CONGRESSMAN KENT HANCE is completing his first year as congressman from the 19th district (and a good first year, from all reports). Hance said this week that his opinion of Washington had changed somewhat since he was elected to his position.

Hance, who is only the second congressman ever to serve the 19th District, said he was shocked to discover the size and the power exerted by the bureaucracy. He knew that the federal bureaucracy was bad, he said, but didn't have any idea it was as extensive as it is.

Another factor which is surprising, Hance said, was the extent that special interest groups lobby in Washington to get favorable legislation passed. Some congressmen get so obligated to these special interests that they cannot cast an otherwise objective vote, Hance said.

Hance says he feels as though he has accomplished what he set out to do--build a base and become known. He was able to secure some important committee appointments, in spite of being a newcomer.

We personally salute Congressman Hance for a job well done. Like his predecessor, George Mahon, we commend him for listening to your problem and being sympathetic.

When he was a student at Dimmitt High School, it is said that Hance had an ambition to meet Congressman George Mahon. Hance not only realized his ambition, but when the veteran congressman decided to retire, Hance won election to replace him in congress.

THE ECONOMIC BAROMETERS seem to be looking better for our country. The prime interest rate, which had hit an all-time high, and had virtually shut down the building industry, has begun to come down somewhat.

Reactions to the easing of interest rates has been good. Folks in the home building industry have a more positive attitude, as some loan money is beginning to be made available.

The automotive industry, which had seen its sales slump considerably on the national level, may also begin to recoup some of its losses, as the interest situation gets better.

Thursday's Amarillo Daily News even had a headline proclaiming that the end of the recession was in sight. This is also a step in the right direction. The national news media needs to follow suit, since they had a big hand in "talking the nation" into

its economic slowdown.

Nothing responds to the daily news, rolls and falls with the tide, like the nation's economy. Wall Street goes up and down each day in relation to how the nation fares on the news front.

That's why we say it's time for the national news media to put on a "good news blitz." For a change, if they would simply accentuate the good things, it could go a long way toward curing the ills of the nation, which has been burdened by inflation, shortages and a general run of "bad news" for the past year or two.

Routine Business For Commissioners

Renewing of certificates of deposit, plus final action in purchasing an automobile for the deputy sheriff was the main items of business for the Parmer County Commissioners on Monday.

A certificate of deposit for \$20,000 for Precinct 2, and one in the amount of \$30,000 for Precinct 4 were renewed for a short period.

The bill from Friona Ford Sales, for the new deputy sheriff's car, was approved in the amount of \$6,031, trade difference.

A bill from Amarillo Laboratory of Pathology, for \$332.50, representing an autopsy on Celestino Galicia, ordered by justice of the peace Frances Euler was approved for payment.

Motion was passed to pay \$40 to help defray expenses of the Anthony Kirbys, foster parents of Dora Fields, who have made several trips to Lubbock to see the doctor with the foster child.

The court approved easements to Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative across two county roads, for the laying of underground cable.

County Agent Seth Ralston reported that there would be a plant clinic at Farwell this week. He stated that all test plots for this year soon will be planted.

Ralston is to leave soon to buy show lambs for 4-H members. Laura Jacobs was attending a 4-H

energy workshop.

CROPS, HOMES HIT

Hailstorm Leaves Trail Of Damage

A vicious storm system moved across Parmer County on Wednesday afternoon, May 28, depositing rain and up to tennis ball-sized hail, leaving considerable damage behind in a strip a couple of miles wide, running mainly north of Highway 86 across the entire county.

It was the same cloud system which later spawned tornadoes that did considerable property damage at Nazareth in Castro County and Tulia in Swisher County, as the storm virtually followed the state highway for almost 70 miles.

The storm cloud was first spotted on Amarillo radar at about 6:15 p.m. that afternoon, in the Farwell area near the Texas-New Mexico state line.

It moved eastward at approximately 30 miles per hour. Considerable hail damage was noted to homes and property at the city of Bovina, and to crops in the surrounding area.

Then, as one observer said, the cloud appeared to have "made a right turn off Highway 60 and headed down Highway 86."

Darrell Thompson was quoted as

having seen a funnel start to form, in the cloud southeast of Friona, but the funnel went back into the cloud and did not fully develop.

Among the farmers who sustained

crop damage was Lloyd Rector, who had a field of wheat located just off Highway 214 south of Friona completely demolished.

