POSSIBLY NOT since the big turn around of the presidential election of 1948 has the national press been so fooled as it was Wednesday night during the selection of the vice presidential running mate for Ronald Reagan at the Republican National Convention.

Throughout the day on Wednesday the television network coverage of the convention were hawking the possibility of former President Gerald Ford joining the ticket as the vice presidential nominee.

The network newscasters began to build this event toward a successful conclusion, pushing staff members of the Ford and Reagan camps for an announcement, as each tried to get the "scoop."

Although the representatives interviewed continued to deny as best they could that no deal had been struck, the networks, who have done everything except backward handspins in an attempt to outdo the other, showed their disbelief while interviewing the staff people, and virtually told them "Aw, quit kidding, tell us the truth."

All week long they pressured eventual nominee George Bush for an announcement, and Bush was equally as vehement that no invitation had been extended.

When the vice presidential announcement finally came, and it was Bush and not Ford, the networks (at least the one we watched) tried to portray this as a sign that the Republicans had failed to show a solid unity front in getting the team they wanted.

Actually, as the situation looked to us, the outcome proved the networks wrong in attempting to hasten an announcement which really was NOT official. In desperation, a couple of the newsmen tried to make the Republicans look bad for "failing," when in reality it was the network newsmen who had jumped their guns, and would have been better off to have reported the comments from the party officials as the gospel, which it later turned out to be.

Then, to make matters worse, one network had the audacity to show a Chicago newspaper which had used a headline saying "Reagan and Ford" were the GOP ticket. Well, the newspaper shouldn't have listened to the TV Wednesday night.

OPERATION RE-COUNT is currently underway in the area, with all cities and municipalities doing their utmost to dig out those who have been missed so far by the 1980 census.

Apparently, there have been discrepancies in the count virtually nationwide. This is the first time the census had been tried using the mail as the major fact-gathering agency, and placing individual households on an "honor system" as to whether or not they respond, or indicate if they have been missed.

It is also apparent that many people had rather not be counted. They also object to filling out several pages of questions.

As one commentator stated: "If they had just mailed out a simple card where the people could have listed their family members' names, birthdates, etc., and dropped it back in the mail, the participation ratio might have been higher."

Besides not wanting to fill out forms, particularly the long ones, some people just balk at filling out anything for the government.

Although a fine may be imposed on an individual for failure to turn in a census form, many still do not.

If you have not been counted, or know of someone who may have been missed, please cooperate by calling the city office and giving the name and address.

Many programs are based on the official census figures, such as the revenue sharing program. So it is vital that an exact count be made.

Do it for your community and for yourself. The extra benefits might be money you are scheduled to receive somewhere down the line.

"If you have any ideas for Maize Days, please let us hear from you. Your ideas will be appreciated," Wright said.

New System To Begin On Monday

All classified U.S. Post Offices in the Panhandle area will have available Monday, July 21, 1980, Selective Service System Registration Forms to hand out to men born in 1960 and 1961.

Men born in 1960 register during the week of July 21, 1980.

Men born in 1961 register during the week of July 28, 1980.

It is suggested the registration schedule be—if registrant was born in: January, February or March, register on Monday; April, May or June, register on Tuesday; July, August, or September, register on Wednesday; October, November or December, register on Thursday.

