CONSUMER TIP? A used car can often be a better buy than a new one, says a major U.S. transportation company. Hertz Corp. reports that it compared new and used cars driven 10,000 miles a year for three years and found that the used cars cost drivers just half as much to keep on the road. The used car expenses averaged 17.3 cents a mile; the new cars averaged 30.1 cents. The survey included all relevant costs-depreciation, fuel, insurance, maintenance and repairs.

LOUIS B. STRONG, president of the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, has some interesting comments concerning gasoline rationing:

"Those of us who lived and drove cars during World War II remember gasoline rationing very well. According to polls I have seen, the majority of Americans think gasoline rationing might be a good way to help relieve our oil supply problem. I personally cannot work up much enthusiasm for gasoline rationing for the following reasons:

1. During World War II we had about 24 million automobiles. Today we have over 100 million. Also, by the end of the War, with only 24 million cars, the black markets were beginning to destroy the system.

2. During World War II, we had great popular support for everything related to the War effort. Today the majority of Americans don't believe we have an oil problem and blame either the oil companies or the government for what is happening to gasoline prices. So when the inequities, unfairness, and the bureaucracy required to run the system became evident, I think the great majority of Americans would soon become disillusioned with the process.

3. I can't quite envision the size and cost of the bureaucracy required to run it, nor can I envision how all the differing circumstances affecting the need for gasoline can be made to fit fairly into any system.

At the present rate, the building will soon be ready for occupancy. So far, it is only conjecture as to what line of business will occupy the building.

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 26, 1939

E.W. Boedecker, principal of Friona High School, announces that the coveted Reader's Digest Award for scholastic achievement has been won by the valedictorian of the class of 1939, Martin Todd.

Dan Ethridge has had the north half of the office which he has occupied for the past two years handsomely decorated and has his office arranged there. 



Leaders Seek Aid For Facility

Mayor B.K. Buske and City Manager A.L. Outland attended a five hour briefing in Lubbock, Tuesday, May 15, in relation to the possibilities of seeking federal funds to build a new wastewater plant for the City of Friona.

The intent is to comply with federal wastewater disposal standards and provide a facility that will service the growth of Friona in years to come. Should the plan be approved, the federal funds will be provided in the amount of seventy-five per cent of the cost with the city providing the remaining twenty-five per cent of the cost.

Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Inc., Consulting Engineers, Lubbock, the Engineer Representative, Clayton Yeager, was also in attendance at the briefing. The cost of the project is envisioned in the approximate amount of \$300,000.00. The type facility planned is an oval shaped aeration-clarification unit, similar to

those presently in use at Dimmitt and Muleshoe.

The application for federal funds consideration has been in process since December, 1975, and it is expected to take at least two years before construction will begin after the step 1 application is approved. The city's present wastewater facility was constructed in 1959 and has served the community well for the past twenty years.

"Ralph will serve as a resource person for the committee and his duties will include coordination of information gathering and dissemination of facts pertinent to agriculture," Clayton said.


