the most to gain. By installing fuel alcohol plant on his own farm, the farmer can grow his own complete fuel supply and have a surplus to sell for profit.

Federal law already permits farmers to use set-aside acreage for "energy crops," without loss to present income. It is also pointed out that inferior or distressed crops can be marketed at the local fuel alcohol plant. Agricultural by-products, such as residues and wastes, can also be sold to make the new fuel.

By-products of fuel alcohol can be used as an excellent livestock feed and as a fertilizer.

Kubiak inspected a research test car at Texas A&M University, which had been operated for two years on 100 per cent alcohol fuel, without adverse affects.

In fact, it was reported that gasohol can be burned in any type car, truck or farm machine, and in most cases with increased engine performance.

Tests showed that gasohol brought greater fuel mileage, and burned with less major pollutants than conventional gasolines.

Other advantages also have been discovered.

All we can add to the legislator's report is—What are we waiting for?

The Friona American Legion Post No. 206 sponsors the boys to Boys State which is a companion program to the Girls State program. Boys State is held on the campus of University of Texas in Austin. The same program is carried out by the American Legion. Representing Friona this year is Doug Massey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Massey. Doug is the second generation delegate to attend Boys State—Leon having attended while a junior in high school.

Chosen to represent Friona's Unit and City are Angela Sims, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Sims and Sonya Gore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Gore.

The program is designed to teach young people the principles of our State government from the city level on through the State Offices. There is an enrollment of 550 girls from over the state of Texas who are selected from only junior classes of high schools by the American Legion Auxiliary Units over the State of Texas.

After the state elections are held—Governor, Lt. Governor, Su-

preme Court Judges, Department of Agriculture, Railroad Commissioner and all the other State officers—all the students are taken to the State Capitol at Austin and literally take over our State Capitol and are sworn into their respective offices by the present state officials.

This program is held on the campus of Texas Lutheran College at Seguin, Texas each year and is staffed by volunteers.

The Girl State Citizens choose and elect all of the candidates for the 51st State but the directors chose the two outstanding girls to attend Girls Nation which is just another step in the learning process on the National level. Two girls from each state are sent to Washington, D.C. to form a "national government" and elect the highest officials.

The local American Legion Auxiliary sponsors delegates from Bovina and Farwell High Schools. The Bovina Women's Club chooses their delegates and the Student Council of Farwell High School chooses their delegate. When these girls return from Girls State, they are asked to give a report of their experiences to the sponsoring Units, Clubs and schools.

# FHS "Sweeps" 3-aa Literary Title

Friona High School has captured the sweepstakes trophy for District 3-AA's spring literary contests, and in the process snapped a lengthy winning streak by their rivals in the speech department, Muleshoe High School.

It was the first time in 19 consecutive years that Muleshoe's speech department had failed to win their district title in the spring meet.

Friona won the title with 296 points, to 202 for Muleshoe in a close race.

This is the fourth year for Muleshoe to be back in District 3-AA, after a dozen years in District 1-AAA. Friona had won the sweepstakes award on other occasions, most recently in 1975.

Friona students won six events in the spring contests, and qualified 19 students for regional competition in 14 events.

A big win was registered by the one act play to kick off the week's competition. The cast also scored with two members on the all-star cast (Laura Ellis and David Merrell) and two honorable mention (Sharla Duggins and Ricky Taylor), for 41 points toward the sweepstakes standings.

Other first place honors were garnered by Tracy Horton in informative speaking; Kipl Fleming in editorial writing; Laura Ellis in news writing; Jan Mason in headline writing and Ruth Rodriguez in typing.

First place in the individual events was worth an additional 15 points per event, so Friona registered 116 points on first place honors.

Debaters racked up 25 more points for FHS, when Mark Zachary and Mark Blankenship placed second, and Sonya Gore and Maria Escalante placed third.

