

## Star Lites

OVER THE EASTER weekend, we visited some of our relatives who live in Vernon, and saw their tornado damage first hand.

The Chief of Police at Vernon, Wayne Hendrix, is a cousin of ours, and he gave us some interesting facts concerning the storm cloud which hit the North Texas community. Of the three communities hit (Vernon, Wichita Falls and Lawton, Oklahoma), Vernon considered itself the "luckiest," since the funnel hit just the southeast corner of the city.

Although a law officer spotted a funnel on the ground about 13 miles south of Vernon (and this one apparently went back up into the cloud), the lawmen watching the cloud never saw a funnel again before the cloud hit the city.

Luckily, the police chief had decided to sound the storm warning about ten minutes before the storm hit, even though they had not seen a funnel.

My cousin told me that his department had caught flack in the past for sounding the siren when no tornado developed. A few years ago, lawmen spotted a funnel cloud that looked menacing and sounded the warning. The town's senior graduation ceremony was in progress, and was interrupted by the warning. As it happened, the tornado did not touch down in the city.

"We got a lot of complaints about sounding the warning, and interrupting the graduation program," Hendrix told us.

This, plus the fact that the Vernon area has so many potential storm clouds during the spring, had caused the residents to become a little careless about tornado warnings. But the appearance of the "real thing" last Tuesday will probably change that attitude for a while.

The cleanup operation in Vernon had progressed very smoothly when we were there this past Saturday. The officials seemed to have everything pretty well organized.

But, there had to be some federal agencies involved, due to the disaster programs involved, and our cousin indicated that these people, trying to be sure everything was done according to regulations, had made things somewhat harder to coordinate.

We have heard of folks in our area who had relatives killed at one or the other of the places which were hit by the killer tornadoes. This brings such an event a little "closer home," even though we are separated from that area by a number of miles.

ANOTHER COUSIN that we visited on Easter, Don Ellis, lives in Roosevelt, Kiowa County, Oklahoma. He is on the board of directors of the rural electric cooperative which serves four or five counties in that area.

Their electric cooperative had lost about 240 power line poles in the storm that hit the area last week.

In the Vernon area, the fields on the outskirts of town were littered with steel, and parts of machinery from the implement company that was leveled by the storm. Farmers were having to clear their fields in order to get ready for planting time.

OUR UNCLE, Jimmie Ellis of Hobart, Oklahoma, has been in the cattle business for over 50 years. He and his son Don have an extensive operation in Kiowa County.

Their area received only good rain from the storm system which went through last week, and we have never seen it looking so green there. The Redbuds were blooming, and everything was looking good.

Commenting on the current cattle market, which has been the most favorable for the cattleman in quite some time, Uncle Jimmie said it was somewhat different from the time several years ago when he took a load of feeder steers to market in Oklahoma City. He received the top market price for his steers—four cents per pound!

## Cancer Drive Slated Here; Details Given

April has been designated as "Cancer Control Month," and the Friona Chapter of the American Cancer Society is planning a residential door-to-door fund drive on Thursday, April 26.

Co-chairmen of the Friona drive are Mae Magness and Lawanda Moore.

Funds given by Friona residents to the American Cancer Society will be spent in the following manner:

For cancer research: 30 cents; for professional education, fellowships and services, 14 cents; for public education, (informing Texans of cancer's seven warning signals so they may guard themselves and their families against cancer), 21 cents; for service (providing cancer patients with comfort items, transportation, sickroom equipment, information and guidance for rehabilitation), 27 cents; program development and administration, six cents, and crusade (providing crusade materials for over 363 unit campaigns which reach more than 3,000,000 Texas families during the April crusade), ten cents.

The total, which comes to 108 per

cent, reflects increased research allocations to Texas by the National Society.

"In our electronic age of computerization, the problems and opportunities of the individual cancer patient or the research scientist have not been forgotten by the American Cancer Society. As an independent voluntary health organization, the ACS is able to cut across economic, social and political boundaries to play a key role in the fight against cancer," said the local drive chairman.

The leaders in the cancer drive also reminded Friona residents of cancer's seven warning signals:

- Change in bowel or bladder habits.
  - A sore that does not heal.
  - Unusual bleeding or discharge.
  - Thickening or lump in the breast or elsewhere.
  - Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
  - Obvious change in wart or a mole.
  - Nagging cough or hoarseness.
- If you think you have a warning signal, see your doctor, advises the volunteer workers for the American Cancer Society.

# Friona Flashbacks

**50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 26, 1929**

Friona was visited last Saturday by what was perhaps the most costly fire in its history, when the immense piles of grain heads and ear corn in the Doggett Grain Company's yard caught fire. Wind swept the fire from the northwest corner of the yard to the south, and soon the entire yard, consisting of three city blocks, was in flames. Estimates put the loss at not less than \$12,000.

