MOST PEOPLE AGREE that President Carter's action in breaking off diplomatic relations with Iran, expelling the Iranian diplomats and training pilots was entirely in order, and was not a bit too soon.

In fact, most people think that even more stiff action should be taken, if there were some which could be.

One observer has said that the only thing the Iranians recognize is force, and that the U.S. government should already have arrested 50 Iranians and jailed them, so we would have more of a bargaining point.

This, of course, would be "illegal arrest," and our government, attempting to be a model nation, would not stoop to violations of international law. But when you're dealing with people and nations who don't play by the rules, sometimes you have to get down to their level.

Some type of positive action needs to be taken, to bring about the release of the American hostages, who have been held entirely too long already.

AMERICANS ARE FINDING new ways of hedging against inflation, with the annual inflation rate not only in the "double digit" category, but well into the double digits at that.

Some have gone from savings accounts to investing their savings in such things as gold, silver, diamonds, etc. However, in the case of the silver market, numbers of investors, including the wealthy Hunt family of Texas, found out last week that even this type of investment has its pitfalls when the market plunged drastically after having climbed to record highs.

Collections of all sorts have always been considered good investments—coins, stamps, etc. The news this week told of the auction sale in New York of "the world's most famous stamp," an 1856 one-cent stamp from British Guiana.

The stamp was sold at auction for \$850,000, the largest amount ever paid for a single stamp. The stamp is the only existing one of its type and has been described as the most valuable single object in the world "for its size and weight."

The stamp had been put up for sale by Irwin Weinberg, a collector from Wilkes Barre, Pennsylvania, who bought it as a hedge against inflation in 1970 for \$280,000. The amount was a record at that time for a stamp sale.

Stamp experts had thought it possible that the Guiana stamp could have sold for over a million dollars at this week's auction sale.

IT SEEMS THAT WE are having more wind, or perhaps having it in "faster doses" than even our area usually has in the spring.

The big blow of Monday, March 31, was one of the worst in these parts in several years. Oldtimers could remember times when there was more dust in the air than last week, making it darker, but few could recall the wind ever blowing any harder than it did that day, and for the prolonged time.

Hopefully, the spring "zephyrs" will diminish soon. We don't need any more of those destructive types.

Voting Booth Slated Here

A special absentee voting booth will be open in Friona for the May 3 Democratic and Republican primaries, it was announced this week by Bonnie Warren, County Clerk.

A booth will be operated on April 17 and 24 at the Friona Federal Credit Union.

Voters who think they may be out of town on the primary dates may come by and cast absentee ballots on those dates. They should bring their voter registration cards.

City Calls Special Election For Mayor

The City of Friona has called a new election for the position of mayor, following an unusual turn of events during and following the annual city election last Saturday.

In the election, with a light turnout of voters as was expected with the election falling on a holiday weekend, 84 voters wrote in Charles Caudill for the mayor's position, with incumbent mayor B.K. Buske receiving 55 votes.

Caudill declined to serve, however, leaving the city without an elected mayor.

In the regular meeting of the Friona City Council on Monday night, the council passed a resolution calling for a special election on May 20 to fill the mayor's spot. Prospective candidates will have until April 18 to get their names on the ballot.

Election Results Are Highlight Of Meeting

Discussion of the city election, in particular the situation brought about by the results of the mayor's race, was the main item of business at the monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday.

City Manager A.L. Outland read a mailgram from Charles Caudill, who had received the most votes in the election, 84, in a write-in effort. Caudill declined the job as mayor.

After much discussion and acting on advice from Richard Collard, city attorney, a motion was passed to call a special election for May 20, to fill the mayor's office.

The city manager was authorized to solicit bids for a new administrative automobile, with a mid-sized vehicle being solicited.

The proposed rate increase by Southwestern Public Service Company was discussed, noting that the council had requested a delay of 120 days to study the matter at its last meeting. The matter was tabled until the next meeting.

A motion was passed naming alderman Jerry Brownnd as mayor pro-tem. Brownnd will serve as mayor during the interim period.

