BOWIE, TEXAS, has one of the most well-known and successful "Trades Day" programs of any place we know of.

My parents were from Montague County, and had told us for years about the event, which is known as "Second Monday" in the Bowie area.

When the swap-meet idea was started before the turn of the century, horses, mules and other farm livestock were the main item of exchange. Farmers would take their horses to the Second Monday event, and see if they could be successful in "trading up."

In the more than 80 years of the monthly sales spectacular, the field of merchandise has expanded to include almost anything which can be bought and sold. And, today's participants use cash instead of the original swapping idea.

Dogs have also been a big item at Bowie's Second Monday trade event. During the 1950s, it was not uncommon for the sale to draw as many as 600 hunting dogs, as owners from as far away as Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico and Missouri congregated for the sale.

Bowie merchants have taken advantage of the tremendous crowds of people which are drawn into town by the monthly event, and schedule sales and promotions to lure some of the out-of-town customers.

Although our grandparents had participated in the event for years, and some of our relatives in that area still do, this past weekend was the first opportunity for us to get to see a Second Monday in operation. We were impressed.

It is true that the merchants have everything from soup to hays to offer to the bargain-seekers. Second Monday is sort of a giant garage sale. But it is more.

Yes, it could be described as a sprawling flea market. But it's much, much more.

You can get new or used clothing; farm tools, almost any type of farm animal, fruits, vegetables, antiques, hardware, books, knick-knacks—you name it, and they probably have it. The merchants display their wares in pickups, trucks, and on tables set up in rows at the sale location.

Bartering is still a major factor at Second Monday. We personally heard one customer open with "That's a nice looking hammer." The merchant replied "Yep. I've got it priced at \$6, but why don't you give me \$5 for it so I won't have to take it back home?" "Sold!" the buyer replied.

The biggest turnout at the sale is usually in August, September and October. They told us that the crowd, both of buyers and sellers, was much better for the October sale than it had been earlier in the year, probably due to the hot summer weather earlier.

Many of the merchants live in Bowie or nearby. Others come from far and near. They now arrive as early as Thursday and begin vying for the best spots. Saturday and Sunday prior to the "Second Monday" are now the big days, and most of the sale is actually gone by Monday.

Food vendors have caught onto the act in recent years. Mobile hamburger joints now have sprung up among the vendors. People used to take a sack lunch, if they were manning a stand at the sale.

There were even a couple of carnival-type items for the young folks, including a Shetland pony ride. This keeps the small fry busy, and creates yet another business prospect.

We had been to two state fairs, one world's fair, a Major League all-star game, and to NFL football games. But after seeing Bowie's Second Monday in full-bloom, we decided that these other things were second-rate.

That's a great thing the folks down there have going. Wish our towns had something like it.

Work Will Continue On Highway Project

Since construction on the northern half of Highway 60 through Friona has progressed somewhat slower than expected, we contacted the Department of Highways and Transportation, as well as the contractor doing the work, for a progress report on the project.

This week, workmen began laying the asphalt stabilized base on the north half of the project, beginning at the east end.

Rhea Bradley of Littlefield, resident engineer for the TDHT, said that contrary to reports that the workers would leave after October 15, or after freezing weather, etc., work will continue on the project until at least everything except the riding surface is added to the roadway.

"The riding surface is the only thing which cannot be added during cold weather. The portion of the highway from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line, which is being re-surfaced, also will have to wait for this top inch and one-half of surface," Bradley said.

Bradley said that he had had a long visit with the contractor, Bert Borsberry of El Paso, who had assured him that the south side of the road through Friona should progress faster than the north side has.

"They will have the re-surfacing work completed outside of the city, and will be able to concentrate on the road project inside Friona," Bradley said.

The highway official said it was the department's hope to have traffic back to normal, or nearly so, by January 1, 1981.

"We're looking at another eight weeks of work, unless we get considerable weather delay," Bradley indicated.

Since the southern half of the road will be completed during cold weather, the top layer or riding surface cannot be added until after April 15, it was explained.

Although the weather has cooperated for most of the highway project, a couple of sizeable rains have cost the project considerable time in the portion through Friona.

Just about two weeks ago, workmen were almost ready to lay the pavement on the northern side of the roadway through Friona, when a good-sized rain hit, and delayed work on the roadway for almost a week.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe has contacted the Department of Highways and Transportation in regard to the problem which will be created by the widened highway at the

school crossing on Highway 60.

