### Vandals Hit City Again

Additional vandalism was noted in Friona last weekend, with the main target being the Panhandle Concrete Co. in southeast Friona.

Manager Terry Copley said that vandals broke out all the windows on two mixer trucks, one flatbed truck and a large front-end loader. At least \$3,000 in damage was estimated.

In addition to the glass breakage, the vandals ruined the radiators on two vehicles, punching 22 holes in the radiator on the loader. The

Other vandalism noted was at the CVAE shop at Friona Junior High, where six windows were broken out. Vandals entered the building, taking soft drinks out of the refrigerator and pouring them on the floor. They also released the contents of a fire extinguisher, and took a small amount of change.

One Friona elevator indicated that their corn receipts were considerably less than for 1978, but it was expected.

"There were a lot more acres of cotton, soybeans and sunflowers in the area this year, and maybe even more milo," said Ron Smiley, manager of Friona Wheat Growers. This speaks well for the diversification of crops in the Friona area.

Maize, which is later maturing than corn, is now beginning to come in at a pretty good pace, Smiley said.

Cotton farmers are on the verge of their harvest season, with the stripping activities getting underway on a limited basis this week in the area.


Producers southeast of Friona defoliated some 1,000 acres of cotton, and stripping was underway

of cotton by mid-afternoon Thursday, and had many more bales on their lot.

One cotton observer said that the light freeze of the past Monday could have been just what was needed, although early appearances might indicate that it was not cold enough to kill the plants. A harder freeze may be needed to get the job done.

"It's remarkable how much progress the cotton has made since the first of August. At that time, the status of our cotton crop was much in doubt, but the weather has really been great. As a result, I feel we have a good crop," said Army Armstrong, manager of the Bruegel Bros. Gin.

Dear Editor:

The vandalism which has been going on in Friona recently has become serious business, and I wonder if Friona residents are fully aware of just what is going on. If not, they might pay a little more attention to their youngsters, or caution them about participating in such acts of destruction.

For example, what might have been considered as "pranks" by some caused more than \$3,000 in damage to our equipment at the concrete plant last weekend. It put us completely out of business for three days.

As many of you are aware, the construction business hasn't exactly been booming lately, so losses such as this are even harder to make up.

To make matters worse, we did have a job we were to have begun on Monday, but the vandalism to our machines on Saturday night saw to it that we could not get onto this project.

If you've ever had to keep a crew on during a slack period of time, you can see how frustrating it was for us on Monday morning.

We thought the parents in the Friona area should have an idea of the seriousness of the damage which has been done in our city. This is the third time we have been hit, and we know that others have also suffered damage.

If you read the story in last week's paper, you know what offenders can receive in the way of fines and jail sentences.

### 50 YEARS AGO .-- NOV. 8, 1929

Work on new buildings is progressing nicely this week, thanks to the good weather which has visited the area. O.G. Turner has the walls of his new building on the east side of town up, and the framework on the new Baptist Church has been erected.

Friona grain prices are as good as at any other Panhandle point, it was shown in an investigation on Monday. A false rumor had it that Bovina dealers were paying 15 cents per hundredweight more than local elevators, but the truth of the matter is that local prices were 98 cents on Monday, and had never been as low as the 80 cents, which was rumored.

#### 45 YEARS AGO -- NOV. 9, 1934 The members of the Friona PTA held their annual Halloween Carnival at the high school building last Friday night, October 26.

### 40 YEARS AGO .- NOV. 3, 1939

The people of Friona were horrified this week when they learned of the death of R.H. (Reube) Kinsley, who had been terribly burned Wednesday morning in the west part of town. The burning occurred about 10 o'clock when a can of blasting powder exploded in the little workshop where Mr. Kinsley was working. Kinsley had workmen

engaged in building a new garage at his home, and the can of powder had been used the day before in blowing a stump from the ground where the foundation was being built. ....

### 30 YEARS AGO -- NOV. 4, 1949

Three people were killed and three others critically injured in a head-on collision of a truck and car three miles east of Friona on Highway 60 Thursday morning. Dead are Frank Phillips, 53, of Farwell, Mrs. Loretta Essie Stone, 25 and her infant son, Billy, both of Hereford.

#### 25 YEARS AGO -- NOV. 5, 1954

Continued ideal harvest conditions, coupled with the record vields of Parmer maize fields this week, have taxed elevator and shipping facilities to the greatest extent since the early 1930s. Most elevators have experienced temporary shutdowns since the middle of the last week, awaiting cars for shipment. 



# **Furious Mule Rally Overcomes FHS 36-23**

Friona played a "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" game at Muleshoe last Friday.

The underdog Chieftains surprised their hosts by jumping out to leads of 17-0 and 23-7 in the first half, before Muleshoe finally got their touted offense to rolling in the second half, coming from behind for a 36-23 win.

It was the district opener for both teams.

Friona took the opening kickoff, and thanks to a 36-yard run by Chuck Nichols, drove to the Muleshoe 15. On fourth down, the Chiefs were to try a field goal, but the snap from center was bad and the kick was never got off.

Friona got the ball back, and set out on another drive. Mike Hubbart ran 13 yards, Rod Owen 12 and 17 for first downs as Friona ran to the Muleshoe nine. Again, the drive bogged down, and this time freshman Mark Montoya booted a 26-yard field goal to get Friona on the scoreboard with a 3-0 lead.

Muleshoe received the kickoff, but the fielding back stepped out with the ball at his 14, and on the first play from scrimmage, the Mules fumbled the ball. Friona hopped on it.

Four plays later, Owen scored, and Montoya's kick made it 10-0, Friona, with 56 seconds left in the quarter.