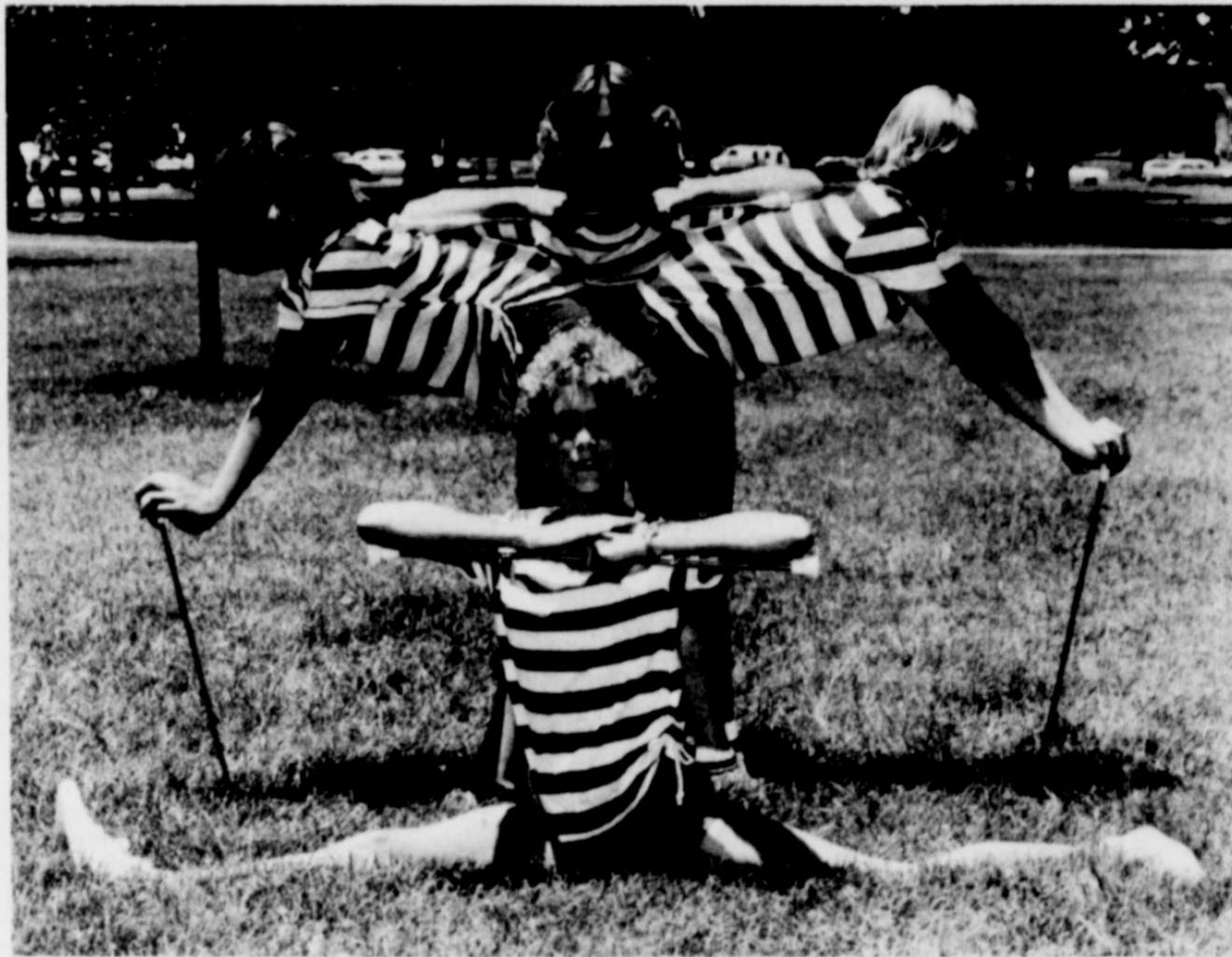
Post Offices responsibilities are limited to handing out Registration Forms and pamphlet, "Selective Service and You."

The registrant must PRINT their date of birth; full name; current mailing address; permanent residence address (if different from current address); current phone number; and signature of registrant.

The registrant then takes the completed card back to the post office window with his identification (driver's license or social security, etc.); the postal official will check the card for completeness; post mark the card; and mail it to the Selective Service System for the registrant.

Post Offices will not have any other information, such as, draft deferments or how registration will affect them, etc. All inquiries by registrants concerning such questions will have to be answered by the Selective Service and not by the Postal Service. The only role of the Postal Service in this process is to handle the registration itself.

Commissioners Have Full Agenda Monday

Re-investing of various county funds which are not budgeted for use at the current time, plus approval of payment for the tractor and shredder purchased from Peek Industrial Tractor Parts Company highlighted the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court this past Monday.