Previously, children crossing the highway have been able to use the old median as a "halfway" spot. Also, the school zone's flashing lights have been located in the median, where they were very noticeable for through traffic. By eliminating the medians, the lights will have to be placed at the side of the highway.

Jarboe said he had had a preliminary visit with Mickey Powell, traffic engineer for the TDHT, who has promised to study the problem, and meet with school and/or city officials in its regard.

A pedestrian crossing over the highway would be the ultimate solution, but highway department officials feel that the cost would be prohibitive.

Berend Wins Star's Weekly Grid Game

Two contestants shrugged off the majority of upsets on the sixth week of the Friona Star Football Contest, and walked away with first and second prizes in the weekly grid-guessing contest.

Leroy Berend of Route 2, Friona, and Ron Harkey of Petersburg were the star pupils for the week with scores of 20. Berend edged Harkey for the top prize money on the basis of the tie-breaker score.

Berend had picked River Road to win, 26-10, and missed the actual score by only four points, to wrap up the weekly prize of \$10.00. Harkey guessed the score at 14-13, Friona, and had to settle for second place.

Ted Giddens, like Harkey an ex-Friona resident, took third place in the weekly contest with a score of 19. Giddens, now head coach at Valley High School near Turkey, was awarded \$4.00 for his score and tie-breaker guess.

Hance Campaigns For Sarpalius

Congressman Kent Hance and state senatorial candidate Bill Sarpalius were in Friona last Friday. Congressman Hance was "Stumping" on behalf of Sarpalius' candidacy.

Hance said he had come from Washington at his own expense to campaign on behalf of Sarpalius, and that Sarpalius was the only candidate he would be doing extra work for in the district.

"I feel that the state senate position is a vital one, and that the district has not had the type of representation the past three years that it deserves," Hance told a crowd which gathered at the Parmer House Restaurant.

"Every property owner in this district is affected by the state senate. The senate determines the types of local property taxes which the residents will pay."

"You need to have a state senator who will be effective, who can get along with your colleagues. With 14 senators (of 31) from the four largest cities in the state, you need to ask 'Can our elected official influence another official?'" Hance said.

Hance said he had the utmost

respect for Sarpalius, and felt he would be the type of official of which the local residents would be proud.

Sarpalius said he had conducted a "personal" campaign. "I have been to every town in the district six times, and have been in every place of business at least twice. I live right down the road from you, and will speak out for you. I'm willing to work hard, and would be proud to represent you in the state senate," he added.

The hereford resident carried Parmer County with a 90 per cent margin.

"I don't have the money for as much television advertising as my opponent, and I will be counting on my grass roots campaign to win. I will need to carry Parmer County again by 90 per cent in order to offset gains by my opponent in his home area," Sarpalius said.

Getting out the vote was also cited as a key to the senate race.

Bob Price was elected to the state office in 1977, after former Senator Max Sherman resigned to become president of West Texas State University.

"Judge Not That You
Be Not Judged"

When most of us look at our own lives we realize that our "sins" are usually not dramatic acts of rebellion and violent self-affirmation. No, our sins are most of the time sins of attitude. None of them are punishable by law. They are sins of being overly critical, of failure to understand of being unkind, of being judgmental.

Jesus saw how much harm such attitudes can cause. He spoke to this issue very frankly and very bluntly. "Judge not, that you be not judged. For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get." (Matthew 7:1, 2)

This does not mean that we should be colorless people who have no opinion, or who are never upset by anything and thus never pass judgment on anything. On occasions this is necessary. Jesus, Himself, was passing judgment when he condemned the scribes and Pharisees. Things that are wrong must be recognized as such and in so doing we express a judgment upon them.

It does mean that unfair, unkind, unnecessary, judgmental attitudes are harmful. In fact, they hurt the ones who are judged. We all know that it is always painful to feel criticized,

unfairly evaluated or judged. Secondly, they hurt the ones that are judgmental. Those who are over critical, always willing to condemn soon find themselves isolated in a world of people. They also find that their own heart has become hard.

The big question then is how can we overcome the too judgmental attitude? The following are suggestions. Some will apply and be helpful to you, and some will benefit others.

1. A consciousness of our own faults should make us less inclined to be critical or judgmental of others. Jesus put it very clearly when he said, "Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye." (Matthew 7:4, 5) Jesus had to have a sense of humor to speak in terms of such exaggeration but there was more than humor in His purpose.

