IT HAS BEEN HOT. This is one statement I have made in this space which should not be open to debate.

But, as you know from watching the temperature reports from other parts of our state and region, it has not been quite as hot here in Parmer County as it has in other places.

And, according to a story reported by the wire services this past week, we're not even close to a record, bad as the current heat wave has been, with its death toll and other related calamities.

For example, it was reported that in 1934, the temperature reached or topped the 100-degree mark for 54 consecutive days in Ozark, Arkansas.

And if that doesn't impress you, maybe the record posted at Conway, Arkansas, will. The mercury reached or exceeded the 100-degree mark on 71 days between June and late September in 1954.

Those are a couple of records we'd just as soon let the Arkansawyers keep.

AS THE HEAT WAVE continues, we need to continue to be careful not to over-expose ourselves to the heat, so as to guard against a heat stroke.

Also, as the news media has suggested, if you have elderly neighbors, it would be a good idea to keep an eye out for them, to be sure they are doing okay. This is especially true if they have air conditioning which is "suspect."

THE WATER CRISIS which has affected the residents of Friona should make us all conscious about saving not only as much water as possible, but also conserving wherever possible on our natural resources.

An article in the past weekend's paper called America "A nation of wasters." I'm afraid this pretty well describes most of us.

Changing our wasteful ways, the article says, may be the fashionable thing to do, but it is not easy. It's hard to change habits which we have acquired over a lifetime.

Americans represent only six per cent of the world's population, but they use approximately 30 per cent of the world's annual output of resources. This gives you an idea about how fast we are using our natural resources.

The article points out that the richer a society is, the more wasteful it seems to be. "An American is someone who drives a large automobile (probably with the air conditioner going full-blast), to deliver a bag of aluminum cans to a recycling center," the writer states.

We all should realize, without having it pointed out, that during the last 20 or 30 years, we have been using water as though the well would never run dry; we have developed an appetite, and a habit for using gasoline and oil products as though there were a never-ending supply at minimal cost.

One of the culprits in using our products is the packaging industry. Half of the nation's paper, three-fourths of its glass, a third of its plastic, 40 per cent of its aluminum and eight per cent of its steel are used to wrap and decorate consumer products.

Packaging accounts for a fifth of the weight and a tenth of the price of groceries. (We would have guessed higher in both categories).

We can't afford to completely do away with packaging, but maybe the industry could launch a campaign to cut down somewhat.

That's what we're all needing to do in a number of areas during the last two decades of this century, or the outlook for the 21st century may be a little bleak.

Early Census Total Less Than Expected

Friona's preliminary 1980 census count was received from the Amarillo District office of the Census Bureau this week, and Friona Mayor B.K. Buske feels that a number of residents have been missed by the count.

The number of residents counted so far by the Census Bureau is 3,681. This represents an increase of 18.3 per cent over the 1970 figure of 3,111.

But the report provided the City of Friona also showed 53 vacant houses, and this is one figure which concerns Mayor Buske.

"I don't believe we have 53 vacant houses in Friona. Even if the realtors had listings--and there may have been ten or fifteen--these would have been occupied, and would not have been empty. We just don't have that many vacancies," Buske said.

Buske is urging people who were missed by the census count to call either the City Hall at 247-2761 or the Chamber of Commerce office at 247-3491. They also may call the Friona Star at 247-2211.

"If we can find a substantial number of people who were missed, I think the census officials will do a re-count. If we should get 30 families, for instance, who come forward and say they were not counted, this would probably indicate that three times that many were missed," Buske said.

The Friona mayor pointed out that the city's population totals are important, because they form a basis for such things as revenue sharing, federal grants, etc. Plus, the city has to "live with" whatever total the census comes up with for the next ten years.

Buske said it was his personal feeling that the total as supplied by

the Census Bureau was "about ten per cent lower" than it should be. That would place the population just over the 4,000 mark, a level many felt the city had reached in population.

Bill Soule, director of the Amarillo district census count, said Wednesday that during "Phase 2" of the census, his office would be working closely with the cities. "We are depending on them to pinpoint areas where they think people may have been missed," Soule said.

