The Democratic runoff election held Saturday, June 7, had a light turnout on the county and state level, with 326 votes cast in Parmer County.

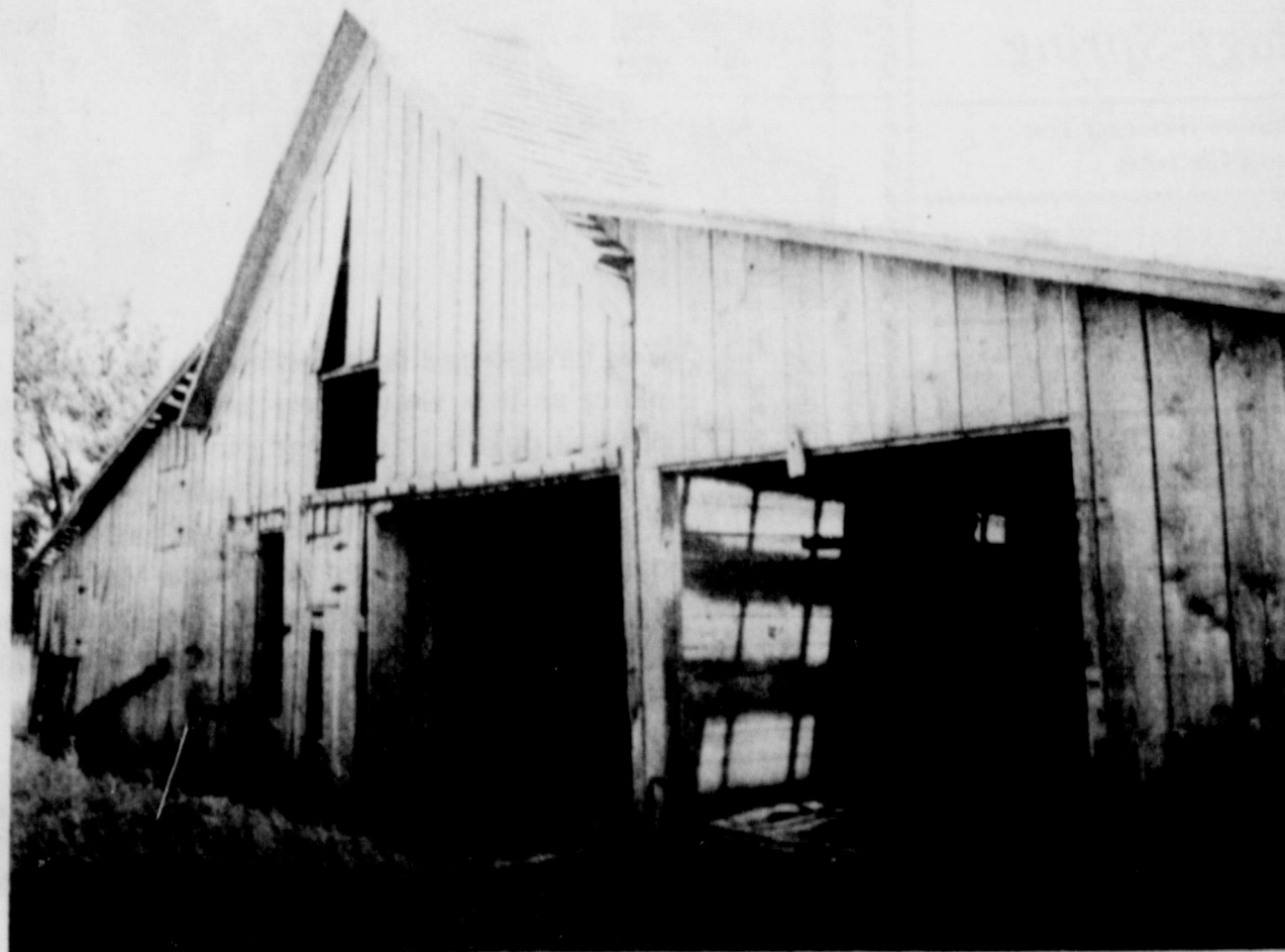

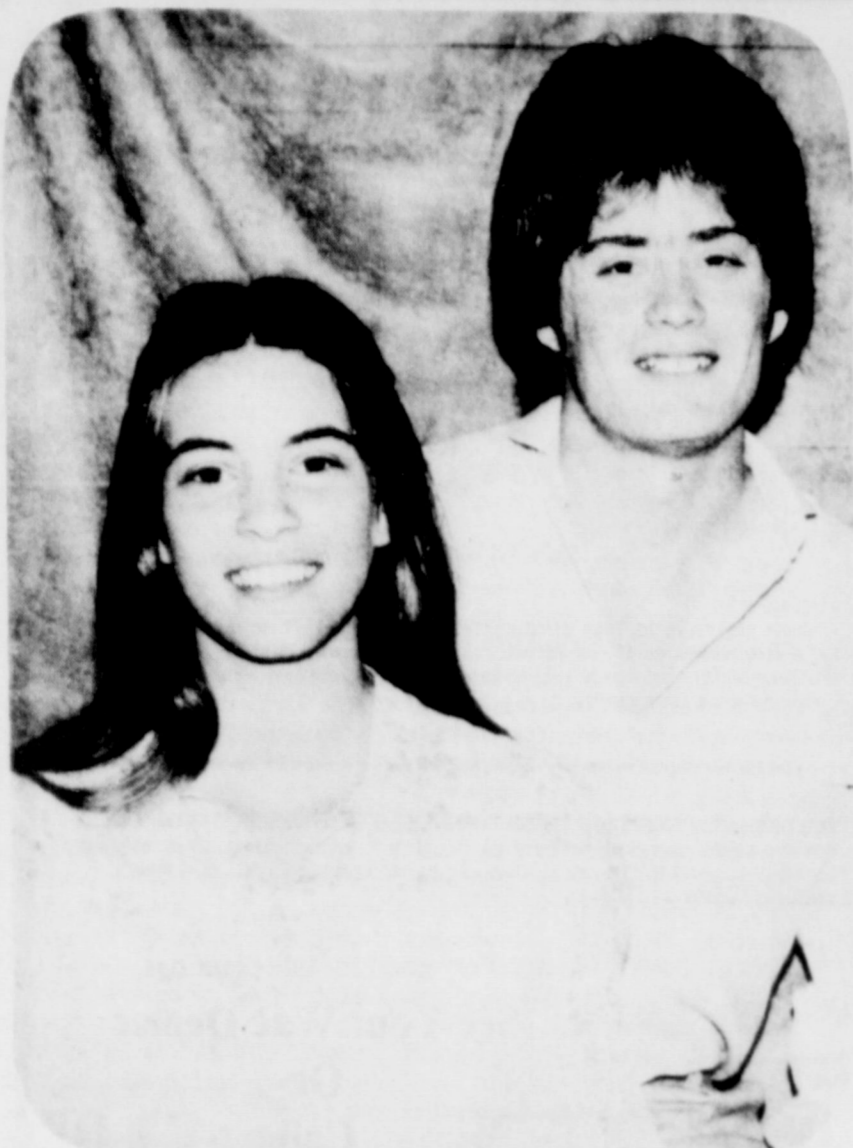

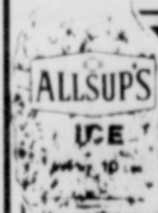

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--MAY 30, 1930

A force of men arrived here and began work on the construction of the new Farmers' Elevator here this week. The work is progressing at a satisfactory rate and the manager in charge of the work proposes to have the building complete in time to receive the new crop of wheat when it comes in. The new elevator is being built on the south side of the track near the old one and will be owned and operated on the same plan.

45 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1935

In spite of the fact that it seemed that all wheat in this territory had been ruined by the wind and dust storms of the past several weeks, it now appears that there will be some wheat grown here if no unfavorable weather conditions arise. The good rain of two weeks ago has placed sufficient moisture in the land to admit planting of the spring row crops.