2. Realize the simple fact that all people are human and therefore imperfect. This by all means should make us less judgmental. There is an old saying, "There are two billion people in the world, but not one of them is perfect." No one would argue with that statement but we often fail

to live up to its implications. A truly great person is one who can see all the problems and weaknesses of other folk and still look on them hopefully and helpfully. Jesus was able to do that perfectly. The people Jesus dealt with were real people. They were subject to all the weaknesses that all of us are. They discouraged Him, disappointed Him, even betrayed Him. But He still believed in them and in their possibilities.

3. Be sure you are aware of all the facts before you pass judgment. The story is told of how John Wesley was very critical and judgmental of a man because he was not as generous as Wesley thought he ought to be. Later Wesley found the man was almost living in poverty paying off a huge debt. Wesley said, never again would he judge another person until he knew all of the facts.

4. Always try to put yourself in another's place. Rabbi Hillel in ancient Palestine said, "Judge not thy neighbor till thou comest into his place." Several centuries later on our own continent the Sioux Indians had a prayer, "Great Spirit, help me never to judge another until I have walked two miles in his moccasins." These are other ways of announcing the same truth found in the familiar Golden Rule.

5. The ultimate, the all inclusive solution is the New Testament demand that we love and forgive. This is not easy. It demands a life of personal discipline and self-examination. It demands that we seek this through prayer, Bible study and the challenge of others. The promise is that this is the road to personal freedom.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 3, 1930

J.C. Wilkison this week sold the Wilkison Chevrolet Company to J.W. Magness, owner of the Chevrolet agency at Farwell. It is reported that Mr. Magness has leased the Parr Building recently vacated by the Friona Motor Company, and will move the business into it. Mr. Wilkison will continue his business as representative of the Magnolia Petroleum Company here.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 4, 1935

Quite a goodly number of Friona people attended the picture show at Hereford during Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, to witness the Will Rogers picture, "Steamboat Round The Bend."

Mr. Loomis, manager and owner of the Allerita Loomis Players, a tent comedy show of considerable fame for its clean and interesting entertainment, was in Friona Tuesday making arrangements for a six-night program here next week.

35 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1945

On Monday the Friona Locker Company opened its doors for business and in the afternoon at least four hogs were slaughtered and placed in the cooling room, preparatory to processing and conversion into bacon, cured hams and sausage, etc. The operative work of the company is in charge of Wilmet Crow, one of the proprietors of the business, and he is ably assisted by A.L. Talley and T.B. Whitfield.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1950

Friona city commissioners and mayor met Tuesday and unanimously framed ordinances setting the city tax rate at \$1.25 representing a twenty-five cent increase over the previous levy. This action followed on the heels of increased agitation for a paving program for Friona, heretofore blocked by lack of sufficient credit earned by the city under its old tax structure. Mayor Bainum pointed that even with the old tax structure, the city's tax rate is still considerably under the average for towns the size of Friona across the state.

25 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 30, 1955

The opening of the new Sixth Street Church of Christ building will be held on Sunday, October 2. A program for the day has been planned. The formal opening services will be held at 3 p.m. There will be three guest speakers, Stanley Lockhart, minister of the Church of Christ at Levelland, and former pastor of the local church; Doyle Chapin, minister of the Vega Church of Christ, and Bob Wear, minister of the Canyon Church of Christ.

20 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 29, 1960

The Friona City Council, meeting in a special session Monday afternoon at the City Hall, spent about three hours discussing a budget under which the city of Friona will operate during the tax year, October 1, 1960 to September 30, 1961. This is

the first year that the city has operated under a budget set up on a tax year; as previous budgets were based on calendar years. The budget just ended was based on a nine-month period.

15 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 30, 1965

The enrollment in Friona Public Schools is up almost nine per cent over last year, it was revealed this week by Superintendent Alton Farr. Current enrollment was listed the past week at 1367, which was an increase of 111 students over the 1256 total at the end of the 1964-65 school year.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 1, 1970

Business places in the city of Friona will begin collecting the one-cent city sales tax on all purchases starting Thursday, October 1. City Manager Jake Outland reminded merchants that the city sales tax will be collected on everything that currently is taxable. Merchants will simply add the extra penny to each \$1 purchase.

5 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1975

"This project actually had its beginning back in the 1920s, when people living to the south of Friona had problems crossing the draw a times when they needed to come to Friona," said mayor R.L. Fleming during his remarks at dedication ceremonies at the new overpass into the city Tuesday. Also speaking at the program was George C. Wall, Jr., district engineer for the highway department's Lubbock district.