The payment was made to the Amarillo company for the equipment for Precinct 3, in the amount of \$15,164.39, as per their successful bid, using \$10,740.64 from the Farm-to-Market fund from Precinct 3, and \$4,423.75 from the precinct's portion of the Revenue Sharing Funds.

After a review of the county's certificates of deposit which were maturing, a motion was made by commissioner Ernest Anthony that the following Farm-to-Market funds be re-invested in CDs:

\$20,000 for Precinct 2, to mature August 15, 1980; \$20,000 for Precinct one, to mature September 26, 1980, and \$30,000 for Precinct four, to mature September 26, 1980.

The motion included the transferral of \$30,000 from Farm-to-Market funds into the checking funds, for paying for equipment.

The court passed a resolution to close certain streets lying outside the city limits of Farwell, as originally platted, authorizing the owners of the land involved to proceed in cancelling the streets and alleys. It was noted that such cancellation would not interfere with the rights of any purchaser owning any portion of such subdivision.

A motion was passed approving \$25.00 participation in soil conservation work by Steve Pearson in Precinct 3.

Payment of \$180 in boarding care for Dora Fields, a Parmer County foster child, was approved.

A brief discussion was held relative to the proposed budget for the Bookmobile, which shows an increase over the current budget, mainly due to the increase in cost of gas and oil.

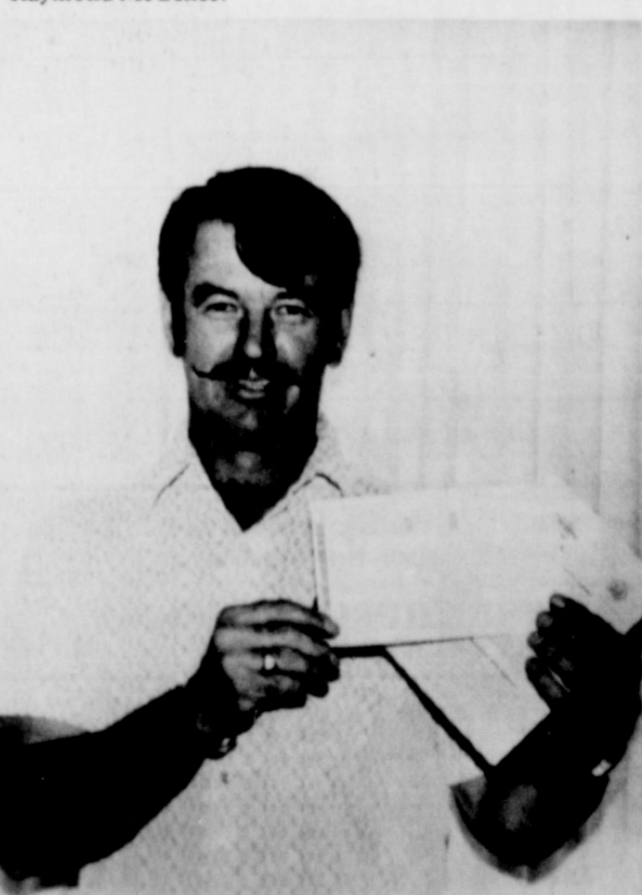
The court passed a resolution that a letter be written to Congressman Kent Hance and the two senators, voicing the court's opposition to the proposed 15 per cent automatic withholding of income from interest on savings accounts.

After much discussion of a bill for painting from Tagco Industries, relative to the amount of the bill, a motion was made that the bill be paid.

A motion was passed that the county advertise for a tractor with shredder, plus another shredder for a Model 8000 Ford tractor for Precinct 2, with bids to be opened on August 11, 1980.

Also approved unanimously was the treasurer's quarterly report, with the stipulation that the report be published. This report can be found in this issue of the Friona Star, on Page 6.

Judge Porter Roberts presided at the regular session. Commissioners attending were Ernest Anthony, Jack Patterson, Archie Tarter and Raymond McGehee.

City Works To Correct Shortage

Work was continuing this week as the City of Friona moved to alleviate the water shortage.

