I REMEMBER the first time I ever tasted a real, drugstore milkshake. Kids of modern times may take them for granted, but they were just a sometimes delicacy for those of my generation and before.

We lived out on the farm, 20 miles from town, and the only time you went to town was the regular shopping trip on Saturday afternoon. And if it was a busy time of year, such as harvest time, the men folk might not get to stop on Saturday afternoon.

So, the opportunity for such treats as milkshakes were not as handy as it might have been for "town kids."

We had a big old earthen water tank on our place, and that tank was quite a delight for children. It was used to provide water for the cows and horses, but children used it for other purposes as well.

In a round-about way, the old earth water tank contributed to my first milkshake. We were living on the place near the Longview community in Bailey County, so I must have been only four or five years old. It had to be at Longview, because we didn't have a water tank at the place near Baileyboro, where we later moved (where we were living when I started to school, in 1943).

Anyway, my younger brother Darrell and I liked to take cane stalks left over from grinding grain and throw them into the big old earth tank. The stalks would make marvelous "ships," and the tank probably was the ocean itself for a little boy out in semi-arid West Texas. But throwing cane stalks can be hazardous, and on this occasion, I cut my hand on one of the stalks, and in time had developed an infection that called for a rare event -- a trip to town in midweek, to see the doctor. I remember they said the doctor "lanced" my hand, and perhaps made a stitch or two. It was a frightening experience.

With near ideal weather conditions prevailing in the area during the past week, harvest operations were beginning to pick up their pace, and observers indicated it would really get busy if the weather continued to be good.

Harvest of corn, the biggest acreage crop in the county, has begun on a limited basis, mainly by those having on-the-farm dryer systems. But if the hot weather continues

another week, there could be a lot of corn ready to harvest, according to one observer.

Meanwhile, harvest of soybeans and sunflowers has begun. The maize harvest will be later than the corn, and may require a frost to mature the crop. Cotton needs as much time as it can get, gaining more maturity as long as the killing frost holds off. The past week has helped this crop tremendously.

Peggy Pope Wins In Week Of Upset Games

Peggy Pope survived the week of upsets and tie games to claim first place in the Friona Star's football contest in the third week of the annual event.

Mrs. Pope had a score of 16, and was the only contestant of the 198 who entered for the third week to score that high, claiming the first prize of \$10.00.

Seven contestants had scores of 15, and from this list, the second and third weekly prize winners were selected. James Whitson of Muleshoe claimed second place money of \$6.00, on the basis of his tie-breaker score on the Friona-River Road game. Whitson picked Friona, 21-14, and missed the actual score by 14 points.

C.H. Veazey took third place, picking 15 games correctly and missing the score by 15 points. Veazey said the Chiefs would win, 19Guerra, Ron Smiley and James Clark.

Mrs. Nuttall's score of 15 elevated her into first place in the overall contest standings, with a score of 48 after three weeks.

Danny Guerra, Joe Santellano and Richard Wilson are next with scores of 46, followed by James Clark, Jimmy Evans and C.H. Veazey with 46s.

With two tie games on the slate, plus a number of upsets, the scores suffered for the most part. The winning scores the first two weeks had been 20 and 19. Scores went all the way down to a low of five correct. The previous low score for any week had been an eight.

The Littlefield-Slaton and Texas Tech-Arizona games ended in ties, and were counted wrong for each contestant. Other often missed games "From what we have heard, some seem to think the corn yield will be much better this year than the past year or two. Some are talking about the possibility of 10,000 pounds per acre yields. Of course, some had hail damage, and this will affect their yields accordingly," said Ron Smiley, manager of Friona Wheat Growers elevator.

Another bright spot for area farmers is the fact that the corn market, which stood at \$5.18 per hundred at the close of business on Thursday, was running about \$1.00 per hundred above the price of a year ago. This could be a big plus, especially coupled with the better than average yields.

