Land Bank To Increase Rates

SEN. WILLIAM PROXMIRE of Wisconsin is one of our favorite lawmakers. Every year, early on, Sen. Proxmire hands out his "Golden Fleece Awards," to lawmakers or bureaucrats who have done the best (or worst?) job of fleecing you and me out of hard-earned tax dollars.

Some of the projects which our tax money is used for boggles the imagination. Here are some of the "winners" which the senator saluted recently:

Did you know that the government awarded \$219,592 to "teach college students how to watch television." Seems to us students should have a pretty good idea about how to handle the boob-tube by the time they get to college.

Or, did you know that the Office of Education was awarded \$40,375 for the purpose of providing 35 bureaucrats some 1100 creative career and life-planning courses during working hours?

Or that \$5,000 was awarded to "exercise pregnant pigs on a treadmill, to relieve boredom." "Everyone knows that if you have a bored pig, you should take him to a movie," the senator remarked.

A whopping \$222,000 was awarded to the Federal Highway Administration for a "study of motorists' attitude toward large trucks." Heck, we could have told the highway administration what they wanted to know, and for a whale of a lot less money.

Get ready for this one: The National Institute for Mental Health was awarded \$97,000 for a "study of the behavior and social relations in Peruvian brothels." Your tax money sent some bureaucrat to Peru, and paid for all the hanky-panky south of the border that he could take. That's not all. According to Proxmire, the "report" was never completed as such, but the "expert" published a book instead. When asked for his report, he told the government it would have to buy a copy of his book to discover what he found out.

Another of Sen. Proxmire's jewels was the awarding of \$122,000 to the U.S. Senate itself, to be used toward a new gymnasium in the new Senate Office Building (S.O.B.), which has become the biggest albatross in government history.

"The last thing we need is another gym. We already have two gyms, and virtually no one ever uses the ones we have. If you have something you really want to get done, you could take it over to the gym, and depend on some peace and solitude," Proxmire says.

One of the worst offenders was the awarding of \$52 million to the Pentagon and to various military brass, for the use of aircraft for "low priority" missions and personal flights, when commercial transportation was available and much cheaper.

"We have always sent our top brass and government officials anywhere they want to go. One general forgot his golf shoes, and they turned his plane around and went back for them. This is ridiculous," the senator says.

Another \$15 million was approved for the National Aeronautic and Space Administration, over a seven-year period, to try to find life in outer space. "It will take a million light years for a probe to get to another star, so I think we could postpone this study another few years," he cracked.

How about the grant of \$384,000 to the Department of Labor, for a door-to-door survey counting the number of dogs, cats and horses in 160,000 households in Ventura, California? Somebody must need to know for sure if they need another veterinarian in that county.

The bureaucracy secured \$6,025 for a "national endowment for the arts" for an artist to film the throwing of crepe paper and burning grass out of high-flying planes. A lady in El Paso was to do the filming, and then we were to pay to have her

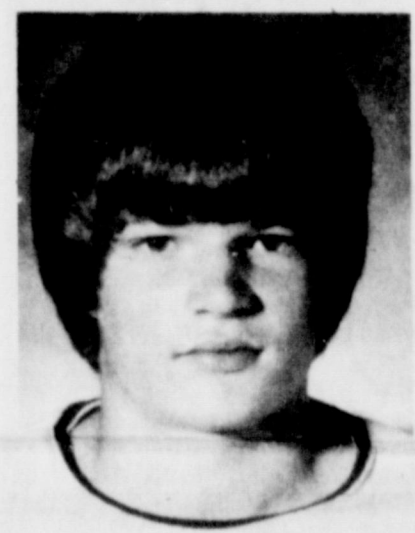

Ernest Kerr, Manager of The Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe, announced recently that The Federal Land Bank of Houston's billing rate on farm and ranch loans and rural residence loans will be increased from 8½ per cent to 9 per cent effective June 1, 1979.

In making the announcement, Kerr stated that the increase in the billing rate became necessary because of the continued high cost of funds to finance the Bank's lending operation and no substantial decline is anticipated in the near future.

He further stated that in today's economic climate the 9 per cent rate is very competitive.

