FARMERS IN THE AREA have been hard hit by the weather in recent days. Hail cut a large swath across the county on Monday, zeroing in on the Lazbuddie area. Some farmers whose crops were just about "made" saw them shredded by the vicious late-season storm.

A hail storm can ruin a farmer's entire year, and those who are sometimes critical of farmers, or think they "have it made" might have their minds changed if they saw what can happen in just a few minutes.

It has been a trying year for some farmers, who were beset by too much rain and cold weather earlier in the season which ruined or hampered their cotton. After putting in substitute crops, some of these same farmers now have been hit twice the same year.

Several farmers in the Rhea area also know of what we speak, having been hit with that bad storm the last part of July. They had been fortunate until that time, having more moisture than usual, with prospects for a better than average crop, then--boom!

Farming is a risky business at best. As they will tell you, when they plant their seeds in the spring, they have no assurance they will have a harvest in the fall.

We salute our farming neighbors. Hopefully the remainder of the season will be favorable, so that no more crops will be ruined, and the harvest overall will be a good one.

Season Grid Tickets On Sale Now

Season tickets for the Friona Chieftain home games are now on sale at Bi-Wize Drug in Friona, it was announced this week.

Hail Damages Lazbuddie Area

A late-season thunderstorm wiped out thousands of acres of crops in the Lazbuddie area on Monday, August 20.

The towering cloud had built up near Clovis earlier, and began its trail of damage in Curry County before entering Parmer County. It passed across the southern portion of Parmer County between 4 and 5 p.m. Monday, and when it had moved out, some farmers saw virtually their entire crop destroyed.

Bobby Broyles, who farms southeast of Lazbuddie, said the hail completely wiped out his cotton and virtually ruined his sunflowers.

The same general area had experienced a similar hailstorm on Memorial Day weekend. In that storm, the Broyles farm had lost the biggest part of what had been a good cotton crop.

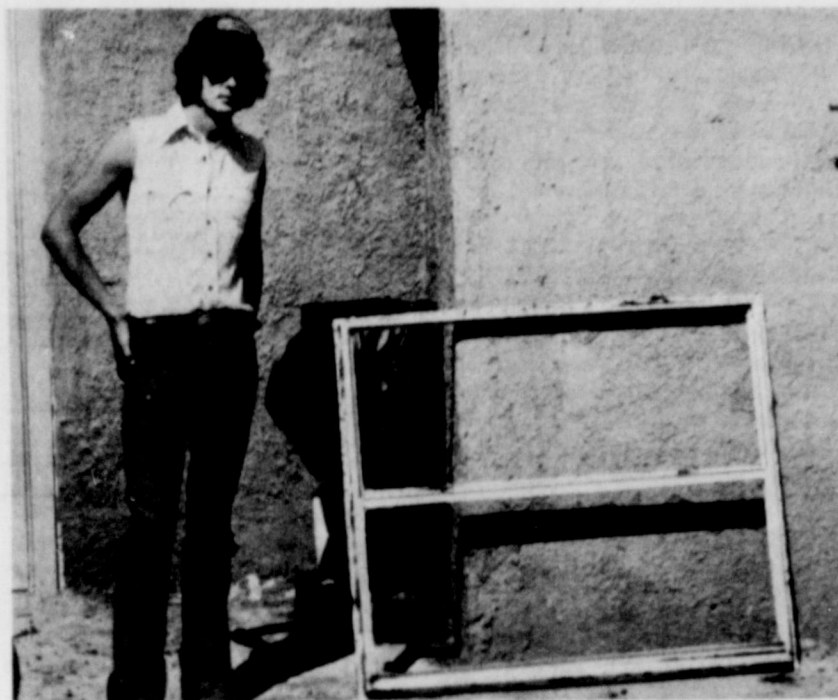
"We had salvaged one quarter section of cotton, and it was looking about as good as any I've seen before the storm hit Monday. Now it's gone. The stalks are completely stripped," Broyles said.