Possible such areas in Friona are the Friona Mobile Estates (trailer park) on the eastern edge of the city, and the Saratoga Gardens apartments.

The preliminary figures by the Census Department were based on a total of 1,236 households in Friona, 53 of which the department listed as vacant. The figure supplied indicated a population per household of 3.09 people, compared to a ratio of 3.3 in 1970.

Figures released to the other city officials in Parmer County this week indicated the following figures:

Farwell had a 1980 total of 1,284, compared to 1,185 in 1970; Bovina with a total of 1,444, compared to 1,428 in 1970. The rural portion of the county had a total of 4,082, compared to 4,785 in 1970. The county's preliminary total was 10,496, compared to 10,509 in 1970.

The Census Bureau found a 14 per cent vacancy rate for the county as a whole, compared to 4.3 for the city of Friona. The total number of vacant homes in the county was listed as 547.

"I feel that the homes listed as vacant just represented people who were not at home or did not receive a

form to begin with," Mayor Buske said in regard to the Friona vacancy count.

Tommy Bonds, Bovina City Manager, said he felt the preliminary total given for Bovina had missed the mark considerably. "We did a survey here in 1977 for Revenue Sharing purposes. We made a pretty thorough check, and estimated our population at that time to be 1,633," Bonds said.

"We have had a number of new homes built since 1970. We don't have any vacancies to speak of. People come in looking for houses, and we don't have anything for them," Bonds continued.

The Bovina city official indicated that his city had a number of Mexican field workers, and that this group was the most likely to have been missed in the preliminary count. "I don't know how you get them counted, though," he added.

For the first time in the history of the census, the forms were delivered through the mail, and residents were on an "honor system" in returning them. In the past, census workers visited each household in taking the census.

The followup phase has employed workers to attempt to get forms from addresses which did not return their forms in the mail.

If the county totals do not change materially, the preliminary totals indicate that the three main communities in the county showed population gains of 700 people, mostly in Friona, and that the rural portion of the county "lost" about this same number, indicating a continuing shift of population from the rural areas into town.

Did Census Miss You? Call Now!

Anyone who did not fill in a census form and has not been counted for 1980 is urged to call the City Office, 247-2761, the Chamber of Commerce, 247-3491, or the Friona Star, 247-2211, so they may be counted.

It's vital to the city and county that EVERY resident and their children be counted for census purposes. A number of programs are based on the census totals, and a true count is needed.

"If you know of someone who was not counted, please help us to get their names," asks Friona Mayor B.K. Buske. Please call as soon as possible.

Change Noted For Super Market

Houser's Venture Foods has been purchased by D.L. Harguess, it was announced this week. The change of ownership will be effective Monday, July 14.

Marc Houser, who has been associated with the ownership of the super market since 1966, has sold the business to the Harguesses.

Harguess was born in Littlefield and raised in Eastern New Mexico. His wife Ruth was born in McLean and raised in Tucumcari, N.M.

Both attended Eastern New Mexico University, where they met.

The Harguess family first came to Friona in March of 1975, when he became minister at the Sixth Street Church of Christ. He held that position for two and one-half years, and then, at the advice of his doctors, left the preaching field after having been in it for 19 years.

The family went to San Angelo, where Harguess was in the Buick business for a year. He returned to Friona in 1978, to become associated with Friona Ford Sales.

D.L. and Ruth are parents of two daughters, Dee Ann, who is 13, and Tammy, who is 11.

Ruth's father, John Cooper, will be associated with them in an advisory capacity. He is a veteran of 48 years in the grocery business. Cooper was in business at McLean for 30 years, and at Tucumcari for 26 years. He had brothers in the grocery business in Hereford and Canyon.

Closing time for Houser Venture Foods Sunday evening will mark the end of a thirty-four year span of time during which Friona residents have

been able to buy groceries from some of the Houser family.

Orville, Cotton and Marc Houser were all born in Collin County, Texas, and moved with their parents, Mrs. P.M. Houser of Friona and the late P.M. Houser, to Deaf Smith County early in 1925.