Brookfield Drilling Company was awarded the contract to furnish two submersible pumps for two city wells. Brookfield's bid to the city was \$4792 each for the two pumps, or a total of \$9,584.

Floyd Brookfield was busy Thursday installing one of the pumps in well number 8, at Ninth and Grand, one of the wells which failed on June 22.

The well was bailed and treated with dry ice. It is hoped that the new submersible pump will reclaim the well, and add to the water supply.

The pump at the new well site was slated to be installed on Friday, and if this was completed, the well could then be put into service.

However, City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland warned that even the addition of the new well would by no means completely solve the water shortage.

"We plan to continue with our rationing program, and by controlling the levels at the reservoirs," Outland said.

Early tests on the new well showed that production was about 200 gallons per minute, somewhat below what was hoped for.

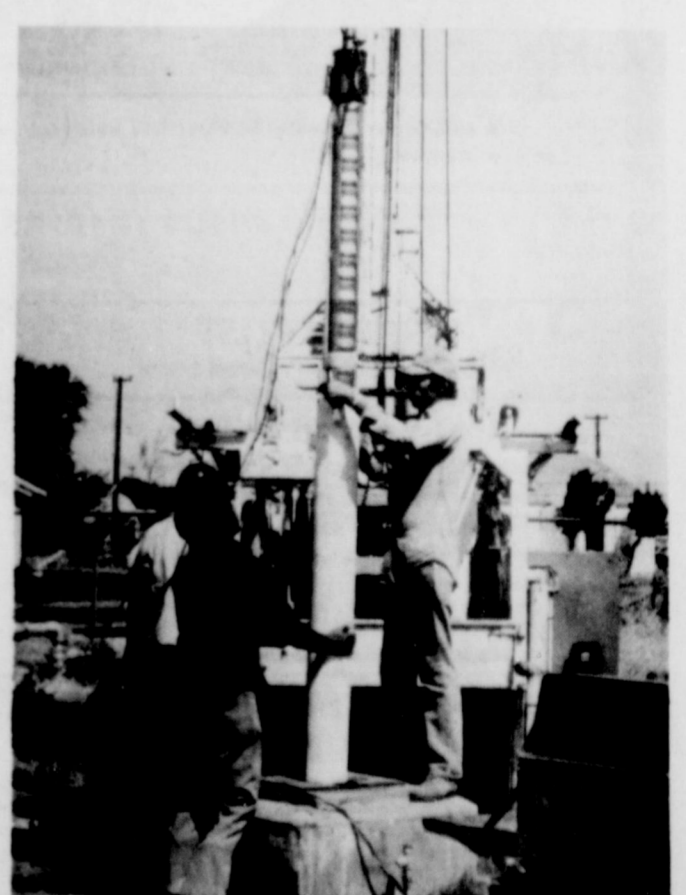

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 11, 1930

Mayor J.L. Landrum received notice from the census department last Saturday giving word that the census report showed the present population of Friona to be 730, with only 17 persons out of employment. This falls within estimates, which ranged from 700 to 800. The report shows that Friona's population has almost quadrupled since the 1920 census, which gave it nearly 200. This increase has practically all come within the last five years.

45 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1935

On Monday of last week, Mrs. Ray Springer and Mrs. Oscar Bell, who have been operators at the local telephone central office for the past two years, relinquished their positions, and the city is now being served by two new operators. The new operators are Miss Ruth Staggs and Mrs. Velma Lippard, assistant. Both are from Ropesville, and are experienced operators, genial and courteous in manner.

40 YEARS AGO--JULY 12, 1940

A very sad occurrence took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W.E. Donaho, who live on the A.H. Boatman land a mile and a half south of Hub last Sunday afternoon when their fifteen-month-old son, Kenneth Earl, was found drowned in a stock tank near the house. Efforts were

made to restore respiration, without avail, and Mr. Boatman rushed the child to Dr. Stover, but too late to revive the spark of life.

35 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1945

On Saturday of last week, Betty Jean Gore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milt Gore, came to the Star Office with an exploded weather balloon which she had found near her home. It contained radio instruments and had been sent up by the weather bureau at Clovis, to which the balloon and box were returned.