Also placing second in events, scoring ten points and qualifying for regional, were Susi Noah in poetry interpretation, Tracy Horton in feature writing, Sharla Duggins in typing, David Fleming in number sense, and Kim Taylor in slide rule competition.

Also qualifying for regional events were Susi Noah with a third place in editorial writing; Dana Smith with a

third place in persuasive speaking and Jan Mason in shorthand. Third place was worth five points in the individual events.

Other students placing in the contests were David Fleming, sixth in informative speaking; Kipl Fleming, sixth in prose reading; Sharla Duggins, with a regional alternate's spot in prose reading; Sandy Spring, fifth in oral reading; Kelly Caudill, fifth in editorial writing, and Laura Ellis, fourth in poetry reading.

Also, Kim Frye, fifth in headline writing; Diana Glover, fifth in ready writing; Robert Alexander, fourth in ready writing; Lesa Bermea, third in oral reading; and Stephanie Schueler, sixth in shorthand.

The contest play, "The Golden Grotto," was performed in the area contest Thursday at Plainview.

The regional competition for the individual events will be held April 21 at Texas Tech.

Writing a newspaper column reminds me of something a preacher told a group of fellow ministers. He shocked his fellow clergymen by announcing that he had pleased everybody in town—some when he came—some while he was there—and the rest when he left!

The poor fellow didn't realize that the skids to failure are greased by

trying to please everybody all the time. All of you know that I am a history buff. I promise to play that down; just hang in—we'll get to your favorite subjects.

Every Texan should get acquainted with J. Frank Dobie. His varied career included ranching, treasure hunting, authoring books and articles, lecturing at Cambridge University in England, teaching at the University of Texas and being solely responsible for a college course on how to appreciate the Life and Literature of the Southwest. Let's take a quick look at just two of his books.

**THE VOICE OF THE COYOTE**  
Unless you are really interested in this sly 'prairie wolf' you may be told more than you care to know. Outdoorsmen and nature lovers will have a difference of opinion with ranchers who have suffered losses due to these predatory 'varmints.' Like all serious books, it gives both sides of the question.

Mr. Dobie is an honest writer who has contributed more than any of his peers to a real down-to-earth discussion of the entire spectrum of Southwestern living.

**THE BEN LILLY LEGEND**  
Here is a book that strains the imagination. As you read you will find yourself trying to separate fact from fiction. About the time you decide an incident could not have happened you come across proof that it did! Ben Lilly was a combination of the Incredible Hulk

and Gentleman Jim. From the swamps and canebrakes of the very deep south to the high barren hills of the southwest, he ranges far and wide in his search for bears and mountain lions.

Was he a hero of the hunt or a fiddlefooted wanderer? You will change your mind a dozen times as you follow him from stagnant pools to dry canyons.

Both books demonstrate that truth is stranger than fiction.

# Friona Flashbacks

#### 50 YEARS AGO—APRIL 12, 1929

Ground was broken Monday for the erection of another new business building on the east side of Main Street, between Fifth and Sixth. The new building will be fifty by eighty feet in size and will be constructed of brick and concrete. It is being built by the Turner-Parr Trading Company, and half of it will be used by them to house their office and machinery and implement business. The other half will be let to some individual or corporation for the installation of some line of business.

#### 40 YEARS AGO—APRIL 7, 1939

Members of the Friona Post of the American Legion and the Friona Legion Auxiliary dedicated their new Legion home with a program and a feast Tuesday night. D.K. Roberts, commander of the local post, served as toastmaster, and there were visiting Legionnaires from other Legion posts of the Panhandle territory.

#### 30 YEARS AGO—APRIL 8, 1949

Friona can now boast of another business place, since Leonard Coffey, formerly of Clovis, N.M., has opened his Paint & Body works in one of W.M. White's buildings on the south side of Highway 60.