The forerunner of Houser Foods in Friona was Cashway Grocery & Market, which was located on the corner of Seventh and Main. Orville and his wife, Oleta, moved to Friona early in 1946 and operated the store, which was owned by E.E. Gollehon of Hereford, for five years.

In the fall of 1951 the store was purchased by Orville and Cotton. Cotton and Ruth moved here from San Angelo. For the next fifteen years, the store stayed in the same location.

Orville and Oleta and Cotton and Ruth were assisted in its operation by Lillian and Corinne Jones, Walter Cunningham, Betty Smith, Odell Vaughn and others until 1966.

At this time the third Houser brother, Marc, who had been a salesman for Gold Medal flour and Betty Crocker cake mixes, and his wife, Vi, moved to Friona and the three brothers bought the Piggly-Wiggly store, which was located at the corner of Ninth and Main, and combined the two stores in the new location.

Cotton retired in 1975 and Orville retired two years later. Then, for the past three years Marc and his employees have continued to sell groceries, meat and other household items from the same location.

Residents Urged To Write Stories

Otho Whitefield, chairman of the Parmer County History Book, Volume 2, reminded county residents this week to turn in their family histories to be included in the new history book which is being planned. The deadline has been set as July 20.

"We are planning to publish a 625-page book. Our cost to the publisher will be \$27 per book. We will sell the books for \$35.00, including tax," Whitefield said.

Whitefield said that the book will be paid for through advance sales, memorial pages (at \$180 per page,

\$100 per half page and \$60 per one-fourth page), tribute pages (prices same as memorial pages), and business histories, also priced the same as above.

Family histories will be published free, up to 500 words. After 500 words, a charge of ten cents per word will be made.

"We want each living family unit to be represented in the book. Please mention your parents and grandparents, but for a history of those deceased, we want you to

New Concern Over City Water Supply

New concern for the city's water supply was caused last weekend when a third city well began to show signs of failing, causing city officials to issue a new stricter mandate on water rationing.

On Sunday, City Manager Jake Outland asked residents to curtail lawn watering, and only water gardens and flowers when needed.

However, after the questionable well had been shut off for a day or so, it began again to produce water when started up, so it may not have failed completely.

In the meantime, the new city well was drilled this week, and testing began on Thursday. Outland said it appeared that the well would produce around 200 gallons per minute. It is hoped to have the new well tied into the city's system early next week, if everything runs smoothly.

Residents are cautioned to continue to cut back as much as possible on their water usage.

"This will alleviate the shortage somewhat, but the supply will not meet the demand," Outland said. "Please tend to your watering. Drainage into the streets should be stopped," Outland said.

consider a memorial page," Whitefield says.

Special events and celebrations also will be highlighted in the publication.

The book will be leatherette bound with a gold logo on the front cover. It will be printed on high quality book paper.

"We can do this only with the help and participation of all of the county residents. Please help us leave a record for our future generations. We are concentrating on the period from 1900 up to the present. We want histories of the young families as well as those who have been here a long time," Whitefield said.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

45 YEARS AGO--JULY 5, 1935

The contracts of two rural telephone lines out of Friona to the Rhea and Lakeview communities was let last week to R.B. Fairly of Lubbock. The two lines are already under construction and about 12 new subscribers will be connected as soon as the lines are completed and there will be a few other patrons connected soon after they are completed. The Hub community has been offered the same contract, provided they can get the required number of subscribers.

40 YEARS AGO--JULY 5, 1940

The Parmer County Old Settlers Association held its first picnic and program at the high school building at Bovina on Friday of last week. A goodly number of people were present for the program and a basket dinner. Following the program in the afternoon a business session of the Association was held for the purpose of electing new officers and designating the time and place of the next meeting.