Muleshoe's comedy of errors continued, as the Mules put the ball in play at their 16, only to fumble again, with Friona obliging with a recovery. 2-10

Three plays later, Owen again scored. He fumbled after crossing the goal-line, but the six-pointer was good. Montoya's kick made the score 17-0, and Muleshoe fans couldn't believe it.

Muleshoe quarterback Mike Northcutt sent Jim Norman down the sidelines, where he got behind the, Friona defense and completed a 75vard scoring pass play to get Muleshoe on the scoreboard at 17-7. But Friona responded. Running the option to perfection, Chieftain

quarterback Joe Malouf galloped 60 yards to the Muleshoe eight, being caught from behind. He went the last six yards two plays later, and the score became 23-7 with 8:32 left in the half.

Muleshoe again took to the air, getting 51 yards in two plays, speedy Charles Walker gained 18 yards rushing. Northcutt scored the TD, which made the score 23-14 with 5:25 left before halftime. Friona's only fumble of the night proved costly. Muleshoe had not stopped the Chieftain running game up to this point, but a fumble at the Friona 37 gave the Mules good field position. The Mules converted the break into a TD in seven plays, and the score, became 23-21, Friona, with 1:15 left in the half. After an offensive display that saw Friona gain 250 yards to Muleshoe's 213 in the first half, the teams played better defense in the second half. In fact, after that 34-point second quarter, neither team was able to put points on the board in the third quarter, but it took a pass interception by Bret Moore to stall a Muleshoe bid at the Friona ten. The first punt in the game was by Friona, with 4:21 left in the third quarter. Friona had a good play by Malouf and Hubbart late in the quarter. Malouf ran about 10 yards, then pitched back to Hubbart who was trailing and Mike made another 14

yards, moving the ball to the Muleshoe 38.

Malouf made another gain, and then gave the icam a big first down at the Muleshoe 25, with a sneak for four yards. Bad luck set in, however, as Hubbart and Owen were stopped for no gain.

On fourth and six from the 21, Malouf was back to pass, then decided to run, and had an open field. A lone Muleshoe defender made a shoestring tackle at the line of scrimmage, otherwise the Friona quarterback might have scored. As it was, the Mules took over.

They proceeded to drive 77 yards in 12 plays which ate up most of the clock in the fourth quarter. Northcutt passed to Sam Whalin for the TD from eight yards out, and the Mules took the lead for the first time in the game at 29-23 with 3:53 left to play.

Friona tried a razzle-dazzle play

which resulted in an eight-yard loss, and Muleshoe got the ball back at the Friona 39 with 2:16 to play.

Due to an injury to a Friona player, Ben Landrum, causing the clock to be stopped, Muleshoe was able to score its last TD, which came with one second left, and brought the final margin of 36-23.

It was a great spectator's game, with some wild offense and some timely defense by the winning Mules.

It was a cleanly-played game, with Friona not drawing a single penalty (the only time in memory for a Chieftain team to play an entire game without penalty), and Muleshoe had only two flags for ten yards.

Friona produced its biggest offense of the season, and best balance, led by quarterback Malouf who led with 107 yards, helped by his 60-yard sprint. Every member of the starting backfield gained at least 60 yards.

# **Program Highlights Study Club Meeting**

Modern Study Club members met in regular session October 16 at the Women's Club House for a program on "Solar Energy."

Faye Reeve called the meeting to order and Janet Buske led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance followed by the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner."

Roll call was answered by naming ways to use the sun at home. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Committee reports were called for. Rhea Foster gave a report for the finance committee. Lora Mae McFarland, chairman of the library committee, reported that two new best sellers had been ordered for the library.

Linda Murphree made a motion that the club time be changed from 7:30 to 7 p.m. The motion carried. Winfred Hurst read a "Thank You" card from Dana Miller, the club's Maize Days queen contestant, thanking the club for the gifts given her and for the honor of representing the club as a contestant.

Allo Reeve gave a report on the T.F.W.C. meeting held in Dallas. Beth Thompson brought a report on the workshop on "Home and Life" presented at the district meeting held in Levelland. Faye Reeve pointed out the fact that the speaker emphasized women's role and opportunities in America. She reported that Friona, Farwell and Bovina will be host for the 1981 District Meeting, with the theme to be on "Expanding."

Beth Thompson, program director, presented Vera Beil who gave a discussion on "Solcost," bringing out what solar energy is and emphasizing that the sun won't run out of energy for another several billion years. She presented the facts that using solar energy can help our nation by conserving the conventional sources that we already have and by helping to control much of the pollution in the air. She stated that there are many questions to be answered before solar energy can be installed in a home and these questions can only be answered by a mechanical engineer.

Linda Murphree told how solar energy can be used for heating and cooling. By a drawing, she illustrated how the energy from the sun can be converted and stored for use in the home.

Mary Johnston showed how solar energy can be used for agriculture and industry. She stated that solar energy in agriculture is not new for the sun has been in use for drying foods, growing crops and even in the evaporation of salt. Farmers use about 30 calories of heat energy to produce every food value calorie. The annual consumption is equivalent to 258 million barrels of oil each year.

Industry uses more than five

million barrels of oil each year, half of which is process heat; which could easily be supplied by solar energy.

A basic solar thermal conversion system would have these basic elements: (1) a concentrator, (2) a receiver to absorb radiant energy, (3) means for transmitting heat to a storage facility or directly to the turbogenerator, (4) means for storing heat when the sun is not shining, and (5) a turbogenerator that converts heat energy into mechanical energy and in turn into electricity. She also said that there are many different methods of using solar energy and each can supply a special need. America with its resourceful people will probably never go back to a dark cold existence. It will be necessary to rethink our methods of keeping the symbolic "candle in the dark burning."