#### 25 YEARS AGO—APRIL 8, 1954

O.J. Beene was elected to the city council as a write-in candidate on Tuesday. With 130 votes cast, Beene, local druggist, received 67 votes to 57 for H.K. Kendrick. Incumbent Raymond White was returned, and Mayor Charles Allen, unopposed, was re-elected.

#### 20 YEARS AGO—APRIL 9, 1959

Dillie M. Kelley formally assigned as superintendent of the Friona Independent Schools at the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the F.I.S.D. on Monday night. The resignation is effective at the end of the present school term. Kelley came to Friona and served five years prior to being elected superintendent.

#### 15 YEARS AGO—APRIL 9, 1964

Friona High School track team won a first-place meet trophy for the

first time in almost a decade last week when they took the team trophy at Springlake. David Carson won a 220-yard dash in a blistering 22.4 timing, and junior Danny Murpree had Friona's other first place, in the pole vault.

#### 10 YEARS AGO—APRIL 3, 1969

Ray DeBord was named Monday night as the new boys basketball coach for Friona High School, at a special meeting of the board of trustees of Friona Independent School District.

Friona High School placed second in the District 3-AA Interscholastic League Literary contests which the local school hosted Saturday and Monday.

#### 5 YEARS AGO—APRIL 7, 1974

Tuesday's high wind, which produced winds of up to 75 miles per hour, caused considerable damage to property in the area.

number of years, is scheduled to begin Monday at 615 Main. Included in the Main Place are "The Browsabout," a ladies and teens dress shop; "The One and Only," a gift shop; and "Country Crafts," a hobby and art supply shop.

But it wasn't all just the "Dale and Gene Show," as another of their teammates on the 1974 team, Dale Parsons, pumped in 20 points.

It was a close game most of the way, with Friona holding a 47-45 halftime lead. But the former Chieftains began to build a lead in the latter stages.

Strickland's pair of free throws put Friona at the 100-point total with 3:12 left in the game, and a 100-92 lead. Dimmitt rallied to trail by only four points at one stage, but Cleveland personally assured the win by scoring eight points in the final minute of play.

His last basket popped the net from about 35 feet out, with a second left on the clock, and brought the final margin to 20 points as Friona effectively shut down the Dimmitt offense in the late going, outscoring the visitors 17-3 in the last three minutes of play.

A good crowd attended the game, and helped the club send students to D-E contests.

## Chamber Gives Results Of Housing Survey

THE FRIONA CHAMBER of Commerce and Agriculture has just completed an interesting, and somewhat eye-opening housing survey for the city.

Survey sheets were distributed to employees at MBPXL on March 9, pertaining particularly to those employees not living in Friona, and being obligated to drive to and from work each day.

Out of 89 employees who responded to the survey, 50 indicated that they would move to Friona if suitable housing was available.

The respondents also listed their current residences, and the breakdown as to where they are now living, and commuting to Friona, is interesting.

Twenty-five, exactly half of the employees responding favorably, are now living in Clovis, and say they would move to Friona if housing were available. Eleven more employees are now living in Hereford, but say they would move if they had living quarters.

The other breakdowns, those who said they would move to Friona included six people now living in Muleshoe, four from Texico, N.M., two from Bovina, one from Farwell, and one who is commuting all the

way from Lubbock. Thirty-nine of those responding indicated that they would probably continue living where they now live, even if more housing were available here.

Of the 50 indicating they would move to Friona if it were possible, 27 indicated their family size was one to three; 17 had families in the 4-4 member range, and six had seven to nine members in their family. Thirty of the respondents had school-age children.

As to type of housing preferred, 45 checked houses, with only five indicating apartments as their preference.

As to monthly rent the potential residents would prefer to pay, 39 hoped to rent something in the \$150-\$200 per month range; six expected to pay between \$200 and \$250 per month; four would pay \$250 to \$300 a month, and one expected to pay over \$350 in rent per month.