The Lazbuddie farmer said that hailstones ranged from marble to golfball sized, and were whipped by a ferocious wind, which aided the damage.

"We had replanted the cotton we lost on Memorial Day to sunflowers, and they were really looking good," Broyles said. However, following the Monday storm the flowers were bent into grotesque shapes. Many were broken off or laying down.

The corn stalks likewise were stripped of leaves. The ears were left on the stalks in most cases, but later reports indicated that the corn was pouring on the stalk.

In addition to the damage to his crops, the Broyles family also sustained extensive damage to their

home, as the large hail, driven by the wind, broke out every window on the north side of the house. Mrs. Broyles said that hailstones and glass filled the living room and bedroom, damaging furniture and carpet in that

No Plans To Close Local Beef Plant

Although there have been some changes in the operation of the plant, there are no plans to close Friona's Progressive Beef plant, according to Carl Skaggs, manager.

Skaggs said that the plant had lost the large beef contract with the Sambos Restaurant chain, due to a change in Sambos' operations.

Due to this loss, the plant was closed down this past week, and while it was closed, a small crew had been doing maintenance work.

"But we plan to be able to start back up on Monday. We are hoping to get some other contract work. It will be hard to replace the Sambos order, but we are definitely not planning to close, or move. We're doing everything possible to keep going," Skaggs said.

The slaughter plant has been employing 50 people locally, and while fulfilling the Sambos contract, had been killing up to 200 head of cattle per day, or 1,000 per week.

Prior to the dropping of the Sambos order, the plant had been making plans to further expand its operation here.

GSPA To Elect 4 Directors

Four directors will be elected to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board in an election which is currently underway. Ballots are being mailed to grain sorghum producers throughout the 29-county TGSPB area of the Texas High Plains.

Every two years, the terms of four members of the Board expire. Current members of the Board who have chosen not to seek re-election are: A.W. "Dub" Anthony, Jr. of Friona; E.C. Witten, Edmonson; and Don Nelson of Tulia.

The producers whose names have been placed in nomination are: Dennis Anthony, Friona; Olan "Jack" Crowl, Morse, Texas; John Gilbreath, Hart; Steve Lee, Hale Center; and Albert Scheele, Lockney. John Gilbreath is the only incumbent candidate.

All grain sorghum producers within the 29-county area of the Texas High Plains (served by the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board) are eligible to vote. Any producer who does not receive a ballot through the mail may obtain one at his county agent's office.

The biennial election deadline is September 15, 1979. Any ballot that is postmarked after that date will not be valid. In addition to the five candidates listed on the ballot, a producer may also vote for any grain sorghum producer who has agreed to serve on the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, provided he write in the preferred name in the space provided for write-in candidates.

TGSPB chairman, Larry Witten of Olton encourages all grain sorghum farmers to exercise their right in this election by marking their ballots and returning them to the TGSPB office as quickly as possible.

All events will be held at the Bovina Roping Club Arena and will begin at 2 p.m.

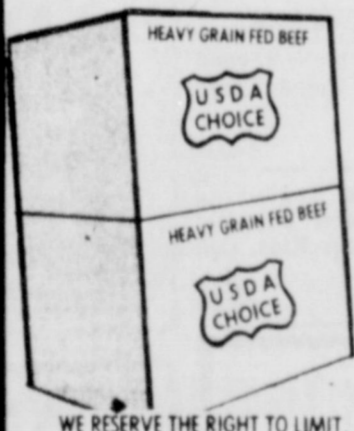

Council OKs Budget; Annexes Five Lots

The Friona City Council gave approval for publishing its budget for the fiscal year 1980, and approved expenditure of \$35,000 for an additional trash truck, using Revenue Sharing Funds, at its regular monthly meeting August 13.

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland presented the budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The budget calls for revenue to the city of \$877,052, up eight per cent from the figure of \$804,697 in 1978-79. Proposed expenditures will be \$626,815, compared to \$533,732 in the current year's budget.

Principal capital items include exchanging automobiles for the police department and city manager, plus \$7,000 in improvements at the municipal swimming pool, which includes renovation of the dressing facilities.