**40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 28, 1939**

Tuesday of this week several Friona men were invited by Hugh L. Clearman, Government Entomologist, to visit a section of Parmer County east of Friona, to witness the emergence of millions of young grasshoppers. Mr. Clearman assured us that the hoppers we saw coming out of the ground, literally by the thousands, were the real "migratory" variety, and if nothing is done about them, they will take wing within six weeks and be ready to destroy crops many miles from their place of origin.

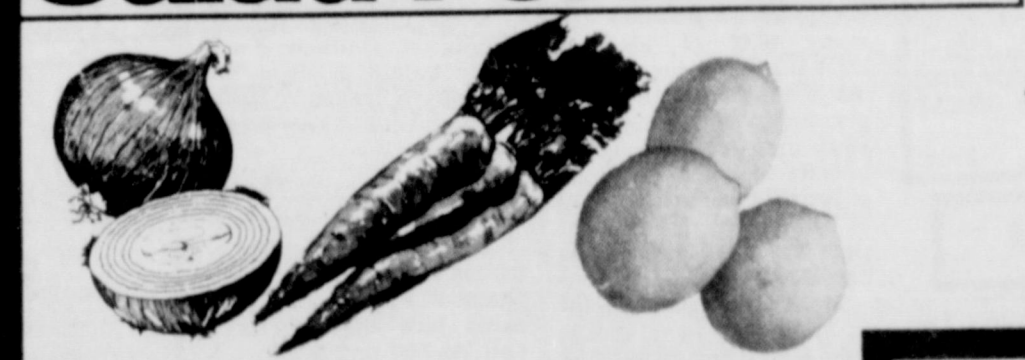

## April 30 Deadline

Farmers are reminded that April 30, (one week from next Monday) is the last day for signing an "Intention to Participate" in the 1979 Set-Aside Programs.

Approximately one-half of the farms in Parmer County have been signed in the program up to this time. No doubt, at least 98 per cent of the farms in this county will participate in the program, however, all of them should be signed up by the farm operator. It is just good business to insure program availability in the event that a person needs or wants it. It costs nothing to sign up and each farm operator should keep in mind the April 30, deadline.

### RUMORS & FACTS ABOUT THE FARM PROGRAMS:

**RUMOR:** That farmers who have grain in the reserve will never be able to sell it, because the Government will sell CCC-owned stocks before the "release" level is reached.

**FACTS:** Not only will the Government not sell CCC-owned grain before the "release" level is reached, CCC-owned grain will not be sold until the reserve has been called. The minimum sales price then will be 180 per cent of the loan for wheat and 150 per cent for feed grains.

**RUMOR:** Farmers expect provisions of the 1979 Wheat & Feed Grain Program to change as they did in 1978, therefore, some farmers are hesitating to sign an "Intention to Participate."

**FACT:** Compliance provisions have not changed. Producers who wish to participate in the program are expected to comply with all program requirements.