However, 38 of the 50 preferring to move to Friona say they would rather buy than rent. Of the 50 respondents, 31, would hope to buy a house in the \$20,000 to \$25,000 range. Thirteen thought they could pay \$25,000-\$30,000 for a home, three checked the \$30,000-\$35,000 block,

and three checked "over \$35,000."

Six of those interviewed had yearly income between \$5,000 and \$6,000. Eight were in the \$7,000 to \$9,000 annual income range; five more made from \$9,000 to \$11,000; eight were in the \$11,000 to \$13,000 bracket, and 23, almost half, make over \$13,000 per year.

Out of the 50 responding, 16 said their wives also worked, which means that many would have additional payroll income.

A little quick mathematics indicates that if the 50 employees who say they would move to Friona if housing were available were living here now, that would give the city an additional payroll living here of at least \$545,000 a year.

That would appear to be quite an attractive payroll to make an effort to secure, especially in light of the fact that the workers are already employed here, and would prefer to live in Friona, by their own statements.

The Chamber of Commerce plans to share their survey figures with builders, in an attempt to get new houses for these potential workers. The organization is also looking into the possibility of government funding for housing.

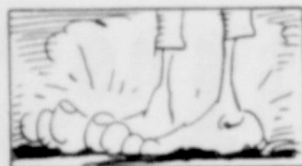

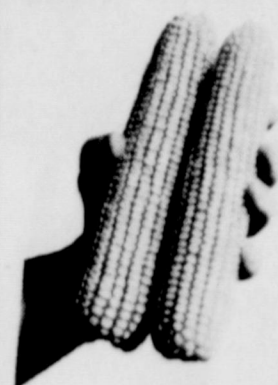

## Services Conducted For Henry Smith, 96

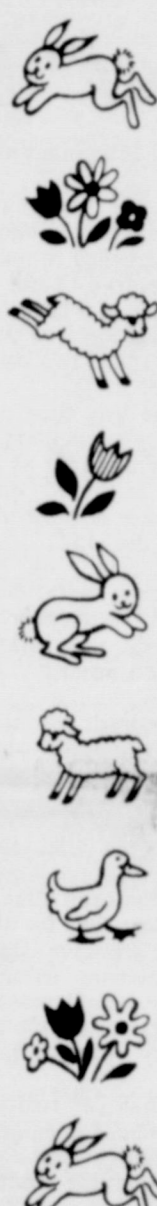

## Friona Reservist Has Part In "Skunk Hunt" Maneuver

Spending a weekend skunk hunting may not appeal to the average hunter, but to 22 naval reservists from the Amarillo area, it's an excellent opportunity to keep

abreast of new Navy equipment and procedures.

The skunks, in this case, are unidentified surface vessels being tracked on new shipboard simulators at the Naval Reserve Center in Oklahoma City, which is where the men of Amarillo Naval Reserve Unit CC-945 (USS Hull) spent two days last weekend (March 17-18).

"This is really the only time our men have a chance to participate in exercises which include radar as an integral part of drilling," said Lieutenant Rod Buckner of Amarillo, training officer for the unit.

"In addition to radar, we get 'hands on' experience with dead reckoning tracers, maneuvering boards, status boards, and related communications equipment," he added.

Since they're hundreds of miles from any ocean, simulated shipboard exercises provide the only real opportunity these citizen sailors have to prepare for mobilization aboard their ship, the USS Hull (DD-945).

Once each year, the crew flies to San Diego to join the Hull for two weeks of training. Between these annual treks, classroom lectures and discussions are complemented by drills in the shipboard simulators in Oklahoma City every three months.

The simulator has a realistic ship's bridge, a Combat Information Center, engine room, crews compartment and a damage control training area.

"The ship's simulator allows reservists to 'go to sea' regularly, saving time and money that would otherwise be required to get them to the nearest port," said Lieutenant Commander Charles Greever, commanding officer for the Hull detachment.

"Our crew would find it difficult to

maintain a high degree of readiness without the shipboard simulators," he stated.