Ordinance number 540, amending the city's solid waste ordinance, was read, which adjusted certain charges for grocery stores and commercial installations requiring daily service. This was the second consideration of the topic. The ordinance was

In the meantime, mayor pro-tem Jerry Brownnd, a member of the city council, will serve in the mayor's capacity.

Caudill was vacationing in Tennessee at the time of the election. When notified of the vote, he said that although flattered, he felt he had to decline. He sent a mailgram to the city council, saying in part:

"I appreciate the confidence of those who voted for me, but feel I cannot accept the office of mayor at this time. I am sorry for any inconvenience this may cause you or the city of Friona."

Caudill told the Friona Star that he had not known of an organized write-in campaign. "One or two had told me in passing 'I may write you in for mayor,' etc., but I had passed it off as a lark," Caudill said.

Gasohol Plant Report Slated Here Tuesday

An informal meeting on the prospects for a fuel alcohol (gasohol) plant which is proposed for this area will be held Tuesday, April 15 at 8 p.m. at the Friona Community Center.

A similar meeting is scheduled at Bovina on Thursday, April 17 at the First State Bank.

Grady Sorley, a member of the board of directors of the High Plains Grain Products International (GPI), said that the results of the recently completed feasibility study on the gasohol plant for this area will be presented.

The study was detailed to members of the co-op by the board members at Muleshoe this past week.

"Things are looking very good—better than we ever thought. We are needing to enlist more members in the

Buske, who has served as Friona mayor since 1976, told the Friona Star that he would place his name on the ballot for re-election.

"Because the citizens of Friona have a right to know what happened in last Saturday's election, I feel obligated to offer the following explanation," Buske said.

"As mayor, some tough decisions have had to be made for the benefit of the majority of the citizens. For example, Friona is growing. Inflation is rampant. We must maintain a conservative budget.

"When I was elected in 1976, I was surprised to learn that the taxpayers earned absolutely zero on their surplus funds. Since that time, any surplus funds in checking accounts have been placed in interest-bearing accounts. This action will earn the taxpayers over \$20,000 for this fiscal year.

"Every taxpayer will benefit, because this is that much less he would have to pay in property taxes.

"The citizens also should know that Charles Caudill and I are the best of friends, and on several occasions I have tried to get him to run for the city council. Each time, he has declined, and I respect his decisions.

"Numerous people have asked that I place my name on the ballot once again. With this kind of support, I have chosen to run again, and if elected, I will continue to serve in the best interests of the majority," Buske concluded.

At the Muleshoe meeting on April 9, the co-op membership had reports from Bill Levitt, of Levitt & Associates, the consulting firm, from Joe Johnson, A.D. Little and Company of Washington, D.C.

The prospects of organizing a gasohol plant for the immediate area have been discussed for more than a year, and the feasibility study was undertaken earlier this year to give concrete facts for the prospects.

A number of farmers in Parmer County have already become members of the cooperative.

The location of the plant will be decided during a "phase two" feasibility study.

Census Chief Says City Returns Good

The city of Friona's 1980 census mail return percentage looked "real good," Bill Soule, manager of the 1980 census office for this area, said when contacted Wednesday by the Friona Star.

"For the size of town, I would say that Friona is above average for the number of census forms which have been returned. Your citizens are to be complimented," Soule said in a telephone interview.

The district census manager said that the followup campaign will begin in the next few days. He said that according to computer print-outs, the city as a whole responded good to the mail-in request.

"The portion of the city from Austin Street west seems to have the biggest percentage of non-returns," Soule said. (This would include West 9th, 10th and 11th streets).

No census figures can be released at this point, but the district census chief said that judging by the number of returns, Friona's 1980 count could top the 4,000 mark. Friona's official count in 1970 was 3,111.

"We figure 2.8 persons per household, as a national average," Soule said.

(The current number of active water meters in Friona is 1,392, which would indicate a population of 3,898 according to the census household average. However, the water meter figure includes business establishments as well as residences).