Area Friends Buy Breathing Machine

With the help of friends, a 23-year-old man was finally able to return home to Friona.

Panhandle residents from Odessa to Hereford chipped in \$2,437 to buy Alex Guerra three respiratory therapy machines he needed before doctors would release him from High Plains Baptist Hospital.

The respiratory machines allow Guerra to live at home instead of the hospital.

Guerra, one of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Guerra, suffers from bronchiectasis—a condition in which the lining of the airways is interrupted and mucus remains in the lungs.

"I'm glad I've got a lot of friends and people that helped me out," he said.

When Guerra became ill as a child, doctors believed he just had a tendency toward colds.

When he was 14, he developed double pneumonia and doctors predicted the youth would live no longer than 12 hours. But Guerra said "through faith in God and my parents' praying I made it."

"The fever broke and my lungs began to clear and about a week and a half later I opened my eyes and knew my parents standing by my bed."

But illness continued to plague Guerra as a youngster.

"About four or five times a year I got sick," he recalled.

A social agency, contacted for financial help, said they could help, but Alex would have to drop out of school to be eligible. But wanting to get his degree, he refused, and graduated from Friona High School in 1976.

He then enrolled at West Texas State University in Canyon to study business. But he suffered another bout of pneumonia and was forced to drop out.

A kidney infection brought Guerra to an Amarillo physician. Guerra was admitted to High Plains Baptist

Hospital where a number of respiratory tests were conducted.

Guerra was diagnosed as having bronchiectasis.

He was treated and then released. But several months later he was forced to return to the hospital for his most recent stay.

This time, Guerra said, doctors would not release him until he had the proper equipment to live at home.

The Social Services Department of the hospital began searching for funds to buy the needed equipment.

All efforts failed.

"It was just one of those cases where he fell through all the loopholes," said Kendra Elliott, caseworker.

Joe Bermea, president of the

Parish Council of St. Teresa's Catholic Church in Friona, spearheaded a drive to raise the necessary funds through private donations.

Bermea contacted Roy Anzaldúa, a disc jockey at a KMUL radio station in Muleshoe to see if the station could announce that \$2,200 was needed for the life supporting equipment.

"I talked about it on the air Friday and Saturday and then the drive kicked off at 3 p.m. Sunday," Anzaldúa said.

The Catholic Youth Organization and the Senior Class of the high school helped pick up donations.







Comments Are Urged On 1981 Progroams

By November 15, a decision must be made on whether to offer a set-aside program or to permit farmers to be eligible for program benefits--including the reserve program--without setting aside acreage.

In particular, USDA is seeking comments on reserve release and call prices which are based on production costs and adjusted either by increasing the national average loan price or increasing the gap between loan and reserve prices.

Under new authorities granted under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1980, the current cost of production estimates may be considered in determining 1981 target prices. In the past, changes in target prices were based upon a formula considering only prior year's costs.

Because of these new authorities, USDA is asking for comments on how 1981 target prices should be adjusted from 1980 levels and whether producers should be required to comply with established farm normal crop acreages to be eligible for full program benefits.

The USDA also is asking whether barley and oats should be included in the 1981 feed grain program, and appropriate loan and purchase prices for corn, sorghum, barley, oats and rye.

In addition, public comment is requested on whether there should be a land diversion program, and if so, the size of the diversion and level of payment. Comments are also requested on limitations on planted acreage.

If a set-aside program is

implemented, USDA has discretionary authority to adjust the target price to compensate producers for participating in such a program. Comments are requested on whether this authority should be used and the magnitude on any adjustment.

Because of the relationship between soybeans and feed grains, the USDA is also seeking public comments on appropriate loan price and purchase price levels for 1981 crop soybeans. Other determinations affecting soybeans include commodity eligibility, storage requirements and premiums and discounts.

Related to these program decisions are determinations on the amount of the national program acreage and recommended reductions from 1980 harvested acreage for full target price protection.

While USDA is required by law to announce set-aside, national program acreage and recommended reductions in plantings decisions by November 15, the department may announce program decisions before that time.

Before reaching any decisions, all recommendations and views will be considered along with the best data available on world and U.S. crop conditions, production and consumption prospects.

Written comments will be received until October 27 by the director, Production Adjustment Division, ASCS, USDA, room 3630-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C., 20013. All comments will be available for public inspection during regular business hours in the Director's office.