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 7, 1950

Making Friona easily accessible to the vast trade territory lying south between Friona and Muleshoe, the last 12-mile gap in the north-south road ending at Friona has been paved. This strip has long been a headache for residents south of Hub and in the Lazbuddie area, who wished to trade in Friona or use this direct route to Amarillo and points north.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 8, 1955

Potato harvest probably will get underway in seriousness next week, local growers and processors predict. Eleven growers this year are producing some 650 acres in the immediate area, the Herman Neff Company reports. Growers are Neff,

G.H. Whitaker, Kenneth Neill, Gordon Massey, Earl Lance, Jimmie Jesko, Roy Botkin, Buck Barnett, Kenneth Christian, Lloyd Oswald and Hardy May.

20 YEARS AGO--JULY 7, 1960

A new Baptist Church will officially organize Sunday at the American Legion Hall in Friona. This new church will be organized by those attending the services, which have been held since July 12 in the Legion Hall. The new church has been designated as the Calvary Baptist Mission of the First Baptist Church of Friona, and the home church voted last week to deed the new church 3.9 acres of land north of the city limits on which to construct their church.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 8, 1965

The stie of a multi-purpose structure on Running Water Draw has been narrowed to three locations, it was revealed in a joint meeting of the county's steering committee and the county commissioners last week. Next step in the project is to secure engineering reports on the locations.

10 YEARS AGO--JULY 9, 1970

Friona High School will have an Australian girl for its exchange student for the 1970-71 school year, it was announced this week. Janet Wallis from the town of Indooroopilly, Queensland, will arrive in Friona in early August, to make her home with the Carl Schlenker family. Miss Wallis will be the second exchange student from Australia, as the community, along with the E.G. Phipps family, hosted Brenda Hawker during the 1964-65 school term.

5 YEARS AGO--JULY 6, 1975

The Friona Star was the winner of a second place award in the "appearance" contest at the 96th annual summer convention of the Texas Press Association last weekend at El Paso. There were 24 newspapers from across the state in Friona's population bracket.

A new business, Lakeside Parts & Machine, opened in Friona on July 1 at the former Panciera Tire Co. location on West Highway 60. Owners of the new parts house are Arlen May, C.H. Veazey and Fred Ferguson.

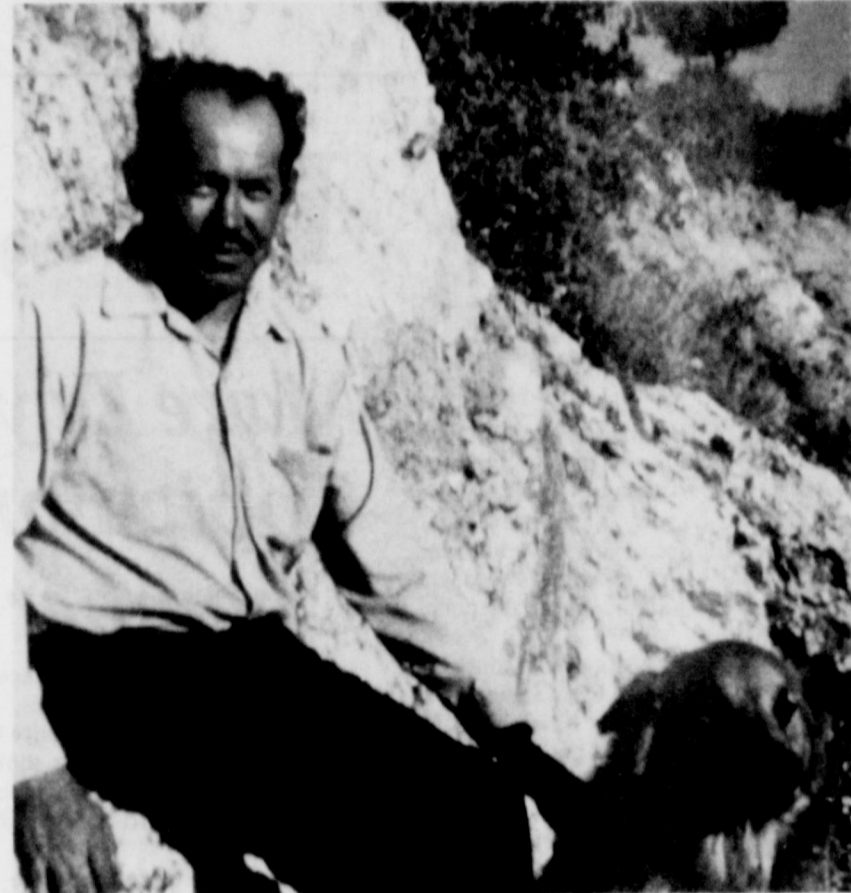
I was born in Goliad County, Texas, June 7, 1929. My parents died when I was very young and I do not remember anything about them. Friends raised me. Diniso and Santa Aguilar kept me the first few years. I started working when I was eight years old.