The Land Bank in Houston introduced a variable rate plan in 1969 which allows the billing rate to increase or decrease with variations in the money market. This increase in billing rate will affect 320 loans in the total amount of \$15,602,700.00 for

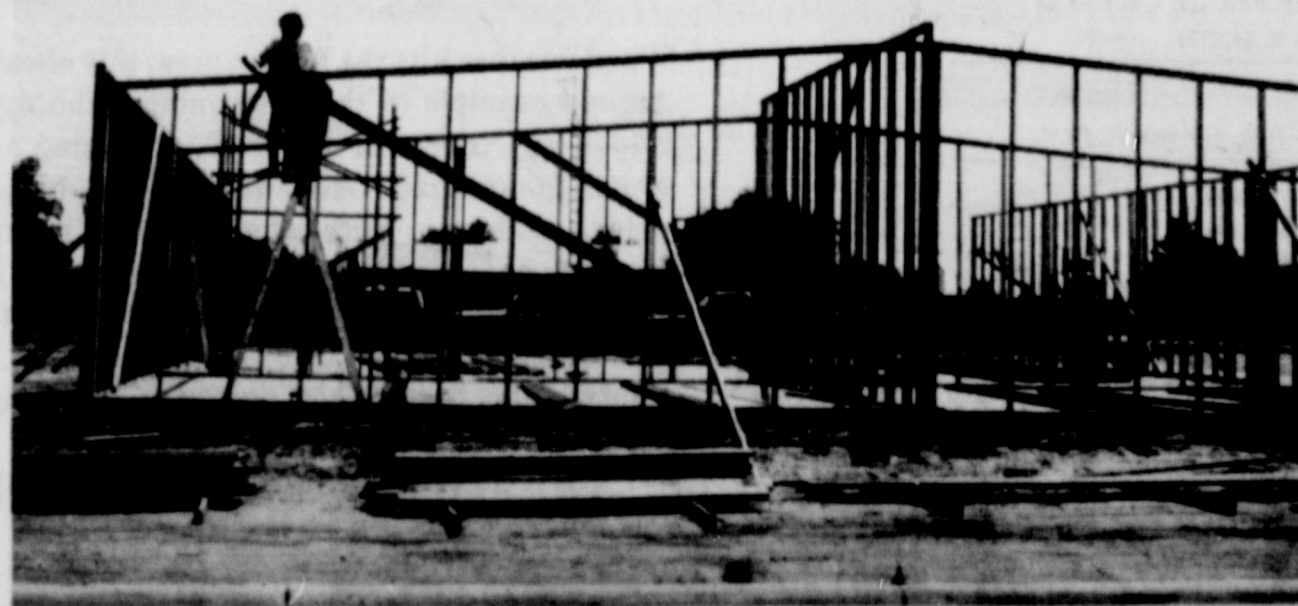
Douglas Massey Attends Boys State

Six area residents were injured, two seriously, after a car-pickup truck collision about 1:15 p.m. Wednesday on Texas Highway 214, eleven miles north of Muleshoe.

Laura Jesko, 11, of Muleshoe remained in critical condition Thursday night at Methodist Hospital with head injuries suffered in the crash. Her 16-year-old sister, Angelea, and her mother, Brenda Collier Jesko, 35, both were listed in satisfactory condition at Methodist.

Another sister, Ginger, 7, remained in good condition late Thursday at Muleshoe's West Plains Hospital.