35 YEARS AGO--JULY 6, 1945

Beginning July 1, the Friona Post Office is advanced from a third class to a second class post office, according to information received from the Post Office Department by Postmaster Sloan Osborn. The promotion allows Friona to have

regular clerks if needed, along with an increase in salaries.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1950

The demolition of the vault at the old Friona State Bank location, Fifth and Main this week, brought back memories to many pioneers of one of the most colorful banking histories ever recorded in any era, or any locality. The bank has moved into its new location at Sixth and Main. Having survived through the threat of fire, depressions and bank robberies, the vault this week even defied contractors as they began its destruction last Saturday.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1955

O.B. Moyer suffered severe bruises on his right leg early Monday morning when his tractor over-balanced and the front of the implement rose from the ground, pinning him beneath the steering wheel. He was digging a ditch on his farm six miles north and six miles west of Friona. L.D. Chiles, a farmer in a neighboring field, was servicing a combine when he heard the cries for help. Chiles' son, Jerry, took a truck, backed it up to the tractor, and Chiles pulled the injured man free.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1960

Mary Lynne Stephens, seven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Stephens of Friona, was killed Wednesday morning when her bicycle was struck by a car driven by Mrs. Clyde Sherrieb. The Stephens girl was riding east on Fifth Street and as Mrs. Sherrieb approached, the small girl rode across the street in front of the car. Mary Lynne would have been in the second grade in Friona schools this fall.

Friona Lanes, Friona's 12-lane bowling center, will hold its official grand opening Monday, July 4th, with two championship bowlers as the highlight of the day's activities. These two bowlers, Norm Nichols and Helen Duval, will give personal instructions during the morning, then will give a match bowling contest during the evening with local bowlers.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 1, 1965

The Friona City Council passed an ordinance calling for the paving of 15

city blocks in newly-annexed areas, primarily in Welch Acres and Western Addition. Added to the six blocks which had already been approved by the Friona Independent School District for paving adjacent to the new high school complex, the action brings to 21 the number of blocks to be paved this summer, and more may be added.

10 YEARS AGO--JULY 2, 1970

Recognizing the need for a baseball park for the older boys in Friona, the Friona Noon Lions Club adopted a project this summer of building a new park, and the project is making exceptional progress. The Lions have been instrumental in securing a full city block of land at Third and Prospect Streets for the purpose of building a baseball park, and are now proceeding full speed ahead.

5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 29, 1975

"I believe it was a combination of straight and twisting wind that caused the damage," said Jake Outland at City Hall, about the broken tree branches and collapsed tool building damaged in the June 20th thunderstorm. Oddly enough the damage was only reported to be down Euclid Street. Although no one reported a tornado to officials, whatever the force was, it tore at trees, leaving large branches scattered in the street. The wind toppled the CVAE tool shed at the corner of Euclid and Highway 60.

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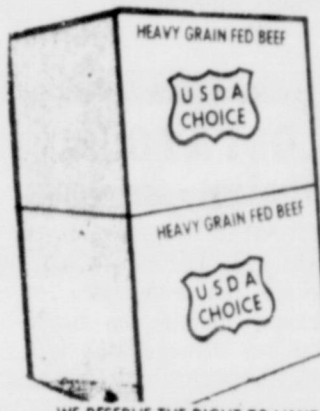

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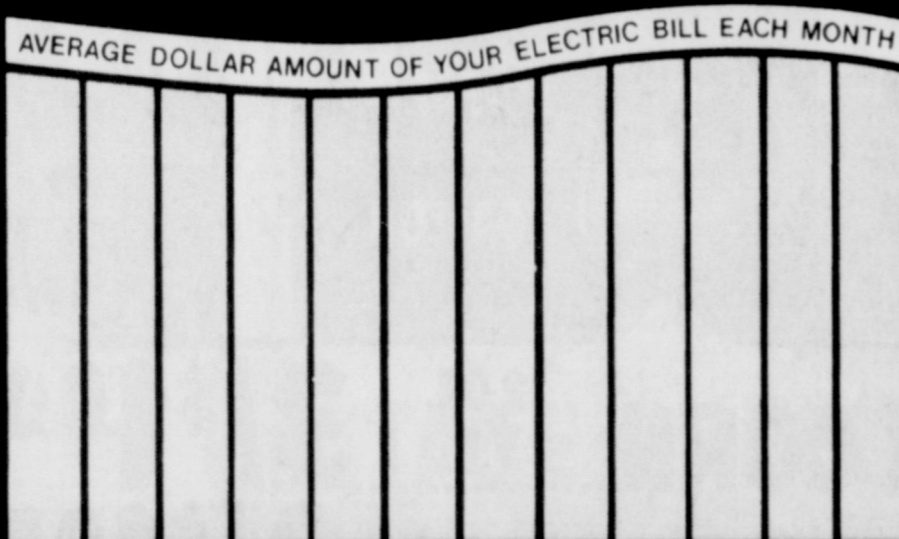

