THE UNIVERSITY Interscholastic League (UIL) announced changes in its classification system this week, which brought at least a numerical change to every high school in the state. It's the first sweeping change in the "numbering system" which groups schools into districts in about 25 years.

Friona, for example, will be in class AAA. No, the school won't be moved up to compete in the same district with such schools as Canyon and Levelland, it's just that every level is being advanced a notch.

The UIL decided to do away with the "B" classification. Perhaps the schools which had been in this numerical division objected to the indication that they were below all the rest. So, conference B has been eliminated, or re-assigned as conference A.

All the rest of the classifications have been jumped up a step, so that the highest classification, which used to be AAAA, is now AAAAA.

The UIL has re-classified Morton downward, due to enrollment, and the Indians, longtime district foes for Friona, will compete in a district to the south, they being the northernmost team, rather than the southernmost as they have been in 3-AA. Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Littlefield, Olton and Friona will make up the new district, which will be known as 2-AAA.

So, like the Jeffersons of television fame, we're just "Movin' on up!"

DON'T KNOW IF you have been following the antics of Lubbock's cartoonist-mayor, Dirk West, in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, but if you have, then you probably know about the running battle which developed between the cartoonist and the people over at Muleshoe.

It all started about a month ago in West's weekly cartoons about the Southwest Conference games. He showed the Houston Cougar, who is portrayed as a scraggy alley cat, pawing through a trash can, and saying something like "This is about as bad as finding a good place to eat in Muleshoe."

West followed that up the next week with one of his "background signs," which proclaimed Muleshoe as the site of the "1980 Kaopetate Festival." The next one said that Muleshoe had been named the "City of the Year" by Maalox.

The good people at Muleshoe objected to West's remarks, and the Chamber of Commerce president then invited, and virtually insisted that West come to Muleshoe for dinner. (He admitted in a newspaper article that he had not eaten there prior to the cartoon episode, that "Muleshoe just had a funny ring to its name.")

We saw some friends from Muleshoe this week, and they were telling us that Monday of this week was the big day, when Mayor West came to town, to settle the issue. They said that Dirk played the matter to the hilt, dressed in a black tuxedo. He also had a big, burly policeman for a bodyguard, and an official "taster," just in case the Muleshoe cooks wanted to really get even.

The upshot of the whole deal was that Muleshoe received considerable publicity, and even though some of this publicity might have been considered a dubious honor, most people no doubt took the cartoons in the light in which they were intended.

Once before, West had had the Texas Aggie in his cartoon saying he had just won a contest, and that first prize was a week in Borger. He went on to say that second prize was two weeks in Borger. "I just pick these places out at random. There was no malicious intent," West assured the folks at Muleshoe.

Sarpalius Keynotes United Fund Kickoff

He gave examples of how people with great courage can succeed, such as Olympic champion Hal Connally, who had polio as a child, Helen Keller, and Michael Dowling, a cripple who spurred on the troops during World War I.

Some 40 people attended the kickoff breakfast at the Girl Scout House November 5. Girl Scout leaders prepared the food.

Chieftain Band Gets First Division Score

The Friona High School Band received a "First Division" rating at the University Interscholastic League (UIL) marching contest Wednesday at Jones Stadium on the Texas Tech campus in Lubbock.

The band received "1" ratings from each of the three contest judges. The event is the first leg in competition for "Sweepstakes" band honors. The band will compete in sight-reading and concert playing next spring.

Judge Mike Marsh commented on his score-sheet "Really a well-planned and well-executed show. Fine balance and blend--a very enjoyable performance. Fine teaching and excellent attention to detail. I enjoyed it."

"Nice trumpet solo on 'What I Did for Love,'" he concluded, referring to the solo by band president Rory Brito.

Judge Lynn Low called the Chieftain band a "pretty band" in the blank for "general appearance." "Interesting band. Seems to handle style fairly well," he said in his comments.

"I especially liked the last part of your show. Nice flags. You did a fine job today; I enjoyed seeing you perform. Congratulations," said Judge Harris Brinson.

Scott Houston is director of the

FHS band, assisted by Nancy Ray. "I was real proud of the kids. They really worked hard the last month getting ready. This was the first time I ever had a band get straight 'ones,'" so it was a great feeling for me," Houston said.

The FHS band director said that although it was cloudy and overcast (it had rained earlier in the morning at Lubbock), that the "low ceiling" actually helped the band's sound. "Sometimes, when it's cold and windy, it's hard to hold your sound," Houston said.

Miss Ray has spent considerable time working with the Flag Corps, and this has been a big plus for the band's appearance.

The FHS band last had a Division I rating in the marching contest in 1977-78, when it also went on to win the coveted "sweepstakes" award.