Democratic Runoff Set On June 7

The Democratic runoff election will be held on Saturday, June 7, with all of the county's 16 polling places to be open.

Three state races will appear on the

ballot. For the Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1, J.P. (Jim) Wallace and John C. Phillips are opposing. For the Court of Criminal Appeals,

W.T. Phillips and Mike McCormick are candidates for the Place 2 position. Tom Davis and Edith Roberts are candidates for the Place 3 spot on the court.

In Parmer County, Max Crim and

Archie Tarter meet for the county commissioner's spot for Precinct 3 (Farwell-Lariat-Oklahoma Lane area).

"It hailed constantly at our place for 17 minutes. It was raining hard at the same time, and the wind was blowing. At times, you could not see the road from our house," stated Rector.

The Rectors also sustained damage to another wheat field near their home, although not doing quite as extensive damage as it did to the other one.

"It ruined our garden, except for a few tomato plants which were protected by cans. It's been years since we had a hailstorm this bad," said Betty Louise Rector.

The Rectors also sustained broken windows where their son Larry lives on the old Rector home place on Highway 214.

"It started out to be a nice gentle rain, and I was thinking 'this is just what we need,' when suddenly the hail started," Rector related. He said that he recovered several of the hailstones about 30 minutes after the storm. They were still the size of golfballs, after melting down considerably.

To the east of the Rectors, the Tom and Roy O'Brian farms also sustained considerable crop and property damage. The O'Brians also reported hailstones which were near tennis ball-sized.

Windshields were broken out of

vehicles, and extensive damage was sustained by the barn at the Tom O'Brian place. Windows were broken in their home. Just south of the O'Brians, J.W.

Gammon reported windshields

broken by extremely large hailstones.

Damage was also reported at the Howard Fleming farm near Hub. Also in the Hub area, severe hail damage was sustained at the Billy Dean Baxter farm.

Jessie Lane, who lives four miles north of Tam-Anne, reported damage, which included a vehicle windshield. Other hail and crop damage was sustained by the Buchanans, and the Tommy Jones farms, north of the Bruegel elevator.

Closer to Friona, bad hail was reported by Nancy Mingus, southwest of town. Another vehicle lost a windshield at the Mingus place, where trees and crops also were shredded.

Other area farmers who sustained hail damage included Jerry London, Arnold Daily, Charles Hough, Dwight O'Brian, Floyd Rector, Kenneth O'Brian, N.C. White, Jr., Rex Blackburn and Billy Joe Mercer.

A lot of hail was reported in the Parmerton area.

However, Clyde Woodard, who farms right at Hub, said he missed the severe hail. "We had enough hail to cover the ground, but it wasn't as bad as the others. We got about three-quarters of an inch of rain during the storm," Woodard said.

The amount of rainfall varied considerably. The official measurement by the City of Friona was .65 inch of rain during the period, while at the Terry Copley place four miles southeast of town, a total of 1.5 inches fell in a 15-minute period.

Highway 2397 in that area was under water for about three miles for a time Wednesday evening.

Wednesday's weather spell marked the third time during the month of May for the area to receive considerable rain, and at least some hail, on a Wednesday. Previous rains were received on May 7 and 14. The City of Friona must have been

near the northern edge of Wednesday's storm system. The Rhea community did not even receive a sprinkle, and the area just south of Highway 86 also missed the latest weather system. Wednesday's rainfall brought the

month's total moisture, as recorded in Friona to 4.17 inches, according to A.L. Outland, official weather recorder. Outland's report showed "pea sized to ping-pong ball sized hail" received in Friona.

general public. The park's general manager Ray Williams said that the decisions to establish a gas station at Six Flags was made to help ease traveler uncertainty about fuel availability.

"During the gasoline crunch last year, our attendance dropped about five per cent. By installing our own pumps, we hope not only to make gasoline available, but also convenient," Williams said.

The Six Flags station, which began operation March 1 with the opening of the park's 20th season, is located in the parking lot adjacent to the picnic area on the south side of the

Five self-service islands, with a total of nine two-sided pumps, offer regular, unleaded and diesel fuel.

Staffed by park personnel, the Six Flags station is open for business during park operating hours. To offer complete gasoline availability information to the public, the park

has also established a gasoline hot line at 214/641-7200.

"Through the use of this telephone number, we can communicate to thousands of potential visitors information on the availability of gasoline not only in our park but also at stations surrounding the park," Williams said.

He added that Six Flags' fuel prices will be competitive.