Soule indicated that after the followup campaign is completed, the census figures will be sent to the Dallas regional census office, which will in turn send the figures to the mayors of each city, for review.

"The mayor of each city will have the option of accepting the census report, or if they think their city has been slighted, they can technically ask for a recount," Soule said. "We're hoping every area will be pleased with the count," he added.

The district census official said that for the Amarillo district, the census returns were running at about 70 per cent. The census officials were hoping for at least an 80 per cent mail return, so that the "door-knocking" phase of the count would require less time.

He said that some 49,000 census forms were returned in the mail on "census day," April 1, and that the number dropped off considerably after that, until the number coming into the district office on Wednesday, April 9 was around 1,000.

Those who have not returned their census forms are urged to do so as quickly as possible. Anyone needing a form may call the Amarillo district office, toll-free, at 1-800-692-4061.

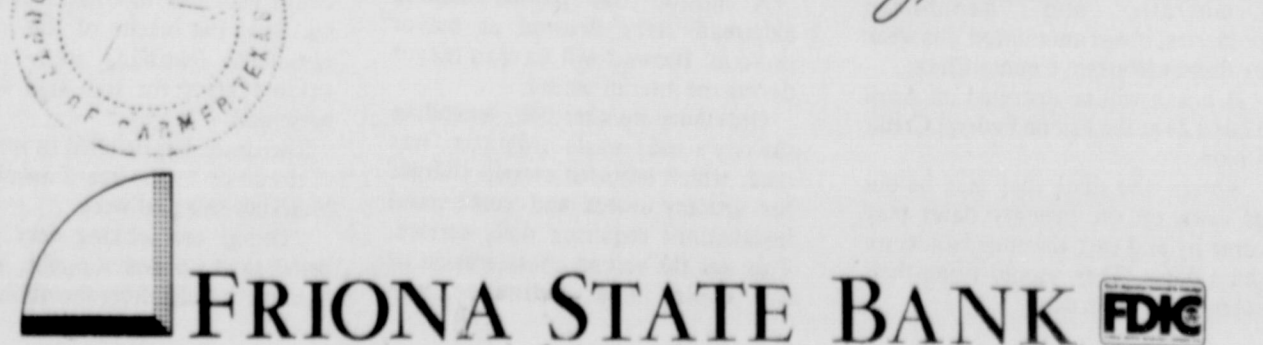

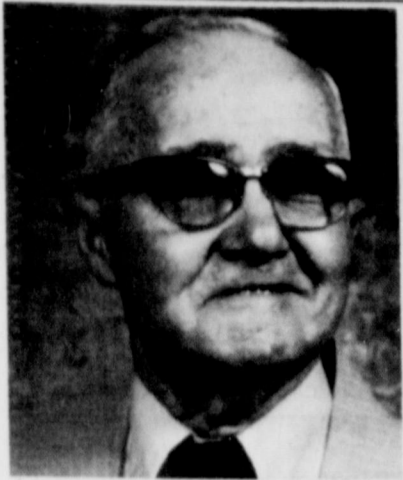

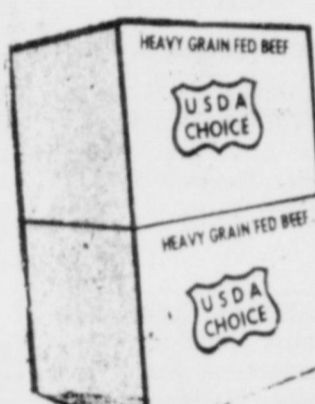

SET TWO NEW MARKS

Chiefs Blaze At Dumas Meet

The Friona Chieftains turned in best performances of the season in virtually every event at the North Plains Relays at Dumas last Friday.

Not originally scheduled to have a meet due to the Easter weekend, the Chiefs, a last-minute entry due to the cancellation of their own meet a week earlier, set two school records.

The team won both relay races, cutting a full second off their best time in the 440-yard relay. The foursome of Michael Gowens, Mike Hubbard, Rod Owen and David Fleming ran the lap in the time of 42.9.