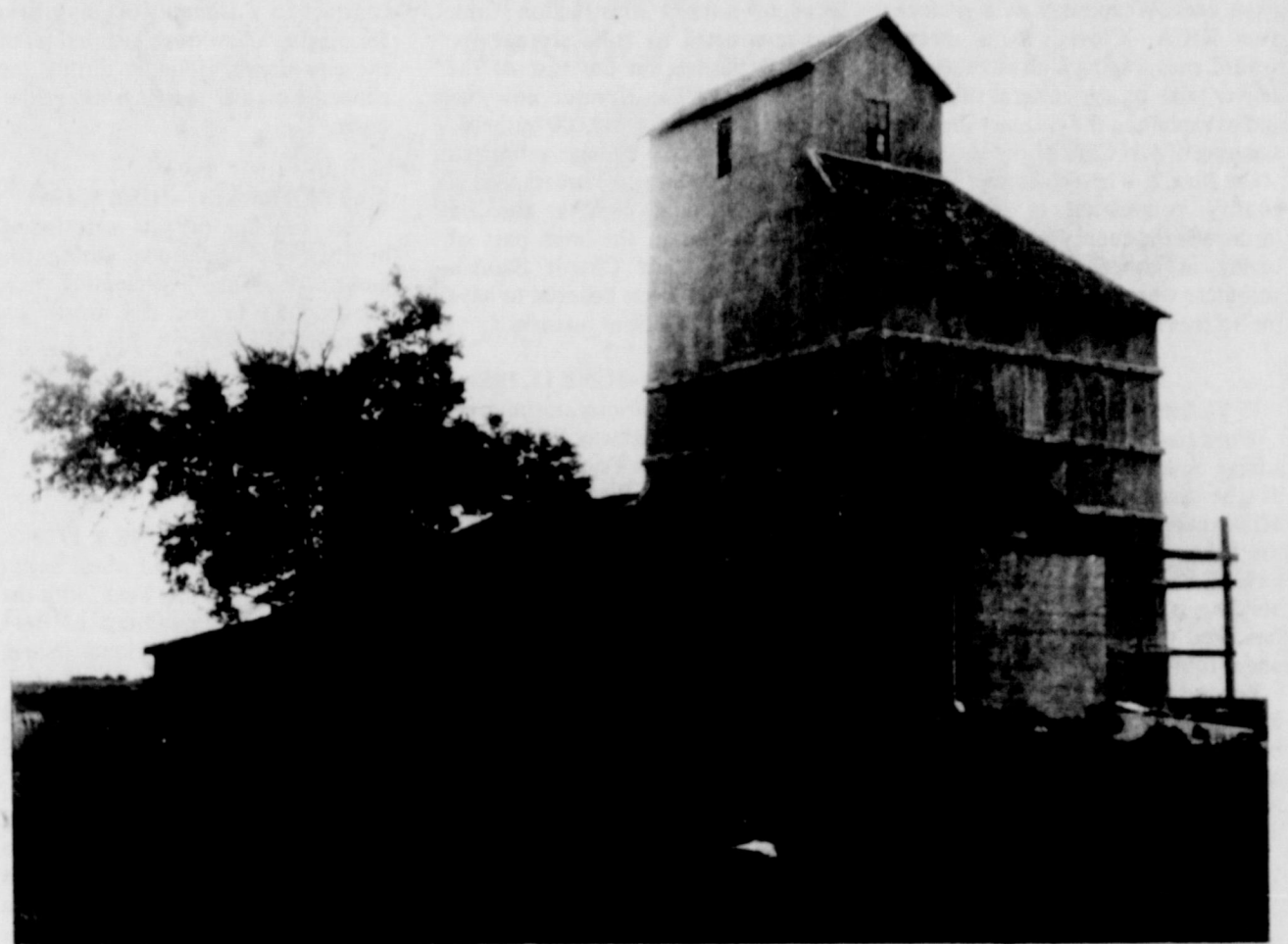
The driver of the pickup, Joe Nanez, 51, of Friona, also was in good condition late Wednesday at the Muleshoe hospital, and his son, Jessie Manuel, 9, was treated at West Plains and later released.

Department of Public Safety reports show that Mrs. Jesko was going north on Texas 214 and Nanez was traveling south on the same highway when the accident occurred. Trooper Jim Bishop said the two vehicles struck almost head-on about 350 feet north of the intersection of Farm Road 145 and Texas 214.

Gas Rate Increase To Become Effective July 1

Since November of 1971, the date of the last base rate adjustment for irrigation customers, the costs of materials, labor, taxes and other expenses have increased for Pioneer Natural Gas Company.

In February, an increase of approximately 20 per cent was granted in the General Service Rate in the West Texas System, which was the first increase in that base rate since 1970. Now, it is necessary to increase the irrigation rate by an average of 10.6 per cent.

Effective July 1, the effective date of this new rate schedule, all present irrigation gas rates are cancelled. The new irrigation gas rate schedule will automatically displace the rate now attached to the irrigation contracts presently in effect.

The new irrigation gas service rate is, for the first 50 Mcf of gas used per month, the same price as the general service rate which became effective in Pioneer's West Texas System on February 15 of this year. The remaining steps of the new irrigation rate are lower in price than the last step of the new general use rate. This follows the general pattern of previous irrigation rate schedules which also followed the general service rate for the first brackets.

Pioneer last increased the base irrigation rate in November of 1971. Since that time the Company has experienced enormous increases in its cost for labor and materials and other expenses.

Pioneer has no control over the

price the producers charge for the gas at the wellhead. Pioneer bids in competition for the gas supply adequate to take care of consumer's

needs. This is further complicated by the national energy legislation passed late last year that now extends federal controls to Pioneer's purchase of gas.

40 YEARS AGO—JUNE 16, 1939

A radio program contest for 4-H Club boys in Parmer County has been announced by County Agent Jason O. Gordon, with broadcasts to be given each Wednesday at 8 o'clock over KICA, Clovis, as a means toward encouraging club members to deliver talks on agricultural subjects, and to explain to the citizenry the true meaning of 4-H Club work.