Kicking Errors Cost Chiefs Against Wildcats

"We were pleased with almost every element of our game except our kicking game. It broke down and cost us points. We had breakdowns which led to three touchdowns," said Friona Coach Pete Hubbard regarding Friona's game against River Road last Friday in Amarillo.

Friona dropped the game, 27-7. It was the team's sixth loss of the season.

Nelson Jackson, who had started the first five games at running back, was moved to the quarterback position due to an ankle injury to Martin Mercado.

Although Jackson scored Friona's only touchdown and was the leading ground-gainer, Hubbard said that the shift cost the team, in that the running back position was weakened. In addition to Mercado's injury, the other running back, Tony Jackson, was slowed by a rib injury last Friday.

In the game, it was scoreless past the midway point of the first quarter, when Friona had its first meeting with adversity. Jeff Landrum snapped the ball over punter Mark Montoya's head, giving the Wildcats the ball at the Friona 15.

Three plays later, Dwight King ran a yard for the touchdown and a 6-0 R.R. lead.

King then became a defensive star. He intercepted a Jackson pass at the Friona 17 and ran it to the three. Two plays later, Patch Rogers scored from the one, and the PAT kick made the score 13-0.

The Chieftains held together on their next drive. Jackson ran 63 yards on a quarterback option play to get

Friona on the scoreboard. Montoya's kick made the score 13-7.

With six minutes left in the half, Friona got another bad snap on a punt. This time Montoya alertly threw the ball out of the end zone for a safety which made the score 15-7.

But after the free kick, River Road marched 40 yards in nine plays with Rogers going in from the three, and River Road had a 21-7 halftime lead.

The teams played a scoreless third quarter, but early in the fourth, Rogers fielded a Friona punt and weaved his way 63 yards for the touchdown. That brought the final margin of 27-7.

"Those mistakes killed us. We gave them some easy touchdowns, and it kept us from winning."

Hubbard said the attitude of the Chieftains players remains uncompromising. "Sometimes I get down in the dumps, and they will pick me up. Their spirit has remained great all season," he commented.

"But we really need a win. That would mean so much to these young guys—to prove to them that they can win games would turn it all around," Hubbard said.

The team gets their chance in the

district opener Friday at Dimmitt. Two teams with a lot in common—both having inconsistent offenses, will clash in the contest.

Although Dimmitt is somewhat ahead in that it has a win—over River Road—the Bobcats have scored about the same number of points as has Friona.

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

Girl Scouts Trace Origin To Thirties

Girl Scouts have been in Friona since 1935 when Pearl Kinsley and Winnie Wilkerson started meeting with a small group of girls in Mrs. Kinsley's basement. Now Friona has 125 registered Girl Scouts, which include four divisions.

These four divisions are Brownies, Juniors, Cadettes, and last spring a special troop was formed for the mentally retarded and emotionally disturbed girls. There are also twenty-two registered adults.

Some of the Girl Scouts have gone on to "wider opportunities" such as counselors at camp, and Debbie Baxter was the director of the Girl Scout Camp in Hawaii for two years. Jill Riethmayer and Vicki Flores have attended "Our Cabana" in Mexico which is a gathering of Girl Scouts from all over the world.

Troop projects include visits to Prairie Acres, to shut-ins, making gifts and tray favors for patients in the local hospital. They have planted bulbs and shrubs at different sites around Friona. They were responsible for table decorations at the Chamber of Commerce banquet several years ago and have had a float in the annual Maize Days parade every year.

Each troop is responsible for some type of clean-up campaign to beautify Friona. One troop called Friona citizens during the last election year to remind them to vote.

The Girl Scout leaders have been responsible the past few years for cooking and serving breakfast for the United Fund Drive kick-off.

The purpose of Girl Scouts is to inspire girls with the highest ideals of character, conduct, patriotism and service, so that they will become happy, resourceful citizens, and projects such as these, are serving the purpose.

The money given to the Girl Scouts from the United Fund goes to the Caprock Girl Scout Office in Lubbock, unless the checks are designated otherwise. This money is used to keep up Camp Rio Blanco, near Crosbyton, and pay bills and salaries of adults working there.

The Scouts receive benefits from the council office by learning and training events once a month as they come to Friona to perform these duties.

Each troop is responsible for their own expense and they get their money from troop dues. This year the United Fund has set aside \$500.00 to pay for the utilities and up-keep of our local Girl Scout House, called the Brownie Fund.

"Friona has always been wonderful to support our own Girl Scouts," a spokesman said.




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