"But when you consider that production costs have skyrocketed, due to the cost of fuel, machinery, interest, etc., the farmers need to have a good yield and price, in order to come out with a profit," Smiley said.

One thing which probably added to the projected good yields was the fact that the area received a number of good rains during the growing season. Also, the summer was not quite as hot as usual, which may have kept the crops from suffering.

As to the rail car situation, Smiley said that this problem was still facing local shippers. "We were promised 50 or 60 cars this month, and have received only about 15. We're running about 95 cars behind schedule, but if we can keep getting cars, we might make it without having to pile the corn on the ground." Smiley said.

"This is something you've never had, and I'll bet you can't get all the way through it," he said, taking us to the old Western Drug Store there in Muleshoe.

At that time, they used "real" ice cream to make malts and milkshakes, taking big scoops of creamery-made ice cream, and filling a big metal can up to a point, adding milk and flavoring, etc., then putting the can on the mixer to let it whir away for a minute or two.

The concoction was then poured into a large-mouthed glass, which wouldn't nearly hold all of the milkshake, and we had one of our first drinking experiences.

We can still remember the cold, wonderful taste of that milkshake, and our futile attempt to finish the "whole thing." Wouldn't it be great if you could get one that good today? It couldn't have cost over 15 cents, but it made an impression that has stayed with me for years.

upsets and tie games. Mrs. Pope's score of 16 was the lowest for a winner this season, but looked good as the average score for the week was 11. This situation was a problem last summer in the Northern Panhandle, where a record wheat crop caused elevators to have to dump the grain on the ground and in the streets, and considerable loss was sustained due to rains and spoilage.

The Santa Fe Grain Company has this week begun the removal of the old warehouse on its property on Main Street just north of the railroad siding. This is one of the oldest buildings in Friona and was at one time located near the center of the city from which place it was moved to the location above mentioned, and since the organization of the Santa Fe Grain Company, the building has been used as a storage room for feeds, salt and other commodities handled by the company.

45 YEARS AGO -- SEPT. 28, 1934

Costly fumbles prevented the Chiefs from dedicating the new Chieftain Stadium with a win last Friday when they played the Adrian Highs to a scoreless tie.

The contract for carrying the mail over the newly established star route from Friona to Summerfield and return, which is advertised to begin on October 1, was let to Lloyd Pope, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Pope, he being the lowest bidder for the contract.

.... 40 YEARS AGO -- SEPT. 29, 1939 Another very disastrous farm fire occurred in the Friona territory about 2:30 a.m. Saturday morning, when

the barn on the G.L. Mingus farm was destroyed as was the garage and the family car and a truck which were in it. A poultry house with a large number of chickens and a grainery with about 2,000 bushels of wheat, also burned.

Eddy Nicholson, known as the "Rocking chair philosopher," will speak at Calvary Baptist Church, at the 11 a.m. service Sunday, September 30.

Rev. Murle Rogers, pastor, says this is a rare opportunity for folks in the Friona area to hear Nicholson, who is much in demand for such functions as Chamber of Commerce banquets, etc.

Nicholson uses his "homespun" style, and for civic events often speaks on such subjects as "Folks Ain't A-livin' No More," "After Milkin' Time," and "How to put Beans in your Pocket.'

The yesterday of the Tennessee hills blends with the rat race of today as the hard times of being poor rubs elbows with the fuel crunch, the high cost of living and political shenanigans in Nicholson's usual presentation.

Nicholson knows all about it. He's been there. Memories of a poor but rich boyhood in Tennessee helped him make his own switch to "slow down and live."

Nearly four years later, with his rocking chair philosophy so popular, he has to work pretty hard to keep from getting back in the "race."

"I try to get folks to see the bright side of life in hard times. I urge them to get a bigger bite out of life, to get back to the basics of living and loving.

"I encourage them to live well, laugh often and love much. Residents of the community are

invited to attend the service.


The Friona Chieftains were still seeking that elusive first win of the season when they journeyed to Farwell Friday night to battle the longtime county rival Steers.