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The Happy Homemaker

How many of us hard cook eggs the most nutritious way? Most nutritionists agree that for the best taste, looks and food value eggs should not be boiled.

Quoting from a recent "Reader's Exchange" in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, here's all we need to know about hard cooking eggs.

"Hard cooked eggs should never be boiled. Cooking eggs below the boiling temperature will prevent the whites from being rubbery and the yolks will be less likely to turn dark.

For hard cooked eggs (the cold water method), place eggs in a saucepan. Add enough cold water to come at least one inch above the eggs. Heat rapidly to the boiling point.

Remove from heat immediately and cover. Let stand 22 to 24 minutes. Immediately cool eggs in cold water to prevent further cooking.

Tap egg to crack shell; then roll between hands to loosen shell. The eggs should peel easily. Hold eggs under cold running water to help ease shell off."

Before long most of us will be eating a lot of freshly grown cantaloupe, which is one of the most versatile things we grow in our gardens and fields. It fits into any menu for any meal of the day and can be served plain or dressed up in

dozens of different ways.

Jeanne Lively of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal included the following cantaloupe recipe in one of her columns.

Cantaloupe Preserves

2 pounds cantaloupe
4 cups sugar
1 lemon
Cut cantaloupe into chunks. Add sugar and let stand overnight. Add thinly sliced lemon and cook until clear. Pour into jars and process five minutes at five pounds to seal.

I haven't tried this recipe yet, but plan to the very first time I have access to two pounds of cantaloupe above what we can eat fresh.

Does it surprise you that there is an available recipe for Furr's Millionaire Pie? This one was also included in a Jeanne Lively column.

Furr's Millionaire Pie

2 cups powdered sugar
1 stick softened oleomargarine
1 large egg
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon vanilla
2 baked 8 inch pie crusts
1 cup heavy cream
½ cup chopped nuts
1 cup crushed pineapple, drained
Cream together powdered sugar and oleomargarine. Add egg, salt and

vanilla. Mix until light and fluffy. Spoon mix evenly into baked pie crust.

Whip cream until stiff. Blend in pineapple and nuts. Spread on top of egg, sugar, oleomargarine, salt and vanilla mixture and chill.

For delicious desserts which are quick to make, easy to serve and very adaptable, a homemaker can use the following recipe for fruit cobbler to be served immediately or frozen for another time.

Fresh fruit, when it is in season, or canned or frozen fruit may be used.

Easy Fruit Cobbler

Melt 3 tablespoons oleomargarine or butter in a 7x11x2 baking dish. Cover bottom of dish with two cups fruit. Add sugar and water if you are using fresh fruit. Otherwise, the liquid in the container will be sufficient.

Mix 1 cup sugar, 1 cup flour, dash of salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder and 1 cup milk. Pour over fruit and bake until top is golden brown. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle top with sugar if desired.

The two recipes following were selected with the thought of keeping you cool and making your family and guests happy.

Palm Springs Cooler

3 cups milk
3 tablespoons sugar
1½ cups orange juice
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
Place milk and sugar in blender and mix well with finely crushed ice. Add orange juice and grated rind and mix until frothy. Pour into glasses and garnish with mint and orange slices. Makes six servings.

Apricot Chiller

2 cups chilled apricot nectar
¼ cup sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
4 cups cold milk
pinch of salt
Combine apricot nectar, sugar and lemon juice and stir until sugar is dissolved. Add milk and salt, stir to mix. Pour into chilled glasses. Top with lemon slices. Makes six servings.