The time was equalled by Liberal, Kansas in the large-school division of the meet, and the two teams are tied with the best mark in the Panhandle area, for all classifications.

The foursome broke one of the oldest school records still on the books. The record, 43.6, was set by Danny Murphree, Everett Gee, David Carson and S.D. Baize in 1964.

The other new school record was broken twice in the same event. Rod Owen first jumped 21-5½ in the long jump to top the mark of 21-3¾ by Jeff Whiteside in 1978, but the record was short-lived, as Joe Malouf

jumped 21-7¼, to win the event and erase Owen's minutes-old school record. Owen placed second, giving Friona 16 points in the event.

The mile relay team won their event, turning in a time of 3:27.7, their best mark of the season. This mark ranks third in the Panhandle area, behind only Liberal and Plainview, class AAAA schools.

The other stellar performance was by David Fleming, who won the 440-yard dash with a sparkling 50.3. This was Fleming's personal best, and ranks as the third best quarter-mile clocking, all classes, in the area this

spring. Rod Owen ran a 51.5 to capture third place in the event.

Other point-winners for the Chieftains included Chitto Caballero, who placed third in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles in 40.2, and Gowens, third in the 220-yard dash at 23.2.

Chuck Nichols cleared 12 feet in the pole vault, but had to settle for fifth place.

The team scored 88 points, good for runnerup honors in the meet, and received a handsome trophy. Childress, which dominated the field events, won with 94 points.

"We had talked to the boys prior to the meet, and were concerned with improving our marks, first of all. We said that we weren't necessarily concerned with winning the meet—we mainly wanted to get our marks down. We were very pleased with the results," said Coach Robert Mears this week.

The Chieftains are entered in the Amarillo Relays this week. There are 17 teams entered in Friona's division. The Chiefs will face district rival Muleshoe for the first time in 1980 at the meet.

The Amarillo meet is the last tuneup prior to the District 3-AA meet at Olton on April 19, and Mears thinks the tracksters have their sights on that meet.

Friona has won back to back district track titles, and the seniors on this year's team have not failed to win their district trophy since they were in the seventh grade.

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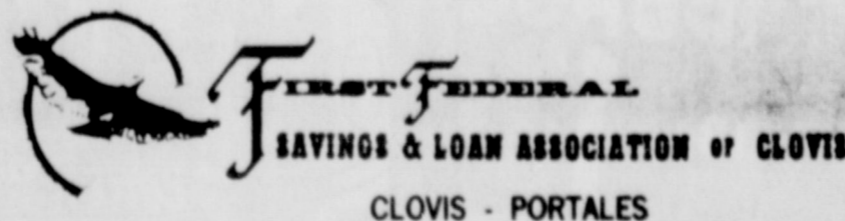

A Wayland Baptist College student and an administrative staffer will be representing the College in Washington, D.C., this weekend.

Friona sophomore Barbara Rhodes and Mrs. Lena Faye Alford, assistant to the vice-president for student affairs, will attend the 11th Annual National Student Symposium this Friday through Sunday, April 11-13, in the Nation's Capital.

This year's event, entitled "The Presidency and Priorities for the 1980's," is an extensive program featuring lectures on such topics as American foreign policy, national strategy and defense, and economic policy issues by distinguished experts in each field. An evening address by Republican presidential candidate John B. Anderson is also scheduled.

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Notice To Homeowners And Farmers

Deadline for filing homestead, over 65 or disabled and open space land exemptions. These exemptions must be filed with the school tax office by April 30, 1980.

WHO SHOULD FILE:

General Homestead--If you qualify for a residence homestead, you will be entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. The amount of an exemption which you receive cannot exceed the market value of your homestead.

The school homestead exemption is available to the general public as long as valid applications are filed with the school district before the end of the rendition period, April 30, 1980.

ARE YOU OVER 65? If you are 65 years of age or older, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only and you must apply for the exemption before the end of the rendition period, April 30.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and \$10,000 disability exemption (discussed later). If you are qualified for both, you must choose one or the other.