On June 2, a letter was sent by the county committee to all wheat farmers in the county who had seeded barley in either seeded wheat or volunteer wheat in order to be within the acreage allotment.

35 YEARS AGO—JUNE 16, 1944

Work has begun on the erection of a large building on the lots just north of the Santa Fe Grain Company office and warehouse, to be used by the Santa Fe Machinery Company, local Case implement dealers. The building is a frame structure, 32x60 feet, and the frame work is up and under roof.

For the first time in three years the Frio Draw filled and over-flowed its banks Sunday afternoon, as a result of the heavy rains that fell over in New Mexico Friday evening and night.

25 YEARS AGO—JUNE 10, 1954

Lumber was being unloaded Tuesday at Black for construction of additional storage bins at the Black Grain Company. Chalmers and Borden, Kansas construction firm, has contracted to build storage for 260,000 bushels on the east of the present bins. The elevator now has storage facilities for 460,000 bushels.

Earl Smith was named the head football coach for the Friona High School by members of the board of trustees of the Friona Independent School District Monday night. In the same action, members chose Roy Simmons as head basketball coach.

15 YEARS AGO—JUNE 11, 1964

A net distribution to stockholders

of \$423,573.48 was announced by Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. at its 30th annual meeting Tuesday night here.

The Friona City Council awarded contract to a Dimmitt ditching firm for digging a new trash disposal pit at the city dump grounds, during the council's regular meeting last Friday night.

10 YEARS AGO—JUNE 5, 1969

Nine building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the month of May, representing new construction in the city worth an estimated \$77,900.

Friona's new feed mill, Hi-Pro Feeds, began processing feed last Friday, and is now producing cattle feed on a small scale, according to General Manager Ron Davenport.

5 YEARS AGO—JUNE 9, 1974

Harvest of barley and wheat began in the Friona area this week, with the delivery of the first loads of both crops for 1974 at Friona Wheat Growers. The first load of small grain delivered in Friona was a load of barley that was delivered Wednesday afternoon, June 5, by W.M. Massie.

Horse Owners Need To Take Precautions

It is approaching the time when equine owners should be warned about the possibility of horses grazing sorghum hybrids, becoming affected with a problem called "Sorghum Cystitis." This syndrome was reported by members of the Large Animal Clinic at the College of Veterinary Medicine in 1966, it has been recognized with increasing frequency in the southwestern part of the United States.

It occurs more frequently during times of medium to high rainfall, usually from June to November. Cases are not usually seen after the first frost. Horses affected have a history of grazing hybrid plants resulting from crossing Sorghum vulgare (Sorghum) with the Sorghum vulgare variation Sudanense (Sudan). Other cases have been reported in horses grazing varieties of Sorghum or Johnson Grass mixed with native pastures.

The problem occurred when the plant material was young and growing rapidly, but mature and second-growth pastures were also incriminated. Horses fed well-cured sorghum species hay were not affected, but cases did develop after eating freshly cut hay. The condition occurs in all equine breeds; however,

age does not seem to be a factor since it has been reported in horses from 5 months of age to 20 years. The majority were 2 to 3 years old. Cases have been observed in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Kansas and Colorado.

Signs: The first signs usually seen have been incoordination of the rear legs; this has been followed by urinary incontinence in about half of the horses. In mares, the most obvious clincial signs include opening and closing of the vulva and dribbling of urine which may cause loss of hair on the inner part of the hind legs due to urine scalding. Geldings may show a loss of hair on the ventral abdomen near the prepuce. Urine may drip continually and become intensified if the animal is caused to move suddenly.

Some mares may abort. When affected animals are removed from the pasture and fed a balanced ration, they usually improve, but complete recoveries have not been reported. Both the urinary incontinence and ataxia have been observed in some horses for as long as three years.

Prevention:

1. Keep equines off sudan type pastures.
2. Do not feed freshly cut sudan species hay to equines.
3. Horses fed well-cured sudan species hay did not develop this syndrome.
4. Many treatments have been used in affected equines, but with little success.

Water Board To Meet In Hereford

Hereford, Texas will be the site for the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1. The Board will convene at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, June 12, in the Medallion Room of the Deaf Smith County Electric Co-op. The meeting will be open to the public.

Among items of business to be considered by the Board will be testimony regarding the possible need for a rule requiring that check valves be installed on water distribution systems where certain types of chemicals are being injected into the

system. Other matters requiring Board action will include approving water well permit applications, and review of cases of noncompliance with District rules and regulations.