Only five of the 19 bands competing in conference's AA marching were awarded "Division One" status. Three of those so honored were from District 3-AA: Friona, Littlefield and Dimmitt.

Friona's band was the first band to march Wednesday morning in the competition, and in order to get to the competition on time, the

bandsmen left Friona at 5 a.m. Due to one of the three buses having a breakdown, they did not make it back to Friona until about 7:30 that night, making for a fairly long day.

Offices To Close Mon.

Several institutions will be closing on Monday, November 12, in observance of Veteran's Day. The holiday had been made a Monday holiday by Congress a few years back, but due to objections by veterans groups, it has been moved back to its official date, November 11.

This year, since the holiday falls on a Sunday, some employees will again get a day off.

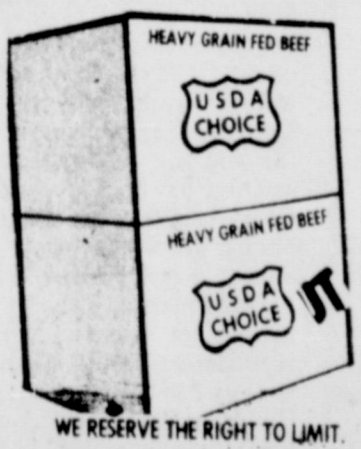

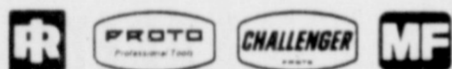

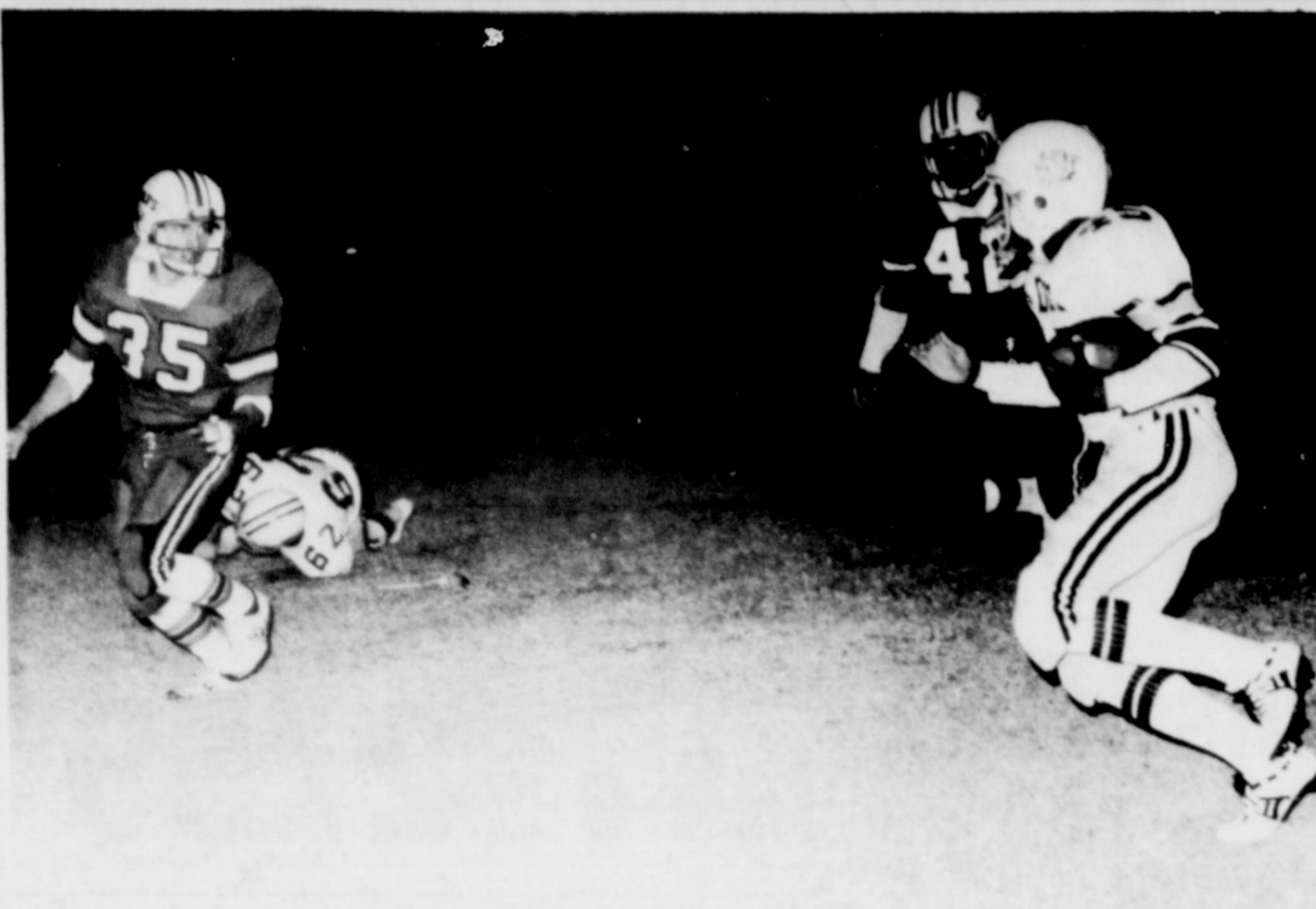

Wildcats Bury Chiefs With Big Explosion

Littlefield's Wildcats broke away from a slim 14-13 halftime lead for a runaway, 48-13 win in a District 3-AA game at Chieftain Field last Friday.

Friona had rallied for 13 second-period points, to make it a close game, but the Chieftains' game plans blew up in their face in the second half.

"We thought we could throw on them, after completing two passes for 55 yards in the first half. But our pass protection broke down, and our passing game fell apart in the second half," said Coach Lonnie Phillips.

Friona tried four passes during the third quarter, and the only completions were to Littlefield defenders, who picked off three of the four passes. One of them was returned for a Wildcat touchdown during the wild third quarter, which saw Littlefield score 27 points during a wooly seven minutes of clock time.

Littlefield scored the first time they had the ball, going 75 yards to take a 7-0 lead with 2:21 left in the first quarter. Friona had earlier driven to the Wildcat 22-yard line, but lost the ball on downs.

On the last play of the first quarter, quarterback Joe Malouf hit halfback Mike Hubbard on a pass play that covered 35 yards, from the Friona 29 to the Littlefield 36.

Three plays later, Malouf spotted end Joel Hight near the Wildcat goal line, and Hight caught the aerial for a 20-yard scoring strike. Mark Montoya's kick tied the score, 7-all, after 1:02 had expired in the second quarter.

Neither team could score in their next two tries, but Littlefield broke speedy Ruben Torres around right end for a 24-yard scoring sprint, and took a 14-7 lead with 2:34 left in the half.

Friona attempted to lateral the ball on the kickoff, and advanced the ball to midfield. But the ball had been thrown forward, and the Chiefs were penalized back to their own eight