As an additional aid to travelers, a convenience store will also be located at the station. Motor oil, ice, soft drinks, snacks, cigarettes and other convenience items will be available at

"We at Six Flags Over Texas feel that this move may have a substantial economic impact on the local community. Because Six Flags is the state's major tourist attraction, any effort to attract travelers to the park benefits the local economy as a whole," Williams said.

Six Flags, which introduced its new roller coaster "Judge Roy Scream" this season, is now open for daily operation.

■ Don't be rushed into signing repair contracts. Fly-by-night repairmen often prey on tornado victims. Be sure you know with whom you're dealing. Your insurance agent or adjuster should be able to help; or ask your Better Business Bureau or friends or relatives to recommend someone. Keep receipts for all repairs and additional living expenses.





Jerry Taylor, membership chairman, offered two new names for membership. Thelma Coffey and Louise Dunham were accepted by a unanimous vote.





The Happy Homemaker

If you are growing zucchini in your garden, you will soon have an ample supply. This delicious vegetable is nutritious as well as attractive regardless of how it is served.

Homemakers who are not growing gardens will probably soon have an ample supply, too. For a number of years zucchini was baked or boiled on rare occasions. For the most part it was served fried in batter.

In more recent years, recipes for zucchini dishes have been showing up in just about all the new cookbooks as well as in the cook's section of newspapers and magazines.

This week we're featuring some of our favorite recipes using this tasty vegetable which always seems to produce profusely. Any grower generally has enough to supply everybody in the neighborhood.

Anyone who enjoys omelets for breakfast should try this one.

Zucchini Omelet 3 small zucchini small onion, chopped 6 eggs, well beaten

1/2 cup grated cheese Salt, pepper, parsley, garlic and seasoning salt to taste

Cracker crumbs to cover Boil zucchini until tender; mash. Brown chopped onion in small amount bacon drippings or melted butter. Combine all ingredients

except cracker crumbs. Mix well. Cover with crumbs. Bake at 375 degrees 45 minutes or until a silver knife comes out clean.

Then, for lunch you might like to serve Zucchini Casserole. To make it you will need the following: 2 pounds zucchini-six to eight small to medium size; ½ medium size green bell pepper, chopped; salt, pepper and garlic salt to taste; 1 medium onion, chopped; 2 tablespoons butter or margarine; 2 beaten eggs; 3/4 cup bread or cracker crumbs and 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese.

Slice zucchini and cook with green pepper, onion and seasonings in small amount of water until tender.

Add beaten eggs and cracker crumbs. Mix well and put in a buttered 11/2 quart size casserole dish and top with shredded cheese. Bake for 30-40 minutes in 350 degree oven.

If you are one of the homemakers who enjoy preparing and serving pickles and relishes, you will want to clip the following recipes for use in that department.

Red Cinnamon Pickles Peel and seed large fresh zucchini. Then cut in cubes, strips or half circles. Cover two gallons of prepared zucchini with 81/2 pints of water in which you have dissolved 2 cups of

lime. Let set overnight.

Drain and rinse several times in cold water. Let set 3 hours in ice water. Drain well and cover with a mixture of 1 cup vinegar, 11/2 small bottles of red food coloring; 1 tablespoon alum and enough water to cover. Simmer for three hours.

After draining liquid off, mix 3 cups apple cider vinegar, 2 cups water, 9 cups sugar, twenty ounces red hots and 11/2 teaspoons salt.

Heat to boiling and seal in hot sterilized jars. Let set one week to ten days before serving.

Zucchini Relish

Grind twelve cups zucchini and four cups onions. Add five tablespoons salt, mix well and let set overnight. Next morning, drain well and rinse two times in cold water. Drain thoroughly.

Add one red bell pepper and one green one, which have been ground; three tablespoons each nutmeg and tumeric and one tablespoon powdered mustard.

Also add 11/2 teaspoons celery seed; 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 4 cups sugar and 21/2 cups vinegar. Mix ingredients well. Then simmer

for 30 minutes before sealing in hot

sterilized jars.

Then, for a tasty addition to your dessert recipes, add the following:

Zucchini Bread

3 eggs 2 cups sugar

I cup salad oil 2 cups grated zucchini

2 teaspoons vanilla

3 cups flour 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt 3 teaspoons cinnamon

Chopped nuts, if desired







There was some damage done to the grass at the Farwell school by a car driving on the lawn, Lovelace said.