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1940

The Santa Fe Grain Company, under the direction of the manager G. (Preach) Cranfill, is making extensive additions to its plant, which, when completed, will place Friona among the high-ranking grain buying cities of the Panhandle. The work now under construction, will add five larger metal storage bins to the company's storing capacity. Each bin will have a capacity of 20,000 bushels of grain, making a total capacity of 100,000 bushels.

35 YEARS AGO--MAY 25, 1945

So far as the growing wheat in this locality is concerned, the situation has already become serious from the long continued dry spell. Some farmers report that they have already plowed under a portion or all of their wheat crop, while others are talking of turning their livestock in on their wheat and thus reaping as much as possible from its pasture.

30 YEARS AGO--MAY 19, 1950

Victim of a freak explosion, Clyde

Fields, about 30 years old, is in the Parmer County Community Hospital, suffering painful injuries, cuts and bruises. The forefinger on the left hand was severed and part of another finger was cut off in Tuesday's accident. Fields' left eye was injured but the damage is not believed to be permanent. As he and C.L. Mercer were walking along the country road from the pickup to their irrigation ditch, Fields unearched a partially covered object about the size of a fountain pen. On closer examination, he took the top off the object. When he did, the unidentified missile exploded in his face. His condition was pronounced as painful but not critical. One theory is that the object was a detonator left by a seismograph crew that worked in that vicinity last year.

25 YEARS AGO--MAY 27, 1955

Coming to Friona to fill the position of grade school principal is Mr. Kenneth Fields who is a brother of Rev. C.M. Fields, pastor of the Friona Baptist Church. Fields began his teaching career in Sudan where he taught the eighth grade for two years. From there, he went to Farwell, where he served the past few years in the capacity of principal of the elementary grades.

20 YEARS AGO--MAY 26, 1960

Friona Lanes, Friona's newest addition to the skyline along Highway 60 will officially open their doors for bowling enthusiasts at 8 a.m. Friday morning.

Members of the Friona Star and Plains Publishers staffs honored J.W. (Uncle John) White with a birthday party Monday afternoon. This "grand old man" of the Star was observing his 92nd birthday. He was the first editor and publisher of the Friona Star. The first issue was printed July 5, 1926.

15 YEARS AGO--MAY 27, 1965

J.W. (Uncle John) White quietly observed his 97th birthday on Sunday, May 23. The old gentleman,

Friona's pioneer newspaperman, spent a quiet day with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Flippin, Jr.

Friona Feed Yard, Inc. was a major attraction on the first day of a three-day tour of the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico area beginning Monday by a group of Englishmen who are members of Corn and Agricultural Merchants, Limited. There were sixteen men in the group.

10 YEARS AGO--MAY 28, 1970

Greenbugs have been found on small sorghum plants in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties, according to Jack King, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board research director. This is the earliest that greenbugs have been found on sorghum in the Plains since they first became a threat to the crop in 1968.

5 YEARS AGO--MAY 25, 1975

Mrs. T.E. Lovett and Mrs. Woody Wilson were honored with a retirement tea by Mrs. Troy Ray at Mrs. Ray's home Tuesday. Mrs. Lovett is retiring at the end of this school term after 22 years of teaching school. Mrs. Wilson has logged 36 years of teaching.

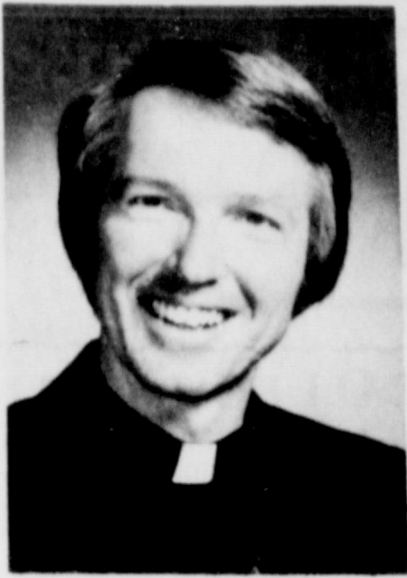