The council approved a motion to enter into agreement with the Panhandle Emergency Medical Service System, Inc., for the payment of \$3.00 per ambulance run, on a semi-annual basis, for assistance in maintaining emergency communications in the Panhandle. This was necessary to fund an item which had been previously funded through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The council heard a petition from the Frio Development Corp. for annexation of five lots in Block 2 of Western Addition on West Ninth

Street. After some discussion, the petition was approved, with the developers agreeing to have some paving discrepancies corrected in the portion of the block which has been newly paved.

A request from the chairman of the Prairie Acres board of directors to spend over \$3,000 for a storage building was approved. The building will house gasoline, paint, lawn mowing equipment, etc.

Ordinances were passed updating service credits for City of Friona employees and allowing the employees to participate in supplemental death benefits through the Texas Municipal Retirement System. Additional cost to the city will amount to less than one per cent of the employees' salaries.

The additional trash truck purchase, through Revenue Sharing Funds, had been advertised prior to the meeting, and a motion was passed authorizing the city to advertise for such truck. The specifications will be similar to the truck presently being used.

Beamon McDonald, representing the Softball League, met with the council and asked for assistance in completing the lighting of the park. The specific request was for \$3,500 to complete the light installation. As the item had not been on the agenda, the mayor and council suggested that it be added to the proposed budget for 1978-79 if possible.

Rural women still choose traditional roles

COLLEGE STATION — A six-year regional study, based on 1,265 interviews with women and men in Texas, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia and North Carolina, reveals that women in rural areas still choose the traditional roles of nurse, teacher, secretary and housewife.

The women's movement seems to have had no effect on career choices for rural women, claim sociologists Dr. J. Steven Picou and Arthur G. Cosby of Texas A&M University.

The researchers believe there is a definite need for better occupational guidance in these rural areas. Calling disadvantaged southern rural youth the forgotten minority, Picou contends that "Rural females just haven't had the role models of successful women that are so often apparent in the cities. They see only what they have access to — women in their traditional jobs."

portion of the house. The roof to the Broyles home was also damaged.

The hailstorm which came during a 45-minute period in the Lazbuddie area, also dumped a large amount of rainfall as well. Broyles said he measured 2.1 inches of rain at his place.

Demp Foster, who operates Foster Fertilizer Company just north of the Broyles place, said he had not seen such a devastating hailstorm since about 1949 or 1950. Both he and the Broyles family told of how the weather seemed like wintertime with all the hail on the ground.

According to Foster, the water ran down the bar ditches in front of his business so swiftly that they overflowed, and filled up the pit at his grain scales. Water was still standing on his property the

following day.

Steve Foster reported that he lost six windows at his house during the hailstorm.

Damage began to be noticeable at about Clay's Corner, and the worst of the hail hit right near Lazbuddie and farther east. The Sunnyside community, to the southeast, also was hard hit.

Other farmers in the Lazbuddie community who sustained hail damage included Max Steinbock, Jerry Don Glover, Terry Parham, Gene Smith and Jim Roy Daniel.

Most of the hail damage was to farms on the south side of Running Water Draw, as farmers on the north side of the draw reported less hail.

In the path of worst destruction, the storm beat all of the almost-grown cotton bolls off the stalks, as well as the plants' leaves. Near the draw, as well as other places there

were inclines, could be seen "patches" of cotton leaves and bolls which washed out of the fields during the deluge.

Parmer County had been placed under a severe thunderstorm warning by the U.S. Weather Service in Amarillo just prior to the Monday afternoon storm. Unfortunately for many residents of the southeastern part of the county, the warning turned out to be in order.

Although the massive cloud system also reached to Friona on the northern fringe, just a light sprinkle was received here, with only .01 inch being the official measurement Monday afternoon.

Thursday morning, a rare morning thunderstorm again moved across the area, with some beneficial moisture being received in places. The Kenyth Cass residence near Hub received a half inch, according to Mrs. Cass.