District staff will report on the status of various District activities and projects. Staff reports will

include a review of critiques and results of a pilot classroom testing in Idalou of the supplemental water text being developed by the District. The Board will review copies of the District's most recently completed report on "Cost Analysis of Irrigation Ditch Losses."

"Footsteps" Celebrate Anniversary

There are presently twelve pairs of human footsteps on the Moon, left there by American Astronauts. With no rain, snow or wind to erode them, those first footprints will be visible a million years from now, barring an unexpected catastrophe.

Will there be other footsteps there--and elsewhere? And when?

The new star program opening Friday, June 15, at the Don Harrington Discovery Center planetarium in Amarillo is titled "FOOTSTEPS," the story of mankind's continual dream to reach the Moon and the significance of that dream realized. 1979 marks the tenth anniversary of man's first step onto a planet beyond the Earth.

"FOOTSTEPS" travels back in time to witness the formation of the solar system and to explore why the Earth and Moon, which receive the same amount of sunlight, are radically different worlds: The Earth teems with life while the Moon remains an almost unchanged museum of the early days of our solar system. Visitors will watch man through the centuries learning about the Moon and trying to guess what he might find there: a world like ours, or a world of fantastic animals, plants and rocks. Finally, viewers ride with Apollo 11 astronauts down to the surface of the Moon and peer into the future as man becomes a true citizen of the universe.

The Don Harrington Discovery Center planetarium in Amarillo will present "FOOTSTEPS" on an expanded schedule this summer, adding a Friday evening at 8 performance to the regular schedule of Saturday evening at 8 and Sunday afternoon at 3, through August 17. Tickets are priced at \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for students under 18. The box office opens one hour prior to showtime.

In addition to "FOOTSTEPS" visitors may see at no charge exhibits from NASA, the American space agency, and from the American Medical Association.

Sunday visitors can view live pictures of the sun including sunspots, coronas and plagues through the heliostat when the sun is shining.

Special showings of "FOOTSTEPS" are available for groups. For additional information interested parties should contact the Don Harrington Discovery Center office during business hours.

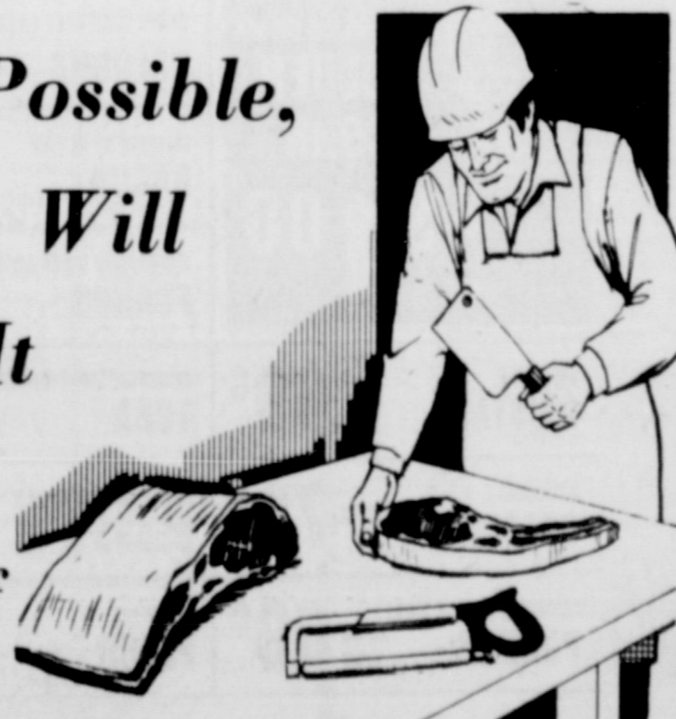

Pat has served as a photographer for the past two years, has been in the Honor Society for three years and the Society of Distinguished High School Students for one year.

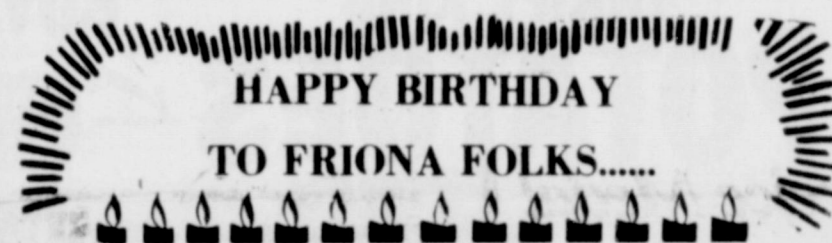
He works at R.C. Young Seed and Grain in the research department, where he has been for three summers.