I do know that my father came from Old Mexico to work on the railroad and married someone from Texas. That was sometime in the 1920's.

I never went to school and did not learn to write. But I taught myself to read. I read the Reader's Digest, National Geographic, Popular Mechanics and magazines like that. I also read the daily paper. I do all kinds of farm work and mechanic work. I have worked in machine shops and I do repairs on most all kinds of motors.

I was very young when I learned to ride and rope. I worked for Joe and Betty Allen for a long time and they surely did help me. That consisted of farm and ranch work. Here I learned to hunt and fish on the San Antonio River. I learned how to find and eat wild fruits and plants. It was fun gathering pecans along the river bottom.

As I grew older I started following the harvest northward. In 1952 I went to Portales, N.M. to pick cotton and would then return to Goliad County for the winter.

One man I worked for, Michael Berra, taught me the value of repairing things when they broke. If the car broke when I was using it he said now get busy and repair it. He said, "I will show you what to do but you are going to do the work." And I found out I could.

I liked the Plains country so when I could find full time work I remained here. During the 1940s I worked in the machine shops and learned to repair motors and fix machinery of all kinds. I then went into farm work. I worked for "Bev" Buchanan, George Jones, Joe Buchanan, Chief and Mike Buchanan, Tulon White's Elevator, Billy Rexrode, David Patterson, Wayne Jones, Burke Hand, Melvin Lloyd and Loyd Chesser. I live now in a trailer on the

Otho Whitefield place. Some years I go to the mountains of New Mexico and pick Pinon nuts. I am still single.

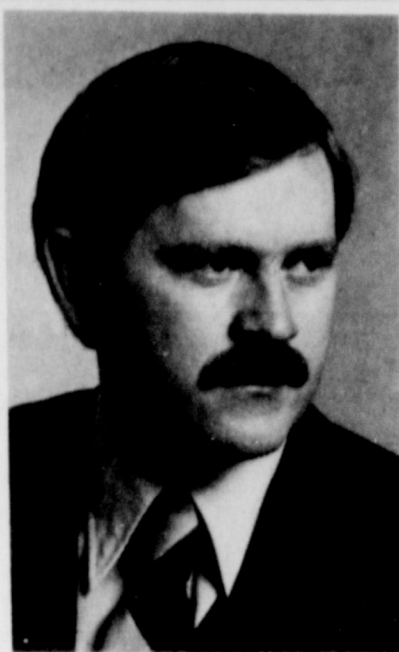
Deadline Set For Tennis Tournament

Around The House

Mobile homes continue to be popular with new home buyers. If you will be shopping for a mobile home remember these tips:

Generally, the most economical size is the single unit—twelve by sixty-five feet.

For stronger walls, consider a mobile home with four-inch studs on sixteen-inch centers.

For energy savings, look for insulated walls and ceilings.

Is the exterior made of steel, aluminum or composition material? Aluminum is favored since it is a lightweight and reflects heat.

Look for skew and rivet fasteners, tight seams.

The roof-cap should be rolled over the sides for a weather-tight seal. Also be sure there are plenty of fastenings, not just at the edges.