ARE YOU DISABLED? If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to receive an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only.

"Disabled" for purposes of this exemption means either that, because of physical or mental disability, you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work; or that you are 55 years of age or older and blind, and by reason of the blindness are unable to engage in your previous work.

If you are receiving disability benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Program administered by the Social Security Administration, you will qualify as long as you apply on time.

If you are receiving disability benefits under any other program, you will not automatically qualify. You must still meet the definition of disability stated above and apply before the end of the rendition period, April 30, 1980.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and a \$10,000 disability exemption. You must choose one or the other.

Farm & Ranch Open Space Land Applications: In addition to the exemption described above, qualified farmers and ranchers may enjoy another form of tax relief.

Two amendments of the Texas Constitution permit agricultural and open-space land to be taxed generally at its productivity value instead of market value. These provisions are effective only if applications are filed with the tax office in a timely manner.

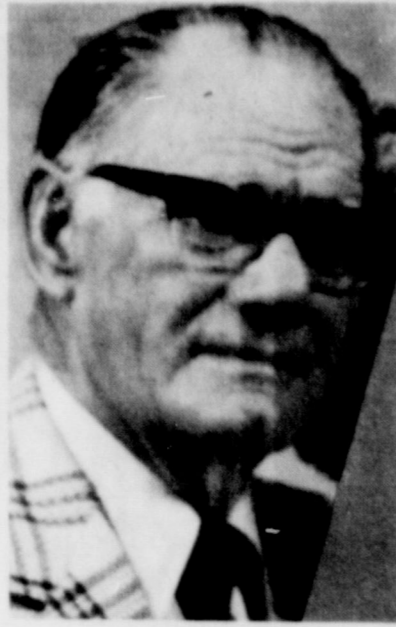

Funeral services for A.C. (Tay) Nittler, 68, will be held Saturday, April 12 at 2 p.m. at the Sixth Street Church of Christ. Officiating will be D.L. Harguess. Burial will be in the Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

Nittler passed away Friday while undergoing surgery in Lubbock.

He was born June 9, 1911 in Hale Center, and was a farmer. He married Dora Louise Kolb August 30, 1937 at Edinburg. The Nittlers had lived in Friona for the past seven years.

Survivors include his wife, Dora, two daughters, Mrs. Louise Lundy of Friona and Mrs. Nancy Gernewitz of Edinburg; one sister, Mrs. Mabel Stump of Elsa; two brothers, Bert of Lake City, Kansas and Harold of Monte Alto, Texas.

The Texas Department of Corrections' crime and drug education department will present programs in Friona on Tuesday, April 15, according to high school counselor B.E. Duggins.

The program will include an hour-long general assembly, followed by "rap sessions" in high school until noon, and then at the junior high after noon.

Duggins says that the program has proven very effective, where prison inmates come into schools and talk personally to the students, in an effort to steer them away from drugs, alcohol or other criminal activities.

"Most people have the idea that criminals have fangs, and are some type of monster. Actually, for the most part, they are very average people, and these inmates usually 'come across' to the students very well," Duggins says.

Any person in the community who would be interested in attending any portion of the day-long program is welcome. The assembly program begins at 9:45 a.m.

"Operation Kick-It" was established through the Governor's Criminal Justice Council in May of 1970. A panel of three to five inmates was formed to travel throughout the state to tell their life stories in an effort to educate, warn and inform the public, specifically teenagers, about the dangers and consequences involved in the illicit use of drugs.

In 1971, a second panel was formed in order to meet the demand of bookings, so great was the public acceptance of the program. The format was further expanded in 1975, and the program's name was changed to the Community Education Program.

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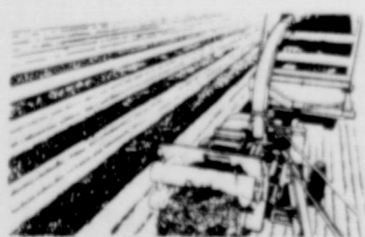
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