Phillips said he felt that the Chieftains were "their own worst enemies" in the River Road game. "We were just a step away from where we should have been in several instances," he said.



JV Chiefs Top 'Cats

The Chieftain Junior Varsity overpowered the River Road Wildcat JV, 28-6 in a game here last week. The win ran the Friona JV record to 2-0 for the season.

Nelson Jackson stood out on offense and defense. He ran eight yards for Friona's first score, and also ran for two PATs and an 8-0 lead

With the lead cut to 8-6 in the second quarter, Robert Caballero intercepted a pass for Friona, but the team couldn't score. Jackson then blocked a kick, and later Caballero scored from four yards out, added the PATs for a 16-6 Friona lead.

Friona had some great defensive plays in the third quarter. Caballero intercepted a pass, but Friona fumbled the ball back. Mark Tucker then recovered a fumble for the Chiefs, but again the team couldn't move and had to punt.

Jackson blocked a River Road punt, giving Friona the ball. Caballero ran 49 yards for his second TD. The point after try failed but

River Road Tops Chiefs By 27-20

The Friona Chieftains met a firedup River Road team last Friday night, and in one of the hardest-fought games seen at Chieftain Field in a long time, came out on the short end of a 27-20 score.

It was no fluke win by the Amarillo team, which scored only its third win in four years of varsity play. The Wildcats ran up 352 yards total offense, and displayed an impressive passing attack.

River Road finished the night with 213 yards gained passing, but had 193 of those yards by halftime.

Friona was in command for the first six minutes. The Chiefs forced the visitors to punt, and took over at midfield after a short punt. Nine plays later, Rod Owen crashed over tackle for a touchdown from a yard out, and Mark Montoya's kick gave the Chiefs a 7-0 lead as only 5:25 had expired.

River Road answered the challenge. In just four plays, the Wildcats were on the scoreboard. Big play was a 46-yard pass to the Friona six, as end Paul Tarbet got behind the Chieftain defenders.

Martin Mercado blocked the PAT kick to keep Friona ahead, 7-6.

But Friona fumbled the kickoff return at their own 19, and River Road pounced on the ball. Six plays later, the Wildcats scored again, and took a 12-7 lead with 2:14 left in the quarter.

Quarterback Patrick Roger of the Wildcats connected with Tarbet once again on the first play of the second quarter. It was a well-executed pass play, and was good for a third touchdown for the visitors. A pass for two points made the score 20-7, as the Chiefs began to stagger somewhat.

On Friona's first play of the second half, quarterback Joe Malouf rifled a pass to Owen, who was streaking up the east sideline. Owen caught the ball on the dead run and continued in for the score. The play covered 79 yards, one of the longest from scrimmage for Friona in several years. Montoya's kick made the score 20-14, with 11:35 left in the quarter. Friona held River Road on its next

series, and was about to get the ball, when a fumbled punt set the Wildcats up on the Friona 16. Five plays later found the 'Cats in the Friona end


zone once again and the score became 27-14 with 2:46 left in the quarter. Early in the final quarter, Owen returned a River Road punt from his own 40 to the visitors' 35. Two plays later, Chuck Nichols ran 26 yards for a TD, to cut the margin to 27-20, and there was still 10:32 left in the game.

Friona was driving for what appeared to be the tying touchdown late in the game. Tony Jackson made two vital pass catches to keep the drive alive, but on a fourth down from the 12 yard line, Friona came up two yards short, and the ball went over on downs.

The visitors then were able to chalk up some running gains, to eat up most of the remaining four minutes, and Friona had no time to rally.

It was a good game statistic-wize for the Chieftains, who came up with a season high of 160 yards passing and 144 rushing, or a total of 304.

Ben Landrum had 11 tackles and Chuck Nichols and Kirk Frye 13 each to pace the defensive effort. Frye also had a quarterback sack, and Landrum has a pass interception.