Look under the coach along the two main channels of the chassis. These channels should be of thick, wide, heavy gauge steel and straight.

Wheels should have flat-bed, truck-type rims. Check for six or eight plies in the tires. Inquire as to the mechanics of the brake system. Test the brakes by operating them.

Look for all the quality points you would use in shopping for a house. Ask questions and take time to satisfy yourself on the important points.

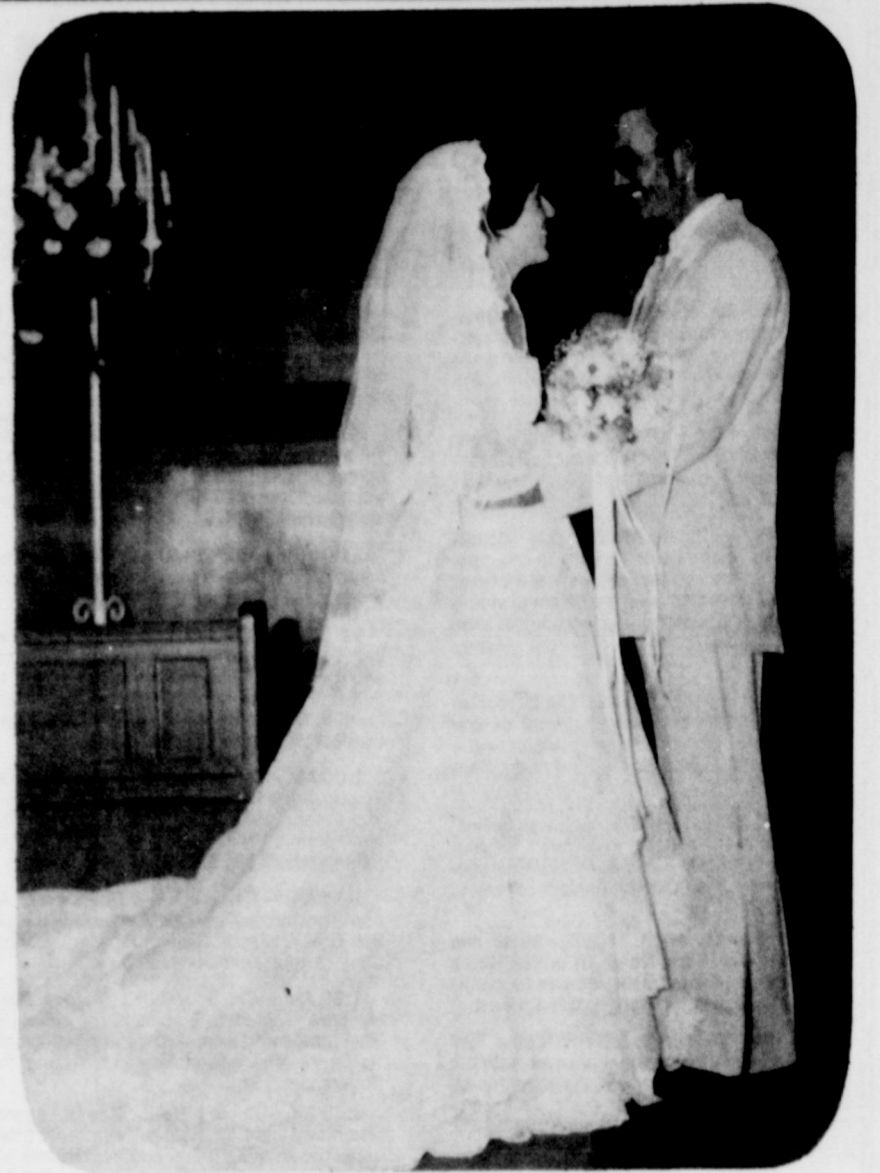

Co-Ops Establish WTSU Scholarships

Eleven electric cooperatives in the Panhandle and South Plains have joined to establish the West Texas State University Electric Cooperative Scholarship Fund with a gift of \$13,750.