yard line, having the ball in a big hole instead of in good position.

Two plays later, the team faced third down and one to go, from their own 17. Rod Owen took the handoff and burst through the drawn-in Littlefield defense. He found himself in the secondary, and put on a burst of speed to get away from the Wildcat safety man, outrunning him to the goal-line for a nifty 83-yard touchdown run, one of the longest scoring plays in recent Friona football history.

The team got a bad snap on the PAT try, but they had virtually knotted up the game with a 14-13 halftime score, and appeared to have the momentum going into the second half.

Only trouble was, someone forgot to tell the visitors. Littlefield drove the second half kickoff out to the 29, and then marched 71 yards to take a 21-13 lead.

Friona took to the air, and Malouf's pass was intercepted. Seven plays later, Littlefield had another TD, and a 27-13 lead.

Again Friona went to the air, and again Littlefield intercepted. And again it cost Friona seven points, this time on a 14-yard pass play. The score became 34-13, as Littlefield had scored 20 points in 6:34 of clock time. But that wasn't all.

The 'Cats scored on a 30-yard run in the third quarter, and then recovered an onside kick and quickly scored again, to increase their lead. Friona was unable to score in the second half.

Robert Osborn added 25 yards. Friona was playing Olton this week in an attempt to get back on the winning track.

Voting Is Very Light

The turnout was light, as expected, in the Constitutional Amendment election this past Tuesday. Only 401 out of 4,519 registered voters cast their ballots in the county.

Friona voters went against the trend on all three of the proposed amendments.

Local voters went against number one, to change the term of office for notaries public, 61-24. The local precinct was one of two county boxes to favor number two, to allow for legislative review of the state agency rule-making process, by 45-40.

And local voters were the only ones to go against the amendment to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch land, 44-43.

Countywide, amendment number one failed, 268-128; number two failed, 237-156, and number three passed, 252-145. That voting trend also held throughout the area and state.

Freshmen Fall, 36-8

The Friona Freshmen Chieftains dropped a 36-8 game to Littlefield last Thursday, although getting off to an 8-0 lead in the second quarter.

After the teams were scoreless in the first quarter, Friona broke out on top in the second quarter when Pilo Castillo ran six yards. Richard Malouf ran the PATs, and Friona had an 8-0 lead.

But Littlefield answered the challenge with three scores prior to halftime, to forge a 22-8 lead.

The third quarter was again scoreless, and Littlefield added a pair of fourth-quarter scores for the final margin.