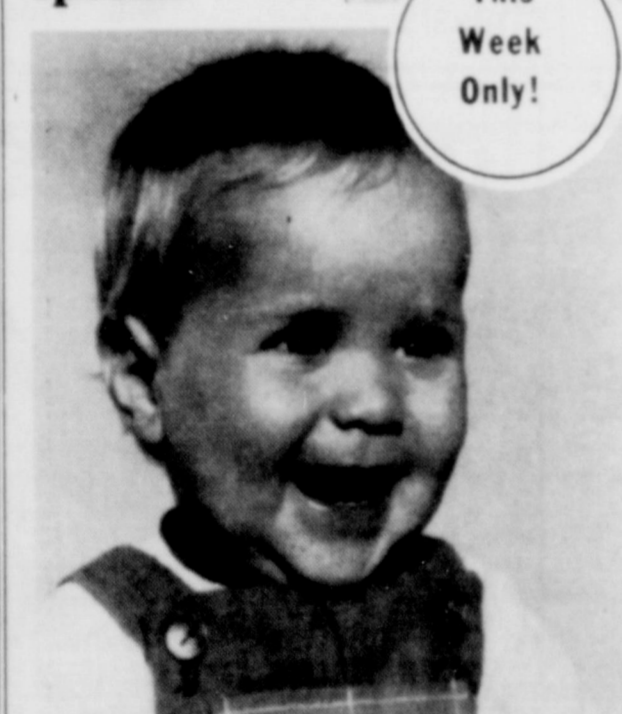

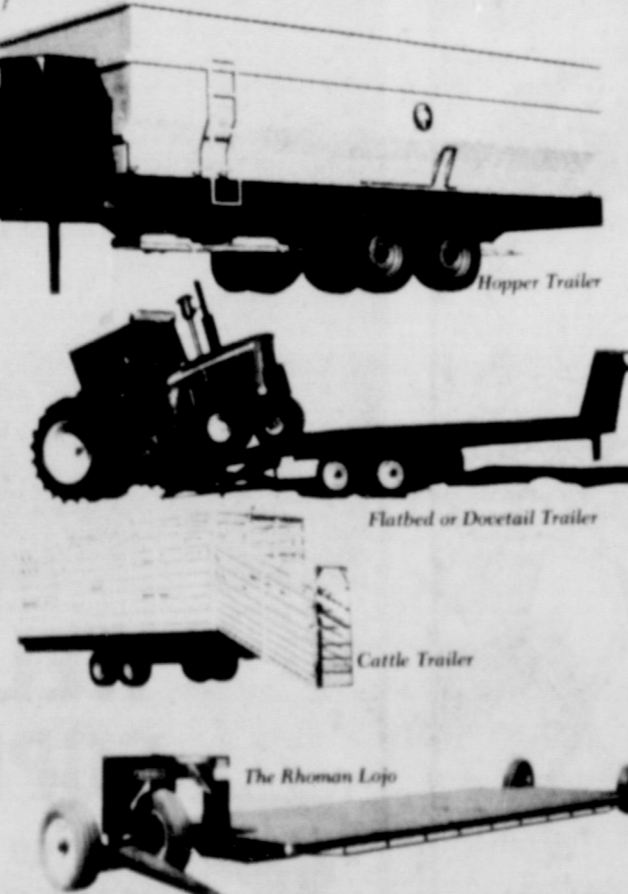

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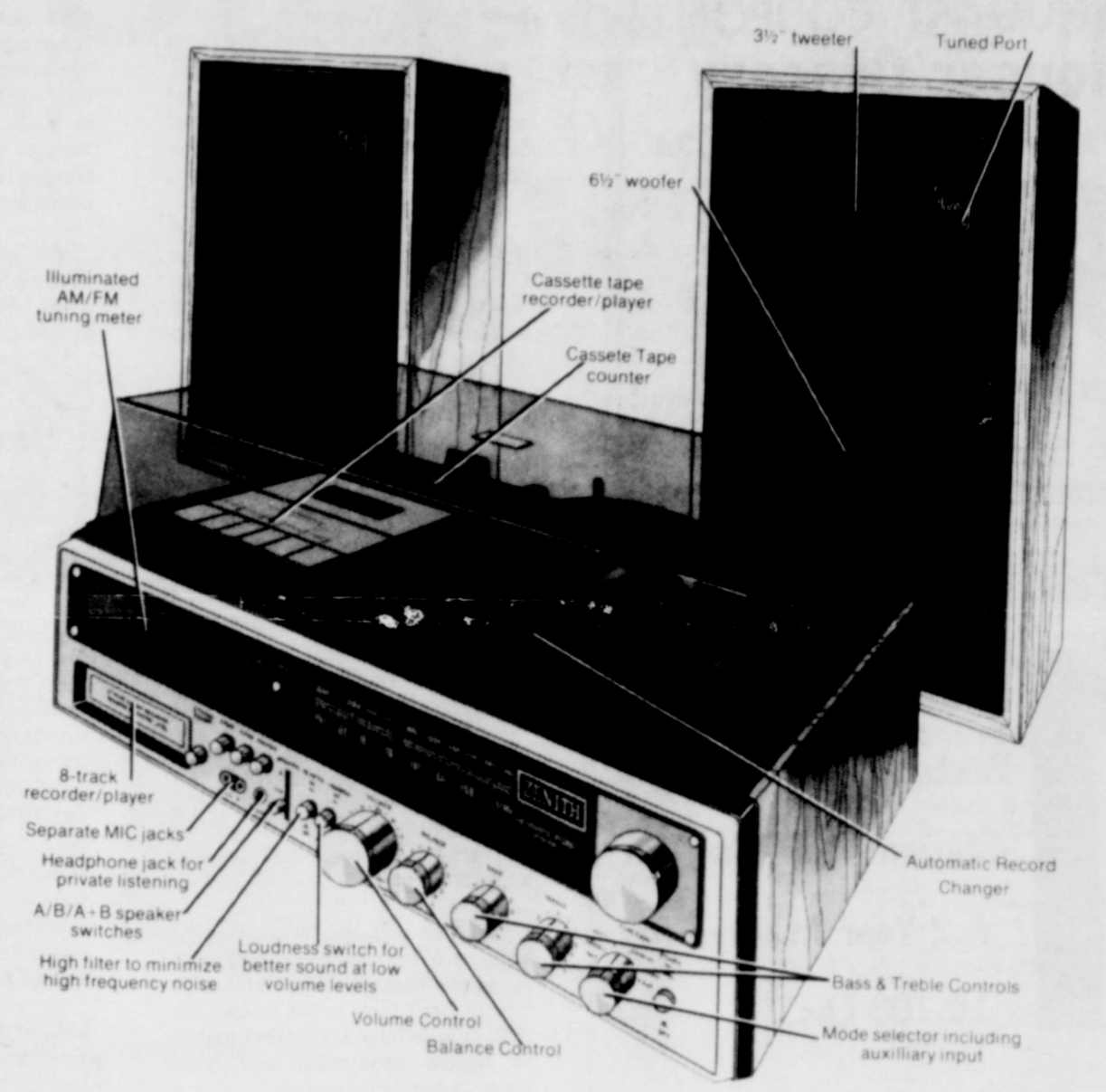