Interest from the endowment will be used to provide scholarships each year to majors in agriculture, accounting, computer information systems and management.

The cooperatives include Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association; Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc.; North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative, Inc.; South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc.; and Swisher Electric Cooperative, Inc.

According to the fund agreement, the donors will make annual contributions to the West Texas State University Foundation on or before September 1 of each year.

Each donor will contribute a

minimum of \$250 until that cooperative has awarded \$1,250.

Scholarship recipients will be selected on a merit basis by a committee which includes the dean of the WTSU School of Business, dean of the School of Agriculture, and two faculty members each from the business and agriculture faculties.

Lyle Robinson, general manager of the Swisher Electric Cooperative, Inc., of Tulia, which serves portions of six counties, said he believes the cooperatives and WTSU are members of the same community.

"We appreciate WT," said Robinson, who has been with the coop for 21 years.

He said students who leave the rural areas to attend colleges and universities in larger towns and cities often do not return to their home areas.

"We need the young people who love small communities and we feel that many of these will be coming from WT," he said. "We need to bring people back to the rural towns."

Representatives of cooperatives in Texas, eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle met on the WTSU campus for the annual meeting in January.

Packing Manager Talks To Lions Club

"Our goal at MBPXL is to break even on the red meat division of our packing plant. We make our profits from the by products," Ben Taylor, plant manager of MBPXL told members of the Friona Lions Club last Thursday.

Taylor gave the club members an idea as to how many different by products are produced at Friona's beef packing plant, and pointed out that they are exported to a world-wide market.

There are three profit centers to the meat packing industry, Taylor pointed out: the buying division, the slaughter facility and the fabrication plant.

MBPXL is the second-largest meat packing company in the world, Taylor said, since Iowa Beef Packers has the edge in total volume.

"MBPXL developed the concept of boxed beef, and took the lead in bringing the meat factory out 'where the beef is.' Having the slaughter plant located in beef country saves an average of \$40 per head on freight, if you were moving the cattle to Chicago, for instance," Taylor said.

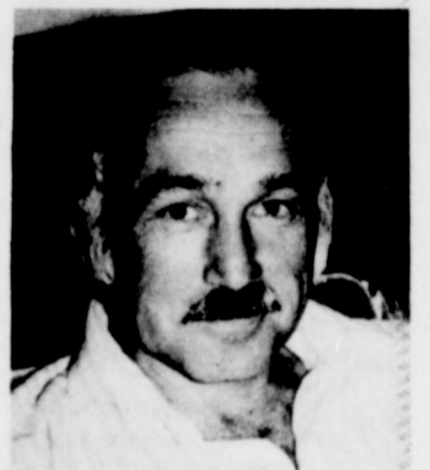
Taylor called Friona's plant the "best in the MBPXL corporation. We employ about 1,090 people, with 800 of these on hourly wages, and another 300 or so in management positions or jobs not directly on the assembly line," he said.

"Actually, we don't have an assembly line at our plant. It's more of a dis-assembly line," Taylor quipped.

Taylor gave a thumb-nail sketch of the by products sold by the plant, and briefly explained what each product is used for. These products include:

*Two kinds of sutures, including those used in surgical operations, and those used to make "strings" for tennis racquets.

*Spinal cords: used to produce

hormone material, a growth stimulant, and vitamin D-3.

*Brains, an extract from which some type of ladies' cold cream is made.

*Blood--in dried form used for fertilizers, and in liquid, for cancer research; fetal research and ladies' cosmetics.

*Thenal gland--used for growth hormones.

*Horns and gallstones--exported mostly to the Orient, which uses them for a variety of things.

*Ground or gelatin bone--sold exclusively to the Kodak Company for use in the manufacture of film.

*Hides, used for a variety of leather products, and

*Kidneys--exported, where they become part of a delicacy dish.

Taylor said that the company's exports go mainly to France, Japan, the Orient and Scandinavian countries.

Members of the Lions Club thoroughly enjoyed Taylor's talk, and asked him questions after he had finished. He is the first of the MBPXL plant managers to live in Friona. His predecessors have lived in Hereford.
